A PROCLAMATION.

A. CALDECOTT.

KNOW Ye that I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Proclamation give notice that, by virtue of the powers vested in me by section 40 of the Colombo Municipal Council Waterworks Ordinance (Chapter 161), I have this day confirmed the regulations made by the Colombo Municipal Council under section 38 (ee) of that Ordinance and set out hereunder.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Regulations.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Licensing of Plumbers Regulations, 1942.
2. No person shall act as a plumber for the purposes of section 11 of the Ordinance except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Council.
3. Every person who desires to obtain a licence shall apply in writing therefor to the Waterworks Engineer.
4. No person shall be granted a licence unless he satisfies the Waterworks Engineer—
 - (a) that he, or any person employed by him, has the skill to execute the works referred to in section 11 of the Ordinance, and
 - (b) that he has a suitable place of business and the necessary plant, tools, and materials.
5. The fee payable for each licence shall be ten rupees.
6. Every licensee shall deposit with the Council a sum of fifty rupees as security.
7. Every licence shall—
 - (a) contain the name and the private and business addresses of the licensee; and

(b) expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year in which it is issued.

8. Every licence shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (i) Where the licensee employs any other person having the skill to execute the works referred to in section 11 of the Ordinance, the licensee shall in writing forthwith notify to the Waterworks Engineer the name of that person, and, where that person's services are terminated by the licensee, the date of such termination.
- (ii) Without the written approval of the Waterworks Engineer, the licensee shall not employ, for the purpose of executing any work undertaken under the authority of the licence, any person whose licence has been cancelled by the Waterworks Engineer or to whom the Council has refused to grant a licence.
- (iii) The licensee shall assist the Waterworks Engineer, or any person authorised by him, in inspecting or testing any work executed by the licensee and the pipes, fittings, and other materials used in connection with such work.

9. Where a licensee contravenes any condition specified in regulation 8, he shall forfeit such portion of the security furnished by him under regulation 6 as the Waterworks Engineer may determine.

10. The Waterworks Engineer may cancel a licence in his absolute discretion.

11. In these regulations—

- "Council" means the Colombo Municipal Council;
- "Licence" means a licence granted by the Council to any person authorising him to act as a plumber for the purposes of section 11 of the Ordinance;
- "Licensee" means a person to whom the Council has granted a licence;
- "Ordinance" means the Colombo Municipal Council Waterworks Ordinance;
- "Waterworks Engineer" means the Waterworks Engineer of the Council.

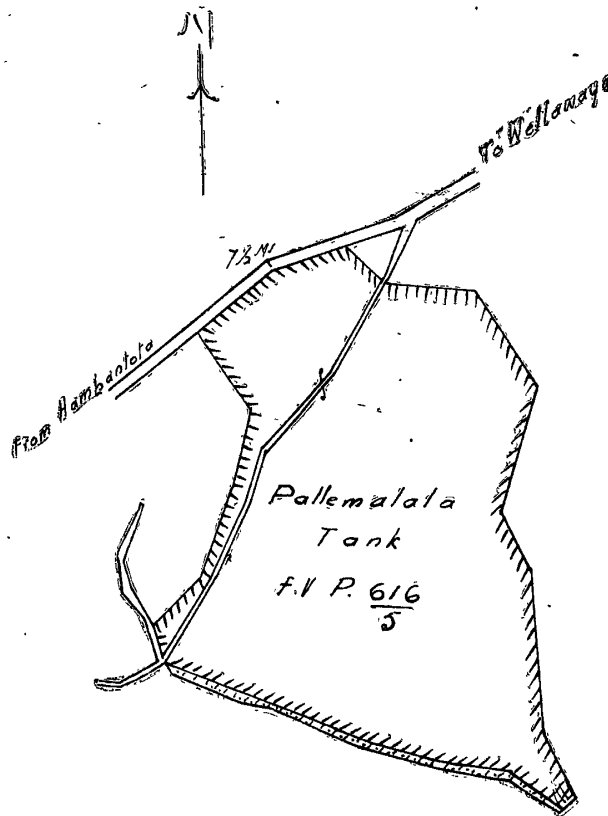

WHEREAS Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah is an enemy within the meaning of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939, by reason of his residence at Mantakap in Pahang in the Federated Malay States, now enemy territory within the meaning of the said Regulations :

And whereas prior to the date on which the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah became an enemy within the meaning of the said Regulations, the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah duly appointed Vytilingam Samuel Ratnam his attorney in Ceylon (hereinafter referred to as the "Attorney") :

And whereas every person in Ceylon who has any commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with, or for the benefit of, the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah is liable to be deemed to have traded with the enemy within the meaning of the said Regulations, and will thereby be guilty of an offence against the said Regulations unless he has acted under authority given generally or specially by the Governor :

And whereas it is expedient in terms of paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the said regulations to give authority to the Attorney and to persons resident in Ceylon in the manner hereinafter provided :

Now, therefore, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do, by virtue of the powers vested in me by paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939, hereby authorise the Attorney to have commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with persons in Ceylon for the benefit of the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah and do, further, authorise persons in Ceylon generally to have commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah through his Attorney in Ceylon.

REGULATIONS, 1939.

WHEREAS Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah is an enemy within the meaning of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939, by reason of his residence at Mantakap in Pahang in the Federated Malay States, now enemy territory within the meaning of the said Regulations :

And whereas prior to the date on which the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah became an enemy within the meaning of the said Regulations, the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah acting through A. C. Abeywardene his Proctor duly appointed for the purpose (hereinafter referred to as the "Proctor"), instituted a case No. 2059 L in the District Court of Colombo :

And whereas every person in Ceylon, who performs any obligation to, or discharges any obligation of the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah, or who has any commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with, or for the benefit of the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah is liable to be deemed to have traded with the enemy within the meaning of the said Regulations, and will thereby be guilty of an offence against the said Regulations unless he has acted under authority given generally or specially by the Governor :

And whereas it is expedient in terms of paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the said Regulations to give authority to the said Proctor and to persons resident in Ceylon in the manner hereinafter provided :

Now, therefore, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do, by virtue of the powers vested in me by paragraph (2) of regulation 1 of the Defence (Trading with the Enemy) Regulations, 1939, hereby authorise the said Proctor to continue to appear for the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah in the aforementioned case and also to have such commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with persons in Ceylon generally as may be necessary for the purposes of the aforementioned case and do, further, authorise persons in Ceylon generally to have such commercial, financial or other intercourse or dealings with the said Bastiampillai Spalding Nalliah through the said Proctor as may be necessary for the purposes of the aforementioned case.

GREETING.

WHEREAS I have deemed it necessary to issue a Commission to inquire into and report upon the matters hereinafter mentioned upon which information is, in my opinion, necessary:

Know Ye that I, ANDREW CALDECOTT, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Governor in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Territories and Dependencies thereof, reposing great trust and confidence in your prudence, ability and fidelity, do by these presents nominate, constitute and appoint you, the said NAMASIVAYAM NADARAJAH to be my Commissioner for the purpose of inquiring into and reporting upon—

- (a) the treatment of Uyangoda Radage Hinni Appu of Hittetiya by the Police while under arrest and during his detention at the Matara Police Station on the 18th day of March, 1942;
- (b) the facts and circumstances relating to the death of the said Uyangoda Radage Hinni Appu at the said Police Station on the said date;
- (c) the conduct of the Police with regard to the investigation and legal proceedings consequent upon the death of the said Uyangoda Radage Hinni Appu.

And I hereby authorise and empower you to hold all such inquiries and make all such investigations into the aforesaid matters as may appear to you to be necessary; and I do hereby require you to transmit to me a report thereon under your hand as early as possible.

And I do hereby require and direct all public officers and other persons, to whom you may apply for assistance or information for the purposes of this inquiry, to render all such assistance or furnish all such information as may properly be rendered or furnished in that behalf.

Regulation.

The Defence (Control of Prices) (Supplementary Provisions) Regulations, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,019 of October 8, 1942, are hereby amended in the Schedule thereto, as follows:—

- (1) in regulation 10 set out in that Schedule, by the substitution, for "regulation 8", of "regulation 9"; and
- (2) in regulation 15 (1) set out in that Schedule—
 - (a) by the substitution in sub-paragraph (a), for the words "to enter", of the words "to enter and inspect, or authorise in writing any officer or person specified in such writing to enter and inspect,";
 - (b) by the substitution in sub-paragraph (b), for the words "to seize", of the words "to seize, or authorise such officer or person as aforesaid to seize,".

Regulation.

The Defence (Machine Tools) Regulations, 1942, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 8,978 of July 29, 1942, are hereby amended as follows:—

- (1) by the insertion, immediately after Regulation 4, of the following new regulation:—
 - 4A. (1) No person shall purchase or acquire any scheduled machine tool from any other person, unless the purchase or acquisition of that machine tool has been authorised by a permit in that behalf granted by the Director.
 - (2) No person shall sell or transfer any scheduled machine tool to any other person except upon surrender by such other person of a permit granted by the Director authorising him to purchase or acquire that machine tool.
 - (3) Every applicant for a permit under this regulation shall—
 - (a) set out in his application the name of the person from whom he proposes to purchase or acquire the machine tool in respect of which the application is made, and particulars relating to the specification of that machine tool and to the purposes for which he proposes to use that machine tool;
 - (b) furnish to the Director such particulars or information as the Director may require relating to the undertaking for the purposes of which he proposes to use that machine tool.
 - (4) The Director may in his discretion refuse to grant a permit under this regulation to any applicant therefor, and any such decision of the Director shall be final.
 - (5) Any person who sells or transfers any scheduled machine tool to any other person upon the surrender by such other person of a permit authorising the purchase or acquisition by him of that machine tool, shall transmit the permit to the Director before the expiry of a period of seven days after the date of such sale or transfer."
- (2) in Regulation 7, by the substitution for the words "return furnished" of the words "application made or return furnished".

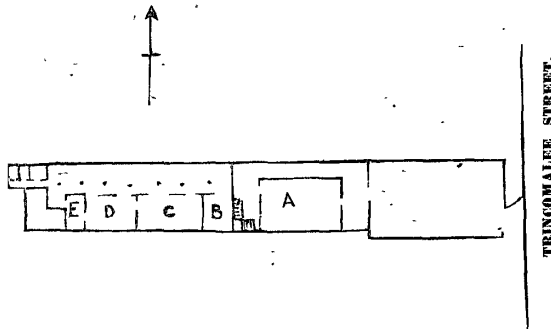

1. The quorum for a meeting of the Board shall be three members.
2. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Board, and, in his absence from any meeting of the Board, such member shall preside as may be elected by the other members present to be the presiding member for that meeting.
3. (1) Every question for determination at a meeting of the Board shall be decided by the majority of members present and voting at that meeting.
(2) Where the votes of the members present at any meeting of the Board are equally divided in regard to any question, the Chairman or other member presiding at that meeting shall, in addition to his vote as a member, have a casting vote.
4. (1) The Chairman at any time may, and the Secretary on the receipt of a requisition signed by three members shall, summon a meeting of the Board.
(2) Unless the Chairman otherwise directs in any particular case, the Secretary shall give to every member at least seven days' written notice of each meeting of the Board.
5. (1) Every contribution, whether compulsory or voluntary, shall be recovered as an abatement from the salary of the contributor.
(2) Where, for any reason, a contribution due from any contributor in respect of any month is not recovered as an abatement from his salary, the contributor shall, within fifteen days of the receipt of his salary for that month, pay

such contribution to the Deputy Financial Secretary; and in case of default of payment, such contribution shall be recovered as an abatement from his salary for any month subsequent to that for which such contribution is due.

6. The conditions subject to which and the manner in which a contributor may, in lieu of the whole or any portion of the compulsory contribution under section 4 of the Ordinance, pay, under section 7 (1) thereof, an equivalent sum towards a policy of assurance on his own life shall be as follows:—

- (1) The contributor shall in writing notify to the Board his intention to make payments under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance and shall furnish the Board with such information as the Board may require.
- (2) The contributor shall not make payments under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance without the written permission of the Board.
- (3) The contributor shall not be granted permission to make payments under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance unless he has complied with the provisions of paragraph (1) of this regulation:
Provided that, notwithstanding the failure to comply with such provisions, the contributor may be granted such permission if the Board is satisfied that such failure is not due to his negligence or wilful default.
- (4) Where permission to make payments towards a policy of life assurance under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance is granted to the contributor, he shall, within three months of the grant of such permission, deposit such policy with the Board or with such person as may be approved by the Board.
- (5) Where the contributor makes payments towards a policy of life assurance under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance, he shall, within the period of grace allowed by such policy, pay each premium thereon, and shall produce, for inspection by the head of the department in which he is employed, the receipt issued by the insurer for the payment of that premium.
- (6) Without the prior approval in writing of the Board, the contributor shall not effect any variation of the terms or conditions of a policy of life assurance towards which payments are made by him under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance.
- (7) Where the contributor contravenes the provisions of paragraph (4), paragraph (5), or paragraph (6) of this regulation, the Board may, by letter sent to him, withdraw the permission granted to him to make payments under section 7 (1) of the Ordinance. On the withdrawal of such permission, he shall pay to the Fund, in a lump sum or in instalments approved by the Board, the amount of the compulsory contributions in lieu of which payments under that section had been made by him. That amount or any part thereof, if not paid by him, shall be recovered as an abatement from his salary.

7. A female contributor retiring with a view to, or in consequence of, marriage after not less than three years' service shall, within six months of her retirement, produce as evidence of her marriage, for the purposes of section 13 (6) of the Ordinance, a certified copy of the registration of such marriage according to law.

8. (1) The nomination by any contributor of the person or persons to whom payments under section 15 of the Ordinance are to be made on the death of that contributor shall be in the form set out in the Schedule hereto. Such form shall be signed by that contributor in the presence of two witnesses and by those witnesses in the presence of each other and of that contributor, and shall be sent to the Board for registration.

(2) No nomination made by any contributor for the purposes of section 15 of the Ordinance shall be valid unless the nomination is made in the form set out in the Schedule hereto and unless that form is received by the Board at least one month before the death of the contributor.

9. In these regulations—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Board referred to in section 3 (3) of the Ordinance;

"contribution" means a contribution to the Fund;

"member" means a member of the Board;

"Ordinance" means the Public Service Provident Fund Ordinance, No. 18 of 1942;

"Secretary" means the person appointed by the Board to be or to act as the Secretary of the Board.

Tenders for the Supply of Sleepers to the Railway Department from Crown Forests.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the supply of sleepers to the Railway Department from the Crown forests detailed in the annexed schedule. It should be clearly understood that tenders required are for contracts to supply specified numbers of sleepers from each area in the schedule and not for exclusive right of exploitation of the areas and supply of sleepers as part of disposal of exploited material. The contracts will be for one year where specified supply is over 2,000 sleepers and six months where it is less than that number. The present scheme is as follows:—

- (a) The annexed schedule shows the areas from which the supply is to take place, with the minimum quantity that can be supplied from each.
 - (b) Tenderers should quote the rates at which they can supply sleepers at the nearest point on the Railway approved by the Railway Department. The rate will not include any proportion for royalty as the supplier will not be required to pay royalty to the Forest Department.
 - (c) Sufficient trees will be made available for conversion of the number of sleepers shown against each area. It will be possible to supply more than that number in all areas. For such excess supplies bonus payments will be made on the following basis: (a) for the first 1,000 B. G. sleepers and 250 N. G. sleepers over the specified numbers an extra payment of 10 per cent.; (b) for the second 1,000 B. G. sleepers and 250 N. G. sleepers an extra payment of 20 per cent.; (c) for the quantities above the second 1,000 B. G. and 250 N. G. sleepers an extra payment of 30 per cent. All percentages above will be on the respective accepted tendered rates.
 - (d) Sleepers converted should conform to the specifications shown in Special Condition (3) below. Those that do not will be rejected. In the case of B. G. sleepers, however, the Railway Department will accept as 2nd grade, sleepers that just fail to come up to standard and the number so accepted will not exceed 20 per cent. of the number of sleepers taken over as fully conforming to the specifications. Payment for 2nd grade sleepers will be at half the current rate for B. G. sleepers. The stipulated number of N. G. sleepers for each area must be supplied unless instructions to the contrary are issued by the Conservator of Forests. Rejected B. G. sleepers other than those accepted as 2nd grade should be converted into N. G. sleepers and offered to the Railway if in the opinion of the Railway inspecting officer such rejections are suitable for conversion into N. G. sleepers. Rejections not so converted will be available for purchase at 75 cents per B. G. and 40 cents per N. G.
2. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover and should be addressed to the Chairman, Tender Board, General Treasury, P. O. Box 500, Colombo.
 3. Tenders should be marked "Tender for Supply of Sleepers" in the left hand top corner of the envelope and should reach the General Treasury not later than midday on Tuesday, November 17, 1942. Each area shown separately in the annexed schedule should be tendered for separately.
 4. Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the General Treasury, Room No. 223, Second floor, Galle Face Secretariat, Colombo, or be sent through the post preferably under registered cover.
 5. Tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at any of the Divisional Forest Offices in Jaffna, Batticaloa, Nuwara Eliya and Kurunegala, or the Head Office, and no tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form.
 6. All alterations and erasures in tenders must be initialed by the tenderers.
 7. A deposit of Rs. 50 must be made either in the Office of the Conservator of Forests or in a Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for same before any form of tender is issued. If a person to whom a tender form has been issued fails for no satisfactory reason to submit his tender within the time fixed in Condition 3 above, his tender form deposit of Rs. 50 will be liable to be forfeited at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests.
 8. A tenderer shall before making his tender, examine in the office at which he obtains the tender form a copy of the contract he will be required to execute in the event of his tender being accepted and shall sign and deliver a statement at the time of applying for a tender form to the effect that he has fully acquainted himself with the terms of such contract and that in the event of his tender being accepted he will, within the time fixed by the Conservator of Forests, *vide* Condition 11 below, execute a contract in terms of the specimen contract. As evidence of his having examined the specimen contract the tenderer shall sign his name on it in the space provided for the purpose.
 9. A tenderer who has not previously held a Forest Department contract, when applying for tender forms, should furnish the officer issuing the forms with a written statement giving his full name and permanent address, stating in which district or districts he owns landed property or other interests. The extent of landed property and the nature and extent of other interests should also be given. A tenderer who has carried out contracts with the Department but not in the Division or Districts concerned in the notice calling for tenders, should state in which Division or District or Divisions or Districts he has held contracts. A tenderer who has carried out Government contracts with any other department should state the name of such department and the District in which the service was rendered, as well as the other information required. No tender form will be issued to any person or on behalf of any other person whose name appears in the list of defaulting contractors.
 10. No tender will be considered unless the conditions laid down above have been complied with. The Government reserves to itself the right without question to reject any or all offers and to accept any portion of an offer. No offers will be entertained from persons whose names appear on the list of defaulting contractors.
 11. The successful tenderer for each area shall within such time as may be fixed by the Conservator of Forests of being informed in writing that his tender has been accepted enter into the necessary contract supplying at his own cost stamps to be affixed to the contract in respect of stamp duty and depositing the security shown against the area in the annexed schedule. Should he fail to comply with these requirements his tender form deposit may be forfeited to the Crown; he may render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract in future, and to make good any resultant loss; further the service may be offered to another tenderer in which case no claim for any profit that may accrue to Government by such offer will be entertained. Notice of acceptance of the tender will be deemed to have been received by the tenderer if it has been sent by post addressed to, or left at the address given by the tenderer. All tender form deposits will be returned upon signature of the contracts.
 12. The contract shall be entered into by the successful tenderer (hereinafter called the contractor) with the Divisional Forest Officer within whose jurisdiction the area of operation lies, acting for and on behalf of His Majesty the King, and the designation of such officer shall mean and include the officer for the time being holding such office and his successors in office for the time being under the Government of Ceylon.
 13. The contract may not be assigned or sublet without the authority of the tender board. The Tender Board reserves to itself the right to refuse to recognize a power of attorney issued by the contractor to any person authorizing him to carry on the contract on the contractor's behalf.
 14. The contractor shall not employ any person whose name is on the list of defaulting contractors. The Divisional Forest Officer may, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, give notice in writing of his objection to the employment by the contractor of any person specified in such notice, and no such person shall be employed by the contractor.
 15. Unless otherwise authorized the successful tenderer will be required to employ only Ceylonese labourers in carrying out the work tendered for. The employment of only Ceylonese labourers in carrying out the work tendered for will be made a condition of the contract and the failure on the part of the successful tenderer to fulfil this condition will be treated as a breach of the terms of the contract and will render the contract liable to cancellation. Provided, however that in exceptional circumstances the Head of the Department with whom the contract is entered into may permit the contractor to employ any non-Ceylonese labourers previously approved by him in writing with the concurrence of the Treasury. The employment of non-Ceylonese labourers without such approval in writing and concurrence is forbidden. The term "Ceylonese" shall mean and include all persons born in Ceylon and no others.
 16. Special rules for felling, conversion, and removal of material which are to be observed by the contractor are more fully outlined in the Special Conditions given below. Nothing in these Special Conditions will exempt the contractor from liability under the Forest Ordinance, Cap. 311, should he be responsible for the commission of a Forest Offence.
 17. The contractor shall indemnify the Crown against any claim by or in respect of any employee of the contractor under the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance, Cap. 117.
 18. The payments to which the contractor may render himself liable under the contract may be deducted by the Divisional Forest Officer concerned from all moneys then due or that may become due to the contractor under this or any other contract he may hold under Government and/or from the security deposited by the contractor and hypothecated to the Crown under clause 11 hereof or under any other contract, or be recovered from him by action at law.
 19. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of ejecting the contractor's employees and of rescinding the contract if the above conditions are not adhered to.
 20. In case of any disagreement arising between parties to the contract except where the right of final decision is reserved to the Conservator of Forests, it shall be referred to the Tender Board whose decision in every such case shall be final and binding on the parties to the contract.
 21. The contract shall be current from the date it is signed for such period as may be allowed under Condition 1. Extension of time will not be granted save under exceptional circumstances, and may not be claimed as a right. Payment for supplies during an extended period will be at the rates obtaining at the time of expiry of the original period and the benefit of bonus payments under Condition 1 (c) will not accrue during the extended period beyond any that may have obtained at the expiry of the original period.
 22. For any further information, application should be made to the officer issuing tender forms.

Special Conditions.

- (1) Sleepers shall be converted only from trees of satinwood, palu, milla, ranai, and na. In areas which are Other Crown Forests all trees of these species which exceed 4 ft. 6 in. in girth shall be felled and converted into sleepers. In areas which are Reserves or Proposed Reserves only such trees of these species as are marked by a Forest Officer shall be felled and converted.

(2) Conversion of sleepers may take place at the site where trees are felled or at a wayside depot chosen by the contractor with the approval of the Divisional Forest Officer. Converted sleepers or logs for conversion at wayside depot shall not be removed from the felling site until they are stamped by a Forest Officer with a distinctive hammer mark approved for the area and with the Crown mark.

(3) Sleepers shall conform to the Railway Department's specification which is reproduced below :—

- (a) The broad gauge sleepers are for the 5 ft. 6 in. gauge lines and are to be 9 ft. long, 10 in. wide and 5 in. deep, subject to a variation in length of 1 in. The narrow gauge sleepers are for the 2 ft. 6 in. gauge lines and are to be 5 ft. long, 9 in. wide and 4½ in. deep, subject to a similar variation in length.
- (b) All sleepers shall be cut from well matured trees of the true species of timber. Sleepers must be sawn, and shall be of good sound timber free from heartshake, sapwood (except as provided in (c)) dry rot and knot holes and shall be cut square out of winding and straight.
- (c) Allowance may be made for small surface sunshakes, end shakes up to 6 in. ; a few pinholes, but not in groups, sound and firm knots up to 2 in. in diameter ; sap or wane must not exceed 2 in. on either face and not come under the rail seat.
- (d) The sleepers shall not be cut on full quarter and shall be cut with an allowance of ¼ in. in width and ½ in. in thickness to allow for shrinkage and no further allowance on account of size, except as provided above for length, shall be made.

(4) Sleepers shall be delivered at an agreed point on the Railway line side or station yard in batches of not less than 400 or 250 respectively, and as sufficient quantities become available for handing over, the Forest Department will advise the Railway Department to this effect. Each batch of sleepers shall contain a minimum of 25 per cent. N.G. sleepers (except in the case of areas 43, 59 and 60) until the stipulated number of N.G. sleepers has been supplied. A Forest Department representative will pass sleepers for species at the same time that the Railway Department inspecting officer passes them for specification and payment. The removal of sleepers from the forest to the delivery point shall be covered by removal permits or cart notes issued by the Range Forest Officer in charge of the forest.

(5) The first batch of sleepers must be ready for delivery to the Railway Department not later than March 31, 1943. In case of delay a penalty of Rs. 50 may be imposed for every month or part of a month, after March 31, 1943, and until the first batch is ready for delivery, at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests. Subsequent batches should be delivered at intervals of not longer duration than one month and in case of failure the Conservator of Forests may at his discretion impose a penalty not exceeding Rs. 100 for each month's delay.

(6) The concession of advance payment on batches or parcels of sleepers awaiting inspection will be granted to contractors who make regular supplies, keep a steady average and maintain a high standard of production. Should any advance payment represent on final acceptance of sleepers an overpayment, such overpayment will be recovered from sums that subsequently become due to the contractor. The concession will be withdrawn from contractors who fall behind in supplies. The grant and withdrawal of the concession will be entirely at the discretion of the Conservator of Forests and his decision shall be final.

(7) The contractor shall, if called upon to do so, supply logs or sawn timber of any species to the Forest Department at rates to be agreed upon between him and the Divisional Forest Officer and approved by the Conservator of Forests.

(8) The contractor may, if his work on the contract is satisfactory, be allowed to remove logs, sawn timber, firewood, &c., for his own use or for sale purposes on payment of royalty to be specified by the Conservator of Forests with the approval of the Executive Committee for Agriculture and Lands.

(9) The contractor shall at his own cost and charges furnish labour, transport, implements, tools, and any material whatsoever required for carrying on the work under the contract. He shall also supply labour, tools, &c., for enumerating trees, demarcating boundaries and for any other work connected with the contract deemed necessary by the Divisional Forest Officer.

(10) If the contractor shall fail to make fair and reasonable progress towards completing the work within the time hereinbefore specified, it shall be lawful for the Divisional Forest Officer (if it shall appear to him expedient to do so), to take the work into his own hands, after giving one week's notice in writing to the contractor that the said work will be completed by the Divisional Forest Officer, and thereupon to employ sufficient workmen, overseers and materials to finish and complete the same and the contractor shall be liable to pay and make good such sum or sums of money, if any, as may be spent by the Divisional Forest Officer in the completion as aforesaid of the said work over and above what may have been payable to the contractor if he had completed the work within the time specified.

(11) The contractor shall not in any manner do, cause, or procure to be done any act, matter, or thing whatsoever to delay or impede the completion of the said work by the Divisional Forest Officer under preceding condition (10) or to obstruct the person or persons so employed by the Divisional Forest Officer or to prevent them from using the plant, implement, tools, wire-shoots, and other materials which shall have been or shall be provided for the execution of the said work ; and shall not in any way molest, or cause to be molested, the Divisional Forest Officer or any person or persons employed by him.

(12) The contractor or his agent or agents, whose names shall be given to the Divisional Forest Officer and the Range Forest Officer in charge of the work, in writing at the commencement of work under the contract and who shall hold a written authority from the contractor shall at all times and without fail be at the working centres to supervise and control workmen and to take orders from inspection Forest Officers. Should this condition not be complied with the inspecting officer shall have the power to eject such workmen. Further the Divisional Forest Officer shall have the power to reject without question any of the contractor's agents or employees. The contractor will be at liberty to change his agents provided the changes are duly communicated to the Divisional Forest Officer and the Range Forest Officer in writing and provided that each new agent holds a written authority from the contractor to act on his behalf.

(13) Fines not exceeding Rs. 100 for any breach of the conditions or for any delinquencies on the part of the contractor in carrying out this contract may be imposed with the approval of the Conservator of Forests whose decision shall be final.

(14) All notices to be served upon the contractor shall be deemed to have been served if given to him or to his agent personally or left at his address given in the tender.

Special Apprentices, Hydro-Electric Scheme.

APPLICATIONS are invited from Ceylonese youths possessing the necessary qualifications as set out below for training as Special Civil Engineering Apprentices on the Hydro-Electric Scheme under construction at Watawala.

2. Applications on forms to be obtained from the Secretary to the Committee for Recruitment and Training of Special Apprentices on the Hydro-Electric Scheme, Public Works Office, Colombo, should be addressed to that officer so as to reach him before 12 noon on November 6, 1942.

3. Eligibility for selection under this scheme will be limited to those having any of the following qualifications, provided they are able to produce a certificate from the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services as to their physical fitness when they are called upon to do so.

- (a) Candidates who have completed three years training as apprentices under indenture with the P. W. D., are student members of the Institution of Civil Engineers, are under 26 years of age on the closing date for applications, and are nominated by the D. P. W.
- (b) Candidates who have completed the Inter-Science (Eng.) Examination of a British University or are final year students in the Engineering Classes of the Ceylon Technical College, are under 24 years of age on the closing date for applications and are nominated by the Principal, Ceylon Technical College.
- (c) Candidates who have obtained the degree B.Sc. (Eng.) or its equivalent and are under 26 years of age on the closing date for applications.

4. The course of training to be followed by these apprentices will comprise work on the Civil Engineering construction of the Hydro-Electric Scheme at Norton Bridge, for a period of one year, and will be drawn up by the Committee for each individual, specifying the periods to be spent by him on each part of the scheme.

5. The period of training may be extended for a period not exceeding one year in the case of such apprentices as the Committee, at its discretion, may consider desirable; and in such cases the course of training for each individual will be further stipulated by the Committee.

6. (a) Apprentices will be required to enter into an indenture on a form specified by the Committee. This indenture will be between the appropriate Head of Department and the apprentice, in conjunction with his parent or guardian, for a period of one year with provision for extension in accordance with paragraph 5 above; and the apprentice will be under the control of the Resident Engineer of the particular work to which he is appointed. (b) The appropriate Head of Department shall have the right to terminate the indenture with one month's notice to the apprentice, if for any cause whatsoever construction work on the Hydro-Electric Scheme be suspended temporarily or permanently.

7. Apprentices will not be required to pay any premium in consideration of their indentures; nor will they be paid any salary during the term of such indentures.

8. An allowance will be made by Government as a contribution towards the cost of subsistence of these apprentices at a rate of Rs. 50 per mensem.

No medical allowance will be payable by Government.

The conditions of leave and disciplinary regulations now in existence will be observed. The apprentices will be allowed free quarters and a small Mess, but the service will have to be maintained by the apprentices.

9. In the event of the services of any apprentice being used by contractors in a special capacity on works of utility and benefit to the contractors any remuneration that the contractors would be liable to pay will be recovered by Government against the cost of training of the apprentice.

10. Apprentices will not be allowed to apply for any appointments in the Public Service during the first nine months of their apprenticeship and may not normally be released to take up other duties until termination of the apprenticeship period. This should be clearly stated in any application for appointments.

11. Government does not undertake to give employment to apprentices on the completion of their training. The possibility of their securing appointment will depend on the

occurrence of vacancies for which they may be eligible and on their successful competition with other candidates on the grounds of qualification and merit.

12. Successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination and be prepared to take up duties at Norton on December 1, 1942.

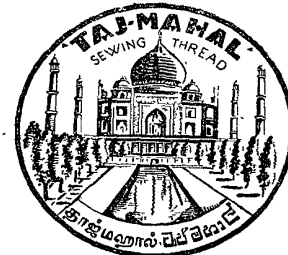

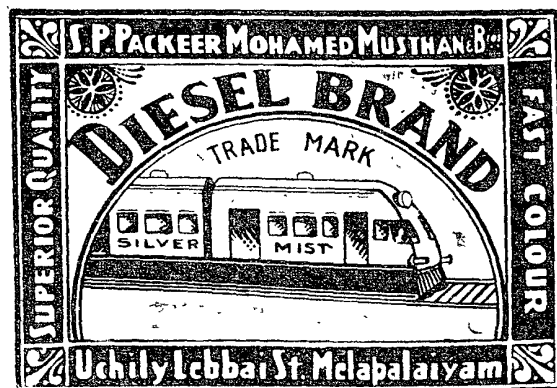

Order.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Controller of Prices by section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939 I, Reginald Sydney Vernon Poulter, Controller of Prices, do, by this Order :—

(i.) revoke with effect from this date my Orders—

- dated May 8, 1942, published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,930 of May 8, 1942 ;
- dated May 22, 1942, published in *Government Gazette* No. 8,932 of May 22, 1942 ;

in so far as they relate to the articles of the description and grade mentioned in the First Schedule hereto ;

- fix the prices specified in columns 2, 3 and 4 of the Second Schedule hereto to be, respectively, the importer's maximum price, the maximum wholesale price and the maximum retail price above which articles of the description and grade specified in the corresponding entries in column 1 of that Schedule shall not be sold by wholesale or by retail, as the case may be, within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo ;
- direct that for the purposes of this Order—

- any sale of any quantity of any article for the purpose of resale or any sale of any article in a quantity of 200 lb. or more at a time shall be deemed to be a sale by wholesale ;
- any sale of any quantity less than 200 lb. of any article for the purpose of consumption or use by the purchaser shall be deemed to be a sale by retail ;
- an "importer" shall mean any person who has cleared from the Customs in his name any article mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto ;
- a "wholesale dealer" shall mean any person who is in the habit of selling by wholesale any article mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto ;

PULSES.

- (e) "importer's maximum price" shall apply to the sale (by wholesale) of any article by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
- (f) "maximum wholesale price" shall apply to all sales by wholesale except sales by an importer to a wholesale dealer;
- (g) "maximum retail price" shall apply to all sales by retail;
- (iv.) direct that no trader shall sell any article of any description or grade mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto which is adulterated with any other article or with an article of an inferior description and grade or quality;
- (v.) direct that any trader who, at any premises within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo, sells any article of the description and grade mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto, shall exhibit in a conspicuous position, at those premises, a notice on which there shall be set out the maximum price fixed by this Order in respect of that article of that description and grade;
- (vi.) direct that every person who sells by wholesale any article of the description and grade mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto shall, and every person who sells by retail any article of the description and grade mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto shall, on demand, give the purchaser of that article a receipt in which there shall be set out—
- (a) the date of the sale;
- (b) the description and grade of the article sold;
- (c) the weight of the quantity sold if sold by wholesale, and the volume in measures of the quantity sold if sold by retail;
- (d) the price paid for the quantity sold;
- (e) the nature of the transaction, that is to say, whether the sale was by wholesale or by retail;
- (vii.) direct that every importer of, and wholesale dealer in, any article specified in the Third Schedule hereto, who has his place of business or store within the Municipal limits of Colombo, shall furnish to the Controller of Prices, 111, Dam street, Colombo, on or before October 28, 1942, a return (sent separately in respect of each store), which shall specify—
- (a) the address of the store;
- (b) the quantity of each article specified in the Third Schedule hereto which is contained in the store.
