THE VILLAGE COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE.

Order.

WHEREAS by Proclamations the area now known as the town of Talaimannar consisting of Talaimannar Port and part of the villages of Talaimannar and Kaddukkaramkudiyiruppu in the Divisional Revenue Officer's Division of Mannar, in the Mannar District, of the Northern Province, has with effect from the first day of January, 1947, been excluded from the operation of the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance (Chapter 197) and brought within the operation of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), and added to the Mannar West village area of the aforesaid Divisional Revenue Officer's Division.

Now, therefore, by virtue of the powers vested in me by section 41 of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198) I, Henry Monck-Mason Moore, Governor of Ceylon, do by this Order, with effect from the first day of January, 1947 :—

- (a) transfer to the Village Committee of the aforesaid village area the whole of the property and the funds acquired or received by or vested in the Sanitary Board of the Mannar District for the use and benefit of the Town of Talaimannar and specified in Schedule A hereto ;
- (b) declare that such funds and the revenue derived from that part of the village area which is now known as the town of Talaimannar shall be employed by the Village Committee for the use and benefit of the aforesaid part of that area ;
- (c) direct the aforesaid Village Committee to keep separate books of accounts in respect of the aforesaid part of that village area ;

- (d) apportion and assign to the aforesaid Village Committee the whole of the rights, liabilities, debts or obligations of the Sanitary Board of the Mannar District under any contract entered into by the said Board for the benefit of the town of Talaimannar;
- (e) prescribe the terms and conditions set out in Schedule B hereto as the terms and conditions on which the officers or the servants specified in that Schedule and employed by the said Sanitary Board for purpose relating to the town of Talaimannar may be transferred to the service of the aforesaid Village Committee; and
- (f) direct the Assistant Government Agent of the Mannar District—(1) to collect all moneys due to the Sanitary Board of that District (whether as rates, taxes, licence duties, or otherwise), from the inhabitants of the area now known as the town of Talaimannar; (2) to recover such moneys in the manner in which they would have been recovered if that town had not been excluded from the operation of the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance; and (3) to pay such moneys when so collected and recovered to the Village Committee of the aforesaid village area.

By-laws.

The by-laws relating to cesspits made by the Sanitary Board of the Colombo District and published in *Gazette* No. 6,907 of November 9, 1917, are hereby amended in so far as they apply to the area within the administrative limits of the Urban Council of Avissawella as follows:—

- (1) by the rescission of by-laws 12 and 13;

- (2) in by-law 14 thereof, by the substitution, for all the words from "The fees due from such person" to "under by-law 12" of the following:—

"The fees due from such person shall be paid at the office of the Avissawella Urban Council on or before the last day of the month on which the service is rendered";

- (3) in by-law 16 thereof, by the substitution, for all the words from "such fees" to "under by-law 12", of the following:—

"The fees due from such person shall be paid at the office of the Avissawella Urban Council on or before the last day of the month during which the service is rendered."

By-laws.

The general by-laws relating to licences published in *Gazette* No. 7,772 of April 16, 1930, as amended by by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 8,867 of February 20, 1942, are hereby amended as follows:—

(i) by the omission of the heading "Lime Kilns" and of the by-laws 1 to 7 occurring thereunder; and

(ii) by the insertion immediately after the by-laws relating to Hairdressing Saloons or Barbers' Shops, of the following new by-laws:—

"Offensive or Dangerous Trades.

1. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless—

(i) the site on which that trade is to be carried on is approved by the Chairman; and

(ii) the building or buildings, if any, to be used for the purposes of the trade are in conformity with the following requirements—

- (a) the building must be at least one hundred and fifty feet distant from any dwelling house;
- (b) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted and provided with a sanitary dust bin, adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;
- (c) the building must be provided with outlets to convey any noxious or offensive effluvia, vapours or gases that will be emitted in the course of carrying on the trade, in a manner that is not prejudicial to the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood;
- (d) the roof of the building must be made of some permanent material;
- (e) the floor of the building must be made of some impermeable material and cemented;
- (f) the eaves of the building must be not less than six feet from the ground;
- (g) every room of the building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open must be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
- (h) the walls of every room in such building must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of brick, stone, or cobwork;
- (i) the internal surface of such walls to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered in cement, and the rest of the walls must be lime plastered and lime washed;
- (j) the wood work of the building must be oil painted or lime washed;
- (k) the building must be provided with an adequate supply of water for washing and drinking purposes; and
- (l) in any case where the building is to be used for a lime kiln, a separate room made of permanent materials and with a floor area of at least one hundred and twenty square feet must be provided in such building for storing burnt lime.

2. No licensee shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of, persons in the neighbourhood.

3. No licensee shall pollute or contaminate any well or tank, or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water.

4. Every licensee shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board on which his name, and the description of the offensive or dangerous trade, in English, Sinhalese and Tamil are clearly painted.

5. Every licensee shall take all the necessary steps to ensure that the licensed premises are kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

6. Every licensee shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purposes of the offensive or dangerous trade to be kept in good repair and swept daily;

- (b) the walls of every such building to be kept clean and to be lime washed at least once in twelve months;
- (c) the drains in the premises in which such trade is carried on to be kept in good repair and washed daily;
- (d) all apparatus, implements and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean;
- (e) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on.

7. Every licensee shall cause—

- (a) all materials required for carrying on any offensive or dangerous trade to be stored in such a manner as the prevent effluvia or other nuisance;
- (b) all materials which are likely to emit effluvia or cause other nuisance to be carried in non-absorbent covered receptacles whenever such materials are being carried along any public place or thoroughfare.

8. Every licensee shall cause any offensive vapours or gases which are emitted in the course of carrying on any offensive or dangerous trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effect; or
- (b) to be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus.

9. Every licensee shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be exhibited in a prominent place in the licensed premises.

10. Every licensee shall produce his licence whenever he is called upon to do so by the Chairman or person duly authorised by him in writing.

11. Where for the purposes of any offensive or dangerous trade skins or other materials are washed or soaked in tanks, the licensee shall, in order to prevent effluvia, cause such tanks to be emptied and cleaned on the completion of such washing or soaking.

12. Where the manufacture of bricks or tiles are carried on in any premises, the licensee shall take proper steps to ensure that all pits or trenches in such premises are covered in order to prevent stagnation of water.

13. The licensee shall not permit any part of the licensed premises to be used as a dwelling house except with the permission of the Chairman.

14. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Kalutara Urban Council."

By-laws.

1. (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades :—

Iceing of fish,
Boiling of offal or blood.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades :—

Manufacturing or storing of fibre,
Burning of lime.

2. (1) No person shall carry on an offensive or a dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) No licence shall be transferable.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on an offensive or a dangerous trade unless—

- (i) the place at which the trade is to be carried on is approved by the Medical Officer of Health; and
- (ii) the building or buildings, if any, to be used for the purpose of that trade are in conformity with the following requirements—

- (a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted, and provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;
- (b) the roof of such building must be made of some permanent material and the floor must be cemented;
- (c) the eaves of such building must be not less than six feet from the ground;
- (d) every room in such building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
- (e) the walls of every room in such building must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of bricks, stone or cabook;
- (f) the internal surface of such walls, to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered in cement and the rest of the walls must be lime-plastered and lime-washed;
- (g) the woodwork of such building must be oil-painted or lime-washed.

4. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued, any building used for the purpose of the offensive or dangerous trade to which the licence relates, ceases to conform to the provisions of by-law 3, the Chairman may, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do, before a day to be specified in the notice, all things necessary to make such building conform to such provisions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, the Chairman may cancel the licence.

5. Any notice under by-law 4 shall be deemed to have been served on the licensee if it is affixed to the premises at which the licensee carries on the offensive or dangerous trade or if it is left with any person employed in such premises by the licensee.

6. Every licensee shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purposes of the offensive or dangerous trade to be swept and cleaned daily;
- (b) the walls of every such building to be lime-washed at least once in every twelve months;
- (c) all apparatus, implements and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean;
- (d) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on.

7. No licensee shall pollute or contaminate any well or tank or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water.

8. No licensee shall carry on an offensive or a dangerous trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of, persons in the neighbourhood.

9. Every licensee shall cause any offensive vapours or gases which are omitted in the course of carrying on any offensive or dangerous trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such a manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effect; or
- (b) to be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus.

10. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer of the Committee authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any premises at which any offensive or dangerous trade is being carried on, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall permit such inspection to be made.

11. In these by-laws—

- “Chairman” means the Chairman of Committee;
 “Committee” means the Village Committee of the Talahena village area;
 “Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer;
 “Licence” means a licence issued under these by-laws;
 “Licensee” means a person to whom a licence is issued.

By-laws.

Bakeries, Eating-houses, Restaurants and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. In these by-laws—

- “Bakery” means any premises in which bread, biscuits or confectionery is baked for sale as food for human consumption and includes any premises in which such food is prepared, or in which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored;
 “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Village Committee;
 “Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

2. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any bakery except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 2, unless the premises to be used as a bakery are in conformity with the following requirements :—

- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime, mortar and white-washed;
- (c) the floor must be cemented;
- (d) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation and sufficient drains;
- (e) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof;
- (f) the premises must not be situated within fifty feet of any cesspit, permanent manure heap, latrine or open sewer;
- (g) the premises must be provided with a separate kneading room having superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 10 feet;
- (h) there must be a free external air space, not less than seven feet wide, on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contains doors or windows; and
- (i) the door of the oven must not open directly into the kneading room.

4. The licensee of a bakery shall cause—

- (a) all utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to the bakery; to be kept clean;
- (b) the tops of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned, closely fitting planks, or of some non-harmful impervious material and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;

- (c) the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle, and removed from the bakery daily ;
- (d) the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, or cesspit and from any other similar nuisance ;
- (e) the floor which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet above the ground ;
- (f) all refuse from the premises of the bakery to be removed and the drains to be flushed daily ;
- (g) at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the premises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread ;
- (h) clean water, clean towels, a nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread ; and
- (i) a copy in Sinhalese of these by-laws relating to bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.
5. The licensee of a bakery shall not—
- (a) allow the bakery to be used as a place for sleeping or for keeping any animal or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery ;
- (b) allow any bread, biscuits or confectionery to be exposed for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases ;
- (c) allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuit or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materials which are not good and wholesome ;
- (d) use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor ; or
- (e) allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises of the bakery.
6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuits or confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process, and shall wear a clean white apron, covering the chest, armpits and body, and also a white cap or turban.
7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.
8. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuits or confectionery, until the period of infection and incubation have elapsed.
9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorized by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.
- (2) The licensee, or the person in charge of a bakery shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman, or such officer, all such assistance as may be necessary.
10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries ; and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.
11. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.
- (2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.
12. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 11, unless the premises to be used as an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique are in conformity with the following requirements :—
- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted ;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed ;
- (c) the floor must be cemented ; and
- (d) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof ;
13. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause—
- (a) the premises thereof to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition ;
- (b) all utensils, furniture or other equipment, used in or belonging to the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be kept clean ;
- (c) all refuse and dirt in or about the premises of the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be swept and removed twice daily ;
- (d) all cakes, sweets and other food exposed for sale on such premises to be kept in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass-cases ;
- (e) all waste tea, coffee, or milk and all remnants of food to be collected in a fly-proof receptacle with a close-fitting lid or cover, and removed from such premises twice daily ;
- (f) all utensils used in the preparation, sale and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in twenty-four hours ;
- (g) every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by another customer ; and
- (h) a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times in the premises, so as to be available for inspection.
14. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall not permit—
- (a) any waste tea, coffee or milk or any remnants of food to be thrown on the floor of the licensed premises ; or
- (b) any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the licensed premises.
15. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall cause at least two spittoons to be kept at all times on the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises, as well as to the employees.
16. No person shall spit within the premises of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.
17. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to enter such place or take part in the preparation or sale of any food or drink therein until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
18. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee or the person in charge, of any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.
19. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutiques, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.
20. The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 7,727 of August 9, 1929, and therein called " Rules " are hereby amended by the rescission of all the by-laws appearing under the headings " Bakeries " and " Eating-houses ".

By-laws.

Village Roads and Paths.

1. Every village road or path shall be constructed or reconstructed and maintained in accordance with the decision of the Committee as to the width of such road or path and the course which it is to take.
2. (1) Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any village road or path, the Chairman shall have the power to prohibit the use of such road or path by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice of such prohibition by beat of tom-tom or otherwise.
- (2) It shall be lawful for the Chairman, whenever authorised by the Committee by a resolution in that behalf, to restrict or to prohibit the use of any village road or path by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.

3. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorised in writing by the Chairman—

- (1) to enter, between 7 A.M. and 5 P.M., with all necessary workmen, vehicles, animals and implements, upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed village road or path, for the purpose of executing any work connected with such road or path;
- (2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed village road or path such earth, rubbish, or materials as it may be necessary to remove from the place of any work connected with such road or path: Provided that such earth, rubbish or materials shall be removed within a reasonable time;
- (3) to make any temporary road through the grounds near any existing or proposed village road or path during the execution of any work connected with such road or path: Provided that such temporary road shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands, or over any enclosed garden or yard; and
- (4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing, or cleaning such drains, water-courses, fences or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair or construction of any village road or path.

4. No person shall—

- (a) injure, damage, obstruct, encroach upon, or otherwise interfere with the use of any village road or path, whether constructed or in course of construction; or
 - (b) except with the permission of the Committee, divert the line of any village road or path, whether constructed or in course of construction.
5. (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of any paddy field through which any public footpath runs, to maintain such footpath at its customary width.
(2) No person shall cut or encroach upon any such footpath so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.

6. No person shall—

- (a) erect any new building, wall, or fence within a limit of twelve feet from the centre of any village path, or within a limit of eighteen feet from the centre of any village road; or
- (b) commence the erection of any building, wall, or fence along any such path or road, unless written notice of the intention to erect such building, wall, or fence has been given to the Chairman at least thirty days before the date on which such erection is intended to be commenced.

7. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee; and
“Committee” means the Village Committee of the Dondra village area.

8. The by-laws made by the Village Committee of the Dondra village area relating to village roads and paths and published by notification in *Gazette* No. 9,300 of August 11, 1944, are hereby rescinded.

Bakeries.

1. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Village Committee.

9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any Officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.

(2) The licensee, or the person in charge of a bakery shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any Officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman, or such Officer, all such assistance as may be necessary.

10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

By-laws.

Markets and Fairs.

1. The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any village market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market.
2. Within any market area, no person shall, on any day on which the village market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale, any vegetables, fruits, fish, meat or other perishable articles of food at any place other than the village market: Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to—
 - (a) the sale of vegetables or fruits by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places;
 - (b) the sale by the licensee of an eating house or a tea or coffee boutique of ripe plantains or other fruits for consumption on the premises; or
 - (c) the sale by any person of young coconuts.
3. Every village market or fair shall be open from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M., on such days of the week as may be approved by the Committee.
4. Where the Committee has set apart any portion of a village market or fair for the sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—
 - (a) sell or expose for sale such article or class of articles in any place in such market or fair other than the portion so set apart; or
 - (b) sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in the portion so set apart.
5. A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use and occupation of any stall, seat or space in any village market or fair:—
 - (a) For a space inside any building, five cents per diem for every unit of 2 square yards or outstanding part thereof.
 - (b) For a space outside any building, one cent per diem for every square yard.
 - (c) For each stall, fifty cents per diem.
6. No person shall hold, use or occupy any stall, seat or space in a village market or fair unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. Every such licence shall expire on the date specified thereon.
7. The fees payable under by-law 5 shall be paid to the Chairman or to such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman; and no licence under by-law 6 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fee due from him.
8. The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each village market or fair a notice setting out, in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, the fees payable for the use and occupation of that market or fair; and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.
9. Whenever the Committee is satisfied after consultation with the Medical Officer of Health that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Committee, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the Committee may appear necessary, the introduction and sale of such article of food in any village market or fair.
10. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any village market or fair—
 - (a) the carcase or meat of any animal which has been slaughtered at any place other than a village slaughter-house or a licensed slaughter-house; and
 - (b) any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

The preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat, game or fish.

11. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use or occupy any stall, seat or space in any village market or fair, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

12. No person using or occupying any village market or fair shall—

- (1) behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market or fair; or
- (2) carry on cooking in any such market or fair; or
- (3) remain in or loiter about such market or fair after the place is closed for business at 6 P.M. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself; or
- (4) damage or in any way deface, any portion of the building, stalls, lamps or any property of the Committee in or about such market or fair, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market or fair; or
- (5) enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of the market or fair or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind; or
- (6) leave any goods in or about the premises of such market, or fair between the hours of 6 P.M. and 6 A.M. without the special permission of the Chairman; or
- (7) place any fruits, vegetables, meat, fish, or other article of food exposed thereat for sale, on any unclean or insanitary surface; or
- (8) expose for sale any article of food, whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

13. Every person using or occupying any stall, in a village market or fair shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a close fitting lid or cover, and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

14. No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any village market or fair.

15. No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any village market or fair or any other person appointed by the Committee to superintend any village market or fair or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein, in the lawful execution of his duty.

16. The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or along side the premises of any village market or fair for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into or unloading goods from that vehicle.

17. The Chairman shall give notice, by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the establishment or the temporary closing of any village market or fair.

Private Markets and Fairs.

18. No private market or fair shall be established or held within any market area.

19. (1) No private market or fair shall be established or held within any area (other than a market area) except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(2) Every licence issued under paragraph (1) shall—

- (a) be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto;
- (b) be subject to the conditions specified therein; and
- (c) expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (1) shall be ten rupees.

20. No person shall be entitled to a licence to establish or hold a private market or fair unless the site is approved by the Medical Officer of Health.

21. A licence issued under by-law 19 may be cancelled by a Village Tribunal on a second or subsequent conviction of the licensee for a breach of any of these by-laws or of the conditions of the licence, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

22. The Chairman may refuse to issue a licence under by-law 19 to any person whose previous licence has been cancelled by a Village Tribunal.

General.

23. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Assistant or any person authorised in writing by the Chairman at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any market or fair or any article of food exposed or kept for sale therein, and no person shall obstruct or resist any officer aforesaid in the execution of his duty under this by-law.

24. In these by-laws—

- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Udapalata Village Committee;
- “Committee” means the Udapalata Village Committee;
- “Market area” in relation to any village market means the area described in by-law 1;
- “Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

1. A table in English, Sinhalese and Tamil of the rents and fees leviable at the private market*/fair shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in the market*/fair.

2. The licensee shall not allow any person to sell or expose for sale in the private market*/fair any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

3. The licensee of every private market*/fair shall take all steps necessary to ensure that fruits, vegetables, meat, fish or other articles of food are not placed on an unclean or insanitary surface.

4. The licensee shall not expose for sale any articles of food whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

5. The licensee shall not allow any person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to use or occupy any stall, seat or place in the market*/fair or to expose for sale thereat any articles whatsoever until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

6. The licensee shall keep the premises of the market*/fair clean and free from filth and rubbish and shall cause all sweepings and refuse from the premises to be burnt, buried or otherwise disposed of in such manner as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.

7. The licensee shall maintain order within the premises of the market*/fair.

8. The licensee shall provide a separate portion of land in or near the premises of the market*/fair for the parking of vehicles.

9. The licensee shall provide a sufficient number of fly-proof receptacles with close fitting lids for the deposit of rubbish and refuse.

10. The licensee shall provide on the premises of the market*/fair a sufficient number of latrines of a type approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

11. This licence may be suspended by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health during any epidemic, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such suspension.

Preliminary Report on the Vital Statistics of Ceylon, 1945.

THE vital statistics for Ceylon for the year 1945 present the following important features :—

- The marriage rate (General and Kandyan) of the non-Muslim population, 13.0 per thousand, is lower than the corresponding rates for any of the three years immediately preceding.
- The birth-rate, 36.7 per thousand of the population, is lower than the corresponding rates for the two years immediately preceding.
- The death-rate, 22.0 per thousand of the population, is the highest recorded since 1935.
- The infant mortality rate, 140 per thousand live births, is the highest recorded since 1940.
- The maternal mortality rate, 16.5 per thousand live births, is the highest recorded since 1939.

Population.

The estimated population of the Island on December 31, 1945 (excluding the military and shipping populations) was 6,614,000, as against an estimated population of 6,384,000 on December 31, 1944. The births registered during the year exceeded the deaths registered by 95,563, and the number of immigrants exceeded the number of emigrants by 107,677.

Marriages.

The number of marriages registered under the Marriage Registration Ordinance and the Kandyan Marriage Ordinance during 1945 was 39,674 (General, 33,678; Kandyan, 5,996), giving the above-mentioned marriage rate for the non-Muslim population of 13.0 per 1,000, as against a corresponding marriage rate of 14.2 per 1,000 for 1944. There were 4,641 Muslim marriages, and the resulting marriage rate is 21.9 per 1,000 of the Muslim population as against a marriage rate of 25.5 per 1,000 of the Muslim population for 1944.

Births.

238,494 births—121,381 male and 117,113 female—were registered in the Island during the year. The birth-rate was 36.7 per 1,000 of the total population, as against a birth-rate of 37.1 per thousand of the total population in 1944. The

sex-ratio of the births was 1,036 males to 1,000 females. In the city of Colombo the birth-rate was 41.3 per thousand as against a birth-rate of 43.8 per 1,000 in 1944. There were 33,906 births on estates, as against 34,415 in 1944.

Deaths.

The number of deaths registered during the year was 142,931—72,973 deaths of males and 69,958 deaths of females—and the resulting death-rate is 22.0 per 1,000 of the population, as against a death-rate of 21.3 per thousand of the total population in 1944. In the city of Colombo the death-rate was 26.8 per 1,000, as against a death-rate of 25.6 per 1,000 in 1944. 13,271 deaths were registered on estates in 1945, as against 12,780 in 1944.

Infant Mortality.

The number of infants deaths registered during the year was 33,309, and the resulting infant mortality rate is 140 per 1,000 live births, as against an infant mortality rate of 135 per 1,000 live births in 1944. The city of Colombo had an infant mortality rate of 149 per 1,000 live births, as against an infant mortality rate of 146 per 1,000 live births in 1944. The infant mortality rate for estates is 109 per 1,000 live births, as against an infant mortality rate of 126 per 1,000 live births on estates in 1944.

Maternal Mortality.

The number of maternal deaths (deaths connected with pregnancy and child-birth) registered during the year was 3,940, and the resulting maternal mortality rate is 16.5 per 1,000 live births, as against a maternal mortality rate of 13.7 per 1,000 live births in 1944. In the city of Colombo the maternal mortality rate was 24.3 per 1,000 live births, as against a maternal mortality rate of 19.8 per 1,000 live births in 1944. The maternal mortality rate on estates is 9.6 per 1,000 live births, as against a maternal mortality rate of 8.6 per 1,000 live births on estates in 1944.

Notes.

- (1) The rates in this report have been calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1945, 6,504,000, which in turn has been calculated on figures returned at the censuses of 1931 and 1946 and on statistics of births and deaths registered, and of migration differences recorded, prior to January 1, 1946.
- (2) All figures in this report are subject to revision.

Internal Purchase Scheme.

Harvesting of Paddy in the Karachchi Division.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulation 1942 and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulation 1943, I do hereby direct that :—

- (1) Every person whether owner or cultivator in charge of the reaping of the harvest of any paddy land situated within the Karachchi Irrigation Scheme Area and which is expected to be harvested during Sirupokam, 1946, shall inform the Land Officer, Kilinochchi, or any other officer authorised by me in writing :—
 - (a) the date on which it is proposed to reap and thresh the harvest on the land, and
 - (b) the name, situation and extent of the land.
- (2) No cultivator, shareholder or other persons having interest in any land cultivated with paddy situated within the said area shall remove any paddy, harvested in Sirupokam, 1946, from the threshing floor until the harvest has been checked and verified by the Land Officer or any other Officer authorised by me in writing.
- (3) Removal thereafter to the barn or other places of storage within the said area should only be on a permit issued by the Land Officer or other officer authorised by me in writing.
- (4) Removal to places outside the Karachchi Irrigation Scheme Area should only be on permit issued, by me or the Land Officer, Kilinochchi. Non-residents who desire to remove their share outside the Jaffna District should make their application on Form D.F.C. 34 in duplicate through the Revenue Officer or Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which they reside.
- (5) The levy of two bushels per acre be delivered to the Land Officer or any other officer appointed by me in writing.
- (6) If no application for removal of any share to a place outside the said area is received within six weeks of harvesting of same, the paddy in question will be taken over by me and payment made at the rate of Rs. 6 per bushel for well dried paddy free from chaff, grit, &c.

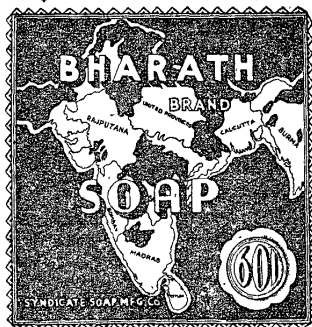
