THE REGISTERED STOCK AND SECURITIES ORDINANCE.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 4 of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance (Chapter 289), I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Order direct that of the sum of fifty million rupees for the raising of which by way of loan authority has been given by the Home Defence Loan Ordinance, No. 2 of 1942, the sum specified in the Schedule hereto shall be raised in Ceylon in the mode and upon the terms and conditions specified in that Schedule.

Schedule.

1. The sum of money to be raised shall be 10 million rupees, and it shall be raised by way of—

- (a) a 3 year loan,
- (b) a 7 year loan,
- (c) a 10 year loan, and
- (d) a 20-25 year loan.

2. Each of the four loans shall be raised by the creation and issue of registered stock only:

Provided, however, that the holders of registered stock issued for the purpose of raising the four loans shall, on and after such date as may be appointed by the Governor by notification published in the *Gazette* not later than six months after the conclusion of the present war, have the option of exchanging such stock for securities in the form of Government promissory notes.

3. The rate of interest payable shall—

- (a) in the case of the 3 year loan, be 2½ per centum per annum;
- (b) in the case of the 7 year loan, be 3 per centum per annum;
- (c) in the case of the 10 year loan, be 3½ per centum per annum; and
- (d) in the case of the 20-25 year loan, be 3½ per centum per annum.

4. The dates in each year on which the half-yearly interest on each of the four loans shall be payable shall be the first day of June and first day of December.

5. A half-yearly appropriation out of the general revenue and assets of Ceylon as a contribution to the sinking fund to be established for the purpose of redeeming each of the four loans shall—

- (a) in the case of the 3 year loan, be made at the rate of 5 per centum per annum, and commence from the thirty-first day of May, 1944;
- (b) in the case of the 7 year loan, be made at the rate of 5 per centum per annum, and commence from the thirty-first day of May, 1945;
- (c) in the case of the 10 year loan, be made at the rate of 5 per centum per annum, and commence from the thirty-first day of May, 1945;
- (d) in the case of the 20-25 year loan, be made at the rate of 3 per centum per annum, and commence from the thirty-first day of May, 1945.

6. The date of redemption of the registered stock issued for the purpose of raising each of the four loans and any Government promissory notes taken in exchange for such stock by the holders thereof shall—

- (a) in the case of the 3 year loan, be the first day of June, 1945;
- (b) in the case of the 7 year loan, be the first day of June, 1949;
- (c) in the case of the 10 year loan, be the first day of June, 1952;
- (d) in the case of the 20-25 year loan, be the first day of June, 1967;

Provided, however, that in the case of the 20-25 year loan, the Government shall, on such date subsequent to the first day of June, 1962, as may be appointed by the Governor by notification published, not less than six months prior to that date, in the *Gazette* and in two Ceylon newspapers, have the option of redeeming the registered stock issued for the purpose of raising that loan and any Government promissory notes taken in exchange for such stock by the holders thereof.

The Loan will be opened on March 2, 1942, and will be closed on May 30, 1942, or earlier if the Loan is fully subscribed.

ISSUE OF RS. 10,000,000. CEYLON GOVERNMENT HOME DEFENCE LOAN.

THIS LOAN WILL BE RAISED IN FOUR ISSUES AT THE OPTION OF THE APPLICANT—

- (a) 2½ per cent. Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on June 1, 1945.
- (b) 3 per cent. Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on June 1, 1949.
- (c) 3½ per cent. Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on June 1, 1952.
- (d) 3½ per cent. Stock repayable at par at the General Treasury, Colombo, on June 1, 1967, but the Government will have the option of redemption at par on or after June 1, 1962, on giving six calendar months' notice.

The allocation between the four issues will not be fixed, but the total amount issued will not exceed Rs. 10,000,000.

Authority.—The loan is raised on the authority of the Home Defence Loan Ordinance, No. 2 of 1942, and under the provisions of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance, 1937 (Chapter 289).

Purpose.—The entire proceeds of the loan will be used to finance any emergency expenditure which may become necessary as a result of the war.

Form of Issue.—The loan will be issued in the form of registered stock only. Holders of registered stock will, however, have the option of exchanging registered stock for promissory notes on and after a certain date as may be appointed by the Governor by notification published in the *Gazette* not later than six months after the conclusion of the present war (Leaflets containing the general conditions applicable to Registered Stock are available on application to the Public Debt Office).

Issue Price.—The issue price is Rs. 100 per cent payable in full at the time of application. The minimum holding is Rs. 100.

Applications.—Applications will be received by the Registrar, Public Debt Office, General Treasury, Colombo, from March 2, 1942, and until the list is closed. Applications must be on the proper form and must be accompanied by a remittance in full or by a receipt for the remittance from a Kachcheri or Bank—for mode of payment see under "Payment for Stock".

When payment is made into a Kachcheri or a Bank, the application form may be forwarded through such Kachcheri or Bank.

A commission of 1/16 per cent. will be allowed to bankers, recognized stock brokers, and brokers registered under the Coconut Products Ordinance in respect of applications bearing their stamp.

Payment for Stock.—Payments may be made personally or by post in cash or by cheque at the General Treasury, Colombo, or at any Kachcheri or to the credit of Ceylon Government account in any of the following Banks in Colombo:—

- Bank of Ceylon.
- Chartered Bank of India, Australia and China.
- Eastern Bank, Limited.
- Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation.
- Imperial Bank of India.
- Mercantile Bank of India, Limited.
- National Bank of India, Limited.

Scrip.—Stock Certificates will be issued immediately after receipt and acceptance of the application.

Interest.—Interest on the four issues at the appropriate rate will be payable half-yearly on the 1st day of June and the 1st day of December in each year. The first payment of interest will be the amount of interest due for the period from the date on which the stock is purchased to the 31st day of May, 1942, and a warrant for this amount payable on the 1st day of June, 1942, will be attached to the scrip. A first full six months' interest will be payable on the 1st day of December, 1942.

Taxation.—All documents used in the issue, exchange, transfer or redemption of the loan will be free from stamp duty. Interest to resident holders will be paid without deduction of income tax, but resident holders liable to income tax must include such interest in their income tax returns. Deduction of tax at source will be made from holdings by non-residents, other than Empire Governments. (Current rate of income tax is 15 per cent. in the case of non-resident individuals and 18 per cent. in the case of non-resident companies.) Persons who are exempt from Ceylon Income Tax will be entitled to repayment of the tax deducted. Holdings of Charities and Governments of Empire countries are exempt from Ceylon Income Tax.

Security.—The loan is secured on the general revenues and assets of the Ceylon Government. Four separate sinking funds will be formed for the redemption of the four issues of the loan under the management of the Deputy Chief Secretary and the Deputy Financial Secretary, who are the Trustees of the sinking funds. Half-yearly contributions at the rate of 5 per cent per annum to the Sinking Fund of the 1945 loan will be commenced on June 1, 1944, and to the 1949 and 1952 loans on 1st June, 1945, respectively. Contributions to the 1962-67 loan will be at the rate of 3 per cent per annum and will commence on 1st June, 1945.

These contributions may be increased and will only be discontinued if and when the Trustees are satisfied that no further contributions will be required to ensure the repayment of the loans on the due dates.

Date of Examination—

(a) The salary and conditions of service on which successful candidates will be appointed will be those fixed for the General Clerical Class after a decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Select Committee of the State Council appointed to consider the Reports of the Retrenchment Commission, on the structure, salary and conditions of service of the General Clerical Service. If any candidates take up duties before a decision has been reached they will receive a provisional salary of Rs 600 per annum and their other conditions of service will provisionally be those applicable to officers recruited to Class III of the General Clerical Service after June 1, 1934. Candidates must clearly understand however that the salary scale and conditions of service which will be finally applicable to them will be those fixed by Government when a final decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Select Committee and that they will have no claims to special consideration on the ground that they have been appointed before a final decision has been reached on their terms of service.

(b) Successful candidates will be appointed on 2 years' probation. They will be liable to transfer and may be posted to any station in Ceylon. They will be required to pass a test in typewriting in order to qualify for their first increment. No rent allowance is payable. They will also be subject to the Public Service, Financial and other Standing Regulations of the Government.

(c) Successful candidates who may have previous non-pensionable or quasi-Government service will not be given incremental credit in respect of such service.

3. The number of appointments to be made will be notified later. The names of successful candidates will be published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette*, and they will be given appointments as suitable vacancies occur.

Applications—

4. Applications for admission to the examination must be addressed to the Director of Education on forms which may be obtained from his office up to March 7, 1942.

5. Applications must be sent by registered post to reach the Director of Education not later than 2 p.m. on March 14, 1942. Any applications received after that hour will be rejected.

6. The Director of Education will return those applications which are approved to the candidates concerned. Such applications will constitute the candidates' tickets of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Education. A candidate not producing such form will be refused admittance to the examination.

Eligibility—

7. Candidates must be Ceylonese.*

8. Candidates must furnish proof when forwarding their applications that they have previously passed at least—

(a) The Cambridge Senior or the London Matriculation, or the Senior School Certificate (English) Examination, or

(b) The Final Examination for the Commercial Certificate of the Ceylon Technical College, or

(c) The Cambridge Junior or the Junior School Certificate (English) Examination and either (i.) the Higher Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce, or (ii.) the Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce.

Their applications must also bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs 10

9. (i) A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be not less than 17 nor more than 22 years of age on August 1, 1942, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person, to the satisfaction of the Director of Education, must be attached to the form of application.

(ii) Certificates of birth issued for the purpose of the Code for Assisted Schools will not be accepted for this examination.

* For the purpose of this examination a Ceylonese is—

- (a) a British subject who is born in Ceylon, one of whose parents was born in Ceylon, or
 (b) a British subject who is a descendant of a person falling within category (a), or
 (c) a British subject deemed by the Governor with the advice of the Board of Ministers, in view of special circumstances, to be a Ceylonese.

(m) Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted as substitutes for birth certificates.

(iv) In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past births, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs either by alteration or addition, from the name by which a candidate is known—(a) the parent or guardian, in the case of a candidate under the age of 21 years, should before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 19 of the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance (Chapter 94), and (b) in the case of a candidate over the age of 21 years, he should produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Director of Education that the certificate of birth forwarded applies to him.

(v) If the candidate has been educated at a Government or Assisted School, a certificate must be from the Principal of the last Government or Assisted School which he has attended, otherwise it may be from the candidate's teacher or schoolmaster by preference or a member of the Public Service, a Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Advocate, Proctor or Notary, or, generally speaking, some person whose name is known and to whom reference can be readily made.

10. Clerks on the permanent establishment of Government Departments who are paid directly from "Personal Emoluments" Votes in the Government Estimates (other than members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, Harbour Engineer's, or Railway Departments; Draughtsmen, and Stenographers), if within the age prescribed in these regulations will be admitted without fee provided that they have passed the examination or examinations prescribed by regulation 8 above and that their services since employment under Government have been throughout satisfactory.

Withdrawals and Refunds—

11. (a) If a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission to the examination a refund will be made of 3/5 the value of stamps affixed to his application.

(b) If a candidate, who has been admitted to the examination gives notice of his withdrawal to the Director of Education at least 7 days before the date of the examination, a refund will be made of 1/2 the value of stamps affixed to his application provided his form of admission to the examination is returned with his notice of withdrawal.

(c) A candidate who has been admitted to the examination and wishes to withdraw on account of illness, should forward notice of his withdrawal to reach the Director of Education at least one day before the examination. A refund of the full value of stamps affixed to his application will then be made, provided his notice of withdrawal is accompanied by a certificate from a qualified medical officer to the effect that he is unfit to sit for the examination.

(d) In no other case will a refund be granted.

Leave to Government Officers to attend Examination—

12. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications have been returned to them approved by the Director of Education, leave to present themselves at the examination.

In all written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling. Candidates whose writing is illegible are liable to be disqualified. The *Viva Voce* examination will be held in Colombo.

Medical Examination—

15. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

Payment of Duty on Locally Manufactured Malt Liquor.

1. By-laws relating to the tax on vehicles and animals.

1. (1) For the purposes of the tax on vehicles and animals levied under section 47 of the Village Communities Ordinance, every person who has possession or custody or control of any vehicle or animal liable to such tax shall furnish to the Chairman a schedule of particulars relating to such vehicle or animal in such form as may be provided for the purpose by the Committee.

If any person, after having furnished the schedule referred to in by-law 1 acquires, keeps or uses any vehicle or animal, not mentioned in such schedule, he shall, within one month from the date on which he acquires or commences to keep or use any such vehicle or animal, notify the Chairman in writing of the fact of such acquisition, keeping or use and further furnish true and correct information in respect of every such vehicle or animal so acquired, kept or used.

3. Subject to the provisions of section 47 (2) of the Ordinance every person who has furnished the schedule referred to in by-law 1 shall without further notice be liable in respect of vehicles or animals entered in such schedule to pay the tax for the year for which such schedule is furnished, and every person who has sent the written notice referred to in by-law 2 shall be liable to pay the tax on vehicles or animals referred to in such notice for the year in which such vehicles or animals were acquired by him or otherwise came into his possession.

4. Every person who, having furnished the schedule referred to in by-law 1 or the written notice referred to in by-law 2, claims to be exempt under section 47 (3) of the Ordinance from the liability to pay the tax in respect of any vehicle or animal which is entered in or referred to in such schedule or notice shall forthwith give notice in writing to the Chairman of his claim for such exemption specifying the grounds on which such claim is made.

5. The annual tax payable under the provisions of section 47 of the Ordinance shall be paid at the office of the Committee on or before the thirty-first day of March in each year: Provided that in any case where the schedule referred to in by-law 1 or the written notice referred to in by-law 2 is furnished to the Chairman after the thirty-first day of March in any year, the tax in respect of each vehicle or animal referred to in such schedule or notice shall be payable within one month of the date on which such schedule or notice is so furnished.

6. On payment of the annual tax by any person the Chairman shall issue to that person, in respect of every vehicle for which such tax is paid, a metal plate with distinguishing letters for the several kinds of vehicles as specified in the schedule hereto and with figures denoting the year for which the plate is issued and the corresponding number in the register of vehicles. Where any such plate becomes indistinct or defaced by use or otherwise the owner shall return it to the Chairman and shall be entitled on making a payment of 25 cents to receive a fresh plate. The Chairman may, on his being satisfied by affidavit or otherwise that any such plate has been lost or stolen, issue a fresh plate on the application of the owner and on payment by such owner of 50 cents.

7. The owner or person in charge of every vehicle shall affix the plate referred to in by-law 6 on a conspicuous part of the vehicle in respect of which such plate was issued.

By-laws.**Capitation Tax.****Exemption.**

1. The following classes of persons are hereby exempted from the liability to pay the capitation tax:—

- accredited priests or ministers of any religious denomination;
- members of the Ceylon Defence Force;
- railway telegraph linesmen; and
- persons over 55 years of age.

Preparation of Lists.

2. The person or persons authorised in that behalf in writing by the Chairman, shall on or before December 1, in each year, prepare in such form as may be specified by the Chairman, a list of all persons resident within the village area who are liable to pay the capitation tax for the next succeeding year.

3. The chief occupier of every house shall, whenever required by the Chairman or by any duly authorised person, fill in to the best of his knowledge any form supplied to him for the purposes of the preparation of the list, or furnish all such information, written or oral, as may be required relating to the number of persons resident in the house (including the householder himself), and the name, age, and race, and other particulars of each such person.

4. The list prepared in each year shall be kept at the office of the Village Committee or at any other suitable place appointed by the Chairman and shall be open for inspection to the public from December 1 to 31 of that year.

5. Any person whose name is included in the list may, by a written statement addressed to the Chairman on or before January 31 next succeeding, object to the inclusion of his name in the list on the ground that he is not a voter, or that he has ceased to be resident in the village, or that he is exempted by by-law 1 from the liability to pay the capitation tax. The Chairman shall, after holding such inquiry as he may consider necessary, make such order as may seem to him just.

6. Any person not already exempted under by-law 1 may, on or before February 15, make a written application to the Chairman for exemption from the liability to pay the capitation tax for that year. The Chairman may exempt such person from such liability for that year, or for life, or for such other period as may be think fit, on the ground that such person is by reason of bodily infirmity or disease, incapable of performing labour.

7. The list shall be revised in accordance with the orders made by the Chairman under by-law 5, and with the exemptions granted under by-law 6, and shall be certified under the hand of the Chairman on or before March 1, as the final list of the persons liable to pay the capitation tax for that year.

Annual Programme of Work.

8. (1) The Committee shall at a meeting to be held on or before March 15, in each year—

- prepare a programme of all the items of work which have to be constructed or maintained during that year;
- determine the number of days for which each person included in the final list should be called upon to perform labour for that year in payment of the capitation tax due from him;
- determine the rate, not exceeding fifty cents in respect of each day, at which the labour due from any person may be commuted by payment of money.

(2) Notice of the matters determined by the Committee under paragraph (1), shall be published by the Chairman as soon as may be, by beat of tom-tom in the village area and by the exhibition of written notices in conspicuous places in that area.

9. In the case of any item of work not included in the programme referred to in by-law 8 (1), any person included in the final list may be called upon to contribute labour for an additional period, but so however, that the total period for which any one person may be called upon to perform labour in any year does not exceed ten days.

Commutation of Tax.

10. Any person whose name is in the final list prepared for any year may commute his liability to perform labour for that year by making payment of money, at the rate determined by the Committee under by-law 8 (1), on or before March 31 or such later date in that year as the Committee may fix with the approval of the Executive Committee of Local Administration.

11. Not less than one week before the date appointed by the Chairman for the commencement of any item of work, information shall be given in the village area by beat of tom-tom, and by the exhibition of written notices under the hand of the Chairman, specifying the place at which the work is to be done, the persons who are required to perform the labour necessary, the number of days for which each person has to contribute labour and the hours of work on each such day. The persons required to contribute labour may be described in the notice either by name or as inhabitants of any specified village or part of a village or group of villages.

12. (1) Every person who elects to commute his liability to perform labour by making payment of money shall pay the money to such officer and at such place as may for the time being be appointed by the Committee.

(2) A written receipt in such form as may be provided for the purpose by the Committee shall be issued under the hand of the officer to whom such payment is made.

Performance of Labour.

13. Every person whose name appears in the final list referred to in by-law 7 and who has not commuted his liability to perform labour, shall attend with such implements and tools as may be necessary and perform labour on the days and at the time and place specified in such notice as may be issued exhibited or published by the Chairman in that behalf.

Performance or Commutation of Double Labour.

14. Every person who fails to perform labour on any day on which he is required to do so by by-law 13, shall be deemed to be in default on that day and shall be liable to perform double labour, that is to say, labour for two days in respect of each day on which he is in default.

15. Any person who is liable to perform double labour may commute his liability to perform such double labour by making payment of money at the rate determined under by-law 8 (1): Provided that no person shall be permitted to make payment of money in commutation of the liability to perform such double labour after the expiry of a period of one month from the earliest day in respect of which he is in default.

16. Every person who is liable to perform double labour under by-law 14 and has not made payment in commutation thereof under by-law 15 shall attend with such implements and tools as may be necessary and perform labour on such days and at such time and place as may be specified in a notice which shall be issued by the Chairman. Such notice shall not require any person to perform labour for any period exceeding in length the total number of days for which such person is liable to perform labour under by-law 14.

17. In these by-laws—

- "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee;
- "Committee" means the Village Committee;
- "List" means the list of persons liable to pay the capitation tax in the village area.

Colombo Gas and Water Co., Ltd., and the workers of the Company, is published in terms of section 7 of the above Ordinance.

2. The representatives of the parties, Mr. P. H. W. de Silva, President, All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union, on behalf of the workers, and Mr. H. E. Stone, on behalf of Messrs. Colombo Gas and Water Co., Ltd., are required to state in writing, in terms of section 7 (2) of the said Ordinance within fourteen days after the date of publication of this notice, whether they accept or reject the settlement reported.

Report of the Conciliation Board.

On February 13, 1942, the All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union forwarded to the Manager of the Colombo Gas & Water Co., Ltd., a list of four demands on behalf of the workers who were members of the Union. The Resident Engineer and Manager in reply to this letter informed the Union on February 14 that the demands had been placed before the Local Committee for decision. The Union replied to this letter on February 15 stating that the Company's reply was unsatisfactory and demanded a more satisfactory reply by 3 p.m. on Tuesday the 17th. This letter further stated that if a more satisfactory reply was not received within the time limit indicated they would "be compelled to resort to other and more effective methods of collective bargaining". This letter reached the Manager only on the 17th at 3.10 p.m. The Company replied to this letter on the 17th afternoon itself stating that a meeting of the Local Committee will be held on the 18th after which the decision will be communicated to the Union, but the labourers struck work on the 18th morning.

The Controller of Labour got in touch with the Union on the 18th morning itself and suggested that pending negotiation the labourers should be persuaded to return to work as the general public would be greatly inconvenienced if the supply of gas was curtailed. The Union agreed to this suggestion and the workers resumed work on the 18th afternoon.

A conference was held at the Office of the Controller of Labour on the 19th and 20th. The Union added five further demands to the list already forwarded to the Company. The parties indicated that this dispute should be settled by a Conciliation Board appointed in terms of the Industrial Disputes Ordinance, Chapter 110. I therefore appointed myself Chairman of the Board and nominated Mr. H. E. Stone to represent the Company and Mr. P. H. W. de Silva to represent the workers on the Board. Both declined to serve and I therefore functioned as the Board.

A settlement was arrived at and a memorandum of agreement reached was signed by them. The settlement is as follows:—

Agreement.

The following settlement has been reached in the dispute between the Colombo Gas & Water Co., Ltd., and the workers of the Company who are members of the All-Ceylon Industrial and General Workers' Union:—

1. The Company agrees to pay a full month's wages to all workers as an advance for evacuation and any matters connected with the present emergency. The advance to be repayable over a period of 8 months in weekly instalments. The Union agrees that it will not apply on behalf of the workers for any further advance for evacuation or any matters connected with the present emergency.

2. The Company agrees to make weekly payments to the nearest rupee and any balance due to be paid at the end of every fourth week. The monthly wages for February will be paid on March 6. The wages for the first week in March will be paid on March 12, and thereafter wages will be paid every Thursday.

3. It was agreed that a War bonus should be paid as follows:—
When the Government index cost of living is over 110, the War Bonus should be 20 cents per day.

When it was over 120—30 cents per day.

" " 130—40 "

" " 140—50 / "

If the index cost of living rose over 150, the position will be further reviewed.

4. It was agreed that the bonus be paid at the end of every fourth week. A worker who works for 22 days or over in a period of 4 weeks will be paid bonus for 28 days. If he works less than 22 days over a period of 4 weeks, the worker will get the bonus for the number of days he actually has worked. The payment of the increased bonus commences from March 1, 1942.

5. It was agreed that the rate of payment for overtime should be time and a half for any work that is done over the normal shift. The payment of this rate of overtime to commence from March 1, 1942.

6. It was agreed that the Company should pay a full day's wages for work on February 18, 1942. This is not to be taken as a precedent.

7. The Company agreed to keep the lamp lighters in employment in the event of a full black-out being introduced.

8. It was agreed that if the Union took up the dismissal or discontinuance of any worker which is likely to lead to an industrial dispute, the Company should agree to submit the matter to the arbitration of an officer appointed by the Controller of Labour.

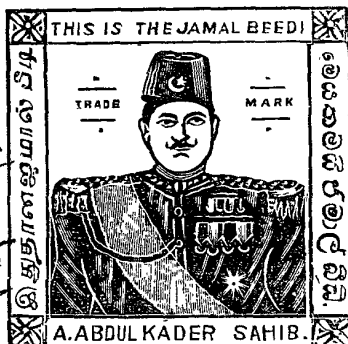

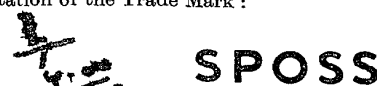

THE INCOME TAX ORDINANCE

4/2/2 (FSO)

RULE made by the Board of Income Tax under section 90 of the Income Tax Ordinance.

Rule.

The rules made by the Board of Income Tax and published in Gazette No. 7,990 of June 30, 1933, are hereby amended as follows:—

- (1) by the omission of rule II.;
- (2) by the substitution, for paragraph (4) of rule I, of the following new paragraph:—
- (4) In determining the profits of any period which is taken into account for the purpose of computing the statutory income of a bank for the year of assessment commencing

on the first day of April, 1942, or for any subsequent year of assessment, the preceding provisions of this rule shall have effect as though there were substituted, for paragraph (3), the following paragraph:—

"(3) Where the accounts prepared by a bank for its own purposes do not, in the opinion of the Commissioner, disclose the true profits of the Ceylon branch from business carried on in Ceylon, such profits shall be determined as follows:—

- (a) The Commissioner shall determine the amount which bears to the profits of the entire business of the bank the same proportion as the sum of the assets and liabilities of the business of the Ceylon branch bears to the sum of the assets and liabilities of the entire business of the bank.
- (b) In determining the profits of the entire business of the bank, no deduction shall be made for bad or doubtful debts.
- (c) In determining the assets and liabilities of the entire business of the bank, transactions between branches shall be excluded.
- (d) From the amount determined in accordance with the preceding provisions of this paragraph, there shall be deducted such sums as the Commissioner may, in his discretion, allow as a deduction for bad or doubtful debts under section 9 (1) (d) of the Income Tax Ordinance and such amount, less such deduction, shall be deemed to be the profits of the Ceylon branch of the bank from business carried on in Ceylon."

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Deputy Controller of Prices by section 3 (read with section 2 (3)) of the Control of Prices Ordinance, I, Richard Henry David Manders, Deputy Controller of Prices, Matale District, do by this Order:—

- the description and grade of the article sold ;
 - the quality of article sold ;
 - the price paid for the quantity of article sold ;
 - the date of the sale ; and
 - the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was a wholesale or retail, as the case may be ;
- (6) direct that for the purpose of this Order—
- any sale of any quantity of the said articles for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale ;
 - any sale of any quantity of the said articles for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail ;
- (7) direct that provisions of this Order shall apply to the descriptions and grades of the articles mentioned in the First Schedule hereto ;
- (8) rescind my Order dated January 27, 1942, relating to prices of curry stuffs and pulses in Matale District published in *Government Gazette* of January 30, 1942.
