Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 2 or paragraph 3 of this Order during the twelve days (exclusive of Sundays) immediately preceding each of the following days, namely, Christmas Day, Hindu New Year's Day, Muslim Hadji Festival Day, the full moon day of the Sinhalese month Wesak, Hindu Deepavali Festival Day, and the day fixed by the Governor under the Holidays Ordinance as the day following the end of Ramazan, any shop other than a

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MOTOR CAR ORDINANCE, No. 45 OF 1938.

Notice of Applications for Licences for Omnibuses and Lorries, 1941.

IN terms of section 46 (1) (b) of the Motor Car Ordinance, No. 45 of 1938, as amended by Ordinance, No. 38 of 1939, a notice of applications for hieraces for omnibuses and lorries for the rest of the year 1941, is published below for general information.

Provisions of section 46 (2) (a) and (b) and of section 46 (4) of the Motor Car Ordinance apply to objections against the issue of hieraces. Objections must be made in the manner prescribed by the regulations published in Government Gazette No. 8,533 of October 20. 1939. Objectors under section 46 (2) (b) are requested to state clearly in their objections the facts entitling them to object, i.e., whether they are holders of valid licences or are themselves applicants for licences for omnibuses or lorries in respect of any route or m respect of the whole or any part of the area of operation, as the case may be, which is proposed by any applicant. They are also requested to give the registered number of their vehicles on the route or area applied for or cite the serial numbers of their applications as the objections must be made to the Commissions and the Gazette.

The objections must be made to the Commissioner of Motor Transport, Colombo, so as to be received by him not later than 2 r.M on MONDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1941.

Any objections not conforming to these requirements will be of no avail

If the objection is in respect of any application for a licence for an omnibus or lorry "under construction", the serial number given to the application in the list must be quoted.
