The by-laws of the Municipal Council of Kandy published in the Supplement to Gazette No. 6,165 of January 11, 1907, as amended by the by-laws published in Gazette No. 7,749 of December 6, 1929, are hereby further amended by the addition, immediately after by-law 39 (f), of the following new by-law —

“ 39 (g) Where any plate issued under by-law 39 (c) becomes indistinct or defaced by use or otherwise, the owner thereof shall return it to the Municipal Commissioner and shall be entitled, on making a payment of twenty-five cents, to receive a fresh plate. THE AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS (REGULATION)

IT is hereby notified that the Executive Committee of Agriculture and Lands has, in pursuance of the powers vested in that Committee by section 6 (1) of the Agricultural Products (Regulation) Ordinance, No. 29 of 1939, after consultation with the Agricultural Products Regulation Board, prescribed—

- (a) that in order to obtain a licence to import a specified quantity of raw coffee seed an importer must purchase Ceylon Grown Raw Coffee Seed in the ratio of 1 hundred weight of Ceylon Grown Raw Coffee Seed to 1,000 hundred weights of imported raw Coffee Seed.
- (b) Rs. 55 as the price at which 1 hundred weight of Ceylon Grown Raw Coffee Seed will be sold to an applicant to import raw Coffee Seed
- (c) Colombo as the place at which the above local product will ordinarily be delivered to the purchaser.

By-laws.

1. No person shall keep any aerated water manufactory except on a licence duly obtained in that behalf from the Chairman. Every such licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in each year.
2. No licence issued under these by-laws shall be transferable.
3. Every licensee shall comply with the requirements of any notice served on him by the Chairman—
 - (a) within the time specified therein; or
 - (b) within seven days of the service of that notice, if no such time is specified therein
4. All notices in connection with any aerated water manufactory shall be deemed to be served upon the licensee when left with any person employed in that manufactory.
5. No person shall be entitled to a licence unless—
 - (a) the building to be used as an aerated water manufactory is in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted;
 - (b) every room in such building is provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when opened being not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
 - (c) the walls of every room in such building are not less than seven feet in height and are built of brick, stone or cabook;
 - (d) such walls are plastered with lime-mortar and white-washed;
 - (e) the eaves of such building are at least six feet from the ground;
 - (f) the roof of such building is made of some permanent material, and the floors are cemented throughout;
 - (g) the woodwork of such building is oil-painted or lime-washed.
 - (h) such building is at least fifty feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, cattle shed, manure heap or open sewer;
 - (i) such building is provided with at least one room that can be used for the preparation of aerated water;
 - (j) such building is provided with a room suitable for the storage of articles necessary for the preparation of aerated water;
 - (k) the premises are provided with adequate drainage facilities and latrine accommodation; and
 - (l) the premises are provided with water from a wholesome source.
6. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued any aerated water manufactory ceases to conform to the conditions specified in by-law 5, the Chairman may cause a notice to be served on the licensee directing him to do all things necessary to make the premises conform to such conditions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of such notice the Chairman may suspend or cancel the licence.
7. Every licensee shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board on which his name in English, Sinhalese and Tamil and the phrase "Licensed Aerated Water Manufactory" and its Sinhalese and Tamil equivalents shall be clearly painted.
8. Every licensee shall cause—
 - (a) a list of the names and addresses of all the employees (including the vendors of aerated water) to be kept in the premises and to be available for inspection;
 - (b) the walls of every room to be lime-washed in June and December in every year;
 - (c) the woodwork to be lime-washed, or if oil-painted to be washed with hot water and soap in June and December in every year and at such other times as the Chairman may order in writing;
 - (d) the floors to be washed at least once every day;
 - (e) every part of the premises and all furniture, utensils and equipment to be kept clean and in good condition,

- (f) no articles other than those necessary for the purposes of the aerated water manufactory to be introduced into the premises,
- (g) all articles necessary for the preparation of aerated water to be stored in vermin-proof cupboards or shelves,
- (h) every bottle containing aerated water to bear a label, setting out the contents of the bottle, the place of manufacture, the name of the person or firm owning the aerated water manufactory, and the number assigned to such manufactory by the Chairman,
- (i) any person engaged in bottling aerated waters to wear, whilst so engaged, a wire gauze mask, and leather gloves,
- (j) any vessel used for containing syrup, essences or chemicals to be made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware or galvanized iron, and to be kept in a place specially set apart for its storage,
- (k) all refuse in and about the premises to be deposited in a suitable receptacle approved by the Chairman,
- (l) such refuse to be removed at least once a day and to be disposed of so as to cause no nuisance,
- (m) the premises to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, or cesspit, and from any other similar nuisance,
- (n) the premises to be provided with at least two spittoons,
- (o) no animal or bird to be kept in the premises for any purpose whatsoever,
- (p) a separate place to be provided for the cleaning of bottles;
- (q) the water used in the premises—
- (1) to be transported in such a manner that such water shall not be polluted in transit,
 - (2) to be stored in clean and properly constructed tanks, and
 - (3) to be passed through a suitable filter approved by the Chairman before use, and
- (r) a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, and the licence, to be framed and hung in a conspicuous position in the premises.

9. Every licensee shall keep for the purpose of cleaning bottles used in the aerated water manufactory two tanks, one tank to be used for any cleaning of a preliminary nature and the removal of labels, and the other for the final cleaning. Provided that where the water is supplied through pipes one tank shall be necessary only, as the final cleaning in that case shall be in running water.

10. Every licensee shall take all necessary steps to ensure that only articles that are clean, wholesome, and of good quality are used in the preparation of aerated water.

11. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by the licensee or person in charge of an aerated water manufactory to enter such manufactory or take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of aerated water, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

12. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person duly authorised by him in writing to enter and inspect any aerated water manufactory at all reasonable times, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

13. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee on a second or subsequent conviction by such Tribunal, for breach of any of these by-laws and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

14. In these by-laws—

“Committee” means the Wellawa Village Committee.

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee;

“Licensee” means the holder of a licence issued by the Chairman under these by-laws.

Regulations

1. The Manufacture of Matches Regulations, 1938, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,418 of December 3, 1938, as last amended by the regulation published in *Gazette* No. 8,748 of May 23, 1941 (hereinafter referred to as “the principal Regulations”) are hereby further amended as follows—

- (1) in regulation 2, by the omission of the definitions “statistical year” and “sale aggregate”;
- (2) by the omission of regulations 28, 29, 30, 35, and 36,
- (3) by the substitution, for regulation 32, of the following new regulation—

“32 (1) The Director shall in the month of January in the year 1942 allocate a quota to each holder of a licence to manufacture matches, and specify in that licence the amount of the quota so allocated and the maximum permitted monthly output of the manufactory or manufactories specified in the licence.

(2) It shall be the duty of every person who is the holder of a licence to manufacture matches to transmit his licence to the Director in the month of January in the year 1942 in order to enable compliance to be made with the provisions of paragraph (1).

(3) The amount allocated by the Director under paragraph (1) as the quota of the holder of a licence to manufacture matches shall be an amount equivalent to the highest quota allocated to that holder in any quota year prior to the quota year commencing on February 1, 1942.

(4) The amount of the quota and the amount of the maximum permitted monthly output specified in any licence under the preceding provisions of this regulation shall, subject to the provisions of regulation 34 and of paragraph (5) of this regulation, be, respectively, the quota of the holder of that licence, and the maximum permitted monthly output of the manufactory or manufactories specified in that licence, for the quota year commencing on February 1, 1942, and for every succeeding quota year.

(5) In any case where a share in the quota of a cancelled or revoked licence is allocated under regulation 40 to the holder of a licence to manufacture matches, the quota of that holder for that quota year and for every succeeding quota year shall be an amount equivalent to the aggregate of—

- (a) the quota allocated to him under the preceding provisions of this regulation, and
- (b) the share allocated to him under regulation 40.

The Director shall in any such case, upon transmission to him of the licence, make such alterations therein, relating to the amount of the quota and to the maximum permitted monthly output, as may be necessary in consequence of the increase in the amount of the quota.”

2. The amendments effected in the principal Regulations by regulation 1 of these regulations shall not be deemed in any way to prejudice the validity of anything done under the principal Regulations in respect of the quota year commencing on February 1, 1941, or to affect or modify any quota allocated in respect of that year under those Regulations.

KANDY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on October 25, 1941, at 8 30 a.m. in accordance with the notice dated October 21, 1941.

Present — Mr. A. Morley Spaar, Mayor; Gate Muhandiram N. Canaganayagam, Deputy Mayor; Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. M. A. S. Marikar, Mr. V. D. Paul Raj, Mr. B. H. Dunuwille, Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra, Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte, Mr. L. B. Mawilmada, Mr. S. Halim Deen, Mr. H. L. Ratwatte, and the Municipal Commissioner.

1 The Minutes of Proceedings of the meeting held on September 27, 1941, having been previously submitted to the Mayor for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Mayor

1A The Mayor made the following announcement. — 'In the Kandy letter of the Times of Ceylon by their Correspondent of the 13th instant, I find the following statement alleged to have been made by Mr. George E. de Silva—

"The Kandy Municipal Council has become an Augean Stables and my other name is not Hercules—When I left the Council we had a surplus balance of nearly four lakhs of Rupees—I dread to think what it must be to-day".

Since this appeared I requested the Accountant to submit a statement of the surplus balances from the year 1932.

I think Mr. de Silva left the Council in 1939 at which time the Surplus Balance was only Rs 234,627 03 It is obvious that his statement that there was a surplus balance of nearly four lakhs is incorrect

From the records available I find that the surplus balance which stood at Rs 415,371 in the year 1932 had dwindled down in 1939 to less than 2½ lakhs.

I take this opportunity to mention that at the end of 1940—at the end of the first year of the New Council—it was possible to add a sum of Rs 1,656 to the surplus balance after an interval of several years

This sum would have been much more if the Council had not to shoulder the burden of additional expenditure due to unforeseen circumstances such as flood damage, Poor Law Administration, additional wages to labourers owing to the war, commuted pensions and pensions to 3 officers not provided in the Budget, and a contribution of Rs 5,000 to the Gloucester Fund.

I felt it my duty to refer to this matter in fairness to this Council to remove any wrong impression which the Public may have arrived at in reading the article

2. The following documents were submitted —

(a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1940 to August 31, 1941, on account of the Municipal Fund.

(b) Progress report of works brought up to September, 1941.

(c) Health Officer's report for September, 1941.

(d) Statement of cases instituted by the several inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of September, 1941.

(e) The reservoir reading for the week ending September 24, 1941.

Resolved that the statement (a) together with the minutes of proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No 6 of 1910" be forwarded to the Commissioner of Local Government for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table — Reports by the several inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies inspected during September, 1941.

4. Petitions — (a) Mr. M. A. S. Marikar presented a petition signed by Mr. K. D. Edmund Silva and others for additional standposts for the alley near the Wembley Theatre, (b) Mr. L. B. Mawilmada presented a petition from Mr. K. B. Ekanayake regarding the Gansabhawa path which branches off from Kurunegala road running by the side of premises No 37, Kurunegala road, (c) Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte presented a letter from the Honey. Secretary, Kandy Ratepayers' Association, dated October 23, 1941.

The Mayor undertook to look into the petitions

5. Notice of Motions — Nil

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. L. B. Mawilmada moved the following motion. With leave of the house he addressed in Sinhalese and later in English in support of the motion — (a) "That in the opinion of this Council steps be taken to amend the Municipal Councils Ordinance if necessary to enable the Council to exempt the paddy fields from the consolidated rates" Gate Muhandiram N. Canaganayagam seconded Mr. B. H. Dunuwille and Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte were heard in support. Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Mr. M. A. S. Marikar and Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra were heard contra. Mr. L. B. Mawilmada was heard in reply. The proposer called for a division. The following voted for the motion — Messrs. S. Halim Deen, L. B. Mawilmada, A. C. L. Ratwatte, W. A. B. Soysa, and Gate Muhandiram Canaganayagam—5. Against — Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra, Mr. B. H. Dunuwille, Mr. V. D. Paul Raj, Mr. M. A. S. Marikar, and the Mayor—6. Declined to vote — Mr. H. L. Ratwatte. The motion was declared lost.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. L. B. Mawilmada moved — (b) "As the Council spends a large sum of money yearly on concrete and timber posts used by the Electricity Department and as there is a trained gardener attached to the Council, this Council resolves that steps be taken to plant such timber trees, as can be used by the Electricity Department, in the lands belonging to this Council." Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne seconded. Agreed to refer to the Works and Finance Committees for report

7. Papers *re* indebtedness of Mr. G. B. M. Hay, Assistant Electrical Engineer.

Read letter from Mr. Hay asking for extension of time till the end of November, 1941.

Decided that the time asked be allowed and should be considered final

8. To elect a member to serve on the Law Committee to fill vacancy caused by the death of Mr. P. M. Talwatte. Deferred.

9. Recommendations of Standing Committees —

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Purposes held on September 27, 1941.

(1) Lease of Roseneath estate. Papers *re* action filed for the cancellation of the lease of Roseneath estate to Mr. D. T. Pelpola. Mr. D. E. Weerasuriya has made an application on behalf of Mr. D. T. Pelpola that the Tea Controller be informed that there is no objection to the issue of coupons to Mr. Pelpola without prejudice to any rights that the Council may have with reference to the action instituted against Mr. Pelpola. The Committee drafted the following letter to be sent to Mr. Weerasuriya — "With reference to your letter of the 10th September, 1941, I have the honour to inform you that at no time did I instruct the Tea Controller to suspend or withhold tea coupons due to your client in respect of Roseneath estate. The Tea Controller has made no enquiry on this point and if he does enquire I shall inform him that the Council has made no claim to the coupons"

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Law and General Purposes held on October 11, 1941.

(2) The approval of Council is required for the re-conveyance of premises No. 34, Aruppola, to their present owners K. V. D. A. de Silva Wijeratne and W. N. D. Justina Wijeratne Hamine — Recommended.

(3) Drafts of the Indenture proposed to be executed with the Automobile Association of Ceylon in respect of the extension of the existing lease of ground to them for their garage in Kandy from January 1, 1941, to December 31, 1942 — Recommended.

(4) With reference to the resolution passed at the meeting of Council held on September 27, 1941, it is necessary for the Law Committee to consider the terms and conditions on which the application of Mr. Ameen to provide door behind premises Nos 102 and 103, Trincomalee street, to open into Municipal Council premises at the rear of the Health Department offices, for conservancy purposes, should be allowed — Recommended that the permit be allowed on the following conditions — (a) The permit-holder shall at his own cost provide the entrances to the wall as approved by the Commissioner, and maintain same in good condition. (b) Shall pay the Municipal Council an annual rental of cents twenty-five. (c) Shall use the said entrance only for conservancy purposes. (d) The Council reserves to itself the right (1) to terminate this permit at will, and (2) to close the said entrance or entrances without notice and without assigning any reason therefor. (e) The permit-holder shall deposit a sum of Rs 5 as the cost of closing the entrance if it considers necessary to do so.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on Finance and Establishment held on October 11, 1941

(5) To consider the Commissioner's memo dated September 23, 1941, regarding the percentage of consolidated rates to be levied in respect of the year 1942 — Recommended the adoption of the following resolution — (1) "By virtue of the powers conferred by section 115 (1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance (Chapter 193), this Council hereby — (a) makes and assesses for the year 1942 a rate of twenty per centum on the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the administrative limits of this Council, (b) declares that of the said rate a portion equal to two and a half per centum of the annual value is levied for the purpose of providing the conservancy service, and (c) declares for the purpose of section 17 of the Colombo Municipal Council Waterworks Ordinance (Chapter 161), that a proportion of the said rate equal to eight per centum of the annual value is assessed in respect of the water supply provided by the Council" (2) The Commissioner to assess the houses, buildings, lands or tenements through the Revenue Inspectors for the year 1942.

(6) To consider the M. O. H.'s report that the amount provided for the purchase of disinfectants is nearly exhausted owing to the increase in their prices brought about by the war, and asking that a sum of Rs 150 be transferred from savings out of the amount provided for labour under this vote, to meet the expenditure up to the end of the year — Recommended.

- (7) Papers *re* request from the Kandy Rowing Club to make use of the old barge purchased by it from Mr. Mottram as a supplementary boat-house. Also letter of September 11, 1941, received from the Secretary indicating the terms in regard to special concessions which the Club proposes to allow to schools in Kandy.—Recommend that the Rowing Club be allowed to keep the barge on the Lake on the suggested fee of Rs 3 per annum.
- (8) To consider the Works Engineer's report that there is a *kovil* on the site at which it is proposed to construct 6 labourers' latrines at Mahayaya, and the man in charge of it has no objection to removing the *kovil* to another site provided he is paid a sum of Rs. 25 to meet the cost of removal and a further sum of Rs 5 necessary for the performance of certain religious ceremonies. Funds are available and the expenditure can be met from the vote provided. Sanction of Council is necessary to pay the amount asked for and to allow the man in charge to do the work connected with the removal.—Recommended.
- (9) To consider the following motion moved by Mr. B. H. Dunuwille at the meeting of Council held on June 28, 1941, and referred to the Finance Committee.—“That this Council do vote a reasonable sum of money that may be approved of by the Finance Committee towards the Flood Relief Fund” The Accountant recommends that a vote of Rs. 600 be obtained.—Recommended a vote of Rs. 600 be allowed and allocated under the following heads—19 (c) Contribution to Mayor's Relief Fund, Rs 500; 19 (g) Flood Relief, Rs 100.
- (10) To consider papers *re* proposal to purchase land belonging to Mr. Cracklow in Gotambe to serve as site for the Clinic in the Peradeniya area. Approval is required to offer Rs 2,300 for the land.—Recommended.
- (11) To obtain a vote of Rs 20 required to meet the wages of the substitute peons employed at the Library as and when the Librarian and the peon go on leave.—Recommended.
- (12) A supplementary vote of Rs. 320 was allowed at the meeting of the Council held on August 23, 1941, for erecting 8 “Major Road ahead” signs. The Works Engineer reports that the cost of boards has gone up considerably and a sum of Rs. 558·80 is required for the work. A supplementary vote of Rs. 238·80 is necessary.—Recommended.
- (13) To obtain the approval of the Council to write off the following sums in respect of market stalls and grain sheds as the amounts are irrecoverable, as per Accountant's report of September 23, 1941. *Market Stall Rents*.—1935–1938, Rs. 509·26; 1939, Rs. 582·14; 1940, Rs. 247·84. *Grain Sheds*.—1938, Rs 33; 1939, Rs 66 Also a supplementary vote of Rs. 238·24 is necessary as a reserve of Rs. 1,200 has already been made.—Recommended
The Accountant to report on the procedure to be adopted to prevent a repetition of such items having to be written off.
- (14) To consider letter dated September 29, 1941, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer on the subject of purchasing electrical goods required, without calling for tenders, with Commissioner's and Mayor's minutes thereon. The Electricity Committee recommends the purchase of goods on quotations and purchases be made on the authority of the Commissioner.—Recommend that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (15) To consider the confirmation of Mrs G. A. Aponsu, Public Health Nurse, who completed her probationary period on October 1, 1941. The M. O. H. recommends her confirmation.—Recommended.
- (16) To consider application from Marthens, retired reservoir watcher, for a plot of land in Reservoir road to enable him to erect a dwelling. The Commissioner has inspected the land leased to Siyathu, Metal Contractor, and proposes that a portion of it as per sketch should be leased to the applicant. The Works Engineer recommends the lease on a rental of 50 cents for six months. Approval is required to issue a permit to the applicant for the occupation of the land on the terms suggested. The Law Committee recommends that the application be allowed on the terms suggested and further recommends that the building to be erected should conform to the usual requirements and that no compensation be claimed in any event for improvements made or alleged to have been made by the lessee in the event of the lease being cancelled.—Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (17) Papers *re* damaged water meter at premises No 6B, Lady Gordon's road. Neither the owner nor the tenant admits liability to make good the damage and the Council's lawyer, who was consulted, does not think a claim can be successfully maintained. The claim amounts to Rs. 20·75. Sanction is required to write off the claim. The Law Committee recommends that the claim be written off.—Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (18) To consider papers *re* the M. O. H.'s Memorandum on an Anti-tuberculosis Scheme for the town. The M. O. H. considers it necessary that the Scheme should be considered very early. Before the matter is brought up with the Budget he suggests that the terms and conditions of service of the Medical Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare, as special Tuberculosis officer should be settled. The Health Committee recommended that the designation of the Medical Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare, be changed to Assistant M. O. H. and that he be detailed to do this work. That there was no need to alter the terms and conditions of service.—Recommended that Health Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (19) The accepted tender for improvements to the bathing place at Bahirawakanda was for Rs. 1,135·60, but the contractor wants increased rates in respect of certain items, occasioned by increase in price of materials. The Works Engineer is of opinion that the rates claimed are reasonable. Grant of this request would make it necessary to increase the amount of tender to Rs 1,234·60, while the amount available in the estimate for this work is Rs 1,206·66. The Works Engineer asks for a supplementary vote of Rs. 133·34 to provide for supervision and contingencies as well. The Works Committee recommended a supplementary vote of Rs 161·28.—Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (20) Application for a water service to the Buddhist Temple at premises No 1066, Peradeniya road. The Works Engineer recommends a metered service with the limit of free allowance fixed at 10,000 gallons per quarter. The Works Committee recommended the free allowance be fixed at 10,000 gallons.—Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (21) Tender received from Messrs Walker & Greig for the supply of water meters. The Works Engineer recommends the acceptance of the tender. The Works Committee recommended the acceptance of the tender. Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (22) Meters have been fixed and readings of the water consumed at the Mosques at 1040, Peradeniya road, and 254, Katugastota road, taken. It is necessary to determine the quantity of water to be given as a free allowance in each case now, and papers are circulated for the purpose. The Works Committee recommended—(1) in respect of mosque at No 1040, Peradeniya road, a free allowance of 15,000 gallons per quarter; (2) in respect of the Mosque at 254, Katugastota road, a free allowance of 10,000 gallons per quarter.—Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (23) To consider letter addressed by Mr J. R. C. Backhouse suggesting that the Council take over the maintenance of the overhead mains connecting the bungalows in Siebel's and Primrose Gardens and improve the lighting system to standard required. The Municipal Electrical Engineer recommends that the Council should take over the maintenance, and that improvements required to the system be considered with next year's Budget. The Electricity Committee recommended that the Municipal Electrical Engineer's recommendation be adopted and that estimates be called from the Municipal Electrical Engineer.—Recommended that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (24) Papers *re* recovery of expenditure incurred in repairing a lamp post in Lady Mac Callum's drive damaged by an elephant on April 2, 1940. The Electricity Committee recommended that the overhead charges be waived and that a fresh account be submitted to the executor of the estate of Sir Cudah Ratwatte.—Recommended that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (25) To consider proposed amendment of by-law 11 of the by-laws relating to the supply of electricity. The Electricity Committee recommended that the following by-law be adopted.—11 (3) “The agreement shall be in force for a minimum period of 12 months and thereafter for similar periods, provided, however, that the Municipal Electrical Engineer, or the consumer may determine it by giving thirty days' notice in writing of his intention to do so immediately prior to the end of the first twelve months or of any subsequent period of twelve months.”—Recommended that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.

- (30) To consider application from Mr Richard Suriyadasa for an appointment as an engineering apprentice in order to enable him to acquire practical knowledge necessary for him to take up the A.M.I.C.E. The Works Committee recommended that the application be approved subject to the fee of Rs. 500 per annum, as a premium, and the whole sum being appropriated by the Works Engineer.—Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

(31) To consider estimate for Rs. 100 from the Works Engineer for providing a footbridge near the Mawilmada School in terms of the motion moved by Mr. L. B. Mawilmada at the meeting of Council held on June 28, 1941. The expenditure can be met from estimate 13. The Works Committee recommended the construction of the footbridge.—Recommended that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

(32) To consider letter dated September 25, 1941, from Mr. V. K. Fernando, the owner of premises No. 957, Peradeniya road, in which the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic is housed, requesting that an increased rent of Rs. 60 be paid for the Clinic from January 1, 1942. Minutes of Proceedings of a Special General Meeting of the Kandy Municipal Council held in the Town Hall Kandy at 8.30 a.m. on November 1, 1941, in accordance with the Notice dated October 28, 1941.

Present.—Mr. A. Morley Spaar, Mayor, Gate Muhandiram N. Canaganayagam, Deputy Mayor; Mr. V. D. Paul Raj, Mr. B. H. Dunuwille; Mr. H. R. U. Premachandra; Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Mr. W. A. B. Soysa, Mr. L. B. Mawilnada; Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte, Mr. M. A. S. Marikar; and the Municipal Commissioner.

1. To consider item No. 9 (5) of meeting held on October 25, 1941, deferred for consideration—

Item referred to.—To consider Commissioner's memo. dated September 23, 1941, regarding the percentage of consolidated rates to be levied in respect of the year 1942.

The Finance Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution—(1) "By virtue of the power conferred by section 115(1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance (Chapter 193), this Council hereby—(a) makes and assesses for the year 1942 a rate of twenty per centum on the annual value of all houses, and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the administrative limits of this Council, (b) declares that of the said rate a portion equal to two and half per centum of the annual value is levied for the purpose of providing the conservancy service, and (c) declares for the purpose of section 17 of the Colombo Municipal Council Waterworks Ordinance (Chapter 161), that a proportion of the said rate equal to eight per centum of the annual value is assessed in respect of the water supply provided by the Council." (2) The Commissioner to assess the houses, buildings, lands or tenements through the Revenue Inspectors for the year 1942.

The Mayor read the following statement.—(Vide annexure)

The Council went into Committee and considered the Finance Committee's recommendation.

The Council resumed and Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne proposed, and Mr. H. R. C. Premachandra seconded, that the following proviso be added to the recommendation "Provided that in the areas not served by water the consolidated rate be reduced by 1 per cent".

This was put to the house and carried by 7 to 2.

Mr. M. A. S. Marikar proposed and Mr. W. A. B. Soysa seconded the following amendment—"That the Council resolves that the consolidated rate be 19 per cent".

The amendment was put to the house and declared lost, 2 voting for and 7 against.

ANNEXURE.

Mayor's Statement.

The Mayor made the following statement—The item on the Agenda has been circulated to you. Perhaps you have studied it very carefully and come to the Council with an open mind to consider the matter.

I should like to bring before you certain facts and figures for your consideration. The revenue under the head, consolidated rates, as per rates levied in 1941, and the annual rates amount in the 20 per cent area to Rs. 305,477.40, in the 12 per cent area to Rs. 14,744.16, and in the 9½ per cent area to Rs. 13,358.23, making a total of Rs. 333,579.79.

That is on the consolidated rates account. The remissions and write-offs are estimated at Rs. 17,579.79. Remissions are allowed when houses are untenanted. Rates are written off or waived in the case of paddy fields when the crops fail as a result of the floods, and when objection is made. When objections are raised on the assessments certain reductions are made. All these items are not above the usual years. This is the amount set apart for such purposes.

So that the revenue amounts to Rs. 316,000 after allowing for such reductions and write-offs. If the rates are reduced by one per cent there will be a shortfall of Rs. 17,908. As you will see, the areas which pay 12 per cent, and 9½ per cent, will not be materially affected by such a reduction. The decrease on each unit in the 20 per cent area will be Rs. 309 per year, in the 12 per cent area will be Re. 1.57 per year, in the 9½ per cent area will be 70 cents per year by the reduction of one per cent. I hope you will bear that in mind. A sum of Rs. 51,350 is required for essential items of capital expenditure for the coming year. But according to resolutions passed by the Council and recommendations made by the members, I feel that the full list will amount to two or three lakhs or rupees. The Commissioner and I and the Heads of Departments went into the list very carefully and cut it as drastically as possible, reducing it to that minimum.

It is left for you to decide whether that is the irreducible minimum. At the same time members are interested in various items of work in their wards, and this amount is likely to be increased by about Rs. 25,000 when we come to discuss the list. It may even be more than that and will put us in a difficult position.

The total sum available for capital expenditure is Rs. 26,700 on the present rates. Against this there is a sum of Rs. 51,350 to be incurred on capital works. If we decide to adopt that list there will be a deficit of Rs. 29,560, which will have to be drawn from the surplus balances.

In the 1941 Budget the Council has budgetted for a deficit of Rs. 26,617.75 despite the increase of rates by 1½ per cent. If the rates were to be reduced by 1 per cent there will be a shortfall of Rs. 17,908.68. As I mentioned before there will be a deficit of Rs. 16,208 and there will be no funds whatsoever to meet items of capital expenditure.

I think I have given you sufficient facts and figures to prove to you conclusively the necessity to continue to levy the rates and taxes on a 20 per cent basis so as to provide essential services, and to contribute some material progress and advancement in this town. Taxation is a levy which no individual accepts without a grumble—but yet it has to be faced. Let us face the issue which confronts us with a sense of responsibility. I cannot help coming to the conclusion that the agitation against this step has been engineered by men who have no abiding interest in this town, in fact, by men who neither pay rents nor taxes, with mischievous intentions to gain their own ends. What is sadly needed in this town is a healthy public opinion on all questions of great importance.

The majority of members in this Council are elected members and I grant we are placed in an embarrassing position as we cannot anticipate the repercussions to our attitude in this matter, but I feel sure that our electorates would, if facts are placed before them, view it in a sensible and in a reasonable manner, with sound judgment and understanding with the exception, as I said before, of some political agitators. I have spent some hours with the Commissioner and the Accountant in working out the figures placed before you to-day and from these investigations I find that the decrease which each unit of assessment will be relieved of paying on the 19, 11 and 8½ per cent basis works out at Rs. 3.09, Rs. 1.57, and cents 70. In the lowest rate of assessment in the 9½ per cent area where the village population predominates, it works out at an increase of nearly 6 cents per month or 70 cents per annum, and in the 12 per cent area served by conservancy nearly 11 cents extra per month. I would even admit that for the villager an additional sum of 6 or 11 cents burden per month may be a consideration. Against this, if the Council is able to undertake some work or improvement for their benefit by the increased levy it will react to their benefit by 3, 4, or 500 per cent. Is it not then justifiable? It might be argued that for the last 8 years or so that the consolidated rate remained at 18½ per cent and what need was there for an increase on that score?

The additional burden of Poor Law relief and the feeding of school children—costing at the moment Rs. 33,000—has been forced on us by the Government and I am glad that the Council has shouldered this burden. The costs of materials for essential services have gone up by 50 and 100 per cent, and even more in many cases, perhaps 300 to 400 per cent.

Are these not reasons by themselves for the increase of rates by 1½ per cent? I challenge anyone in this hall to deny this fact—that each and everyone of us, representatives of our electorates, has taken a keen interest in providing essential needs in the ward he represents such as wells, bathing places, public conveniences, playgrounds, the carrying out of improvements to rural roads and paths neglected for many years, the establishment of additional clinics, the lighting of miles of roads and paths in villages which remained unlit and in darkness for many years. These are only a few of the many improvements effected.

Is not all this a justification for increased revenue? Gentlemen, how could we have met this expenditure and provided these services? How are we going to continue to meet such services? Have not these amenities provided some justification for the expenditure incurred? It is not possible—to quote a familiar aphorism—to make bricks without clay. We shall have to cry a halt to all very essential improvements still awaiting attention and mark time. I sincerely feel we are not justified in doing so. Circumstances do not warrant it. I had intended to come to the Council for the approval of a loan of Rs. 50,000 or Rs. 75,000 for the construction of about 75 tenements for the housing of those who are now weighed down with the burden of paying from Rs. 8 to Rs. 12 per month as rent of tenements rented out by them from rapacious landlords, similar or in a worse condition than those rented out by the Council for Rs. 4 per month and for other improvements for the benefit of the poorer classes. But if we have not got the resources and if we are not in a position to pay interest on such a loan and the repayment of the principal in 15 or 20 years it cannot be done and these amenities will have to be withheld from those whose cause, members are anxious to espouse, for an indefinite period—till the crack of doom. We are trying to be scrupulous over small things when there are greater issues at stake by retrenchment. I think I have said enough for a forward policy and to convince you of the need for continuing to levy the rate of 20 per cent, and I hope that better judgment will prevail and that we shall be unanimous in voting for the same rates that have prevailed in the current year for 1942.

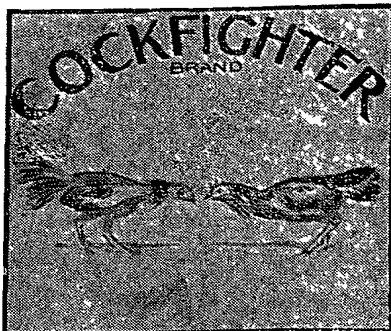

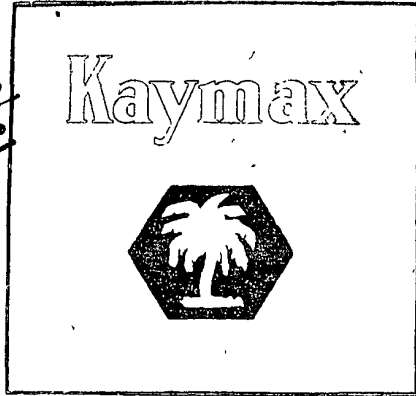

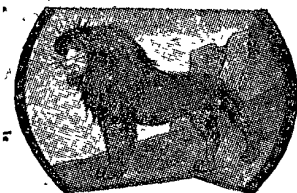
