CADETSHIPS IN THE CEYLON CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1946.

1. An Open Competitive Examination for Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service will be held by the Ceylon Civil Service Commission in Colombo in or about October, 1946. The actual dates will be notified later.
2. The number of vacancies will be ten. (The full number of appointments will not be made unless candidates attain a suitably high standard.)
3. Candidates for this examination must be Ceylonese. For the purpose of this examination a Ceylonese is—
 - (a) a natural born male British subject who is born in Ceylon, one of whose parents was born in Ceylon; or
 - (b) a natural born male British subject who is a descendant of a person falling within category (a); or
 - (c) a natural born male British subject deemed by the Governor with the advice of the Board of Ministers, in view of special circumstances to be a Ceylonese.
4. Candidates must have attained the age of 22 and must not have attained the age of 24 on August 1, 1946.
5. Candidates are required to obtain a written nomination from the Governor to sit for the examination.
6. Candidates must satisfy the Governor that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight and physically qualified for service in any part of the Island. Successful candidates will be called upon to undergo a strict medical examination to test these points.
7. A married candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a Ceylon Cadetship without the special consent of the Governor.
8. The fee for examination will be—
 - (a) Rs. 200 for the competitive examination which should be paid to Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Bank of Ceylon. See note 4 of application form. The bank receipt should be attached to the application form.
 - (b) Rs. 10.50 for the medical examination. Successful candidates will be notified later of the manner in which this fee is to be paid.

9. Nomination will be limited to candidates who have passed an Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of London or an Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of Ceylon or any other examination which may be deemed to be of at least equal standard. Nomination to sit for the examination will also be granted to candidates, otherwise eligible, who intend to sit the Final Examination for a University Degree before August 1, 1946. Candidates nominated in these circumstances will not be eligible to sit for the Civil Service Examination unless they have completed the Degree Examination. Any candidate who competes in the Civil Service Examination on these conditions will be presumed to do so in the knowledge that should he later be informed that he has not been successful in the Degree Examination he will not be considered for appointment to the Civil Service.

10. Candidates who possess the necessary qualifications and who propose to sit for the examination will, on application to the Chief Secretary, be supplied with copies of the Regulations, Syllabus, and Application Form.

11. Nominations for the examination will be considered on the receipt of the forms of application which must be filled in duplicate by the applicants in their own handwriting and must reach the Chief Secretary's Office on or before July 22, 1946.

12. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post can be considered. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

13. Acknowledgments of application forms are sent and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should at once write to the Chief Secretary, Colombo. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

14. Candidates will be notified as soon as possible of the dates and place fixed for their *viva voce* test; the time table of the written part of the examination will be sent to the address given on the form of application and will contain instructions about the time and place at which candidates are to attend.

APPLICATION FORM.

For the use of the candidates seeking admission to the Competitive Examination to be held in Colombo in 1946 for appointment to Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service.

Note 1.—This form is to be filled up and returned to the Chief Secretary, Colombo, in time for delivery on or before July 22, 1946. No application form received after that date will be accepted.

A candidate who fills up and returns this application form and does not receive an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should inform the Chief Secretary.

Note 2.—Candidates should, by consulting the regulations, make certain that they are eligible to compete and that their selection of subjects conforms with the regulations. No scrutiny of the information which is given on this sheet is made by the Chief Secretary or the Ceylon Civil Service Commissioners before the examination.

Note 3.—Should any of the particulars furnished by candidates be found to be false within their knowledge they will, if appointed, be liable to be dismissed. The wilful expression of any material fact will be similarly penalized.

Note 4.—The fee for the examination will be Rs. 200 which should be paid to the Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Bank of Ceylon. A form for this purpose is annexed. The Bank receipt should be annexed to the application form. The full fee is returned to candidates who are not granted nominations to sit for the examination. A candidate who withdraws or absents himself from the examination for any reason whatsoever at any time after he has been granted a nomination shall not be entitled to a refund of the whole or a portion of the fee.

4. The Civilization (subjects 9, 12, 14, and 22 associated with a language can be taken only by candidates who also offer the language itself).

5. In English Literature (subjects 15 to 19 inclusive) a candidate may not offer subjects carrying a total of more than four hundred marks. Thus a candidate who offers English Literature (General) (subject 15) may not offer more than two periods of English Literature (subjects 16 to 19).

6. Candidates who offer a natural science subject (subjects 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54) must produce a certificate of laboratory training in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the head of the institutions.

7. Candidates who offer Geography I. or Geography II. (subjects 32 and 33) must produce a certificate of practical training in that subject in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the head of the institution.

8. Candidates who offer Higher Pure Mathematics (38) or Higher Applied Mathematics (39) will be allowed to take either Lower Pure Mathematics (36) or Lower Applied Mathematics (37) but not both the lower papers.

9. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Examiners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

10. If a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a deduction which may be of considerable amount will be made on this account from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.

11. Credit will be given for good English, including orderly, effective and exact expression, combined with due economy of words in all the subjects of the examination and not only in subjects 1 and 2 which are specially devoted to the English language.

12. Candidates must be prepared to sit for more than one paper in subjects carrying a total of 200 marks.

SYLLABUSES.

All papers will be of three hours' duration except where specified.

1. *Essay*.—An essay to be written in English on one of several specified subjects. The essay will be judged not only according to language, style and arrangement but also according to the degree of thoughtfulness and originality in its treatment of the subject.

2. *Precis*.—A paper of one hour's duration requiring the candidate to express in his own words, but more succinctly, the substance of one or more passages of prose.

3. *Intelligence Test*.—A paper of one hour's duration designed to place the candidates in order of merit from the point of view of general ability. No marks will be assigned, but the result of the test will be used in assigning marks for the *Viva Voce* Examination.

4. *General Knowledge*.—A paper designed to test the candidate's general knowledge. No special syllabus is prescribed.

5. *Viva Voce*.—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to assess his suitability for the Service for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and alertness, his vigour and strength of character and his potential qualities of leadership.

6. *Sinhalese, Tamil and Arabic*.—A paper of one and a half hours' duration containing translation into English, translation into the language of English sentences chosen to test grammatical knowledge and translation into the language of easy passages of continuous English prose.

English (Special).—A paper of one and a half hour's duration designed to test the candidate's knowledge and command of written and spoken English.

7. *Sinhalese Language and Literature*.—(Two papers.) Candidates are expected to show a knowledge of the language in its various phases of development and of the literature from the earliest times. Passages may be set for translation from and into English.

8. *Tamil Language and Literature*.—(Two papers) Translation from Tamil into English and from English into Tamil, an essay and questions on grammar; Tamil Literature from the Sangam age to the end of the 19th Century.

9. *Dravidian Civilization*.—(Two papers.) The history of Dravidian civilization from the earliest times to the end of the 19th Century with special reference to the Tamils.

10. *Arabic*.—(Two papers.) A general knowledge of the language, its grammar, literature and history; and of Islamic culture. Questions may be set on the geography, history, and social, political and religious institutions of the Islamic world.

11. *Sanskrit Language*.—(Two papers.) Translation from Sanskrit into English; composition, in the Devanagari script, which may include an essay on one of several given subjects.

Both Vedic and Classical Sanskrit passages may be set for translation. Questions may be included relating to grammatical forms, both Vedic and Classical Sanskrit, occurring in the passages set for translations, or to grammatical and syntactical problems of a general nature suggested by them. Composition will be required in Classical Sanskrit style.

12. *Sanskrit Civilization*.—(Two papers.) The history of the culture, philosophy and the thought of India, and Sanskrit literature, from the Vedic period to 1200 A.D.

13. *Pali Language*.—(Two papers.) Translation from Pali into English and from English into Pali and composition in Pali on one or more specified subjects.

14. *Pali Civilization*.—(Two papers.) This history of Buddhist Civilization in India from the time of Buddha to 1000 A.D.

15. *English Literature (General)*.—(Two papers.) Paper I. 1350–1700; Paper II. 1700 to the present day.

Candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the social and historical background of English Literature during these periods; and to attempt the criticism of set passages. They will not be expected to study every part of either of the two periods with equal thoroughness. Credit will be given for evidence of first hand knowledge of the work selected for study.

16–19. *English Literature—Periods 1 to 4.*

Period 1, 1579–1660, with the following for special study: Spenser, Lyly, Shakespeare, Johnson, Webster, Donne, Browne and Milton.

Period 2, 1660–1800, with the following for special study: Dryden, Defoe, Swift, Pope, Fielding, Dr. Johnston, Gibbon and Blake.

Period 3, 1800 to 1880, with the following for special study: Wordsworth, Coleridge, Keats, Jane Austen, Tennyson, Dickens, Arnold, Hopkins.

Period 4, 1880 to the present day, with the following for special study: Yeats, Hardy, Conrad, Shaw, Eliot, Joyce, Lawrence (D.H.), Eugene O'Neill.

Candidates will be expected to have a fair general knowledge of the life and thought of the period selected with a more detailed knowledge of at least *four* of the authors set for special study. Candidates will be expected to identify passages taken from authors set for special study and to comment on them. Credit will be given for evidence of first hand knowledge of the material selected for special study.

20. *Latin Language*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Composition and Translation. The paper on Latin Composition will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or may attempt both verse and prose.

21. *Greek Language*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Composition and Translation. The paper on Greek Composition will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or may attempt both verse and prose.

22. *Greek and Roman Civilization*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Greek and Latin Literature and Greek and Roman History. On both papers special credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities. In Greek History the main stress will be laid on the period from 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.: In Roman History on the period from 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

Languages and Civilizations.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the language and its literature. The papers on civilization will test the knowledge of geography, history, and social, political and religious evolution and developments. Questions may be set which require an acquaintance with archæological discoveries.

23. *History I*.—(Two papers.) The history of India and of Ceylon.

24. *History II*.—(Two papers.) The history of Europe since the Renaissance.

25. *History III*.—(Two papers.) The history of Great Britain since 1485. Questions will be set on development of the British Empire and Commonwealth.

[Questions may be asked on Indian and European political theories and institutions, constitutional development and European activities in the east generally].

26. *Economics I*.—(Two papers.) (a) Economics, descriptive and analytical (including public finance), (b) principles and practice of currency, banking and international trade.

27. *Economics II*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as Economics I. but taken to a more advanced stage.

28. *Economics III*.—(One paper.) Modern Economic History, to include Economic History of England, France, Germany, Russia and U. S. A. from the middle of the eighteenth century, and Economic History of India and Ceylon during the British period.

29. *Statistics*.—(1) Frequency distributions, averages, percentiles, and simple methods of measuring dispersion, graphic methods, treatment of qualitative data, e.g., investigation of association by comparison of ratios, the practice of graphic and algebraic methods of interpolation.

(2) Practical methods used in the analysis and interpretation of statistics of prices, wages and incomes, trade, transport, production and consumption, education, &c., methods of dealing with population and vital statistics, miscellaneous methods used in handling statistics of experiments or observations.

(3) Elements of modern mathematical theory of statistics frequency curves and the mathematical representation of groups generally, accuracy of sampling as affecting averages, percentages, the standard deviation, significance of observed differences between averages of groups, &c., the theory of correlation for two variables.

30. *Political and Social Theory*.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, political theory being understood to mean not only the theory of legislation, but also the general history of the State and its connection with kindred studies such as jurisprudence, Public International Law and Economics. A knowledge of original authorities is required.

31. *Political Organization*.—Constitutional Forms (Representative Government, Federalism, &c.), and Public Administration, central and local. Candidates will be expected to understand the origin and development of existing institutions.

32. *Geography I*.—(Two papers.) (1) General economic geography, regional geography of Eurasia, with emphasis on Ceylon.

(2) Practical work, including reading and interpretation of topographical, land utilization and geological maps, the construction and use of the principal map projections, simple methods of land survey.

33. *Geography II*.—(Two papers.) (1) The physical basis of geography, regional geography of North and South America, Africa and Australasia.

Candidates will be expected to answer questions on *two* of the more specialized branches of geography—Cartography, Geomorphology, Climatology and Oceanography, Distribution and Ecology of Plants and Animals, Distribution of Man, Economic Geography, Political Geography, Historical Geography. Choice of subjects should be indicated in the application form.

(2) Practical work, including more difficult questions on the subject matter of Geography I. (2), critical cartography, the collection of data relating to climatic, economic and population conditions and cartographical and diagrammatic methods of expression of such data.

34. *Philosophy I*.—(Two papers.) History of Philosophy and Ethics.

35. *Philosophy II*.—(Two papers.) Logic and Metaphysics.

36. *Lower Pure Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Algebra, Trigonometry (including De Moivre's Theorem and its application), Geometry (including Analytical Geometry of two and three dimensions), Elementary Differential and Integral Calculus, and Differential equations in one independent variable.

37. *Lower Applied Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Statics of a particle and of a rigid body, Hydrostatics, Dynamics of a particle and of a rigid body, the theory of Potential.

38. *Higher Pure Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Geometry (including projective and differential Geometry), Algebra (including Matrices), Mathematical Analysis (including simple functions of a complex variable and contour integration), Differential Equations, Elementary Finite Differences.

39. *Higher Applied Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Mechanics of solids and fluids (including equations of Euler and Lagrange) Electricity and Magnetism.

40. *Law of Persons and Property*.—The principles of Roman-Dutch Law, with special reference to their application in Ceylon.

41. *Law of Contracts and Torts*.—The English law of contracts and tort, including the elements of the law of quasi-contract, with special reference to their application in Ceylon.

42. *Roman Law*.—Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial process. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.

43. *Constitutional Law*.—English constitutional law; the relations between the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Commonwealth of Nations; the constitutional law of Ceylon.

44. *International Law*.—The international law of peace, including international organization.

45. *Jurisprudence and Legal Theory*.—Theories as to the nature of law, including the theory of sovereignty. The sources of law and its development, with particular reference to English and Roman law. The character and classification of rights, and duties (legal and equitable). The analysis of the leading conceptions employed in law. The methods of Jurisprudence.

46. *Criminal Law*.—English criminal law and Criminal Law of Ceylon not including Criminal Procedure.

47. *Lower Physics*.—(Two papers.) The general properties of matter, heat and thermodynamics, acoustics, optics, electricity and magnetism.

48. *Higher Physics*.—(Two papers.) The general properties of matter and acoustics; heat, thermodynamics, kinetic theory of matter; optics, including the electromagnetic theory of light, electricity, physics of the atom.

49. *Lower Chemistry*.—(Two papers.) General theoretical chemistry, including its historical development; inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry and physical chemistry.

50. *Higher Chemistry*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as *Lower Chemistry*, but at a higher standard.

51. *Lower Botany*.—(Two papers.) The general morphology and anatomy of plants; plant physiology and ecology, cytology and the principles of evolution; the phylogeny and taxonomy of plants.

52. *Higher Botany*.—(Two papers.) Botany in all its branches.

53. *Lower Zoology*.—(Two papers.) Zoology in all its branches.

54. *Higher Zoology*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as *Lower Zoology*, but at a higher standard.

(1) The construction of the following items of the necessary work, namely, a 31' masonry spill, a 35' natural spill on the L. B., a Breaching section on the R.B. and raising bund to level 113' 50 up to the estimated cost of Rs. 8,000 is under taken by the Government.

(2) In consideration of the aforesaid undertaking on the part of the Government, the proprietors on their part undertake to complete the following items of work free of all charges, namely, 150 (one hundred and fifty) cubes of earthwork in raising the bund to designed level.

(3) The proprietors further agree to contribute, after the completion of the work, all labour required for its maintenance and repair, free of all charges.

(4) The proprietors further agree that in the event of any default on the part of any of them in contributing any uncommutable labour due under this scheme, the Government Agent may cause such labour to be performed by any other person and recover the cost thereof in the manner prescribed in Chapter VIII. of the Ordinance.

(5) The proprietors share of earthwork to be done concurrently with or even before in the other improvements to the tank are completed. If this work has to be carried out by Government the rate including departmental charges such as overseerage will be Rs. 5 per cube. In the event of total default the total recoverable will be Rs. 750.

By-laws.

I.—Conservancy and Scavenging.

1. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an Officer authorised by such Medical Officer.

2. If the Medical Officer of Health or an Officer authorised by such Medical Officer certifies that any cesspit or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 1) situated on any premises within the area for which a conservancy service has been established is insanitary and dangerous to health the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.

3. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 1 or by-law 2 has been served shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.

4. Every occupier of premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.

5. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Village Committee shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.

6. The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Village Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Village Committee a conservancy fee at the rate specified in the Schedule hereto.

7. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine, whether constructed or in course of construction, on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health, or an officer authorised by him to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset, and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of the inspection.

8. Upon the establishment of a scavenging service for the whole or any specified part of the village area, the occupier of any premises situated within an area for which such service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and other refuse from his premises to be deposited in a bucket, or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.

9. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 8 shall—

- (1) daily between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause such bucket or bin to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road; and
- (2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Village Committee.

10. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 8 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 9.

11. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Village

Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Village Committee a scavenging fee at the rate specified in the Schedule hereto.

12. The conservancy fee referred to in by-law 6 and the scavenging fee referred to in by-law 11 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Village Committee or to any person duly authorised by him in writing to collect such fees, on or before the 10th day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fees are due. Provided that when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month; and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman that such premises were in fact not occupied during the month, no conservancy or scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of those premises for that month.

13. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Village Committee;
“Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

II.—Bakeries, Eating Houses, Restaurants and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. In these by-laws—

“bakery” means any premises in which bread, biscuits or confectionery is baked for sale as food for human consumption and includes any premises in which such food is prepared, or in which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored;

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Village Committee;
“Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

2. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any bakery except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year in respect of which it is issued.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 2, unless the premises to be used as a bakery are in conformity with the following requirements:—

- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
- (c) the floor must be cemented;
- (d) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation and sufficient drains;
- (e) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof;
- (f) the premises must not be situated within fifty feet of any cesspit, permanent manure heap, latrine, or open sewer;
- (g) the premises must be provided with a separate kneading room having a superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 10 feet;
- (h) there must be a free external air space, not less than seven feet wide, on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors or windows; and
- (i) the door of the oven must not open directly into the kneading room.

4. The licensee of a bakery shall cause—

- (a) all utensils, furniture and other requisites used in or belonging to the bakery, to be kept clean;
- (b) the tops of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned, closely-fitting planks, or of some non-harmful impervious material, and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;
- (c) the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle, and removed from the bakery daily;
- (d) the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy or cesspit and from any other similar nuisance;
- (e) the flour which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet above the ground;
- (f) all refuse from the premises of the bakery to be removed and the drains to be flushed daily;
- (g) at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the premises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread;

- (h) clean water, clean towels, a nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread; and
- (i) a copy in Sinhalese of those by-laws relating to bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.
5. The licensee of a bakery shall not—
- allow the bakery to be used as a place for sleeping or for keeping any animal, or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery;
 - allow any bread, biscuits or confectionery to be exposed for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;
 - allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuits or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materials which are not good and wholesome;
 - use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor; or
 - allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises of the bakery.
6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuits or confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process, and shall wear a clean white apron, covering the chest, armpits and body, and also a white cap or turban.
7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.
8. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuits or confectionery, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.
- (2) The licensee, or the person in charge of a bakery shall permit the Chairman or the Medical officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman, or such officer, all such assistance as may be necessary.
10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries; and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.
11. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any eating house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique, except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.
- (2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year in respect of which it is issued.
12. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 11, unless the premises to be used as an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique are in conformity with the following requirements:—
- the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
 - the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
 - the floor must be cemented; and
 - a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof.
13. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause—
- the premises thereof to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition;
 - all utensils, furniture, or other equipment, used in or belonging to the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be kept clean;
 - all refuse and dirt in or about the premises of the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be swept and removed twice daily;
 - all cakes, sweets and other food exposed for sale on such premises to be kept in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;
 - all waste tea, coffee, or milk and all remnants of food to be collected in a fly-proof receptacle with a close-fitting lid or cover, and removed from such premises twice daily;
 - all utensils used in the preparation, sale or consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in every twenty-four hours;
 - every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by another customer; and
 - a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times in the premises so as to be available for inspection.

14. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall not permit—

- any waste tea, coffee or milk or any remnants of food to be thrown on the floor of the licensed premises; or
- any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the licensed premises.

15. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall cause at least two spittoons to be kept at all times on the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises, as well as to the employees.

16. No person shall spit within the premises of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

17. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to enter such place or take part in the preparation or sale of any food or drink therein, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

18. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee or the person in charge, of any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

19. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to eating-houses, restaurants or tea or coffee boutiques, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

20. The by-laws relating to bakeries made by the Village Committee of the Kaduwela village area and published in *Gazette* No. 8,796 of September 26, 1941, are hereby rescinded.

III.—Markets and Fairs.

1. The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any village market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market.

2. Within any market area, no person shall, on any day on which the village market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale any vegetables, fruits, fish, meat or other perishable articles of food at any place other than the village market:

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to—

- the sale of vegetables or fruits by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places;
- the sale by the licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique of ripe plantains or other fruits for consumption on the premises; or
- the sale by any person of young coconuts.

3. Every village market or fair shall be open from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. on such days of the week as may be approved by the Committee.

4. Where the Committee has set apart any portion of a village market or fair for the sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—

- sell or expose for sale such article or class of articles in any place in such market or fair other than the portion so set apart; or
- sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in the portion so set apart.

5. A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use and occupation of any stall, seat or space in any village market or fair:—

6. No person shall hold, use or occupy any stall, seat or space in a village market or fair unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Chairman or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. Every such licence shall expire on the date specified therein.

7. The fee payable under by-law 5 shall be paid to the Chairman or such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman, and no licence under by-law 6 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fee due from him.

8. The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each village market or fair a notice setting out, in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, the fees payable for the use and occupation of that market or fair and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.

9. Whenever, the Chairman is satisfied, after consultation with the Medical Officer of Health that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful it shall be lawful for the Committee by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the Committee may appear necessary, the introduction and sale of such article of food in any village market or fair.

10. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any village market or fair—

- (a) the carcase or meat of any animal which has been slaughtered at any place other than a village slaughter house or a licensed slaughter house; and
- (b) any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat, game or fish.

11. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use or occupy any stall, seat or space in any village market or fair, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

12. No person using or occupying any village market or fair shall—

- (1) behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market or fair; or
- (2) carry on cooking in any such market or fair; or
- (3) remain in or loiter about such market or fair after the place is closed for business at 6 P.M. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself; or
- (4) damage or in any way deface, any portion of the building, stalls, lamps or any property of the Committee in or about such market or fair, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market or fair; or
- (5) enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of the market or fair or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind; or
- (6) leave any goods in or about the premises of such market or fair between the hours of 6 P.M. and 6 A.M. without the special permission of the Chairman; or
- (7) place any fruits, vegetables, meat, flesh, fish or other article of food exposed thereat for sale, on any unclean or insanitary surface; or
- (8) expose for sale any article of food, whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

13. Every person using or occupying any stall, in a village market or fair shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a close fitting lid or cover, and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

14. No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any village market or fair.

15. No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any village market or fair or any other person appointed by the committee to superintend any village market or fair or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein, in the lawful execution of his duty.

16. The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or alongside the premises of any village market or fair for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into or unloading goods from that vehicle.

17. The Chairman shall give notice by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the establishment or the temporary closing of any village market or fair.

Private Markets and Fairs.

18. No private market or fair shall be established or held within any market area.

19. (1) No private market or fair shall be established or held within any area (other than a market area) except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(2) Every licence issued under paragraph (1) shall:—

- (a) be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto,
- (b) be subject to the conditions specified therein, and
- (c) expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (1) shall be six rupees per year.

20. No person shall be entitled to a licence to establish or hold a private market or fair unless the site is approved by the Medical Officer of Health.

21. A licence issued under by-law 19 may be cancelled by a Village Tribunal on a second or subsequent conviction of the licensee for a breach of any of these by-laws or of the conditions of the licence, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

22. The Chairman may refuse to issue a licence under by-law 19 to any person whose previous licence has been cancelled by a Village Tribunal.

General.

23. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Assistant or any person authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any market or fair or any article or food exposed or kept for sale therein, and no person shall obstruct or resist any officer aforesaid in the execution of his duty under this by-law.

24. In these by-laws:—

- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee;
- “Committee” means the Kaduwela Village Committee;
- “Market area” in relation to any village market means the area described in by-law 1;
- “Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

Schedule.

Licence to establish and hold a private *market/fair.

_____ of _____ is hereby licensed to establish and hold a private *market/fair on the land called _____ situated at _____ in the _____ village area from the date hereof until the thirty-first day of December, 19____ subject to the subjoined conditions.

Conditions of the above licence.

1. A table in English, Sinhalese and Tamil of the rents and fees leviable at the private *market/fair shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in the *market/fair.

2. The licensee shall not allow any person to sell or expose for sale in the private *market/fair any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

3. The licensee of every private *market/fair shall take all steps necessary to ensure that fruits, vegetables, meat, fish or other articles of food are not placed on an unclean or insanitary surface.

4. The licensee shall not expose for sale any articles of food, whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

5. The licensee shall not allow any person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to use or occupy any stall, seat or place in the *market/fair or to expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

6. The licensee shall keep the premises of the *market/fair clean and free from filth and rubbish and shall cause all sweepings and refuse from the premises to be burnt, buried or otherwise disposed of in such manner as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.

7. The licensee shall maintain order within the premises of the *market/fair.

8. The licensee shall provide a separate portion of land in or near the premises of the *market/fair for the parking of vehicles.

9. The licensee shall provide a sufficient number of fly-proof receptacles with close fitting lids for the deposit of rubbish and refuse.

10. The licensee shall provide on the premises of the *market/fair a sufficient number of latrines of a type approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

11. This licence may be suspended by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health during any epidemic, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such suspension.

IV.—Slaughter-houses.

1. No person shall at any slaughter-house slaughter any animal—

- (a) unless that animal has been inspected by the Medical Officer of Health and approved by him as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption; or
- (b) at any time after the expiry of a period of thirty hours from the time of the approval of that animal under paragraph (a); or

* Strike out whichever is inapplicable.

(c) except between 9 A.M. and 12 noon on any day; provided that the Chairman may in exceptional circumstances authorise the slaughter of any animal at any time other than that herein specified.

2. No person shall at any slaughter-house slaughter any animal which has been removed alive from the slaughter-house premises after it was approved under by-law 1, unless it is again inspected and approved under that by-law as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption.

3. (1) The Medical Officer of Health may prohibit the slaughter of any animal if, after it has been approved under by-law 1, it has been found to be diseased or unfit to be slaughtered for human consumption.

(2) No person shall slaughter any animal the slaughter of which is prohibited under this by-law.

4. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of a slaughter-house shall take all such measures as may be necessary to ensure that that animal is adequately fed and watered while it remains in those premises.

5. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of a slaughter-house shall, if the animal is rejected as unfit for slaughter, forthwith remove the animal or cause it to be removed from those premises.

6. If the carcase or offal of any animal slaughtered at any slaughter-house is in the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health, diseased or unfit for human consumption, he shall cause the carcase or offal to be forthwith destroyed or disposed of so as to prevent such carcase or offal being exposed for sale or use for human food. Except under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health, no person shall remove any such carcase or offal from the slaughter-house.

7. The keeper of a slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter therein of any animal which has not been approved as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption, or the slaughter of which has been prohibited under by-law 3.

8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house the carcase of any animal intended for human consumption unless such carcase has been stamped on its fore quarters and hind quarters by the keeper of the slaughter-house with the letters "V.C.A.P." and with such one of the marks "Australian Beef", "Country Beef", "Mutton Goat", "Mutton Sheep", or "Pork" as may be appropriate to the case.

9. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of any other animal or until the carcase of every animal previously slaughtered in the premises has been removed or screened off and the premises cleaned.

10. No person who is suffering or who has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall be permitted by the person in charge of any slaughter-house to enter such slaughter-house or take part in the slaughtering of any animal until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

11. It shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health to enter and inspect at all reasonable times, any slaughter-house, and the person in charge thereof shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

12. A fee at the following rates shall be paid in advance to the Committee for the use of any slaughter-house established by the Committee; and no animal shall be slaughtered without an official receipt in proof of payment of the fee—

For cattle	One rupee per head
For sheep or goats	fifty cents per head
For pigs	fifty cents per head

13. The keeper of every slaughter-house shall maintain in such form as the Committee may direct a register of particulars relating to each animal slaughtered at the slaughter-house.

14. The powers conferred on the Medical Officer of Health by these by-laws may be exercised by any Officer acting under the general or special directions of the Medical Officer of Health.

15. In these by-laws:—

- "animal" means any head of cattle, goat, sheep or pig;
- "cattle" includes buffaloes;
- "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee;
- "Committee" means the Kaduwela Village Committee;
- "Medical Officer of Health" includes a Field Medical Officer.

V.—Offensive and Dangerous Trades.

1. (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades:—

- (a) Tanning.
- (b) Manufacture of soap.
- (c) Storing of lime in any quantity exceeding 3 gunny bags.
- (d) Storing of manure in any quantity exceeding 3 gunny bags.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades:—

- (a) Storing copra.
- (b) Storing straw.

(c) Storing fibre.

(d) Storing plumbago.

(e) Manufacturing coconut oil by mills or chekkus.

2. (1) No person shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence shall, unless it is cancelled under by-law 4, expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) No licence shall be transferable.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless:—

(i) the place at which that trade is to be carried on is approved by the Medical Officer of Health; and

(ii) the building or buildings, if any, to be used for the purpose of that trade are in conformity with the following requirements—

- (a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted, and provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;
- (b) the roof of such building must be made of some permanent material and the floor must be cemented;
- (c) the eaves of such building must be not less than six feet from the ground;
- (d) every room in such building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
- (e) the walls of every room in such building must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of bricks, stone or cabook;
- (f) the internal surface of such walls, to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered in cement and the rest of the walls must be lime-plastered and lime-washed; and
- (g) the woodwork of such building must be oil painted or lime-washed.

4. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued, any building used for the purposes of the offensive or dangerous trade to which the licence relates, ceases to conform to the provisions of by-law 3, the Chairman may, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do before a day to be specified in the notice all things necessary to make such building conform to such provisions, and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, the Chairman may cancel the licence.

5. Any notice under by-law 4 shall be deemed to have been served on the licensee if it is affixed to the premises at which the licensee carries on the offensive or dangerous trade or if it is left with any person employed in such premises by the licensee.

6. Every licensee shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purpose of the offensive or dangerous trade to be swept and cleaned daily;
- (b) the walls of every such building to be lime-washed at least once in every twelve months;
- (c) all apparatus, implements and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean;
- (d) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on.

7. No licensee shall pollute or contaminate any well or tank or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water.

8. No licensee shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to, the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood.

9. Every licensee shall cause any offensive vapours or gases which are emitted in the course of carrying on any offensive or dangerous trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such a manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effects; or
- (b) to be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus.

10. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any Officer of the Committee authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any premises at which any offensive or dangerous trade is being carried on, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall permit such inspection to be made.

By-laws.

Roads and Paths.

1. (1) The width of every new village road shall be at least twelve feet.
- (2) The width of every new village path, other than a village path through a paddy field, shall be at least four feet.
2. No person shall—
 - (a) injure, damage, obstruct, encroach upon or otherwise interfere with the use of, any village path or road whether constructed or in course of construction; or
 - (b) except with the permission of the Committee, divert the line of any village path or road, whether constructed or in course of construction.
3. No person shall—
 - (a) erect any new building or wall within a limit of twelve feet from the centre of any village road; or
 - (b) commence the erection of any building or wall along any such path or road unless written notice of the intention to erect such building or wall has been given to the Chairman at least thirty days before the date on which such erection is intended to be commenced.
4. (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of paddy fields through which any public foot path runs, to maintain such foot path at its customary width.
- (2) No person shall out or encroach upon any such foot path so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.
5. Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any village road or path, the Chairman shall have the power to prohibit the use of such path or road by the public for such time as may be necessary.

Public Health and Amenities, Disorderly Conduct.

6. The owner or occupier of every house shall keep his premises clean and free from all weeds, rank, vegetation and all refuse or rubbish or receptacles likely to form breeding places for mosquitoes, for a distance of thirty yards from such house or to the boundary of his premises, whichever is less.
7. (1) Whenever any tree, or any branch or fruit or other part of a tree, is causing or is likely to cause damage to any building, or is in a condition dangerous to the occupants of any building, or to the property, or to the safety of the passers by along any public thoroughfare, the Chairman may, by a notice in writing served on the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands, require such owner or occupier to tie up and make secure, or to cut down or to remove such tree, within such time as may be specified in the notice.
- (2) Every person on whom a notice is served under this by-law shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, and in the event of the refusal or neglect of such person to comply with such requirement within such time, the Chairman, or any officer, or workman authorised in writing by the Chairman, may enter upon the land referred to in such notice and do what such person was required to do by such notice, and the expenses thereby incurred shall be recoverable from such person as a debt due to the Committee.
8. No person shall cause any annoyance to any other person by publishing any obscene writing or by making any obscene drawing or by singing or reciting any obscene song or ballad, or do any other act which is likely to outrage public decency.
9. No person shall throw stones or filth at the house, or into the compound, of any other person.

Unwholesome Food.

10. No person shall sell or expose for sale any article of food or drink which is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.
11. (1) The Chairman, or any officer authorised in writing by the Chairman, or a Sanitary Assistant, may at any time of the day inspect any article of food or drink exposed for sale and seize any such article which appears to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.
- (2) The Chairman may order any article of food or drink, seized under paragraph (1) and found to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption to be destroyed or to be so disposed of as to prevent its being sold or exposed for sale or used for human food.

Dairies.

12. In these by-laws “dairy” means any place where two or more cows are milked for the purpose of selling the milk to the public.
13. No person shall keep a dairy unless he is the holder of a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.
14. Every person who desires to sell or offer for sale milk from one cow, shall cause himself to be registered in the books of the Committee as a registered supplier of milk and obtain a permit from the Chairman in that behalf.
15. No person shall sell, hawk, deliver, expose, carry or offer for sale within the village area, any milk adulterated with water or any other foreign substance or liquid.
16. No person shall at any time sell or expose, keep, carry, hawk or offer for sale any milk within the village area unless he is the licensee of a dairy or a registered supplier of milk or the authorised agent of such licensee or registered supplier.
17. Every licence holder, registered supplier or authorised vendor of milk shall carry his licence, permit or written authority when carrying, delivering, hawking or exposing milk for sale, and shall on demand made by any Sanitary Assistant or other person authorised thereto in writing by the Chairman produce the same for inspection.
18. The licensee of a dairy shall cause all dung, refuse, urine and washings to be removed from the dairy at least once a day, and disposed of at a suitable distance from the dairy in such manner as not cause a nuisance.
19. The licensee of a dairy shall keep every part of the dairy and its surroundings in a clean and sanitary condition.
20. The licensee of a dairy shall not cause or permit any milk to be poured into any vessel which is not thoroughly cleansed and which is not used exclusively for the purposes of the dairy.
21. The licensee of a dairy shall not cause or permit milk to be stored in any vessel other than a vessel made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware, tin or enamelled or galvanized iron.
22. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall enter a dairy or take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of milk, until the period of infection and incubation have elapsed.

23. The licensee of a dairy or a registered supplier shall not use any stray cow or any cow suffering from any disease, for milking purpose.
24. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to suspend for such time as may be necessary any dairy licence issued under by-law 13 or a permit issued under by-law 14 in any locality where cattle disease of any kind prevails.
25. The Chairman, the Sanitary Assistant or any person duly authorised thereto in writing by the Chairman, may at any time or place within the village area examine the milk of any dairy or any milk that is offered or carried for sale.
26. The issuing of a licence for a dairy or a permit for a supplier of milk shall be at the discretion of the Chairman who shall consult the Sanitary Assistant before the issue of such licence or permit.
27. Every licence or permit issued under these by-laws shall expire on December 31 of the year in respect of which such licence or permit is issued.
28. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of Village Committee;
 “Licence” means a licence issued under these by-laws; and
 “Licensee” means a person to whom a licence is issued.

Wells, Spouts, Bathing places, &c.

1. No person of one sex shall enter any enclosure at a public well, or any public bathing place set apart by the Committee for the exclusive use of persons of the other sex.

2. (1) No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or cutaneous disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at any public well or watering place set apart by the Committee as a public bathing place, until the periods of infection and of incubation have elapsed.

(2) Water for the use of any person referred to in paragraph (1) shall be drawn by a healthy person and carried for use to a distance of at least 20 feet from the well or bathing place.

3. (1) No person shall wash, or cause to be washed, any animal, or any clothes, mats, or other articles whatsoever, at any public well, or at any place set apart as a public bathing place.

(2) No person shall lead, or drive, or take any animal into any public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

(3) No person shall in any manner pollute the water, or the precincts, of any public well or bathing place.

4. (1) No person shall wash or bathe at any public well, spout, or other watering place at which washing or bathing is prohibited by order of the Committee.

(2) Where the Committee has set apart any special place in any tank, stream, or other watering place, for washing, for bathing, for taking water for human consumption or for the washing of animals, no person shall use any such place for any purpose other than that for which it has been so set apart.

5. No person shall, without the written permission of the Chairman, remove water from any public well, tank, or any other watering place, in any cart or barrel, or in any quantity exceeding such quantity as may from time to time be determined by the Committee.

6. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee; and
“Committee” means the Village Committee of the Talahena village area.

Bakeries, Eating-houses, Restaurants and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. In these by-laws—

“Bakery” means any premises in which bread, biscuit or confectionery is baked for sale as food for human consumption and includes any premises in which such food is prepared, or in which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored;

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Village Committee of the Maho village area;

“Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer.

2. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any bakery except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 2, unless the premises to be used as a bakery are in conformity with the following requirements:—

- the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
- the floor must be cemented;
- the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation and sufficient drains;
- a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof;
- the premises must not be situated within fifty feet of any cesspit, permanent manure heap, latrine or open sewer;
- the premises must be provided with a separate kneading room having superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 10 feet;
- there must be a free external air space, not less than seven feet wide, on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors and windows;
- the door of the oven must not open directly into the kneading room.

4. The licensee of a bakery shall cause—

- all utensils, furniture and other requisites used in or belonging to the bakery, to be kept clean;
- the tops of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned closely fitting planks, or of some non-harmful impervious material, and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;
- the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle, and removed from the bakery daily;
- the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy or cesspit and from any other similar nuisance;
- the flour which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet above the ground;
- all refuse from the premises of the bakery to be removed and the drains to be flushed daily;
- at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the premises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread;
- clean water, clean towels, nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread; and
- a copy in Sinhalese of these by-laws relating to bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.

5. The licensee of the bakery shall not—

- allow the bakery to be used as a place for sleeping or for keeping any animal or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery;
- allow any bread, biscuit or confectionery to be exposed for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;
- allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuit or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materials which are not good and wholesome;

- (d) use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor; or
- (e) allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises of the bakery.
6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuit or confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process, and shall wear a clean white apron, covering the chest, armpits and body, and also a white cap or turban.
7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.
8. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuit or confectionery, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant, or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.
- (2) The licensee or the person in charge of a bakery shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant, or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman or such officer, all such assistance as may be necessary.
10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.
11. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique, except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.
- (2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.
12. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 11, unless the premises to be used as an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique are in conformity with the following requirements:—
- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
- (c) the floor must be cemented; and
- (d) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof.
13. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause—
- (a) the premises thereof to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) all utensils, furniture or other equipment, used in or belonging to the eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique to be kept clean;
- (c) all refuse and dirt in or about the premises of the eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique to be swept and removed twice daily;
- (d) all cakes, sweets and other food exposed for sale on such premises to be kept in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;
- (e) all waste tea, coffee or milk and all remnants of food to be collected in a fly-proof receptacle with a close-fitting lid or cover, and removed from such premises twice daily;
- (f) all utensils used in the preparation, sale and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in every twenty-four hours;
- (g) every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by another customer; and
- (h) a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times in the premises so as to be available for inspection.
14. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall not permit—
- (a) any waste tea, coffee or milk or any remnants of food to be thrown on the floor of the licensed premises; or
- (b) any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the licensed premises.
15. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause at least two spittoons to be kept at all times on the licensed premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises, as well as to the employees.
16. No person shall spit within the premises of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

17. No person who is suffering, or has suffered, from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique to enter such place or take part in the preparation or sale of any food or drink therein, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

18. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant, or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee or the person in charge, of any eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

19. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to eating-houses, restaurants or tea or coffee boutiques, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

Conservancy and Scavenging.

1. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within the area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such Medical Officer.
2. If the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such Medical Officer certifies that any cesspit or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 1) situated on any premises within an area for which a conservancy service has been established is insanitary and dangerous to health, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.
3. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 1 or by-law 2 has been served shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.
4. Every occupier of premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.
5. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Village Committee shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.
6. The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Village Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Village Committee a conservancy fee at the rate specified in the Schedule hereto.
7. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine, whether constructed or in the course of construction, on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by him, to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset, and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of the inspection.
8. Upon the establishment of a scavenging service for the whole or any specified part of the village area, the occupier of any premises situated within an area for which such service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and other refuse from his premises to be deposited in a bucket or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.
9. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 8 shall—
- (1) daily between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause such bucket or bin to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road; and

(2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Village Committee.

10. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 8 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 9.

11. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Village Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Village Committee a scavenging fee at the rate specified in the Schedule hereto.

12. The conservancy fee referred to in by-law 6 and the scavenging fee referred to in by-law 11 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Village Committee or to any person duly authorised by him in writing to collect such fees, on or before the 10th day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fees are due: Provided that when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance, to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month, and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman that such premises were in fact not occupied during that month, no conservancy or scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of these premises for that month.

- (a) all utensils, furniture and other requisites used in or belonging to the bakery, to be kept clean;
- (b) the tops of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned, closely-fitting planks or of some non-harmful impervious material and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;
- (c) the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle and removed from the bakery daily;
- (d) the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, or cesspit and from any other similar nuisance;
- (e) the flour which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet above the ground;
- (f) all refuse from the premises of the bakery to be removed and the drains to be flushed daily;
- (g) at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the premises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread;
- (h) clean water, clean towels, nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread; and
- (i) a copy in Sinhalese of these by-laws relating to bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.

5. The licensee of a bakery shall not—

- (a) allow the bakery to be used as a place for sleeping or for keeping any animal or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery;
- (b) allow any bread, biscuit or confectionery to be exposed for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;
- (c) allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuit or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materials which are not good and wholesome;
- (d) use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor; or
- (e) allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises of the bakery.

6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuit, confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process and shall wear a clean white apron, covering the chest, armpits, and body and also a white cap or turban.

7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

8. No person who is suffering, or had suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuit or confectionery, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.

(2) The licensee or the person in charge of a bakery shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman or such officer, all such assistance as may be necessary.

10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or offender of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

11. (1) No person shall establish or carry on business at any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

12. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 11, unless the premises to be used as an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique are in conformity with the following requirements:—

- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
- (c) the floor must be cemented; and
- (d) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof.

13. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause—

- (a) the premises thereof to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition;

- (b) all utensils, furniture or other equipment, used in or belonging to the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be kept clean ;
- (c) all refuse and dirt in or about the premises of the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be swept and removed twice daily ;
- (d) all cakes, sweets and other food exposed for sale on such premises to be kept in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases ;
- (e) all waste tea, coffee or milk and all remnants of food to be collected in a fly-proof receptacle with a close fitting lid or cover, and removed from such premises twice daily ;
- (f) all utensils used in the preparation, sale and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in every twenty-four hours ;
- (g) every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by another customer ; and
- (h) a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times in the premises so as to be available for inspection.

14. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall not permit—

- (a) any waste tea, coffee or milk or any remnants of food to be thrown on the floor of the licensed premises ; or
- (b) any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the licensed premises.

15. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique shall cause at least two spittoons to be kept at all times on the premises so as to be readily available to the visitors to the premises, as well as to the employees.

16. No person shall spit within the premises of an eating-house, restaurant or tea or coffee boutique except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

17. No person who is suffering or who has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to enter such place or take part in the preparation or sale of any food or drink therein, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

18. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee or the person in charge of any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

19. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to eating-houses, restaurants or tea or coffee boutiques, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

TEXTILES CONTROL ORDERS, 1945.

Order No. 38.

Prescribed Prices of Textiles Manufactured on Handlooms.

ORDER made by the Controller of Textiles under Regulation 20 of the Defence (Control of Textiles) Regulations, 1945.

1. No regulated textile manufactured on handlooms and exported from India on or after May 20, 1946, shall be sold or supplied, or offered or attempted to be sold or supplied, or be exposed for sale or supply by retail at prices exceeding those indicated in columns (11) and (12) of Part I. in Schedule “A” hereto.

Provided that :

- (a) in the case of goods on which import duty in Ceylon has been paid at 15 per cent. the prices indicated in columns (11) and (12) shall be increased by 8.4 per cent.
- (b) in the case of goods on which import duty in Ceylon has been paid at 15 per cent. and 10 per cent. as surcharge the prices indicated in columns (11) and (12) shall be increased by 9.4 per cent.

2. No such regulated textile aforesaid shall be sold by wholesale at a price exceeding the maximum retail price prescribed in the above paragraph reduced by 15 per cent.

3. Where any regulated textiles manufactured on handlooms and imported into Ceylon do not correspond to any individual item in Schedule "A", the importer shall produce a certificate regarding counts of yarn, ends and picks, width, and export price applicable from the Provincial Textile Commissioner of the Province from which the textiles were exported to Ceylon.

4. For the purposes of this Order the date on which the goods have been handed over to a Shipping or Railway Company in India shall be deemed to be the date of export.

5. Textiles Control Order No. 10 published in *Government Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,423 of June 27, 1945, and Textile Control Order No. 24 Amendment No. 1; 24 Amendment No. 2; 24 Amendment No. 3, shall continue to apply to all regulated textiles manufactured on handlooms and imported into Ceylon on or before October 2, 1945, and May 20, 1946, respectively.

6. The information contained in Schedule "A" shall be interpreted subject to the explanatory notes contained in Schedule "B".

7. Until such time as Schedules of additions to the prescribed basic prices on account of borders and headings are published, the additions specified in Parts III., IV., and V. of the Schedule to Order No. 10 shall be applicable to the prices prescribed in this Order.

8. If any regulated textile which cannot be exactly identified with any one item in Schedule "A" is imported into Ceylon the maximum retail price of such textile shall be the price applicable to the variety in Schedule "A" to which the Controller may hold that such textile corresponds.

9. Subject to the specific reservations made in this Order Textiles Control Order No. 10 and Textile Control Order No. 24, 24 Amendment No. 1, 24 Amendment No. 2, 24 Amendment No. 3, shall be deemed to be revoked with effect from this date.

Explanatory Notes and Instructions.

1. The rates quoted in column 12 of Schedule "A" are the maximum retail prices per yard applicable in any part of the Island to the classes of material specified therein.
2. In fixing the maximum retail prices 3 per cent. export cess levied in the country of export and 5 per cent. import duty levied at the port of entry have been taken into account and no further addition will be allowed in respect of them.
3. In the case of articles which are sold by the unit such as sarongs, camboys, dhoties, sarees, &c., and not by the yard, the goods will be price-marked and sold by the article, the price of the article to be stamped on it being determined by its length.
4. The terms "ends and picks" in column (3) denote the number of threads per inch in the warp and weft respectively. Materials falling below the specifications are liable to corresponding reductions of the schedule prices.
5. Any handloom materials imported into Ceylon with dyes inferior to those specified in column (9) of Schedule "A" shall be liable to assessment at reduced Schedule prices.
6. Importers of handloom goods shall be responsible for identifying, grading and assorting of consignments for the purposes of price marking.
7. The Schedule contains a complete list of handloom textiles which are permitted for export to Ceylon with the specification of each variety as published by the Madras Provincial Textile Commissioner in Fort St. George Gazette No. 37 of September 11, 1945; and column 10 of the schedule contains the maximum export price of each variety as prescribed by the Madras Provincial Commissioner and published in Fort St. George Gazette No. 40 of October 2, 1945, and Fort St. George Gazette No. 45 of November 6, 1945.

TEXTILES CONTROL NOTICE No. 248.

To Outstation Importers in Handloom Textiles.

WITH reference to the Textiles Control Notice No. 240, which appeared in the Press on May 9, 1946, I observe that importers outside Colombo still submit invoices for price marking in respect of consignments of Handloom textiles without the samples, which they have been required to forward at one and the same time as the invoices or shortly afterwards for verification.

2. It is hereby notified that from the date of publication of this notice, no invoices submitted by dealers personally or sent by post for purposes of price marking without the corresponding samples, will be accepted by the Assistant Controller of Textiles, Distribution Office but will be returned to the dealers to be forwarded along with samples, selected and authenticated by the Assistant Controller of the area or by an officer authorised by him.

3. Where an invoice is sent by post, and the corresponding samples are also being sent separately by post or rail, the importer must make an endorsement in the price marking application form that these samples are being so forwarded, and attach to it any documents that may be necessary to enable the Assistant Controller, Price Marking, to take delivery of the samples from the railway or the Post Office.

TEXTILES CONTROL NOTICE No. 249.

Distribution of Textiles to Retailers in the Western Province.

FROM June 16, 1946, the Retail dealers and Hawkers of the Western Province outside the Colombo Municipality will be absorbed into the Provincial wholesale distribution scheme and will not draw their supplies from Colombo City. A separate notice will be published giving the names of the wholesale dealers from whom they must buy.

2. The scheme of wholesale sales in Colombo City will relate to periods of two weeks each, and on the first Sunday

and Monday of that period there will be no wholesale sales at all. On the first Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday there will be sales to retail dealers in Colombo City only. From the Friday up to the end of the following week only Provincial wholesalers can buy from Colombo wholesalers.

3. The first fortnightly period under this scheme will commence on June 16 up to June 29, inclusive.

TEXTILES CONTROL NOTICE No. 250.

American Cotton Precegoods—Notice to Importers.

IT has been decided to replace the present system of bulk purchase by Government of the whole of the allocation of American Textiles by import through the trade. Import licences will be issued by the Controller of Imports to merchants who hold the Textiles Controller's authority to import textiles against firm offers from American exporters within the categories constituting the allocation.

2. Indents should be forwarded to the Controller of Imports in quadruplicate to reach his office not later than August 15, 1946.

3. Letters of Credit should be opened within fourteen days of the issue of import licences and, if a letter of credit is not opened within the specified time, the licence issued is liable to cancellation.

4. A separate indent should be sent in for each class of textiles under the American C. P. R. B. Classification.

5. When the allocation under any class is exhausted the remaining indents will be returned to the applicants and no licences will be issued.

6. All applications for licences should quote the Textiles licence number of the dealer and state whether he holds my authority to import.

7. The third quarter's allocation has not yet been made but importers are advised to entertain offers and apply for import licences on the basis of the second quarter's allocation. All offers must quote the class and item number under the American C. P. R. B. Classification.

8. A copy of the schedule of classification as well as a statement of the allocations made for the second quarter, 1946, can be seen on application at the Office of the Control of Textiles, or at that of the Assistant Controller of Textiles, Colombo, at 104, Second Cross street, Pettah.

TRADE DISPUTE—MESSRS. WALKER, SONS AND COMPANY, LIMITED, COLOMBO.

THE Ceylon Mercantile Union presented a petition to me under section 6 of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, with regard to a trade dispute that had arisen between the said Union and Messrs Walker, Sons & Co., Ltd., Colombo. The petition was referred to a Special Tribunal appointed by His Excellency the Governor under the proviso to section 5 of the said Order for adjudication.

2. The following findings and award dated May 30, 1946, made by the Special Tribunal are published for general information in terms of section 8 (4) of the above-mentioned Order:—

“The petition presented by the Ceylon Mercantile Union on behalf of the clerical staff, peons and other workers attached to the offices of Messrs. Walker, Sons & Co., Ltd., and their branches in outstations makes demands that the clerical staff should be paid salaries in accordance with the scale prescribed by the Award of the Special Tribunal and published in the *Government Gazette* of October 5, 1945, and that the peons and other minor employees should be paid their salaries in accordance with the terms agreed upon between the President of the Bank Clerks' Union and the Chairman of the Exchange Banks Association.

These demands have been resisted by the respondent chiefly on two grounds. (a) that the respondent firm will not be able to pay salaries on the scales demanded in view of the downward trend in its business and in view of the competitive nature of the business done by an engineering firm. (The respondent firm did a considerable amount of service for the British Admiralty during the war years and earned enormous profits.) (b) that the nature of the duties performed by the clerks employed in this firm is not comparable with the duties performed by the Mercantile clerks employed by the various Mercantile firms in Colombo in respect of whom the award of October 5, 1945, was made.

As regards the first objection, while it is true that the income earned by the respondent after the cessation of hostilities is bound to be less, in fixing a scale of salaries to Ceylonese clerks employed by this firm, regard must be had to the following factors. (1) A living wage to a Mercantile clerk. (2) The salaries paid to Mercantile clerks engaged in the performance of similar and comparable duties. (3) The capacity of the employer to pay the salaries prescribed.

In fixing a scale of salaries to these clerks, one must necessarily bear in mind the nature of the output of work turned out by the respondent during normal working years. The abnormal amount of work and the considerably enhanced profits earned during the years of the war will therefore have no bearing in arriving at any result for the determination of the dispute. During this period, a larger clerical staff was employed at the Iron Works of this Company at Mutwal. With decrease of work there is bound to be a reduction in the clerical and other staff. An improved scale of salaries may also necessitate a reduction in the staff if the Company finds that they cannot meet the increased salary bill without a reduction of staff. This reduction of staff can possibly be effected by a reorganization of the office system whereby it may be possible to reduce the number of the European and Ceylonese staff employed by this Company.

The Tribunal pointedly drew the attention of the President of the Ceylon Mercantile Union to the possible consequence of unemployment of a certain percentage of the present staff if the salary scales are improved and the Company in consequence decides upon a retrenchment of staff. On behalf of the Trade Union, I was informed that it was a principle of the Union to press for a living wage even if in consequence some members of the staff may be thrown out of employment.

The respondent has produced a statement marked A* giving a list of all its employees as at December 31, 1945, showing their period of service, their present salary, the salary which would be paid to each of them according to a scheme of regrading suggested by the Respondent Company. On behalf of the petitioner, a similar document* has been submitted showing the salaries which should be paid to these various clerks in terms of the Special Tribunal's award dated October 5, 1945. I have carefully examined these documents and find that the salaries paid to several of these clerks after a period of service falls short of the salary point which they would have reached if they were paid salaries payable to Mercantile clerks in terms of the award above referred to. It may be that the Junior clerks employed by this Company and who perform ordinary routine duties are employed in performing what was described as “hack work”. I find

as a fact that the duties performed by them are similar and comparable to similar routine duties performed by the Mercantile clerks to whom the award of October 5, 1945, applies. That Award took into consideration the question of a living wage to a Mercantile clerk. That consideration must apply equally well to the clerks employed by this Company. The salary scale prescribed by the award of October 5, 1945, will be made applicable as regards all clerks in the lower grade according to the salary scheme applicable to Grades 1 and 2 of which a copy is hereto annexed. According to that scheme, the initial salary of a clerk is fixed at Rs. 50. He will receive annual increments as provided for Grade 1. When a clerk reaches the salary point of Rs. 90 per month and at the time when his next annual increment falls due, his employer will assess his previous work, his capacity and suitability for promotion to Grade 2. If the clerk is then found to be suitable for promotion to Grade 2, he will be transferred to that grade and receive increments as provided for that grade. If he is found unsuitable for promotion to Grade 2, he will continue to remain in Grade 1 and draw his increments until he reaches the maximum salary of Rs. 150 per month provided for that grade.

Grades 1 and 2 referred to above will comprise the members of the Junior clerical staff. Most members of the Clerical Staff in this firm, will, it is anticipated, be placed in these grades and draw the salaries provided for them. The Senior Staff according to the grading submitted by the respondent company consists of Bookkeepers, Insurance Clerks, Legal Clerks, Senior Clerks, Chief Bookkeeper, Senior Store Clerk, Assistants, Foremen, Draughtsmen, Overseers, Cashiers, Radio Mechanics, Salesmen, Assistant Storekeepers and Senior Wharf Clerk. I would divide this senior staff and place them in 2 grades—Higher Grade, Class 1, and Higher Grade, Class 2. The salary scale of the Higher Grade, Class 1, is as set out in Schedule A commencing from Rs. 210 and going up to a maximum of Rs. 275 by increments as shown therein. The salary scale for the Higher Grade, Class 2, is Rs. 290 to Rs. 350, by annual increments of Rs. 15 per year. The employer being the best judge of the nature of the duties performed by the various classes of employees falling within the category of the Senior Staff as detailed by him, he is directed to place these employees on either of the classes falling within the higher grade and assign to them the appropriate salary in that class. It should be understood that no employee should as a result of this reclassification receive a less salary than he is at present drawing.

Promotion of a clerk from the junior grade to the higher grade will depend upon a vacancy occurring in the higher grades and upon the eligibility of a clerk for such promotion. The respondent may also at his discretion have a special grade for his clerical staff on a salary scale Rs. 355—15—400. An appointment to the special grade of any officer will be at the discretion of the employer and on any salary point on the scale abovementioned.

Salary Scale of Stenographers.—The respondent has submitted a salary scale for stenographers in the scheme suggested by him marked Z*. I have considered this scheme and find it satisfactory. I would adopt that scheme and award that the salary scale for stenographers shall be as set out in Schedule B annexed hereto. I would also add that if a stenographer passes the Higher Commercial Examination conducted by the Technical College, the employer will place him in a higher scale if he has proved himself to be an efficient stenographer and a neat typist with accuracy and speed. His salary in that higher scale will be Rs. 215—15—275.

Salaries of Peons and Lift-drivers.—Their initial salary should be Rs. 30 per mensem with increments of Re. 1.50 per mensem at the end of each year until they reach a maximum salary of Rs. 75 per mensem.

Head Peon.—There will be one Head Peon attached to the office in the Fort. He will be paid his salary on the scale prescribed for peons. His maximum salary will be Rs. 90 per month. When appointed Head Peon, his initial salary will be Rs. 75 rising by increments of Rs. 2.50 per mensem for each year until a maximum of Rs. 90 is reached.

Salary Scale of Messenger Boys.—Their initial salary is fixed at Rs. 25 per month rising by increments of Re. 1 per mensem for each year to Rs. 30.

Labourers employed in the Office.—The wages of unskilled labourers employed in the workshops of this Company are, I understand, regulated by and payments made in terms of the decisions made by the Wages Board relating to the Engineering Trade. In terms of the agreement arrived at, I award that the labourers employed in the office be paid their salary on the scale which I have awarded for Peons.

Watchers.—I award that watchers be paid wages as provided for them in the decision of the Engineering Wages Board.

Five Statutory Holidays.—I find from the evidence of Mr. Badman that all employees concerned in this dispute are given a holiday with pay on 6 days and also on days which are regarded as days of religious observance. I find also that if a clerk or employee is called upon to work on any of these statutory holidays, he is either given a substitute holiday or is paid overtime for work on that day. In view of this fact, I award that the existing practice should continue.

Leave.—I find that the Ceylonese staff is given 14 days full-pay leave each year. An employee is also given casual leave with pay for sufficient reason. The employees are also given full-pay leave on the ground of illness for a period of 3 months. I award that these privileges should be continued but I do not wish to fix a specified period for the purpose of casual leave.

Provident Fund.—I award that the employer should contribute to the Provident Fund each month $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the employee's salary and recover from the employee 5 per cent. of his salary each month as his contribution to the Fund. The respondent will, I take it, continue to make payment of any pension or gratuity which in the past he has been accustomed to pay according to any schemes in operation. If these payments were merely *ex gratia* payments, I make no award to compel the employer to make such payments. The above remarks apply also to the Christmas and Annual bonus paid by the Company to its employees.

Age of Retirement.—At the age of 60, an employee, can at his option, retire from the firm. The employer can also terminate the services of the employee at that age.

This award will take effect from June 1, 1946, and will, as agreed, be applicable to the branch establishments of Walker, Sons & Co., Ltd.

P.S.—As regards war allowance, in view of the statement made by Mr. Choksy in the course of the inquiry that the respondent Company is paying dearness allowance either at Government rates or at 30 per centum of the salary as awarded by Mr. Roberts, whichever amount is greater, I award that the respondent Company should continue to pay war allowance either on the Government scale or at 30 per centum of the employee's salary, whichever amount is greater, as they are doing at present.

Internal Purchase Scheme.

Harvesting of Paddy in Talpe Pattu, Four Gravets and Hinidum Pattu of Galle District for the 1946 Yala Season.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations, 1942, the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, and the Defence (Food Rationing) (Special Provisions) Regulations, 1944, I, William Oswald Stevens, Government Agent, Southern Province, a competent and a proper authority, do, by this Order, direct that every owner or cultivator of any land which is cultivated with paddy during the 1946 Yala season and which is situated within the Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's divisions of Talpe pattu, Four Gravets and Hinidum pattu of the Galle District shall—

- (1) inform the Village Headman of the area in which the paddy land is situated of the date on which it is proposed to reap the harvest on that land, not less than 10 clear days ahead;
- (2) give the Village Headman or other person authorised by me, at his request, the following information relating to the land:—
 - (a) the name, situation and extent of the land;
 - (b) the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of the land, under any contract or agreement or otherwise; and
 - (c) the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

2. I do further direct that—

- (1) no paddy shall be removed or caused or permitted to be removed by any person from a field or threshing floor to a barn or any other place of storage until the Village Headman or other person authorised by me shall have assessed and recorded the total harvest and the shares; and except on a permit on due form obtained from the proper authority in terms of paragraph 4 of this Order;
- (2) the Government levy of 2 bushels of paddy per acre for the Yala season shall be handed over to the Village Headman at the threshing floor;
- (3) no paddy shall, without prior authority, be disposed of in any manner other than by way of consumption at approved rates by the owner and his *bona fide* dependants subject to a maximum of 50 bushels or such lower quantity as they may be entitled to until the following harvest;

(4) no paddy shall be utilised for consumption by an owner or his dependant possessing a Rice Ration book until the surrender of the appropriate number of rice coupons;

(5) any paddy in excess of the requirements for consumption as laid down in clause (3) and, in the case of those who normally supply seed paddy and customarily feed labourers during cultivation operations, any paddy in excess of the requirements for consumption, seed paddy at the rate of 2½ bushels of paddy per acre and feeding allowance at the rate of 1 bushel of paddy per acre, or such other quantity of paddy as I may order shall be sold to the Village Headman on behalf of Government.

3. The approved rates of consumption of paddy by producers at present are 6 measures of paddy per person per week in the case of cultivators and owner cultivators and their dependants, and four measures of paddy per person per week in the case of non-cultivating owners and their dependants. Coupons in respect of paddy shall be surrendered at the rate of one rice coupon for every six measures of paddy received by a cultivator or an owner cultivator and one rice coupon for every four measures of paddy received by a non-cultivating owner. In this connection the attention of all paddy producers is drawn to the Defence (Food Rationing) (Special Provisions) Regulations, 1944, by which the onus of surrender of coupons equivalent to the quantity of paddy obtained is laid on the producers themselves.

4. Permits for transport of paddy from the field or threshing floor to a barn situated within the same Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's division shall be obtained from the Village Headman concerned who will obtain the signature of the remover on the triplicate of the permit on form D. F. S. and C. 12 or I. P. S. 33 in proof of removal, and detach the requisite number of coupons from the Rice Ration Books of the members of the producer's household. It is important that these permits should be surrendered to the Village Headman of the area to which the paddy is transported within 3 days of such removal thereto. For transport from one Chief Headman's or Divisional Revenue Officer's Division to another, or from one Emergency A. G. A.'s area to another, or from one district to another, application should be made to the Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent, or the Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which the applicant is resident giving all particulars asked for in form D. F. C. 34 (duplicate) copies of which can be obtained from any of the above offices. To expedite the issue of permits, the applicants are requested to produce reports from the Village Headman or any other authorised person of the areas of their residence and of the areas in which the paddy lands are situated giving particulars of their households and of their shares of paddy from the various fields.

5. If no application is made in the manner described above within 6 weeks from the date of harvesting, all stocks of paddy are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.

"Improvements in coagulating or separating rubber from latex."

Abstract:—The inventors describe a method of coagulating rubber electrolytically by means of an alternating current with or without the superposition of a direct current. The frequency of the a.c. current is adjusted to get the optimum results for the kind of latex treated, and the d.c. current value is adjusted so as to equal the r.m.s. value of the a.c. current.

The apparatus consists of a water-cooled tank with electrodes which are also water-cooled. Provision is made for raising and lowering the tank and for blowing compressed air so as to agitate the latex under treatment.

Thermostatic means are employed to cut off the current when undue rise of temperature is experienced.

The inventors state that this method is of particular merit in treating juice from the shrub *Sonchus Oleraceus*. To obtain the best results it may be found necessary to adjust the p^H value of the extract of the plant by the addition of a small quantity of acid or alkali.

Abstract:—The inventors describe a method of preparing extracts suitable for oral and/or parenteral administration derived from the livers of fish of the shark family (the viviparous and oviparous Selachians of the Elasmobranchii group) wherein the liquor obtained from the cleaned minced livers by well known methods such as subjecting the livers to pressure and/or extracting them with acidulated water, suitably adjusting the p^H value, heating for half an hour at 80°C and removing the coagulated proteins and oil, is further subjected to the process of repeated fractional precipitation with alcohol. The last mentioned process comprises the addition of 90% alcohol to the concentrated extract so as to secure a percentage of 70 of alcohol in the resulting mixture; separating the inactive proteins which are thrown off, and concentrating the filtrate again by distillation under low pressure; subsequently the filtrate is treated with absolute alcohol so as to secure a concentration of 90-95% in the resulting mixture, at which stage a buff coloured precipitate will be thrown off containing the active material. This is dried to a powder and taken up with sterile water to be ampouled for use.

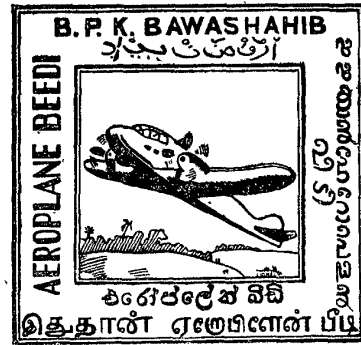

THE CENSUS ORDINANCE.

RULE made by the Governor under section 4 of the Census Ordinance (Chapter 118).

Rule.

The Census Rules, 1945, published in *Gazette* No. 9,435 of July 20, 1945, as amended by any subsequent rule, are hereby amended by the addition at the end thereof, of the following:—

“VIII.—Rules for the Census of Commerce, Industry and Trade.”

1. The owner or person in charge of every commercial or industrial undertaking, whether private owned or state-aided having ten or more paid employees and/or working with a capital of one thousand rupees or more shall, within fifteen days of the publication in the *Gazette* of a notice by the Superintendent calling for such declaration, make a declaration in the form set out hereunder:—

‘Declaration (under rule 1 of the Rules for the Census of Commerce, Industry and Trade)’.

For the purpose of this rule:—

“industrial undertaking” includes:—

- (a) mines, quarries and other works for the extraction of minerals from the earth,
- (b) industries in which articles are manufactured, altered, cleaned, repaired, ornamented, finished, adapted for sale, broken up or demolished, or in which materials are transformed, including ship-building, and the generation, transformation and transmission of electricity and motive power of any kind,
- (c) construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, alteration or demolition of any building, railway, tramway, harbour, dock, pier, canal, inland waterway, road, tunnel, bridge, viaduct, sewer, drain, well, telegraphic or telephonic installation, electrical undertaking, gaswork, waterwork, or other work of construction, as well as the preparation for or laying the foundations of any such work or structure,
- (d) transport of passengers or goods by road or rail, including the handling of goods at docks, quays, wharves, and warehouses but excluding transport by hand.

“commercial undertaking” includes:—

- (a) banking, insurance, finance, business, estate agency, imports and exports, shipping agency and associated business, lighterage, coaling and fuelling,
- (b) wholesale and/or retail business in any commodity,
- (c) dry cleaners, dyeworks, laundries, barber saloons, beauty parlours, photographic studios, theatres and picture houses, hotels, cafes, restaurants, bars, taverns, bakeries and tailoring establishments.
