THE EDUCATION ORDINANCE.

REGULATION made by the Executive Committee of Education under section 32 of the Education Ordinance No. 31 of 1939, approved by the State Council and ratified by the Governor.

The Code of Regulations for Assisted Vernacular and Bilingual Schools published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 7,722 of July 12, 1929, is hereby amended by the insertion, immediately after regulation 35, of the following new regulation:—

“35A. (1) In addition to the grant for maintenance and equipment under regulation 35, a grant shall be paid to every Vernacular and Bilingual School towards the cost of books and other school materials supplied free by that school to poor pupils: provided, however, that the amount of such grant shall not exceed fifteen cents per unit of average attendance in that school.

(2) No grant under the preceding paragraph shall be paid to any school, unless the Manager of that School—

(a) certifies that the books and school materials have been supplied to poor pupils and that the expenditure in that behalf has been actually incurred by the school;

(b) furnishes along with the annual returns a statement containing the following particulars:—

- (i) the names of the poor pupils to whom books and school materials have been supplied,
- (ii) the monthly income of the parents of each such pupil, and
- (iii) the cost of the books and school materials supplied; and

(c) keeps a register of all books and school materials supplied free to poor pupils and produces that register for verification whenever called upon to do so by the Inspector.”

- (2) give the Village Headman or any other person authorised by me at his request all information desired by him in regard to the field, persons entitled to shares and the amount of such shares in terms of Regulation 10 of the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943.

2. I further direct that—

- (1) no paddy shall be removed from the field or threshing floor to a barn or any other place of storage until the Village Headman or any other person authorised by me shall have recorded the total harvest and shares; nor except on a permit obtained from the proper authority in terms of paragraph 3 of this notice.
- (2) the levy of one bushel per acre for the Maha season shall be handed over to the Village Headman at the threshing floor.
- (3) no part of the paddy removed in terms of clause (1) shall, without prior authority, be disposed of in any manner other than by way of consumption at approved rates by the owner and his *bona fide* dependants subject to a maximum of 50 bushels, provided that the appropriate number of coupons has been surrendered.
- (4) any paddy in excess of the requirements for consumption until the following harvest as laid down in clause (3) or such quantity of paddy as I may order shall be sold to Government.

3. Permits for transport of paddy from the field or threshing floor to a barn situated within the same Village Headman's division shall be obtained from the Village Headman concerned who will obtain the signature of the remover on the triplicate of the permit on form D. F. S. & C 12 in proof of removal. Permits for transport of paddy from one Village Headman's division to another within the same Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division shall be obtained from the Chief Headman or the Divisional Revenue Officer concerned. For transport from one Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division to another, or from one Emergency A. G. A.'s area to another, or from one District to another, application should be made to the Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent, or the Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which the applicant is resident giving all particulars asked for in form D. F. C. 34 (duplicate) copies of which can be obtained from any of the above officers. To expedite the issue of permits, the applicants are requested to produce reports from the Village Headman or any other authorised person of the areas of their residence and of the areas in which the paddy lands are situated, giving particulars of their households and of their shares of paddy from the various fields.

4. If no application is made in the manner described above within six weeks, all stocks of paddy are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.

Internal Purchase Scheme.

Harvesting of Paddy and Kurakkan in Magam Pattu and East Giruwa Pattu of Hambantota District.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, I, Archibald Keith Johnston Henderson, Assistant Government Agent, Hambantota District, do hereby direct that every person whether owner or cultivator of any land which is cultivated with Paddy or Kurakkan situated within Magam pattu and East Giruwa pattu of the Hambantota District and which is expected to be harvested between January 1, 1945, and July 31, 1945, shall inform in writing the Vel Vidane of the area in which the paddy field is situated and the Village Headman of the area in which the Kurakkan land is situated of—

- (a) the dates on which it is proposed to reap and thresh the harvest on the land;
- (b) the name, situation and extent of the land;
- (c) the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of the land under any contract, agreement or otherwise; and
- (d) the details of the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

2. I further direct that—

- (a) no paddy or kurakkan shall be removed from the threshing floor or chena to a barn or any other place until the Field Assistant or Vel Vidane or any other person authorised by me shall have inspected and recorded the total harvest and shares, nor except on a permit on the D. F. S. & C 12 form issued by the Vel Vidane or person authorised, who will obtain the signature of the remover on the triplicate of the permit in proof of removal, nor until the levy of 2 bushels of paddy per acre for the main cultivating season and 1 bushel of paddy per acre for the smaller cultivating season shall have been handed over to the

Vel Vidane or transported to the nearest Government Purchasing Centre after obtaining a permit from the Vel Vidane specifically for this purpose;

- (b) no part of the paddy so removed shall be used for consumption until the surrender of the appropriate number of coupons; and then only at the approved rates of 6 measures per head per week for owner-cultivators and their dependants and four measures per head per week for non-cultivating owners and their dependants up to a maximum of 50 bushels per household per cultivating season;
- (c) no paddy other than that referred to in (b) above seed and feeding allowances at the authorised rates shall be transported or disposed of except by way of sale to a Government Purchasing Centre or without prior permission from me;
- (d) the permits on the form D. F. S. & C 12 for removal from the threshing floor to the barn or place of storage must be surrendered to the Village Headman of the Division in which the barn or place of storage is situated as soon as the removal is completed and in any case not more than two days after the permit has lapsed.

3. Permits for the removal of paddy from the threshing floor direct to a Government Purchasing Centre situated within the same Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division will be issued by the Vel Vidane. Permits for the removal of kurakkan from the chena to a Government Purchasing Centre situated within the same Chief Headman's or the Divisional Revenue Officer's division will be issued by the Village Headman. Permits for the removal of paddy or kurakkan from a barn or storehouse to a Purchasing Centre situated within the same Pattu will be issued by the Village Headman of the place where the barn is situated.

4. For transport from one Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division to another or from one Emergency Assistant Government Agent's area to another or from one district to another, application should be made to the Deputy Food Controller or the Assistant Government (Emergency) of the area where the applicant resides on the prescribed form, copies of which are available at any of the above-mentioned offices concerned.

5. All walahans are advised to register their names with the Cultivation Officer before commencing work, sign the register and state the fields in which they will be working. No applications for removal of shares from a pattu will be entertained unless the walahan's names have been registered on the Cultivation Officer's list prior to commencement of harvesting.

6. All persons such as cattle-owners, goiyas and others who are entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of any paddy or kurakkan land in East Giruwa pattu and Magam pattu are advised to ensure that their names and addresses, &c., are furnished to the Vel Vidane in the case of paddy and the Village Headman in the case of Kurakkan prior to harvesting. No permit for removal of any paddy or kurakkan will be issued to any person whose name has not been furnished to the Vel Vidane or the Village Headman, as the case may be as one who is entitled to remove any part of the produce.

7. If no application for removal is made within six weeks of the date of threshing in the manner described above, all stocks of paddy will be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.

Internal Purchase Scheme.

Harvesting of Paddy in the Jaffna District.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation, 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulation, 1942, and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulation, 1943, I do hereby direct that—

(1) every person whether owner or cultivator in charge of the reaping of the harvest of any Paddy or Kurakkan land situated within the Jaffna District and which is expected to be harvested during Kalapokam, 1944-45, shall inform the Kirama Vidane of the area in which the land is situated:—

- (a) the date on which it is proposed to reap and thresh the harvest on the land.
- (b) the name, situation and extent of the land.

2. No cultivator, shareholder or other persons having interest in any land cultivated with paddy or kurakkan situated within the Jaffna District shall remove any paddy, harvested in Kalapokam, 1944-45, from the threshing floor until the harvest has been checked and verified by the Kirama Vidane or any other officer authorized by me in writing.

3. Removal thereafter to the barn or other places of storage within the Maniagar's/D.R.O's division should only be on permit on form D.F.S. & C. 12 issued by the Kirama Vidane of the area in which the threshing floor is situated or other officer authorised by me in writing.

4. Removal to places outside the Maniagar's/D.R.O's division should only be on permit issued by me or any other officer authorised by me in writing. Non-residents who desire to remove their share outside the Jaffna District should make their application on form D.F.C. 34 in duplicate through the Revenue Officer or A. G. A. (E) of the area in which they reside.

5. The levy of two bushels per acre be delivered to the Kirama Vidane or any other officer authorised by me in writing at the threshing floor.

6. If no application for removal of any share to a place outside a Maniagar's/D.R.O's division is received within six weeks of harvesting of same, the paddy in question will be taken over by me and payment made at the rate of Rs. 6 per bushel for well-dried paddy free from chaff, &c.
