THE QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASES ORDINANCE.

Notification.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by regulation I of the regulations under sections 2 and 3 of the Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance (Chapter 173), published in the Supplement to Gazette No. 7,481 of August 28, 1925, I, Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Notification confirm the declaration of the "diseased locality" specified in the Schedule hereto, made by the Acting Government Agent, North-Central Province, the proper authority in that behalf, on August 27,

THE CEYLON (STATE COUNCIL) ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1931.

. IT is hereby notified that by virtue of the powers vested in him by Article 32 (2) of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, the Governor has approved the following resolution passed by the State Council on August 26, 1942:-

' That pursuant to Article 32 (2) of the Ceylon (State Council) Order in Council, 1931, the First Schedule to that Order as amended shall be further amended—

- (1) by the deletion from Group V of the function described as "Food Control in Emergencies" and the insertion of the words "other than foodstuffs" after the word "Commodities" in the function described as "Control of Prices of Commodities in emergencies or to prevent profiteering";
- (2) by the addition to Group II of the following functions:-

"Food Control in Emergencies"
"Control of Prices of Foodstuffs in emergencies or to prevent profiteering"."

THE EMERGENCY POWERS (DEFENCE) ACTS, 1939 AND 1940.

G. O. No. C 46.

DEFENCE regulations made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the Emergency Powers (Defence) Acts, 1939 and 1940, of the Imperial Parliament, as adapted, modified and extended to Ceylon by the Emergency Powers (Colonial Defence) Order in Council, 1939, and the Emergency Powers (Colonial Defence) (Amendment) Order in Council, 1940.

Regulations.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Defence (Food and Price Control) (Transfer of Powers) Regulations, 1942.

2. Every power, duty or function conferred or imposed upon or assigned to the Minister for Labour, 2. 3. Every power, duty or function conferred or imposed upon or assigned to the Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce or the Executive Committee of Labour, Industry and Commerce by the Essential Commodities Reserves Ordinance, No. 5 of 1939, or the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, shall, with effect from the date on which these regulations come into force, and so far as such power, duty or function relates to articles of food or drink be exercised, performed or discharged by the Minister for Agriculture and Lands or, as the commerce when the Executive Committee of Agriculture and Lands or as the commerce of these Ordinances. as the case may be, by the Executive Committee of Agriculture and Lands; and the provisions of those Ordinances shall apply and be construed accordingly.

- 4. The power conferred upon the Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce by regulation 2 of the Defence (Rice Rationing) (Issue of Substitutes) Regulations, published in Gazette Extraordinary No. 8,969 of July 17, 1942, shall, with effect from the date on which these regulations come into force, be exercised by the Minister for Agriculture and Lands; and the provisions of those Regulations shall apply and be construed accordingly.
- 5. Every regulation, Order or notification made or issued under any of the provisions of the Ordinances or of the Defence Regulations referred to in regulation 2 or regulation 3 or regulation 4 and in operation at the date on which these regulations come into force, shall continue in operation, and shall be construed and applied, and may be amended, varied, repealed or rescinded, as though such regulation, Order or notification had been made or issued under the powers conferred by the aforesaid regulations 2, 3 and 4.

THE WAGES BOARDS ORDINANCE, No. 27 of 1941.

Notification under section 7 (1).

IN accordance with the provisions of section 7 (1) of the Wages Boards Ordinance, No. 27 of 1941, I, George Claude Stanley Corea, Minister for Labour, Industry and Commerce, do hereby notify my intention to make an order, under section 6(1) of that Ordinance, applying the provisions of Part II of that Ordinance to the trade specified in the Schedule hereto.

Objections to the proposed order will be received by me on or before 1st October, 1942. Every such objection must be made in writing and must contain a statement of the grounds upon which such objection is taken.

### Schedule.

The coconut trade consisting of any one or more of the following five activities:

- (1) The raising and maintenance of a coconut plantation of over ten acres in extent and the disposal of coconuts from such plantation otherwise than by conversion into copra, desiccated ecconut, ecconut oil, or coir products; including-
  - (a) felling, burning and clearing jungle and old coconut land;
  - draining and terracing;

(c) lining, pegging, holing, and planting seedlings;

(d) preparing beds, planting seed-nuts and watering seedlings in nurseries; (e) supplying vacancies and watering supplies in the field; (f) weeding, removing "illuk" grass, and clearing boundaries;

collecting fronds and clearing estate;

(h) constructing, repairing, and maintaining roads, paths, buildings, fences, and hedges;

propping;

- (i) taking a census of palms;
  (k) digging, forking, ploughing, and harrowing;
- (l) planting cover crops and green manure crops, lopping;
- cutting manure trenches, manuring and applying fertilizers;

- (n) mulching, burying husks;
  (o) picking, collecting, and counting nuts;
  (p) making charcoal from coconut shells;
- care of palms in relation to pests and diseases;
- digging out and burning dead or diseased palms;
- (s) transporting;(t) cattle-keeping;
- (u) conservancy work;
- (v) the work of kangany;
- (w) the work of watcher;
- (x) any other operation connected with or incidental to work specified in this paragraph;

but excluding the work of the following workers:-

Lorry and van driver, mechanic, clerk, conductor, store-keeper, dispenser, midwife, bungalow servant, and teacher.

(2) The manufacture of copra;

including-

- (a) husking and splitting nuts, copra curing, sorting, bagging, and weighing copra;(b) any other operation connected with or incidental to work specified in this paragraph;

but excluding the work of the following workers:-

Engine driver, lorry and van driver, clerk, mechanic, conductor, store-keeper, dispenser, midwife, bungalow servant, and teacher.

(3) The manufacture of desiccated coconut;

.. including-

- (a) husking nuts :
- (b) removing shells (hatcheting);
- (c) removing parings;
- (d) washing coconut meat, disintegrating and drying;
- (e) sifting, grading, and packing;(f) stencilling cases;

- (a) weighing, loading, and transporting;
  (b) collecting parings, drying, and pressing parings for oil;

- filtering oil and pumping to storage or drums; cleaning and washing filter cloths, cleaning expeller and pumps; collecting effluent water, removing sediment and preparing sediment oil and poonac;
- (l) the work of kangany;

(m) the work of watcher;

(n) any other operation connected with or incidental to work specified in this paragraph;

but excluding the work of the following workers :-

Clerk, engine driver, mechanic, fitter, carpenter, lorry and van driver, and store-keeper.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 4 (1) (a) of the Food Control Ordinance (Chapter 132), read with the Defence (Food and Price Control) (Transfer of Powers) Regulations, 1942, I, Don Stephen Senanayake, Minister for Agriculture and Lands, do by this Order prohibit the transport or removal of paddy or other grain from the Divisional Revenue Officer's Division of Pachehilaippali-Karachehi, and the Divisional Revenue Officer's Division of Punakari-Tunukkai in the Jaffna District, except under the authority of a permit issued by the Government Agent, Northern Province, Deputy Food Controller. # THE CONTROL OF PRICES ORDINANCE, No. 39 OF 1939.

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Controller of Prices by section 3 of the Control of Prices Ordinance, No. 39 of 1939, I, Reginald Sydney Vernon Poulier, Controller of Prices, do by this Order:-

- (i.) fix the prices specified in the Schedule hereto to be the maximum retail price per tyre or the maximum retail price per tube, as the case may be, above which tyres or tubes of the description and grade specified in the Schedule hereto shall not be sold by retail in Ceylon;
- (ii.) direct that, for the purposes of this Order, any sale of any tyre or tube for the purpose of use shall be deemed to be a sale by retail;
- (iii.) direct that every trader, who at any premises in Ceylon sells tyres or tubes of the description and grade specified in the Schedule hereto, shall exhibit in a conspicuous position at those premises the maximum prices fixed by this Order for tyres and tubes of that description and grade;

- (iv.) direct that every trader, who sells tyres or tubes of the description and grade specified in the Schedule hereto, shall give to every purchaser of tyres or tubes a receipt in which there shall be set out—
  - (a) the quantity, description, and grade of the tyres or tubes sold;
  - (b) the price paid for the quantity of the tyres or tubes sold; and (c) the date of the sale.
