THE HOUSING AND TOWN IMPROVEMENT ORDINANCE.

THE following resolution passed by the State Council at a meeting held on March 3, 1945, is published for general information:—

This Council resolves under the provisions of section 3 (b) of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199) that, notwithstanding anything contained in the resolution passed by the Legislative Council on June 26,

1920, and published in *Gazette* No. 7,113 of July 2, 1920' the aforesaid Ordinance shall, with effect from the first day of April, 1945, be in force only in that part of Tissamaharama which is defined in the Schedule hereto.

V. P. 631), thence by a line drawn southwards along the said village boundary and crossing the said road at the 7th mile stone to a point 50 fathoms south of the western edge of the said road.

South, by a line drawn from the last-mentioned point north-westwards parallel to and at a distance of 50 fathoms west of the western edge of the Wirawila-Kirinda road as far as a point 50 fathoms south of the southern edge of the Wirawila-Kataragama road, thence by a line drawn westwards parallel to and at a distance of 50 fathoms south of the southern edge of the said road as far as a point 50 fathoms east of the eastern edge of the new Hambantota-Tissa road, thence by a line drawn southwards parallel to and at a distance of 50 fathoms east of the eastern edge of the said road as far as the left bank of Kirindi-oya, thence north-westwards along the said bank passing the new bridge on the said road to a point 50 fathoms west of the western edge of the said road.

West, by a line drawn from the last-mentioned point northwards parallel to and at a distance of 50 fathoms west of the western edge of the new Hambantota-Tissa road as far as a point 50 fathoms south of the southern edge of the Wirawila-Kataragama road, thence by a line drawn westwards parallel to and at a distance of 50 fathoms south of the southern edge of the said road as far as the left bank of Kirindi-oya, thence northwards along the said bank passing the old bridge on the said road to the starting point of the northern limit of the area.

REGULATIONS made by the proper authority in that behalf, to wit, the Kuliyaipitiya Urban Council, under section 22 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201) and confirmed by the Governor by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section.

Regulations.

1. The public slaughter-house proclaimed under section 21 of the Ordinance shall be in charge of the Sanitary Inspector of the Kuliyaipitiya Urban Council. Such officer shall be responsible for the discipline and sanitary conditions within such slaughter-house.

2. (1) No person shall slaughter any animal at the slaughter-house—

(a) unless such animal has been inspected by the officer appointed by the Council for the purpose, and approved by him as fit to be slaughtered for human food; or

(b) except between the hours of 7 A.M. and 9 A.M.; Provided that the Chairman may in any case authorise the slaughter of any animal at any time other than that specified herein.

(2) No person shall slaughter any animal at the slaughter-house—

(a) at any time after the expiry of a period of 72 hours from the time of the approval of that animal under paragraph (1); or

(b) if it has been removed alive from the slaughter-house premises after it was approved under paragraph (1), unless it is again inspected and approved under that paragraph as fit to be slaughtered for human food.

3. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of the slaughter-house shall take all such measures as may be necessary to ensure that that animal is adequately fed and watered while it remains in those premises.

4. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of the slaughter-house shall, if the animal is rejected as unfit for slaughter, immediately after such rejection remove the animal or cause it to be removed from those premises.

5. The Medical Officer of Health, Kuliyaipitiya, or the officer referred to in regulation 2, may prohibit the slaughter of any animal if, after it has been approved under regulation 2, it is found to be diseased or unfit to be slaughtered for human food.

6. If the meat or offal of any animal slaughtered in the slaughter-house is, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health or of the Officer referred to in regulation 2, diseased or unfit for human consumption, he shall cause the meat or offal to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent such meat or offal being exposed for sale or used for human consumption.

7. The officer in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animal which has not been approved as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption or the slaughter of which has been prohibited as provided in regulation 5.

8. (1) No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health or the officer referred to in regulation 2, any meat or offal which has been declared under regulation 6 to be unfit for human food.

(2) No person shall remove the carcase of any animal, intended for human consumption from the slaughter-house, unless such carcase has been stamped on its fore-quarters and hind-quarters with the mark "U. C. Kuliyaipitiya" by the officer in charge of the slaughter-house.

9. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of any other animal or until the carcase of every animal previously slaughtered in the premises shall have been removed or skinned off and the premises cleaned.

10. (1) A fee at the following rates shall be paid in advance to the Council for the use of the slaughter-house, and no animal shall be permitted to be slaughtered without an official receipt in proof of payment of the fee:—

For cattle ..	1 0 per head
For sheep, goats, or pigs ..	0 50 per head

These rates shall cover exposure in the proper spot for 24 hours. An additional fee at one half the above rates shall be paid for each further period of exposure not exceeding 24 hours.

(2) Where an animal has been approved under regulation 2 as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption, the production of an official receipt in proof of payment of the fee shall not be necessary prior to the admission of that animal to the slaughter-house.

11. The keeper of the slaughter-house shall maintain a register in the following form of all cattle removed to the slaughter-house:—

12. The regulations under section 23 (now section 22) of the Ordinance, published in *Gazette* No. 7,536 of July 16, 1926, and therein referred to as "Rules" are hereby rescinded in so far as they relate to the town of Kuliyaipitiya.

- "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Council;
 "Council" means the Kuliyaipitiya Urban Council;
 "Ordinance" means the Butchers Ordinance.

By-law.

The General by-laws relating to licences made by the Kadugannawa Urban Council, and published in *Gazette* No. 9,421 of June 22, 1945, are hereby amended as follows:—

- (1) in by-law 2, by the substitution, for the words "ice factory or public bathing place," of the words "ice factory, hair dressing saloon or barber's shop, or public bathing place";
- (2) by the re-numbering of by-law 194 as by-law 245;
- (3) in the re-numbered by-law 245 by the insertion immediately after the words "Public Bathing places," of the words "butchers' stalls, fish stalls";
- (4) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 193, of the following new by-laws which shall take effect as by-laws 194 to 244:—

Butchers' stalls.

194. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a butcher's stall unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following conditions:—

- (1) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided

with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.

- (2) The walls of every room in every part must be not less than 7 feet in height, and must be built of bricks, stone, or cobwork, with the inside thereof lime plastered and limewashed, and the lower 4 feet of the internal surface must be covered with glazed tiles or be plastered in cement.
- (3) The eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground.
- (4) The roof must be made of some permanent material.
- (5) The woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed.
- (6) The floor must be cemented throughout.
- (7) The premises must be provided with adequate drainage.
- (8) The tables and all the furniture must be capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.
- (9) Every table on which meat is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.
- (10) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
- (11) The premises must be at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.
- (12) There must be no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within, or directly communicating with the premises.

195. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Butcher's Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

196. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause a copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep on the premises a list of the names and the addresses of all employees including vendors of meat so as to be at all reasonable times available for inspection, by the Chairman or any person authorised by him.

197. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles, or are plastered in cement to be limewashed, and shall cause the woodwork, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

198. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause the floor, the tiles, or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging meat to be kept polished and free from rust.

199. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep every part of the licensed premises, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of meat clean and in good repair, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance.

200. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises. He shall keep the spittoon so as to be easily accessible to those employed on the premises.

201. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in a covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always covered except at the times when refuse is being actually placed therein.

202. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep the licensed premises free from rats, and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as these are discovered.

203. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

204. No person shall spit within a butcher's stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

205. No person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or cutaneous disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter a butcher's stall or take part in the storing, preparation, or sale of meat therein, or in the transport of any meat to or from such premises.

206. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall knowingly permit the contravention by any person of the above by-laws numbered 204 and 205.

207. No licensee shall keep or allow to be kept in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or articles other than those used for the purpose in the storing, preparation, or sale of meat.

208. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall allow any place on the same level with the butcher's stall and forming part of the same building to be used as a sleeping place, unless such place is effectually separated from the butcher's stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless

such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when opened shall be not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.

209. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

210. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall sell, or expose for sale on the licensed premises any meat except the meat of animals slaughtered either in a public slaughter-house within the limits of the Council duly declared and proclaimed under section 21 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201) or in a place appointed for the purpose by the Chairman, under section 22 of the said Ordinance, or under a special licence issued under section 14 of the said Ordinance.

211. Every licensee of a butcher's stall shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of meat during the hours 7 A.M. to 10 A.M. and 3 P.M. to 7 P.M.

212. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall allow any person to transport meat for sale from his licensed premises unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the butcher's stall.

213. No licensee of a butcher's stall shall permit any person to transport for sale from his licensed premises any meat except in closed vehicle or closed basket, tin or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin or other receptacle is at all times kept clean and wholesome.

214. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a butcher's stall, issue cards of registration for the use of every person employed by such licensee in transporting meat for sale.

Fish Stalls.

215. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a fish stall unless the premises to be licensed comply with the following condition—

- (1) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fiftieth of the superficial floor space.
- (2) The walls of every room in every part must be not less than 7 feet in height and must be limeplastered and limewashed except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement.
- (3) The eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground.
- (4) The woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed.
- (5) The floor must be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered and emptying into a bucket.
- (6) Every table on which fish is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.
- (7) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
- (8) The premises must be at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.
- (9) There must be no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the premises.

216. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Fish Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

217. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a copy of these regulations relating to fish stalls in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep on the premises a list of the names and addresses of all employees including vendors of fish so as to be at all times available for inspection by the Chairman or any person authorised by him.

218. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the fish stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be limewashed, or if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

219. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging fish to be kept polished and free from rust.

220. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep every part of the fish stall, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of fish in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance.

221. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises. He shall keep the spittoon so as to be easily accessible to those employed on the premises.

222. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always as covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

223. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep the licensed premises free from rats and shall fill up all rat holes with broken glass and plaster such holes with cement as soon as these are discovered.

224. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

225. No person shall spit within a fish stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

226. No person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or cutaneous disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such a disease, shall enter a fish stall or take part in the storing, preparation, or sale of fish therein, or in the transport of any fish to or from such premises.

227. No licensee of a fish stall shall knowingly permit the contravention by any person of any of the by-laws numbered 224, 225 and 226.

228. No licensee shall keep or allow to be kept in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or other articles, except those used for the purpose of storing, preparation, or sale of fish.

229. No licensee of a fish stall shall allow to be used for sleeping any place on the same level with the fish stall and forming part of the same building unless such place is effectually separated from the fish stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

230. Every licensee of a fish stall shall provide the licensed premises with an ample supply of potable water.

231. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of fish.

232. No licensee of a fish stall shall allow any person to transport fish for sale from the licensed premises unless he is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of a fish stall.

233. No licensee of a fish stall shall allow any person to transport for sale from his licensed premises any fish except in a closed vehicle, or in a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin or other receptacle is at all times kept clean.

234. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a fish stall, issue cards of registration for the use of persons employed by such licensee in transporting fish for sale.

Hair Dressing Saloons or Barbers' Shops.

235. No person shall be entitled to obtain a licence to keep a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop unless the building or part of the building to be used for the purpose, and the equipment of the saloon or shop, are in conformity with the following conditions and requirements:—

(1) The building or part of the building—

- (a) must be substantially constructed, and must have a floor space of not less than 120 square feet; provided that the requirements of this paragraph shall not apply to any building in which a saloon or shop is carried on or kept at the date of the publication of this by-law in the *Gazette*;
- (b) must have its walls lime-plastered and limewashed, its roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white, its floor cemented, and the junction of the floor with the walls rounded off with cement;
- (c) must be well lighted and well ventilated; and
- (d) must be provided with satisfactory drains, and with satisfactory latrine accommodation either within the building or on the premises.

(2) If any part of the building is used or is intended to be used for residential purposes, that part must be in conformity with the requirements of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199).

(3) The saloon or shop must be provided with—

- (a) sufficient supply of water at all times during which the saloon or shop is open to customers.
- (b) means for securing an adequate supply either of boiling water or of disinfectants, for the purpose of washing or sterilizing the instruments or appliances in daily use;
- (c) facilities for the hairdressers or barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work;
- (d) a sufficient number of receptacles for the disinfectants to be used for sterilizing instruments or appliances;
- (e) a sufficient supply of towels and overalls for the use of the customers;
- (f) a sufficient number of spittoons, kept by the side of the seats in such manner as to be readily available to customers and employees; and
- (g) a covered and movable bin made of galvanized iron or other impervious material, for the reception of hair-clippings and refuse.

236. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position outside the saloon or shop, a board bearing the words "Licensed Hairdressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop" as the case may be; and
- (b) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position within the saloon or shop, a framed copy of these by-laws in each of the languages, English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

237. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause the walls of such saloon or shop to be limewashed and the ceiling painted at least once in six months; and
- (b) cause the floor, walls, ceiling, fixtures, furniture, and equipment of such saloon or shop to be kept clean at all times.

238. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall take steps to ensure that every hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop—

- (a) keeps his person and his wearing apparel clean;
- (b) keeps his finger-nails short and free from dirt; and
- (c) washes his hands with soap and water immediately before attending to each customer.

239. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause every spittoon in such saloon or shop to be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) cause every hair-brush or comb used in such saloon or shop to be washed or cleaned, and sterilized or disinfected, every day, and to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times;
- (c) cause every shaving mug or cup, shaving brush, clipper, razor, or other cutting instrument, used in such saloon or shop to be well rinsed and cleaned in hot water after each occasion on which it is used; and
- (d) cause all hair-clippings and other refuse to be collected after each customer has been attended to, and to be deposited in the bin provided for the purpose.

240. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use, or permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop to use, on any customer—

- (a) any styptic pencil, powder puff or sponge; or
- (b) any alum or other material for the purpose of stopping any bleeding, unless such alum or other material is in powder or liquid form.

241. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not supply, for the use of any customer, any towel which is not fresh from the wash or any overall which is not clean.

242. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not—

- (a) knowingly permit any person who is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease of any kind, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, to enter the saloon or shop for any purpose;
- (b) employ any person referred to in paragraph (a) in any capacity in such saloon or shop;
- (c) knowingly permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him to attend in the saloon or shop on any person referred to in paragraph (a);
- (d) permit any such hairdresser or barber who, by error or accident, attends on any person referred to in paragraph (a), to attend on any other customer unless that hairdresser or barber washes and cleans his hands before attending on such other customer; or
- (e) permit any instrument that has been used on any person referred to in paragraph (a) to be used on any other person until it is sterilized.

243. No person shall expectorate within any hairdressing saloon or barber's shop, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

244. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use or permit any other person to use the licensed premises—

By-law.

The general by-laws relating to licences published in *Gazette* No. 8,080 of September 21, 1934, as last amended by by-law published in *Gazette* No. 8,702 of January 17, 1941, are hereby further amended as follows:—

- I. in by-law 1 of the general by-laws relating to licences, in the definition of "Offensive or dangerous trades", by the substitution, for the words "icing and packing of fish", of the words "icing and packing of fish, blacksmith's workshop, manufactory of pottery";
- II. by the insertion, immediately after the by-laws relating to timber or firewood depôts, of the following new by-laws:—

"Dangerous and Offensive Trades.

1. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any dangerous or offensive trade unless the premises to be licensed are in conformity with the following requirements:—

- (a) the premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open must be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
- (b) the walls of every room in every part must be not less than 7 feet in height and must be built of brick, stone or cobwork, and the lower 4 feet of the internal surface must be plastered in cement, and the rest of the internal surfaces limeplastered and limewashed;
- (c) The eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground;

- (d) the roof must be made of some permanent material;
- (e) the woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed;
- (f) the floor must be cemented throughout;
- (g) the premises must be provided with adequate drainage;
- (h) the premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin;
- (i) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation for the use of the persons employed in the premises.
- (j) that the premises must not be less than 50 feet distant from the nearest building and must not be structurally connected to it.

2. Every licensee shall store all materials required for the purpose of carrying on any dangerous or offensive trade in such a way as to prevent the diffusion of effluvia or other similar nuisance.

3. Every licensee who carries along any public place or thoroughfare any materials which are likely to be offensive or to give off effluvia shall carry such materials in non-absorbent covered receptacles so as to prevent the creation of any nuisance.

4. Every licensee shall cause all offensive vapours or gases emitted during any process or manufacture to be discharged into the external air in such manner and at such a height as to ensure their absorption into the upper air without injurious or offensive effects upon the neighbourhood or be passed directly through a fire into a condensing apparatus.

5. Every licensee shall cause the drains of the licensed premises to be kept in efficient order and to be washed daily.

6. Every licensee shall cause the floors of the licensed premises to be maintained in a proper state of repair and to be cleansed daily.

7. Every licensee shall keep the walls of the licensed premises in good repair, so as to prevent the absorption of filth, and shall cause them to be whitewashed annually.

8. Every licensee shall cause all apparatus including implements and vessels used in any dangerous or offensive trade to be kept clean, and where possible to be cleansed daily.

9. Every licensee shall cause refuse, sweepings and scrapings, together with all waste and by-products to be removed daily from the licensed premises in covered receptacles, unless such refuse, sweepings, scrapings, waste or by-products are intended to be forthwith subjected to further trade purposes on the premises.

10. Every licensee shall cause every tank used for washing or soaking skins or any other material to be emptied and cleansed as often as may be necessary to prevent the creation or diffusion of effluvia.

11. No licensee shall pollute any river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank or any open piece of water by discharging or suffering to flow therein any foul, ill-smelling or offensive water or other fluid or by throwing therein or suffering to be washed therein any offensive substance, or in any other way pollute or contaminate such river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank or open piece of water.

12. Every licensee of a brick, tile or pottery manufactory shall cause any pits or trenches in the licensed premises to be filled so as to prevent the stagnation of water therein.

13. No licensee shall carry on an offensive or a dangerous trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood."

ARRANGEMENTS have now been made for the identification and stamping of handloom cloth prior to export from the Madras Presidency. These arrangements will, it is understood, operate in respect of consignments of Handloom cloth on invoices certified by the Provincial Textile Commissioner, Madras, after June 10, 1946. Textiles covered by invoices certified by the Provincial Textile Commissioner after June 10, 1946, will bear a stamp giving the serial number in the Madras export price schedule and the month of stamping. Ceylon maximum retail prices will be worked out on the basis of the Madras identification, under the provisions of Textiles Control Order No. 39, and duly stamped on the cloth by me.

2. Importers of Handloom textiles which have been stamped by the Provincial Textile Commissioner, Madras, need not therefore submit to the Assistant Controller, Price Marking, samples as required by Textiles Control Notices Nos. 240 and 248. They have only to submit the relevant invoices together with the usual application for price-marking. The procedure will be much the same as now obtaining in respect of mill-goods invoices.

3. Samples will, however be collected by my Officer who calls for price marking, after the prices have been marked, for Departmental purposes, and later returned to the Dealer.

4. The provisions of Textiles Control Notices Nos. 240 and 248 will continue to operate in regard to textiles which have not been stamped by the Provincial Textiles Commissioner, Madras.

TRADE DISPUTE—MESSRS. JINASENA & CO., COLOMBO.

THE United Engineering Workers' Union, Colombo, presented a petition to me under section 6 (1) of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, with regard to a trade dispute that had arisen between the said Union and Messrs. Jinasena & Co., Colombo. This petition was referred to a Special Tribunal appointed by H. E. the Governor under the proviso to section 5 of the said Order for adjudication.

2. The following findings dated May 6, 1946, made by the Special Tribunal are published herein for general information in terms of section 8 (4) of the above-mentioned Order—

The Union at first made 7 demands, and at the conference pressed 5 of those. Now, their demands number 13.

Neither party called evidence. I understand that each accepts as true the facts stated by Counsel for both at the hearing. I will consider the demands one by one.

War Allowance.

Petitioner seeks a war allowance rising and falling with the index at the same rates as apply to Walker & Greig. But all along respondent has paid his men, and they have accepted a consolidated rate of wages including war allowance, and the total in each grade is far higher than Walker & Greig's total. I reject this demand.

Mid-Day Meals.

Under the Walker & Greig award, a free mid-day meal has to be given, and that plainly binds respondent. His defence is that he called his men together when the Wages Board reduced hours of work to 8 and gave them a choice: He would either cut out the meal or reduce wages. The men chose to have the mid-day meal cut out.

That does not seem to me to be a good defence as it stands not against the whole of the present claim. It was in effect a waiver, but this waiver ceased to have any legal effect as soon as the men withdrew it. They withdrew it when the Union wrote its letter of February 16, 1946.

There is another relevant fact in favour of respondent on this issue. The wages paid by respondent exceed those paid by Walker & Greig as basic wage plus the war allowance plus the extra 4/- added on the November, 1944, decision plus the cost of the mid-day meal: If respondent had cut wages by the amount of the cost of this meal, this relevant fact might have been a valid defence against the present claim.

But the award of a mid-day meal was specific and deliberate. It was designed on the suggestion of Mr. Gratiaen and Mr. Hale to meet the difficulty of those men who, when they receive cash for a meal, instead of a meal, buy only a cup of tea and carry on hungry and inefficient. It is not open to the employer and his men to contract out of that and wipe off liability.

I hold respondent liable to a penalty for failure to supply meals from February 16, 1946, but in fixing the amount I bear it in mind that he has paid high wages. Let respondent pay 20 cents more per day to each workman for each day on which he worked after February 16, 1946.

Full pay for 5 Government Holidays

do. 2 weeks sick leave

Pensions

Full pay during breakdowns.

On all these issues, respondent agrees that his workmen are entitled to the privileges claimed, but he has never denied, these rights. Petitioner had therefore no cause of action to make these demands; and I make no award. No occasion has ever arisen to put respondent to the test.

V-Day Pay.

It does not follow that respondent is liable to make gifts because a few other firms made gifts for V-Day. I reject this.

Cut in Pay of Thomas and William.

I find that these two men deserved this cut in pay and I reject this.

Tuck Shop Capital.

There is no evidence that any money of the respondent's men is in respondent's hands. There is no substance in this demand.

Free Teas.

I see no reason to add this burden on respondent.

Inquiry before discontinuance.

Presence of Union Officials at inquiries.

(1) I do not believe that respondent has discontinued any one without enquiry.

(2) It will be wise for him to let a Union Official hear the evidence, but he is not bound to do so.

I reject these two demands.

Sanitation.

I agree that inspection by an official of the Labour Department is desirable, and reserve my finding on this demand pending such an inspection and report.

Accident leave and Pay.

I hold that respondent is bound to give his men accident pay from the 3rd day after each accident.

Continuation of jobs after transfer.

Respondent is on the point of conveying his business to a Limited Company, in which he will be a shareholder. The Union demands an order on him to arrange with this assignee company to keep in their employ all the men now employed.

Now, it may be that respondent's financial position, or his assignee's, compels a reduction of staff in order to keep costs below earnings: On this I have no evidence before me and find this demand unjustified. Further, these men are now out on strike to enforce this demand. But respondent has all along been a generous employer, whom the Union has cited in other proceedings as a model. I have never encountered a more wanton strike. It is callous ingratitude. These men do not deserve to be employed at all. I reject this demand.

P. S.—I have read the report of the Labour Medical Officer as regards the sanitation arrangements and the present arrangements seem adequate. I make no award as regards this demand."

TRADE DISPUTE—MESSRS. ROWLANDS, LTD., COLOMBO.

THE Ceylon Mercantile Union, Colombo, presented a petition to me under section 6 (1) of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes & Lockouts) Order, 1942, with regard to a trade dispute that had arisen between the said Union and Messrs. Rowlands Ltd., Colombo. This petition was referred to a Special Tribunal appointed by H. E. the Governor under the proviso to section 5 of the said Order for adjudication.

2. The following findings and award dated June 22, 1946, made by the Special Tribunal are published herein for general information in terms of section 8 (4) of the above-mentioned Order:—

"The petition makes the demand on behalf of the clerical staff employed by the respondent Company that the salaries paid to them should be on the scale adopted by the various mercantile employers in Colombo as a result of the award made by the Special Tribunal which dealt with the dispute that arose between the various mercantile employers and their employees in Colombo.

The respondent resisted this demand. Towards the conclusion of the inquiry it was agreed between the parties that the terms and conditions of employment and the salaries payable to clerks and other minor employees of Messrs. Walker Sons & Co., Ltd., Colombo, should be made applicable to the clerks and other minor employees employed by the respondent Company. I find that the employees of the respondent Company are employed in an engineering trade comparable to the Motor Engineering Trade carried on by Messrs. Walker Sons & Co., Ltd., and therefore the award of the Special Tribunal which dealt with the dispute between Walker Sons & Co., Ltd., and its employees must apply to the terms and conditions of employment of clerks and other minor employees employed by the respondent Company.

Award.

I. *Salaries.*—I accordingly award that the conditions of service and scales of salaries provided to the clerical staff and other minor employees by the award relating to Walker Sons & Co., should apply to the clerical staff and minor employees of the respondent Company. These scales are reproduced in the annexures marked A & B.

II. *Provident Fund.*—As has been awarded by the Special Tribunal which dealt with the trade dispute between Walker Sons & Co., Ltd., and its employees, I award that the respondent Company should contribute to the provident fund each month $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the employee's salary and recover from the employee 5% of his salary each month as the employee's contribution to the fund.

III. *Special Allowance.*—With regard to this allowance I award as in the case of the award relating to Walker Sons & Co., Ltd., that the respondent Company, should pay War Allowance either on the Government scale or at 30% of the employee's salary whichever amount is greater.

IV. *Leave.* (a) *Annual holiday.*—As agreed to by the respondent I award that each employee be given an annual holiday each year for a continuous period of 14 days.

(b) *Casual Leave.*—Casual leave for periods not exceeding 2 days at a time and not exceeding 7 days in the aggregate each year should be granted to the clerical staff and other minor employees as was agreed to by the respondent Co. It should be noted that no period of casual leave should as a rule immediately precede or follow the period of annual holiday.

(c) *Sick Leave.*—As regards sick leave the respondent Company expressed its willingness to grant leave on full pay to an employee on the ground of illness up to a period of six weeks in a year, on production of a certificate by a Medical Practitioner employed or approved by the respondent Company. The Medical Certificate should in a normal case cover a period of two weeks only. On further medical certificates being furnished leave on full pay should be granted up to a maximum period of six weeks. The respondent Company also agreed to extend the benefit of sick leave up to a maximum period of three months in the year provided that the further period of six weeks is regarded as leave on half pay and that in respect of such further period also, medical certificates for each further fortnight are furnished. This seems reasonable and I award accordingly.

(d) *Working Hours.*—8 A.M. to 12 noon and 1 P.M. to 5 P.M. 12-1 being the interval for the mid-day meal.

(e) *Reinstatement of T. K. Nair.*—This demand was not pressed and I make no award thereon.

(f) *Reinstatement of S. M. Sheriff.*—Mr. Sheriff was employed as a ledgerkeeper by the respondent Company. It would appear that the new Accountant who took charge of the accounting department in September last year was making endeavours to reorganize the office system in the accounting branch and got the Managing Director to issue an office order relating to monthly bills, posting of debits and credits and the posting of monthly statements to the customers. This office order marked P 2* was sent to the four ledger clerks, including Mr. Sheriff, for them to note and comply. For some reason which is not justifiable Mr. Sheriff appears to have shown an unwillingness to comply with this order, he being of the view that the preparation of the monthly statement really fell within the scope of the duties of the Accountant. The preparation of this statement does not involve any expert knowledge possessed by an Accountant and could easily have been done by a ledger clerk. The explanation submitted by Mr. Sheriff as embodied in the document P 3* indicates his unwillingness to co-operate and carry out lawful orders issued by the employer. The evidence shows that the four ledger clerks did not have enough work to do and that they wasted a good deal of their office hours in reading newspapers and in unnecessary talking and discussion. Mr. Wishart, the Managing Director, has given evidence that he told Mr. Sheriff when he went to see him in connection with this order that he must comply with it and interviewed the Accountant for the purpose of clearing up any difficulties that may exist with regard to carrying out some of the items in the order. Mr. Sheriff however disobeyed the order of the Managing Director and did not comply with his instructions even after he was reminded about it. In these circumstances, the Managing Director was compelled to give Mr. Sheriff notice terminating his services. I accept the evidence given by Mr. Wishart and Mr. Montgomery with regard to the events which preceded the termination of Mr. Sheriff's services. I find it proved that Mr. Sheriff acted in a spirit of defiance of lawful orders and unwillingness to co-operate with the new accountant, who, in his opinion, was not competent to give him orders. I find therefore that the notice of termination of his services has been brought about entirely as a result of Mr. Sheriff's foolish conduct in disregarding lawful orders.

Much as I sympathize with a person who is thrown out of employment, I will not be justified, in the circumstances, in forcing upon an employer an employee who by his previous conduct of non-co-operation and disobedience to lawful orders has forfeited any claims to reinstatement. I therefore do not award that Mr. Sheriff be reinstated.

Salaries of Senior Clerical Staff.—It will be seen from the annexure marked A that the Senior Clerical Staff has been divided into higher grade Class I. and Class II. No evidence has been placed before me to indicate which members of the clerical staff were performing more responsible duties are now in receipt of salaries appropriate to the higher grade or whether the nature of the duties they now perform warrants their being paid salaries provided for the higher grade.

Promotion to the higher grade must necessarily depend upon merit and on vacancies, if any, occurring in the higher grade. The employer is the best judge of the suitability of a clerk for promotion to the higher grade. Promotion to this grade cannot therefore be regarded as being automatic. It should be understood that no employee should as a result of these reclassifications receive a less salary than he is at present drawing. If any clerk is at present drawing a salary assigned at any point in the salary scales provided for the higher grade Classes I. and II. he should be paid his annual increments till he reaches the maximum provided for the Class in which he is at present placed. Promotion from the higher grade Class I. to the higher grade Class II. must, as laid down above, depend entirely upon the occurring of a vacancy and the eligibility of the clerk for such promotion.

Salary Scale of Stenographers will be as provided in the scales shown in the Annexure B and subject to the conditions laid down in the award of the Special Tribunal relating to Walker Sons & Co., Ltd.

Salaries of Peons.—Their initial salary should be Rs. 30 per mensem with increments of Rs. 1.50 per mensem each year up to a maximum of Rs. 75 per mensem. I make no provision for any extra salary to be paid to a head peon.

Salaries of Messenger Boys.—They will receive an initial salary of Rs. 25 per mensem rising by increments of Re. 1 per mensem each year to Rs. 30.

Labourers employed in the office should be paid on the same scale as provided for peons.

Watchers.—I award that watchers should be paid their wages as fixed for them by the decisions of the Engineering Wages Board.

This award should take effect from July 1, 1946, and will be applicable as regards the payment of salaries and wages for the month of June, 1946.

*Harvesting of Paddy in Hewagam and Salpiti Korales,
Colombo District—Yala, 1946.*

IN terms of Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulations 37, Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, Defence (Food Rationing) (Special Provisions) Regulations 1944, it is hereby ordered that—

1. (A) No person harvesting paddy produced in fields or highlands during the season "Yala" 1946 within the Hewagam and Salpiti Korales of the Colombo District shall proceed to thresh same unless ten clear days' notice is given of the said person's intention of doing so to the Village Headman, or to any other person by name or office authorized by me in writing.

(B) No person harvesting paddy as aforesaid shall remove same from the customary threshing floor to a barn or other customary place of storage situated within the same D. R. O's division until—

- (i.) an account of paddy threshed has been taken by the Village Headman or any other person by name or office authorized by me in writing;
- (ii.) permitted to do so in writing by the officers referred to above;
- (iii.) the Government levy of two bushels per acre, which is a first charge of the crop, and any other surplus due to Government has been surrendered to the Village Headman, or any other person by name or office authorized by me in writing.

It must be carefully noted that any person found in the possession of paddy, the acquisition of which cannot be substantiated with a permit or permits as mentioned at (ii.) above, is liable to have paddy so found requisitioned without any payment whatsoever.

2. No person who has threshed paddy during "Yala" 1946, and removed same for storage in accordance with paragraph (1) of this order shall dispose of such paddy on any account except

on written directions issued by me or an officer authorized by me in this behalf. This Order, however, does not apply to the use of such paddy for:—

- (i.) normal consumption by the shareholder and his or her *bona fide* dependants subject to a maximum rate of six cut measures per head per week in case of owner cultivators and cultivators who are actually engaged in the work of cultivation, and in the case of others a maximum rate of four cut measures per head per week for all dependants above the age of three years subject further to a maximum of fifty bushels per family;
 - (ii.) sowing as seed in the field or fields from which the paddy was harvested subject to a maximum of two bushels per acre;
 - (iii.) allowance as working expenses at the rate of one bushel per acre for the field or fields from which the paddy was harvested.
3. All paddy received from fields which are held on mortgages should not be disposed of on any account; and the proviso to Order (2) above does not apply to such paddy.

4. All paddy stocks not threshed and accounted for as aforesaid within one month of their reaping are liable to be requisitioned by Government.

5. For removal of any such paddy to any other place situated outside the same D. R. O's division as the field from which the paddy is obtained, permission should be obtained from me or an officer authorized by me.

Non-residents who desire to remove their shares to places outside my Emergency area, *i.e.*, Hewagam and Salpiti korales in the Colombo District, should make their applications on forms D. F. C. 34 in duplicate to the Revenue Officer or the A. G. A. (E), of the area in which they reside.

To expedite the issue of permits the applicants are requested to produce reports from the Village Headman or any other authorized person of the areas of their residence and of the areas in which the paddy lands are situated giving particulars of their households and of their shares of paddy from the various fields.

It is further ordered that:—

- (a) If no application for removal from their area is received by me within six weeks of the date of threshing, any such paddy is liable to be requisitioned; and
- (b) If after application for removal the quantity authorized to be removed is not removed within six months from the date of threshing such quantity or part thereof is liable to be requisitioned.

Forms D. F. C. 34 referred to above are available on application from my office.

6. Rice coupons must be surrendered at the rate of:—

- (a) five coupons for every bushel of paddy allowed for consumption to owner-cultivators and cultivators; or
- (b) eight coupons for every bushel of paddy allowed for consumption for non-cultivating owners (no substitute coupons need be surrendered). In the case of producers resident within the area the necessary coupons must be surrendered to the Village Headman concerned immediately on receipt of paddy for consumption.

7. Any producer acting in contravention of any of the above orders will be liable to prosecution.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulations 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations, 1943, and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, I do hereby direct that every person, whether owner or cultivator, having charge of the reaping of the harvest of any paddy land, situated within the Kalutara Totamune of the Kalutara District, shall—

- (1) give the Vel-Vidane of the village four clear days' notice of his intention to harvest any paddy field.
- (2) shall not thresh any paddy in the threshing floor between 7 P.M. and 7 A.M. except with the written permission of the Vel-Vidane of the area.
- (3) give the Village Headman, Vel-Vidane, Field Assistant or any other person authorised by me, all information required to be given by them in regard to the field, persons entitled to the shares and the amounts of such shares in terms of Regulation 10 of the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943.
- (4) not remove, cause or permit to be removed any paddy from the field or threshing floor to a barn or any other place of storage until the Vel-Vidane or any other

person authorised by me shall have recorded the total harvest and shares and until a permit has been obtained from the Village Headman of the area for such removal.

Note.—Applications for permits for the transport of paddy by a producer who is resident outside the Kalutara totamune to his or her residence should be made to the D.F.C., A.G.A. (E), or other Food Control authority, who deals with these applications, of his residential area, in duplicate in form D.F.C. 34 and not to me.

- (5) hand over the Government levy of TWO bushels per acre for the Yala season to the Village Headman of the area.
- (6) if for any reason a producer anticipates the yield of any one or more of his fields to be less than 5 bushels per acre, he should inform me one month before harvest, by registered post, giving the name of the field, extent, village where situated, anticipated yield, reason for low yield. Subsequent applications of producers who fail to do this, for waiver of the levy, will not be entertained.
- (8) not dispose of in any other manner than by way of consumption at approved rates by the owner of his *bona fide* dependants subject to a maximum of 50 bushels or such lower quantity which his dependants entitle him to, provided that the appropriate number of coupons have been surrendered, any part of the paddy removed in terms of clause (5) without my prior authority.
- (9) sell any paddy in excess of the requirements for consumption until the following harvest as laid down in clause (8) above or such quantity of paddy as I may order shall be sold to Government.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, I, Rutger Dirk Philippus Paulusz, Assistant Government Agent (Emergency), Gampola, do hereby direct that every person whether owner or cultivator of any land which is cultivated with paddy in the Chief Headman's Division of Uduwara and Yatinuwara and the Divisional Revenue Officers' Divisions of Uda Palata and Uda Bulatgama in Kandy District, and which is expected to be harvested between July 10, 1946, and October 31, 1946, shall inform in writing the Village Headman of the area in which the paddy field is situated of—

- (a) the dates on which it is proposed to reap and thresh the harvest on the land;
- (b) the name, situation and extent of the land;
- (c) the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of the land under any contract, agreement or otherwise; and
- (d) the details of the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

2. I further direct that—

- (a) a levy of 1 bushel per acre shall be imposed on all paddy fields. The levy shall be a first charge on the crop and shall be delivered at the threshing floor to the Village Headman or any other officer authorised by me in writing, who shall issue a receipt on the prescribed form for the quantity of paddy received;
- (b) no cultivator, shareholder or any other person having interest in any paddy field situated within the Emergency area of Gampola comprising the Chief Headman's Division of Uduwara and Yatinuwara and the Divisional Revenue Officers' Divisions of Uda Palata and Uda Bulatgama in the Kandy District, shall remove any paddy harvested in Yala, 1946, from the threshing floor until the harvest has been checked and verified by the Village Headman or any other officer authorised by me in writing and until the levy paddy has been delivered;
- (c) removal thereafter to the barn or other place of storage within any one of the above divisions shall only be on permits on the prescribed forms issued by the Village Headman of the area in which the threshing floor is situated or any other officer authorised by me in writing;

- (d) no person shall dispose of any paddy in any way except so much as is allowable at the following approved rates for consumption and other purposes:—

Approved rates—

- (1) a customary allowance of 1 bushel per acre;
 - (2) an allowance of 2 bushels per acre for seed purposes;
 - (3) a consumption allowance of 6 measures per head per week to cultivators and owner-cultivators and the members of their household and 4 measures per head per week to non-cultivating owners and the members of their household for 12 months if the fields are cultivated only once a year and for 7 months if the fields are cultivated for both seasons, subject to the proviso that the maximum quantity allowable to a producer during any cultivating season for consumption will be 50 bushels.
- (e) all the remaining paddy must be delivered to the Village Headman of the area at his house or store. Government shall accept only well-dried and well-winnowed paddy for which payment shall be made at Rs. 6 per bushel after delivery to the Village Headman.
 - (f) coupons shall be detached from all ration book holders in respect of the paddy allowed for consumption under paragraph (d) (3) above on the following basis by the Village Headman:—
one rice coupon for every 6 measures of paddy received by cultivators;
one rice coupon for every 4 measures of paddy received by non-cultivating owners.
 - (g) any person who desires to remove the whole or part of the crop of any fields situated in any of the above three Divisions to a place outside that Division but not outside the Emergency area of Gampola shall apply to the Divisional Revenue Officer or Chief Headman of the area in which he resides, on form D. F. C. 34 in duplicate within 4 weeks of the harvesting of his crop;
 - (h) removal to a place outside the Gampola Emergency area shall only be on permits issued by me. Non-residents who desire to remove their shares to places outside the Gampola Emergency area, that is outside the Chief Headman's division of Uduwara and Yatinuwara and the Divisional Revenue Officer's Divisions of Uda Palata and Uda Bulatgama shall make their applications on form D. F. C. 34 in duplicate to the Revenue Officer or A. G. A. (E) of the area in which they reside within 4 weeks of the harvesting of their crops.

3. It should be carefully noted that it is an offence not to comply with this order. Further, if no application is made for removal of paddy as required, all stocks of paddy are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme.

4. Form D. F. C. 34 is the usual form that has to be filled before permits to transport rice or paddy are given and the information is being requested in advance so that everything possible may be done to verify the information given in the form and to expedite the issue of the permits.

- A British subject who is born in Ceylon, one of whose parents was born in Ceylon; or
- A British subject, who is a descendant of a person falling within category (a); or
- A British subject deemed by the Governor with the advice of the Board of Ministers, in view of special circumstances to be a Ceylonese.

6. (i.) A certificate of registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be not less than 17 nor more than 23 years of age on August 1, 1946, must be attached to the form of application. Services Personnel, including full-time members of the Auxiliary Fire, Air Raid Precautions, and Civil Defence Services, may deduct the period of their continuous service in the present war from their age, if necessary.

(ii.) Certificates of birth issued for the purpose of the Code for Assisted Schools will not be accepted for this examination

(iii.) Affidavits will, in no circumstances, be accepted as substitutes for birth certificates.

(iv.) In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past births, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. "Improvement in Heating System".

Abstract :—The inventor describes an air conditioning system for circulating either cold or hot air in which the evaporator of a refrigerating system and a steam condenser are situated in a common duct such that either the refrigerating system or steam condenser can be supplied by a single boiler. The design of the boiler is such that at maximum load on either the refrigerating plant or condenser the amount of steam capable of being supplied is just sufficient to condense without any excess. The steam outlet from the generator of the refrigerating plant and the condenser are connected to a common vent in which is installed a thermometric bulb which is responsive to the presence of steam in the vent. If due to any unforeseen circumstance, e.g., the stoppage of flow of circulating water to the refrigerating plant or blocked air passage in the air-conditioning system excess steam flows into the common vent, a relay immediately operates to cut off the main burners to the boiler. The apparatus is such that after a suitable time delay fuel is again supplied to the burners, unless the faulty condition persists; beyond a certain minimum time the burners are permanently cut off and have to be reset by hand.

The apparatus also includes control means to sequently cut off the main burners according to rising temperature in the conditioned air.

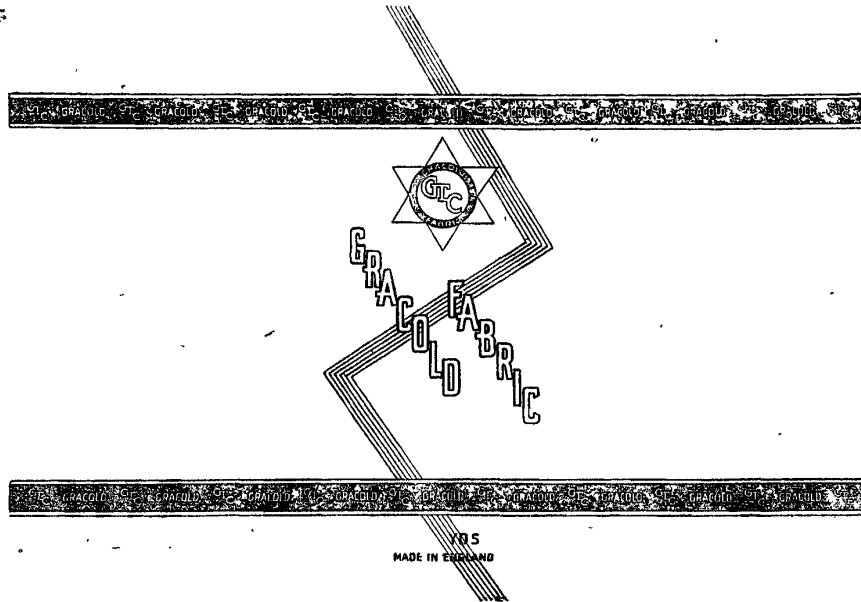
