BY-LAWS under section 49 of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), made by the Village Committee of the Udapattu village area of the Kuruwiti Korale in the Ratnapura District, and approved by the Minister of Health and Local Government by virtue of the powers vested in him by sub-section (3) of that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No 9,773 of September 24, 1947

By-laws

Offensive and dangerous trades

1 (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades.—

- (a) Manufacturing compost or artificial manure,
- (b) Manufacturing vinegar;
- (c) Manufacturing soap;
- (d) Boiling blood or offal;
- (e) Curing arecanuts;
- (f) Seasoning planks and other timber,
- (g) Curing or manufacturing rubber;
- (h) icing fish,
- (i) Keeping a tannery,
- (j) Keeping a kraal for soaking coconut husks,
- (k) Smoking or manufacturing sheet or crepe rubber,
- (l) Storing hides,
- (m) Storing bones;
- (n) Storing artificial manure or materials used for the preparation of artificial manure in quantity over three bags,
- (o) Storing maldive fish, salt fish or dry fish in any quantity over three hundred weights;
- (p) Storing perishable articles of food and provisions for the purpose of trade by wholesale

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades:—

- (a) Any trade in which machinery driven by oil or other fuel, steam or electricity is used;
- (b) Burning or storing lime,
- (c) Curing or storing plumbago,
- (d) Digging for coral stones by opening a pit,
- (e) Extracting oil by apparatus;
- (f) Manufacturing coconut oil by machinery;
- (g) Manufacturing copra,
- (h) Manufacturing aerated waters,
- (i) Manufacturing desiccated coconut,
- (j) Manufacturing or storing fibre;
- (k) Manufacturing matches;
- (l) Quarrying for cabook, gravel or metal,
- (m) Storing copra;
- (n) Storing straw;
- (o) Storing cotton wool

(3) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive and dangerous trades:—

- (a) Burning bricks and tiles,
- (b) Dyeing fibre.

2 (1) No person shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence shall, unless it is cancelled under by-law 15, expire on the thirty-first day of December in the year in respect of which it is issued

(3) No licence shall be transferable

3 No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless—

- (1) the place at which that trade is to be carried on is approved by the Medical Officer of Health, and
- (2) any building to be used for the purposes of that trade is in conformity with the following requirements:—
 - (a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted, and provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;

- (b) the roof of the building must be made of some permanent material and the floor must be cemented,
- (c) the eaves of the building must be not less than six feet from the ground,
- (d) every room in the building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space,
- (e) the walls of every room in the building must be not less than seven feet in height and must be built of brick, stone or cabook;
- (f) the internal surface of such walls, to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered with cement and the rest of the walls must be limeplastered and limewashed, and
- (g) the woodwork of the building must be oil-painted or limewashed

4. (1) If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued in respect of any offensive or dangerous trade any building used for the purposes of that trade ceases to conform to the provisions of by-law 3, the Chairman may, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do, before a day specified in the notice, all things necessary to make such building conform to such provisions

(2) No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade on whom a notice is served under paragraph (1) shall fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein

5 Any notice under by-law 4 shall be deemed to have been served on the holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade if it is affixed to the premises at which he carries on that trade or if it is left with any person employed by him in such premises

6 No person shall be entitled to a licence to quarry metal, unless he has caused to be erected separate latrines for male and female workers at the metal quarry

7. (1) The holder of a licence to quarry metal shall—

- (a) keep his licensed premises in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) maintain order within his licensed premises; and
- (c) not permit gambling or disorderly conduct in his licensed premises

(2) The Chairman may, during the continuance of an epidemic, suspend any licence to quarry metal if the suspension is necessary in the interests of public health

8 The holder of a licence to burn bricks or tiles shall—

- (a) fence the premises where clay pits are being dug,
- (b) not obstruct any village road or path while loading or unloading bricks, tiles or firewood, and
- (c) keep at least one watcher on duty while bricks or tiles are being burnt

9 The holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purposes of such trade to which his licence relates to be swept and cleaned daily,
- (b) the walls of every such building to be limewashed at least once in every twelve months;
- (c) all apparatus, implements, and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean, and
- (d) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on

10 No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall contaminate any well or tank or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water.

11 No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall carry on such trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of, persons in the neighbourhood

12 Every holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause any offensive vapours

or gases which are emitted in the course of carrying on such trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such a manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effect, or
- (b) to be passed directly through a filter or into a condensing apparatus

13 It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Assistant or any officer of the Committee authorised in writing by the Chairman at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any premises at which any offensive or dangerous trade is being carried on, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall permit the inspection to be made.

14 The holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the premises in which such trade is carried on, the licence obtained under by-law 2, or where such licence cannot be affixed cause a board to be affixed, with the licence number and the name of the holder of the licence clearly painted, in a conspicuous place on such premises.

15 It shall be lawful for the Rural Court in addition to any other punishment that it may impose to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of a breach of any of the by-laws relating to offensive or dangerous trades, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Land and Property

16 No person shall destroy, damage or interfere with the use of any ambalam, madam, open space or place for public recreation.

17 No person shall destroy, damage or encroach upon, any waste or public land vested in, or under the control of, the Committee.

18 Where any common pasture lands have been set apart by the Committee for the use of any specified village, no person who is not resident in any such village shall tether any cattle, or permit any cattle to stray, upon such pasture lands without the written permission of the Chairman.

19 No person shall damage any fence or obstruct any gateway, or befoul or poison any pond, situated on any land set apart as a communal pasture.

Disorderly Conduct, &c

20 No person shall loiter or lurk in any village path or road or in any thoroughfare or public place after nine o'clock at night, without a light and without lawful cause. The mere possession of an electric torch or other lighting device, without the light being actually put on, shall not be deemed to be sufficient for the purpose of this by-law.

21 No person shall be found drunk and incapable of taking care of himself, or behaving in a disorderly manner, in any village path, or road, or in any thoroughfare, or public place.

22 No person shall cause any annoyance to any other person by publishing any obscene writing or by making any obscene drawing or by singing or reciting any obscene song or ballad, or do any other act which is likely to outrage public decency.

23 No person shall throw stones or filth at the house or into the compound of any other person.

24 No person shall preach or address any assembly or crowd or hold any meeting on any village road or path within the village area, except in pursuance of a permit from the Chairman, and within the times and limits specified in such permit.

Officers, &c

25 The Chairman may authorise in writing any officer or other person, to collect all taxes or fees due to the Committee and to issue printed receipts bearing the facsimile of his signature and the seal of the Committee.

26 No person shall wilfully obstruct—

- (a) the Chairman or any other officer of the Committee in the exercise, performance or discharge of any power, duty or function, conferred, imposed or assigned to such Chairman or officer

by or under any of the provisions of the Village Communities Ordinance, or of any by-laws made thereunder, or

- (b) any servant or labourer employed by or on behalf of the Committee in the performance of any duty lawfully imposed upon him by the Chairman or any other officer of the Committee.

Regulation of traffic, &c.

27 No person shall pull, or push along, or drive any kind or class of vehicle on any path or road within the village area at night without a lighted lantern attached on each side to the front of the vehicle.

28 No person shall lead or drive any animal along any path or road within the village area without a light between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

29 When any solo pedal cycle is being ridden or wheeled along by any person on any road or path—

- (1) he shall not carry any other person on such cycle, and
- (2) no other person shall cause or permit himself to be carried on such cycle.

30 The by-laws published in *Gazette* No 8,291 of May 21, 1937, and therein called "Rules" are hereby amended as follows—

- (1) by the numbering of those by-laws as by-laws 1 and 2,
- (2) in by-law 2 (b) thereof, by the substitution, for the words "house-holders and Division Officers' Rolls," of the words "trade premises and vehicle tax schedules"; and
- (3) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 2 thereof, of the following new by-law—

"3 Every tax collector of the Village Committee shall be entitled to receive such commission or fee as the Committee may determine, not exceeding ten per centum, of the amount collected by him."

31 The by-laws relating to the tax on vehicles and animals made by certain Village Committees in the Ratnapura District, published in *Gazette* No 8,687 of November 29, 1940, are hereby amended, in so far as they relate to this village area, as follows—

- (1) in by-law 5 thereof, by the substitution, for all the words from "at the office" to "in each year", of the words "on or before the thirty-first day of March in each year, at the office of the Committee or to any person employed by the Committee to collect the tax," and
- (2) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 7 thereof, of the following new by-law—

"7A It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any officer authorised by him in writing, to stop and detain any vehicle proceeding on any road or path for the purpose of inspecting the metal plate referred to in by-law 6, and the driver or person in charge of any such vehicle shall stop the vehicle and permit the Chairman or such officer to make such inspection and shall render him all such assistance as may be necessary."

32 The by-laws published in *Gazette* No 9,868 of May 21, 1948, are hereby amended—

- (1) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 40 thereof, of the following new by-law—

"40A. No person shall wilfully contravene the directions set out in any notice, or remove any notice board, fence, post or barrier or other thing put up by the authority of the Chairman in the execution of any work commenced under these by-laws"; and

- (2) by the rescission of by-laws 7 and 8.

33 In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee;

"Committee" means the Village Committee of the Udapattu village area of the Kiruwiti Korale,

"licence" means a licence issued under these by-laws; and

"licensee" means a person to whom a licence is issued.

By-laws

Sanitation and Nuisances

1. No person shall sink any well or cause any well to be sunk for the supply of water for domestic purposes within fifty feet from any cess-pit, cess-pool, pig-sty, gala, cattle-shed, defective drain, or latrine, or any refuse heap or manure heap which is not removed at intervals of not more than two weeks, or of any land under cultivation which is regularly manured every season.

2. No person shall, within a distance of fifty feet from any well used for the supply of water for domestic purposes—

- (a) construct or cause or permit the construction of a cess-pit, cess-pool, latrine, pig-sty, gala, or cattle shed; or
- (b) allow any cess-pit, cess-pool, latrine, pig-sty, gala, or cattle shed to remain, or
- (c) deposit, or cause or permit the deposit of, any manure or decaying animal or vegetable matter; or
- (d) manure any land; or
- (e) allow any drain to be in a defective condition

3. Whenever any tree or any branch or other part of a tree overhangs any well, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause a notice in writing under his hand to be served on the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands, requiring such owner or occupier to tie up, cut down, or remove such tree, or such branch or part of the tree, and such owner or occupier shall comply with the requirements of such notice within fourteen days from the date of service thereof.

4. The Committee may, whenever such a course is deemed to be necessary, cause notice in writing under the hand of the Chairman to be served on the owner or occupier of any land in which there is a well supplying water for domestic purposes, requiring such owner or occupier to bale out the water and clean the well and to execute such repairs as the Committee, may, in the interest of health, consider necessary, and such owner or occupier shall comply with the requirements of such notice within fourteen days from the date of service thereof.

5. The owner or occupier of every land in which there is any abandoned well, quarry, or pit shall cause such well, quarry, or pit to be filled up within two days from the date on which the Chairman gives notice in that behalf either by beat of tom-tom or in any other suitable manner

6. No person shall cause any annoyance, danger, or injury to any other person, or cause damage to the property of any other person by committing any of the following acts.—

- (1) Halting any vehicle on any village road or path longer than is reasonably necessary for the purpose of taking up or setting down passengers or goods.
- (2) Allowing children of tender years to play or stray in any village road or path or public place
- (3) Overtaking or passing a vehicle on the wrong side in any public place or village road or path.
- (4) Easing himself on his own land in such a way as to offend other peoples' feelings of decency, or easing himself on another's land or on any village road or path, or in a public place other than that specially provided for such a purpose.

- (5) Throwing rubbish, offensive matter, or unserviceable articles or any other things, on land belonging to any other person
- (6) Allowing dirty or unwholesome water to run into, or along, the land of any other person, or any public place or village road or path
- (7) Allowing offensive smells to arise in his own compound so as to pollute the surrounding air
- (8) Omitting to drain or fill up any pit, hollow, trench, ditch, or low place, where water may collect and stagnate, within twenty yards of any building used for human habitation, in such a manner as to constitute a danger to public health.
- (9) Altering the existing conditions of the general drainage of any land by any building or planting operations, or by raising or lowering the level of such land, or by diverting or blocking any drain or channel or waterway without first obtaining the sanction of the Committee. In this paragraph "general drainage" means the flow of water over the surface of land in the ordinary cause of gravitation and not necessarily in any defined channel or drain
- (10) Allowing cactus or prickly-pear to grow on his land
- (11) Placing or burying any charmed metal plate, leaf, or paper or a charm of any other form, on the land of any other person, and causing fear or annoyance thereby to any person.

7. No person shall, for sale or for any purpose other than that of immediate use, keep or deposit, or cause the keeping or depositing of, any guano, bone-dust or any substance whatsoever from which noxious or offensive smells may arise, in any place within the village area

8. In the case of death of any person, the occupier of the premises where the death took place or, in his absence, the nearest adult male relative of the deceased shall be responsible for the proper burial of the body. In the absence or default of such occupier or nearest relative, the Chairman may cause the body to be buried at the expense of the Committee

9 (1) No person shall deposit the body of any dead animal on any land or premises occupied by any other person

(2) The Chairman shall cause the bodies of the dead animals of which the owners are absent or cannot be ascertained to be buried in a suitable place at the expense of the Committee

10. The owner or occupier of every house within the village area shall cause his house to be whitewashed within and without, at least once yearly before the fifteenth day of April. Provided that it shall, at any time, be lawful for the Committee, if on account of the prevalence of any epidemic, disease, or for any other similar reason it appears to be necessary, to order the owner or occupier of any house within the village area to cause such house to be whitewashed, notwithstanding that such house may already have been whitewashed.

11. Every person splitting coconuts, or causing coconuts to be split, for other than domestic purposes, shall collect and throw away or otherwise dispose of, the milk thereof, or cause such milk to be collected and thrown away, or otherwise disposed of, at a distance of at least one hundred yards from any village road or path or public place, or any dwelling house

12. (1) If any building, or wall, or anything affixed thereon, is in such condition as to be dangerous to the neighbouring buildings or the occupiers thereof, or to passers-by, the Chairman shall cause a notice in writing to be served upon the owner or occupier of land on which such building or wall stands, requiring him—

- (a) in any case of urgency, within twenty-four hours after the service of the notice, to put up a proper hoarding or fence for the protection of the passers-by, and
- (b) in all cases, within three days after the service of the notice, to secure or repair such building or wall, or thing affixed thereon

(2) Every owner or occupier on whom a notice is served under this by-law shall comply with the requirement of such notice within the time specified therein

(3) Where any owner or occupier fails or neglects to comply with the requirements of a notice served on him under this by-law, the Committee may authorise any specified person or persons to do the work which ought to have been done by such owner or occupier and the expenses thereby incurred shall be recovered from such owner or occupier as a debt due to the Committee.

13 (1) Whenever any house or hut appears to be in an insanitary condition, or in such disrepair as to be prejudicial to the health of the inmates or of the neighbours, the Chairman may cause a notice in writing to be served upon the owner or occupier of that house or hut requiring him within a time specified in such notice to do such work as may be necessary to put that house or hut into a sanitary state.

(2) Every owner or occupier on whom a notice is served under this by-law shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein.

(3) Where any owner or occupier fails or neglect to comply with the requirements of a notice served on him under this by-law, the Chairman may cause the work mentioned in the notice to be done, and the expenses thereby incurred shall be recovered from such owner or occupier as a debt due to the Committee.

Markets and Fairs

14 The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any village market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market.

15 Within the market area of a village market, no person shall, on any day on which that market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale any vegetables, fruits, fish, meat or other perishable articles of food at any place other than that market.

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to—

- (a) the sale of vegetables or fruits by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or who do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places; or
- (b) the sale, by the licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique, of ripe plantains or other fruits for consumption on the premises; or
- (c) the sale of young coconuts by any person.

16 Every village market shall be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on such days of the week as may be determined by the Committee and notified to the public by notice in English, Sinhalese and Tamil displayed at that market by the Chairman.

17 Where the Committee has set apart any portion of a village market for the sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—

- (a) sell or expose for sale such article or class of articles in any place in such market other than the portion so set apart; or
- (b) sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in the portion so set apart.

18 A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use of any stall, seat or space in any village market—

	<i>For a day Cents</i>
For a stall not exceeding 12 square feet in area	15
For a space not exceeding 12 square feet on the floor	15
For a space not exceeding 12 square feet on the market compound	10
For a square yard of floor space in the fish market	20

19. No person shall use any stall, seat or space in a village market unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such licence. Every such licence shall expire on the date specified thereon.

20 The fees payable under by-law 18 shall be paid to the Chairman or to such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman, and no licence under by-law 19 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fee due from him.

21 The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each village market a notice setting out, in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, the fees payable for the use of that market, and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.

22 No person shall sell or expose for sale in any village market or fair—

- (a) The carcase or meat of any animal which has been slaughtered at any place other than a village slaughter-house or a licensed slaughter-house, and
- (b) Any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat, game or fish.

23 No person who is suffering or who has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use any stall, seat or space in any village market, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

24 No person using any village market shall—

- (1) behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market, or
- (2) carry on cooking in any part of such market, or
- (3) remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 6 p.m. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, or
- (4) damage or in any way deface, any portion of any building, stalls, lamps or any other property of the Committee in or about such market, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market; or
- (5) enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of such market or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind; or
- (6) leave any goods in or about the premises of such market between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. without the special permission of the Chairman; or
- (7) place any fruits, vegetables, meat, flesh, fish or other article of food exposed thereat for sale, on any unclean or insanitary surface; or
- (8) expose for sale any article of cooked food otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

25. Every person using any stall in a village market shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a close fitting lid or cover, and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

26 No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any village market.

27. No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any village market, or any other person appointed by the Committee to superintend any village market or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein, in the lawful execution of his duty.

28. The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or alongside the premises of any village market for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into or unloading goods from that vehicle.

29 The Chairman shall give notice, by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the temporary closing of any village market or fair.

30. (1) No private market or fair shall be established or held within the market area of any village market.

(2) No private market or fair shall be established or held except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(3) Every licence issued under paragraph (2) shall—

- (a) be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto;
- (b) be subject to the conditions specified therein; and
- (c) expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(4) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (2) shall be twenty-four rupees.

31. No person shall be entitled to a licence to establish or hold a private market or fair unless the site is approved by the Medical Officer of Health.

32. A licence issued under by-law 30 may be cancelled by a Rural Court on a second or subsequent conviction of the licensee for a breach of any of these by-laws relating to markets and fairs or of the conditions of the licence, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

33. The Chairman may refuse to issue a licence under by-law 30 to any person whose previous licence has been cancelled by a Rural Court.

34. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Assistant, or any person authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any market or fair or any article of food exposed or kept for sale therein, and no person shall obstruct or resist him in the exercise of his powers under this by-law.

35. Whenever the Committee is satisfied, after consultation with the Medical Officer of Health, that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Committee, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit, for such time as it may appear necessary to the Committee, the introduction and sale of such article of food in any market or fair.

36. In these by-laws—

- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee,
 “Committee” means the Village Committee of the Gangabada Pattu village area;
 “Medical Officer of Health” includes a Field Medical Officer; and
 “village area” means the Gangabada Pattu village area.

- The licensee shall take all steps necessary to ensure that fruits, vegetables, meat, fish or other articles of food are not placed on an unclean or insanitary surface in the market*/fair.
- The licensee shall not expose for sale any articles of cooked food otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.
- The licensee shall not allow any person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to use any stall, seat or place in the market*/fair or to expose for sale thereat any articles whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- The licensee shall keep the premises of the market*/fair clean and free from filth and rubbish and shall cause all sweepings and refuse from the premises to be burned, buried or otherwise disposed of in such manner as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.
- The licensee shall maintain order within the premises of the market*/fair.
- The licensee shall provide a separate portion of land in or near the premises of the market*/fair for the parking of vehicles.
- The licensee shall provide a sufficient number of fly-proof receptacles with closely fitting lids for the deposit of rubbish and refuse.

10. The licensee shall provide on the premises of the market*/fair a sufficient number of latrines of a type approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

11. This licence may be suspended by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, during any epidemic, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the suspension.

By-laws

- (1) The resthouse is intended primarily for the use of travellers.
- (2) No person shall occupy any portion of the resthouse for more than three consecutive days without the special authority in writing of the Chairman of the Urban Council.
- A consolidated fee at the rate set out in the Schedule hereto shall be paid by every person who uses or occupies the resthouse or garage or parks a vehicle within the premises of the resthouse. Provided that—
 - children under 12 years of age shall be charged only half the aforesaid rates, and
 - no fee shall be charged in respect of the following—
 - an infant in arms;
 - a servant who is in attendance on a visitor at the resthouse and sleeps within the resthouse; or
 - the chauffeur of any car garaged in the resthouse premises, if he sleeps in the car or in the garage.
- (1) Every person using any part of the resthouse as an office or place of business shall pay, in addition to the occupation fee prescribed by by-law 2, a special fee of fifty cents for each period not exceeding one hour.
- (2) Every person so using the resthouse shall desist from doing so upon being requested by the resthouse-keeper whose duty it is to consult the comfort and convenience of the occupants of the resthouse.
- (1) Every visitor shall, on admission to the resthouse, legibly write his correct name and address in the resthouse visitors' book.
- (2) No visitor shall be entitled to use the resthouse or to be supplied with refreshments until he has complied with the requirements of paragraph (1).
- No charges other than those payable to the Urban Council shall be entered in the resthouse book by a visitor.
- The resthouse fees and charges shall be paid in cash on demand. In default of such payment the resthouse-keeper shall be entitled to refuse further supplies. The attention of visitors is invited to the Hotel Keepers' Protection Ordinance (Chapter 30), a copy of which shall be exhibited, together with these rules, in some conspicuous place in the resthouse.
- (1) No room shall be reserved unless it is engaged at least one day in advance.
- (2) When a room is so reserved, it shall be paid for even if the person engaging it does not occupy it.
- (3) Until the arrival of the person or persons for whom a room is reserved, the room shall be at the disposal of any other person requiring it.
- The resthouse-keeper shall not be bound to comply with any telegram requesting meals to be prepared unless the name and address of the sender are set out in the telegram.

9 No bed, sofa, or couch in the resthouse shall be used by any visitor for the purpose of sleeping unless a sheet is spread thereon. A breach of this by-law shall be punishable with a fine of five rupees.

10 The value of all articles damaged or broken by any visitor or his servant shall be paid by that visitor in accordance with the scale of charges appearing on the resthouse notice board.

11 Visitors shall be entitled to call upon the resthouse-keeper to attend on them personally. The resthouse-keeper is a paid servant of the Council and is expected to wear a white coat and to be neatly dressed when attending on visitors.

12 (1) Any complaint which a visitor may have to make about the resthouse or the resthouse-keeper shall be noted in the complaint book.

(2) It shall be the duty of the resthouse keeper to produce the complaint book when called upon to do so.

13 No visitor shall bring any dog into the resthouse.

14 (1) No public lunch, dinner, garden party or other reception shall be held in the resthouse except with the written permission of the Chairman of the Urban Council.

(2) Where the Chairman allows the use of the whole or a part of the resthouse for any of the purposes specified in the preceding paragraph there shall be paid to the Council—

(a) where the number of persons attending does not exceed twenty-four, a fee of ten rupees in lieu of occupation charges, for the first six hours and of one rupee for every hour or part of an hour in excess of six hours.

(b) where the number of persons attending exceeds twenty-four, a fee of ten rupees plus occupation charges at the rate specified in the Schedule hereto, for each additional person above twenty-four.

15 Persons in actual occupation of the resthouse shall have a prior claim to the use of any garage or stable attached to the resthouse, over persons not in actual occupation of the resthouse.

16 The owner or hirer of a vehicle garaged in the resthouse or parked anywhere within the premises, shall, notwithstanding that he himself has not occupied the resthouse, pay the personal occupation fees for the period during which the vehicle is garaged or parked in addition to the fee for parking the vehicle or for the use of the garage.

17 It shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Urban Council to prohibit the use of the resthouse by any visitor who abuses these by-laws.

18 A breach of any of the above by-laws other than by-law 9 shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

By-laws

1 These by-laws may be cited as the Kandy Traffic (Formation of Queues) By-laws, 1948.

2 Where at any stopping place on any omnibus route on any street provision is made, by means of a barrier rail, or of two parallel rails, or of markings on the street, for the formation of a queue of persons waiting to enter any omnibus, such persons shall form and keep a queue which shall—

- commence at that end of the rail, rails or markings which is nearer to the stopping place,
- face the stopping place, and
- continue alongside the rail, or between the rails, or in conformity with the markings, as the case may be.

3 Where no barrier rail or marking is provided, any six or more persons so waiting as aforesaid shall form and keep a queue on the footway or, where there is no footway, on a side of the highway.

4 No person shall take or attempt to take any position in a queue formed as aforesaid otherwise than behind the persons already standing in the queue.

5 No person who is a member of a queue formed as aforesaid shall enter or attempt to enter an omnibus before any other person who was standing in front of him in the queue and is endeavouring to enter the omnibus.

6 Where a queue has been formed at any stopping place as aforesaid, no person who has not taken up any position in the queue shall enter or attempt to enter any omnibus, when it is at or is approaching and about to stop at the stopping place, before any other person who was standing in the queue and is endeavouring to enter the omnibus.

7 Every passenger in any omnibus shall, if so requested by the driver or conductor, forthwith leave the omnibus when it reaches the terminus to which the omnibus is proceeding.

8 In these by-laws "stopping place" includes a public stand and a terminus of a route.
