### GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

The Defence (Control of Imports) Regulations.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by regulation 3 of the Defence (Control of Imports) Regulations, I, Maxwell MacLagan Wedderburn, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do by this Order—

- (1) prohibit the importation into Ceylon of any of the goods specified in the Schedule hereto; and
- (2) exempt from such prohibition-
  - (a) such of those goods as may be proved to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs to have been shipped from the country of origin before the seventh day of November, 1939:
  - (b) such firearms as may be proved to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs to be intended for the use of His Majesty's Naval; Military and Air Forces in Ceylon including the Ceylon Defence Force and the Ceylon Naval Volunteer Force;
  - (c) such of those goods as may be consigned to or imported by or for the use of consular officers named in any Order of the Governor issued under section 21 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (d) such of those goods, other than firearms, as may be exempted from payment of import duties under section 22 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (e) such of those goods as may be required by section 47 of the Customs Ordinance to be passed duty free in the circumstances and on the terms and conditions prescribed in that section; and
  - (f) such of those goods as are exempted as passengers' baggage within the meaning of the Customs Regulations.

### SCHEDULE.

Goods the Importation of which is Prohibited.

- 1. Gold Leaf.
- Fireworks.
- 3. Sparkling wines other than Champagne.
- 4. Firearms of the following description :-

Air-guns, air rifles and air pistols, pistols, revolvers, rifles and carbines.

- 5. Stationery Compendiums.
- 6. Straw, grass and rush mats and matting other than ola mats and matting.
- 7. Perfumed spirits, other than bay-rum, eau-de-cologne, and lavender water.
- 8. Toys made wholly or mainly of metal.
- Silver and silver plateware.

### THE DEFENCE (CONTROL OF IMPORTS) REGULATIONS.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by regulation 3 of the Defence (Control of Imports) Regulations, I, Maxwell MacLagan Wedderburn, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do by this Order—

- (1) prohibit the importation into Ceylon of any of the goods specified in the First Schedule hereto from any territory or place mentioned or described in the Second Schedule hereto; and
- (2) exempt from such prohibition—
  - (a) such of those goods as may be proved to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs to have been shipped from the country of origin before the seventh day of November, 1939;
  - (b) such of those goods as may be consigned to or imported by or for the use of consular officers named in any Order of the Governor issued under section 21 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (c) such of those goods as may be exempted from payment of import duty under section 22 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (d) such of those goods as may be required by section 47 of the Customs Ordinance to be passed duty free in the circumstances and on the terms and conditions prescribed in that section;
  - (e) such of those goods as are exempted as passengers' luggage within the meaning of the Customs Regulations;
  - (f) such of those goods as may be imported by individuals, through the post, for the personal use or consumption of such individuals or their families, and not for sale, in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case

### THE DEFENCE (CONTROL OF IMPORTS) REGULATIONS.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by regulation 4 of the Defence (Control of Imports) Regulations, I, Maxwell MacLagan Wedderburn, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do by this Order-

- (1) direct that, except under the authority of a licence granted by or on behalf of the Controller of Imports, the goods specified in the First Schedule hereto shall not be imported into Ceylon from any territory or place mentioned or described in the Second Schedule hereto; and
- (2) exempt from the restriction imposed by paragraph (1)-
  - (a) such of those goods as may be proved to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs to have been shipped from the country of origin before the seventh day of November, 1939;
  - (b) such of those goods as may be consigned to or imported by or for the use of consular officers named in any Order of the Governor issued under section 21 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (c) such of those goods, as may be exempted from payment of import duty under section 22 of the Customs Ordinance;
  - (d) such of those goods as may be required by section 47 of the Customs Ordinance to be passed duty free in the circumstances and on the terms and conditions prescribed in that section;

(e) such of those goods as are exempted as passengers' luggage within the meaning of the Customs

(f) such of those goods as may be imported by individuals through the post for the personal use or consumption of such individuals or their families, and not for sale, in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each

### THE FOOD CONTROL ORDINANCE.

Order.

BY virtue of the powers in me vested by section 4 (1) (d) of the Food Control Ordinance (Chapter 132), I, George Claude Stanley Corea, Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce, do by this order prohibit the removal from the Customs premises at any port or place mentioned in the first column of the Schedule hereto, of any sugar which is imported into Ceylon, except under a permit issued by the person mentioned in the corresponding entry in the second column of that Schedule and except under the second column of the Schedule. in the second column of that Schedule, and except in accordance with such directions as he may issue in regard to the time at which, the manner in which and the place to whom such sugar may so be removed.

Order

BY virtue of the powers in me vested by section 4 (1) (e) of the Food Control Ordinance (Chapter 132), I, George Claude Stanley Corea, Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce, do by this order assume control:

(c) of every store in the town of Galle in which sugar is kept and which is a registered store within the meaning of section 6 (4) of the Essential Commodities Reserves Ordinance, No. 5 of 1939.
