## THE DEFENCE (TRADING WITH THE ENEMY) REGULATIONS, 1939.

WHEREAS the Oriental Bank of Malaya, Limited (hereinafter referred to as "the Bank") is an enemy within the meaning of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939:

And Whereas, prior to the date when the Bank became an enemy within the meaning of the aforesaid regulations, the Bank at its duly established place of business in Jaffna carried on the business of banking through its Agent, Santhiapillai Philip Joseph (hereinafter referred to as "the Agent"):

And whereas every person in Ceylon who has any commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with the Bank or its Agent is liable to be deemed to have traded with the enemy within the meaning of the aforesaid regulations:

And whereas by paragraph (1) of regulation 1 of the aforesaid regulations, it is provided that any person who trades with the enemy within the meaning of those regulations shall be guilty of an offence:

And whereas by paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the said regulations it is provided that a person shall not be deemed to have traded with the enemy by reason only that he has done anything under authority given generally or specially by the Governor:

And whereas it is expedient in pursuance of paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the said regulations to give authority to the Agent and to persons in Ceylon in the manner hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, by virtue of the powers vested in me by paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939, do hereby authorise the Agent to have commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with persons in Ceylon for the benefit of the Bank, and do, further, authorise persons in Ceylon generally to have commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with the Bank through the Agent.

- (d) in the case of any land on which there is no building (other than a building used solely for the purpose of housing animals or poultry) and which is under permanent cultivation, one per centum of the annual rent.

(2) Every person on whom a notice under clause (a) of paragraph (1) is served shall, within fourteen days from the date of such service, correctly and truly fill up, sign, date, and deliver or transmit to the office of the Committee the form served with such notice, and every person on whom a notice under clause (b) is served shall comply with the requirements of such notice.

(3) For the purposes of this by-law, any notice which is addressed to any person and which is (a) delivered to an adult member of his household or his servant, or (b) affixed on a conspicuous part of the premises in respect of which the tax is to be imposed, in any case where such adult member or servant refuses to accept the notice or where there is no such adult member or servant on the premises, shall be deemed to have been duly served on that person.

3. No person shall obstruct any assessor or any person acting under the orders of an assessor, in the lawful discharge of his duties.

4. In these by-laws—

- “ building ” includes any hut, shed, or roofed enclosure, whether used for human habitation or otherwise ;
- “ Chairman ” means the Chairman of the Committee ;

#### CEYLON GOVERNMENT RAILWAY Recruitment of Candidates to Class III. of the Railway Clerical Service.

A competitive examination for candidates wishing to enter the Railway Clerical Service will be held at Colombo on March 27, 1943.

##### Salary Conditions of Service.

2. (a) The salary and conditions of service will be those fixed for the lowest grade of the Railway Clerical Service after a decision has been reached on the recommendations of the Select Committee of the State Council appointed to consider the Reports of the Retrenchment Commission, on the structure, salary and conditions of service of the Railway Clerical Service. If any candidates take up duties before a decision has been reached they will receive a provisional salary of Rs. 600 per annum. The grant of leave and other conditions will be governed by the recommendations in Sessional Paper VIII. of 1934, in the case of new entrants to the Public Service. (b) Successful candidates who may have previous non-pensionable or quasi-Government service will not be given incremental credit in respect of such service.

3. The names of successful candidates will be published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* and they will be given appointments as vacancies occur.

##### Applications.

(v.) Any dog found in any public place or road or any place other than a private building, compound or garden, within the said area, and not tied up or led, or effectively controlled, shall be liable to be destroyed forthwith by any person authorised in writing for the purpose.

This proclamation shall take effect from January 1, 1943, to June 30, 1943.

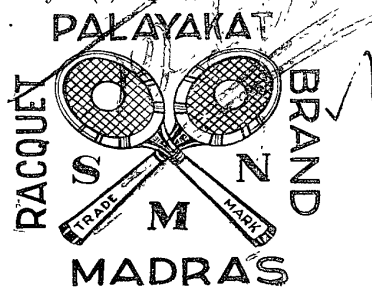

##### THE CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, NO. 39 OF 1939.

Order.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Controller of Prices (Food) by section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Reginald Sydney Vernon Poulter, Controller of Prices (Food), do, by this Order—

- (i.) revoke with effect from this date my Order dated November 12, 1942, published in Gazette No. 9,033 of November 13, 1942, in so far as it relates to maximum prices fixed in respect of milk food of the description named and specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto;
- (ii.) fix the prices specified in columns 3 and 4 of the Schedule hereto to be, respectively, the maximum wholesale price per case and the maximum retail price per tin above which the brand of the milk food specified in the corresponding entry in column 1 of that Schedule and of the standard pack specified in the corresponding entry in column 2 of that Schedule shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, in any part of Ceylon;
- (iii.) direct that paragraphs (iii.), (iv.), and (v.) of the Order published in Gazette No. 8,908 of April 10, 1942, shall apply in the case of the milk food of the description named and specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto as though those paragraphs were incorporated in this Order.
