THE NUISANCES ORDINANCE.

BY-LAWS for the Minneriya Development Scheme, made by the Board of Health tor the North-Central Province under section 6 of the Nuisances Ordinance (Chapter 180), and confirmed by the Officer Administering the Government by virtue of the powers vested in the Governor by that section.

By-laws.

Interpretation.

J. In these by-laws

"bakery" includes a building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread or the making of cakes or biscuits for sale, but does not include any place where bread is baked or cakes or biscuits are made and sold mainly, if not wholly, for consumption at that place;
"Board" means the Board of Health for the North-Central

Province;
"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Board;

"dairy" includes any farm, farmhouse, cowshed, milk store, milk shop, or other place from which milk is supplied or in which milk is stored or kept for the

supplied or in which milk is stored or kept for the purposes of sale;

"dairyman" includes any cow-keeper, purveyor of milk, or occupier of a dairy, and, where a dairy is owned by more than one person, the manager of the dairy;

"Development Scheme" means the Minneriya Development Scheme within the area defined in the Schedule to

these by-laws; "irrigation work" means Yoda Ela, or Smith's Channel, or any other channel or work declared by the Board to any other channel or work declared by the Board to be an irrigation work by notification published in the Gazette under the hand of the Chairman; "public bathing place" means a place set apart as a public bathing place by the Board; and "public washing place" means a place set apart as a public washing place by the Board.

General.

2. Every part of any building used as a dwelling-house, church, school, or place of assembly shall be provided with sufficient light and ventilation and shall, whenever so ordered by the Chairman or any officer acting under his authority, be forthwith externally and internally limewashed, disinfected, or otherwise cleaned.

3. Latrines shall be constructed where, in the opinion of the Chairman, it is desirable that they should exist.

the Chairman, it is desirable that they should exist.

4. (1) The occupier of every dwelling-house or the person in charge of every church, school, or place of assembly shall deposit or cause to be deposited the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from the premises in a covered dust bin on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M., and shall remove such bin within the space of half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

(2) It shall not be lawful for any person to place or cause to be placed the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse referred to in paragraph (1) on any road except in the dust bins and except between the hours referred to in paragraph (1).

5. It shall be lawful for any Inspector or any officer 5. It shall be lawful for any Inspector or any officer authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon any building or premises within the limits of the Development Scheme for the purposes of inspection and to do all things necessary for, or connected with, or incidental to, the preservation of health and the suppression of nuisances.

6. No person shall deposit or throw or cause or permit to be deposited or thrown any discarded bottles, tins, coconut shells, or other receptacles of any kind capable of holding rain water, in or about any land of which he is the owner or the converger such bottles time coconut shells, or other receptacles

occupier; such bottles, tins, coconut shells, or other receptacles shall be burnt or buried or carried away to a suitable place approved by the Chairman.

Bakeries.

Bakeries.

7. No bakery shall be located in any compound within 100 feet of an open cesspit or surface latrine or in a position where bad odours will reach it, and no open cesspit or surface latrine shall be erected within 100 feet of any bakery.

8. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the inside of the walls shall be lime-plastered and shall be white-washed every six months. The roof shall be of some permanent material. The ceiling shall be plastered and limewashed four times yearly, or may be made of closely fitting boards varnished or painted. The floor shall be cemented throughout and adequate drainage provided. Every room shall be provided with windows capable of being opened and having a superficial area of not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space. The door of the oven shall not open directly into the kneading room. The kneading room shall not be less than 12 feet wide or 15 feet long.

9. Every bakery shall be kept in a clean condition and

9. Every bakery shall be kept in a clean condition and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, cesspit, or

other nuisance.

The occupier of every building used as a bakery shall 10.

(a) the floor to be carefully scraped and swept and the drains to be flushed at least once every twentyfour hours;

(b) all dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from the premises to be deposited in a covered dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the premises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and

(c) the dust bin referred to in paragraph (b) to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.

The troughs and all the utensils used in the making

of bread and pastry shall be kept clean.

12. The tops of the tables shall be of well-seasoned closely fitting planks or some non-harmful impervious material, and shall be scraped and cleaned daily.

13. No animal shall be kept in the bakery for any purpose whatsoever.

14. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of the bakery has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of the bakery to enter the bakery or take part in the manufacture or sale, on the premises, of bread, biscuits, or confectionery.

15. All persons employed in the preparation and baking of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of breadmaking.

16. Clean water and soap shall be provided for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuits, and confectionery.

All bread, biscuits, confectionery, and sweetmeats posed for sale shall be kept in receptacles free from connination by flies. Such receptacles shall be kept clean.

8. The flour, water, and other materials used in the nufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and the shall be kept at a height of not less than 18 inches above ound.

No place situated on the same floor as the bakery hing part of the building shall be used as a sleeping aless it is effectually separated from the bakery by a extending from the floor to the ceiling. ting-houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques.

eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

22. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms shall be well ventilated and lighted.

The occupier shall cause

- (a) all refuse and dirt on or about the promises of any eating-house or toa or coffee boutique to be deposited in a covered dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the promises daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
- (b) the dust bin referred to in paragraph (a) to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
- 24. No waste tea, coffee, or milk, or remnants of food or cooking waste, shall be thrown on the floor of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique.
- 25. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of an eating-house, or a tea or coffee boutique, has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of the eating-house or tea or coffee boutique to be employed therein.
- All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique
- shall at all times be kept clean.

 27. The sugar used in an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique shall be kept in glass stoppered bottles.
- 28. All cakes, sweetmeats, and similar articles exposed for sale in an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique shall be kept receptacles free from contamination by flies. receptacles shall be kept clean.
- 29. The occupier of every building used as an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques to be hung up in a prominent place in such building.

Butchers' Stalls.

- 30. Every butcher's stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and shall be whitewashed at least four times a year, and the floor shall be cemented and sufficient drainage provided. All drains in or about a butcher's stall shall be flushed at least once a day.
- 31. Every room in which meat is kept shall be maintained in a clean condition.
- 32. Every table used in a butcher's stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermoable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.
- 33. (1) Every butcher shall provide himself with a fly-proof covered bin or receptacle of metal for waste material and refuse.
 - (2) Every butcher shall cause-
 - (a) all refuse, dirt, offal, or other matter in or about his stall to be deposited in the bin or receptacle referred to in paragraph (1) and to be placed on the edge of the road outside the stall daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
 - (b) the bin or receptacle referred to in paragraph (1) to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
- 34. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any erson in charge of a butcher's stall has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of such stall to be employed therein.
- Every butcher shall cause a copy of these by-laws *.35. Every butcher shall cause a copy of those by laws relating to butchers' stalls to be hung up in a prominent place in the stall. Fish Stalls.

(1) Every fish stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed. The floor shall be of smooth cement, having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built to in cement and cement. rondored, and omptying into a bucket. The drain and bucket shall be washed with disinfectant at least twice a day, and the bucket shall not be allowed to overflow:

Provided that in hou of building such drain a fish-monger may use a large zinc sheet or concrete counter having a fall towards its contre and so arranged that the washings shall fall into the bucket.

- (2) The stall shall always be kept clean and free from stains of blood, and dust, and the walls and floor kept in a state of good repair.
- 37. Every table used in a fish stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.

38. Fish baskots shall be washed darly and kept exposed to sun and air on a shelf and shall not be kept inside the fish stall.

- 39. (1) The holder of every fish stall shall provide himself with a covered fly-proof movable receptucle of metal for wasto material.
 - (2) The holder of every fish stall shall cause-
 - (a) all waste material in or about the stall to be deposited in the covered fly-proof movable receptacle referred to in paragraph (1) and to be placed on the edge of the road outside the stall daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
 - (b) the receptacle referred to in paragraph (1) to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
- The drains in or about every fish stall shall be well 40. flushed at least once a day.
- 41. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a fish stall has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of such stall to be employed thoroin.
- 42. The holder of every fish stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fish stall to be hung up in a prominent place in the stall.

Fruit and Vegetable Stalls.

- 43. Every fruit and vegetable stall shall be well ventilated and the walls thereof shall be plastered and shall be whitewashed at least twice a year, and the floor shall be comented.
- 44. All fruits and vegotable exposed for sale shall be fresh and shall be kept at a height of not less than 18 inches from the floor.
- 45. The occupier of every fruit and vegetable stall shall cause
 - (a) all refuse and other unsaleable material in or about the stall to be deposited in a fly-proof dust bin and placed on the edge of the road outside the stall daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 10 A.M.; and
 - (b) the dust bin referred to in paragraph (a) to be removed within half an hour after it is emptied by the scavenging labourers employed by the Board.
- 46. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a fruit or vegetable stall has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such diseases, shall be permitted by any person in charge of such stall to be employed therein.
- 47. The occupier of every fruit and vegetable stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fruit and vegetable stalls to be hung up in a prominent place in such stall.

Cattle Sheds.

- The yard of every cattle shed shall be properly levelled and drained, and the ground shall either be paved or properly consolidated with broken metal, so that it keeps a hard and level surface.
- 49. (1) Every cattle shed shall be provided by the owner, tenant, or occupier of the premises on which the shed is situated with suitable cemented drains to carry off washings, urino, or rain water :

Provided that the Chairman, if he considers it necessary, may require such drains to be so constructed as to convey the urine or washings into one or more covered receptacles constructed in such manner as the Chairman may direct, the contents of which shall be daily removed at the expense of such owner, tenant, or occupier, and disposed of so that no nuisance is caused thereby.

- (2) The floor of every cattle shed shall be paved with brick rendered in cement, stone, cement concrete, asphalt, or other hard material which can readily be kept clean, and shall be kept even and in good repair. The roof shall be of tiles, corrugated iron sheets, or similar material, and the walls of stone or brick cement-plastered to a height of 4 feet from the
- (3) Every cattle shed shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, and all dung and refuse shall be removed daily to such place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman may approve.

Dairies.

No dairy shall be located in any compound within 100 feet of an open cesspit or surface latrine or in a position where bad odours will reach it, and no open cesspit or surface latrine shall be erected within 100 feet of any dairy.

51. The premises of every dairy shall be sufficiently provided with proper drainage and the drains shall be kept flushed. No foul water shall be allowed to stugnate in any such premises.

52. All cowdung, refuse, or dirt on or about the premises of a dairy shall be collected and removed from the premises at least once a day.

53. A pure and protected supply of water shall be provided at a convenient distance for the use of every dairy. No bathing, or washing of clothes shall take place at or near such

water supply.

54. (1) No milch cow or buffalo shall be kept in a dairy or milked for the purposes of the milk supply unless it is free from

(2) No person suffering from, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a dairy has recently suffered from, any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of the dairy to be employed therein.

55. (1) Every dairyman shall issue all such instructions to his employees and take all such measures as may be necessary to ensure that the udders and teats of each milch cow and buffalo are washed before milking.

(2) Every person employed for the purpose of milking cows

or buffaloes in a dairy shall wash his hands with soap and water before milking.

(3) Every precaution shall be taken to prevent contamination of milk by dung or urme.

56. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in cr belonging to a dairy shall be kept clean.

All vessels in which milk is sent out for distribution shall be clean, and shall be properly covered, stoppered, or corked with clean materials. No such vessels shall be carried under the armpit by the person distributing the milk.

58. Every shed in which cattle are kept in a darry shall be

in conformity with the requirements of such of these by-laws

as relate to cattle shods.

59. (1) Every dairy shall be provided with a room (hereinafter called a "milk room"), erected in such position and at such distance from the cattle sheds as the Chairman may approve, for the storing and preparation of milk, and for the storing, after they are cleansed, of all the vessels used for the

purposes of the dairy.

- (2) The floor of the milk room shall be cemented with ruonded corners at its junction with the walls; the walls shall be of plasted masonry, smooth boards, or ironwork, and shall be limewashed or painted periodically as directed by the Chairman. At least two opposite walls of the milk room shall abut on the open air. The roof shall be ceiled with grooved boards to prevent the ingress of dust. There shall be at least one window and one door. The window shall be three feet by two feet without glass or shutters and be fitted with fly-proof netting. The door shall be opposite the window, be close fitting, and fitted with fly-proof netting, and shall be kept
- (3) Every table used or placed in a milk room shall have its top covered with marbale, slate, zinc, or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman.

(4) The milk room shall not be used for any purpose other than that of storing and preparing milk or storing the clean

vessels used for the purspose of the dairy.
60. Every dairyman shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to dairies to be hung up in a prominent place in the

Public Bathing Places.

61. The Board may set apart as a public bathing place the whole or any defined portion of any public place over which it has control.

62. A list of the places set apart as public bathing places shall be published by the Chairman in the Guzette and proclaimed within the limits of the Development Scheme by beat of tom-tom.

63. No person shall wash any animal, clothes, mats, or other articles in any public bathing place.

64. No person shall commit a nusiance by obeying a call

of nature at or near any public bathing place.
65. No person suffering, or who has recently suffered, from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or has been

recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at, or in any way use the water of, any public bathing place, unless such water is drawn for such person by some other person and carried for use to a safe distance from such bathing place.

Public Washing Places.

66. It shall be lawful for the Board from time to time to set apart as public washing places for the washing of animals, clothes, mats, or other articles, such places as it may deem proper, and to specify the hours during which such places may be used.

67. A list of the places set apart as public washing places shall be published by the Chairman in the Gazette and placed within the limits of the Development Scheme by by of tom-tom.

68. No person shall wash any animal suffering from

infectious or contagious disease at any public washing f 69. No person suffering, or who has recently a from any contagious or infectious disease, shall wash his or any other article in any public washing place.
70. No person shall commit a nuisance by obeyin

nature at or near any public washing place.

Irrigation Works.

71. No person shall throw any dirt or filth irrigation work.

72. No person shall allow any animal to trespash in ırrigation work.

73. No person shall (a) bathe, or (b) wash any animal,

clothes, mats, or other articles in any irrigation work.
74. No person shall ease himself within 100 yards of any irrigation work or wash or clean himself therein immediately after easing himself.

75. No person shall cause or permit any water from any house or land belonging to or occupied by him to drain or be

discharged into any irrigation.
76. The Board shall proclaim the irrigation works by beat

of tom-tom or other means.

77. The by-laws for the Development Scheme, made by the Board, and published in Gazette No. 8,103 of February 8, 1935, are hereby rescinded.

By-laws.

1. No person shall draw water from a public standpipe

for any purpose other than a domestic purpose.

2. No person shall fix any contrivance to the tap or handle of any standpipe in order to secure a continuous flow of water.

3. (1) No person shall lay any pipe for the conveyance of water from any of the Council's mains or branches into any land or premises without the approval of the Chairman, or maintain any such pipe which has been laid without such

(2) No person other than an employee of the Council shall lay any pipe referred to in paragraph (1) of this by-law.

(3) Where any pipe referred to in paragraph (1) of this by-law has been laid in any land or premises in contravention of any of the preceding provisions of this by-law, the Chairman may direct the owner or occupier of such land or premises to have such pipe removed; and if such owner or occupier does not carry out the Chairman's direction to have such pipe removed, the Chairman or any person authorised by him may cause the removal of such pipe.

t. Where water is running to waste from any tap, pipe other fitting forming part of the private water service any land or premises, the owner or occupior of such or premises shall take all such measures as may be to stop the wastage of water; and if such owner pier does not take such measures, the Chairman or on authorised by him may cause the discontinuance upply of water to such land or premises from the mains.

person shall contaminate the water in any reservoir, cistern, pipe or vossel belonging to the Council, tream whereof the water flows into or feeds any

Irson shall attach any hosopipe, pipe, tube, or wance of any nature whatsoever either temporarily

ontly to any public standpipe.

The person shall interfere with the automatic selfclosing valve or other automatic appliance attached to or forming part of any public standpipo so as to prevent either temporarily or permanently the automatic action of such valve or appliance.

8. The Chairman may, whenever it may be expedient to do so, diminish without notice the supply of water allowed

to any person or to the whole town.

9. No person who is suffering from any contagious or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, shall draw water from any public standpipe.

10. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Urban Council, "Urban Council" means the Urban Council of Avissawella.

By-law.

The general by-laws relating to licences published in Gazette No. 9,419 of June 15, 1945, are hereby amended as follows:-

(1) under the heading, "Interpretation of Terms", in by-law 1, by the substitution, in the definition of "offensive or dangerous trade", for the words "storing plumbago, "of the words "storing plumbago, storing timber or firewood,";

(2) by the re-numbering of by-law 235 thereof as by-law 238; and

(3) by the insertion, immediately after by law 234 under the heading "Butchers' Stalls" of the following new by-laws .-

" Timber and Firewood Stores.

235. No person shall be entitled to a licence unless the premises to be used as a timber or firewood store are in conformity with the following requirements:

(a) Every building on the premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted;

(b) Every room in such building must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open must be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;

(c) the walls and pillars in every part of such building must be not less than seven feet in height;
(d) the eaves of such building must be at least six feet

above the ground;
(e) the roof of such building must be made of some non-

inflammable material; and

(f) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation, at least one latrine being provided for every ten persons employed in the premises.

236. Every licensee shall take adequate precautions against fire, and no licensee shall kindle a fire within the licensed premises.

237. Every licensee shall keep the licensed premises free

from any filth, refuse or other matter which is likely to affect the safety, health or comfort of the neighbours or the public."

By-laws.

Water Supply.

1. Where the Council decides to prohibit the removal of water by cask or barrel from any public well, tank or reservor, the Chairman shall cause a notice setting out the prohibition to be posted up at such well, tank or reservoir.

2. Where a notice has been posted up at any public well, tank or reservoir in accordance with by-law I, no person shall remove or cause the removal of water by cask or barrel from such well, tank or reservoir.

3. No person shall in any manner pollute the water of

any public well, tank or reservoir.

4. No person shall bathe any animal or wash any vehicle

at any public well, tank or reservoir.

5. Any person contravening any of the by-laws 2, 3 and 4 shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and in the case of a continuing offence, an additional fine not exceeding twenty-five rupees for every day during which the offence is continued after conviction or written notice from the Chairman of the contravention.

Bakeries and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. In those by-laws

"Bakery" means any premises in which bread, biscuit or confectionery is baked for sale as food for human consumption and includes any premises in which such food is prepared, or in which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored; "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Village Committee of Ganga Ihala village area; "Medical Officer of Health" includes a Field Medical Officer.

- (1) No person shall establish, or carry on the business of a bakery except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.
- (2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of
- 3. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 2 unless the premises to be used as a bakery are in conformity with the following requirements :—
 - (a) the premises must be well ventilated and well lighted; (b) the walls must be plastered with lime mortar and white-

washed: (c) the floor must be cemented;

(d) the premises must be provided with sufficient latrine accommodation and sufficient drains;

- (e) a ceiling of suitable materials must be provided so as to
- prevent dirt and dust falling from the roof;
 (f) the premises must not be situated within fifty feet of any cesspit, permanent manure heap, latrine, or open
- (g) the premises must be provided with a separate kneading room having superficial floor space of not less than 12 feet by 10 feet;
- (h) there must be a free external air space not less than seven feet wide, on at least two of those sides of the kneading room which contains doors or windows;
- (1) the door of the oven must not open directly into the kneading room.
- The licensee of a bakery shall cause-
- (a) all utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or
- belonging to the bakery, to be kept clean;
 (b) the tops of the tables in the bakery to be made of well seasoned closely fitting planks, or of some non-harmful impervious material; and the tables to be scraped and cleaned daily;
- (c) the floor of the bakery to be swept at least once in every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings to be placed immediately in an impervious and covered receptacle, and removed from the bakery daily;
- (d) the premises of the bakery to be kept clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy or cesspit and
- from any other similar nuisance;
 (e) the flour which is used in the bakery to be kept on a platform raised at least three feet from the ground;
- (f) all refuse from the premises on the bakery to be removed and the drams to be flushed daily;
- (g) at least two spittoons to be kept in some part of the pre-mises other than the kneading room, but so as to be easily accessible to those engaged in the manufacture of bread;
- (h) clean water, clean towels, nail brush and soap to be provided on the premises for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread; and
- (i) a copy in Sinhalese of these by-laws relating to bakeries to be exhibited in a conspicuous part of the bakery.
- 5. The licensee of a bakery shall not-
- (a) allow the bakery to be used as a place for sleeping or for keoping any animal or any article other than an article necessary for the purposes of the bakery;
- (b) allow any bread, biscuit or confectonery to be exposed
- for sale otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases;

 (c) allow any person engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuit or confectionery to use any flour, water or other materails which are not good and wholesome;
- (d) use or keep in the bakery any furniture or equipment which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor; or (e) allow any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place
- on the premises of the bakery.
- 6. Every person employed in the preparation or baking of bread, biscuit or confectionery, shall wash his hands before engaging in that process, and shall wear a clean white apron, covering the chest, armpits, and body, and also a white cap or
- turban.
 7. No person shall spit within the premises of the bakery except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.
- 8. No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of a bakery to enter the bakery or to take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuit or confectionery, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- 9. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanıtary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times and at any time when the process of kneading or baking is be is carried on, to enter and inspect the bakery.
- (2) The licensee, or the person in charge, of a bakery, shall permit the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing to enter and inspect the bakery, and shall render the Chairman, or such officer or Assistant all such assistance as

It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to bakeries; and the licensee shall not be entitled to compensation in respect of such cancellation.

 - (b) any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place on the licensed premises.
- 15. The licensee of a tea or coffee boutique shall cause at least two spittoons to be kept at all times on the licensed premises so as to be readily available to visitors to the premises, as well as to the employees.
- 16. No person shall spit within the premises of a tea or
- coffee boutique except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

No person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any person in charge of a tea or coffee boutique to enter such place or take part in the preparation or sale of any food or drink therein, until the periods of infection and
- incubation have elapsed.

It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer authorised by the Chairman in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect a tea or coffee boutique, and the licensee or the person in charge of such tea or coffee boutique, shall permit the Chairman, or such officer or Assistant to enter and inspect the premises, and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary.

It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to tea or coffee boutiques; and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.
