THE DEFENCE (CONTROL OF IMPORTS)  
REGULATIONS.

*Order.*

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by regulation 4 of the Defence (Control of Imports) Regulations, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Order further amend the Order under the said regulation published at page 1919 of *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,543 of November 1, 1939, as amended by the Order published in *Gazette* No. 8,548 of November 10, 1939, as follows:—

(1) in Clause 2 of that Order, by the insertion immediately after paragraph (f), of the following new paragraphs:—

“(g) such of those goods as may be imported by visitors, or residents returning to the Island, in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case; and

(h) such of those goods as are proved to the Principal Collector of Customs to be articles reimported in accordance with

the Regulations made by the Principal Collector of Customs under Schedule A to the Customs Ordinance; and

(i) such of those goods as may be imported by the agents or the members of the staff of the agents of any shipping company, in vessels belonging to that company, for the use of such agents or staff and in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case; and

(j) such of those goods as may be imported as samples or patterns by commercial travellers or indenting agents; and

(k) such of those goods as may be imported before the thirty-first day of December, 1939, on a licence granted by the Principal Collector of Customs under the Ceylon Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Orders in Council, 1934 and 1936.”;

(2) in the First Schedule to that Order—

(a) by the insertion, immediately after item 2, of the following new item:—

“(2A) Beer, ale, porter and all other malt liquors.”;

(b) by the substitution, for items 16, 22, 29, 31, 42 and 53 respectively, of the following new items in the appropriate places:—

- “ 16. Manures—  
 Mineral Rock Phosphate  
 Calcium Cyanamide  
 Nitrate of Soda  
 Muriate of Potash  
 Sulphate of Ammonia  
 Sulphate of Potash  
 Superphosphate  
 Sylvinite.
22. Plates and sheets, not coated—not fabricated, excluding sheets and circles declared to be imported for the purpose of manufacturing drums for the export of local produce.
29. Wireless goods and apparatus including batteries and accumulators.
31. Electrical goods and apparatus other than telegraph and telephone apparatus, electric batteries and accumulators, electric wires and cables and electric lighting accessories and fittings.
42. All apparel of silk, satin, artificial silk, wool or cotton, including cotton banians, hosiery, haberdashery and millinery.
53. Spare parts and accessories for all motor vehicles including magnetos and accumulators.”

(c) by the insertion, immediately after item 54, of the following new item:—

- “ 54A. Imitation Jewellery and haberdashery not included in item 42.”

(1) in Clause 2 of that Order—

(a) by the substitution in paragraph (aa), for the words “before the second day”, of the words “before, or an indent bearing a date prior to, the second day”;

(b) by the insertion immediately after paragraph (f), of the following new paragraphs:—

“(g) such of those goods as may be imported by visitors, or residents returning to the Island, in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case; and

(h) such of those goods as are proved to the Principal Collector of Customs to be articles reimported in accordance with the Regulations made by the Principal Collector of Customs under Schedule A to the Customs Ordinance; and

(i) such of those goods as may be imported by the agents or the members of the staff of the agents of any shipping company, in vessels belonging to that company, for the use of such agents or staff and in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case.”;

(2) in the First Schedule to that Order—

(a) by the substitution, for item 5 of the following new item:—

“ 5. Frozen meat (other than pork), poultry and game.”;

(b) by the omission of item 8;

(c) by the substitution, for items 23, 25, 34, 55, 57, 58, 59, 62, 72, 98, 100, 115, 122, 139, 167 and 173, respectively, of the following new items in the appropriate places:—

“ 23. Fish preserved (other than dried, salted or tinned but including potted fish and jadi).

25. Fruits (other than dates) dried or preserved otherwise than in sugar, syrup or spirits.

34. Spirits other than brandy, rectified spirits of wine and spirits denatured to the satisfaction of the Principal Collector of Customs.

55. Waxes of all kinds other than sealing wax.

57. Vegetable oils, fats and greases (other than essential oils, olive oil and substitutes for ghee).

58. Hides and skins, raw or salted.

59. Raw rubber.

62. All manures other than—

Basic Slag  
 Mineral Rock Phosphate  
 Calcium Cyanamide  
 Nitrate of Soda  
 Muriate of Potash  
 Sulphate of Ammonia  
 Sulphate of Potash  
 Superphosphate  
 Sylvinite.

72. Sanitary fittings including cisterns and baths (porcelain, chinaware and earthenware).

98. Brass and alloys of copper and manufactures thereof (other than nails and screws) falling within the Customs classification Class III., Group D.

100. Electroplate including silverplated and goldplated ware but excluding wire, thread and imitation jewellery.

115. Electrical batteries and accumulators (except splash-proof for motor vehicles) other than dry cell batteries and wireless batteries and accumulators.

122. Magnetos (Ignition) other than for motor vehicles.

139. Sail cloth or canvas (linen).

167. Ammunition and explosives (other than fireworks including Chinese crackers).

173. Jewellery including silver, gold, silver-plated and goldplated wire and thread but excluding imitation jewellery.”;

(d) by the omission of item 149.

- “(g) such of those goods as may be imported by visitors, or residents returning to the Island, in such quantities as the Principal Collector of Customs may consider reasonable in the circumstances of each case; and

CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, No. 39 OF 1939.

Order.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, as amended by Ordinance No. 43 of 1939, I, Samson Felix Amerasinghe, Deputy Controller of Prices, Kegalla District, do by this Order :—

- (1) fix the prices specified in column 2 of the schedule hereto to be the maximum retail price per carboy of 4 gallons and per bottle above which Formic Acid and Acetic Acid of the description and grade specified in the same column shall not be sold within the area mentioned in the corresponding entry of column 1 of the same schedule;
- (2) direct that every trader who exposes for sale any article mentioned in the schedule hereto shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises a notice on which shall be set out the maximum price fixed by this Order in respect of that article;
- (3) direct that no such trader shall sell any article mentioned in the schedule which is adulterated with any other article or with an article of an inferior description or quality;
- (4) direct that where any article mentioned in column 2 of the schedule to this Order is sold, the sale shall be made according to the measure of capacity (liquid measure) and concentration specified in column 2 of that schedule;
- (5) direct that every trader who sells an article of any description and grade mentioned in the schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that article a receipt on which shall be set out :—
  - (i.) the description and grade of the article sold;
  - (ii.) the price paid for the quantity of article sold; and
  - (iii.) the date of the sale.
