CADETSHIPS IN THE CEYLON CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1947.

1. An Open Competitive Examination for Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service will be held by the Ceylon Civil Service Commission in Colombo in or about October, 1947. The actual dates will be notified later.
2. The number of vacancies will be ten. (The full number of appointments will not be made unless candidates attain a suitably high standard.)
3. Candidates for this examination must be Ceylonese. For the purpose of this examination a Ceylonese is—
 - (a) a natural born male British subject who is born in Ceylon, one of whose parents was born in Ceylon; or
 - (b) a natural born male British subject who is a descendant of a person falling within category (a); or
 - (c) a natural born male British subject deemed by the Governor with the advice of the Board of Ministers, in view of special circumstances to be a Ceylonese.
4. Candidates must have attained the age of 22 and must not have attained the age of 24 on August 1, 1947.
5. Candidates are required to obtain a written nomination from the Governor to sit for the examination.
6. Candidates must satisfy the Governor that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight and physically qualified for service in any part of the Island. Successful candidates will be called upon to undergo a strict medical examination to test these points.
7. A married candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a Ceylon Cadetship without the special consent of the Governor.
8. The fee for examination will be—
 - (a) Rs. 200 for the competitive examination which should be paid to Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Bank of Ceylon. See note 4 of application form. The bank receipt should be attached to the application form.
 - (b) Rs. 10.50 for the medical examination. Successful candidates will be notified later of the manner in which this fee is to be paid.
9. Nomination will be limited to candidates who have passed an Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of London or an Honours or Pass Degree Examination of the University of Ceylon or any other examination which may be deemed to be of at least equal standard. Nomination to sit for the examination will also be granted to candidates, otherwise eligible, who intend to sit the Final Examination for a University Degree before August 1, 1947. Candidates nominated in these circumstances will not be eligible to sit for the Civil Service Examination unless they have completed the Degree Examination. Any candidate who competes in the Civil Service Examination on these conditions will be presumed to do so in the knowledge that should he later be informed that he has not been successful in the Degree Examination he will not be considered for appointment to the Civil Service.
10. Candidates who possess the necessary qualifications and who propose to sit for the examination will, on application to the Chief Secretary, be supplied with copies of the Regulations, Syllabus, and Application Form.
11. Nominations for the examination will be considered on the receipt of the forms of application which must be filled in duplicate by the applicants in their own handwriting and must reach the Chief Secretary's Office on or before June 16, 1947.
12. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post can be considered. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.
13. Acknowledgments of application forms are sent and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should at once write to the Chief Secretary, Colombo. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.
14. Candidates will be notified as soon as possible of the dates and place fixed for their *viva voce* test; the time table of the written part of the examination will be sent to the address given on the form of application and will contain instructions about the time and place at which candidates are to attend.

APPLICATION FORM.

For the use of the candidates seeking admission to the Competitive Examination to be held in Colombo in 1947 for appointment to Cadetships in the Ceylon Civil Service.

Note 1.—This form is to be filled up and returned to the Chief Secretary, Colombo, in time for delivery on or before June 16, 1947. No application form received after that date will be accepted.

A candidate who fills up and returns this application form and does not receive an acknowledgment of it within a reasonable time should inform the Chief Secretary.

Note 2.—Candidates should, by consulting the regulations, make certain that they are eligible to compete and that their selection of subjects conforms with the regulations. No scrutiny of the information which is given on this sheet is made by the Chief Secretary or the Ceylon Civil Service Commissioners before the examination.

Note 3.—Should any of the particulars furnished by candidates be found to be false within their knowledge they will, if appointed, be liable to be dismissed. The wilful suppression of any material fact will be similarly penalized.

Note 4.—The fee for the examination will be Rs. 200 which should be paid to the Examination Fund (No. 2) account of the Director of Education in the Bank of Ceylon. A form for this purpose is annexed. The Bank receipt should be annexed to the application form. The full fee is returned to candidates who are not granted nominations to sit for the examination. A candidate who withdraws or absents himself from the examination for any reason whatsoever at any time after he has been granted a nomination shall not be entitled to a refund of the whole or a portion of the fee.

4. The Civilization (subjects 9, 12, 14, and 22) associated with a language can be taken only by candidates who also offer the language itself.

5. In English Literature (subjects 15 to 19 inclusive) a candidate may not offer subjects carrying a total of more than four hundred marks. Thus a candidate who offers English Literature (General) (subject 15) may not offer more than two periods of English Literature (subjects 16 to 19).

6. Candidates who offer a natural science subject (subjects 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54) must produce a certificate of laboratory training in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the head of the institutions.

7. Candidates who offer Geography I. or Geography II. (subjects 32 and 33) must produce a certificate of practical training in that subject in an institution of University rank. The certificate must be signed by the head of the institution.

8. Candidates who offer Higher Pure Mathematics (38) or Higher Applied Mathematics (39) will be allowed to take *either* Lower Pure Mathematics (36) or Lower Applied Mathematics (37) but not both the lower papers.

9. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Examiners may consider necessary in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

10. If a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a deduction which may be of considerable amount will be made on this account from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.

11. Credit will be given for good English, including orderly, effective and exact expression, combined with due economy of words in all the subjects of the examination and not only in subjects 1 and 2 which are specially devoted to the English language.

12. Candidates must be prepared to sit for more than one paper in subjects carrying a total of 200 marks.

SYLLABUSES.

All papers will be of three hours' duration except where specified.

1. *Essay.*—An essay to be written in English on one of several specified subjects. The essay will be judged not only according to language, style and arrangement but also according to the degree of thoughtfulness and originality in its treatment of the subject.

2. *Précis.*—A paper of one hour's duration requiring the candidate to express in his own words, but more succinctly, the substance of one or more passages of prose.

3. *Intelligence Test.*—A paper of one hour's duration designed to place the candidates in order of merit from the point of view of general ability. No marks will be assigned, but the result of the test will be used in assigning marks for the *Viva Voce* Examination.

4. *General Knowledge.*—A paper designed to test the candidate's general knowledge. No special syllabus is prescribed.

5. *Viva Voce.*—The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his career. He will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to assess his suitability for the Service for which he is entered, and in framing their assessment the Board will attach particular importance to his intelligence and alertness, his vigour and strength of character and his potential qualities of leadership.

6. *Sinhalese, Tamil and Arabic.*—A paper of one and a half hours' duration containing translation into English, translation into the language of English sentences chosen to test grammatical knowledge and translation into the language of easy passages of continuous English prose.

English (Special).—A paper of one and a half hour's duration designed to test the candidate's knowledge and command of written and spoken English.

7. *Sinhalese Language and Literature.*—(Two papers.) Candidates are expected to show a knowledge of the language in its various phases of development and of the literature from the earliest times. Passages may be set for translation from and into English.

8. *Tamil Language and Literature.*—(Two papers.) Translation from Tamil into English and from English into Tamil, an essay and questions on grammar; Tamil Literature from the Sangam age to the end of the 19th Century.

9. *Dravidian Civilization*.—(Two papers.) The history of Dravidian civilization from the earliest times to the end of the 19th Century with special reference to the Tamils.
10. *Arabic*.—(Two papers.) A general knowledge of the language, its grammar, literature and history, and of Islamic culture. Questions may be set on the geography, history, and social, political and religious institutions of the Islamic world.
11. *Sanskrit Language*.—(Two papers.) Translation from Sanskrit into English; composition, in the Devanagari script, which may include an essay on one of several given subjects.
Both Vedic and Classical Sanskrit passages may be set for translation. Questions may be included relating to grammatical forms, both Vedic and Classical Sanskrit, occurring in the passages set for translations, or to grammatical and syntactical problems of a general nature suggested by them. Composition will be required in Classical Sanskrit style.
12. *Sanskrit Civilization*.—(Two papers.) The history of the culture, philosophy and the thought of India, and Sanskrit literature, from the Vedic period to 1200 A.D.
13. *Pali Language*.—(Two papers.) Translation from Pali into English and from English into Pali and composition in Pali on one or more specified subjects.
14. *Pali Civilization*.—(Two papers.) The history of Buddhist Civilization in India from the time of Buddha to 1000 A.D.
15. *English Literature (General)*.—(Two papers.) Paper I. 1350–1700; Paper II. 1700 to the present day.
Candidates will be expected to have some knowledge of the social and historical background of English Literature during these periods, and to attempt the criticism of set passages. They will not be expected to study every part of either of the two periods with equal thoroughness. Credit will be given for evidence of first hand knowledge of the work selected for study.
- 16–19. *English Literature—Periods 1 to 4*.
Period 1, 1579–1660, with the following for special study: Spenser, Lyly, Shakespeare, Ben Jonson, Webster, Donne, Browne and Milton.
Period 2, 1660–1800, with the following for special study: Dryden, Defoe, Swift, Pope, Fielding, Dr. Johnson, Gibbon and Blake.
Period 3, 1800 to 1880, with the following for special study: Wordsworth, Coleridge, Keats, Jane Austen, Tennyson, Dickens, Arnold, Hopkins.
Period 4, 1880 to the present day, with the following for special study: Yeats, Hardy, Conrad, Shaw, Eliot, Joyce, Lawrence (D.H.), Eugene O'Neill.
Candidates will be expected to have a fair general knowledge of the life and thought of the period selected with a more detailed knowledge of at least four of the authors set for special study. Candidates will be expected to identify passages taken from authors set for special study and to comment on them. Credit will be given for evidence of first hand knowledge of the material selected for special study.
20. *Latin Language*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Composition and Translation. The paper on Latin Composition will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or may attempt both verse and prose.
21. *Greek Language*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Composition and Translation. The paper on Greek Composition will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or may attempt both verse and prose.
22. *Greek and Roman Civilization*.—(Two papers.) Papers will be set on Greek and Latin Literature and Greek and Roman History. On both papers special credit will be given for knowledge of original authorities. In Greek History the main stress will be laid on the period from 510 B.C. to 323 B.C.: In Roman History on the period from 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.
- Languages and Civilizations*—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the language and its literature. The papers on civilization will test the knowledge of geography, history, and social, political and religious evolution and developments. Questions may be set which require an acquaintance with archaeological discoveries.
23. *History I*.—(Two papers.) The history of India and of Ceylon.
24. *History II*.—(Two papers.) The history of Europe since the Renaissance.
25. *History III*.—(Two papers.) The history of Great Britain since 1485. Questions will be set on development of the British Empire and Commonwealth.
[Questions may be asked on Indian and European political theories and institutions, constitutional development and European activities in the east generally].
26. *Economics I*.—(Two papers.) (a) Economics, descriptive and analytical (including public finance), (b) principles and practice of currency, banking and international trade.
27. *Economics II*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as Economics I. but taken to a more advanced stage.
28. *Economics III*.—(One paper.) Modern Economic History, to include Economic History of England, France, Germany, Russia and U. S. A. from the middle of the eighteenth century, and Economic History of India and Ceylon during the British period.
29. *Statistics*.—(1) Frequency distributions, averages, percentiles, and simple methods of measuring dispersion, graphic methods, treatment of qualitative data, e.g., investigation of association by comparison of ratios, the practice of graphic and algebraic methods of interpolation.
(2) Practical methods used in the analysis and interpretation of statistics of prices, wages and incomes, trade, transport, production and consumption, education, &c.; methods of dealing with population and vital statistics, miscellaneous methods used in handling statistics of experiments or observations.
(3) Elements of modern mathematical theory of statistics frequency curves and the mathematical representation of groups generally, accuracy of sampling as affecting averages, percentages, the standard deviation, significance of observed differences between averages of groups, &c., the theory of correlation for two variables.
30. *Political and Social Theory*.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, political theory being understood to mean not only the theory of legislation, but also the general history of the State and its connection with kindred studies such as jurisprudence, Public International Law and Economics. A knowledge of original authorities is required.
31. *Political Organization*.—Constitutional Forms (Representative Government, Federalism, &c.), and Public Administration, central and local. Candidates will be expected to understand the origin and development of existing institutions.
32. *Geography I*.—(Two papers.) (1) General economic geography, regional geography of Eurasia, with emphasis on Ceylon.
(2) Practical work, including reading and interpretation of topographical, land utilization and geological maps, the construction and use of the principal map projections, simple methods of land survey.
33. *Geography II*.—(Two papers.) (1) The physical basis of geography, regional geography of North and South America, Africa and Australasia.
Candidates will be expected to answer questions on two of the more specialized branches of geography—Cartography, Geomorphology, Climatology and Oceanography, Distribution and Ecology of Plants and Animals, Distribution of Man, Economic Geography, Political Geography, Historical Geography. Choice of subjects should be indicated in the application form.
(2) Practical work, including more difficult questions on the subject matter of Geography I. (2), critical cartography, the collection of data relating to climatic, economic and population conditions and cartographical and diagrammatic methods of expression of such data.
34. *Philosophy I*.—(Two papers.) History of Philosophy and Ethics.
35. *Philosophy II*.—(Two papers.) Logic and Metaphysics.
36. *Lower Pure Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Algebra, Trigonometry (including De Moivre's Theorem and its application), Geometry (including Analytical Geometry of two and three dimensions), Elementary Differential and Integral Calculus, and Differential equations in one independent variable.
37. *Lower Applied Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Statics of a particle and of a rigid body, Hydrostatics, Dynamics of a particle and of a rigid body, the theory of Potential.
38. *Higher Pure Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Geometry (including projective and differential Geometry), Algebra (including Matrices), Mathematical Analysis (including simple functions of a complex variable and contour integration), Differential Equations, Elementary Finite Differences.
39. *Higher Applied Mathematics*.—(Two papers.) Mechanics of solids and fluids (including equations of Euler and Lagrange) Electricity and Magnetism.
40. *Law of Persons and Property*.—The principles of Roman-Dutch Law, with special reference to their application in Ceylon.

41. *Law of Contracts and Torts*.—The English law of contracts and tort, including the elements of the law of quasi-contract with special reference to their application in Ceylon.
42. *Roman Law*.—Roman private law and its history studied in connexion with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial process. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.
43. *Constitutional Law*.—English constitutional law; the relations between the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Commonwealth of Nations; the constitutional law of Ceylon.
44. *International Law*.—The international law of peace, including international organization.
45. *Jurisprudence and Legal Theory*.—Theories as to the nature of law, including the theory of sovereignty. The sources of law and its development, with particular reference to English and Roman law. The character and classification of rights, and duties (legal and equitable). The analysis of the leading conceptions employed in law. The methods of Jurisprudence.
46. *Criminal Law*.—English criminal law and Criminal Law of Ceylon not including Criminal Procedure.
47. *Lower Physics*.—(Two papers.) The general properties of matter, heat and thermodynamics; acoustics, optics, electricity and magnetism.
48. *Higher Physics*.—(Two papers.) The general properties of matter and acoustics; heat, the modynamics, kinetic theory of matter; optics, including the electromagnetic theory of light, electricity, physics of the atom.
49. *Lower Chemistry*.—(Two papers.) General theoretical chemistry, including its historical development; inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry and physical chemistry.
50. *Higher Chemistry*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as *Lower Chemistry*, but at a higher standard.
51. *Lower Botany*.—(Two papers.) The general morphology and anatomy of plants; plant physiology and ecology, cytology and the principles of evolution; the phylogeny and taxonomy of plants.
52. *Higher Botany*.—(Two papers.) Botany in all its branches.
53. *Lower Zoology*.—(Two papers.) Zoology in all its branches.
54. *Higher Zoology*.—(Two papers.) The same syllabus as *Lower Zoology*, but at a higher standard.

TRADE DISPUTE—VALIKAMAM WEST OMNIBUS COMPANY,
LIMITED, JAFFNA.

THE North Ceylon Omnibus Workers Union presented a petition to me under section 6 of the Essential Services (Avoidance of Strikes and Lockouts) Order, 1942, with regard to a trade dispute that had arisen between the said Union and the Valikamam West Omnibus Company, Limited, Jaffna. The petition was referred to a Special Tribunal appointed by His Excellency the Governor under the Proviso to section 5 of the said Order for adjudication.

2. The following findings and award dated February 15, 1947, made by the Special Tribunal are published for general information in terms of section 8 (4) of the above-mentioned Order.

“The petitioner Union presented two petitions embodying various demands against the Respondent Company. The demands contained in these two petitions were dealt with by the Tribunal at one inquiry and the following are my findings and Award in respect of the various demands.

1. *Item 3 A.*—In regard to this demand the parties have arrived at an agreement that in respect of all claims either for overtime payment or arrears of salary during the period when they were out of employment and in respect of all other money claims which have been demanded on behalf of the workmen by the Union against the respondent Company (except the claim on account of arrears of salary due to Inspector Anthonipillai) a sum of Rs. 12,000 be paid by the Company.

It was also agreed between the parties that this sum be distributed by Dr. N. M. Perera amongst all employees who are members of the Union in such proportion as may be determined by him in consultation with the workmen. This amount should be remitted by the Respondent Company to the Commissioner of Labour in three equal monthly instalments commencing from February 1, 1947. The Commissioner of Labour is directed to hand over these amounts when received to Dr. N. M. Perera for distribution amongst the workmen. It is also agreed that Mr. K. S. Arumugam, the Managing Director of the respondent Company should be present when the monies are distributed by Dr. N. M. Perera to the workmen concerned.

As regards the claim of Inspector Anthonipillai on account of arrears of pay from September 25, 1946, till the date of his re-employment, it was agreed that the Company should pay him for this period half the salary payable to him, his salary being computed at the rate of Re. 1.65 per diem.

Item 3 B.—With regard to this matter, I award, in terms of the agreement between the parties that a workman who reports for duty and is ready to assume duty as driver, conductor or otherwise, at the appointed hour should be deemed to have commenced his work for the day from that time even although the vehicle has not commenced its trip at that precise moment but is delayed for some time due to other causes. A driver or a conductor should be reckoned to have worked during the full period from the time when he commenced work till his vehicle has, on the completion of its trip been brought back to the garage at which it is expected to be at the end of the day's work. Any period of work in excess of 8 working hours should be reckoned for the purpose of payment of overtime.

Weekly Holiday.—I award in terms of the agreement between the parties that all workmen should be given one day in each week as a holiday with pay. In a utility service rendered by a Bus Company it is not practicable to fix the same day in the week as a holiday to all workmen. I direct therefore that the Company should prepare a scheme whereby the weekly holiday can be given to sections of the workmen on certain specified days of the week. A roster should be drawn up with notice to the employees concerned and the names of the persons entitled to and the days during the week when they can take the holiday should be posted up in the notice-boards of the offices of the company on the Saturday previous to each week.

Item 3 B 2.—This relates to a demand that each workman should be provided with work for at least 22 days in a month. It has now been agreed by the employers that all employees in this Company should be regarded as monthly-paid employees. In view of this agreement the necessity for adjudication on this demand does not arise. It is understood however that if a workman absents himself from work without leave or lawful excuse the employer is entitled to deduct from his salary the proportionate amount of his salary for the days on which he has been so absent. I would accordingly make award on the terms set out above.

Religious Holidays.—The following days are by agreement fixed as days on which a holiday with pay should be given, viz., Thai Pongal, Hindu New Year, Adi Amavasa, Deepavali and Christmas Day. It is not practicable to give these holidays to all the workmen who are mostly Hindus without disorganising the bus service. It must therefore be understood that the workmen have no right to claim to be absent from duty on any one of these days. The company is directed to devise a scheme whereby these holidays can by arrangement be given to sections of the employees in rotation. Any workman who is called upon to work on any one of these prescribed holidays should be given a substitute holiday with pay within one month after that day. It is desirable that a scheme specifying the names of the workman who will be required to work on these holidays and the day on which they would be given the substitute holiday should be drawn up and posted in the notice-board at least one week before each such prescribed holiday.

3 C 2.—As agreed the Time-keepers should maintain a register in which should be entered the time of arrival and departure of each workman each day. This Register should be signed by each workman and should be kept both at Karamagar and at Jaffna.

3 C 3.—Each workman should work for 9 hours a day inclusive of the hour given for the midday meal.

Item 4 I.—With regard to this item, I award in terms of the agreement between the parties that the following workmen, viz., Vairavipillai, Sittampalam, Subramaniam, Nagalingam and Asaimuttu be paid at the rate of Rs. 33 per month for such months or periods of the month during which they were out of employment.

Overtime Payment.—It is agreed that for the purpose of calculating overtime payments in future the payments should be at 1½ times the payment for a normal working day.

Medical Leave.—In terms of the agreement between the parties, I award that a workman should on production of a certificate regarding his illness from a practitioner practising the Western system of Medicine be granted full-pay leave for a period of a fortnight. On production of a further medical certificate recommending leave on the ground of illness the workman will be entitled to further leave with full-pay for a further fortnight each time. Such leave with full-pay would not exceed 6 weeks in the aggregate each year unless the employer chooses to give full-pay for further periods.

Over-loadings of Buses.—One of the demands of the Union is that no workman should be suspended or refused employment for refusal to overload a bus. On behalf of the Company, an assurance has been given that no workman will be victimized for refusal to overload a bus. It does however appear to be the case that there is a great deal of overloading of these buses on certain days when the number of buses plying on these routes is insufficient to meet the demands of the travelling public. On days when there are Temple-Festivals and Market-Days it is desirable that the Company should make

arrangements to serve the public better by putting on the routes a greater number of buses. I would therefore recommend for the consideration of the Commissioner of Motor Transport the desirability of permitting an enlarged service on such days in order that the needs of the public may be adequately served.

Provident Fund.—The demand of the Union is that the employer should contribute 10 per cent. and the employee should contribute 5 per cent. of the monthly salary towards the formation of a Provident Fund for the benefit of the employees. Having examined the Balance-sheets of the Company from its inception, I am satisfied that it can without undue strain on its finances inaugurate this fund. My award therefore is that the Company should contribute each month $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the salary earned by each employee during the month. The employee should likewise contribute 5 per cent. of his salary. This amount can be deducted by the employer out of the salary payable to the employee each month. The fund should be managed by a Committee of Management consisting of representatives of the employers and employees. The number of representatives of the employees should in no case exceed the number of the representatives of the employer nominated or elected by the employer. The monies belonging to this Provident Fund should be lodged to the credit of a separate Banking Account which can be operated upon only by Trustees duly appointed by the representatives of the employer and employee respectively. The fund should be started from May 1, 1947.

Petition dated December 23, 1946, related to the discontinuance from service of 14 Inspectors employed by the Company. The Company by its resolution decided to discontinue its inspectorate as they were found to serve no useful purpose. The decision of the Company on a matter of policy

is a matter of its own discretion. However, I would make an award in terms of the agreement arrived at as follows:—

- The 14 inspectors should be continued in employment in the capacity of conductors or in some other capacity.
- in the event of the Company making a further decision to employ inspectors those 14 men or such number out of them as may be decided upon to be employed as inspectors should have the first preference to be so employed.
- These 14 men on re-employment should be paid their salary as monthly paid employees, their salary being computed at the rate of Rs. 3 per diem for the days during which they have worked as set out above for all employees.
- That they be paid compensation for the period when they were out of employment out of the sum of Rs. 12,000 which has been referred to earlier.

I would also record an agreement which has been arrived at that with regard to all questions relating to policy and the general control and directions to be issued to the various employees of the Company, the sole authority in these matters so far as they affect the workmen should be the Managing-Director of the Company (Mr. K. S. Arumugam). The Managing-Director is entitled to consult the other shareholders with regard to the policy or directions which have to be given to the workmen. But once directions are so given by him it is agreed that the other shareholders or office-holders in the Company should not countermand those instructions or give contrary instructions.

Enter Award accordingly.

Internal Purchase Scheme.

Harvesting of Paddy in the District Adigar's Division of Mannar and the Divisional Revenue Officer's Divisions of Mantai and Musali.

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence (Miscellaneous) Regulation 37, the Defence (Purchase of Foodstuffs) Regulations and the Defence (Paddy Cultivation) Regulations, 1943, I, Neil Quintus Dias, Assistant Government Agent, Mannar, do hereby direct that every person whether owner or cultivator of any land which is cultivated with paddy in the District Adigar's Division of Mannar and the Divisional Revenue Officers' Divisions of Mantai and Musali, in the Mannar District, and which is expected to be harvested between February 1, 1947 and May 30, 1947, shall inform in writing the District Adigar or the Divisional Revenue Officer of the area in which the paddy is situated of—

- (a) the dates on which it is proposed to reap and thresh the harvest on the land;
- (b) the name, situation and extent of the land;
- (c) the names and addresses of the person or persons entitled to take or receive any part of the produce of the land under any contract, agreement or otherwise; and
- (d) the details of the share or shares of the produce to which such person or persons may be entitled.

2. I further direct that—

- (a) a levy of 2 bushels per acre shall be imposed on all paddy fields. The levy shall be a first charge on the crop

and shall be delivered at the threshing floor to the officer authorised by me in writing, who shall issue a receipt on the prescribed form for the quantity of paddy received;

- (b) no cultivator, share-holder or any other person having interest in any paddy field situated within the Mannar District comprising the District Adigar's Division of Mannar and the Divisional Revenue Officers' Divisions of Mantai and Musali, shall remove any paddy harvested in Kalapokam 1947, from the threshing floor until the harvest has been checked and verified by the officer authorised by me in writing and until the levy has been delivered;
- (c) removal thereafter to the barn or other place of storage within any one of the above division shall only be on permits on the prescribed forms issued by an officer authorised by me in writing;
- (d) no person shall dispose of any paddy in any way except so much as is allowable at the following approved rates for consumption and other purposes:—

- (1) a customary allowance of 1 bushel per acre,
 (2) an allowance of 3 bushels per acre for seed purposes;

(3) a consumption allowance of 6 measures per head per week to cultivators and owner cultivators and the members of their household and 4 measures per head per week to non-cultivating owners and the members of their household for 12 months if the fields are cultivated only once a year, and for 7 months if the fields are cultivated for both seasons, subject to the proviso that the maximum quantity allowable to a producer during any cultivating season for consumption will be 50 bushels.

- (e) All the remaining paddy must be delivered to a Purchasing Agent authorised by me in writing. The Purchasing Agent shall accept only well dried and well winnowed paddy and payment shall be made by him at Rs. 6 per bushel.

- (f) coupons shall be detached from all ration book holders in respect of the paddy allowed for consumption under paragraph (d) (2) above on the following basis by the village headmen:—

one rice coupon for every 6 measures of paddy received by cultivators.

one rice coupon for every 4 measures of paddy received by non-cultivating owners.

- (g) any person who desires to remove the whole or part of the crop of any fields situated in any of the above three Divisions to a place outside that Division but not outside the Mannar District shall apply to the District Adigar or the Divisional Revenue Officer of the area in which he resides, on form D. F. C. 34 in duplicate within 4 weeks of the harvesting of his crop.

- (h) removal to a place outside the Mannar District shall only be on permits issued by me. Non-residents who desire to remove their shares to places outside the Mannar District, that is outside the District Adigar's Division of Mannar and the Divisional Revenue Officer's Divisions of Mantai and Musali, shall make their applications on form D. 4. Forms D. F. C. 34 is the usual form that has to be filled before permits to transport rice or paddy are given and the information is being requested in advance so that everything possible may be done to verify the information given in the form and to expedite the issue of the permits.
