ACT, 1939.

THE INDIA SERVICE MEDAL, 1939-45

*General sanction for the transfer or mortgage of certain ships.*CHANGES IN THE TIME QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE CAMPAIGN  
STARS AND THE DEFENCE MEDAL.

IN the exercise of the powers conferred upon the Board of Trade by section 1 (1) of the Ships and Aircraft (Transfer Restriction) Act, 1939 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") and duly delegated to the Governor of Ceylon under the provisions of section 9 of the Act, I, John Curtois Howard, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do hereby give general sanction—

**Wearing of Emblems denoting Mentions in Despatches, King's Commendations for Brave Conduct and King's Commendations for Valuable Service in the Air with an Appendix containing a Summary of the Conditions of Award of the Campaign Stars, the Defence Medal, the War Medal and the India Service Medal.**

- (1) for the transfer, between persons entitled to own British ships in accordance with the provisions of section 1 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, of any ship not under requisition by or on behalf of His Majesty to which the Act applies or any share in any such ship,
- (2) for the mortgage of any such ship or any share therein, and
- (3) for the transfer of any mortgage of any such ship or share, subject to the condition that the ship (*a*) is registered in accordance with the provisions of Part I. of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, at any port of registry in Ceylon, and (*b*) does not exceed 50 tons gross tonnage.

IN continuation of the Notification dated June 20, 1945, published in *Ceylon Government Gazette* No. 9,425 of June 29, 1945, regarding the institution of further Campaign Stars and a Defence Medal for service in the war and the variation of the qualifications for the award of the Stars instituted in 1943, the following further recommendations for the institution of a War Medal and an India Service Medal, the amendment of the time qualifications for the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, and questions relating to Emblems denoting Mentions in Despatches and King's Commendations, which have been approved by His Majesty the King, are published below for public information.

The War Medal, 1939-45

2. (i) Approval has been given for the institution of a War Medal. This is to be granted to full-time personnel of the armed Forces wherever their service during the war has been rendered. A 28-day qualification will be adopted. Operational and non-operational service will qualify. In the Merchant Navy it will be a requirement that the 28 days should have been served at sea.

(ii) The ribbon is in the red, white and blue of the Union Flag. There is a narrow central red stripe with a narrow white stripe on either side. There are broad red stripes at either edge, the two intervening stripes being in blue.

(iii) Service between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive will qualify wherever rendered.

(iv) The War Medal will be granted in addition to the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, if earned.

(v) Operational service brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability attributable to service, capture by the enemy, or the cessation of hostilities on the 2nd September, 1945, will qualify a recipient of one of the Campaign Stars for the award of the War Medal even though the service may not amount to 28 days in all. This concession will not apply to an individual who does not qualify for a Campaign Star. When service was ended by capture by the enemy it will be a condition that there should have been freedom from blame. When the 1939-45 Star or one of the other Campaign Stars has been awarded for operational service of less than 28 days, the War Medal will be granted in addition.

*Civilians*

(vi) The few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars, for instance, (*a*) full-time uniformed civilians serving in army operational areas under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (*b*) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents serving in army operational commands or in Naval or R.A.F. Establishments in the area thereof, (*c*) air crew of civil air transport who have flown on specified routes into the theatres of war, or (*d*) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform in the area of army operational commands overseas, will be eligible for the War Medal in addition to the Campaign Stars.

(vii) Categories of civilians, similar to those described in (*a*) and (*b*), who served in the United Kingdom only and thus qualified for neither Campaign Stars nor the Defence Medal, and such categories as air crew of civil air transport and R.A.F. Education Officers who served in the United Kingdom only and qualify for the Defence Medal, will not qualify for the War Medal.

(viii) Civil categories similar to those described in (*a*), (*b*), (*c*) and (*d*) who served outside the country of residence in non-operational areas will not qualify for the War Medal unless such service outside the country of residence was rendered in a territory subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

The India Service Medal, 1939-45

3. (i) The great size of India, the diversity of her races and the considerable movement of Forces there, have resulted in conditions of exceptional discomfort and hardship for the majority of Indian troops during the war. Approval has been given for the institution of an India Service Medal for three years non-operational service in the Indian Forces in India or elsewhere between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945. This will not be given to anyone

qualifying for the Defence Medal. It will be granted in addition to the War Medal and the Campaign Stars.

(ii) The ribbon is in the blue colours of the Order of the Star of India and the Order of the Indian Empire. There is a narrow central light blue stripe with a narrow dark blue stripe on either side. There are broad dark blue stripes at either edge, the two intervening stripes being in light blue.

#### Changes in Time Qualifications for the Campaign Stars

4. When the present rules were drawn up, the war continued both in Europe and the Pacific and no one could tell for how long it would last. It was then necessary to see that the various Stars were not debased by the institution of a scheme on too lavish a scale which might have cheapened them unduly, especially if the war had continued for a considerable time. The whole matter has now been examined in retrospect, and it is evident that in relation to service on land and in the air the requirement that, for the award of the other Stars, the 1939-45 Star must first be earned by six or two months previous operational service, has produced a number of hard cases. The fact that *per contra* there is a one day rule for the Africa Star has also given rise to some noticeable inequalities of treatment as between the earning of this Star and of the others. The following changes have therefore been approved.

**Pacific Star**  
**Burma Star**  
**Italy Star**  
**France and Germany Star**

#### 5. (i) Service on land

(a) The time qualification for these Stars is at present six months and one day, that is to say, the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service before any of these four Stars may be awarded, and they are then earned by entry into the theatre of operations.

(b) The six months time qualification for these four Stars is now cancelled and the time qualification is reduced to one day, that is to say, to entry into the qualifying area.

(c) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

#### (ii) Service at sea in the Royal Navy and the Merchant Navy

(a) The time qualification for these four Stars is at present as at (i) (a) above.

(b) The six months time qualification for the first three remains as in (i) (a) unaltered.

(c) The time qualification for the France and Germany Star has been reduced to one day, that is to say, to entry into the qualifying area, in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c. For the three first-named awards the present qualification remains unaltered because of the difference in the conditions of operational service at sea and ashore. Whereas for an individual landed in an operational area, one day's service must nearly always be part of a substantial period in that area, one day's service at sea in an operational area may not necessarily involve the ship concerned in active operations. The six months qualification is also required to obviate the grant of the Stars for service in many river and estuarial craft as the crews of these could claim to have been at sea on one occasion or another during the war and it would not be possible to exercise any check on such claims. The divergence in respect of the France and Germany Star has been approved because many crews of landing craft would be unable to fulfil a time qualification of six months.

(d) For the three first-named Stars and also the Atlantic Star, however, there will, for service at sea, be a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945, in the European and Atlantic theatres, and up to the 2nd September, 1945, in the Pacific and Burma theatres. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will qualify for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Star, or the Atlantic Star, as the case may be—the Star granted being that appropriate to the last operational area in which service was rendered—and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in these cases in which operational service amounted to less than six months.

(e) Nothing in these provisions will alter the existing rules relating to the grant of Emblems in lieu of certain Stars.

(f) Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

#### (iii) Air crew service

The qualification for these four Stars, for air crew who do not qualify by service on land in the appropriate theatre of operations, is at present two months followed by one operational sortie. The two months qualification has now been cancelled, the qualification being reduced to one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area.

#### Atlantic Star

#### 6. (i) Service at sea in the Royal Navy

(a) The time qualification for this Star is at present six months in the Atlantic, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by six months at sea in an operational area.

(b) Under the present rules an individual who serves six months afloat receives the 1939-45 Star. If, thereafter, he serves six months afloat in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, he is awarded the Atlantic Star.

(c) If, however, he serves his first six months afloat in the area that would qualify for the Atlantic Star, for that he receives the 1939-45 Star. If thereafter, he serves another six months afloat, but in another area, he does not qualify for the Atlantic Star, although he has served twelve months afloat six of which have been in the Atlantic.

(d) A Naval officer or rating who has served twelve months afloat in operational areas, any six months of which have been in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, is now to be regarded as having qualified for the Atlantic Star. This rule will apply also to Army and Air Force personnel serving at sea (otherwise than as air crew).

(e) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### (ii) Service at sea in the Merchant Navy

(a) The time qualification is at present six months service at sea, including a voyage through the Atlantic, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by a previous six months at sea, including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations.

(b) The time qualification will remain as at present, but, in calculating the second six months service at sea, no deduction will be made of time spent in operational areas entitling the candidate to another Campaign Star.

(c) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations, and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### (iii) Air crew service

(a) Following the course taken in paragraph 6 (i) (d) above, four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Atlantic Star, will now be regarded as a qualification for that Star.

(b) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### Air Crew Europe Star

7. (a) The time qualification is at present two months service as air crew in a unit engaged in operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe (including the United Kingdom) between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 5th June, 1944, inclusive, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by two months air crew service in an operational unit, including participation in operations against the enemy.

(b) Under the present rules an individual who serves two months in operational air crew, and participates in operations against the enemy, receives the 1939-45 Star. If, thereafter, he served two months in operations which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, he is awarded the Air Crew Europe Star.

(c) If, however, he served his first two months in the area which would qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, for that he receives the 1939-45 Star. If, thereafter, he served another two months in operations, in another area, he does not qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, although he has served four months in operational air crew of which two have been in operations over Europe in the period up to 5th June, 1944.

(d) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, will now be regarded as a qualification for that Star.

(e) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Air Crew Europe Star before being made prisoner.

#### Africa Star

8. The time qualification for the Africa Star, which is one day, that is to say, entry into the operational area, will remain unaltered. The general rules relating to visits, journeys and inspections also remain unaltered, as set out in paragraph 5 (i) (c) above.

**Change in the Time Qualification for the Defence Medal**

9. The present time qualification is three years at home in a territory subject to enemy attacks or closely threatened, this being reduced to three months for mine and bomb disposal units of the Forces. The time qualification for military service overseas, from or outside the country of residence is twelve months. This period of twelve months is now reduced to six for service in territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

**Mentions in Despatches and King's Commendations**

10. (i) The single bronze oak leaf Emblem signifying in the Forces and the Merchant Navy, either a Mention in Despatches, a King's Commendation for brave conduct, or a King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, is at present attached directly to the coat after all the ribbons, or by itself. If granted for service in the war of 1939-45, it will be worn on the ribbon of the War Medal.

(ii) The plastic oval Badge granted to civilians awarded King's Commendations for brave conduct during the war is to be replaced, except in the Merchant Navy, by an Emblem of silver laurel leaves, and this will be worn on the ribbon of the Defence Medal. The Emblems are now being manufactured. When supplies become available, issues will be made to those entitled to them. When the Defence Medal has not been granted, or the award is for services subsequent to the war, the Emblem will be worn directly on the coat, after any ribbons, or by itself.

(iii) A small silver oval Badge has been approved for award to those civilians granted King's Commendations for valuable service in the air. This is to be worn on the coat immediately below any medal ribbons, or, in civil air line uniform, on the panel of the left breast pocket. It will be some time before supplies are ready for issue.

**APPENDIX****SUMMARY OF THE CONDITIONS OF AWARD OF THE CAMPAIGN STARS, THE DEFENCE MEDAL, THE WAR MEDAL AND THE INDIA SERVICE MEDAL**

(This Summary incorporates the changes set out above.)

**The 1939-45 Star**

1. (i) The 1939-45 Star is granted for service in operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945.

(ii) *Navy.*—(a) The qualification is six months service afloat in areas of active operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive. These areas are:—

(i) From the 3rd September, 1939, to the 31st May, 1940, the Atlantic Ocean, including Home Waters, and the North Sea; the Baltic; the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70° E. and that part of the Indian Ocean lying South of 15° S., and West of 55° E.

(ii) From the 1st June, 1940, to the 9th June, 1940, as (i) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.

(iii) From the 10th June, 1940, to the 8th May, 1945, anywhere at sea.

(iv) From the 9th May, 1945, to the 2nd September, 1945, the areas are the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean and the Bay of Bengal, east of a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the Western side of Sunda Strait, thence through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E. (Most of the Indian Ocean is excluded.)

(b) Naval personnel, not eligible by length of service afloat who served in operations and Commando Raids accepted as qualifying Army personnel for the 1939-45 Star, are held to qualify.

(c) Officers and ratings of the Fleet Air Arm, who are not qualified by sea service, may be considered for qualification under similar rules to the R.A.F.

(iii) *Army.*—(a) The Army qualification is six months in an operational command during the period the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945. As, however, there have been campaigns that have not covered six months, certain exceptions will be made. Where troops have been evacuated, e.g., from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., they will be eligible for the 1939-45 Star although their service in operations may have been less than six months, and specified Commando Raids will be similarly treated. Lists of these exceptions are to be found in paragraph 13 (iv), (vii) (ix), and (xi) below. Service on passage to an operational command through dangerous waters will count towards the six months qualifying period. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations will qualify subject to the completion of two months in a fully operational unit.

(b) Qualifying service between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945, must have been rendered in operations in specified zones in the area bounded on the east by the west coast of the American Continent and on the west by a line running along the Western and then the Southern frontier of the Chinese Republic to the point where the Dihang River crosses the latter into Assam, along the left bank of this river and the Brahmaputra and Meghna Rivers, down the east Coast of India to Point Calimere, to the northernmost point of Ceylon and down the east coast of Ceylon to the southernmost point of the Island, thence along a line 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the Western side of Sunda Strait, thence through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E.

(c) The Commonwealth of Australia, the Dominion of New Zealand and India (except parts of Assam and Bengal, for the purpose of the Burma operations) are not regarded as having been in the area of operational commands, and among the other territories in which service was not a qualification there may be mentioned Ceylon, Norfolk Island, New Caledonia, New Hebrides, Fiji Islands, Tonga Island, Phoenix Island and Fanning Island.

(iv) *Air Force.*—(a) The 1939-45 Star is awarded to all air crew who have taken part in operations against the enemy, subject to the completion of two months in an operational unit.

(b) Air crew service in operations against the enemy between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945, in the area described in sub-paragraph (iii) (b) above will qualify, subject to completion of two months in an operational unit.

(c) In addition, non-air crew personnel serving in the area of an Army operational command will qualify, six months service in the area of the operational command being the qualification, and special exception being made for those evacuated, e.g., from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., as for the Army above.

(d) Non-air crew personnel serving afloat qualify under the same conditions as members of the Navy and Merchant Navy.

(v) *Merchant Navy.*—The Merchant Navy receive the 1939-45 Star under the same conditions as the Royal Navy, except that six months service at sea will qualify, provided that at least one voyage was made through one of the specified areas of active operations. Service as Master or member of the crew of a vessel which took part in the evacuation at Dunkirk will be a qualification.

(vi) *General.*—(a) Operational service for a lesser period than six and two months respectively, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service qualifies. The grant for service in operations, of an Honour, Decoration or Mention in Despatches or King's Commendation is, in the armed Forces or the Merchant Navy, a qualification for the award of the Star.

(b) Those who receive the 1939-45 Star for service of less than six or two months in operations will be required to complete an aggregate of six or two months operational service in any theatre or theatres before beginning to count service for the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. In the Navy, and Merchant Navy, for the Pacific, Burma, or Italy Stars, a prior six months operational service qualification is required. (See also certain modifications of these conditions described in the text below relating to particular Stars.)

**Clasp to the 1939-45 Star**

(vii) The Clasp to the 1939-45 Star is granted to air crew of fighter aircraft engaged in the Battle of Britain between the 10th July and the 31st October, 1940, and the award of this is to be denoted by a gilt rose Emblem when the ribbon alone is worn.

**The Atlantic Star**

2. (i) The Atlantic Star is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for Convoys and their Escorts and Anti-Submarine forces, as well as for fast Merchant ships that sailed alone. The Atlantic Star will be granted for six months service afloat, in the Atlantic and Home waters, since the 3rd September, 1939, and until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe and the Atlantic.

(ii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star. (See also certain modifications of this rule in the sub-paragraphs below.)

(iii) *Navy.*—(a) Service with Convoys to North Russia and service in the South Atlantic west of longitude 20° E. will be included. Naval service from the 6th June, 1944, to 8th May, 1945, within the defined qualifying sea area for the France and Germany Star will not be counted towards the qualifying period for the Atlantic Star.

(b) A Naval officer or rating who has served twelve months afloat in operational areas, any six months of which have been in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, will be regarded as having qualified for the Atlantic Star. This rule will apply also to Army and Air Force personnel serving at sea (other-wise than as air crew).



(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by a Naval officer or rating will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

(iv) *Merchant Navy.*—(a) The Merchant Navy will be awarded the Atlantic Star under the same conditions as the Navy except that six months service anywhere at sea will qualify, provided that one or more voyages have been made in the defined area. Service in fishing vessels working on or near the coast and in certain coastal craft is excluded. This will be recognised by the award of the 1939-45 Star.

(b) In the Merchant Navy, in calculating the second six months service at sea, no deduction will be made of time spent in operational areas entitling the candidate to another Campaign Star.

(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by an officer or rating of the Merchant Navy will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star, including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations, and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

(v) *Air Force.*—(a) Air crew of the Royal Air Force will be eligible if they have taken part in operations against the enemy at sea within the areas and between the dates qualifying Naval personnel for the Atlantic Star, subject to the completion of two months service in an operational unit after earning the 1939-45 Star by six or two months operational service, as the case may be.

(b) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit any two months of which qualify for the Atlantic Star, will be regarded as a qualification for this Star.

(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by air crew, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

(vi) *Army and Air Force.*—Army and Air Force personnel serving in His Majesty's ships or in defensively equipped Merchant ships will qualify under rules similar to those for the Navy or Merchant Navy.

(vii) *General.*—(a) Service for the Atlantic Star brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, will qualify although it may not have amounted to six or two months as the case may be.

(b) There is a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six or two months, as the case may be, will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Atlantic Star and the prior time qualification of six or two months respectively will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases in which total operational service amounted to less than six or two months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

#### Clasp to the Atlantic Star

(viii) A candidate who qualifies for the Atlantic Star, the France and Germany Star and the Air Crew Europe Star mentioned below, or two of these, is awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. When the Atlantic Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn, a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the France and Germany or Air Crew Europe Clasp as the case may be. No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to the Atlantic Star.

#### The Air Crew Europe Star

3. (i) The Air Crew Europe Star is intended as an award for operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe (including the United Kingdom) since the 3rd September, 1939, and up to the 5th June, 1944. The time qualification is two months service in air crew so employed. Air crew service in operations at sea will not be a qualification for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(ii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(iii) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, is regarded, however, as a qualification for that Star.

(iv) Time as prisoner of war, however, is not counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Air Crew Europe Star before being made prisoner.

(v) Service for the Air Crew Europe Star brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, qualifies although it may not have amounted to two months.

#### Clasp to the Air Crew Europe Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for the Air Crew Europe Star, the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star, or two of these, is awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. When the Air Crew Europe Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Atlantic, or France and Germany, Clasp as the case may be. No individual may be awarded more than one Clasp to the Air Crew Europe Star.

#### The Africa Star

4. (i) The Africa Star is granted for operational service of any length in North Africa from the date of the entry of Italy into the war on the 10th June, 1940, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, inclusive.

(ii) *Army.*—The qualification is entry, as part of the establishment, into an operational command in North Africa. The individual should have been taken on the strength of a unit or formation. The whole of the area between the Canal and the Straits of Gibraltar is included. Service in operations in Abyssinia, Somaliland and Eritrea, and also in Malta, is a qualification. Service in West Africa is excluded. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iii) *Air Force.*—The qualification is landing in the area of an Army operational command as defined above, including Malta. Casual journeys and inspections, other than those specially approved, are excluded. In addition, service in the air over any of the Army operational commands in North Africa as defined above, or over enemy-occupied territory in North Africa, is a qualification.

(iv) *Navy and Merchant Navy.*—Naval and Merchant Navy service anywhere at sea in the Mediterranean between the 10th June, 1940, and the 12th May, 1943, or in direct support of the Army in the Abyssinian, Somaliland and Eritrean campaigns between the 10th June, 1940, and the 27th November, 1941, qualifies for the Africa Star. The Africa Star will also be awarded in the Navy on shore or in harbour in the same areas and between the same dates as the Army. Service in Merchant Navy vessels which took part in the landings on the coast of Morocco between the 8th November, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943, will also be a qualification.

#### (v) General

(a) There is no condition that the 1939-45 Star should already have been earned.

(b) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned.

#### Clasps to the Africa Star

(vi) *Army.*—(a) An Emblem in the form of a silver arabic "8" or "1" or a silver rose is worn on the ribbon in service dress denoting the award of one of these Clasps in the Army. The awards are restricted to service in the Eighth and First Armies respectively in the period from the 23rd October, 1942, inclusive, the date of the battle of el Alamein, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943. The silver rose Emblem is granted to those of 18th Army Group Headquarters who did not qualify either for the "8" or the "1" Emblem. Union Defence Force personnel attached to South African Air Force Squadrons which qualified for the silver rose Emblem, qualify for that emblem.

(b) The rear or eastern boundary of the Eighth Army for this purpose ran approximately as follows:—For the period from the 23rd October, 1942, to the 12th May, 1943, the line started from a point on the coast about 16½ miles south-west of the centre of Alexandria and ran due south for about 6 miles. The line then turned south-south-east for about 36 miles, then due south for 61 miles and afterwards south-west for 40 miles. The line then turned westwards and ran more or less parallel with the coast.

(c) The qualification for the First Army Clasp is (i) service in a unit or formation in Tunis or Algeria between the 8th November, 1942, the date of the landings, and the 31st December, 1942, or (ii) thereafter, between the 1st January, 1943, and the 12th May, 1943, service in a unit or formation located forward of the First Army rear boundary or in a unit or formation under the command of First Army, including units or formations which were under the command of First Army for local defence and administration, irrespective of whether or not the unit or formation was on the First Army Order of Battle. The First Army rear boundary during the period the 1st January, 1943, to the 12th May, 1943, started on the coast of Algeria about 30 miles east of Bone and, subject to certain local digressions ran in a south-south-westerly direction for about 190 miles to Zribet el Oued.

(vii) *Air Force.*—A Clasp, denoted by the standard silver rose Emblem on the ribbon, is awarded to air crew and non-air crew personnel of the Royal Air Force who were under the command of the A.O.C., Western Desert, or the Air

Commander, North-West African Forces, and to air crew personnel who were under the command of the A.O.C., Malta, or of other A.O.S.C. who operated in support of the Eighth Army or First Army or in the cutting of Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, or in the defence of Malta, during the period from the 23rd October, 1942, to the date of the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943.

(viii) *Navy*.—Officers and ratings of certain units, for instance inshore squadrons and some of the escorting vessels serving off the coast of North Africa, and of submarines and other craft specifically engaged in cutting Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, from the 23rd October, 1942, to the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, qualify for a clasp to the Africa Star. The rose Emblem is of the standard silver pattern. The Clasp to the Africa Star is also granted in the Navy to those who served as part of the Eighth or First Armies. For these the time limits will be as for the Army, and an "8" or a "1" Emblem will be issued.

(ix) *Merchant Navy*.—As in the Royal Navy, the Clasp to the Africa Star is awarded in the Merchant Navy to the personnel of vessels which worked inshore during the North African Campaign between the 23rd October, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943. Service in Merchant Navy vessels which took part in the landings on the coast of Morocco between the 8th November, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943, will also be a qualification.

(x) No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to the Africa Star.

#### The Pacific Star

5. (i) (a) The Pacific Star is awarded for entry into operational service in the Pacific theatre between the 8th December, 1941, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Pacific Star.

(ii) *Navy and Merchant Navy*.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service in the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean east of a line running due south from Singapore round the south-east coast of Sumatra, through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E., will be a qualification.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Pacific Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore entry into the prescribed area of land operations will be a qualification, and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iii) *Army*.—(a) Qualifying service on land in the Army is restricted to operational service in territories in which there have been enemy or Allied invasions. The dates vary for each particular territory. Service in Burma is excluded.

(b) Operational service in China and Malaya from the 8th December, 1941, up to the 15th February, 1942, qualifies for the Pacific Star and from the 16th February, 1942, to the 2nd September, 1945, for the Burma Star. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iv) *Air Force*.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy will qualify. One operational sortie is the qualification.

(b) Non-air crew service on land qualifies under the same rules as those for the Army.

(v) *General*.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

#### Clasp to the Pacific Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for both the Pacific Star and the Burma Star mentioned below is awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. When the Pacific Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Burma Clasp.

#### The Burma Star

6. (i) (a) The Burma Star is granted for entry into operational service in the Burma campaign between the 11th December, 1941, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Burma Star.

(ii) *Army*.—(a) The qualifying area for land operations is service in Burma. In addition service on land from the 1st May, 1942, to the 31st December, 1943, in the provinces of Bengal and Assam and from the 1st January, 1944, until the 2nd September, 1945, in those parts of Bengal or Assam east of the Brahmaputra, qualifies.

(b) Operational service in China and Malaya from the 8th December, 1941, up to the 15th February, 1942, qualifies for the Pacific Star, from the 16th February, 1942, to the 2nd September, 1945, for the Burma Star. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iii) *Navy and Merchant Navy*.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service is restricted to service in the Bay of Bengal enclosed by a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait. The Malacca Strait is included.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Burma Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel ashore entry into the prescribed area of land operations is a qualification and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iv) *Air Force*.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy qualifies. One operational sortie is the qualification.

(b) Non-air crew service is dealt with under the same rules as those for the Army.

(v) *General*.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

#### Clasp to the Burma Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for both the Burma Star and the Pacific Star mentioned above is awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. When the Burma Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn, a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Pacific Clasp.

#### The Italy Star

7. (i) (a) The Italy Star is granted for entry into operational service on land in Sicily or in Italy at any time during the campaign there from the capture of Pantelleria on the 11th June, 1943, and until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Italy Star.

(ii) Operational service in the Mediterranean theatre, for instance in the Ægean and Dodecanese, Corsica, Greece, Sardinia and Yugoslavia after the 11th June, 1943, is a qualification. Operational service in Elba is a qualification. Service in Sicily after the 17th August, 1943, in Sardinia after the 19th September, 1943, and Corsica after the 4th October 1943, is not a qualification.

(iii) *Navy and Merchant Navy*.—(a) Naval or Merchant Navy service at sea in the Mediterranean during this period is a qualification provided it was directly connected with active operations in the Mediterranean theatre, including those in the Ægean and the South of France.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Italy Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The



1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations will be a qualification and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iv) *Air Force*.—Air crew service in operations against the enemy, within the Mediterranean theatre, is a qualification, including sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe.

(v) *General*.—(a) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

(b) The Star will be awarded to those who have earned it whatever other Campaign Stars may be granted in addition for services in the war.

#### The France and Germany Star

8. (i) (a) This Star is granted for entry into operational service on land from the 6th June, 1944, in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany, until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(b) There is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area, for land operations, will qualify.

(ii) *Navy and Merchant Navy*.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service afloat in the North Sea south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel or the Bay of Biscay east of longitude 6° W. is a qualification, provided such service was directly in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c.

(b) Naval and Merchant Navy service afloat in the Mediterranean in support of operations in the South of France is not a qualification. Such service will qualify for the Italy Star.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations is a qualification.

(iii) *Air Force*.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy over Europe from the 6th June, 1944, to the 8th May, 1945, qualifies. Air crew service qualifying for the Atlantic Star will not qualify for this Star. Sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe will not be a qualification as such service will be a qualification for the Italy Star.

(b) Non-air crew personnel of the Air Force are awarded the Star under the same rules as the Army.

(iv) *General*.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned.

#### Clasp to the France and Germany Star

(v) The Star is not awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. If a candidate should qualify for these three Stars or two of them, the Star first earned will be awarded. If the France and Germany Star is awarded under these conditions a Clasp will be awarded for service which would qualify for the Atlantic Star. When the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem is attached to it to denote the award of this Clasp.

#### Campaign Stars and Clasps. General

##### 9. (i) *Entry into operational service*

(a) Service in ships making occasional visits to the defined areas for fuelling and so forth will not necessarily be a qualification.

(b) The expression "entry into operational service" in the case of the Atlantic and Air Crew Europe Stars is subject to the qualification that six or two months operational service must already have been rendered. For awards in the Navy and Merchant Navy of the Pacific, Burma and Italy Stars a similar prior time qualification of six months also applies. Certain modifications of these rules are mentioned in the text relating to particular Stars.

##### (ii) *Previous operational service of less than six or two months*

(a) A recipient of the 1939-45 Star who has qualified for it by less than six or two months service respectively must complete the period of six or two months, as the case may be, before he can begin to qualify for the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars respectively, or before he can earn the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars by service in the Navy or Merchant Navy. For exceptions to this rule see (c) below.

(b) Those to whom grants of the 1939-45 Star have been, or will be made, as a result of the participation in a campaign on the special lists, in paragraph 13 (iv), (vii), (ix) and (xi) below, service in which qualifies in itself for the award, will not begin to qualify for the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars until the

completion of six or two months operational service, as the case may be. A similar condition applies to Navy and Merchant Navy candidates for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars.

(c) For the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars in the armed Forces or Merchant Navy, or for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars in the Navy or Merchant Navy, operational service for a lesser period than six or two months as the case may be, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or alternatively the grant for service in operations of an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches, King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, is a qualification for award, without regard to any six or two months service requirement but subject to the general restrictions relating to alternative awards of the Stars.

(d) Awards made under the conditions described in subparagraph (c) above will be additional to any award of the 1939-45 Star.

##### (iii) *Exclusion of time spent as prisoner of war*

(a) Although time spent as a prisoner of war in consequence of capture in operations may be counted towards the qualifying period for the 1939-45 Star, such time will not be counted towards the period of six or two months operational service which must, in circumstances described in subparagraph (ii) above, be completed before the grants of certain Stars may be authorised.

(b) An individual who, at the time of his capture, has completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star may, however, count time spent as a prisoner of war towards the period of six or two months service required for the award of the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. The candidate must have begun to earn one of these Stars and, in the case of the Merchant Navy, one or more voyages must have been made in the "defined area" after completion of service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star.

##### (iv) *Award of a second or further Star*

(a) Service qualifying for one of the Stars cannot run concurrently with service qualifying for another of the Stars.

(b) An individual, however, who has once completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star and has been awarded either the Atlantic Star or Air Crew Europe Star will not be required to complete this period of qualifying service a second time in order to begin to qualify for the other. A similar arrangement applies to the prior service qualification for awards in the Navy or Merchant Navy of the Pacific, Burma and Italy Stars.

(c) An exception to the rule in (a) is made in the Merchant Navy in relation to the Atlantic Star and is set out in the text referring to that Star.

##### (v) *Award of Clasps*

No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to any one of the Stars.

##### (vi) *Civil Air Transport*

The 1939-45 and Africa Stars are awarded under certain approved conditions to air crew of transport aircraft for service on specified overseas routes. Consideration will be given to the production of a scheme for the award of the other Star in certain conditions, for those civilian crews who have flown into or through theatres of war or over dangerous waters. Air crew of Royal Air Force Transport Command engaged in similar duties will also be considered.

##### (vii) *The last six months*

(a) In the case of persons in operational service in the Navy or Merchant Navy on the 8th May, 1945, that is to say, at the end of active hostilities in Europe, or during the six months immediately preceding the 8th May, 1945, the Italy Star will be granted by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations, and the prior six months service requirement will not apply. A similar waiving of the prior service requirement will extend to the Atlantic Star. The actual service requirement for the Atlantic Star will thus be reduced in this period to entry into operational service.

(b) Similarly, persons in operational service in the Navy or Merchant Navy on the 2nd September, 1945, that is to say, at the end of active hostilities in the Pacific and Burma, or during the six months immediately preceding the 2nd September, 1945, will receive the Pacific or Burma Star as the case may be, by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations and the prior six months service requirement will not apply. In such cases only one Star will be granted for service at sea during the last six months in the Atlantic, Italy, Pacific and Burma areas, *i.e.*, the Star appropriate to the last operational area in which service was rendered.

(c) The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in any of these cases in which operational service amounts to less than six or two months respectively.

##### (viii) *Civilians*

As stated in paragraph 11 (v) below a few approved categories are eligible.

### The Defence Medal

10. (i) The Defence Medal is to be granted (a) for service in the Forces in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened, (b) for non-operational service in the Forces overseas from, or outside, the country of residence, (c) for Civil Defence or other specified civilian service in military operational areas, provided the civil category was not eligible for Campaign Stars, and (d) for Civil Defence service in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened. The time qualification will be three years for (a), (c) and (d) except for Mine and Bomb Disposal units of the Forces in (a), (b) for which the period will be three months. For (b) the time qualification will be (i) one year, except for (ii) service in territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened, for which the qualifying period will be six months. Specified islands in non-operational areas in the Pacific are included among these territories.

(ii) Those qualified for any one of the Campaign Stars may be granted this award in addition, and subsequent award of one of the Campaign Stars will not supersede a previous grant of the Defence Medal. Military or Civil Defence service in the territory of residence, neither subjected to enemy air attack nor closely threatened is not a qualification for this Medal.

#### (iii) Service in the Forces

(a) All members of the Forces who have served in the United Kingdom during the war up to the 8th May, 1945, will be eligible for the Defence Medal. Personnel of the Anti-Aircraft Command and all Royal Air Force personnel other than operational air crew will, for example, be included. Members of Dominion Forces, other than operational air crew, who have served in the United Kingdom will be eligible. The United Kingdom Home Guard will also be included.

(b) It is the intention, for example, that service up to the 2nd September, 1945, by United Kingdom Forces in West Africa, Palestine or India, as well as service by Dominion Forces, other than operational air crew, in non-operational areas outside their own countries, should also be a qualification.

(c) The part-time service of the Malta Home Guard will be specially recognised by the grant of the Defence Medal.

(d) In dealing with claims under sub-paragraph (i) (b) above, relating to service outside the country of residence, Cyprus, Syria, Lebanon, Palestine and Egypt, are treated as one territory. Kenya, Tanganyika, Uganda, Nyasaland, Northern Rhodesia and Zanzibar are also, for this purpose, treated as one territory.

#### (iv) Civilians serving with the Forces

Members of the few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars, for instance (a) full time uniformed civilians serving under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (b) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents, (c) air crew of Civil Air Transport, or (d) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform, will, if they served overseas, from the place of residence for six months in a non-operational territory subjected to enemy attack or closely threatened, be eligible for the Defence Medal. Members of categories (a), (b), (c) and (d) will not be eligible for the Defence Medal for service in non-operational areas overseas from the place of residence, which are not in the list of territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

#### (v) Civil Defence, etc., service

(a) Members of civilian services in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service will be eligible for the Defence Medal.

(b) Part time, as well as whole time, civilian service of the kind described in sub-paragraph (a) above will be a qualification. Any period between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 8th May, 1945, during which the enrolled member was (i) available for duty up to the standard required from time to time, and (ii) performed such duty as and when required will be reckoned towards the period of three years qualifying service.

(c) A list of civilians serving in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service and the Defence Medal was printed as an Appendix to the White Paper Cmd. 6633 of May 1945. There have been added to the list R.A.F. Education Officers, the Joint War Organisation of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, the Scottish Branch of the British Red Cross Society and the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association. Members of the Joint War Organisation and of the two last named bodies can qualify if (a) they were enrolled in an eligible local authority Civil Defence Service, or (b) they performed duties analogous to those of one of the eligible local authority Civil Defence Services, and the section of the Joint War Organisation or of the Scottish Branch of the British Red Cross Society or of the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association to which they belonged was one which functioned operationally during or immediately after enemy attacks. The usual conditions will apply that the individuals (i) should have been available for duty up to the required standard from time to time, and (ii) that they performed such duty as and when required.

(d) It is the intention that Civil Defence service in military operational areas or in non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack should be included on a similar basis. Civil Defence services in Gibraltar and Malta and in other territories in the Colonial Empire, which qualify for Chevrons for war service, will also be eligible. Civil Defence service in, for instance, West Africa or the West Indies will not be a qualification.

#### (vi) Time qualification

Service in the United Kingdom will be counted from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 8th May, 1945, or to the stand-down of the organisation if earlier. United Kingdom Home Guard service, for instance, will be reckoned from the 14th May, 1940, to the stand-down on the 31st December, 1944, and Civil Defence service will be counted up to the 8th May, 1945, or whatever earlier date is fixed for the cessation of service in particular cases. Service in the various eligible categories may be aggregated. Time overseas in the Forces in non-operational areas amounting to less than a year or six months, as the case may be, will be added at its actual time value to service of less than three years at home, that is to say, it would not be multiplied by three.

#### (vii) Time qualification in the Colonial Empire

Where in certain cases in the Colonial Empire in territories which have been subjected to aerial bombardment or closely threatened, a three-year qualification cannot be adopted without excluding the full or part-time local military Forces and the Civil Defence Organisation, it will be necessary to seek approval for special time qualifications.

#### (viii) Special awards

(a) Service in eligible categories brought to an end before the period of three years or twelve, six or three months service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty, or by injuries entitling the candidate to a Wound Stripe will be a qualification for the grant of the Defence Medal.

(b) The Defence Medal will also be granted, without regard to the three year or twelve, six or three months service requirement, to those British subjects who may have received an award or King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, provided that the recipient, when the award or King's Commendation was earned, was serving in a category eligible for the Defence Medal and that the distinction was granted in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal.

(c) It will be noticed that, for obvious reasons, the above definition excludes those granted the George Cross or George Medal for actions in service qualifying for Campaign Stars or for actions in territories neither subjected to air attack nor closely threatened.

(d) There are a few other recipients of the George Cross or the George Medal not in any of the categories mentioned in the preceding sub-paragraphs (b) and (c), mainly those granted these awards for gallantry in Civil Defence, who were not in a service which would qualify them for the Defence Medal. These also will be eligible specially for the Defence Medal. This arrangement will not apply to holders of awards other than the George Cross and the George Medal.

#### (ix) Claims

It will not be practicable for Departments to certify civil awards of the Defence Medal until application has been made and the prescribed form has been submitted and examined. Further information will be issued on this point. A candidate with qualifying time in more than one Service will submit a certificate from the appropriate authorities in respect of his earlier service.

#### (x) Closing dates

(a) The closing date of the qualifying period for the Defence Medal in respect of service in the Forces will be that on which active hostilities ended in Europe, that is to say, the 8th May, 1945, except that service in the Forces overseas from or outside the country of residence, will continue to be reckoned until the 2nd September, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in the Pacific.

(b) Service by local military Forces or Civil Defence Organisations in non-operational areas in territories in the Pacific area classified as qualifying by reason of aerial bombardment or because they have been closely threatened will continue to be reckoned towards the award of the Defence Medal during the interval between the end of active hostilities in Europe and the end of active hostilities in the Pacific, that is to say between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945.

#### (xi) Non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened

The territories, in addition to the United Kingdom, which for the purpose of (a), (b) (ii), and (d) of sub-paragraph (i) above are classified as non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened are shown below, with dates.

will be adopted. Operational and non-operational service will qualify. In the Merchant Navy it will be a requirement that the 28 days should have been served at sea.

(ii) Service between 3rd September, 1939, and 2nd September, 1945, inclusive, will qualify wherever rendered.

(iii) The War Medal will be granted in addition to the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, if earned.

(iv) Operational service brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability attributable to service, capture by the enemy, or the cessation of hostilities on the 2nd September, 1945, will qualify a recipient of one of the Campaign Stars for the award of the War Medal even though the service may not amount to 28 days in all. This concession will not apply to an individual who does not qualify for a Campaign Star. When service was ended by capture by the enemy it will be a condition that there should have been freedom from blame. When the 1939-45 Star or one of the other Campaign Stars has been awarded for operational service of less than 28 days, the War Medal will be granted in addition.

#### Civilians

(v) The few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars, for instance, (a) full-time uniformed civilians serving in army operational areas under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (b) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents serving in army operational commands or in Naval or R.A.F. Establishments in the area thereof, (c) air crew of civil air transport who have flown on specified routes into theatres of war, or (d) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform in the area of Army operational commands overseas, will be eligible for the War Medal in addition to the Campaign Stars, provided that 28 days of such qualifying service has been rendered.

(vi) Categories of civilians, similar to those described in (a) and (b), who served in the United Kingdom only and thus qualified for neither Campaign Stars nor the Defence Medal, and such categories as air crew of civil air transport and R.A.F. Education Officers who served in the United Kingdom only and qualify for the Defence Medal, will not qualify for the War Medal.

(vii) Civil categories similar to those described in (a), (b), (c) and (d) who served outside the country of residence in non operational areas will not qualify for the War Medal unless such service outside the country of residence was rendered in a territory subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

#### Operational service

13. (i) The areas of qualifying operational service for the Campaign Stars in the Navy and Merchant Navy are given in detail in the foregoing paragraphs dealing with the various Campaign Stars.

(ii) The areas of qualifying operational service for the Campaign Stars on land are set out as shortly as possible below. These apply to Army, Navy and Air Force service on land and also to operational air crew service.

For the 1939-45 Star the qualification is six months operational service, or for air crew, two months, including at least one operational sortie. Service may be aggregated. ## (a) Central Pacific and South China Sea.

Operational service qualifies in all islands South of Latitude 40° N. in the Central Pacific and the South China Sea in the area subjected to enemy invasion during the war, and including islands occupied by the enemy up to the cessation of hostilities, for the period from the date of enemy invasion or occupation in each instance and up to the 2nd September, 1945.

The area is bounded on the North by Latitude 40° N. and on the East by the 180th meridian. The southern boundary of the area runs along Latitude 12° South from the 180th meridian to Longitude 145° East. The boundary then turns North along Longitude 145° East to Latitude 9° 40' South. It runs westward along this line to Timor. It then turns due South of Latitude 12° South, runs along this westwards to the Longitude 110° and then to Christmas Island (excluding the Island). The boundary then runs northwards round the South-East coast of Sumatra to Singapore.

It will be seen that this line encloses, for instance, the Marshall Islands, the Gilbert and Ellice Islands, and the Santa Cruz Islands. It excludes the Phoenix Islands, the Samoa Islands, the Fiji Islands, the New Hebrides and New Caledonia.

#### The India Service Medal, 1939-45

14. The India Service Medal will be awarded for three years non-operational service in the Indian Forces in India or elsewhere between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945. This will not be given to anyone qualifying for the Defence Medal. It will be granted in addition to the War Medal and the Campaign Stars and will be worn after the War Medal.

#### Allied and other Foreign Nationals in the British Forces

##### *The Campaign Stars and the War Medal*

15. (i) The categories of Allied and other foreign nationals in the British Forces eligible for British Campaign Stars and the War Medal are as follows:—

- (a) Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted as individuals into British Forces.
- (b) Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted into British Forces by virtue of their membership of Allied Forces.
- (c) Foreign nationals serving as individuals, (i) in British Merchant ships, or (ii) in Foreign vessels chartered on bare-boat (or nett) charters by His Majesty's Government, flying the British flag and with crews serving under British conditions.

(ii) The above three categories are eligible provided the individuals do not receive a similar award from their own Government. It is explained to recipients that the British ribbons are issued provisionally, and that their claim to the corresponding Stars (and therefore the right to continue to wear the ribbons) would be invalidated by the acceptance from their own or other Allied Governments of any other medal employed or instituted for general use in this war.

(iii) Foreign nationals in the categories in sub-paragraph (i) above (mainly in (a) and (c) who subsequently transferred to the Forces or Merchant Navies of their own countries must, in order to qualify, have completed their qualifying service before their own countries declared war.

##### *Defence Medal*

(iv) The position in relation to the Defence Medal on the civil side is that all foreign subjects who were required to carry out, or who voluntarily undertook, Civil Defence or other civil duties of the kind for which the Defence Medal is to be awarded, and who, it may be assumed, have no expectation of any comparable medal from their respective Governments, should be allowed to have it on the same terms as British subjects, regardless of nationality.

(v) On the military side, the six months, or one year, overseas rule for the Defence Medal is intended to recognise British subjects who were put to the discomfort and inconvenience of service overseas during the war. It is intended that foreign subjects from the continent who came here during the war, for instance in 1940, should be required to serve the whole three years. Subject to the other regulations it will be necessary to apply this rule to all foreign nationals who served here whether they served either as in (i) (a) or (b) above or in Civil Defence.

##### **Interpretation**

16. Any questions of difficulty in connection with the scheme, including interpretation and so forth will be a matter for reference to the Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals.

#### The Dominions, India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire

17. The above arrangements in relation to Campaign Stars and Clasps also apply to the Forces and Merchant Navies of India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire. The Defence Medal will also be granted in these Forces for services of the kind described in paragraph 10 above. The arrangements have been generally agreed in discussion with Dominion Governments, though certain questions of detail remain to be settled. It is the intention that Civil Defence services in areas in the British Commonwealth, in addition to the United Kingdom, subjected to air attack or closely threatened, should also be considered for recognition by the grant of the Defence Medal.

THE following regulations governing the award of Post-Graduate Engineering Scholarships tenable outside Ceylon, approved by the Executive Committee of Education, are published for general information.

The Ministry of Education,      C. W. W. KANNANGARA,

1. Annually there shall be awarded scholarships up to a maximum of two tenable for 2 years in the U. K. and four tenable for 2 years in India, for the prosecution of post-graduate study and/or apprenticeship abroad. The selected scholars will be given:—

- (a) Second-class return passage from Ceylon to the town in which they study or apprenticeship is undertaken.
- (b) Outfit allowance of Rs. 750, in the case of scholars going to the U. K., and Rs. 300 in the case of those going to India.
- (c) Medical expenses up to a maximum of £50.
- (d) Tuition Fees.
- (e) Subsistence allowance varying from £230 to £275 per annum according to circumstances, in U. K. and Rs. 2,400 per annum in India. This allowance will be reduced by the amount of apprentice pay or allowances received by the scholar during his period of apprenticeship.

In exceptional circumstances a Scholar will be permitted to proceed for advanced studies and/or practical training to a country outside the U. K. or India, approved by the Governor, the value of the scholarship in such a case being determined by the Scholarship Board in consultation with the Treasury.

The scholarships will carry in addition any premia (up to a maximum of 100 guineas) to be paid to firms of Chartered Engineers with which the scholars will be apprenticed.

2. The scholarships will be awarded on the results of the Final part II. Examination for Engineering Degrees of the University of London. In special circumstances graduates of the professional Institutions may be considered for the award of these scholarships.

3. *Eligibility*.—A candidate to be eligible for one of these scholarships should:—

- (a) have been a student of the Ceylon Technical College for not less than two years immediately preceding the Final part II. Examination for Engineering Degrees of the University of London.
- (b) be a Ceylonese, that is to say, should be either (i) a British subject born in Ceylon, one of whose parents were born in Ceylon or (ii) a British subject who is a descendant of a person under category (i).
- (c) not have completed his 24th year before the first day of the month fixed for the examination.
- (d) produce medical evidence of physical fitness to undergo a course of study abroad.

4. *Conditions of the Scholarships.*

- (a) The holder shall either enter, as an internal student, one of the approved Universities or Technical Institutes in the U. K. or India or in such other country recommended by the Scholarships Board and approved by the Governor and shall there prosecute his post-graduate studies, or be apprenticed to a firm of Engineers providing training of a character acceptable to the professional Institutes. Such a course of studies or professional training being approved by the Scholarships Board.
- (b) The course of study or apprenticeship approved by the Scholarships Board shall not be changed without the prior approval of the Scholarships Board.
- (c) The holder shall transmit to the Scholarships Board quarterly a certificate signed by the College tutor or other responsible authority stating that he continues to pursue his studies or serve his apprenticeship with diligence and that his general conduct is satisfactory.
- (d) The holder of the Scholarship shall pursue a course of study in Engineering as prescribed above, and shall not during the tenure of the Scholarship follow a course of study or training or sit for any examination, not pertinent to this Scholarship.
5. The duration of the Scholarship may be extended for another year at the written request of the Scholar supported by a recommendation from the head of the Faculty or of the Firm to which he is apprenticed.

6. On the expiration of the Scholarship the scholar will be provided with a free second class steamer or railway passage to Ceylon.

The scholarship may be terminated at any time if—

- (a) the scholar's work and progress be considered unsatisfactory,  
 (b) his conduct proves unsatisfactory or  
 (c) he fails in health.

In this event the scholar will retain the right to a passage to Ceylon provided he returns when instructed to do so. Failure to comply with instructions to return to Ceylon will cause the forfeiture of the right to a free passage to Ceylon.

7. No scholar shall return to Ceylon during the tenure of his scholarship except during the long vacation and at his own expense and with the permission of the Chairman of the Scholarships Board\*. Such permission will be granted only in cases of real need and urgency.

8. The medical expenses of an Engineering scholar will be paid by Government in cases recommended by the Director of Colonial Scholars or representative of the Ceylon Government in that country, but the total sum which will be paid for any one scholar on this account is limited to £50.

9. The parent or guardian of each scholar will be required to execute a bond for an amount of not less than Rs. 1,000 to be utilised to meet medical expenses in excess of £50 which are considered to be necessary by the Director of Colonial Scholars or representative of the Ceylon Government in that country. The Secretary of State or the representative of the Ceylon Government may at any time order the return to Ceylon of any Engineering Scholar on the recommendation of competent medical advisers.

## TRADE DISPUTE—ATTAMPITIYA ESTATE, BANDARAWELA.

THE Industrial and Estate Workers' Union, Colombo, presented a petition to me under section 6 (1) of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, with regard to a Trade Dispute that had arisen between the said Union and the Superintendent, Attampitiya estate, Bandarawela. The petition was referred by me to the District Judge, Badulla, under section 6 (2) of the same Order for adjudication.

The following award dated August 16, 1946, made by the District Judge, Badulla, is published for general information in terms of section 8 (4) of the said Order:—

It is ordered that the dismissal of the labourers Nardiyān, Rasu, Kamaran, P. Sinniah, A. K. Sinniah and Sinnethamby, on or about May 2, 1946, by the respondent was justified, and that the said labourers were given reasonable time to leave Attampitiya estate, Bandarawela. The labourer S. Sinniah is not concerned with these proceedings.

It is further ordered that the application in respect of Ramiah, who was absent at the inquiry, no evidence being led on his behalf, be dismissed.

And it is further ordered that if the aforesaid labourers Nardiyān, Rasu, Kamaran, P. Sinniah, A. K. Sinniah, Sinnethamby and Ramiah affected by this award and their families leave the said estate on or before August 15, 1946, the labourer Rengasamy be reinstated as a labourer on the said estate on his undertaking by a bond to be of good behaviour on the said estate, to do nothing prejudicial to the interests of the said estate, and to accept summary dismissal and not to annoy the said Superintendent of the said estate by remaining thereafter on the said estate, if he should be guilty of a breach of this undertaking after due inquiry by the Superintendent of the estate; and if the aforesaid undertaking is not implemented on or before August 16, 1946, the application of the said Rengasamy will stand dismissed.

Whereas the aforesaid conditions in the above award having been carried out; it is ordered that the aforesaid labourer Rengasamy be re-employed on the said estate as aforesaid.

##### Harvesting of Paddy in the Puttalam District for Yala, 1946.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulations 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations, 1942, the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations 1943, and the Defence (Food Rationing) (Special Provisions) Regulations, 1944, as later amended, I, Walwin Arnold de Silva, Assistant Government Agent, Puttalam District, a competent and a proper authority, do hereby direct that every person whether owner or cultivator of any land which is situated in the Puttalam District and which is expected to be harvested during the Yala, 1946, season, shall state in writing the following information at the time of application:—

2. I do further direct that—

- (a) No cultivator shareholder or other person having interests in any paddy land situated in the Puttalam District shall remove any paddy harvested in Yala, 1946, from a threshing floor—to a barn or any other place of storage, until the total harvest has been checked and recorded by the Village Headman, Vel Vidane or any other person authorised by me;
- (b) removal thereafter to the barn or other place of storage within the Village Headman's Division should only be on permits on Form I. P. S. 33, issued by the Village Headman, Vel Vidane of the area or any other person authorised by me;
- (c) for transport from one Divisional Revenue Officer's Division to another, application should be made to me on form D. F. C. 34 supported by the reports from the Village Headman of the area in which the fields are situated;
- (d) for transport from this district to another, applications should be made in duplicate on form D. F. C. 34 to the Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent or the Assistant Government Agent (Emergency) of the area in which the applicant is resident, the application must be supported by reports from the Village Headmen of the areas in which the fields are situated;
- (e) if no application for removal of any share to a place outside the Divisional Revenue Officer's Divisions, or outside the district, is made to me within 6 weeks from the date of threshing of all stocks of paddy are liable to be requisitioned under the Internal Purchase Scheme;
- (f) the Government Levy of one bushel per acre for this season must be delivered at the threshing-floor to the Village Headman of the area or any other person authorised by me in writing;
- (g) no paddy shall, without prior authority be disposed of in any manner other than those by way of consumption at the approved rates (*i.e.* at 6 measures per person per week in the case of cultivators, owner-cultivators and their dependants and 4 measures per person per week in the case of owners and their dependants) by any shareholder of his dependants, subject to a maximum of 50 bushels or such lower quantity as they may be entitled to until the following harvest;
- (h) no paddy shall be utilised for consumption by an owner of paddy or his dependants possessing price ration books, until the surrender of the appropriate number of rice coupons;
- (i) all paddy in excess of seed and consumption allowances must be surrendered to the Village Headman or any other person authorised by me in writing, at the threshing-floor, for which payment will be made at the rate of Rs. 6 per bushel of paddy free from chaff and grit;
- (j) every shareholder, whether owner or cultivator, who is entitled to any paddy from fields situated in the Puttalam District, must inform the Village Headman, the V. V. or any other officer authorised by me in writing of the area of his residence, ten or more days before threshing, particulars of the field or fields from which he proposes to draw his consumption allowance;
- (k) any person acting in contravention of the above orders will be liable to prosecution.

"An improved rubber tapping knife".

*Abstract.*—The nature of the invention can be ascertained from the single claim which is as follows:—

A rubber tapping knife having two paring blades opposed to each other in the shape of an inverted V. The knife also has two guards which run the whole length and on either side of the paring blades. These guards have two cutting edges. An acute angle of 50° is formed where the paring blades meet the guards on either side of the knife. The bark of the rubber tree when tapped with this knife will take the shape of the

acute angle at which the paring blades and guards are placed forming a channel, raised on the outer side. This will prevent the latex from flowing over and down the side of the tree. The knife could be easily used in the ordinary way by any tapper.

*The Parker Pen Company.*

"Fountain Pen".

*Abstract.*—The inventors describe a pen which while suitable for use with the commonly used acid inks is particularly adapted for use with alkaline inks. Such inks are advantageous in that they quickly penetrate the sizing used for ordinary paper, and do away with the necessity of blotting. They are disadvantageous because they readily attack the metals and plastics commonly used in fountain pens and are more mobile than acid inks so that the fountain pens for use with these inks have to be of special materials and have capillary passages smaller than that of ordinary fountain pens.

The inventors accordingly describe a pen in which a self contained detachable unit is mounted on the pen barrel, the said detachable unit comprising a nib of non-corrodible alloy, a governor having a plurality of capillary cells, an ink feed unit, and a shell completely enclosing the nib except at its writing tip. The function of the governor is to store the excess ink that flows due to causes such as rise of pressure in the barrel, and so prevent flooding at the writing tip.

The filling of the capillary cells also blocks the air passage to the barrel so that the cells have to be drained first before air is admitted to the barrel. The shell has a breather opening in its front end to admit air to the reservoir when the necessity for it arises. It is in contact with the upper part of the nib so that ink is prevented from flowing over the top surface of the nib and the nib is prevented from flexing too much from undue pressure.

There are 17 claims and 1 sheet of drawings.
