THE DEFENCE (TRADING WITH THE ENEMY) AMENDMENT REGULATIONS, 1940.

THE TRADING WITH THE ENEMY (CUSTODIAN) ORDER, 1940.

THE URBAN COUNCILS ORDINANCE,
No. 61 of 1939.

Order under Section 6.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 6 of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No. 61 of 1939, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this order divide the town for which the Kadugannawa Urban Council is to be constituted under that Ordinance into the six electoral divisions defined in the schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Electoral Divisions of the Town of Kadugannawa.

Electoral Division No. 1. (Belungala).

North From the western extremity of the northern limit of the Urban Council area eastwards along the said limit as far as the centre of the Railway line near the south-western corner of lot 30, in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence eastwards along the centre of the Railway line till it meets the centre of the main road to Alagalla.

East From the last mentioned point southwards along the centre line of the main road to Alagalla as far as its junction with the centre of the Colombo-Kandy road, thence along the centre line of the main road to Gampola till it meets the southern limit of the Urban Council area.

South From the last mentioned point south-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area to its western extremity.

West From the last mentioned point north-westwards along the western limit of the Urban Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 2 (Alagalla Vidya).

North From the north-western corner of lot 31 in Town Survey plan No. 46 north-eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban Council area as far as the north-eastern corner of lot 101 in Town Survey plan No. 46.

East From the last mentioned point south-eastwards, southwards and eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban Council area to a point in prolongation of the centre line of the masonry drain between lots 130 and 139 and through lot 38 in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence south-eastwards along the said prolongation and along the centre line of the said masonry drain to the centre of the Colombo-Kandy road and thence to the centre of the culvert over Kohange-ela, thence south-westwards along the centre line of Kohange-ela to the southern limit of the Urban Council area.

South From the last mentioned point south-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area as far as the centre of the path through lot 116 in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence north-westwards along the centre line of the said path to the centre of its junction with the Colombo-Kandy road, thence south-westwards along the centre line of the said road as far as its junction with the centre of the main road to Alagalla, thence northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. 1 to its northern extremity, thence westwards along the northern limit of Division No. 1 till it meets the northern limit of the Urban Council area.

West From the last mentioned point northwards along the northern limit of the Urban Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 3 (Dalianga).

North From the centre of the junction of the Colombo-Kandy road and the main road to Alagalla eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. 2 to a point in prolongation of the north-eastern boundary of lot 50 in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence southwards along the said prolongation and along the eastern boundary of the said lot 50 to its southern extremity, thence in a line to the southern boundary of the masonry drain in lot 57 in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence north-eastwards along the southern boundary of the said masonry drain to the north-eastern corner of lot 77, thence southwards along the eastern boundary of lot 77 and north-eastwards along the northern boundary of lot 78 to the north-eastern corner of lot 78 in Town Survey plan No. 46.

East From the last mentioned point southwards along the eastern boundary of lot 78 and north-eastwards and south-eastwards along the southern boundary of lot 85 in Town Survey plan No. 46 to the southern limit of the Urban Council area, thence southwards along the said limit as far as the northern boundary of the main road to Gampola.

South From the last mentioned point westwards and north-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area to the southern extremity of the eastern limit of Division No. 1.

West From the last mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. 1, to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 4 (Mahawidiya).

North From a point on the southern limit of Division No. 2 in prolongation of the north-eastern boundary of lot 50 in Town Survey plan No. 46 north-eastwards along the said limit to the centre of the junction of the Colombo-Kandy road and the path through lot 122 in Town Survey plan No. 46.

East From the last mentioned point south-eastwards along the southern limit of Division No. 2 to the southern limit of the Urban Council area.

South From the last mentioned point south-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the eastern limit of Division No. 3, thence north-westwards and south-westwards along the eastern and northern limits of Division No. 3 to a point in prolongation of the south-eastern boundary of lot 50 in Town Survey plan No. 46.

West From the last mentioned point northwards along the northern limit of Division No. 3 to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 5 (Thammanagoda).

North From a point on the northern limit of the Urban Council area in prolongation of the centre line of the masonry drain between lots 130 and 139 and through lot 38 in Town Survey plan No. 46, north-eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban Council area to a point in prolongation of the centre line of the Badallange-ela.

East From the last mentioned point south-eastwards along the said prolongation and along the centre line of Badallange-ela to the centre of the ela forming the northern and western boundaries of lot 237 in Town Survey plan No. 46, thence south-westwards and southwards along the centre line of the said ela till it meets the southern limit of the Urban Council area.

South From the last mentioned point south-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area to the southern extremity of the eastern limit of Division No. 2.

West From the last mentioned point north-eastwards and north-westwards along the eastern limit of Division No. 2 to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 6 (Ulugötenna).

North From the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Division No. 5 north-eastwards along the northern limit of the Urban Council area to its eastern extremity.

East From the last mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban Council area to its southern extremity.

South From the last mentioned point north-westwards and south-westwards along the southern limit of the Urban Council area to the southern extremity of the eastern limit of Division No. 5.

West From the last mentioned point northwards, north-eastwards and north-westwards along the eastern limit of Division No. 5 to the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE.

Regulations for St. Anne's Festival.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 2 of the Pilgrimages Ordinance (Chapter 133), I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this notification make the regulations set out hereunder in anticipation of the customary pilgrimage to Talavillu for St. Anne's Festival in July, 1942.

Regulations.

1. In these regulations the expression "camp area" means the space within the boundaries specified in the schedule hereto.

and "Assistant Government Agent" means the Assistant Government Agent of the Puttalam and Chilaw Districts.

2. No person shall camp in any place within the camp area where camping is prohibited by special or general order of the Assistant Government Agent.

3. No person shall ease himself within the camp area, except at the places provided for that purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

4. No person shall deposit any liquid or solid refuse or any rubbish within the camp area, except in the places or receptacles provided for that purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent.

5. (a) No cattle shall be kept within the camp area, except those brought there for slaughter and those permitted by special or general order of the Assistant Government Agent to be kept within such area.

(b) No cattle shall be kept in the vicinity of the camp area except at a place specially appointed as a cattle gala or at a place approved for such use by the Assistant Government Agent.

(c) The person in charge of the cattle shall cause their droppings to be removed to the nearest place provided therefor, and shall at all times keep clean the places occupied by his cattle.

6. All prepared foods sold within the camp area shall be protected from flies and dust by being wrapped in or covered with clean paper or cloth, or (b) kept in closed glass cases, or (c) kept in other covered containers approved by the Medical Officer, or by the Sanitary Officer in charge of the camp area.

7. No person who is likely to affect prejudicially the cleanliness of the camp area, and no person who is suffering from an infectious disease shall be permitted to enter the camp area.

8. In the event of an epidemic breaking out in the camp area during the festival, the Assistant Government Agent may direct the pilgrims to leave the place of pilgrimage, and may prescribe the routes and methods for their conveyance.

9. (a) Every person within the camp area who is suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and (b) every person who resides with him knowing that he is so suffering shall report the case to the Medical or Sanitary Officer in charge of the camp area.

10. When any tank or well within the camp area is set apart for any particular purpose and a notice to that effect is exhibited on the spot, no person shall use the tank or well for any purpose other than that for which it is set apart.

11. No person shall keep any bakery, aerated water manufactory, tea or coffee boutique, eating-house or gala within the camp area without previously obtaining a licence from the Assistant Government Agent permitting him to do so. The licence shall be issued free of charge.

12. No person shall, without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, construct any booth, or extend any building within the camp area so as to encroach on the main or other streets of the camp.

13. No person shall, without the previous sanction of the Assistant Government Agent, discharge fireworks and firearms within the camp area, or within a radius of one mile from the boundaries of such area.

14. No person shall slaughter any animal within the camp area except in the place provided for the purpose by, or with the approval of the Assistant Government Agent, and every person slaughtering any animal in such a place shall be responsible for its cleanliness.

THE IRRIGATION ORDINANCE.

RULES under section 8 of the Irrigation Ordinance (Chapter 312), made at a meeting duly held on January 26, 1942, by the prescribed majority of the proprietors within the irrigable area of the irrigation works comprising the Walawe Ganga Left Bank Scheme in the Hambantota District of the Southern Province, and approved by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 14 of the Ordinance.

Rules.

1. In these rules—

“Assistant Government Agent” means the Assistant Government Agent of the Hambantota District.

“Cultivation Officer” means the officer appointed by the Assistant Government Agent, under section 16 of the Irrigation Ordinance, to supervise the work of the Irrigation Headman and to exercise control in accordance with those rules under the instructions of the Assistant Government Agent;

“joint labour” means labour contributed by all the proprietors concerned in each case, in proportion to the extent of their respective holdings;

“Vel-Vidane” means the Irrigation Headman elected under section 15, or appointed under section 17 (2), of the Irrigation Ordinance to be in charge of a division, or of a tract or a series of tracts of fields.

2. (1) Every Vel-Vidane shall reside within the division or tract or within one mile of the division or tract, in his charge, and shall not absent himself from duty without the permission of the Assistant Government Agent.

(2) On assuming office, every Vel-Vidane shall, by the hypothecation either of a cash deposit of Rs. 250 or of lands of that value, give security to the Assistant Government Agent for the proper disposal of Government monies advanced to him or in his charge and for the payment of any compensation that may be awarded by the Assistant Government Agent in respect of any damage caused to any proprietor through any malicious act of the Vel-Vidane.

(3) The term of office of a Vel-Vidane shall be three years, but he shall be eligible for re-election or re-appointment.

3. It shall be the duty of every Vel-Vidane—

(a) to supervise paddy cultivation within the division or tract in his charge, subject to instructions from, and to the control of, the Cultivation Officer; and

(b) to enforce these rules and, subject to the instructions of the Cultivation Officer, to prosecute any person committing a breach of any of these rules

4. (1) Every Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to receive, from the proprietors or cultivators of fields within the division or tract in his charge, a huwandiram of three kurumies of paddy for each extent on which an amunam of paddy is ordinarily sown, that extent being deemed for the purpose of these rules to be equivalent to $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres.

(2) The whole or any portion of the huwandiram may be withheld if, in the opinion of the Assistant Government Agent, the Vel-Vidane has not satisfactorily carried out his duties during the preceding period of cultivation; and the huwandiram or portion so withheld shall be disposed of as the Assistant Government Agent may in each case order.

(3) Any person acting for the Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to a share of the huwandiram proportionate to the time he acted; and in the event of dispute, that share shall be determined by the Assistant Government Agent.

(4) The huwandiram due in respect of each season shall, unless the Assistant Government Agent has made any order to the contrary, be handed over to the Vel-Vidane within one month after the reaping of the crop, and before any paddy is removed from the threshing-floor; and a receipt shall be given by him therefor.

5. (1) Cultivation for Yala shall begin on March 7, and the sowing shall be completed by May 1, in every year.

(2) Cultivation for Maha shall begin on September 20, and the sowing shall be completed by November 9, in every year.

(3) Where it is not possible in any season to begin the cultivation of any lands on the date specified therefor in the preceding provisions of this rule, another date may be fixed for that purpose, with the advice of the Divisional Irrigation Engineer or the Irrigation Engineer, at a meeting of the proprietors of those lands, convened by the Assistant Government Agent and held at a place and time determined by him.

6. (1) In respect of all tanks, dams, channels, watercourses, and the like works which are required by these rules and which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation—

(a) ordinary repairs shall be carried out by the joint labour of the proprietors benefited, and shall be completed ten days before the date fixed for the commencement of cultivation in each season;

(b) repairs which appear to the Assistant Government Agent or the Cultivation Officer to be necessary shall be carried out by the joint labour of such of the proprietors as are benefited by such repairs and are served with a written notice in that behalf, and shall be completed within the time specified in the notice; and

(c) extraordinary works, such as widening, strengthening, or improving, decided upon by the Assistant Government Agent after such inquiry as may be necessary into any suggestions or objections that may be offered or raised by the proprietors in response to a preliminary notice of his intention to have such works carried out, shall be carried out by the joint labour of such of the proprietors as are served with a written final notice in that behalf, and shall be completed within the time specified in that notice.

(2) All channels shall be kept clear and in a state of good repair throughout the period of irrigation by the joint labour of the proprietors benefited thereby.

(3) Where any of the above-mentioned repairs, improvements, or works are not satisfactorily completed within the time specified, such repairs, improvements, or works shall be carried out by the Cultivation Officer after notice to such of the proprietors concerned as are registered under section 9 or section 61 of the Irrigation Ordinance, and, in the case of works likely to cost over Rs 50, with the prior approval of the Assistant Government Agent obtained on submission of estimates of the cost.

(4) The Cultivation Officer may, for the purpose referred to in paragraph (3), receive an advance from the Fine Fund, and the expenses incurred shall be recovered from the proprietors concerned in proportion to the labour due from each of them.

7. (1) Paths between cultivated lands shall be kept clear by the joint labour of the proprietors of those lands, and shall be maintained at a width of at least two feet

(2) All ridges shall be satisfactorily maintained so as to prevent waste of water.

(3) Every ridge which forms a boundary between any two fields shall be maintained by the proprietors of both those fields, and no encroachment on such ridge shall be made

8. Every terrace in a field which by reason of its sloping position or uneven nature causes any wastage of irrigation water shall be levelled or rectified by the construction of additional ridges by the proprietors of the field so as to prevent the wastage.

9. Wherever it is necessary to avoid irrigation water being taken from terrace to terrace, field channels shall be extended by such of the proprietors as are directed so to do by the Cultivation Officer.

10. (1) Every proprietor shall deliver to the Cultivation Officer a list of the managers or lessees of his fields within seven days after the date fixed in rule 5 for the commencement of cultivation in each season: Provided that no list shall be required of any proprietor who informs the Cultivation Officer before that date that there has been no change among his managers or lessees after the last list furnished by him

(2) (a) The managers of fields shall prepare a full list of the goiyas to be employed in their fields, and no water shall be issued to the fields until such list is delivered to the Vel-Vidane.

(b) The list of goiyas shall be made out on the printed form supplied by the Assistant Government Agent and shall bear the signature of the manager and of all the goiyas.

(c) All the information required by the form referred to in sub-paragraph (b) shall be accurately filled in.

(d) All changes and additions in the list of goiyas shall be notified to the Vel-Vidane in writing.

(e) All lists of goiyas shall be handed over by the Vel-Vidane to the Cultivation Officer.

11. Every proprietor shall be liable to contribute the labour or carry out the works required by these rules for each season's cultivation, unless specially exempted by the Assistant Government Agent on written application made in that behalf

12. Only such varieties of paddy shall be sown either for Maha or Yala as will not require more than ninety days of water from the date prescribed in rule 5 for the completion of sowing.

13. (1) The person in charge of the cultivation of any field shall not cause or allow the sowing of that field in any season after the date prescribed in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in that season, except on a permit issued in that behalf by the Assistant Government Agent

(2) Permits under paragraph (1) may be issued by the Assistant Government Agent upon such terms as he may deem fit in each case.

(b) In ordinary circumstances no extension of the period specified in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in any season shall be allowed under this rule, if it involves an extension of the irrigation period

(c) Every permit issued under this rule shall specify the extended period allowed for the completion of sowing, the name of the field, and the kind of paddy to be sown.

(d) Every person to whom a permit is issued under this rule shall conform to the terms of such permit.

14. Subject to the control of the Cultivation Officer, the apportioning of water, after it has left the irrigation works and entered the tracts, shall be performed by the Vel-Vidane.

15. (1) No person shall wilfully or without the permission of the Vel-Vidane prevent water from flowing to the field below his own, or obstruct the flow of surplus water from any field on a higher level, or allow water to flow into a field through any hole or gap in the ridge.

(2) No person shall issue, apportion, cut off, divert, or use the water in any manner except in accordance with the instructions of the Vel-Vidane.

16. (1) (a) The cultivators shall construct the necessary fences and watch huts as directed by the Vel-Vidane and maintained them in good repair and shall keep regular watch in accordance with the orders of the Vel-Vidane.

(b) The fences shall be constructed in each season within one week from the date specified in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in that season.

(c) A permit issued under rule 13 shall not be deemed to extend the date for fencing, unless it is expressly stated in the permit that it does so.

(2) (a) All fences shall be suitably constructed of barbed wire, consisting of at least four strands, or of live or dried fence sticks.

(b) Huts shall be so constructed as to be six feet from the level of the ground.

(3) The Vel-Vidane shall apportion the fencing of fields among the proprietors thereof in proportion to the extent of their respective holdings. A statement of the allocation shall be published in the division.

17. (1) Where the crop on any portion of any tract sown by the date prescribed for the completion of sowing ripens before the rest of that tract, the cultivators of that portion may reap and store their crop, but shall continue to keep watch over the fields and maintain their fences until the crop on the remainder of that tract

is reaped and stored: Provided that no person shall be required to maintain a fence for the benefit of fields in which the reaping of the crop is delayed without sufficient cause: Provided, further, that, notwithstanding anything in the preceding provisions of this rule, the fences on every tract shall be maintained by the cultivators thereof for twenty-eight days after the last date of the issue of water to that tract.

(2) Where the crop on any portion of a tract does not ripen until after the reaping of the crop on the remainder of that tract, either on account of sowing after the prescribed date or because of the sowing of a different kind of paddy, the cultivators of the remainder of the tract shall not be bound to continue to keep watch over the fields until that portion of the tract ripens.

(3) All stacks of reaped paddy shall be fenced by the cultivators when the fences of the tract are broken.

18. Notwithstanding anything in rule 16—

(a) any tract may be fenced according to the customs prevalent at the date of publication of these rules in the Gazette, and
(b) any tract may not be fenced if the proprietors of that tract so decide.

19. The proprietors shall pay the share due to the cultivator at the threshing floor, immediately after the harvest, after deducting any advances that may have already been paid.

20. (1) All field channels and watercourses, which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation, shall be in the charge of the Vel-Vidane, acting under the directions of the Cultivation Officer.

(2) No person shall fill up or encroach upon any field channel or watercourse or any part of its reservations.

21. (1) Any channel, dam, or other work, whether outside or inside any field, shall, with the permission of the Cultivation Officer, be constructed by the joint labour of the proprietors interested.

(2) (a) Every proprietor shall grant way-leave for any channel, dam, or other work, even though his own land may not be benefited thereby.

(b) Every channel, dam, or other work shall be constructed and maintained so as to cause the least damage to the land through which way leave is granted.

(3) On receipt of a written application from any proprietors for permission to construct any channel, dam, or other work, the Cultivation Officer may give them the necessary permission: Provided, however, that no work which is likely to affect the general irrigation under the scheme or the lands of proprietors other than the applicants shall be permitted until the matter has been referred to and approved by the Assistant Government Agent, acting in consultation with the Divisional Irrigation Engineer.

(4) Before permission is given to construct a field channel through land which is not to be benefited thereby, the proprietor of such land shall be notified of the proposal by the Cultivation Officer.

22. Where the proprietor of any land is unable to obtain water for irrigation owing to the neglect of any other proprietor to cut his share of the field channels, such other proprietor shall be called upon by the Cultivation Officer to do the necessary work, and in the event of his failing or refusing to perform the work required within a reasonable time, the Cultivation Officer shall forward an estimate of the cost of the work to the Assistant Government Agent. The Assistant Government Agent may advance the amount required from the Fine Fund and direct the Cultivation Officer to carry out the work and recover the expenses incurred from the defaulting proprietor.

23. (1) Cattle may be kept within the lands of the proprietors until the date prescribed in rule 5 or fixed under rule 13 for the completion of sowing.

(2) Within twenty-four hours after the date referred to in paragraph (1), all cattle shall be removed outside the cultivated lands and the fenced tracts.

24. No paddy shall be sown in any irrigation or other channel.

25. Every proprietor shall, whenever required by the Assistant Government Agent or the Cultivation Officer, point out the correct boundaries of his land, and shall erect bunds or other suitable marks to define such boundaries.

26. Any Cultivation Officer or Irrigation Officer or Vel-Vidane may take such action as may be necessary to prevent any waste of water occurring in any field.

27. The rules relating to the Walawe Left Bank Scheme published in Gazette No. 8,102 of February 1, 1935, and No. 8,300 of July 2, 1937, are hereby rescinded.

THE IRRIGATION ORDINANCE.

RULES under section 3 of the Irrigation Ordinance (Chapter 312), made at a meeting duly held on January 26, 1942, by the prescribed majority of the proprietors within the irrigable area of the irrigation works comprising the Walawe Ganga Right Bank Scheme in the Hambantota District of the Southern Province, and approved by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 14 of the Ordinance.

Rules.

1. In these rules—

“Assistant Government Agent” means the Assistant Government Agent of the Hambantota District;

“Cultivation Officer” means the officer appointed by the Assistant Government Agent, under section 10 of the Irrigation Ordinance, to supervise the work of the Irrigation Headmen and to exercise control in accordance with these rules under the instructions of the Assistant Government Agent;

“joint labour” means labour contributed by all the proprietors concerned in each case, in proportion to the extent of their respective holdings;

“Vel-Vidane” means the Irrigation Headman elected under section 15, or appointed under section 17 (2), of the Irrigation Ordinance to be in charge of a division, or of a tract or a series of tracts of fields.

2. (1) Every Vel-Vidane shall reside within the division or tract or within one mile of the division or tract, in his charge, and shall not absent himself from duty without the permission of the Assistant Government Agent.

(2) On assuming office, every Vel-Vidane shall, by the hypothecation either of a cash deposit of Rs. 250 or of lands of that value, give security to the Assistant Government Agent for the proper disposal of Government monies advanced to him or in his charge and for the payment of any compensation that may be awarded by the Assistant Government Agent in respect of any damage caused to any proprietor through any malicious act of the Vel-Vidane.

(3) The term of office of a Vel-Vidane shall be three years, but he shall be eligible for re-election or re-appointment.

3. It shall be the duty of every Vel-Vidane—

(a) to supervise paddy cultivation within the division or tract in his charge subject to instructions from, and to the control of, the Cultivation Officer; and

(b) to enforce these rules and, subject to the instructions of the cultivation officer, to prosecute any person committing a breach of any of these rules.

4. (1) Every Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to receive, from the proprietors or cultivators of fields within the division or tract in his charge, a huwandiram of three kurumes of paddy for each extent on which an amunam of paddy is ordinarily sown, that extent being deemed for the purpose of these rules to be equivalent to 2½ acres.

(2) The whole or any portion of the huwandiram may be withheld if, in the opinion of the Assistant Government Agent, the Vel-Vidane has not satisfactorily carried out his duties during the preceding period of cultivation, and the huwandiram or portion so withheld shall be disposed of as the Assistant Government Agent may in each case order.

(3) Any person acting for the Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to a share of the huwandiram proportionate to the time he so acted; and in the event of dispute that share shall be determined by the Assistant Government Agent.

(4) The huwandiram due in respect of each season shall, unless the Assistant Government Agent has made any order to the contrary, be handed over to the Vel-Vidane within one month after the reaping of the crop, and before any paddy is removed from the threshing-floor; and a receipt shall be given by him therefor.

5. (1) Cultivation for Yala shall begin on March 7, and the sowing shall be completed by May 1, in every year.

(2) Cultivation for Maha shall begin on September 20, and the sowing shall be completed by November 9, in every year.

(3) Where it is not possible in any season to begin the cultivation of any lands on the date specified therefor in the preceding provisions of this rule, another date may be fixed for that purpose, with the advice of the Divisional Irrigation Engineer or the Irrigation Engineer, at a meeting of the proprietors of those lands, convened by the Assistant Government Agent, and held at a place and time determined by him.

6. (1) In respect of all tanks, dams, channels, watercourses, and the like works, which are required by these rules and which are not in charge of the Director of Irrigation—

(a) Ordinary repairs shall be carried out by the joint labour of the proprietors benefited, and shall be completed ten days before the date fixed for the commencement of cultivation in each season;

(b) repairs which appear to the Assistant Government Agent or the Cultivation Officer to be necessary shall be carried out by the joint labour of such of the proprietors as are benefited by such repairs and are served with a written notice in that behalf, and shall be completed within the time specified in the notice; and

(c) extraordinary works, such as widening, strengthening, or improving, decided upon by the Assistant Government Agent after such inquiry as may be necessary into any suggestions or objections that may be offered or raised by the proprietors in response to a preliminary notice of his intention to have such works carried out, shall be carried out by the joint labour of such of the proprietors as are served with a written final notice in that behalf, and shall be completed within the time specified in that notice.

(2) All channels shall be kept clear and in a state of good repair throughout the period of irrigation by the joint labour of the proprietors benefited thereby.

(3) Where any of the above-mentioned repairs, improvements, or works are not satisfactorily completed within the time specified, such repairs, improvements, or works shall be carried out by the Cultivation Officer after notice to such of the proprietors concerned as are registered under section 9 or section 61 of the Irrigation Ordinance, and, in the case of works likely to cost over Rs. 50, with the prior approval of the Assistant Government Agent obtained on submission of estimates of the cost.

(4) The Cultivation Officer may, for the purpose referred to in paragraph (3), receive an advance from the Fine Fund, and the expenses incurred shall be recovered from the proprietors concerned in proportion to the labour due from each of them.

7. (1) Paths between cultivated lands shall be kept clear by the joint labour of the proprietors of those lands, and shall be maintained at a width of at least two feet, (2) all ridges shall be satisfactorily maintained so as to prevent waste of water.

(3) Every ridge which forms a boundary between any two fields shall be maintained by the proprietors of both those fields, and no encroachment on such ridge shall be made.

8. Every terrace in a field which by reason of its sloping position or uneven nature causes any wastage of irrigation water shall be levelled or rectified by the construction of additional ridges by the proprietors of the field so as to prevent the wastage.

9. Wherever it is necessary to avoid irrigation water being taken from terrace to terrace, field channels shall be extended by such of the proprietors as are directed so to do by the Cultivation Officer.

10. (1) Every proprietor shall deliver to the Cultivation Officer a list of the managers or lessees of his fields within seven days after the date fixed in rule 5 for the commencement of cultivation in each season: Provided that no list shall be required of any proprietor who informs the Cultivation Officer before that date that there has been no change among his managers or lessees after the last list furnished by him.

(2) (a) The managers of fields shall prepare a full list of the goiyas to be employed in their fields, and no water shall be issued to the fields until such list is delivered to the Vel-Vidane.

(b) The list of goiyas shall be made out on the printed form supplied by the Assistant Government Agent and shall bear the signature of the manager and of all the goiyas.

(c) All the information required by the form referred to in subparagraph (b) shall be accurately filled in.

(d) All changes and additions in the list of goiyas shall be notified to the Vel-Vidane in writing.

(e) All lists of goiyas shall be handed over by the Vel-Vidane to the Cultivation Officer.

11. Every proprietor shall be liable to contribute the labour or carry out the works required by these rules for each season's cultivation, unless specially exempted by the Assistant Government Agent on written application made in that behalf.

12. Only such varieties of paddy shall be sown either for Maha or Yala as will not require more than ninety days of water from the date prescribed in rule 5 for the completion of sowing.

13. (1) The person in charge of the cultivation of any field shall not cause or allow the sowing of that field in any season after the date prescribed in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in that season, except on a permit issued in that behalf by the Assistant Government Agent.

(2) (a) Permits under paragraph (1) may be issued by the Assistant Government Agent upon such terms as he may deem fit in each case.

(b) In ordinary circumstances no extension of the period specified in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in any season shall be allowed under this rule, if it involves an extension of the irrigation period.

(c) Every permit issued under this rule shall specify the extended period allowed for the completion of sowing, the name of the field, and the kind of paddy to be sown.

(d) Every person to whom a permit is issued under this rule shall conform to the terms of such permit.

14. Subject to the control of the Cultivation Officer, the apportioning of water, after it has left the irrigation works and entered the tracts, shall be performed by the Vel-Vidane.

15. (1) No person shall wilfully or without the permission of the Vel-Vidane prevent water from flowing to the field below his own, or obstruct the flow of surplus water from any field on a higher level, or allow water to flow into a field through any hole or gap in the ridge.

(2) No person shall issue, apportion, cut off, divert, or use the water in any manner except in accordance with the instructions of the Vel-Vidane.

16. (1) (a) The cultivators shall construct the necessary fences and watch huts as directed by the Vel-Vidane and maintain them in good repair and shall keep regular watch in accordance with the orders of the Vel-Vidane.

(b) The fences shall be constructed in each season within one week from the date specified in rule 5 for the completion of sowing in that season.

(c) A permit issued under rule 13 shall not be deemed to extend the date for fencing, unless it is expressly stated in the permit that it does so.

(2) (a) All fences shall be suitably constructed of barbed wire, consisting of at least four strands, or of live or dried fence sticks.

(b) Huts shall be so constructed as to be six feet from the level of the ground.

(3) The Vel-Vidane shall apportion the fencing of fields among the proprietors thereof in proportion to the extent of their respective holdings. A statement of the allocation shall be published in the division.

17. (1) Where the crop on any portion of any tract sown by the date prescribed for the completion of sowing ripens before the rest of that tract, the cultivators of that portion may reap and store their crop, but shall continue to keep watch over the fields and maintain their fences until the crop on the remainder of that tract is reaped and stored: Provided that no person shall be required to maintain a fence for the benefit of fields in which the reaping of the crop is delayed without sufficient cause: Provided, further, that, notwithstanding anything in the preceding provisions of this rule, the fences on every tract shall be maintained by the cultivators thereof for twenty-eight days after the last date of the issue of water to that tract.

(2) Where the crop on any portion of a tract does not ripen until after the reaping of the crop on the remainder of that tract, either on account of sowing after the prescribed date or because of the sowing of a different kind of paddy, the cultivators of the remainder of the tract shall not be bound to continue to keep watch over the fields until that portion of the tract ripens.

(3) All stacks of reaped paddy shall be fenced by the cultivators when the fences of the tract are broken.

18. Notwithstanding anything in rule 16—

 - (a) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale;
 - (b) any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of consumption or use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
- (8) direct that every trader who sells any article mentioned in the First Schedule hereto shall give to the purchaser of that article on demand a receipt on which there shall be set out—
 - (a) the description and grade of article sold,
 - (b) the quantity of the article sold,
 - (c) the date of the sale,
 - (d) the price paid for the article sold, and
 - (e) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be.

1. No person shall bury or cremate a corpse without the written permission of the Chairman of the Manipay Village Committee or a permission duly authorised in that behalf by the Chairman, and no such permission shall be granted until the fee chargeable for the burial or cremation has been paid.
2. Subject to the provisions of regulation 1 a fee of one rupee for each burial or cremation shall be paid to the cemetery-keeper by the person making the arrangements for that burial or cremation.
3. No fee shall be charged by the cemetery keeper for the burial or cremation of a corpse which the Chairman of the Manipay Village Committee, or a person duly authorised in that behalf by the Chairman, or a Village headman has certified in writing to be that of a vagrant or destitute, or of a child under five years of age.
4. It shall be the duty of the cemetery-keeper to keep the cemetery in a clean and sanitary condition to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Manipay Village Committee.
5. No grave shall be less than four feet in depth or less than four feet distant from any other grave.
6. Except on the orders of an authority competent to order the disinterment of any corpse, no person shall reopen any grave within three years of the burial of any dead body therein or any vault within six months of any interment therein.

Abstract.—In this kiln, a set of pipes carry the products of combustion from the furnace through a hot air chamber. The hot air chamber itself is divided by vertical partitions so as to ensure an even distribution of heat. On top of the hot air chamber is placed a drier. This has two or three collapsible trays arranged in it one above the other. The broken nuts are placed on the top tray. After some time the tray is made to collapse so that the nuts fall in the next lower tray and so on. The trays are formed by wooden laths; to collapse them the laths are either pulled out or shifted sideways.

The two claims are for the vertical partition and the collapsible trays.

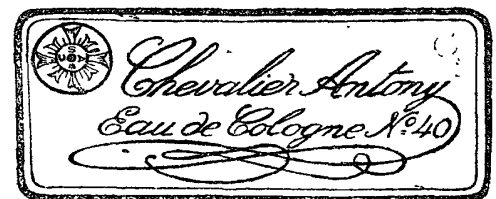

8. The attention of all prospective tenderers is drawn to the fact that from and after October 1, 1940, tapping for, drawing of and manufacturing sweet toddy without any licence, permit or authority has been allowed all over the Island, and also to condition No. 27 (4) (f) of the Arrack Rent Sale Conditions, 1942-43, and to Excise Notification No. 373 published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,932 of May 22, 1942.

9. The attention of tenderers is drawn to new condition 11A of the Arrack Rent Sale Conditions, which aims at ensuring the return of empty arrack bottles to the Bottling Warehouses and preventing their diversion to other uses. According to this condition the first issue of bottle arrack for the new rent period will be on the security of a deposit to be made by the renter for each tavern as shown in Schedule AA representing the value of empties proposed to be drawn. This deposit should be made at the same time as the payment for the first consignment of arrack. Two separate Kachcheri receipts should be produced at the warehouse for the deposit to cover the value of empties and the first payment for arrack. The second and subsequent issues of bottled arrack will be conditional on the gallonage of empty bottles brought by the renter to the warehouse. In broad terms, the gallonage that will be issued will be equivalent to the gallonage of empty bottles returned by the renter—for details see conditions 11 (A) (1) and (6). Renters will be expected to make every effort to collect the empties of the sealed bottles sold at their respective taverns.

10. Condition 20 will enable the Department to compel a renter to take his quota of sealed bottles of arrack, so that a renter may not exploit the situation by making bigger profits on unduly inflated sales of bulk arrack.

11. Attention is also drawn to Schedule A. The issue price at the warehouse of the Extra Special Quality of arrack has been increased from Rs. 15.40 per gallon to Rs. 20.20 per gallon, but there is no alteration in the gross profit to the renter, as the selling price at the tavern has correspondingly been increased from Rs. 19.20 to Rs. 24 per gallon. Condition 1 (b) of the arrack tavern licence form in *Excise Notification* 373. The gross profit of Rs. 3.80 on all these sales thus remains as at present.

12. The proviso to condition 1 (c) of the new licence form should be noted. Bulk arrack sold for off-consumption will not be allowed to be sold at the tavern price for bulk arrack fixed by a renter under condition 1 (c).

13. Condition 1 (e) of the new licence form will help the renter to establish the habit of customers bringing back their empty arrack bottles to the tavern (for return to the warehouse).

14. Attention is also drawn to amended condition 3 (b), new condition 3 (d), amended condition 7, and new condition 10 (a) (ii) of the new licence form.

15. Other minor amendments in the Arrack Rent Sale Conditions and in the said arrack tavern licence form will also have to be complied with.

16. The security required from the GRANTEE of the tavern can be furnished in the form of Promissory Notes of any of the Ceylon Government interest bearing loans (including the interest bearing war loans). 9. The successful tenderer will be required to furnish such security as may be determined by the Fiscal, North-Western Province, and to sign a bond with two sureties for a like amount for the due fulfilment of the contract on a stamp of Rs. 10 to be supplied by him.

10. The contract may not be assigned or sublet without the authority of the Fiscal, North-Western Province.

11. No contract shall be entered into with any person whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors, nor shall the contractor employ any person to whom the Fiscal, North-Western Province, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, objects after giving due notice of his objection in writing. The Contractor shall not issue power of attorney to any person whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors for carrying on the work under the contract.

12. No tender will be considered unless in respect of it all the conditions above laid down have been strictly fulfilled.

13. Particulars in regard to dieting are as follows:—

5.30 A.M. Morning meal—Tea with sugar. Hoppers or string hoppers three (to be not less than 6 oz. in weight). One oz. jaggery or sambol.

11 A.M. Breakfast—(a) One measure boiled unpolished country rice, (b) curry containing 1½ ounces of beef or fish, (c) curry containing 2 ounces of vegetable or dhal and (d) 2 ounces of mellun prepared out of leafy vegetables such as mukunna, tampala, niviti and kankun.

6 P.M. Dinner—One measure boiled unpolished country rice heaped. Curries as at breakfast.
For the duration of the rationing scheme the quantity to be supplied, of rice or its substitute, will be that allowed by the Food Controller. Where the ration falls short of one measure of rice per meal a corresponding deduction will be made in the payment made equivalent to the difference in the cost of the rice.

14. The contractor shall supply cooked meals and deliver the meals at the Magistrate's Court Dock, Chilaw. He may also be required to deliver a number of meals at the Chilaw Police Station.

15. Tenders should quote rate per head per meal. Such quotations should be written both in words and figures.

16. Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender, or the whole of it.

17. The successful tenderer will be required to employ only Ceylonese labourers in carrying out the work tendered for.

The employment of only Ceylonese labourers in carrying out the work tendered for will be made a condition of the contract and the failure on the part of the successful tenderer to fulfil this condition will be treated as a breach of the terms of the contract and will render the contract liable to cancellation: Provided, however, that in exceptional circumstances the head of the department with whom the contract is entered into may permit the contractor to employ any non-Ceylonese labourers previously approved by him in writing with the concurrence of the Treasury. The employment of non-Ceylonese labourers without such approval in writing and concurrence is forbidden. The term "Ceylonese" shall mean and include all persons born in Ceylon and no others.

Where any motor car, the head-lights of which are not fitted with masks of the specification set out in Schedule B to the Lighting Restriction (Motor Cars) Order, 1942, is used in any area in Ceylon in which that Order is not in force, there shall be carried in that car masks of that specification capable of being readily fitted to the head-lights of that car.

3. Paragraph 2 of this Order shall be complied with by the owner and the driver of every motor car to which that paragraph applies, whether such car is stationary or in motion on any highway or in any park, recreation ground, garden or open space of any kind.
