#### By-laws.

#### Fire Brigade.

1. In the case of any fire outside the limits of the town or of any fire afloat in Colombo Harbour, the services of the fire brigade may be provided if the Chief Officer is satisfied, having regard to the need for ensuring that adequate assistance should be available in the event of any fire occurring within the town, that such services may be provided in such case without undue risk to the town.

Provided, however, that in any such case the Municipal Commissioner may in his discretion direct that the services of the fire brigade should or should not be provided, and it shall be the duty of the Chief Officer to carry out any such direction.

2. The fees set out in the Schedule hereto shall be charged for the assistance of the fire brigade in any case referred to in that Schedule. No fees shall be charged for the assistance of the fire brigade at any fire within the town which is not referred to in the Schedule.

3. The fees which become due under these by-laws shall be paid within 15 days from the date of demand.

4. In these by-laws—

“Municipal town” or “town” means the Municipal town of Colombo;

“fire brigade” means the fire brigade maintained by the Municipal Council of Colombo;

“Chief Officer” means the Chief Officer of the fire brigade.

5. The by-laws published by Proclamation dated November 25, 1931, in *Gazette* No. 7,895 of November 27, 1931, are hereby rescinded.

## THE URBAN COUNCILS ORDINANCE.

*Order under sections 21 and 30.*

BY virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by sections 21 and 30 of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No. 61 of 1939, I, John Curtois Howard, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do hereby—

- (1) vary, with effect from the first day of January, 1947, the limits of the town of Tangalla-Beliatta defined by Proclamation published in *Gazette* No. 8,851 of January 23, 1942, and declare that, with effect from that date the limits of that town shall be those specified in the First Schedule hereto ;
- (2) order that, with effect from the said date, the Urban Council of that town shall consist of five members, and that that town shall be divided into five electoral divisions with the limits defined in the Second Schedule hereto ;
- (3) order that, for the purposes of the general election of the members of the Urban Council of that town to be held next after the date hereof and for the purposes of the application of the provisions of the

aforesaid Ordinance in any matter relating or incidental to or connected with that election. the provisions of paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be deemed to be operative on any day, prior to the first day of January, 1947, on which it may be necessary that those provisions should be so operative; and

- (4) revoke, with effect from the said date, the Order relating to the number and limits of the electoral divisions of the town of Tangalla-Beliatta, published in *Gazette* No. 8,932 of May 22, 1946.

*First Schedule.*

The area situated in Tangalla, and bounded as follows:—

*North:* From a point at the centre of the Weeraketiya-Tangalla road where the southern boundary of Walganeliya village (F. V. P. 316) crosses it, alternately north-eastwards and south-eastwards along the said southern boundary of Walganeliya (F. V. P. 316) till it meets the northern boundary of Tangalla-Hambantota road, thence south-eastwards across the said road to its southern boundary;

*East:* From the last-mentioned point south-westwards along the southern boundary of the Tangalla-Hambantota road as far as the eastern boundary of the Gansabhawa road leading from opposite the Henekaduwa temple to the sea, thence south-eastwards along the eastern boundary of the said Gansabhawa road to the northern boundary of the road from Tangalla to gardens thence south-eastwards in a straight line across the said road to the high water mark of the sea, thence south-westwards, southwards, and south-eastwards along the high water mark of the sea to a point 6½ chains due east of the south-eastern corner of lot 8514 (burial ground for the Buddhists) in P. P. 1,085.

*South:* From the last-mentioned point westwards along the high water mark of the sea as far as the eastern limit of Kadurupokuna village (F. V. P. 311).

*West:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern boundary of the said Kadurupokuna village (F. V. P. 311) as far as the north-eastern corner of lot 360 (path) in F. V. P. 311, thence westwards along the northern boundary of lot 360 (path) and the southern and western boundaries of lot 44B (Gansabhawa road) in F. V. P. 311 to the landmark at the south-western corner of lot 44 in F. V. P. 311, thence northwards along the eastern boundaries of lots 45 and 44A in F. V. P. 311 to the landmark at the north-eastern corner of the said lot 44A, thence north-eastwards along the southern boundaries of lots 43 and 49 to the landmark at the south-eastern corner of the said lot 49 in F. V. P. 311, thence northwards, eastwards, and north-westwards along the eastern boundaries of Kadurupokuna and Polommaruwa villages (F. V. Ps. 311 and 313) and thence northwards along the southern boundary of Walganeliya village (F. V. P. 316) to the starting point of the northern limit.

*Second Schedule.*

Electoral Division No. 1 (Pallikkudawa).

*North:* From a point in the centre of the road Kadurupokuna on the western limit of the Urban Council area eastwards along the centre line of the said road to the centre of the junction with Matara-Hambantota road, thence southwards along the centre line of the said Matara-Hambantota road to the centre of the junction with Murray road, thence eastwards along the centre line of the said Murray road and across Market street to the eastern limit of the Urban Council area.

*East and South:* From the last-mentioned point southwards and westwards along the eastern and southern limits of the Urban Council area till it meets the western extremity of the southern limit of the Urban Council area.

*West:* From the last-mentioned point north-westwards and northwards along the western limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 2 (Kotuwegoda).

*North:* From a point in the centre of the bridge over Kirama-oya on the Matara-Hambantota road south-eastwards along the centre line of the said Kirama-oya until it meets the eastern limit of the Urban Council area.

*East:* From the last-mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the northern limit of Division No. 1.

*South:* From the last-mentioned point westwards along the northern limit of Division No. 1 to the junction of the Matara-Hambantota road with the junction of the

*West:* From the last-mentioned point and northwards along the centre line of the Matara-Hambantota road to the starting point of the northern limit of the

Electoral Division No. 3 (Indipokuna).

*North:* From the south-eastern corner of the final village plan No. 313 eastwards along the eastern boundaries of lot 64 up to the thence south east-wards along the Kirama-oya till it meets the starting point of the northern limit of Division No. 2.

*East:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of Division No. 2 until it meets the junction of Kadurupokuna road and Matara-Hambantota road.

*South:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the northern limit of Division No. 1 until it meets the western limit of the Urban Council area.

*West:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 4 (Dankotiya).

*North:* From the western extremity of the northern limit of the Urban Council area north-eastwards along the southern limit till it meets the southern boundary of the Matara-Hambantota road.

*East:* From the last-mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban Council area as far as the eastern boundary of the Gansabhawa road leading from opposite the Henekaduwa temple, thence westwards in a line with the eastern boundary of the said Gansabhawa road to the centre of Matara-Hambantota road and southwards along the centre line of the said road to the centre of the bridge over Kirama-oya on the said Matara-Hambantota road.

*South:* From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along northern limit of Division No. 3 till it meets the western limit of the Urban Council area.

*West:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

Electoral Division No. 5 (Medaketiya).

*North and East:* From a point in the centre of Matara-Hambantota road in line with the eastern boundary of the Gansabhawa road leading from, opposite the Henekaduwa temple, south-eastwards and southwards along the eastern limit of the Urban Council area till it meets the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Division No. 2.

*South:* From the last-mentioned point westwards along the northern limit of Division No. 2 to the centre of the bridge over Kirama-oya on the Matara-Hambantota road.

*West:* From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Division No. 4 till it meets the starting point of the northern limit of the division.

THE VILLAGE COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE.

*Order.*

WHEREAS by Proclamation the area now known as the town of Marawila in the Divisional Revenue Officer's Division of Pitigal Korale South in the Chilaw District of the North-Western Province has, with effect from the first day of January, 1947, been excluded from the operation of the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance (Chapter 197), and brought within the operation of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), and added to the Yatakalan Pattu village area of the aforesaid Divisional Revenue Officer's Division.

Now, therefore, by virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by section 41 of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), I, John Curtois Howard, Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, do by this Order, with effect from the first day of January, 1947,—

- (a) transfer to the Village Committee of the aforesaid village area the whole of the property and the funds acquired or received by or vested in the Sanitary Board of the Chilaw District for the use and benefit of the town of Marawila and specified in Schedule A hereto;
- (b) declare that such funds and the revenue derived from that part of the village area which is now known as the town of Marawila shall be employed by the Village Committee for the use and benefit of the aforesaid part of that area;
- (c) direct the aforesaid Village Committee to keep separate books of accounts in respect of the aforesaid part of that village area;

tion and assign to the Village Committee the whole of the rights, liabilities, debts or obligations of the Sanitary Board of the Chilaw District under any agreement entered into by the said Board for the town of Marawila; and the terms and conditions set out in Schedule A in the terms and conditions on which the services specified in that Schedule and provided for by the Sanitary Board for purposes of the town of Marawila may be transferred to the aforesaid Village Committee;

2. The Government Agent of the Puttalam District—

to collect all moneys due to the Sanitary Board of the Chilaw District (whether as rates, taxes, licence duties or otherwise), from the inhabitants of the area now known as the town of Marawila;

to recover such moneys in the manner in which they would have been recovered if that town had not been excluded from the operation of the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance; and

3) to pay such moneys when so collected and recovered to the Village Committee of the aforesaid village area.

In terms of section 171 (2) (h) of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No. 61 of 1939, this Council resolves that, with effect from January 1, 1947, there shall be made over to the Urban Council of Haputale town, the following source of revenue, namely, the fees and stamp duty for licences issued under the Excise Ordinance (Chapter 42) in respect of any premises situated within the limits of that town, save and except the fees for licences, permits and passes issued under that Ordinance for country liquor.

#### BY-LAWS.

#### Public Bathing Places.

1. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Negombo Urban Council;

“Council” means the Negombo Urban Council; and

“public bathing place” means any well, spring, or tank or any defined portion of a river or a canal established, maintained, or regulated by the Council as a bathing place for the use of the public.

2. The public bathing place known as the “Canal Bath” shall be open for the free use of the public at all hours of the day: Provided that it may, by order of the Chairman, be closed to the public on any day or during any part thereof, for the purpose of effecting such works of maintenance or of repair or of cleansing and disinfecting as may be necessary in the interest of the public health and safety, or for the purpose of giving the exclusive use of the bath to schools or to a group of individuals or a section of the public if the Chairman in his discretion decides to allow any application made therefor.

3. No person of one sex shall enter, or bathe or wash at, any public bathing place, or in any enclosure therein, set apart by the Council for the exclusive use of persons of the other sex and indicated by a notice exhibited on the spot.

4. No person suffering from scabies (itch) or any infectious or contagious disease shall bathe or wash at any public bathing place.

5. No person shall wash, or cause to be washed, any animal or article whatsoever at any public bathing place, or lead or drive or take any animal into any public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

6. (1) No person shall pollute the waters of any public bathing place by performing any ablutions therein immediately after using a latrine.

(2) No person whilst bathing or swimming in the waters of any public bathing place shall use any soap or other similar preparation or any chemical or oily substance, or render the water foul or unfit for bathing by stirring up the mud or silt in any other way.

7. No person shall loiter in the enclosed portion of any public bathing place, without reasonable excuse, either before or after using the bath.

8. No person shall use any indecent or offensive language or behave in any indecent or offensive manner in any public bathing place, or write or draw anything indecent or offensive on the walls or fences thereof.

9. No person shall knowingly or wilfully remove, displace, damage, or destroy any wearing apparel or other article belonging to, or brought into the premises by, any other person using a public bathing place.

10. No person shall in any manner pollute the precincts of any public bathing place.

11. Any person committing a breach of any of the above by-laws shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 50.

#### By-law.

The Hambantota Market By-laws, 1946, made by the Hambantota Urban Council, and published in *Gazette* No. 9,526 of March 1, 1946, are hereby amended as follows:—

(1) by the substitution, in by-law 4 (2), for the words “the Schedule”, of the word and letter “Schedule A”;

(2) by the re-numbering of by-law 22 as by-law 25;

(3) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 21, of the following new by-laws:—

“22. Unwholesome Articles of Food or Drink.

1. No person shall keep or expose for sale, otherwise than in a case or receptacle so constructed as to prevent the contamination of its contents by dust or flies, any cooked food, pastry, confectionery, sweetmeat, sherbet, sweet drink, preserved fruit, or fruit peeled, skinned, cut or otherwise prepared for immediate consumption.

Such case or receptacle shall always be maintained in a clean condition, and shall not be left open except for the purpose of placing articles therein or cleaning it.

2. (1) It shall be lawful for an Inspector or other officer appointed for the purpose by the Council to inspect any meat, poultry, fish, game, vegetable, fruit, cooked food, pastry, confectionery, sweetmeat, sherbet, sweet drink, or other article of food or drink kept or exposed for sale, and if it appears to him that such article of food or drink is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, to seize and convey such article to the Chairman or Medical Officer of Health.

(2) If the Chairman or Medical Officer of Health certifies that any article of food or drink seized under paragraph (1) is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, such article may be destroyed without payment of compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

3. Every contravention of by-law 1 shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding Rs. 50, and in the case of a continuing offence, with an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 25 for every day during which the offence is committed after conviction, or after written notice from the Chairman of such contravention.

Bakeries, Eating-houses, Restaurants, and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. In these by-laws:—

"bakery" means any premises in which bread, biscuit or confectionery is baked for sale as food for human consumption and includes any premises in which such food is prepared, or in which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored;

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Village Committee;

"Medical Officer of Health" includes a Field Medical Officer.

2. (1) No person shall establish or carry on the business of a bakery except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 2, unless the premises to be used as bakery are in conformity with the following requirements:—

(a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;

(b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;

(c) the floor must be cemented;

(d) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation and sufficient drains;

(e) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof;

(f) the premises must not be situated within fifty feet of any cesspit, permanent manure heap, latrine or open sewer;

(g) the premises must be provided with a separate kneading room having a superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 10 feet;

(h) there must be a free external air space, not less than seven feet wide, on at least two of the sides of the kneading room which contain doors or windows;

(i) the door of the oven must not open directly into the kneading room.

4. The licensee of a bakery shall cause—

(a) all utensils, furniture and other requisites used in or belonging to the bakery, to be kept clean;

(b) The top of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned, closely fitting planks, or of some non-harmful, impervious material, and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;

(c) the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle, and removed from the bakery daily;

(d) the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy or cesspit and from any other similar nuisance;

(e) the floor which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet above the ground;

(f) all refuse from the premises of the bakery to be removed, and the drains to be flushed daily;

(g) at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the premises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread;

(h) clean water, clean towels, nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread; and

(i) a copy in Sinhalese of these by-laws relating to the bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.

5. The licensee of a bakery shall not—

(a) allow the bakery to be used as a place of sleeping or for keeping any animal or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery;

(b) allow any bread, biscuit or confectionery to be exposed for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;

(c) allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuit or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materials which are not good and wholesome;

(d) use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor; or

(e) allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the premises of the bakery.

6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuit or confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process, and shall wear a clean, white apron, covering the chest, armpits and body, and also a white cap or turban.

7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

8. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuit or confectionery, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is being carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.

(2) The licensee, or the person in charge of a bakery, shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman, or such officer all such assistance as may be necessary.

10. It shall be lawful for the Village Tribunal, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries; and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

11. (1) No person shall establish or carry on the business of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

12. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 11, unless the premises to be used as an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique are in conformity with the following requirements:—

- (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-washed;
- (c) the floor must be cemented; and
- (d) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof.

13. The licensee of an eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique shall cause—

- (a) the premises thereof to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) all utensils, furniture or other equipment used in or belonging to the eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique to be kept clean;

- (f) all utensils used in the preparation, sale and consumption of food or drink to be washed with soap and water at least once in every twenty-four hours;
- (g) every utensil or receptacle used by a customer to be washed immediately after such use and before being used by another customer; and
- (h) a list of the names and addresses of all employees to be kept at all times in the premises, so as to be available for inspection.

- (a) any waste tea, coffee or milk, or any remnants of food to be thrown on the floor of the licensed premises; or

It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, or the Sanitary Assistant, or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee, or the person in charge, of any eating-house, restaurant, or tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer, to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.
