## EXAMINATION FOR STENOGRAPHERS, MAY, 1946.

APPLICATIONS are invited from male candidates for filling such vacancies in the posts of Stenographers as may occur.

## 2. Salary and Conditions of Service.—

(i.) Salary. Rs. 936 per annum rising by annual increments, fifteen of Rs. 60 and five of Rs. 72 to Rs. 2,196 per annum.

(ii.) The posts are pensionable but confirmation after two years' service is dependent on the passing of an Efficiency Bar, for which a test is prescribed. There will also be an Efficiency Bar before Rs. 1,476 per annum, the passing of which is dependent on satisfactory work and conduct and the passing of a test.

*Note.*—Successful candidates from the fighting forces or from the Auxiliary Fire, Air Raid Precautions and Civil Defence Services will be placed at suitable points on this salary scale so that they will receive some credit for War service if their ages exceed the maximum age in the normal age limit specified in paragraph 9.

(iii.) The grant of leave and other conditions will in the case of a new entrant to the Public Service be governed by the recommendations in Sessional Paper VIII. of 1934. Rent allowance will, however, be payable.

(iv.) Successful candidates will be subject to the Public Service, Financial and other Standing Regulations of the Government.

(v.) Successful candidates who may have previous pensionable, non-pensionable or quasi-Government service will not be given incremental credit in respect of such service.

3. The names of successful candidates will be published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* and they will be given appointments as suitable vacancies occur.

4. *Examination and Selection.*—A competitive examination will be held in Colombo by the Director of Education on May 18, 1946, and the selection will be made on the results of the examination.

5. *Subjects of Examination.*—The subjects of the examination will be as follows and marks will be assigned as indicated against each:—

(5) (a) Successful candidates who are Sinhalese or Tamil will be required to satisfy the Chief Secretary before appointment that they possess an elementary working knowledge of Sinhalese in the case of Sinhalese candidates, of Tamil in the case of Tamil candidates. They should be able to write a short letter, to read aloud a short passage from a newspaper and answer oral questions on the passage read.

(b) Successful candidates who are neither Sinhalese nor Tamil will be required to pass the test in Sinhalese or Tamil, as set out in (a) above or pass a special test in English of a higher standard. The test in English will be a written one.

(c) Successful candidates of mixed parentage will be required to pass a test in the language of either of their parents, *i.e.*, Sinhalese or Tamil or (Special) English.

\* Candidates should bring their own typewriters if possible, otherwise they will be expected to type on the machine provided, irrespective of make or model.

Touch typewriting will be regarded as essential.

Neatness and accuracy will be taken into account in marking the scripts.

6. The Examination will be held in two parts. Part I. comprising subjects (1), (2) and (3) will be held first in accordance with the following Time Table:—

9.0 A.M. to 10.0 A.M. ..	English Essay
10.15 A.M. to 12.30 P.M. ..	Shorthand
Commencing at 2.0 P.M. ..	Typewriting

Candidates who have attained a sufficiently high standard in Part I. will be summoned for Part II. the *viva voce*, on a date to be notified to them later.

7. *Method of Application.*—Applications for admission to the examination must be made on forms obtainable from the Education Office, Colombo. These forms must be filled up and returned to reach that Office not later than 1 P.M. on March 30, 1946. Any applications received after that hour will be rejected. Stamps to the value of Rs. 10 must be affixed to each application and cancelled by the applicant's signature over them. All candidates should forward a copy of their birth certificate (which will be returned) with their application. Certificates of birth issued for the purposes of the Code of Assisted Schools will not be accepted for this examination. Affidavits will not be accepted as substitutes for birth certificates. Candidates who are not in Government Service should also attach copies of two testimonials of good character.

Candidates from the fighting forces or the Auxiliary Fire, Air Raid Precautions and Civil Defence Services should, in addition, attach a certificate from a Staff Officer of such force or Service, specifying the period of full-time service (with dates), and testifying that such service has been throughout satisfactory.

## 8. Eligibility.—

(1) Candidates must be of good character.  
(2) Candidates must be Ceylonese. For the purpose of this examination, a Ceylonese is—

- (a) a British subject who is born in Ceylon, one of whose parents was born in Ceylon; or
- (b) a British subject who is a descendant of a person falling within category (a); or
- (c) a British subject deemed by the Governor with the advice of the Board of Ministers, in view of special circumstances, to be a Ceylonese.

(3) Candidates must furnish proof when forwarding their applications that they have previously passed at least the Cambridge Junior or the Junior School Certificate (English), Examination or the Higher Commercial Certificate Examination (either section), of the London Chamber of Commerce, or the Commercial Certificate Examination (either section), of the London Chamber of Commerce.

(4) Candidates must be within the age limits laid down in paragraph 9.

9. *Age Limits.*—Candidates, who are not already on the permanent establishment of a Government Department must be between the ages of 17 and 35 years on August 1, 1946. The period of mobilized service with the fighting forces since

September 3, 1939, inclusive, may be deducted from the age of any Ceylonese Service candidate in computing his age for the purposes of the age limit prescribed.

The period of continuous service in the Auxiliary Fire, Air Raid Precautions and Civil Defence Services since September 3, 1939, inclusive, may be deducted from the age of a Ceylonese candidate who was a full-time member of any of those Services (excluding those who left those Services of their own accord), in computing his age for purposes of the age limit prescribed.

#### 10. Refunds of Value of Stamps.—

(a) If a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission to the examination a refund will be made of  $\frac{3}{5}$ ths the value of stamps affixed to his application.

(b) If a candidate, who has been admitted to the examination, gives notice of his withdrawal to the Director of Education at least 7 days before the date of the examination, a refund will be made of  $\frac{1}{2}$  the value of stamps affixed to his application. His form of admission to the examination should be returned to the Director of Education for the refund to be made.

(c) A candidate who has been admitted to the examination and wishes to withdraw on account of illness, should forward notice of his withdrawal to reach the Director of Education at least one day before the examination. A refund of the full value of stamps affixed to his application will then be made, provided his notice of withdrawal is accompanied by a certificate from a qualified medical officer to the effect that he is unfit to sit for the examination.

(d) In no other case will a refund be granted.

11. *Medical Examination.*—The selected candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

#### By-laws.

#### Capitation Tax.

#### Exemption.

1. (1) The following classes of persons are hereby exempted from the liability to pay the capitation tax:—

- accredited priests or ministers of any religious denomination,
- members of the Ceylon Defence Force,
- Railway Telegraph linesmen, and
- persons over 55 years of age.

(2) Any person who has paid the land tax imposed by the Committee for any year shall, from the date of such payment, be exempt from the liability to pay the capitation tax for that year.

*Preparation of Lists.*

2. The person or persons authorized in that behalf in writing by the Chairman shall, on or before December 1 in each year, prepare in such form as may be specified by the Chairman, a list of all persons resident within the village area who are liable to pay the capitation tax for the next succeeding year.

3. The chief occupier of every house shall, whenever required by the Chairman or by any duly authorized person, fill in to the best of his knowledge any form supplied to him for the purpose of the preparation of the list, or furnish all such information, written or oral, as may be required, relating to the number of persons resident in the house (including the householder himself), and the name, age, race, and other particulars of each such person.

4. The list prepared in each year shall be kept at the office of the Village Committee or at any other suitable place appointed by the Chairman and shall be open for inspection to the public from December 1 to 31 of that year.

5. Any person whose name is included in the list may by a written statement addressed to the Chairman on or before January 31 next succeeding, object to the inclusion of his name in the list on the ground that he is not a voter, or that he has ceased to be resident in the village, or that he is exempted by by-law 1 from the liability to pay the capitation tax. The Chairman shall, after holding such inquiry as he may consider necessary, make such order as may seem to him just.

6. Any person not already exempted under by-law 1 may, on or before February 15, make a written application to the Chairman for exemption from the liability to pay the capitation tax for that year. The Chairman may exempt such person from such liability for that year, or for life, or for such other period as he may think fit, on the ground that such person is by reason of bodily infirmity or disease, incapable of performing labour.

7. The list shall be revised in accordance with the orders made by the Chairman under by-law 5, and with the exemptions granted under by-law 6, and shall be certified under the hand of the Chairman, on or before March 1, as the final list of the persons liable to pay the capitation tax for that year.

*Annual programme of work.*

8. (1) The Committee shall at a meeting to be held on or before March 15 in each year—

- (a) prepare a programme of all the items of work which have to be constructed or maintained during that year;
- (b) determine the number of days for which each person included in the final list should be called upon to perform labour for that year in payment of the capitation tax due from him.
- (c) determine the rate, not exceeding fifty cents in respect of each day, at which the labour due from any person may be commuted by payment of money.

(2) Notice of the matters determined by the Committee under paragraph (1) shall be published by the Chairman as soon as may be, by beat of tom-tom in the village area and by the exhibition of written notices in conspicuous places in that area.

9. In the case of any item of work not included in the programme referred to in by-law 8 (1), any person included in the final list may be called upon to contribute labour for an additional period, but so however, that the total period for which any one person may be called upon to perform labour in any year does not exceed ten days.

*Commutation of tax.*

10. Any person whose name is in the final list prepared for any year may commute his liability to perform labour for that year by making payment of money at the rate determined by the Committee under by-law 8 (1), on or before March 31 or such later date in that year as the Committee may fix with the approval of the Executive Committee of Local Administration.

11. Not less than one week before the date appointed by the Chairman for the commencement of any item of work, information shall be given in the village area by beat of tom-tom, and by the exhibition of written notices under the hand of the Chairman, specifying the place at which the work is to be done, the persons who are required to perform the labour necessary, the number of days for which each person has to contribute labour and the hours of work on each such day. The persons required to contribute labour may be described in the notice either by name or as inhabitants of any specified village or part of a village or group of villages.

12. (1) Every person who elects to commute his liability to perform labour by making payment of money shall pay the money to such officer and at such place as may for the time being be appointed by the Committee.

(2) A written receipt in such form as may be provided for the purpose by the Committee shall be issued under the hand of the officer to whom such payment is made.

*Performance of labour.*

13. Every person whose name appears in the final list referred to in by-law 7 and who has not commuted his liability to perform labour, shall attend with such implements and tools as may be necessary and perform labour on the days and at the time and place specified in such notice as may be issued, exhibited or published by the Chairman in that behalf.

*Performance of commutation of double labour.*

14. Every person who fails to perform labour on any day on which he is required to do so by by-law 13, shall be deemed to be in default on that day and shall be liable to perform double labour, that is to say, labour for two days in respect of each day for which he is in default.

15. Any person who is liable to perform double labour may commute his liability to perform such double labour by making payment of money at the rate determined under by-law 8 (1) provided that no person shall be permitted to make payment of money in commutation of the liability to perform such double labour after the expiry of a period of one month from the earliest day in respect of which he is in default.

16. Every person who is liable to perform double labour under by-law 14 and has not made payment in commutation thereof under by-law 15 shall attend with such implements and tools as may be necessary and perform labour on such days and at such time and place as may be specified in a notice which shall be issued by the Chairman. Such notice shall not require any person to perform labour for any period exceeding in length the total number of days for which such person is liable to perform labour under by-law 14.

17. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee;

“Committee” means the Village Committee;

“list” means the list of persons liable to pay the capitation tax in a village area.

18. The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 7,631 of February 24, 1928, and *Gazette* No. 7,636 of March 30, 1928, and therein called “Rules” are hereby rescinded in so far as they relate to these village areas.

## Offensive and Dangerous Trades.

1. (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades:—

- Storing of artificial manure or of materials used for the preparation of artificial manure.
- Storing of perishable articles of food and provisions, for the purposes of sale by wholesale.
- Storing of coconuts.
- Manufacture of compost or artificial manure.
- Manufacture of vinegar.
- Manufacture of honey, treacle, or jaggery.
- Curing and manufacturing of rubber.
- Making of soap.
- Burning of lime.
- Burning of bricks and tiles.
- Tanning.
- Curing arecanuts.
- Boiling blood or offal.
- Making or extracting fat.
- Dyeing fibre.
- Storing maldive fish, salt fish or dry fish in any quantity over 5 cwts.
- Storing lime, hides, bones in any quantity over three gunny bags.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades:—

- Storing copra.
- Storing straw.
- Storing firewood.
- Trades using machinery driven by oil or other fuel, steam or electricity.
- Storing and sale of kerosene oil.
- Storing and sale of textiles.
- Keeping of a timber shed.
- Keeping of a smithy.
- Keeping of a carpenter's shed or workshop for wood-work or metal products.

Keeping of a motor repair shop or a place for building bodies for vehicles.

Keeping of a garage for housing motor buses or lorries.

Keeping of mills run by machinery.

Keeping of smoke rooms for the smoking and manufacturing of rubber sheets or crepe.

Extracting of oil by apparatus.

Quarrying for metal, cabook or gravel.

2. No person shall carry on an offensive or dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman. Every such licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on an offensive or a dangerous trade unless—

(a) the site on which the trade is to be carried on is approved by the Chairman ;

(b) every building used for the purpose of such trade is well ventilated and well lighted, and provided with sufficient drains ;

(c) the walls of such building are plastered with lime-mortar and whitewashed ; and

(d) (in the case of any offensive trade), the premises of such trade are provided with outlets to convey any noxious or offensive effluvia, vapours or gases emitted in the course of such trade in a manner not prejudicial to the health of the inhabitants of the village area.

4. Every licensee shall cause all materials which emit noxious or offensive effluvia, vapours or gases to be stored in such manner as to prevent such materials from emitting such effluvia, vapours or gases, and shall cause such materials to be conveyed along any public thoroughfare in covered boxes or other receptacles that have been approved by the Chairman or by a person duly authorised by him in writing.

5. Every licensee shall take all necessary steps to ensure that—

(a) the floors of every building and the drains within the premises used for the purposes of the offensive or dangerous trade are in a good state of repair and are cleaned daily ;

(b) the walls of every such building are kept in good repair so as to prevent the absorption of filth and are white-washed once a year, or as often as is directed by the Chairman ;

(c) every vessel, receptacle, utensil, or instrument used in the premises is cleaned daily ;

(d) all refuse and sweepings are removed daily from the premises in covered receptacles, unless such refuse and sweepings are intended to be forthwith subjected to any further trade processes on the premises.

6. No person carrying on any offensive trade shall pollute any river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water.

7. Every licensee who carries on any such trade shall keep the premises in a sanitary condition and shall provide suitable sanitary conveniences for his workmen and shall ensure that such conveniences are kept at all times in a clean and sanitary condition.

8. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer authorised by him in writing to enter and inspect at all reasonable times any lands or premises used for the purposes of such trade and the licensee or the person in charge shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

#### Kraals.

9. No person shall erect or maintain any kraals for soaking coconut husk or timber in any public lake, river, lagoon or estuary except on a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.

10. No licence shall be issued in respect of a kraal that obstructs any ferry, estuary or irrigation work.

11. Every licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

#### Sale of Provisions.

12. No person shall keep any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables or other perishable articles of food, except on a licence duly obtained in that behalf from the Chairman. Every such licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in each year.

13. The owner or seller of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables or other perishable articles of food in any shop or place (other than a market) shall keep the meat, poultry and fish apart from the vegetables, and the poultry in baskets so made that the birds may not suffer unnecessary discomfort.

14. The Chairman or any person duly authorised by him in writing may inspect any shop (other than a market) used for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, vegetables, or other perishable articles of food for human consumption.

15. (1) No meat shall be transported from any slaughter-house to any shop or place where meat is sold except in a box or vehicle which satisfies the conditions set out in the next following paragraph.

(2) (a) Every box used for the transport of meat must have the inside lined with zinc or other impermeable material and be fitted with a lid.

(b) Every vehicle used for the transport of meat must be provided with—

(i.) a roof to protect the meat from the sun or rain or from contamination by flies or dust ;

(ii.) a covering at each open end to screen the meat from public view ; and

(iii.) a compartment the inside of which is lined with zinc or other impermeable material for storing the meat.

(3) Where any meat is transported in contravention of paragraph (1) the person liable for such contravention shall be the person on whose behalf or at whose directions the meat was so transported.

Every holder of a licence shall keep the premises in a clean and sanitary condition and close up all rat holes with cement and glass.

#### Licences.

16. The licensee shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position the licence issued under these by-laws, but where such licence cannot be affixed shall cause a board to be affixed with the licence number and the name of the licensee clearly painted in a conspicuous place in the premises or place where such trade is carried on.

17. On a second or subsequent conviction for a breach of any of the rules under which the licence was issued, such licence shall be liable to be cancelled by the Court.

#### Dairies and the Sale of Milk.

18. No person shall at any time offer for sale, sell, hawk, deliver, expose or carry for sale within the village area, any milk which has been produced within that area unless he is at that time the licensee of a dairy of four or more cows, or a vendor of milk to whom a card of registration has been issued under by-law 34.

19. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any officer duly authorised in writing to enter and inspect at all reasonable times any dairy or premises used for such purposes and the licensee or person in charge shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

20. No person shall keep a dairy of four or more cows unless he is the holder of a licence issued by the Chairman.

21. No licence to keep a dairy of four or more cows shall be issued to any person unless the premises in respect of which the licence is to be issued are in conformity with the following requirements :—

(1) Every building or shed on the premises, intended for the accommodation of cattle must—

(a) be built of brick, stone, cabook or wood ;

(b) have its walls and pillars limewashed ;

(c) have a roof constructed of durable materials ;

(d) have its floor paved with brick or stone, rendered in cement concrete or asphalt ;

(e) have drains for the purpose of conveying urine, washings, and waste water into one or more covered receptacles, such drains being paved with brick or stone rendered in cement concrete or asphalt ; and

(f) be proportionate in size to the number of cows to be kept in the dairy, allowing for each cow a floor space not less than eight feet in length and five feet in width and a minimum air space of four hundred cubic feet.

(2) The building or shed on the premises, intended for use as a milk room must—

(a) be in a suitable position, at a distance of not less than twenty-five feet from the cowshed or other buildings and not less than one hundred feet from any latrine, cesspit, ashpit, permanent manure heap or open sewer ;

(b) have walls not less than seven feet in height, built of stone, brick, or cabook, and plastered or limewashed on the inside ;

(c) have at least two opposite walls abutting on the open air ;

(d) have its floor cemented, and the junction of the floor with the walls rounded off with cement ;

(e) have a ceiling which is constructed of grooved and oil painted boards capable of preventing the ingress of dust ;

(f) have the eaves of the roof at least six feet above the level of the ground ;

(g) have at least one window and one door, the area of the window space being not less than one-fifteenth of the floor space of the room ; and have each window and door covered with fly-proof netting, and one window facing at least one door ;

(h) be provided with a table covered with marble, slate, zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman, and with a sanitary dust bin and a suitable rack for storing clean bottles.

22. The licensee shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of the premises a board on which the phrase "Licensed Dairy" and its Sinhalese equivalent are clearly painted.

23. Every licensee shall keep in the dairy, so as to be available for inspection at any time, a list of the names and addresses of all employees including the vendors of milk and a register containing the names and addresses of all persons to whom he supplies milk.

24. The licensee shall take all necessary steps to ensure that—

- (a) the walls of every room forming part of the dairy are limewashed and the woodwork is washed with hot water and soap at least twice a year in the months of June and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing;
- (b) the floors and the top of the milk room table are washed at least once every day;
- (c) every part of the dairy, its surroundings and drains are kept clean and in good repair;
- (d) all dung, refuse, urine, and washings are removed from the dairy at least once a day and disposed of at a suitable distance from the dairy in such manner as to cause no nuisance;
- (e) all cattle food, other than grass or straw, is stored in suitable rat-proof receptacles; and
- (f) all utensils, furniture and other requisites used in or belonging to a dairy are kept clean.

25. The licensee shall not cause or permit—

- (a) any milk to be poured into any vessel which is not thoroughly cleansed;
- (b) milk to be stored in any vessel other than a vessel made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware or enamelled or galvanized iron;
- (c) any vessel used for the storage of milk to be kept in any place other than the milk room;
- (d) milk for the purposes of sale to be drawn from any cow unless, immediately before time of milking, the udder and teats of the cow are thoroughly cleaned and wiped with a clean damp cloth, and unless the hands of the person milking are also thoroughly washed and cleaned;
- (e) milk intended for sale to be kept in any place other than the milk room; or
- (f) any animal or bird to enter or remain in the milk room for any purpose whatsoever.

26. The licensee shall provide for the purposes of the dairy only water obtained from a source approved by the Chairman.

27. (1) The licensee shall not allow any milk vessel, butter vessel, churn separator, or other article used in the dairy to be used for any purpose other than the purposes of the dairy; and shall cause each such vessel, churn, separator or other article to be washed after each occasion on which it is used, first with cold water, then with boiling water and soda, and finally with water which has been boiled and cooled.

(2) The licensee shall cause the brushes used in cleansing vessels and other dairy requisites to be boiled for ten minutes each time after use.

28. The licensee shall cause every vessel in the dairy containing milk to be adequately protected with a clean cover or lid; and shall take all precautions to prevent milk from being contaminated during transit.

29. The licensee shall not use the milk room or permit it to be used for any purpose other than that of storing and preparing milk.

30. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any infectious, contagious, or cutaneous disease, or who has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by the licensee or any person in charge of the dairy or milk room to enter the dairy or milk room or to take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of milk, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

31. The licensee shall give immediate notice to the Chairman of any case or suspected case of infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, which may occur among the persons employed in the dairy.

32. The licensee shall not sell, or cause or permit to be sold the milk of any cow suffering from tuberculosis whether of the udder or otherwise, acute mastitis, foot-and-mouth disease, anthrax, or actinomyces of the udder; or add such milk or cause or permit it to be added to any milk which is intended for sale for human consumption.

33. The licensee shall not sell or supply to any person milk obtained from any cow other than a cow kept in a licensed dairy.

34. The Chairman shall issue annually to the owner of every licensed dairy in respect of each vendor of milk or to any other person who desire to sell or hawk milk a card of registration bearing the name and thumb impression of the vendor, and the name of the licensee and the registered number of the dairy. No such card of registration shall be issued until a Medical Officer authorised in writing by the Chairman has examined and found such vendor to be free from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease. Such card of registration shall not be transferable.

35. (1) The Chairman, or any officer authorised in writing by the Chairman, may at any time demand and take a sample of milk for analysis, on payment of the value thereof, from any licensed dairy or from any person selling, exposing, hawking, or delivering milk from a licensed dairy.

(2) No licensee or registered vendor or other person shall refuse to comply with a demand lawfully made under paragraph (1).

#### Tax on Vehicles and Animals.

36. The by-laws relating to the tax on vehicles and animals published in *Gazette* No. 8,606 of April 26, 1940, are hereby amended in so far as they relate to these village areas by the substitution, in by-law 7 thereof, for the words "was issued" of the words "was issued and no person shall use such plate on any other vehicle".

#### Interpretation.

37. In these by-laws unless the context otherwise requires—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Village Committee; "Medical Officer of Health" includes a Field Medical Officer;

"Village area" means the Udapalata village area or the Bogoda village area as the case may be;

"Village Committee" means the Village Committee of Udapalata village area or Bogoda village area as the case may be.

## New Clothing Books—Instructions to Dealers.

EACH page in the new clothing book has a border on the four sides consisting of a shaded strip and of a white strip. The water mark is most easily visible on this border, especially on the white portion of it. It is therefore necessary that when a coupon is cut out of the book the portion of the border adjacent to the coupon right up to the very edge, should go with it, and that the border and the coupon should appear together when pasted on tissue paper, to be surrendered to a wholesaler or to the coupon bank. The following instructions are given to dealers for this purpose:—

(1) A dealer must not accept coupons unless the coupon book with the cover on which the name and address

of the holder and the number of his rice ration book or token card are entered is produced. He must cut out the coupon himself.

(2) Before cutting out the coupons from the book the dealer must satisfy himself that they bear the water mark which is most easily visible on the borders. He must cut out the coupon with the adjacent part of the border, including both the shaded and the white strip. Where the border adjoins the coupon on two sides the coupon must be cut out with the corresponding portion of both borders. The top border includes the broad strip on which the word "Senior" or "Junior" are printed. When a top coupon is cut out it must include the corresponding portion of both this broad strip and of the border beyond.

(3) Where more than one coupon any one page of a book are surrendered at the same time they must be cut out in one piece and pasted on the tissue paper in one piece.

(4) The coupon thus cut out must be pasted on tissue paper with the borders absolutely impact; and in pasting the coupons no part of any coupon, whether the printed portion or the border, should be allowed to over-lap any part of another coupon.

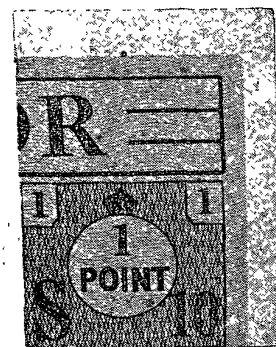
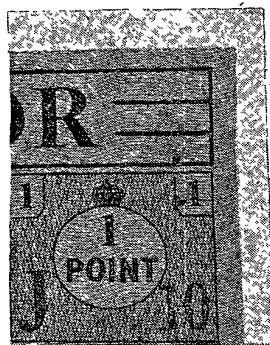
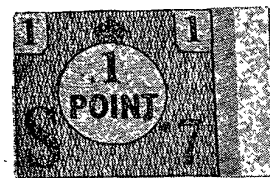
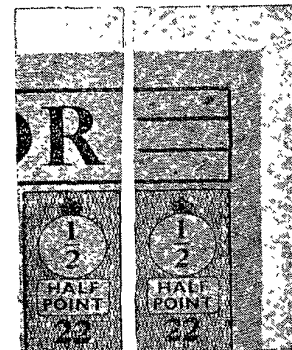
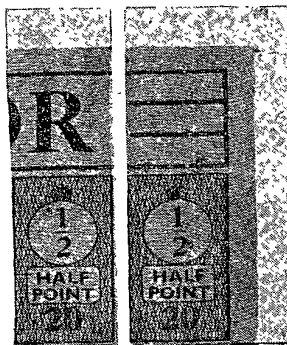
Wholesalers are hereby authorized to refuse, and the coupon bank will refuse, to accept any coupons which do not have the corresponding part of the border attached to them.

(5) It is noticed that dealers use tissue paper of different degrees of thickness to paste coupons. They are required hereafter to use fine tissue paper of the same thickness as that which is supplied by the Textiles Control Department.

(6) One point coupons and half-point coupons must not be pasted on the same sheet of tissue paper. They must be pasted in separate sheets. A full sheet will contain 100 half-point coupons or 100 one-point coupons, and only such full sheets should be surrendered at the coupon bank.

(7) All rules which are now current relating to the formation of coupon sheets and their surrender which are not inconsistent with the above paragraphs will continue to be in force.

(8) The coupons when cut out and pasted on tissue paper will look like this:

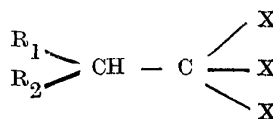

"Manufacture of aqueous emulsions for insecticidal purposes".

*Abstract.*—The inventor states that substances having the general chemical formula:—



where X means chlorine or bromine, R<sub>1</sub> an organic radical having at least 3 carbon atoms and R<sub>2</sub> an organic radical having at least five carbon atoms have marked insecticidal action even in low concentrations while being non-irritant to the mucous membrane of the throat, nose and eyes of human beings.

An insecticidal spray is made by dissolving the substance in an organic solvent, adding an emulsifying agent soluble in the solvent and while stirring well, pouring this mixture into water. Alternatively, the emulsifier is dissolved partly or wholly in the water, and the solution of the insecticidal compound is mixed therewith.

There are 4 claims and 5 examples.

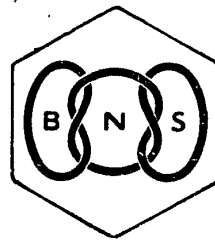

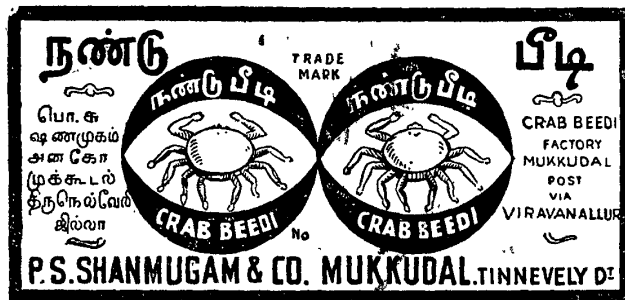

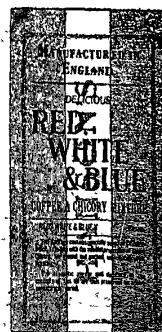

### Regulation.

The regulations under section 10 (2) of the Naval Volunteer Ordinance published in the *Supplement to Gazette* No. 8,332 of November 26, 1937, as amended by any subsequent regulation, are hereby further amended by the addition, immediately after regulation 27, of the following new regulation:—

28. (1) Any member of the Force called into actual service may, at any time during the period of such actual service, be placed on compulsory leave by the Commanding Officer of the Force by notice given or published in such manner as he may deem adequate.

(2) A member of the Force who is placed on compulsory leave as hereinbefore provided shall not be entitled to any pay or allowance or to any other benefit or to any relief for his wife or family under any other provision of these regulations in respect of the period of such leave, notwithstanding that he is on actual service during that period.

(3) Any member of the Force who is placed on compulsory leave as hereinbefore provided may, at any time while he is on actual service, be recalled from such leave by notice served or published in such manner as the Commanding Officer may deem adequate; and upon the service or publication of such notice, the compulsory leave of that member shall be determined and that member shall be bound to attend in person on such date and at such place as may be specified in the notice and to perform such service as may be required under the orders of the Captain-in-Charge or the Senior Naval Officer, Ceylon.

#### TODDY RENT SALE CONDITIONS FOR 1946-47 AND SUBSEQUENT PERIODS.

THE Governor has, under section 18 of the Excise Ordinance, directed that the grant of the exclusive privilege of selling fermented toddy by retail within any local area, during the period commencing on October 1, 1946, and ending on September 30, 1947, and subsequent periods shall until further notice be subject—

- (1) to the General Conditions for the time being in force and applicable to all Excise Licences; and
- (2) to the special conditions set out hereunder.

#### SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

##### 1. (1) *Periods of Privilege.*—

(a) The privilege shall be granted—

- (i.) for the period commencing on July 1 of any one year and ending on June 30 of the next succeeding year, in respect of all toddy taverns in the Mannar District of the Northern Province, in the Vavuniya District of the Northern Province, and in the Eastern Province (except in the case of Alampil, Valayanmadam, Kanagarayankulam, and Kurisuddakulam taverns in the Vavuniya District of the Northern Province); and
  - (ii.) for the period commencing on October 1 of any one year and ending on September 30 of the next succeeding year, in respect of all toddy taverns in other Provinces.
- or for any shorter period within these twelve months, on application by way of tender in the form or by auction in the manner prescribed in these conditions.

(b) In the case of Alampil, Valayanmadam, Kanagarayankulam and Kurisuddakulam toddy taverns in the Vavuniya District of the Northern Province the privilege shall be granted for the period commencing on March 1 of any one year and ending on September 30 of the same year, or for any shorter period within these seven months on application as aforesaid.

##### (2) *Areas for which Privilege granted.*—

The privilege may be granted for the local area of an individual tavern, or for the respective local areas of each tavern in a group of taverns, as the Government Agent may decide.

##### 2. *Tapping areas, and Number of Trees allowed for Tapping.*—

(1) Tapping areas, particulars of which may be obtained from the Superintendent of Excise of each Circle, will be allotted for all taverns other than those situated within the limits of the Colombo Municipality or in the Chilaw District, and licences to tap trees outside the tapping area allotted to a tavern will not be issued without the sanction of the Excise Commissioner previously obtained in writing.

(2) The number of trees that will be allowed to be licensed for tapping will be estimated on the basis of the previous period's sale figures, with due regard to the likely increase or decrease of sales.

(3) Trees situated even within the tapping areas allotted are liable to be disallowed on the ground of inaccessibility, distance from one another, situation in relation to places of worship, or of cemeteries, or of illicit consumption or sale, or for other similar reasons. The final arrangements for the lease of the trees should therefore be made only after the topics specified in the application are approved by the Superintendent of Excise.

##### 3. *Tender Form.*—

Every tender shall be made on the form set out hereunder. Forms may be obtained from the offices indicated in the sale notice.

##### 4. *Tender Deposit.*—

(1) The Government Agent may, if he considers it necessary, require the deposit of a sum not exceeding Rupees Five hundred (Rs. 500) by the tenderer in respect of each tender.

(2) Every tender shall be accompanied by a Kacheheri receipt acknowledging the deposit of the sum required by the Government Agent under the foregoing paragraph of this condition, and the number and date of the receipt shall be entered on the face of the tender form.



5. *Prohibition of Tenders by Agents or of more than one tender by any Person.*—

- (1) Every tender or bid shall be made by the tenderer or bidder in his own name. No tender or bid, made through an agent, will be accepted.
- (2) No person shall send in more than one tender for any one tavern or group of taverns.

6. *Disqualifications against Acceptance of Tenders ; Acceptance null and void.*—

- (1) No tender will be accepted from any person—
- (a) whose name appears on the list of defaulting contractors, or on the list of defaulters in respect of any kind of Excise licence or of toll rents, or on the list of persons precluded for other reasons from having any concern in any Government rent or contract ; or
- (b) whose name is on the Excise register of offenders ; or
- (c) who is a registered criminal within the meaning of the Prevention of Crimes Ordinance, or who has been convicted of any grave crime or of any Excise offence ; or
- (d) who at any time held a licence which has been cancelled under section 26 of the Excise Ordinance.
- (2) If any tender of any such person has been accepted the Government Agent may in his sole discretion cancel the acceptance at any time during the period of the privilege, and shall communicate his order of cancellation to the grantee. On the making of any such order of cancellation, the original acceptance shall become null and void.

7. *Delivery of Tenders.*—

- (1) Every tender shall be placed in a sealed envelope, on the top left-hand corner of which shall be clearly marked the name of the tavern in respect of which the tender is made and its number on the list of sanctioned taverns, or the designation of the group of taverns in respect of which the tender is made as given in the notice calling for tenders, as the case may be.
- (2) Every sealed envelope containing a tender shall—
- (a) be deposited in the Kachcheri tender box ; or
- (b) be handed to the Government Agent or to his Assistant ; or
- (c) be sent by registered post addressed to the Government Agent so as to reach the Kachcheri, before the time fixed for closing the tenders,

8. (1) *Power of rejection of Tender.*—

The Government Agent may in his discretion reject any or all of the tenders received ; and in the event of his so rejecting all tenders, he may call for tenders again or put up the privilege, either at once or after further notice, for sale by auction.

(2) *Restriction of Bidding at Auction.*—

At such auction no person shall be allowed to bid, unless he shall have either—

- (a) submitted a tender accompanied by the Kachcheri receipt prescribed in condition 4, whether such tender be for the particular privilege to be auctioned or for any other privilege ; or,
- (b) produced the receipt prescribed in condition 4, notwithstanding his failure to submit a tender for the particular privilege to be auctioned or for any other privilege.

Provided that no person who is duly declared the purchaser of any privilege, whether by way of tender or of auction, shall use or be permitted to use the same receipt for the purpose of a tender or a bid for any other privilege, until he has completed in respect of the privilege already granted to him the steps prescribed hereinafter in condition 9 (1) (a).

(3) *Power of Rejection of Bid.*—

The privilege shall be granted to the highest bidder at such auction : Provided that the Government Agent may in his discretion reject any or all of the bids made at such auction.

(4) *Procedure after Rejection of all Bids.*—

In the event of the rejection of all bids as aforesaid, the Government Agent may in his discretion—

- (a) call for further tenders for the privilege for any single tavern or for sub-groups of two or more taverns included in any group of taverns, or for any combination of parts of groups or of whole groups of taverns either at once or after further notice, and accept or reject all or any tenders so received, and thereafter, put up for sale by auction the privilege for any single tavern or sub-groups or combinations as aforesaid for which the further tenders were rejected, either at once or after further notice, and accept or reject all or any bids so received ; or
- (b) put up for sale by auction the privilege for any single tavern or for sub-groups of two or more taverns included in any group of taverns, or for any combination of parts of groups or of whole groups of taverns either at once or after further notice, and accept or reject all or any bids so received ; or
- (c) grant the privilege for the tavern, or group, or any single tavern or sub-group of two or more taverns included in a group or for any combination of parts of groups or of whole groups of taverns to any person, who is approved by the Government Agent, and who agrees to pay by way of rent such amount as the Government Agent may fix.

(5) *Procedure after Rejection of further Bids.*—

In the event of the rejection of the bids received under paragraphs 4 (a) and 4 (b) of this condition, the Government Agent may in his discretion take action under paragraph 4 (c).

9. (1) (a) *Security Deposit.*—

The grantee shall, immediately on being declared to be the purchaser of the privilege, sign these conditions, and pay to the Government Agent as a security deposit a sum equivalent to two months' rent payable for that privilege.

(b) *Signing of Bond.*—

The grantee shall also within fourteen days of his being declared to be the purchaser of the privilege enter into a bond with the Government Agent for the full amount for which he has purchased it, and he shall specially hypothecate by such bond the said security deposit.

(c) *Consequences of Breach of Condition of Bond.*—

The said security deposit shall be liable to be confiscated, either in whole or in part, by the Government Agent, at his sole discretion and without any process of law, for breach of any of these conditions or of any of the conditions of the licence or licences referred to in condition 12 (2) below, or for non-payment of any instalment, and such confiscation shall be in addition to any other penalty prescribed by these conditions for such breach or non-payment, and to any other amount which the Crown may have the right to claim and recover by due process of law.

(2) *Banking of Security Deposit.*—

Security money so paid will be deposited in a bank only on the grantee's application and only at his risk, and when such deposit is made, no withdrawal will be allowed till the date of maturity.

(3) *Warrant or Power of Attorney to confess Judgment.*—

If the highest bid or tender under condition 8 exceeds the sum of Rs. 2,000 the grantee shall at the time of the execution of the bond as aforesaid execute, if so required by the Government Agent, a warrant or power of attorney in the form sanctioned by law, to confess judgment in any action which may be instituted against him for the recovery of any moneys due in respect of this privilege, and shall also furnish to the Government Agent within fifteen days of the date of the execution of such warrant or power of attorney a duly certified copy thereof for filing in the District Court under section 32 of the Civil Procedure Code.

(4) *Registered Postal Address.*—

The grantee shall, on signing these conditions, elect and signify under his hand a post office or postal address to which all notices and processes whatever in connection with the privilege may be addressed; and all such notices or processes so addressed to such post office or to such postal address, and posted in due course, shall be deemed to have been duly served and be as effectual for all purposes, as if they had been served upon the grantee in person upon the day on which such notice or process was so posted.

10. *Failure to complete Purchase of Privilege.*—

If any tenderer or bidder, on being declared to be the purchaser of the privilege, declines or fails to sign these conditions of sale, or fails to furnish the security prescribed in condition 9 (1) (a) when called upon to do so, the deposit made under condition 4 will be declared forfeited, and the defaulter will render himself liable to have his name entered in the list of defaulters in respect of all Excise licences. Subject to this exception, the deposits of all tenderers or bidders will be returned, after the conditions of sale have been signed and the aforesaid security given by the successful tenderer or bidder.

11. *Grantee to have no Interests in certain Arrack and Foreign Liquor Sales and Toddy Estate Canteens.*—

The grantee shall not acquire or hold any share or any interests, whether direct or indirect—

(a) *Within the local area to which the privilege of selling toddy relates—*

- (i.) in the sale of arrack, or
- (ii.) in the purchase of any privilege of selling arrack, or
- (iii.) in the sale of foreign liquor, or
- (iv.) in the purchase of any privilege of selling foreign liquor, or

(b) *Within the Revenue District to which the privilege of selling toddy relates, in any toddy estate canteen.*12. (1) *Opening of Tavern on due Date and Approval of Site.*—

(a) The grantee shall open the tavern or taverns on the day on which the privilege commences to run.

(b) The Government Agent shall not be bound to find a site for any tavern in the event of the grantee not being able to procure a site.

(c) The grantee shall not open a tavern on any site otherwise than with the approval of the Government Agent, such approval being obtained from the Government Agent at least fourteen days before the privilege commences to run.

(2) *Obtaining of Licences for Sale of Toddy.*—

The grantee shall, not less than five days before the date on which the privilege commences to run, obtain from the Government Agent a licence or licences for the sale by retail of fermented toddy at the tavern or taverns within the local area covered by this privilege.

13. (1) *Application for Licensing of Trees.*—

The grantee shall, at least twenty-one days before the date on which the privilege commences to run, furnish to the Superintendent of Excise an application on the prescribed form, showing the numbers and the situation of the trees which he proposes to tap for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at each tavern, and the situation and numbers of the collecting stations for toddy which he proposes to establish; and no trees shall be tapped or toddy drawn in pursuance of this privilege otherwise than under cover of a tapping licence setting forth the numbers and the situation of such trees, the name of the drawer, the name of the owner or possessor of such trees, and the tavern for which the fermented toddy is intended.

(2) *Licences for Additional Trees.*—

Any application for a licence to tap additional trees for any tavern shall be made to the Superintendent of Excise in like manner three weeks before the grantee intends to commence the tapping of such trees.

(3) *Tapping Areas for Taverns.*—

Except in cases where the Excise Commissioner's previous sanction has been obtained in writing the Superintendent of Excise will not issue any licence to tap any tree situated outside the tapping area allotted to that tavern.

(4) *Power to refuse or cancel Licences.*—

Subject to appeal to the Excise Commissioner, whose decision shall be final, the Superintendent of Excise shall have power to refuse any application for a licence to tap additional trees for any tavern, and to cancel any tapping licence, the continuance of which appears to him to be unnecessary or open to objection.

(5) *Special Temporary Licences.*—

Special licences for tapping and drawing fermented toddy from trees already tapped for sweet (unfermented) toddy will be allowed in order to meet a temporary special demand for festivals and such other contingencies for any period not exceeding two weeks duration, provided however that such special licences will not be granted in respect of trees tapped for sweet toddy in dry areas.

14. (1) (a) *Marking of Trees.*—

The grantee shall not—

permit any tree to be tapped or toddy to be drawn from any tree for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at any tavern, unless such tree has first been marked for the purpose in the manner prescribed by the Excise Commissioner; or

(b) *Transport Passes.*—

permit any toddy to be transported to any tavern otherwise than under cover of a pass issued to him under the hand of the Superintendent of Excise, and setting forth the name of the person who is to transport the toddy.

(2) *Separate Pass for each Carrier.*—

The grantee shall obtain separate passes for the transport of toddy by pingo carrier from the tree tope to the tavern or collecting station and for its transport by cart, lorry, or other vehicle from the collecting station to the tavern, and shall deliver the appropriate pass to such pingo carrier or to the person in charge of such cart, lorry, or other vehicle.

(3) *Separate Passes for each Person handling Toddy.*—

The grantee shall obtain a separate pass for each person employed in collecting or otherwise handling toddy at topes, collecting stations, or taverns.

15. *Establishment of Collecting Stations.*—

If toddy is to be transported in pursuance of this privilege by motor vehicle, cart, or railway, the grantee shall establish collecting stations on a road suitable for use by all motor traffic in places approved by the Superintendent of Excise, and shall obtain licences for such collecting stations. The grantee shall be bound by and conform to the conditions prescribed in the notifications relating to such collecting stations.

16. (1) *Vinegar Licence.*—

If the grantee wishes to make vinegar from surplus toddy, he may apply for a vinegar licence to the Government Agent, who shall however have full discretion to refuse to issue such licence.

(2) *Vinegar Store to be approved and Accounts kept.*—

If a licence to make vinegar from surplus toddy has been issued to the grantee, he shall store such vinegar in premises approved by the Government Agent, and shall keep a true account in the form prescribed by the Excise Commissioner of all toddy converted into vinegar, and of all sales of vinegar.

(3) *Inspection by Excise Officers.*—

The grantee shall cause such vinegar store to be opened for inspection at the request of any Excise Officer not below the rank of Inspector, and shall produce the accounts kept therein whenever called upon to do so.

17. *Bottling of Toddy.*—

(a) The Excise Commissioner may, in his absolute discretion, issue or authorize the issue of a licence to—

- (i) any grantee to bottle toddy at duly approved premises other than premises licensed for the retail sale of liquor and to sell such bottled toddy by retail at his toddy tavern or taverns, and by wholesale at his bottling premises to any other grantee for retail sale by such other grantee only at such other grantee's tavern or taverns, or
- (ii) any other person to bottle toddy at duly approved premises as aforesaid and to sell by wholesale at such premises such bottled toddy only to renters of toddy taverns for retail sale by such renters at their licensed taverns under the provisions of Excise Notifications Nos. 344 and 345 published in *Gazette* No. 8,448 of April 28, 1939, as amended by any subsequent Notification.
- (iii) any foreign liquor licensee approved by him, in the local area of a toddy tavern, to sell by retail, bottled toddy obtained from that toddy tavern.

(b) No bottled toddy shall be transported to a toddy tavern for sale thereat except under a pass issued by the Assistant Commissioner of Excise.

(c) The sale of bottled toddy at a tavern shall be under the same restrictions and regulations to which the retail sale of ordinary toddy in bulk is subject.

18. (1) *Payment of Rent.*—

The grantee shall pay the purchase money or rent to the Government Agent in twelve equal monthly instalments.

(2) *Due date of Instalments.*—

The first instalment of rent shall be deemed to be due and payable on the last day of the month preceding the commencement of the period of the privilege as in condition 1, and the succeeding instalments shall be deemed to be severally due and payable on the last day of each succeeding month: Provided, however, that if any such day is a Sunday or a public holiday, the instalment of rent due and payable on such day shall be deemed to be due and payable on the day next following, which is not itself a public holiday or a Sunday as the case may be. Every instalment of rent shall be tendered at the Kachcheri Shroff's counter before 3 P.M. on a week day other than a Saturday or before 12 noon on a Saturday.

(3) *Interest and Penalty.*—

Interest at the rate of 9 per centum per annum shall be payable in respect of all arrears of rent. The payment of interest shall not be deemed to prejudice or affect the powers which may be exercised by the Government Agent under section 53 of the Ordinance in any case in which the licence issued to the grantee is liable to be cancelled under section 26.

19. (1) *Payments not valid without Kachcheri Receipt.*—

No payment of any sum due by the grantee to the Crown shall be deemed to have been duly made, unless the grantee produces a Kachcheri receipt in respect thereof.

(2) *Money left with Officers not reckoned as Money paid.*—

No money which, for his own convenience, the grantee may think fit to leave in the hands of any Shroff or any other officer of any Kachcheri shall be deemed to be money paid under this contract.

20. *Limit of Sale and Transport.*—

The limit of sale by retail with respect to the whole Island and as regards purchasers generally shall be one-third of an imperial gallon, and no toddy in excess of that quantity shall be removed by the grantee or sold at any one time to any person except on a valid permit or pass.

21. *Prohibition of Possession of Toddy in certain Dry Areas.*—

The transport or possession of toddy in any quantity whatsoever is entirely prohibited within the areas specified in Excise Notification No. 261 published in *Gazette* No. 8,046 of May 4, 1934, as amended by Excise Notification No. 323 published in *Gazette* No. 8,301 of July 9, 1937, except under a pass or permit granted in accordance therewith.

22. *Grantee responsible for Agents Acts.*—

The grantee shall be responsible for all acts of his agents and employees in relation to the privilege.

23. *Non-transferability of Privilege.*—

The privilege shall not be transferable otherwise than with the sanction of the Excise Commissioner first had and obtained.

24. (1) (a) *Cancellation of Licences and Privilege for Non-payment of Rent, &c.*—

If any instalment or part of any instalment of the purchase money or rent, or any duty, fee, composition fee, or other sum due to the Crown from the grantee, in respect of the grant or of the licence issued to him, remains unpaid, after the date on which it becomes due and payable, the grantee shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these conditions and of the conditions of the licence issued to him, and the Government Agent shall accordingly have power, without further process of law, either (i.) to suspend or cancel the licence or licences issued to the grantee in pursuance of the provisions of section 26 of the Excise Ordinance, or (ii.) to take the licence or grant under management at the risk of the grantee, or to declare the licence or grant forfeited and reissue or resell it at the risk and loss of the grantee in pursuance of the provisions of section 30 of the said Ordinance.

This condition does not in any way affect the Government Agent's powers to confiscate the security deposit in pursuance of the provisions of condition 9 above.

(b) *Intimation or Notice of Cancellation, &c.*—

Intimation of any order of suspension or cancellation, under the said section 26, or the statutory notice or order under the said section 30 may be served personally on the grantee, or addressed to the post office or postal address elected and signified under condition 9 (4), and duly posted, as the Government Agent thinks fit.

(2) *Regrant of Privilege between Cancellation and Resale.*—

In the event of the cancellation of a licence, the Government Agent shall have power to grant the privilege to any person approved by him for any period intervening between such cancellation and the resale of the privilege, and for this purpose may issue to such approved person a temporary licence upon such terms as he may think fit.

(3) *No Remission of Rent.*—

No remission of the rent payable in respect of the privilege will be granted on any plea of the grantee's having over-estimated the value of any tavern or on any other ground.

(4) *No Compensation of Losses.*—

The grantee shall not have or make any claim to any reduction, or to the remission, of any sum due and owing by him to the Crown by reason of any loss alleged to have been sustained by him—

- (a) whether on account of any closing of the tavern or taverns during the passage of troops, or during the encampment of troops in the vicinity of the tavern or taverns, or during the holding of any poll ; or
- (b) whether on account of any closing of the tavern or taverns by reason of such tavern or taverns being situated within or in the vicinity of an area declared to be a diseased locality ; or
- (c) whether on account of the opening of any new arrack, or foreign liquor tavern or estate canteen for arrack or toddy or foreign liquor, or any new foreign or country liquor premises of any other description licensed after the sale of the privilege under these conditions ; or
- (d) whether on account of the manufacture and drawing of fermented toddy on special licences issued by the Assistant Commissioner for *bona fide* domestic consumption on medical grounds, and not for sale ; or
- (e) whether on account of the manufacture and drawing of fermented toddy within the local area or areas of the privilege hereby granted for supply to licensed manufactories in which toddy is used in the process of manufacture ; or
- (f) whether on account of the unrestricted tapping, manufacture and drawing of sweet toddy without any licence or permit ; or
- (g) whether on account of the issue of a licence for bottling and sale of bottled toddy to any other grantee or person or on account of the grantee's inability to make satisfactory arrangements with any such bottling licensee for the supply of bottled toddy to his tavern or on account of the breach by any such licensee of any of the conditions of his licence for bottling and sale of bottled toddy ; or on account of the refusal of the Excise Commissioner to issue licences under the provisions of condition 17 (a) (iii.) above ; or
- (h) whether on account of the issue of licences for the manufacture and/or sale of other liquors within the local area or areas for which the privilege is granted ; or
- (i) through any other cause whatsoever.

25. *Termination of Privilege.*—

The privilege shall terminate on (a) the expiry of the term for which it is granted, (b) the death of the grantee, or (c) a breach of any of the conditions governing it.

26. *No Surrender of Licence.*—

The licence or licences referred to in condition 12 (2) above, being issued free of charge in pursuance of section 18 (2) of the Excise Ordinance to implement the contract between the Crown and the grantee, shall not be surrendered by the grantee under section 28 of the said Ordinance, except with the approval of the Government Agent previously obtained in writing.
