THE DEFENCE (AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS SERVICES) REGULATIONS.
ORDER made by the Governor under Regulation 10 of the Defence (Air Raid Precautions Services) Regulations

Order.

The Defence (Air Raid Precautions Services) Order, 1942, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,843 of January 7, 1942, is hereby amended by the omission of paragraph 10 of that Order, and the substitution therefor of the following paragraph—

“10. *Equipment and Clothing.*—The following uniform is prescribed for the Service:—

(a) Controller, Chief Warden, Deputy Chief Warden, Head Wardens, Deputy Head Wardens, Officers-in-Charge of Services and Staff Officers:—

Tunic, white drill of ‘bush type’;
Slacks or shorts, white drill,
Shirt, white twill, military pattern,
Socks or stockings, white;
Shoes, brown;
Steel helmet (or topi or khaki pigsticker, till helmets are available);
Belt, white drill with buckle

(b) Other ranks —

Shirt, white twill, military pattern;
Slacks or shorts, white drill;
Steel helmet (or topi or khaki pigsticker, till helmets are available);
Shoes or boots, brown.

All ranks will wear the letters A R. P at the base of the shoulder straps of the shirt or tunic

(c) Badges of rank:—

(i) Head Wardens and Deputy Head Wardens—one five pointed star on each shoulder;

(ii) Deputy Chief Warden and Staff Officers—two such stars;

(iii) Controller, Chief Warden and Officers-in-Charge of Services—three such stars;

(d) The following distinguishing marks will be worn on the brassard of certain officers:—

(i) Controller—three quarter inch red band on the A. R. P. brassard;

(ii) Officer-in-Charge of Services—three quarter inch blue band on the A. R. P. brassard;

(iii) Staff Officers—the letters ‘S.O.’ in red on the A. R. P. brassard.

All ranks when on duty, and only when on duty, shall wear on the left upper forearm a white brassard on which the letters A. R. P. in black shall be imposed. The brassard will remain the property of the Government. Every member of the Service must keep the brassard carefully in his personal custody and prevent it from being used by any unauthorised person. Any person who for any reason ceases to be a member of the Service shall return without delay to the Officer-in-Charge of his Service his brassard, together with the uniform or any portion of the uniform which has been supplied to him.

(e) The service when on duty and when so directed by the Controller or other appropriate authority, as the case may be, shall carry such equipment as may be ordered by the Controller or such authority.”

IT is notified for general information that His Majesty the King has approved a recommendation that any person to whom the British Empire Medal has been, or may be, awarded may, on all occasions when the use of such letters is customary, place after his or her names the letters “B. E. IT is hereby notified that information has been received by telegraph from the Secretary of State for the Colonies:—

- (a) that the ships specified in Schedule A hereunder have been included in the Statutory List of ships owned by persons or firms who are enemies or deemed to be enemies for the purpose of the Trading with the Enemy Act, 1939; and
- (b) that the ship specified in Schedule B hereunder has been included in the list of ships which shippers and charterers would in their own interests find it advisable to avoid in connection with any business transaction whatsoever.

Order in Council made 22nd January applying Reprisals Orders to Finland, Hungary, Roumania and Bulgaria.

Text of operative part of Order is as follows:—

Subject to substitution, in the case of Finland Hungary and Roumania of sixth day of December 1941 and, in the case of

Bulgaria of thirteenth day of December 1941 for fourth day of December 1939 in Articles 1 and 2 of Order in Council dated twenty-seventh day of November 1939*, the said Order and Orders in Council dated seventeenth† and thirty-first days‡ of July 1940, shall apply for restricting commerce of Finland Hungary, Roumania and Bulgaria in the same manner as they apply for restricting that of Germany and Italy.

Recommendations of Standing Committees :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on " Law and General Subjects " held on December 13, 1941.

- (1) To consider papers *re* request made by Mr. R. de Alwis that the water meter at premises No. 308, Trincomalee street, at which he is having a printing establishment be removed, in view of the definition made by the Council that " printers " did not fall within the category of premises used for trade purposes.—Recommend the removal of the water meter as from January 1, 1942.
- (2) Papers *re* reconstruction of the footbridge over the *ela* in Dodanwela and sale of materials of the old bridge by the Council. The Commissioner desires an expression of opinion on the legal position of the Council in regard to the material sold, in view of conflicting claims made to its ownership by certain persons. The Committee is of opinion that the claims of neither party can be accepted and that the material is the property of the Council.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Standing Committee on " Finance and Establishment " held on December 13, 1941.

- (3) The Accountant reports that supplementary notes are required in the sums stated against them under the following heads :—
Stamps, Rs. 80 ; Lighting model tenements, Rs. 30 ; Lighting market, Rs. 160 ; Lighting M. C. Office, Rs. 70.—Recommended.
- (4) The Works Engineer reports that the amount provided for this year in Estimate 35 of the Budget for laying new service extensions, &c., to the existing services of householders has been exhausted and suggests that a supplementary vote of Rs. 250 should be provided to meet expenditure under this head up to the end of the year. Since then the Works Engineer has asked that the vote be increased to Rs. 500.—Recommended a vote of Rs. 500.
- (5) Memo dated October 9, 1941, from Messrs. R. E. Goonetilleke and D. T. Ramanayake of the Electricity Department stating that they have not been paid overtime for work done by them during the Easter holidays and asking that their claim be paid. This item was deferred at the Finance Committee meeting of November 8, 1941. Please see Accountant's memo dealing with the question of overtime granted to officers.—Recommend that the overtime earned be paid.
- (6) Mr. B. Chas. de Silva, Clerk to the Medical Officer of Health, has been recommended four weeks' leave from November 18, and the M. O. H. reports that it is not possible to carry on the work with the usual temporary arrangements in view of the length of the period. The M. O. H. proposes to have Mr. J. L. Rodrigo, Slaughter-house Clerk, work full time in the office with the privilege of preparing butchers' returns after office hours, and to employ Mr. Kodituwakku, part-time Playground Instructor, to attend to Mr. Rodrigo's work. A vote of Rs. 30 is required to meet pay of Mr. Kodituwakku.—Recommend the employment of a part-time Playground Instructor at rate of Re. 1 a day.
- (7) Letter from Mr. J. Moses, the owner of premises Nos. 59-61, Katugastota road, at which the Municipal Clinic is housed, stating that the rent of the premises will be increased to Rs. 45 per mensem from January 1, 1942.—Recommend the payment of the increased rent as from February 1, 1942, provided the landlord agrees not to raise the rent again.
- (8) Accountant's memo dated September 28, 1941, regarding the necessity for a special proclamation providing for the charge of a reduced tax of 50 cents per annum in the case of handcarts fitted with pneumatic tyres.—Recommended.
- (9) Tenders were called for the right to trade in space No. 72 Public Market. Only one tender was received, *i.e.*, tender of Mr. G. W. Pineris Appuhamy who has offered a premium of Rs. 177.80. The tenderer has deposited the premium and the security. Sanction is required for the acceptance of his tender. The Health Committee recommends the acceptance of the tender.—Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be accepted.
- (10) The Medical Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare, states that the amount provided under 19 (a) 5 will be exhausted owing to increase in price of materials and the cost of equipping the Clinic in Getambe. He suggests that the unspent balance of Rs. 400 in item No. 10,19(a) be transferred to this head to enable him to meet the expenditure on this account. The Health Committee recommends that the transfer of the vote be allowed.—Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be accepted.
- (11) Mrs. C. Dalpatadu, Public Health Nurse, completes her probationary period on December 2, 1941, and the M. O. H. recommends that she be confirmed in her appointment. The Health Committee recommends the confirmation.—Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be accepted.
- (12) The Mayor has suggested that the stone terracing of the Lake Bund along Victoria Drive towards the boathouse, work in connection with which is now in progress, should be extended to a distance of 30 feet more to come up to the first tree. The extra cost of the work is Rs. 487.75. Sanction is required to carry out the additional work and to entrust it to the same contractor. The Works Committee recommends that the work be carried out and that the work be entrusted to the same contractor at the same rates.—Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be accepted.
- (13) The Works Engineer reports that there is a balance of Rs. 48.88 only in Estimate 32 provided in this year's Budget for the upkeep of water mains and this sum is insufficient to meet the expenditure till the end of the year. He asks for a supplementary vote of Rs. 300. In the same connection he has applied for sanction to relay the pipe line to the standpost on Wombly Theatre road, cost of which is estimated at Rs. 191.75. A vote for this amount is also required. The Works Committee recommends that the supplementary vote be allowed.—Recommend that the Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (14) Papers *re* encroachments on Municipal lands made by the Trustee of the Mosque in Mosque road. The Commissioner has inspected, and sanction is required to settle the matter in terms of his minute of November 25, 1941. The Works Committee recommends the settlement on a rental of 50 cents per annum. Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (15) Tenders received for constructing a silt trap in front of Mulla Walauwa. The Works Engineer recommends the acceptance of the tender of Mr. R. M. Punchirala for Rs. 1,998, the lowest tender received. The Works Committee recommends the acceptance of the lowest tender.—Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (16) Papers *re* free allowance of water to the Baptist Mission School in Ward street. The Works Committee recommends that the free allowance should be increased to 30,000 gallons per quarter in view of the fact that water is being used for cooking purposes in connection with the provision of the midday meal to school children. The Works Committee recommends a free allowance of 24,000 gallons per quarter from January 1, 1942.—Recommends that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (17) Papers *re* Court Dorai Development Scheme and correspondence with the Commissioner of Local Government on the subject. The Works Committee recommends that acquisition of this land be considered if Government contributes 80 per cent. of the sum required.—Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (18) Approval is required to pay Rs. 109.49 as a gratuity to the widow and five minor children of Sinnasamy, labourer No. 275, Health Department, in terms of pension rule 24.—Recommended.
- (19) Supplemental Budget No. 3 of 1941.—Recommended that the Supplemental Budget No. 3 of 1941, be adopted subject to the variations made at this meeting.
- (20) A supplementary vote of Rs. 284.80 is required to enable the payment of proportionate rent to Government in connection with the lease of lots in Reservoir road which form part of the land in Roseneath leased to Mr. Pelpola.—Recommended.
- (21) Damage was caused by Municipal lorry No G-1173 to the level crossing gate in Hill street. Please see report of the Fire Brigade officer regarding the accident and its probable cause. The cost of repairs carried out to the gate by the Railway amounted to Rs. 6.58, and the amount is being claimed from the Council. A vote for the amount is required.—Recommended.
- (22) Papers *re* transfer of half share of stall No. 1 Public Market. The Commissioner recommends that the transfer be made in favour of Mr. N. S. Sheriffdeen and that a premium of Rs. 55 be recovered from him. The Health Committee recommends that the transfer be disapproved and that the tenancy of Mr. A. L. Sheriffdeen be terminated and tenders be called for the half share.—Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (23) Audit Query in respect of the arrears outstanding in connection with job works executed for customers. The Audit suggests that the full sum be recovered on all jobs costing Rs. 5 and over before the work is undertaken on estimates. The Mayor suggests that recovery be made on jobs costing Rs. 20 and upwards. The Electricity Committee does not agree with the suggestions made by the Audit and does not recommend its adoption. The Finance Committee recommends that on jobs estimated to cost over Rs. 25 and below Rs. 50 a deposit of 50 per cent. be recovered before work is undertaken.
- (24) The approval of Council is required for the purchase of 50 A.C. house meters at Rs. 32.50 each from Messrs. Walker & Greig, Colombo, on sales account. Orders for the meters were placed with the approval of the Mayor pending formal sanction of the Council. The Electricity Committee recommends the purchase of the house meters.—Recommend that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.
- (25) The approval of the Council is required for the purchase of electrical goods from Messrs. Fentons, Ltd., amounting to Rs. 2,629.60 plus rail freight ; Messrs. Brown & Co., amounting to Rs. 2,547 plus rail freight ; Messrs. Walker & Greig, amounting to Rs. 455.40 plus rail freight.—Recommended by M. E. E.
- Orders for the electrical goods were placed with the firms mentioned pending formal sanction. The Electricity Committee recommends the purchase of goods.—Recommends that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.

(26) Letter from the Shell Co. of Ceylon, Ltd., stating that the retail prices of Shell Diesel has been increased by 4 cents per gallon as from November 10, 1941, and again increased by $\frac{1}{2}$ cent. The Electricity Committee recommends the increase be approved. It is further recommended that a fresh contract be entered into with the present suppliers (Messrs. The Shell Co. of Ceylon, Ltd.) for the supply of Diesel oil for 12 months as from January 1, 1942.—Recommend that Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.

(27) Leave papers of the Switch-board Attendant, Mr. G. V. Wickremaratne. He has since sent in his resignation which was accepted by the Commissioner.—Recommends if the applicant Mr. B. E. Perera is still available that he be appointed to the post.

(28) Letter from Messrs. de Silva & Karunaratne, Proctors, on behalf of Mr. Pelpola, suggesting the withdrawal of D. C., Kandy, case No. M. R. 812, instituted by the Council for the cancellation of the Rosneath lease on the understanding that their client is willing to pay any damages assessed by a competent party.—Recommended that the case be proceeded with.

(29) Letter dated December 8, 1941, from the Auditor-General forwarding copy of a circular issued by the Chief Secretary regarding the date of retirement of officers retiring on medical grounds.—Tabled.^{4f}

(30) The Works Engineer reports that the stock of new meters is exhausted and as the additional meters which have been ordered have not arrived as yet, he asks for approval to transfer a sum of Rs. 200 from the balance available under Estimate 43 for the purchase of house service meters to Estimate 38—Upkeep of meters, to permit of repairs being carried out to old meters, with a view to putting them into use.—Recommended.

(31) Papers re proposal to purchase land belonging to Mr. R. W. Cracklow in Gatambe for constructing a Child Welfare Clinic. The Council voted a sum of Rs. 2,300 to be offered for this land. It has since been agreed to offer Rs. 2,600 to Mr. Cracklow as he is not prepared to accept the offer of Rs. 2,300. A supplementary vote of Rs. 300 is required to close the transaction.—Recommended.

(32) Papers re indebtedness of Mr. G. B. M. Hay, Assistant Municipal Electrical Engineer. Letter from Mr. Hay tabled. The Commissioner to inquire if Mr. Hay is now free from debts.

(33) Tenders received for the supply of screw cap lamps.—Recommend the acceptance of the tender of Messrs. E. B. Creasy & Co.

(34) Papers re revised electricity tariffs with further observations thereon by the Chief Engineer and Manager of Electrical Undertakings. The Electricity Committee recommends that only paragraphs 1 and 2 of letter No. L.G. 23/20 of December 1, 1941, from the Chief Engineer and Manager, Electrical Undertakings, be adopted and paragraph 3 was not recommended. (Standby charges). The Finance Committee recommends the adoption of paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 contained in the above letter.

Minutes of Proceedings of the First Meeting of the Municipal Council for the Year 1942 held at the Town Hall, Kandy, on Friday, January 9, 1942, at 4 p.m. in terms of Section 61 of the Colombo Municipal Council (Constitution) Ordinance, No. 61 of 1935, as applied to the Kandy Municipal Council by Proclamation published in the Ceylon Government Gazette No. 8,370 of May 27, 1938, and of No. 8,454 of May 26, 1939, for electing a Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

The Commissioner (Mr. W. Gopallawa) was in the Chair.

Present: Gate Muh. N. Canaganayagam; A. C. L. Ratwatte, Esq.; A. M. Spear, Esq.; V. D. Paul Raj, Esq.; B. H. Dunuwille, Esq.; H. R. U. Premachandra, Esq.; H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Esq.; W. A. B. Soysa, Esq.; L. B. Mavilmada, Esq.; R. S. S. Gunawardana, Esq.; M. A. S. Marikar, Esq.; S. Halim Deen, Esq.; H. L. Ratwatte, Esq.; and S. A. Wijayatilake, Esq.

THE GALLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

General Meeting.

Tuesday, November 25, 1941.

The Council assembled this day at 2.30 p.m., pursuant to notice dated November 19, 1941.

Present :—Mr. Dahanayake, Mayor, presiding; and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab, Deputy Mayor; F. Magdon Ismail; A. H. E. Fernando; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed; T. W. Roberts; Thomas Amarasuriya; F. W. E. de Vos; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of October 28, 1941, and of the Special Meeting of October 31, 1941, having been previously submitted to the Mayor for his approval and copies thereof having been furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. The Mayor moved :—“This Council records its sincere regret at the death of Mr. R. L. Ephraums, its appreciation of the valuable services rendered by him to the town of Galle and to this Council during his tenure of office as a nominated member of the Council for about 6½ years, and its sympathy with his widow and children, and desires that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to them. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Messrs. Thomas Amarasuriya and P. Dahanayake also spoke. (Mr. A. M. Saheed came in at this stage). The motion was carried in silence all present standing.

3. The Mayor extended on behalf of the Council a warm welcome to Mr. M. B. de S. Jayasekera, Member of the Dadalla Ward. Mr. M. B. de S. Jayasekera thanked the Council.

4. Pursuant to notice Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya asked the following questions which the Mayor answered :—

Q.—(1) (a) Have certain representations been made to the Mayor by the owner of Magdalene Dairy about the arrest of a milk vendor employed by him? A.—Yes.

Q.—(1) (b) Was this milk vendor detained at the Police Station for three or four hours before he was allowed to go away? (a) He was detained by the Police but I am unable to say for how long. The procedure adopted according to the by-law, is for an illicit vendor to be detained by the Police until he is bailed out.

Q.—(1) (c) Is the Mayor aware of any instances where milk vendors detected for similar offences were not taken to the Police or kept in Police custody? A.—There was one instance recently.

Q.—(1) (d) Have any Inspector been found fault with and censured for not doing so? If so, why has such action been taken against such Inspector, so long as Rules Nos. 27 and 28 of the by-laws re dairies give such Inspector absolute discretion in the matter? A.—In the instance referred to, the vendor who was arrested had in his possession a card not issued in his name, and thereby had committed an offence under by-law 27 (b). The discretion referred to in the by-law is admitted, but as the use of such discretion was inadvisable, the Medical Officer of Health had instructed all Inspectors not to use such discretion. The Inspector in question was censured for disobeying orders.

Q.—(2) (a) Is it the fact that a dairy said to belong to one E. E. de Silva is run opposite the residence of the late Deputy Mayor without a licence for the year 1941? A.—The dairy referred to was licensed on September 23, 1941, in the name of Mr. K. M. R. de Silva.

Q.—(2) (b) Was the Medical Officer of Health aware that this dairy was licensed in 1940 and that it continued to function till the end of the year? A.—Yes, when run in the name of Mr. E. E. de Silva.

Q.—(2) (c) Was the Medical Officer of Health or his officers not aware that this dairy was run without a licence during 1941, until pointed out by a rate-payer? If the Medical Officer of Health paid his usual visits to all dairies, why has this particular one missed his attention? If the Medical Officer of Health is not responsible, have any efforts been made to find out who is? A.—The Medical Officer of Health and his officers were aware that this dairy was being conducted during the first half of the year without a licence, and that necessary action was being taken about it at the Municipal Office as is the procedure adopted for all licensable trades. Action was being taken long before a rate-payer pointed it out. The Medical Officer of Health visited this dairy after the application for a licence had been received. Regular visits are made by him in respect of all licensed dairies within the town. This procedure was that adopted in all cases without discrimination.

Q.—(2) (d) Is it not the fact that 100–150 bottles of milk are sold within this town every day by illicit milk vendors from this dairy? A.—I have no information on this matter.

Q.—(2) (e) Did the Mayor and the Medical Officer of Health experience considerable difficulty to get the Council's Inspectors to arrest these illicit vendors of milk, even after representations had been made to this effect? A.—Yes, there was considerable difficulty, but such difficulty is experienced as a general rule regarding illicit vendors.

Q.—(3) (a) What is the biggest dairy that supplies milk to this town? A.—The dairy situated at Hirimbure owned by Mr. E. Ephraums.

Q.—(3) (b) Is it not the fact that most of the milk from this dairy is distributed by a motor-van on an average of about 300–400 bottles a day? A.—I have no information regarding the number of bottles distributed by motor van. Ten vendors cards are at present being utilized for the sale of milk, one of which is used in the van.

Q.—(3) (c) How often are samples of milk taken from licensed vendors? A.—Milk raids are carried out by each Inspector at least once a fortnight for the purpose of taking samples from illicit vendors and those in possession of vendors' cards.

Q.—(3) (d) Is it not the fact that there is not a single record in this Council's offices to show that samples of milk were taken at any time from the motor van aforesaid? A.—No record was kept of the vehicles used by vendors from whom samples were taken, as this was not a requirement of the by-laws relating to milk samples.

Q.—(3) (e) Is it correct to say that there is only the oral and belated evidence of one single Inspector to the effect that on one solitary occasion about a year or two back this van was stopped and a milk sample taken? A.—Yes, for the reason stated in my reply to question 3(d).

Q.—(3) (f) Is the Medical Officer of Health aware of the provisions of Rule 19 (1) of the by-laws re dairies? A.—Yes.

Q.—(3) (g) Is the Medical Officer of Health aware of the fact that, contrary to the said by-law, the bottling of all milk from the aforesaid dairy is done at the owner's bungalow, adjoining the Medical Officer of Health's bungalow? A.—Bottling and canning of milk takes place in the milk room attached to the dairy in question on the dairy premises at Hirimbure. A certain portion of this milk is delivered direct to customers; the balance is brought to a milk room attached to the owner's bungalow for distribution. There is nothing in the by-laws prohibiting a dairy-man from having more than one milk room or from having a milk room attached to his bungalow. I have inspected these two milk rooms and am more than satisfied with them. There would be no objection raised by the owner to any member doing so himself.

Q.—(3) (b) If so, why does the Medical Officer of Health, who claims "to have neither personal nor communal preference in the discharge of his duties" allow such an offence to go on without the least check or hindrance whatsoever? (i.) If the answer is in the negative, why has the Medical Officer of Health been so oblivious of something highly irregular and highly obnoxious taking place at his very door step? A.—Do not arise as there has not been a violation of the by-laws.

Q.—(4) Did the representations made to the Mayor referred to in question (1) include also complaints re (1) The Unlicensed Dairy and illicit milk vendors of the Dadalla Dairy; (2) Not taking of milk samples from the motor vans referred to in question (3); and (3) Discrimination in the inspection of Dairies by the Medical Officer of Health? A.—Yes.

Q.—(5) Was it not as a direct and immediate result of these representations that—(a) It was discovered that milk vendors from the unlicensed dairy at Dadalla were conducting sales of milk within the town without registration cards and without any hindrance whatsoever? A.—No. (b) That orders were given by the Mayor and the Medical Officer of Health to officers to keep a sharp look out for these illicit vendors? A.—I gave such orders. The Medical Officer of Health had done so previous to this as well. (c) That some of these vendors were detected and prosecuted? A.—I am unable to say as the Medical Officer of Health had issued similar orders even previous to such representations. (d) That the owner of the Dadalla Dairy was prosecuted for running a dairy without a licence? A.—The owner of the Dadalla Dairy was not prosecuted for running this dairy without a licence. (e) That explicit orders were given to Inspectors to take samples from the milk van above referred to and such samples were taken soon after? A.—No. (f) That a record began to be kept of all 'vehicles', 'vans', or 'bicycles' of vendors of milk from whom samples were taken? A.—Yes. (g) That inspection of dairies by the Medical Officer of Health and his officers became more systematic and regular? A.—No. Systematic and regular inspection of dairies has always been carried out by the Medical Officer of Health and his Inspectors.

Q.—(6) Has the Council's Medical Officer of Health in a minute to the Mayor referred to this gentleman, who made such representations, in the following terms—(a) as having uttered "deliberate falsehoods bordering on libel"? (b) as having made an accusation of preferential treatment against the Medical Officer of Health? (c) as having "no spark of decency as a gentleman" which if he had "he will make amends for ungentlemanly conduct"? (d) as having been below "the standard of value" of the Medical Officer of Health? A.—Yes. A certain gentleman, who did not want his identity disclosed, made accusations against the Medical Officer of Health, the Chief Inspector Mr. Rajapakse, and the Inspectorate of the Health Department. As these accusations were unfair, particularly in view of the anonymity of the gentleman, and as I consider the Medical Officer of Health also to be a rate-payer of this town and entitled to his own opinions, I did not consider such remarks as "not in keeping with the responsibility of the office of Medical Officer of Health nor with the standard of correspondence that is expected to form part of the records of this Council" I should like to add that such correspondence between the Mayor and Medical Officer of Health was confidential.

Q.—(7) Has the Mayor written to this gentleman to withdraw the representations made by him as "utterly unfounded" and refused to consider any further representations made by him? If so, on what grounds has the Mayor come to this conclusion? A.—Yes, for the reasons stated in my reply to questions (b) (a) to (d).

Q.—(8) Will the Mayor take steps to—(a) discontinue the illegal practice of bottling of milk outside an authorised milk room by any dairies within this town, and if necessary prosecute the owners thereof? A.—Yes, I shall authorise prosecution against any dairyman who has an unauthorised milk room. (b) allow all Inspectors to exercise their "discretion" which they are entitled to as of right by Rules 27 and 28 in by-laws re Dairies, in all cases of arrest of milk vendors? A.—No, as I agree with the procedure adopted by the Medical Officer of Health (c) call upon the Medical Officer of Health to withdraw insinuator and uncalled for remarks (detailed out in question (6)) made by him of a rate-payer of this Council, which remarks are neither in keeping with the responsibility of the office of Medical Officer of Health nor with the standard of correspondence that is expected to form part of the records of this Council? A.—No.

Arising out of the reply to question 1 (d), the following supplementary questions were asked and answered by the Mayor:—

Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte.—Was this Inspector a Police Inspector or a Ward Inspector? Mayor: A Ward Inspector.

Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya.—Has the Medical Officer of Health the power to amend the by-laws according to his liking? Mayor: I do not think it irregular for the Medical Officer of Health to instruct his subordinates to follow one alternative where there are two provided for in the by-laws.

Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte.—Is the Medical Officer of Health clothed with discretionary powers? Mayor: The by-law gives the power of discretion.

Arising out of the reply to question 2 (e) Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya asked the following supplementary question which the Mayor answered:—Why is it that the Medical Officer of Health experiences difficulty in getting the Inspectors to arrest illicit vendors? Mayor: The difficulty is due to the fact that illicit vendors do their work as secretly as possible.

Arising out of the reply to question 3 (g) Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya asked the following supplementary questions which the Mayor answered:—Is it not the fact that, according to the by-laws, a licence for a dairy is issued in respect of one particular premises? Mayor: My interpretation of the by-law with regard to a milk room is given in my reply. If the Member insists I have no objection to the matter being placed before the Law Committee.

Will the Mayor place the matter before the Law Committee? Mayor: Yes.

Arising out of the reply to question 5 (b) Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya asked the following supplementary question which the Mayor answered:—Are there any records of the Medical Officer of Health having given such orders? Mayor: I am prepared to table the papers.

Arising out of the reply to question 5 (d) the following supplementary questions were asked and answered by the Mayor:—

Mr. P. Dahanayake.—Why was special treatment meted out to the owner of the Dadalla dairy? Mayor: No special treatment was meted out to the owner of the Dadalla dairy. The first owner was given time as is usual in such cases, and when prosecution was about to be authorised against him I received intimation of the change in ownership. When I was pressing the second owner to obtain his licence, an application was made for an extension of time. This was granted as is usual in such cases. Was this not done by the first owner purposely to avoid prosecution? Mayor: I am unable to say.

Mr. T. W. Roberts.—Does the fact that a second owner owns the premises exonerate the first owner from breaches of the law? Mayor: That has been the practice in the past. Where is the evidence of the practice? Mayor: The recollection and knowledge of the Municipal Commissioner.

Arising out of the reply to question (6) the following supplementary questions were asked and answered by the Mayor:—

Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya.—Do they form part of the records of this Council? Mayor: Yes.

Mr. P. Dahanayake.—What part did the Chief Inspector play in this game? Mayor: There was a general allegation made against the Medical Officer of Health and the Inspectors. Did the Chief Inspector at any stage without the knowledge of the Medical Officer of Health issue any orders over these prosecutions of the Magdalene Dairy? Mayor: I am not aware.

Arising out of the reply to question 8 (a) Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya asked the following supplementary questions which the Mayor answered:—Will that decision await the decision of the Law Committee? Mayor: Yes, as regards the future. As regards the milk room in question, it has been authorised by the proper authority. Is there any record to that effect? Mayor: Yes.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. F. Magdon Ismail moved:—(1) "That this Council do request the Central Government to grant to this Council a half share of the profits that the Central Government makes from the income it derives from the Galle Customs and Harbour." Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded, and the Mayor and Messrs. P. Dahanayake; Thomas Amarasuriya; and E. D. Nagahawatte supported the motion. The mover replied. The motion was then put to the meeting and carried by 12 votes to 1. Mr. T. W. Roberts called for a division, which resulted as follows:—*For*—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; A. H. E. Fernando; D. S. Goonesekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; A. M. Saheed; Thomas Amarasuriya; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Against*—Mr. T. W. Roberts. *Declined to vote*—Mr. F. W. E. de Vos. (2) "That this Council do request the Central Government to grant to this Council a half share of the profits that the Central Government derives out of the collection of income tax from the residents of the Municipal area of Galle." With the permission of Council, the mover amended the motion by the substitution of the words "on the properties and trades owned by tax-payers and situated or carried on within M. C. limits" for the words "from the residents of the Municipal area of Galle." Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded, and the Mayor supported the motion, as amended. Mr. T. W. Roberts opposed it. The mover replied. The motion, as amended, was then put to the meeting and carried. (3) "If there is no provision to do the above this Council do request the Central Government to make the necessary legislation for it." With the permission of Council, the mover amended the motion by the substitution of the words "to grant the above requests" for the words "to do the above." Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. The motion, as amended, was then put to the meeting and carried. (4) "That a Special Committee of this Council be appointed to report on any means of augmenting this Council's revenue." The Mayor seconded—carried. Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of the Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. P. Dahanayake moved:—"As neither the Central Government nor this Council is in a position to render any assistance to the occupants of the dwelling houses along the sea-front between Mahamodera bridge and the Civil Hospital when these houses are periodically subjected to sea erosions, this Council resolves that the land in question be acquired by the Council and that half the cost of acquisition, which will not exceed Rs. 8,000, should be borne by the Central Government—the land so acquired to be converted into a promenade." Mr. D. S. Goonesekera seconded. On the suggestion of the mover, it was resolved to refer the matter to the Finance Committee for consideration and report. (Mr. A. M. Saheed left the meeting at this stage).

7. Pursuant to notice Mr. A. William Wijeratne moved:—(1) "The Medical Officer of Health be requested to compile a list of all necessary surface road-side drains throughout the M. C. limits, estimates be drawn up for their construction, and the entire work be done on a loan as a very essential sanitary measure that brooks no delay." Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded. Resolved to refer the matter to the Finance Committee for consideration and report. (2) "This Council resolves, in accordance with the wishes of those who donated the land free, to call the new road in Ward 8 "Viskam road." Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded. Mr. P. Dahanayake spoke on the motion. Mr. F. W. E. de Vos moved, as an amendment, that consideration of this question be deferred for the next meeting and that, in the meantime, the Mayor be requested to investigate the matter and submit a report to the Council. Mr. D. S. Goonesekera seconded. The mover of the motion replied. The amendment was put to the meeting and declared lost by the Mayor's casting vote. Mr. A. William Wijeratne called for a division which resulted as follows:—*For*—Messrs. D. S. Goonesekera; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; T. W. Roberts; Thomas Amarasuriya; and F. W. E. de Vos. *Against*—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; A. H. E. Fernando; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Declined to vote*—Mr. F. Magdon Ismail.

Mr. P. Dahanayake next moved, as an amendment, that the new road in Ward 8 be called "William Wijeratne avenue." Mr. F. W. E. de Vos seconded, and Mr. D. S. Goonasekera supported the amendment. The Mayor and Mr. A. William Wijeratne opposed it. The mover replied. The amendment was then put to the meeting and declared lost, 4 voting for and 5 against. Mr. F. W. E. de Vos called for a division, which resulted as follows:—*For*.—Messrs. D. S. Goonasekera; T. W. Roberts; Thomas Amarasuriya; and F. W. E. de Vos. *Against*.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Declined to vote*.—Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail; A. H. E. Fernando; E. D. Nagahawatte; and P. Dahanayake.

Mr. F. Magdon Ismail then moved as an amendment that a Special Committee consisting of four members be appointed to report on a suitable name for this road. Mr. A. H. E. Fernando seconded—carried by 11 votes to 2. Mr. A. William Wijeratne called for a division, which resulted as follows:—*For*.—Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; A. H. E. Fernando; D. S. Goonasekera; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; T. W. Roberts; Thomas Amarasuriya; F. W. E. de Vos; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Against*.—The Mayor and Mr. A. William Wijeratne. Resolved that the Special Committee do consist of Messrs. A. H. E. Fernando; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; and P. Dahanayake.

8. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council:—
The Mayor moved Council into Committee Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded—carried.

Council in Committee—

(a) Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of November 14, 1941.

- (3) Lists of demolished buildings in Ward No. 2.—Recommended that the rates be struck off.
- (4) Considered the question of waiving the rates due for 1940 and 1941 on the following properties on the ground of poverty of the owners:—No. 10/1, Talapitiya Cross road; and No. 190/1, Colombo road.—Recommended (1) that the application with regard to No. 10/1, Talapitiya Cross road be referred to the Revenue Inspector for report; and (2) that the rates due for 1940 and 1941 on No. 190/1, Colombo road, amounting to Rs. 2.25, be waived on the ground of poverty of the owner.
- (5) To recommend the following supplemental votes:—(a) Rs. 600 under Vote 2—Gratuities; (b) Rs. 3,750 under Vote E. 1/1—Fuel; (c) Rs. 2,000 under Vote E. 1/2—Oil, Waste, &c.; (d) Rs. 250 under Vote E. 7/4—Printing and Stationery; and (e) Rs. 160 under Vote E. 7/16—Rates and Rents.—Recommended.
- (6) To approve (a) the transfer of a sum of Rs. 200 from Vote 15—Stationery to Vote 20—Advertisements; (b) the transfer of a sum of Rs. 500 from Vote E. 2/2 to Vote E. 1/3—Wages at works; (c) the transfer of a sum of Rs. 65 from Vote E. 3/4 to Vote E. 7/15; and (d) the transfer of a sum of Rs. 40 from Vote 33—(Sanitation) Contingencies to Vote 38—(Anti-plague) Contingencies.—Recommended that the transfers be approved.
- (7) Considered the question of remuneration to the Stenographer and Meeting Clerk for overtime work done by him in connection with the typing of the draft budget for 1942.—Recommended, as a special case, the payment of a sum of Rs. 23.36.
- (8) Considered an application from the Municipal Accountant for a loan of Rs. 1,600 for the purchase of a motor car.—Recommended that, on the liquidation of the existing loan, the Municipal Accountant be granted a loan of Rs. 1,600 repayable in not more than 24 monthly instalments with interest at 2½ per cent. on the amount outstanding.
- (9) Considered an application from Mr. M. K. M. Meedin, Assessment Clerk, to be placed on a better maximum salary and for a change in his designation.—Recommended (1) that, with effect from January 1, 1942, Mr. M. K. M. Meedin be granted a personal (non-pensionable) allowance of Rs. 120 per annum; and (2) that his designation be changed to that of "Chief Assessment Clerk."
- (10) Considered the report of the Medical Board appointed to examine and report on D. N. L. Cornelis, Lorry Driver.—Recommended, in view of the report of the Medical Board dated October 25, 1941, (1) that D. N. L. Cornelis be granted further leave on half pay from October 11, 1941, to January 25, 1942; and (2) that he be sent again before another Medical Board at the end of this period of leave.
- (12) Considered the question of calculating the rate of commission payable to Tax Collector, Arambewela, for the collection of Conservancy fees.—Recommended that, for the purpose of arriving at the 80 per cent. collections for which the Tax Collector is paid commission at the rate of 8 per cent. before the warrantable date, any payments made to the office in respect of receipts issued to him be taken into consideration; and (2) that the above basis of calculation be adopted in respect of all collections of Conservancy fees made for and after the month of January, 1942.
- (13) To revise the salary scales of all peons and office labourers.—Recommended that, with effect from January 1, 1942, all peons and office labourers of the Council be placed on the following revised scales of salary, without any alteration in their present incremental dates:—*Peons*.—Rs. 300—Rs. 12—Rs. 480. *Office Labourers*.—Rs. 240—Rs. 12—Rs. 360.
- (15) To declare certain posts in the Municipal service to be pensionable in terms of Rule 2 of the Municipal Pension Minute.—Recommended (1) that, in terms of Rule 2 of the Municipal Pension Minute, every permanent post of Clerk and every permanent post of Ward Inspector in the Municipal service, to which is attached the approved scales of salary for Clerks and Ward Inspectors respectively, be declared pensionable; and (2) that, in terms of the said Rule, the following other posts in the Municipal service be declared pensionable:—*Municipal Office*.—Revenue Inspector. *Health Department*.—Overseer, Anti-Plague Gang; Overseer, Rat-trapping Gang. *Works Department*.—Road Overseer; Cart Shed Overseer; Park-keeper; and Clerk of Works. *Waterworks Department*.—Assistant Fitter. *Electricity Department*.—Draughtsman.
- (17) Considered an application from K. Laisina for compensation for the two goats which were electrocuted at Hume road on August 21, 1941.—Recommended that the application be refused as the Committee is of opinion that no compensation is payable.

Resolution.

With regard to item (9) Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya moved, as an amendment that the recommendation be adopted subject to the following amendment:—that a personal allowance be not paid to him but that he be placed on a maximum salary of Rs. 1,800 per annum, with increments as at present, and that the next increment be paid to him as from January 1, 1942. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded.—Carried by 7 votes to 3, the division being as follows. *For*.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; A. H. E. Fernando; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; P. Dahanayake; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Against*.—Messrs. T. W. Roberts; Thomas Amarasuriya; and F. W. E. de Vos. *Declined to Vote*.—Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail; D. S. Goonasekera, and E. D. Nagahawatte.

With regard to item (12) it was resolved that consideration be deferred for the next meeting.

With regard to item (13) the Mayor moved, as an amendment, that all peons and office labourers of the Council be paid their salaries from their next incremental dates on the basis that they were appointed on the following scales of salary, but without the payment of any arrears:—*Head Peon*.—Rs. 300—Rs. 12—Rs. 540. *Other Peons*.—Rs. 300—Rs. 12—Rs. 510. *Office Labourers*.—Rs. 240—Rs. 12—Rs. 360.

Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried by 11 votes to 2. Mr. T. W. Roberts called for a division which resulted as follows. *For*.—The Mayor and Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; A. H. E. Fernando; D. S. Goonasekera; A. William Wijeratne; W. T. Wijekulasuriya; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; Thomas Amarasuriya, and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Against*.—T. W. Roberts; and F. W. E. de Vos.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

(b) Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of November 17, 1941.

Considered tenders received for maintenance and repair works during 1942, with regard to—(a) Municipal buildings; (b) Roads and drains; (c) Culverts and bridges; and (d) General works.—Recommended (1) with regard to (a) that the tender of R. B. de Silva, being the only one received at 10 per cent. on the sanctioned Schedule of Rates for 1942 be accepted; (2) with regard to (b) that the tender of K. S. Peter, being the lowest, at 21 per cent. off the sanctioned Schedule of Rates for 1942 be accepted; (3) with regard to (c) that, as the only tender received is for 10 per cent. on the sanctioned Schedule of Rates for 1942, and as the Works Engineer is of opinion that not much work in this connection will have to be done during 1942, the work be carried out by engaging departmental labour; and (4) with regard to (d) that the tender of M. W. R. de Silva, being the only one received, at 10 per cent. on the sanctioned Schedule of Rates for 1942 be accepted.

(3) Considered the claims of K. Ineris Silva, Contractor for the maintenance of roads and drains for 1941, for monies alleged to be due to him under the contract.—Recommended that the Contractor be informed that no further monies are due to him under the contract, as he had failed to carry out the six works in question satisfactorily and as the same had to be re-done in terms of the contract at his own risk, at an increased cost.

(4) Considered the following motion of Mr. P. Dahanayake at the General Meeting of Council held on September 23, 1941:—“This Council do make use of the sand bar at the mouth of the Mahamodera river for all Municipal works as far as possible and also allow people to take the sand either free or on a nominal rent as it would help to keep the mouth of the river free of obstructions for the passage of river water, thereby saving the Council a fair sum of money which is spent annually to cut the sand bar.”—Recommended that the Government Agent, Southern Province, be requested to issue permits free of charge for the removal of sea sand from the sand bar at the mouth of the Mahamodera river opposite the Mahamodera bridge.

(5) Considered, further, papers relating to the proposed raising of the Spill at Hiyare.—Recommended that, in view of the report of the Director of Public Works, no further action be taken in the matter.

(6) Considered the question of refunding the retention money of G. M. Hewawasam, Contractor for the construction of side-drains along Richmond Hill road.—Recommended that the retention money of 5 per cent. be refunded to the Contractor, as this money is in respect of work which had been satisfactorily carried out by him.

Resolution.

With regard to item (4) Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte moved, as an amendment that the recommendation be adopted subject to the substitution of the words “sand bars at the mouth of the Mahamodera river opposite the Mahamodera bridge and at the mouth of the Moragoda-ela,” for the words “sand bar at the mouth of the Mahamodera river opposite the Mahamodera bridge”. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

With regard to item (5) Mr. P. Dahanayake moved that consideration of the matter be deferred for the next meeting, and that, in the meantime the papers be circulated to the Members. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried.

The recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

(c) *Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Electricity of November 21, 1941.*

(3) Considered the revised draft agreement with Messrs. Callenders Cable & Construction Co., Ltd., in connection with the Gintota extensions.—Recommended that the revised draft agreement suggested by Messrs. Callenders Cable & Construction Co., Ltd., be approved.

(4) To revise the present system of patrolling the electric mains.—Recommended that the present system of patrolling do continue, and that an additional patrolman be appointed after completion of the electricity extensions to Gintota.

(5) Considered letter No. L. G. 10 of September 24, 1941, from the Chief Engineer and Manager, Electrical Undertakings, with regard to the accident to the electricity mains on Hume road.—Recommended that the Chief Engineer and Manager, Electrical Undertakings, be requested to submit a scheme and estimate for installing earth leakage trips and protective devices for the four sub-stations.

(6) Considered what electricity fittings and materials should be removed when an installation is disconnected.—Recommended that the present practice of removing only the meters and fuses be continued.

(7) To approve the revised form of notice with regard to the removal of overhanging trees under the Electricity by-laws.—Recommended that the revised form of notice, as amended, be approved.

(8) Considered tenders received for the removal of overhanging trees in connection with the Gintota extensions.—Recommended (1) that the tender of E. Sammie de Silva, being the lowest, at 95 cents per tree be accepted; and (2) that, in the event of this tenderer proving unsatisfactory, the Municipal Commissioner be authorised to accept any one of the other tenders up to the tender of R. H. S. Piyasena at Re. 1.40 per tree.—Recommended, further, that the compensation payable to the owners of these trees should not be more than Rs. 7.50 per tree.

(9) Considered the question of installing an electric light opposite Messrs. A. R. Ephraums Co-op. Co., Ltd.—Recommended that an electric light be provided opposite Messrs. A. R. Ephraums Co-op. Co., Ltd., along Middle street, and that the cost be met from savings on Vote 114 (a).

(10) Considered an application from the cleaners of the Electricity Department for navy blue drill shorts.—Recommended that the four cleaners of the Electricity Department be each provided with three navy blue drill shorts a year.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

The Mayor moved that Council do resume from the Committee stage, and that the above resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

9. To consider the applications received for the post of Kangany in the Health Department.

The Mayor moved Council into Committee to consider this item. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

Council in Committee—

After discussion, Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte moved that the Municipal Commissioner be authorised to make the appointment from among the applications received. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab moved that Council do resume from the Committee stage. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.—Carried. Council accordingly resumed and the above resolution of Council in Committee was adopted.

10. To submit the report of the Auditor-General for the year ending December 31, 1940.—Submitted.

11. To submit the draft budget for 1942 as approved by the Five Standing Committees.—Submitted.

12. To nominate a member to serve on the Public Assistance Committee in place of the late Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne.—The Mayor moved that Mr. M. B. de S. Jayasekera be nominated to serve on the Public Assistance Committee in place of the late Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

13. To appoint a member for the Local Sub-Committee of Ward 1 in place of Mr. H. de S. Kularatne, who is unwilling to serve on the Committee.—Resolved that the matter be deferred for the next meeting.

14. Considered the following recommendations of the Special Committee appointed with regard to improvements to Ramparts:—Recommended (1) that the improvements carried out to the Rampart wall opposite the Y. M. C. A. (item 6 of the estimate) be approved; and (2) that cast-iron garden seats be obtained from Messrs. Hunter & Co., at a cost of Rs. 42 each and that as many of these seats as possible be obtained with the balance available on the vote." Resolved that the above recommendations of the Special Committee be adopted. (Mr. T. W. Roberts left the meeting at this stage).

15. To consider, further, the terms and conditions on which Municipal officers, who desire to do so, should be allowed to enlist in military units.—The Mayor moved—(1) That officers in the Municipal service be allowed to enlist in military units, for service either in Ceylon or overseas, provided that the Municipal Commissioner is of opinion that the services of such officers can be dispensed with temporarily; (2) That such officers be granted indefinite leave without pay and that they be allowed to revert to their posts on their return from military service; (3) That the period of mobilization and such further period as may be necessary to enable such officers to return to their employments be counted for purposes of pension, gratuity or long service allowance, as the case may be, in terms of the Municipal Pension Minute; (4) That such officers who are on incremental scales of salaries be paid, on their return to work, the salary to which they would normally be entitled at that time, on the presumption that they had duly earned their increments during the period of their absence on military duty; (5) That, in order to enable the recruitment of substitutes to carry out the duties of officers who are selected for enlistment in military units, the military authorities concerned be requested to give the Council at least two weeks' notice of the date on which such officers will be required to take up their military duties; and (6) That the above resolutions do apply to all officers in the Municipal service other than the executive officers of the Council, and that any application made by the executive officers for permission to enlist in military units be submitted to the Council for consideration. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

16. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of August 21, 1941:—“Considered the proposed new regulations under the Motor Car Ordinance relating to public stands for the use of hiring cars and lorries.—Recommended that the proposed new regulations be approved to come into force from January 1, 1942.”

The Mayor moved, as an amendment, that the proposed new regulations be approved subject to the following schedule of fees:—An omnibus, Rs. 7.50 per quarter; A lorry, Rs. 5 per quarter; A cab, Rs. 2.50 per quarter but the amendment fell through for want of a seconder.

Mr. P. Dahanayake then moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted. Mr. F. W. E. de Vos seconded.—Carried by 7 votes to 2. The Mayor called for a division, which resulted as follows. For.—Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; D. S. Goonesekera; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; Thomas Amarasuriya; and F. W. E. de Vos. Against.—The Mayor and Mr. M. B. de S. Jayasekera. Declined to vote.—Messrs. A. H. E. Fernando; A. William Wijeratne; and W. T. Wijekulasuriya.

17. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of October 24, 1941:—“Considered an application from Semage Kalso for compensation for damage caused to the parapet wall at premises No. 298, Dangedera road.—Recommended that no compensation be paid as the Committee is satisfied that the collapse of the wall was due more to insecure foundation than to any deepening of the drain by the Council in the past.”

The Mayor moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be not adopted but that a sum of Rs. 25 be paid as compensation in view of the fact that the cause of the wall collapsing was the existence of the natural earth drain in its present unsatisfactory condition. Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte seconded.

Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab moved as an amendment, that the matter be referred to the Law Committee for consideration and report. Mr. A. William Wijeratne seconded.—Carried by 6 votes to 5.

18. To consider further papers relating to the security furnished by Tax Collector D. J. Arambawala.—The Mayor moved that, in view of the Council's Lawyer's report, no further action be taken in the matter. Mr. W. T. Wijekulasuriya seconded.—Carried.

19. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of September 4, 1941:—“Considered the following motion of Mr. E. D. Nagahawatte at the General Meeting of the Council held on August 26, 1941:—“In view of the fact that Vidyaloka English School which caters to the educational needs of a large section of the poorest folk in this town urgently requires space for expansion, this Council recommends the lease of the cattle pound site to the Committee managing the said School.”—Recommended, Messrs. F. Magdon Ismail and A. M. Saheed dissenting, (1) that steps be taken to have the site of the old Public Hall vested in the Council for the erection of Granaries; (2) that the Works Engineer be requested to submit the necessary plans and estimates for the erection of Granaries on this site; (3) that, if the above two recommendations are adopted, and provided the old Public Hall site is made available to the Council, the present cattle pound site be leased to the Committee managing the Vidyaloka English School; and (4) that the terms and conditions of the lease be considered later by the Finance Committee.” Resolved that consideration be deferred for the next meeting.

20. To consider the following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of December 6, 1940:—“Considered the priority list for new drains prepared by the Medical Officer of Health.—Recommended that the priority list for new drains be approved.” The Mayor moved that no further action be taken in the matter. Mr. A. I. H. A. Wahab seconded.—Carried.

21. To consider the following motion of Mr. E. de S. Wijayaratne at the General Meeting of Council on March 12, 1940:—“In view of the acute controversy prevailing in Bope regarding the propriety of the route for the new road at Bope adopted by the Resolution of this Council dated September 18, 1939, and in view of the reason that all the facts appertaining to what are known as the eastern and western tracings of this road were not before the Council when the above decision was arrived at, I move that the whole of this question be referred to the Works Committee of the Council for investigation and report.” The Mayor moved that no further action be taken in the matter. Mr. P. Dahanayake seconded.—Carried.

22. To consider a letter from the Hon. Secretary, Galle Municipal Staff's Union, inquiring whether the Council would have any objection to the head office of the Union being housed within the Municipal Office premises.—After discussion, the Mayor moved that the Hon. Secretary, Galle Municipal Staff's Union, be informed that the Council has no objection to the head office of the Union being housed

within the Municipal Office premises. Mr. A. H. E. Fernando responded. The motion was put to the meeting and declared lost, 2 voting for and 7 against. The Mayor called for a division, which resulted as follows:—*For.*—The Mayor and Mr. A. H. E. Fernando. *Against.*—Messrs. A. I. H. A. Wahab; F. Magdon Ismail; D. S. Goonasekera; E. D. Nagahawatte; P. Dahanayake; Thomas Amarasuriya; and M. B. de S. Jayasekera. *Declined to vote.*—Messrs. A. William Wijeratne; and W. T. Wijekulasuriya.

It was accordingly resolved that the application be refused.

23. To fix dates for the next General Meeting and for the Special Budget Meeting to consider finally the budget for 1942.—Agreed that the next General Meeting be held on December 16, 1941, and the Special Budget Meeting on December 9, 1941.

24. The following documents were laid on the table:—

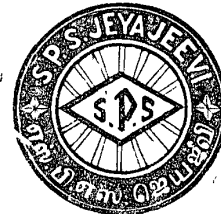

THE CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, No. 39 OF 1939.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance, I, Philip James Hudson, Deputy Controller of Prices, Kalutara District, do by this Order—

- (1) rescind my Order dated December 23, 1941, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,839 of December 31, 1941, in so far as it relates to the maximum prices fixed in respect of rice of the description named and specified in the First Schedule thereto.
- (2) fix the prices shown in columns 2, 3, and 4 of the Schedule hereto as the maximum prices per measure for which rice of the description noted at the head of these columns may be sold within the villages mentioned in the corresponding entry in column 1 of that Schedule;
- (3) direct that every trader who exposes for sale rice of any description mentioned at the head of columns 2, 3, and 4 in the Schedule hereto at any premises within the limits of any village in column 1 of the Schedule hereto shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises a notice in which shall be set out the maximum price fixed by this Order for rice of that description;
- (4) direct that no trader shall sell rice of any description mentioned at the head of columns 2, 3, and 4 in the Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any article or with rice of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (5) prescribe that every trader who sells rice of any description mentioned at the head of columns 2, 3, and 4 of the Schedule hereto shall on demand give to the purchaser of that rice a receipt in which there shall be set out—
 - (a) the description of rice sold;
 - (b) the quantity of rice sold;
 - (c) the price paid for the quantity of rice sold; and
 - (d) the date of the sale;
- (6) direct that for the purpose of this Order—

"measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one-thirty-second part of a bushel.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Controller of Prices by section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Reginald Sydney Vernon Poulter, Controller of Prices, do by this Order:—

- (i.) rescind my Order dated January 22, 1942, published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,851 of January 23, 1942, in so far as it relates to the articles of the description and grade mentioned in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
- (ii.) fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3, and 4 of the Schedule hereto to be respectively, the importer's maximum price, the maximum wholesale price and the maximum retail price above which articles of the description and grade specified in the corresponding entries in column 1 of that Schedule shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo;
- (iii.) direct that for the purposes of this Order—
 - (a) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
 - (b) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
 - (c) an "Importer" shall mean any person who in his name has cleared from the Customs any article mentioned in the Schedule hereto;
 - (d) a "Wholesale Dealer" shall mean any person who has been in the habit of selling for resale any article mentioned in the Schedule hereto;
 - (e) "Importer's Maximum Price" shall apply to the sale (by wholesale) of any article by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
 - (f) maximum wholesale price shall apply to all sales by wholesale except sales by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
 - (g) maximum retail price shall apply to all sales by retail; and
 - (h) a measure shall be deemed to be the standard quart dry measure equivalent to one-thirty-second part of a bushel;
- (iv.) direct that no trader shall sell any article of any description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any other article or with an article of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (v.) direct that any trader who, at any premises within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo, exposes for sale any article of the description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises, a notice on which there shall be set out the maximum price fixed by this Order in respect of that article of that description and grade;
- (vi.) direct that every trader who sells any article of the description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall give the purchaser of that article a receipt in which there shall be set out—
 - (a) the date of the sale;
 - (b) the quantity sold;
 - (c) the price paid for the quantity sold;
 - (d) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail; and
 - (e) the description and grade of the article sold.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Melvill Keverne Trelawny Sandys, Deputy Controller of Prices, Batticaloa District, do, by this Order—

- (1) rescind with effect from this date my order dated January 8, 1942, fixing the maximum prices of rice of the description named and specified in column 1 of the Schedule thereto within the Urban Council limits of Batticaloa;
- (2) fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the Schedule hereto to be respectively the maximum wholesale price per bag, the maximum retail price per bag, the maximum retail price per kottu and the maximum retail price per seer above which rice of the description and grades specified in the corresponding entry of column 1 of the Schedule hereto shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, for the area within the Urban Council limits of the town of Batticaloa;
- (3) direct that every trader who at any premises within the Urban Council limits of Batticaloa town exposes for sale rice of any description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises a notice on which shall be set out the maximum prices fixed by this Order in respect of rice of that description and grade;
- (4) direct that no trader shall sell any rice of any description and grade in the Schedule mentioned hereto which is adulterated with any article or with rice of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (5) prescribe that every trader who sells rice of any description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that rice on demand a receipt on which shall be set out—
 - (a) the quantity, description and grade of rice sold,
 - (b) the price paid for the quantity or rice sold,
 - (c) the date of the sale, and
 - (d) the nature of the sale, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or retail;
- (6) direct that for the purposes of this Order—
 - (a) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale,
 - (b) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail,
 - (c) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart dry measure equivalent to 1/32nd part of the bushel,
 - (d) "kottu" shall be deemed to be equivalent to 1/24th part of a bushel,
 - (e) "seer" shall be deemed to be equivalent to 1/28th part of a bushel,
 - (f) the maximum price which may be demanded within the Urban Council limits of the town of Batticaloa for a quantity of rice which is less than a bag but not less than a bushel shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag prescribed by this Order in respect of that area for rice of that description and grade,
 - (g) a bag of rice other than broken raw rice shall contain not less than 76 measures and 157 lb. nett excluding the weight of the sack, and
 - (h) a bag of broken raw rice shall contain not less than 115 measures and 239 lb. nett excluding the weight of the sack.
