DEFENCE Regulations made by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by the Emergency Powers (Defence) Acts, 1939 and 1940, of the Imperial Parliament, as adapted, modified and extended to Ceylon by the Emergency Powers (Colonial Defence) Order in Council, 1939, and the Emergency Powers (Colonial Defence) (Amendment) Order in Council, 1940.

Regulations.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Defence (Sale of Foreign Liquor to the Forces) Regulations, 1944.

2. No person shall sell any description of foreign liquor to any person who is in the uniform of any of the fighting forces, or whom he knows or has reasonable cause to believe to be a member of the fighting forces, at any place other than a mess or canteen established by or for the members of such forces or any unit thereof:

Provided that—

- Cap. 42. (a) the holder of any licence under the Excise Ordinance for the sale of foreign liquor may, if, but only if, he has obtained a permit issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Officer Commanding the Troops, sell any such liquor to any such person in accordance with such conditions as may be attached to the permit; and
- (b) the holder of any licence under the Excise Ordinance for the sale of foreign liquor in a resthouse may sell any such liquor for consumption on the premises to any such person who is a *bona fide* traveller.

3. (1) Every application for a permit for the purposes of regulation 2 shall be made in writing to the Officer Commanding the Troops and shall

contain all such particulars as may be required by him.

(2) The Officer Commanding the Troops shall have absolute discretion—

- (a) to refuse to issue a permit to any applicant; or
- (b) to attach to a permit, whether by way of endorsement or otherwise, such conditions as he may deem necessary; or
- (c) to cancel any permit.

(3) Where any permit is cancelled by the Officer Commanding the Troops, notice of the cancellation thereof shall be given forthwith to the holder of the permit in writing under the hand of the Officer Commanding the Troops or an officer authorised by him in that behalf.

4. Every person to whom a permit is issued shall keep such permit exhibited at all times in a glazed frame at the entrance to the premises at which he is licensed to sell liquor.

5. Every person contravening any of the provisions of regulation 2 shall be guilty of an offence and shall—

- (a) in the case of a first offence, be liable, on conviction after summary trial before a Magistrate, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one year;
- (b) in the case of a second or subsequent offence, be liable, on conviction before a District Court, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding four years.

6. In these Regulations—

“fighting forces” means the forces of His Majesty or of any Power allied for the time being with His Majesty, and includes such followers of those forces as are in uniform and labour units which form part of or are attached to those forces, but does not include any casual labourer or any member of the corps constituted under the Defence (Essential Services Labour Corps) Regulations;

"forces of His Majesty" includes the Ceylon Defence Force, the Ceylon Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, and any Force, whether regular or volunteer, of India, the Dominions, a British Colony or a Mandated Territory;

"foreign liquor" means any liquor other than toddy or arrack;

"liquor" has the same meaning as in the Excise Ordinance;

"Officer Commanding the Troops" means the General or other Officer for the time being commanding the Troops in Ceylon;

"permit" means a permit issued for the purposes of these Regulations.

7. The operation of paragraph (a) of condition 12 of the general conditions applicable to all excise licences published by Excise Notification No. 329 in *Gazette* No. 8,368 of May 11, 1938, is hereby suspended.

8. The Defence (Sale of Liquor to the Forces) Regulations, published in *Gazette* No. 9,005 of September 14, 1942, are hereby rescinded;

Provided that every permit granted under regulation 2 of those Regulations shall be deemed for all purposes to be a permit granted for the purposes of these Regulations.

Regulations.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Defence (Sale of Arrack and Toddy to the Forces) Regulations, 1944.

2. No person shall sell any arrack or toddy to any person, not being a Ceylonese, who is in the uniform of any of the fighting forces, or whom he knows or has reasonable cause to believe to be a member of the fighting forces, at any place other than a mess or canteen established by or for the members of such forces or any unit thereof:

Provided that the holder of a licence under the Excise Ordinance for the sale of arrack or toddy may sell any quantity of arrack or toddy, as the case may be, to the Commanding Officer of any

unit of the fighting forces, or to any member of such unit, authorised in writing by such Officer to purchase arrack or toddy, for distribution to the members of such unit.

3. Every person contravening any of the provisions of regulation 2 shall be guilty of an offence and shall—

(a) in the case of a first offence, be liable, on conviction after summary trial before a Magistrate, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one year;

(b) in the case of a second or subsequent offence, be liable, on conviction before a District Court, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding four years.

4. Where in any case in which a person (hereinafter referred to as the "seller") is convicted under section 43 (g) of the Excise Ordinance of the offence of selling arrack or toddy to any other person (hereinafter referred to as the "purchaser") in contravention of that Ordinance or of any rule or order made thereunder, or of the conditions of any licence, permit or pass obtained thereunder, it is proved that the purchaser was a Ceylonese and that at the time of the sale the purchaser was in the uniform of any of the fighting forces or that the seller knew or had reasonable cause to believe that the purchaser was a member of the fighting forces, the seller shall, notwithstanding anything in the aforesaid section—

(a) in the case of a first offence, be liable, on conviction after summary trial before a Magistrate, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one year;

(b) in the case of a second or subsequent offence, be liable, on conviction before a District Court, to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding four years.

5. In these regulations—

"Ceylonese" means a person domiciled in Ceylon and possessing a Ceylon domicile of origin;

"fighting forces" means the forces of His Majesty or of any Power allied for the time being with His Majesty, and includes such followers of those forces as are in uniform and labour units which form part of or are attached to those forces, but does not include any casual labourer or any member of the corps constituted under the Defence (Essential Services Labour Corps) Regulations;

"forces of His Majesty" includes the Ceylon Defence Force, the Ceylon Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, and any force, whether regular or volunteer, of India, the Dominions, a British Colony or a Mandated Territory.

Regulations.

1. (1) These Regulations shall apply to every person who is the occupier of any land which is situated in any Province specified in Schedule A and on which there is any live cinchona tree, whether cultivated or of spontaneous growth.
- (2) The date with effect from which these Regulations shall apply to each person referred to in paragraph (1) shall—
 - (a) where such person has, at any time before the date of the publication of these Regulations in the *Gazette*, extracted the bark of any cinchona tree on any land occupied by him, whether for the purposes of trade or for any other purpose, or has other reasonable cause to be aware of the existence of any such tree on such land, be the date of such publication; and
 - (b) where such person has not so extracted the bark of any such tree, or is not otherwise aware of the existence of any such tree on such land, be the date specified in a notice served on him by or under the authority of the Director to the effect that by reason of the existence of any cinchona tree or trees on any land in the occupation of that person, these Regulations will apply to such person with effect from such date.
2. No person to whom these Regulations apply shall lop, fell, uproot or kill or destroy, or cause or permit any other person to lop, fell, uproot or kill or destroy, any cinchona tree on the land or any land of which he is the occupier;

Provided that nothing in the preceding provisions of this Regulation shall be deemed to prohibit—

- (a) any act done in compliance with any instructions issued by the Director, whether such act is the lopping of a cinchona tree for the purpose of extracting bark from the branches that are lopped off or the felling or uprooting of a cinchona tree after it ceases to yield bark of sufficient quantity or suitable quality; or
- (b) the felling or lopping of any cinchona tree at the request or under the authority of any officer of Government or of a local authority acting in pursuance of powers conferred by any other written law.

3. (1) Every person to whom these Regulations apply shall, within one month after the date on which they commence to apply to him, furnish to the Director a return, as hereinafter provided, in respect of the cinchona tree or trees on the land of which he is the occupier. Where any such person is the occupier of two or more lands on which there is any cinchona tree, he shall furnish a separate return in respect of the cinchona tree or trees on each of those lands.

(2) Every return for the purposes of paragraph (1) shall—

- (a) be substantially in the form set out in Schedule B;
- (b) contain all such particulars as may be required to be set out in such form; and
- (c) be supported by a declaration, signed by the person furnishing the return, to the effect that the particulars set out in the return are true and accurate.

4. In every case where there are two or more cinchona trees on the land or any of the lands in the occupation of any person to whom these Regulations apply, such person shall assign serial numbers to such trees and shall mark or cause to be marked legibly on each such tree the number assigned thereto.

5. (1) Every person to whom these Regulations apply shall extract the bark of the cinchona tree or trees on the land or each of the lands of which he is the occupier, or cause such bark to be extracted, in accordance with such general or special instructions as may be issued or given by or under the authority of the Director.

(2) All general instructions for the purposes of paragraph (1) may be issued by notification, published by or under the authority of the Director, in the *Gazette* and in such newspaper or newspapers as the Director may determine.

Any Special instructions for the purposes of paragraph (1) may be given, by or under the authority of the Director, either orally or in writing to the person or persons concerned.

(3) The instructions issued or given by or under the authority of the Director for the purposes of paragraph (1) may include instructions as to—

- (a) the age of the trees from which the bark may be extracted,
- (b) the seasons during which or the intervals at which, and the manner in which, the bark shall be extracted.

6. No person to whom these Regulations apply shall sell any cinchona bark to any person other than the Director or an officer or person authorised by the Director in writing to purchase such bark on behalf of the Director.

7. The Director may, from time to time, by notice published in the *Gazette* and in such newspaper or newspapers as he may determine, fix the price to be paid for the cinchona bark or each grade or quality of cinchona bark to be purchased by him or on his behalf. Such price shall in no case be less than fifty cents a pound.

8. It shall be a condition of each sale of cinchona bark effected in compliance with Regulation 6 that the price of the bark shall not be payable to the seller until—

- (a) the entire quantity of bark specified in the agreement or memorandum of sale has been delivered to the Director or an authorised officer or person referred to in that regulation; and
- (b) the grade or quality of the bark so delivered or of each distinguishable variety thereof has, on the basis of the percentage of Quinine Sulphate recoverable therefrom, been determined by or under the authority of the Director by means of chemical or other tests applied to fair samples thereof.

9. The Director or any officer or person authorised by him in that behalf may enter and inspect any land situated in any Province specified in Schedule A for the purpose of ascertaining whether there are any cinchona trees on that land and whether the occupier of that land has complied or is complying with the requirements of these Regulations; and where such occupier has not at any time prior to the date of such inspection extracted the bark of any cinchona tree or is not aware of the existence of cinchona trees on the land, the Director or such officer or person may serve on such occupier the notice referred to in paragraph (2) (b) of Regulation 1.

10. (1) Where any person to whom these Regulations apply fails for any reason to extract, in accordance with Regulation 5, the bark from any cinchona tree on any land

of which he is the occupier, it shall be lawful for the Director or any officer or person authorised by him in writing in that behalf—

- (a) to enter upon the land with such servants, implements and vehicles as may be necessary;
- (b) to extract the bark from the tree or each of the trees in respect of which default has been made by the occupier; and
- (c) to remove from the land the bark so extracted, after weighing such bark in the presence of the occupier or his agent or servant and delivering to him a memorandum setting out the weight of such bark.

(2) All cinchona bark extracted and removed under paragraph (1) shall be paid for by the Director; and the amount to be paid shall be the price calculated at such of the rates notified under Regulation 7 as may be appropriate to the grade or quality of the bark, less the cost of extracting and collecting the bark upon the land.

(3) The extraction and removal of cinchona bark from any land under paragraph (1) shall not be deemed to affect in any manner the liability of the occupier of the land to any prosecution or other proceedings in respect of his failure to comply with the requirements of regulation 5.

11. In these Regulations—

“Director” means the Director of Commerce and Industries; “occupier”, in relation to any land, includes the owner, lessee, usufructuary mortgagee or other person lawfully in possession of the land and taking the produce thereof.

12. These Regulations may be cited as the Defence (Cinchona) Regulations, 1944.

“damage caused by war operations”, or “damage arising in consequence of war operations”, or any grammatical variation thereof, means—

- (a) damage occurring (whether accidentally or not) as the direct result of action taken by the enemy, or action taken in combating the enemy or in repelling an imagined attack by the enemy;
- (b) damage occurring (whether accidentally or not) as the direct result of measures taken under proper authority to avoid the spreading of, or otherwise to mitigate the consequences of such damage as aforesaid;
- (c) accidental damage occurring as the direct result—
 - (i) of any precautionary or preparatory measures taken under proper authority with a view to preventing or hindering the carrying out of any attack by the enemy; or
 - (ii) of precautionary or preparatory measures involving the doing of work on land and taken under proper authority in any way in anticipation of enemy action,

being in either case, measures involving a substantial degree of risk to property:

Provided that the measures mentioned in clause (c) of this definition do not include the imposing of restrictions on the display of lights or measures taken for training purposes:

Provided, further, that in sub-paragraph (c) of paragraph (1) of regulation 17 the reference to measures taken to avoid the spreading of the consequences of damage caused by war operations shall be construed as a reference to such measures as are referred to in clause (b) of this definition; and

(2) by the omission of the definition of “war operations”.

- (g) show in the appropriate columns the c.i.f. price, the rate of exchange, and the true wholesale market value as defined in section 159 of the Customs Ordinance;
- (h) in the case of imports other than those by the South Indian Railway ferry via Talaimannar, or by post, be presented in quadruplicate, and in the case of any goods from Canada, Newfoundland, Hongkong, British Honduras, or any non-Empire country a fifth copy shall be attached conspicuously marked "For Exchange Control Purposes", an additional copy being presented in each of the following cases:—
 - (i) where the entry is in respect of goods entered to be bonded;
 - (ii) where the person presenting the entry wishes to retain a duly passed copy thereof;
- (i) specify in cases where rice is imported, the quality and grade of the rice.

2. They must have passed the Junior School Certificate (English) or equivalent examination or higher examination.

Proof to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General must be furnished—

- (a) That the applicant is a Ceylonese as defined by Government Regulations.
- (b) (i.) That he is not less than 17 nor more than 22 years old, or
- (ii.) That he is not less than 17 nor more than 26 years old and has had previous training in Electrical Engineering at the Ceylon Technical College or has technical qualifications and/or experience which are of a sufficiently high standard.
- (c) That he is of good moral character.

3. Candidates should be of sound constitution possessed of good eyesight and otherwise physically fit. Before being finally selected for training they will be required to submit themselves to a medical examination by a Government Medical Officer and pay a fee of Rs. 5 for such examination.

4. Selected candidates will be given a course of training as may be decided by the Chief Telecommunication Engineer. Before completion of the training they will be required to obtain Grade I. certificates of the City and Guilds Institute in Technical Electricity and either Telephony or Telegraphy or Radio Communication or Transmission and Lines.

5. During their course of training, candidates will be designated Overseers-in-Training and will be paid at the following rates, provided their progress and conduct are satisfactory:—

First 6 months	Re. 1.30 per diem
Second 6 months 1.76 " "
Second year	Rs. 2.00 " "
Third year and until appointed Daily-Paid Overseers 2.24 " "

6. Hours of duty will generally be those in force in the sections to which the Overseers-in-Training are attached for

training, but will be subject to alteration as may be decided by the Chief Telecommunication Engineer to suit the training or the requirements of the Department at any time. They will conform to all the regulations in force, as applicable to daily-paid employees of similar grade in the Department.

7. An Overseer-in-Training whose progress or conduct has been found unsatisfactory at any stage will be liable to be discontinued on the orders of the Chief Telecommunication Engineer, whose decision shall be final.

8. Candidates selected for training will be required to pay to the Postmaster-General a sum of Rs. 50 before commencement of training and thereafter to pay Rs. 2.50 per mensem until completion of three years from the date of commencement of training.

9. The Postmaster-General may at his discretion—

- (a) on completion of 2 year's service after the end of the third years from the date of commencement of training, or
- (b) on termination of employment with the consent of the Postmaster-General,

pay to the Overseers-in-Training such sum of money as he deems fit as a bonus. The amount paid as a bonus under this paragraph shall in no case exceed the total amount received under paragraph 8.

10. On completion of training those Overseers-in-Training, who have satisfied the Chief Telecommunication Engineer as to fitness in every respect and who have obtained the technical qualifications specified in Clause 4, will be eligible for appointment as Overseers (Daily Paid) in order of merit. They will be paid at the minimum rate of the Daily-Paid Overseers' scale and will be subject to all Government and Departmental regulations applicable to such daily-paid employees.

11. Those who do not satisfy the Chief Telecommunication Engineer that they have reached the standard required in every respect will not be eligible for appointment to the Daily-Paid Overseers' grade.

12. Daily paid employees of the Department are required to serve in any part of the Island and their duties include the maintenance and fitting of all classes of Telephone, Telegraph, Radio, Railway Electric Safety Apparatus, lines and cables with or without assistance according to the nature of the work.
