THE ANURADHAPURA (PRESERVATION) ORDINANCE,  
No. 34 of 1942.

REGULATIONS made by the Executive Committee of Local Administration under section 14 of the Anuradhapura (Preservation) Ordinance, No. 34 of 1942, approved by the State Council, and ratified by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section.

## Regulations.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Anuradhapura (Preservation) Regulations, 1944.

2. Every application for a permit shall be in the form set out in the Schedule hereto.

3. Every application for a permit to erect, re-erect, or alter a building in a controlled area shall be accompanied by—

- (a) a site-plan indicating—
- (i) the extent of the site of the building;
  - (ii) the boundaries of the site and the length of each such boundary;
  - (iii) the position of the building, and the distance between each side of the building and such of the boundaries of the site as may be on that side; and
  - (iv) the position of any adjoining river, canal, water-way, railway, road, lane, or foot-path;
- (b) a building-plan indicating—
- (i) the front elevation of the building;
  - (ii) the position and dimensions of each room and verandah of the building;
  - (iii) the position of every door and window of each such room; and
  - (iv) where the application is for a permit to alter a building, the nature of the proposed alteration; and

(c) specifications of the materials to be used.

4. Every application for a permit to lay out, construct, widen, or close a road on any private land in a controlled area shall be accompanied by—

- (a) a plan indicating—
- (i) the course of the road on the land which the road traverses or is to traverse, and the length and width of the road;
  - (ii) the boundaries of such land, the length of each such boundary, and the distance between each such boundary and the road;
  - (iii) the position of every existing or proposed building within a distance of two hundred feet from the centre of the road, and the distance between the front of that building and the centre of the road; and
  - (iv) the nearest public road, lane, or foot-path;

and

(b) except where the application is for a permit to close a road, specifications of the materials to be used.

5. Every application for a permit to sub-divide, convey, assign, or otherwise dispose of or deal with, a land in a controlled area in such manner as to constitute any part of such land into a separate holding shall be accompanied by a plan drawn to a scale of at least two chains to an inch and indicating—

- (a) the boundaries and extent of such;
- (b) the boundaries and extent of such separate holding;
- (c) the position of every building, wall, and other structure on such land, and
- (d) the position of every road, lane, footpath, river, stream, canal, or other water-course, traversing such land.

6. Every plan required by any of the preceding regulations to be sent with an application for a permit shall be in duplicate.

7. Without the prior approval of the Commissioner of Local Government, the proper officer may grant a permit—

- (a) to erect or re-erect a building mainly with cadjans, straw, or other perishable materials, or to alter or demolish a building so erected or re-erected; or
- (b) to alter a building (other than a building referred to in the preceding clause (a) of this regulation) by constructing or closing up a door or window in an external wall, or by making any change in the internal structure of the building; or
- (c) to re-construct the surface of a road.

8. The proper officer shall not refuse to grant a permit to alter a building in a controlled area in any case where the alteration is prescribed or required by any order or direction issued in the interests of the public health by any officer, person or body empowered by any law to issue such order or direction.

9. The proper officer may insert in any permit to erect, re-erect, or make any additions to, a building in a controlled area, the condition that the person to whom the permit is granted shall cause the building erected or re-erected, or the additions made, under the authority of the permit, to be demolished within a period of six months after the service on him by such officer of a written notice directing him to do so, and that, if that person fails or neglects to do so within that period, it shall be lawful for such officer to cause the demolition to be carried out and to recover from that person by civil action the expense incurred in effecting the demolition.

10. Every statement of appeal under section 6 or section 11 of the Ordinance shall contain the following particulars:—

- (a) The name and address of the applicant.
- (b) A brief statement of the matter in appeal.
- (c) The reasons urged by the appellant in support of his appeal.

11. Every notice, order, or copy of a decision, which is required by the Ordinance or by any of those regulations to be served on any person, shall be served on him either personally or by being sent to him by letter posted to him at his last known place of business or residence. *Harvesting of Paddy in Talpe Pattu, Four Gravets and Himadum Pattu of Galle District for the 1945-46 Maha Season.*

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Food-stuff) Regulations, 1942, the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, and the Defence (Food Rationing) (Special



Provisions) Regulations, 1944, J. William Oswald Stevens, Government Agent, Southern Province, a competent and a proper authority, do, by this Order, direct that every owner or cultivator of any land which is cultivated with paddy during the 1945-46 Maha season and which is situated within the Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's divisions of Talpe Pattu, Four Gravets and Hinidum Pattu of the Galle District shall—

- (1) inform the Village Headman of the area in which the paddy land is situated of the date on which it is proposed to reap the harvest on that land, not less than 10 clear days ahead;
- (2) give the Village Headman or other person authorised by me, at his request, the following information relating to the land:—
  - (a) the name, situation and extent of the land;
  - (b) the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of the land, under any contract or agreement or otherwise; and
  - (c) the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

2. I do further direct that—

- (1) no paddy shall be removed or caused or permitted to be removed by any person from a field or threshing floor to a barn or any other place of storage until the Village Headman or other person authorised by me shall have assessed and recorded the total harvest and the shares; and except on a permit obtained from the proper authority in terms of paragraph 4 of this Order;
- (2) the Government levy of 1 bushel of paddy per acre for the Maha season shall be handed over to the Village Headman at the threshing floor;
- (3) no paddy shall, without prior authority, be disposed of in any manner other than by way of consumption at approved rates by the owner and his *bona fide* dependants subject to a maximum of 50 bushels or such lower quantity as they may be entitled to until the following harvest;
- (4) no paddy shall be utilised for consumption by an owner or his dependant possessing a Rice Ration book until the surrender of the appropriate number of rice coupons;
- (5) any paddy in excess of the requirements for consumption as laid down in clause (3) and, in the case of those who normally supply seed paddy and customarily feed labourers during cultivation operations, any paddy in excess of the requirements for a consumption, seed paddy at the rate of 2½ bushels of paddy per acre and feeding allowance at the rate of 1 bushel of paddy per acre or such other quantity of paddy as I may order shall be sold to the Village Headman on behalf of Government.

3. The approved rates of consumption of paddy by producers at present are 6 measures of paddy per person per week in the case of cultivators and owner cultivators and their dependants and four measures of paddy per person per week in the case of non-cultivating owners and their dependants. Coupons in respect of paddy shall be surrendered at the rate of 1 rice coupon for every six measures of paddy received by a cultivator or an owner cultivator and 1 rice coupon for every four measures of paddy received by a non-cultivating owner.

4. Permits for transport of paddy from the field or threshing floor to a barn situated within the same Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division shall be obtained from the Village Headman concerned who will obtain the signature of the remover on the triplicate of the permit on form D.F.S. & C. 12 in proof of removal, and detach the requisite number of coupons from the Rice Ration books of the members of the producer's household. For transport from one Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's Division to another, or from one Emergency A.G.A.'s area to another, or from one District to another, application should be made to the Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent, or the Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which the applicant is resident giving all particulars asked for in form D.F.C. 34 (duplicate) copies of which can be obtained from any of the above offices. To expedite the issue of permits, the applicants are requested to produce reports from the Village Headman or any other authorised person of the areas of their residence and of the areas in which the paddy lands are situated, giving particulars of their households and of their shares of paddy from the various fields.

5. If no application is made in the manner described above within 6 weeks from the date of harvesting, all stocks of paddy are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.
