WHEREAS His Majesty the King has, by Proclamation issued on the 22nd day of January, 1942, declared that during the continuance of the War with Bulgaria or until His Majesty gives further public notice, the Proclamation issued on the 3rd day of September, 1939, wherein were specified the articles which it is His Majesty's intention to treat as Contraband of War during the continuance of the War with Germany shall be deemed to specify the articles which it is His Majesty's intention to treat as Contraband of War during the continuance of the War with Bulgaria.

Now therefore, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do hereby proclaim that the articles enumerated in the Schedule to the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,498 of September 8, 1939, as the articles to be treated as Contraband during the continuance of the war with Germany, will be treated as Contraband during the continuance of the war with Bulgaria or until further public notice is given by His Majesty.

Given at Colombo in the Island of Ceylon, this ninth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Forty-two.

1. The officers appointed by the Government Agent under section 16 of the Irrigation Ordinance shall be called Chief Irrigation Headmen or Irrigation Vanniahs.

2. The Vaddai Vidhan is the Irrigation Headman in charge of a Vaddai or a tract or series of tracts of fields, and shall hold no other appointment without the sanction of the Government Agent.

The Vaddai Kavalan is the assistant of the Vaddai Vidhan. One or more Vaddai Kavalans shall be appointed if considered necessary by the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah.

The Vaddai Vidhan is responsible for the acts of his assistants. Vaddai Vidhans and Vaddai Kavalans shall, during the cultivation season, reside whenever possible within 3 miles of their Vaddais, and shall not absent themselves during the cultivation season or at other times when their services are required, without making special arrangements to the satisfaction of the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah for the discharge of their duties.

The Vaddai Vidhan shall ordinarily be elected by the proprietors of the Vaddai subject to the approval of the Government Agent:

Provided that the Government Agent may make a temporary appointment pending the holding of an election.

Every Vaddai Vidhan shall hold office for a period of three years from the date of his election or appointment and shall, at the end of such period, be eligible for re-election or re-appointment, as the case may be.

3. The Vaddai Vidhans shall have entire supervision of all paddy cultivation within their respective areas, subject to instructions from, and to the control of, the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah.

They shall enforce these rules and bring all breaches of the same before the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah in order that prosecutions may be entered.

4. The Vaddai Vidhans shall be entitled to receive from the cultivators one marakal of paddy for each avanam of land sown as Vaddai Vidhan's share: and when a Vaddai Kavalan has been appointed, one marakal per avanam in addition shall be set apart for Vaddai Kavalan's share: if more than one Vaddai Kavalan shall be appointed, his share shall be divided proportionately between them. The Vaddai Vidhan and the Vaddai Kavalan shall grant a receipt for the amount of paddy drawn by him before the paddy is removed from the threshing-floor. The whole or any portions of these payments may be withheld, if in the opinion of the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah, the work has been improperly performed, and he may, if he considers it necessary, cause the amount withheld to be paid to any person who has acted for a Vaddai Vidhan or a Vaddai Kavalan or into the Irrigation Fine Fund.

The Government Agent may appoint a person to receive the share or portion of the share of any Vaddai Vidhan or Vaddai Kavalan which he has ordered to be withheld from such Vaddai Vidhan or Vaddai Kavalan. Such appointment shall be made in writing, and the Government Agent may devote a portion of such withheld share to the remuneration of the collector appointed and to the cost of collection. For the purpose of this rule an avanam shall be taken to mean 2 acres of area. The share of the crop due to the Vaddai Vidhan or Vaddai Kavalan shall be handed over to such Vaddai Vidhan or Vaddai Kavalan within four months of the date when the crop was reaped, and failing this the equivalent money value of such share shall be payable immediately after the expiration of this term, the money value being reckoned at the current market rate.

5. As the season for cultivation approaches, whether it be munmari, kalavellamai, pinmari or other harvest, a meeting of the proprietors of lands concerned shall be convened and presided over by the Government Agent or some person deputed in writing by the Government Agent for the purpose.

The time and place of the meeting shall be fixed by the Government Agent or person deputed by him as aforesaid, who shall cause at least seven days' notice thereof to be published in such manner as shall appear to him best adapted for giving publicity thereto.

6. The meeting convened as in last paragraph shall—

(i.) advise the Government Agent or person deputed by him in writing as aforesaid as to—

- (a) the most suitable dates for the commencement and completion of sowing and irrigation;
- (b) the most suitable dates for furnishing dappu;
- (c) the most suitable dates for the completion of fencing;
- (d) extent to be cultivated;

(ii.) determine—

- (a) the order in which different Vaddais shall be sown;
- (b) the method of cultivation;
- (c) the kind of paddy to be sown in each Vaddai;
- (d) the place and manner in which black cattle and buffaloes are to be confined during cultivation;
- (e) applications from proprietors to be exempted from cultivation duties.

The dates referred to in paragraph (i.) shall be fixed by the Government Agent or person deputed by him.

7. Should it not be possible to commence cultivation on the dates fixed, or if there be insufficient water to irrigate the whole area decided on originally, a meeting convened as in rule 5 shall be called to decide (subject to the advice of the Divisional Irrigation Engineer) what alterations of dates are necessary, and what portions of the tracts are to be abandoned owing to anticipation of an insufficiency of water. Provided that, should the meeting so convened not be able to arrive at a unanimous decision as regards the curtailment of the area proposed to be cultivated in consequence of a probable shortage of water, the Government Agent or officer deputed by him shall have power to decide what area of land shall be irrigated. All the proprietors or lessees of the area which it was originally decided to irrigate shall have a right to cultivate a proportional share of the reduced area. Proprietors shall carry out their cultivation in accordance with the decision of the meeting under rule 6 and 7.

8. The Government Agent or officer deputed by him shall cause the decision of a meeting under rule 6 or 7 to be published by beat of tom-tom, by fixing written notices in conspicuous places or by other suitable means. All proprietors shall be bound by the decisions of the meeting: Provided that, if, after due notice no proprietors attend, it shall be competent for the Government Agent or person deputed by him in writing as aforesaid either to fix a fresh date for the meeting or to decide himself all such matters as are referred to in rule 6 or 7, and his decisions shall have the same validity as the decision of a meeting.

9. Each proprietor or lessee shall deliver to the Vaddai Vidhan not later than on the day fixed under rule 6 (i.) (b) a list (dappu) of the mullaicarans and cultivators to be employed in his field. This list shall be on a printed form supplied by the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah, and shall bear the signatures of the proprietor and of the mullaicaran and cultivators or their marks made before two witnesses. All the information required by this form shall be accurately filled in, and any person supplying false information shall be guilty of an offence. From the date of the delivery of the list the mullaicaran and cultivators, as well as the proprietors or lessee, shall be liable for all works of cultivation, and in the event of neglect or default without sufficient reason shall be guilty of an offence.

No person shall cultivate any fields unless dappu has been accepted in respect of that field by the Vaddai Vidhan and unless his name appears in the dappu as proprietor, lessee, mullaicaran or cultivator.

10. In the absence of a legal document showing that another person has been placed in actual possession of the land, dappu shall be accepted, in case of dispute from those persons who furnished dappu for the preceding harvest. The acceptance by the Vaddai Vidhan of a dappu involves the due observance of these rules on all persons who have signed it (witnesses excepted).

11. Should it be found that any proprietor does not intend to cultivate his share, the Vaddai Vidhan shall submit the matter to the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah who, may, if possible, exclude such share from the tract, or may allow such share to be cultivated by any other proprietor or lessee in the tract or failing such proprietor or lessee any other applicant having knowledge and experience of paddy cultivation, should the proprietor of such lands agree in writing thereto. Such other proprietor (or lessee) shall not be liable for any payment to the proprietor of the land, but shall be liable for everything required by these rules for the season's cultivation to the same extent as if he were the proprietor of the field thus apportioned to him: Provided that, should the proprietor of the land in question not agree to its being cultivated by such other proprietor (or lessee), he himself shall be liable for all such duties as are required by these rules.

12. No proprietor (or lessee) shall be exempt from contributing everything required by these rules for the season's cultivation unless exempted at the meeting under rule 6. In the event of any proprietor (or lessee) becoming liable for any work and failing to perform it, the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah shall inform the Government Agent in writing the estimated cost thereof. The Government Agent shall advance the sum necessary from the Irrigation Fine Fund: the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah shall do the work and certify the sum expended which shall be recovered as provided in Chapter VIII. of the Irrigation Ordinance.

13. All tanks, dams, channels, water-courses, &c., not in charge of the Director of Irrigation, shall be kept in a proper state of repair to the satisfaction of the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah, by the proprietors in proportion to their respective holdings. Similarly, all fields shall be levelled and filed ridges constructed to the satisfaction of the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah.

14. Trees or jungle on private land likely to occasion damage by giving cover to birds or wild animals shall be removed by the proprietors (or lessees) thereof.

15. Paths between cultivated places shall be kept open by the proprietors (or lessees) according to the limits prescribed by ancient customs and in proportion to their respective shares. Inspection paths through cultivated fields shall also be constructed and maintained by the proprietors (or lessees) if required by the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah.

16. Subject to the control of the Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah, the apportioning of water after it has left the irrigation works and within the tracts or Vaddais shall be done by the Vaddai Vidhan. During the period of which his tract or Vaddai will receive water the Vaddai Vidhan thereof may cause any dam (not being a work in charge of the Director of Irrigation), which impedes the flow of water thereto to be cut and any channel (not being a work in charge of the Director of Irrigation), which is depriving it of water to be closed. Except during that period, he may not interfere with any dam or channel outside his Vaddai.

17. If any person wilfully prevents water from flowing to the field below his own, or obstructs the flow of surplus water from the field on a higher level, or in any other way interferes with the general apportioning of the water within the Vaddais, the Vaddai Vidhan shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps or remove the obstruction himself, or use the water in any manner except in accordance with his instructions.

18. The fence round the whole Vaddai shall be measured by the Vaddai Vidhan within three days of sowing being completed, and by him apportioned to each proprietor in proportion to the extent of the proprietor's field without regard to whether the fence adjoins his field or not. The Vaddai Vidhan shall forthwith after such apportionment send a list to the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah to be filed for reference showing the length of fence apportioned to each proprietor. If fresh sticks are required, the Vaddai Vidhan shall inform the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah as soon as possible who shall obtain a licence to have them cut.

19. The proprietors shall take all necessary steps to finish the fence within the time fixed at the meeting under rule 6, to construct the necessary watch huts, to keep both fence and watch huts in repair and to keep regular watch in accordance with the orders of the Vaddai Vidhan. No person shall be employed as watcher who is incompetent or under the age of 16 years.

20. The mullaicaran or cultivators shall accompany the Vaddai Vidhan or his Vaddai Kavalan with lights on their rounds at night until such time as the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah considers this no longer necessary.

21. Should any portion of any tract ripen before the rest from any cause, the cultivators thereof shall be allowed the right to reap and store their crop but shall not be permitted of the Vaddai Vidhan to thrash and remove the whole crop. They shall continue to watch the field and preserve the fence until the crops of the remainder of the Vaddai have been reaped and stored. Should any portion of tract not ripen until after the reaping of the crop sown in accordance with the decision under rule 6 and 7 either on account of default in sowing in proper time or because of the sowing of a different kind of paddy to that agreed upon by the meeting, the cultivators of the other portion of the tract shall not be bound to continue preserving the fence and watching the field until that portion of that tract ripens.

22. After the reaping is over the Vaddai Vidhan shall order the removal of the fence, and shall cause the fence sticks to be heaped up by the cultivators in such places as he may direct. Proprietors may with the consent of the Vaddai Vidhan remove the fence sticks from the fields. They shall, however, furnish the Vaddai Vidhan with a receipt for the number taken and return them to the land for the following harvest, whether they cultivate the land or not, or shall be liable for their assessed value.

23. The threshing floor shall be cleared and fenced with a strong fence of stakes by the joint labour of all the cultivators of each field. The paddy shall be stacked there and the cultivators shall take their turn in watching the stacks for a period of two months from the date of reaping.

24. No paddy shall be removed from the fields at the termination of the harvest until the shares due to the Headman under rule 4 and the wages due to all persons engaged in the harvest and the hire of cattle and other cultivation charges have been paid, and in the case of fields cultivated for share until the landlord's dues have been paid.

In cases in which there is serious risk of damage to the paddy if it is left on the threshing floor the owner or cultivator, as the case may be, may remove it with the consent of the other party concerned, or if consent is not given he shall be responsible for leaving sufficient paddy to settle the claim and may only remove the remainder.

25. All field channels and water-courses which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation shall be in charge of the Vaddai Vidhans under the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah, and no person shall fill up, or encroach upon, such channels or water-courses or any of their reservations.

26. Should any channel, dam, or other work be required either outside or inside any field, it shall be constructed by the proprietors interested in proportion to their holdings as in rule 13.

Under schemes in charge of the Director of Irrigation, all applications for permission to construct such works must be made in writing to the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah.

As a general rule the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah may then give the proprietors the necessary permission to construct the work required or may refuse to do so. In cases where, in the opinion of the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah, the proposed work will affect the general irrigation under the scheme or will affect detrimentally proprietors of lands other than those of the applicants, he shall forward the application to the Government Agent with his report. If the Government Agent, after considering any representations which the owners of any lands affected by the proposed work may desire to make, is of opinion that the application should be favourably considered, he shall forward it to the Divisional Irrigation Engineer who, if he approves of it, shall inform the proprietors that permission is granted and shall arrange to give them any help in setting out the work or advice which they may require to enable them to construct the work.

The proprietors or lessees of new lands which have been surveyed and demarcated by landmarks with reservations for field channels shall construct their proportion of the field channel which is shown on the plan to irrigate the group of lots in which their holdings are situated.

Any such field channel shall be constructed by the proprietors in accordance with alignments approved by the Divisional Irrigation Engineer.

If any proprietor of such lands is unable to obtain water for irrigation owing to the neglect of any other proprietors to cut their shares of the field channels, such other proprietors shall be called upon by the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah to do the necessary work.

27. All proprietors shall grant way leave for such channels, dams or other works, even though their land may not be benefited thereby; but those proprietors whose lands are benefited by any such work shall be liable under this rule to pay to the owners of lands, which suffer damage by the construction of the work, compensation for any land taken or damage done, in proportion to the area of the holding benefited. The amount of such compensation shall be determined by the Government Agent on the advice of the Irrigation Engineer, Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah.

28. Should any proprietor fail to perform the work required under rules 13, 19, and 26 within the time fixed by the Government Agent, it shall be done by the Chief Irrigation Headman or Irrigation Vanniah who shall certify the costs incurred and the same shall be recovered as provided in Chapter VIII. of the Irrigation Ordinance.

29. No person shall in any way alter or injure any ridge or boundary between two fields in the same tract. On information that such alteration or injury has been affected, the Vaddai Vidhan shall notify the owners and proceed to the spot with witnesses and call up on the owners to restore the boundary to its original state, and on their failing to do so within three days after notice, the Vaddai Vidhan shall report the matter to the Village Council.

30. The owners and cultivators of all lands which may have been or may hereafter be bought from the Crown or from others shall become liable to the provisions of these rules and shall be entitled to water (provided the Director of Irrigation considers that the water supply is sufficient) from any of the field channels which may be most advantageous to their lands as soon as they are declared irrigable and included in the specification of land irrigable from the irrigation work. Such owners and cultivators shall, in all respects, enjoy the privileges and rights that belong to the owners and cultivators of the lands already irrigable except as regards the question of rates.

31. A meeting of proprietors may be convened whenever the Government Agent or a majority of the proprietors consider it desirable to obtain their advice or assistance in any matter concerning the cultivation.

32. These rules shall be enforced by the Government Agent and such officers and Headmen as may from time to time be appointed, and breaches of the rules shall be punishable as provided in the Irrigation Ordinance.

33. Any proprietor shall, when required, point out the correct boundaries of his lands, and if required by the Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah shall erect bunds or other suitable marks to define such boundaries.

34. Proprietors and others concerned shall be held liable for waste of water occurring on their fields. The Government Agent, Chief Irrigation Headman, or Irrigation Vanniah may, at his discretion, prevent, alter, or stop, or otherwise deal with, as he thinks fit, supplies of water to lands which owing to the default of the proprietors or cultivators to carry out any work required by these rules, demand an undue supply of water. No paddy shall be sown in any irrigation or other channel.

35. Proprietors of lands not paying irrigation rate, but cultivating those lands simultaneously with the specified irrigable lands shall, if such lands fall within the common fence be liable for the observance of rules 14, 15, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26.

36. During the cultivation the Vaddai Vidhan may seize all cattle found in his Vaddai or on a tank bund or bank of an irrigation channel or straying nearby and likely to endanger the crops. Cattle seized under this rule shall be handed over to the Local Police Headman without delay to be produced before the Village Tribunal.

37. Each proprietor or lessee who employs cultivators shall keep a book in which he shall enter all advances of paddy or money to his cultivators under the dates upon which such advances are made. He shall go through accounts with his cultivators at least three times, viz., immediately after the sowing has been completed, immediately before the harvest, and after the threshing, and take their signatures or thumb marks to the accounts in the books if those are admitted by them to be correct.

38. The rules published in *Gazette* No. 8,769 of July 25, 1941, as amended by the rule published in *Gazette* No. 8,799 of October 10, 1941, and by the rule published in *Gazette* No. 8,812 of November 14, 1941, are hereby rescinded in so far as they relate to the Irrigation district of Panama.

INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES (CONCILIATION) ORDINANCE,

Hoare & Co. (Engineers), Ltd., are required to state in writing, in terms of section 7 (2) of the said Ordinance, within fourteen days after the date of publication of this notice, whether they accept or reject the settlement reported.

## Report of the Conciliation Board.

On January 7, 1942, the All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union forwarded to the Manager of Messrs. Hoare & Co. (Engineers), Ltd., a list of 14 demands on behalf of the members of the Union employed by the Company, and on the 10th a further letter asking for a reply before January 14. The management sent a reply on January 12 indicating what demands it was prepared to concede, to which the Union sent a reply on January 20 stating that unless 4 demands specified in the letter were met and a reply to that effect sent to the Union by 4 p.m. on that day, they would resort to other means of collective bargaining to win their original demands. On the same day, i.e., the 20th, the Company sent a reply indicating what concessions it was prepared to grant but apparently this was not considered satisfactory by the Union, for the workers numbering about 350 went on strike the next day. Further correspondence ensued between the Union and the management and on January 24 the Union requested that certain guarantees and certain minimum demands should be met before the workers resumed work. These were forwarded to the management in the form of 7 demands. The Controller of Labour was kept informed of developments, but his efforts to bring about a settlement at the early stages proved futile as both parties did not show willingness to negotiate.

About the end of the month the Controller of Labour put forward a suggestion to the Union which was accepted, that the Union should agree to advise the men to go back to work on Monday,

February 2, if the Company accepted certain principles, and that negotiations should start thereafter. This was accepted by the Company and the workers resumed work on February 2.

In accordance with the terms on which the workers went back to work a conference of both parties was held on February 3 and subsequently on February 6 and 7. The parties then indicated that they wished the dispute referred to a Board of Conciliation and I therefore appointed myself Chairman of a Board and I nominated Mr. Hodges to represent the Company, and Mr. P. H. W. de Silva to represent the workers on the Board. Both declined to serve and I therefore functioned as the Board. In the conferences that were held the parties reached an agreement and a Memorandum of the agreement reached was signed by them. The settlement was as follows:—

## Agreement.

The following settlement has been reached in the dispute between Messrs. Hoare & Co. (Engineers), Ltd., and the workers of the Company who are members of the All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union:—

(1) The Company to recognize the All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union, provided that the majority of their employees are members of this Union.

(2) The Company agrees that no action will be taken against any employee for action in connection with this dispute.

(3) The Company agrees to pay a war bonus which is three-quarters of the rate paid by Government to Government employees, based on the wages prevailing on February 28, 1941. This war bonus is to be in addition to the bonus now being paid. The Union accepts the offer of the Company.

(4) The parties agree to the overtime rate being increased from 1½ to 1¾ times the normal wage rate.

(5) The Company agrees that the maximum period of apprenticeship should normally be five to six years for future contracts. Contracts already in existence are to be excluded. The Union accepts this.

(6) It is agreed that the wages from January 12 to January 20, 1942, should be paid on February 14, 1942. Half of the wages due from February 2 to February 21, 1942, should be paid on February 28. The balance half of the wages due from February 2 to February 21 plus the wages due from February 23 to February 28 should be paid on March 7. The wages due from March 2 to March 7 should be paid on March 14 and weekly thereafter. Where a workman is given advances or purchases goods on credit from the Company in the future, the Company is entitled to deduct the amount due in reasonable instalments from his wages.

(7) It is agreed that three weeks advance should be allowed for evacuation purposes to all those applying for it, except boys, to be paid in two instalments—

(a) first payment middle of February, 1942,

(b) second payment end of February, 1942,

to be deducted in twelve weekly instalments. Those employees of the Company who are already in debt to the Company for special cash advances granted to them and for the value of goods purchased from the Company will have their debt taken into consideration and special arrangements will be made for evacuation purposes; workmen to undertake not to leave the Company's services without their consent until completion of repayments. It is further agreed that "boys" should be defined as persons under 18 years of age.

(8) The employer agrees to consider the efficiency of each skilled worker periodically. Such period in no case to exceed two years, and in the case of workmen who are under 25 years of age, annually, and to grant an increment if any improvement in efficiency has been shown. The amount of the increment and whether an increment should be paid should be in the sole discretion of the Company. The Union accepts this.

(9) The Company explained that workers are clocked every 15 minutes and a worker is given a period of three minutes grace if he is late. If a worker therefore comes to work after 7.03 a.m. he loses the first quarter hour; similarly, if he comes after 7.18 a.m. he loses the next quarter also. The Company agrees to increase the period of grace to five minutes for each quarter. The Union accepts this.

(10) The Company agrees that where the dismissal of a worker is likely to lead to concerted action by all the workers it is prepared to meet the Union and to endeavour to arrange an amicable settlement. This is accepted by the Union.

(11) The Union undertakes that it will not take strike action without fifteen days' prior notice to the Company. The Company on the other hand, agrees not to declare a lockout without fifteen days' notice.

(12) All other demands by the Union contained in their letters dated January 7, 1942, January 20, 1942, and January 24, 1942, are withdrawn.

(13) It is agreed between the parties that this agreement should come into operation from February 16, 1942.

NOTIFICATION No. 324.

Publication of a Decision of an Estate Wages Board as required by Section 8 (5) of the Minimum Wages (Indian Labour) Ordinance, Chapter 114.

NOTICE is hereby given as required by section 8 (5) of the Minimum Wages (Indian Labour) Ordinance, Chapter 114, that at a meeting of the Estate Wages Board for the Revenue District of Puttalam and Chilaw held on January 7, 1942, it was decided that the minimum rates of wages per diem for time work performed on estates within the jurisdiction of the Board should be 55 cents for a man, 45 cents for a woman, 35 cents for a working child including the dearness allowance.

2. The Board of Indian Immigrant Labour will, after the expiry of one month from the date of this notification, confirm, vary, or cancel this decision. The minimum rates of wages specified in this decision will not take effect until they have been approved by His Excellency the Governor and published in the Gazette. When they are so approved and published they will take effect from a date to be fixed by the Controller of Labour and to be published in the Gazette.

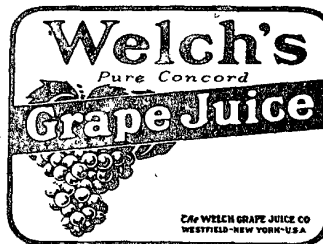

Order.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Assistant Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Alfred Silva Kohomban-Wickrema, Assistant Controller of Prices, Matara District, do by this Order:—

- (1) rescind the Orders dated December 9, 1941, published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,827 of December 12, 1941, prescribing the maximum prices for rice within the Revenue District of Matara;
- (2) fix the maximum wholesale price which is for the time being fixed by me at the Supply Station increased by the amounts specified in columns 2 or 3 (as the case may be) of the First Schedule hereto as the maximum wholesale price per bag above which rice of the description and grade specified in column 1 of the Second Schedule hereto shall not be sold within the area mentioned in the corresponding entry in column 1 of the First Schedule hereto;
- (3) fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the Second Schedule hereto to be the maximum retail price per measure above which rice of the description and grade specified in the corresponding entry in column 1 of the Second Schedule hereto shall not be sold by retail, in respectively, the four areas specified in the Third Schedule;
- (4) direct that every trader who exposes for sale rice of any description and grade mentioned in column 1 of Second Schedule hereto at any premises within the limits of any area mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at these premises a notice in which shall be set out the maximum price fixed by this Order for rice of that description and grade;
- (5) direct that no trader shall sell rice of any description and grade mentioned in column 1 of the Second Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any article or with rice of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (6) direct that every wholesale dealer who sells rice of any description and grade mentioned in column 1 of Second Schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that rice a receipt in which there shall be set out:—
  - (a) the description and grade of rice sold;
  - (b) the quantity of rice sold;
  - (c) the price paid for the quantity sold;
  - (d) the date of sale;
- (7) direct that for the purpose of this Order:—
  - (a) a bag of rice other than raw rice shall contain not less than 80 cut measures;
  - (b) a bag of broken raw rice shall contain not less than 112 measures;
  - (c) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
  - (d) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure equivalent 1/32nd part of a bushel;
  - (e) the maximum price which may be demanded by a wholesale dealer from an authorised distributor or other retail dealer for any quantity of rice which is less than one bag shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag fixed by this Order.

- (4) prescribe that every wholesale dealer who sells rice of any description and grade mentioned in columns (2) to (4) of the Schedule hereto shall give the purchaser of that rice a receipt in which there shall be set out—
- the description and grade of rice sold;
  - the quantity of rice sold;
  - the price paid for the quantity of rice sold;
  - the date of sale;

- (5) direct that for the purpose of this Order—

- a bag of any rice other than broken raw rice shall contain not less than 80 measures;
- a bag of broken raw rice shall contain not less than 112 measures;
- any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
- "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one-thirty-second part of a bushel;
- the maximum price which may be demanded by a wholesale dealer from an authorized distributor or other retail dealer for any quantity of rice which is less than one bag shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag fixed by this Order;
- "Authorized distributor" means a merchant or other fit and proper person authorised by the Deputy Food Controller under Regulation 5 of Part III., under head E of the Food Control Regulations 1938 to be a distributor of supplies of any controlled commodity for specified areas, institutions, or groups of people;
- "Wholesale Dealer" means a merchant or other fit and proper person authorised by the Deputy Food Controller under Regulation 5 of Part III., under Head E of the Food Control Regulations, 1938, to be a distributor of supplies of any controlled commodity to authorized distributors or depots;
- the maximum prices fixed by this Order for rice of any description and grade which is sold by wholesale shall include the container in which such rice is sold.

## THE CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, No. 39 OF 1939.

## Order.

BY virtue of powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance No. 39 of 1939, I, Samson Felix Amerasinghe, Deputy Controller of Prices, Kegalla District, do by this Order—

- (1) rescind my order fixing the maximum price of rice in the area within the Revenue District of Kegalla, dated December 19, 1941, and published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* No. 8,836 of December 23, 1941;

- (4) direct that no wholesale dealer shall sell rice of any description and grade mentioned in columns 2 to 4 of the Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any article or with rice of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (5) prescribe that every wholesale dealer who sells rice of any description and grade mentioned in columns 2 to 4 of the Schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that rice a receipt on which, shall be set out—
  - (a) the description and grade of rice sold;
  - (b) the quantity of rice sold;
  - (c) the price paid for the quantity of rice sold;
  - (d) the date of sale;
- (6) direct that for the purposes of this Order—
  - (a) a bag of any rice other than Broken Raw Rice shall contain not less than 80 measures;
  - (b) a bag of Broken Raw Rice shall contain not less than 112 measures;
  - (c) any sale of any quantity of rice for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
  - (d) "measure" shall be deemed to be the standard quart, dry measure, equivalent to one thirty-second part of a bushel;

- (e) the maximum price which may be demanded by a wholesale dealer from an authorised distributor or other retail dealer for any quantity of rice which is less than one bag shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag fixed by this Order ;
- (f) " Authorised distributor " means a merchant or other fit and proper person authorised by the Deputy Food Controller under Regulation 5 of part III. under head E of the Food Control Regulations 1938 to be a distributor of supplies of any controlled commodity for specified areas, institutions, or groups of people ;
- (g) " Wholesale Dealer " means a merchant or other fit and proper person authorised by the Deputy Food Controller under Regulation 5 of Part III., under head E of the Food Control Regulations, 1938, to be a distributor of Supplies of any controlled commodity to authorised distributors or depots ;
- (h) the maximum prices fixed by this Order for rice of any description and grade which is sold wholesale shall include the container in which such rice is sold.

- (i.) rescind with effect from this date my order dated January 1, 1942, published in *Gazette* No. 8,841 of January 2, 1942, in far as it relates to the maximum prices fixed in respect of flour of the description and grade named and specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
- (ii.) fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Schedule hereto to be, respectively, the maximum importers' price per bag, the maximum wholesale price per bag, the maximum retail price per bag and the maximum retail price per pound above which wheat flour of the description and grade specified in the corresponding entries in column 1 of the Schedule shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo;
- (iii.) direct that for the purpose of this Order—
  - (a) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
  - (b) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
  - (c) an "importer" shall mean any person who has cleared from the Customs in his name any article specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
  - (d) a "wholesale dealer" shall mean any person who has been in the habit of selling for resale any article specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
  - (e) "Importer's Maximum Price" shall apply to any sale by wholesale by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
  - (f) "Maximum Wholesale Price" shall apply to all sales by wholesale except sales by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
  - (g) "Maximum Retail Price" shall apply to all sales by retail;
  - (h) the gross weight of a bag of flour shall be not less than 196 lb.
- (iv.) direct that no trader shall sell wheat flour of any description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any article or wheat flour of an inferior description or grade or quality;
- (v.) direct that every trader who at any premises within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo exposes for sale wheat flour of any description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises notice on which there shall be set out the maximum prices fixed by this Order in respect of wheat flour of that description and grade;
- (vi.) direct that every trader who sells wheat flour of the description and grade mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall give the purchaser of that wheat flour on demand a receipt in which there shall be set out—
  - (a) the date of the sale;
  - (b) the quantity of wheat flour sold;
  - (c) the description and grade of wheat flour sold;
  - (d) the price paid for the quantity of wheat flour sold; and
  - (e) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail.
- (vii.) direct that when any flour of any description and grade specified in items 1, 2 and 3 of column 1 of the Schedule hereto is sold in a quantity exceeding 14 lb. at a time the maximum price charged for the same shall be determined by reference to the maximum price per bag (wholesale or retail as the case may be) fixed by this Order.
