THE HOUSING AND TOWN IMPROVEMENT ORDINANCE

THE following resolution passed by the Senate at a meeting held on January 23, 1948, and by the House of Representatives at a meeting held on January 9, 1948, is published for general information —

This House resolves under the provisions of section 3 (b) of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199), as modified by Proclamation under section 88 (1) of the Ceylon (Constitution) Order in Council, 1946, published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947, that from the 1st day of February 1948, the aforesaid Ordinance shall be in force within the area defined in the Schedule hereto.

Schedule

All that area of land representing the former Sanitary Board Limits of Kosgama situated in Kosgama Pahala village in Udugaha Pattuwa of Hewagam Korale in the Colombo District, Western Province, and bounded as follows —

North By a line drawn from the north-western corner of Aluthwatta claimed by M. D. Gimasingho and others southwards and north-eastwards along the southern and eastern boundaries of the said land to the eastern boundary of the path on eastern boundary of Paththayangodollewatta, claimed by M. Aron and others, thence northwards along the eastern boundary of the said path to the southern boundary of Kanaththagewatta claimed by M. D. Gimasingho and others, eastwards and northwards along the southern and eastern boundaries of the said land to the southern boundary of Hapugahawela claimed by H. M. D. Kaithanappu and others, eastwards and northwards along the southern and eastern boundaries of the said land to the left bank of Kosgama Oya, thence by a line drawn eastwards along the said bank crossing the Kosgama-Pugoda Road to a point on the said bank 2 chains east of the western boundary of the said road where it crosses the said Oya.

East By a line drawn from the last-mentioned point southwards parallel to and at a distance of 2 chains east from the western boundary of the Kosgama-Pugoda Road through Walekumbura claimed by D. S. Wijesundara and others to the north-eastern corner of the house belonging to N. P. Senanayake, thence by a line drawn westwards and southwards along its northern and western walls of the said house to its south-western corner, thence by a line drawn to the centre of the northern end of culvert No. 24/1 on the Colombo-Avissawella Public Works Department Road, thence across the said road to the southern end of the culvert, thence south-eastwards along the ditch to the centre of the northern end of Railway culvert, thence by a line drawn southwards through the said culvert to its southern end, thence along the ditch to the north-western corner of Eriyagahadeniyawatta claimed by D. H. Wijesundara, thence by a line drawn southwards along the ditch running through the said land and Godaporagahawatta claimed by M. J. Perera and along the western boundary of Delgahawatta claimed by G. K. Martin Perera and others to the northern boundary of Bomriyagewatta claimed by M. D. Ermsingho and others, thence southwards through the said land to the north-western corner of Pusseldagare (T. P. 66,433) claimed by D. L. Wijesundara

and others, thence by a line drawn southwards along the western boundary of the said land to a distance of 560 links, southwards through T. P. 66,433 along a line 240 links in length, south-westwards by a straight line 670 links in length of magnetic bearing 217° through the said Title Plan, and again south-westwards through the said Title Plan by a straight line 714 links in length of magnetic bearing 228½°.

South By a line drawn from the last-mentioned point westwards in a straight line of bearing 270° through Pusseldagare (T. P. 66,433) claimed by D. L. Wijesundara and others to the centre of the culvert across Gansabhawa road to Kadugoda, thence westwards along the Ela, which runs along the northern boundary of Nagayawatta claimed by M. Arnolis and others, through Kelagahawatta claimed by W. Johans and others to the north-eastern corner of Ibulgahawatta claimed by W. D. Selvestri, thence westwards along the northern boundary of the said land to the eastern boundary of Baduwatthehenedeniya claimed by W. W. Grigoris and others.

West By a line drawn from the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern boundary of Baduwatthehenedeniya claimed by W. W. Grigoris and others, north-eastwards and north-westwards along the ridge through Andekumbura claimed by W. W. Grigoris and others, northwards along the banks on the eastern boundaries of Palabotewatta claimed by Alexander and others and Public Works Department lines and Premises claimed by Crown to the Colombo-Avissawella Public Works Department Road, thence across the said road, and along a straight line to the starting point of the northern limit of the area.

By-laws

Offensive and Dangerous Trades

1 (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades:—

- (a) Storing cured or dry fish.
- (b) Manufacturing vinegar.
- (c) Manufacturing soap.
- (d) Storing bones.
- (e) Keeping a kraal for soaking coconut husks.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades:—

- (a) Manufacturing aerated waters.
- (b) Manufacturing copra.

- (c) Any trade in which machinery driven by oil or other fuel or steam or electricity is used.
- (d) Storing copra.
- (e) Manufacturing desiccated coconuts.
- (f) Digging for coral stones by opening a pit.
- (g) Burning or storing lime.
- (h) Manufacturing or storing fibre.
- (3) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive and dangerous trades—

- (a) Dyeing fibre
- (b) Burning bricks or tiles

2. (1) No person shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall, unless it is cancelled under by-law 10, expire on the 31st day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) No licence issued under this by-law shall be transferable.

3. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless—

- (i) the place at which the trade is to be carried on is approved by the Medical Officer of Health, and
- (ii) any building to be used for the purposes of that trade is in conformity with the following requirements—

- (a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted, and provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;
- (b) the roof of the building must be made of some permanent material and the floor must be cemented;
- (c) the eaves of the building must be not less than six feet from the ground;
- (d) every room in the building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;
- (e) the walls of every room in the building must be not less than seven feet in height and must be built of brick, stone or cabook;
- (f) the internal surface of such walls, to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered with cement and the rest of the walls must be lime plastered and limewashed, and
- (g) the wood work of the building must be oil painted or limewashed.

4. (1) If at any time during the period for which a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade has been issued, any building used for the purposes of that trade ceases to be in conformity with the provisions of by-law 3, the Chairman may, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do before a day to be specified in the notice, all things necessary to make such building be in conformity with such provisions.

(2) No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade on whom a notice is served under paragraph (1) of this by-law shall fail to comply with such notice within the time specified therein.

5. A notice under by-law 4 shall be deemed to have been served on the holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade if it is affixed to the premises at which he carries on that trade or if it is left with any person employed by him in such premises.

6. The holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purposes of the trade to which his licence relates to be swept and cleaned daily;
- (b) the walls of every such building to be limewashed at least once in every twelve months;
- (c) all apparatus, implements, and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean; and
- (d) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on.

7. No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall—

- (a) contaminate any well or tank or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water, or
- (b) carry on such trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of, persons in the neighbourhood.

8. The holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause any offensive vapours or gases which are emitted in the course of carrying on such trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such a manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effect, or
- (b) to be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus.

9. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or the Medical Officer of Health, or the Sanitary Assistant, or any Officer of the Committee authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any premises at which any offensive or dangerous trade is being carried on, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall permit the inspection to be made.

10. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of these by-laws relating to offensive or dangerous trades, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Interpretation

11. In these by-laws—

- “Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee,
- “Committee” means the Village Committee of the Othara Palata village area,
- “village area” means the Othara Palata village area.

By-law

The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 9,890 of July 30, 1948, are hereby amended by the substitution, for by-law 1 thereof, of the following new by-law:—

1. (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades.—

- (a) Storing cured or dry fish
- (b) Storing perishable articles of food and provisions for the purpose of sale by wholesale.
- (c) Manufacturing compost or artificial manure.
- (d) Manufacturing vinegar
- (e) Manufacturing soap.
- (f) Keeping a tannery.
- (g) Curing arecanuts
- (h) Storing hides
- (i) Storing bones
- (j) Lying fish.
- (k) Seasoning planks and other timber.
- (l) Keeping a kraal for soaking coconut husks
- (m) Storing artificial manure or materials used for the preparation of artificial manure in quantity over three bags.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades.—

- (a) Manufacturing aerated waters
- (b) Manufacturing copra
- (c) Any trade in which machinery driven by oil or other fuel or steam or electricity is used
- (d) Extracting oil by apparatus
- (e) Storing copra.
- (f) Storing straw.
- (g) Manufacturing desiccated coconut.
- (h) Manufacturing coconut oil by machinery.
- (i) Burning or storing lime.
- (j) Manufacturing or storing fibre.

3. The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive and dangerous trades.—

- (a) Dyeing fibre.
- (b) Burning bricks and tiles.”

Order

The Negombo Municipal Council shall consist of twelve Councillors, and accordingly the Municipality for which the aforesaid Municipal Council is to be constituted under the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 29 of 1947, is hereby divided into the twelve wards defined in the Schedule hereto.

Schedule

Wards of the Municipality of Negombo

Ward No 1 (Munnakkare)

North From a point on the western limit of the Municipal Council area due west of the south-western corner of lot 7 in Negombo Town Survey Sheet I 21/61 1 West, eastwards across the lake and north-eastwards along the shore of the lake to a point south-westwards of the centre of the junction of the Circular Road and Custom House Road, thence north-eastwards to the centre of the said junction and along the centre line of the Circular Road to the centre of its junction with Main Street, thence eastwards along the centre line of Main Street to the centre of its junction with Mudaliyar's Road, thence south-eastwards along the centre line of Mudaliyar's Road upto the centre of its junction with 3rd Cross Street, thence southwards along the centre line of 3rd Cross Street to the shore of the lake, thence eastwards along the shore of the lake upto the centre of the bridge over the canal.

East From the last mentioned point south-eastwards along the shore of the lake to the southern limit of Municipal Council area.

South From the last mentioned point westwards along the Southern limit of the Municipal Council area to its western extremity.

West From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Municipal Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Note—The islands other than Munnakkare and Mankuliya falling within the area described above are excluded.

Ward No. 2 (Kotakampu)

North From the extreme north-eastern point of Duwa Village north-eastwards along the western limit of the Municipal Council area to a point in prolongation north-westwards of the southern boundary of lot 215 in Town Survey Sheet I. 21/53 3 East, thence south-eastwards along the said prolongation and southern boundary of the said lot to the centre of the Mosque lane, thence south-eastwards along the centre line of the said lane to the centre of its junction with Alles Road.

East From the last-mentioned point, south-westwards along the centre line of the Alles Road to the centre of its junction with Vistarini Avenue, thence south-eastwards along the centre line of the said Avenue to the centre of its junction with Main Street, thence eastwards along the centre line of the said street to the centre of the bridge over the canal, thence southwards along the centre line of the said canal to the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Ward No. 1.

South From the last-mentioned point westwards along the northern limit of the Ward No. 1 to its western extremity.

West From the last-mentioned point north-eastwards along the western limits of the Municipal Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 3 (Sea Street South)

North From the centre of the junction of Sea Street with St Sebastian's Road eastwards along the centre line of the said road upto the centre of its junction with Chilaw Road.

East From the last mentioned point southwards along the centre line of Chilaw Road to the centre of the junction with Main Street.

South From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre line of Main Street to the centre of the bridge over the canal, thence along the eastern limit of Ward No. 2 to the centre of the junction of Vistarini Avenue with Alles Road.

West From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Ward No 2 to the starting point of the eastern limit of the said Ward, thence northwards and eastwards along the centre line of Alles Road, Suriya Road and Sea Street to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 4 (Sea Street)

North From a point on the western limit of the Municipal Council area at the centre of the continuation of Pereira Place eastwards to the centre of the junction of Pereira Place and Lewis Place.

East From the last-mentioned point southwards along the centre line of Lewis Place up to the centre of its junction with the road opened up recently north of the Gem land, thence eastwards along the centre line of the last-mentioned road up to the centre of its junction with Anderson Road, thence southwards along the centre line of the said road upto the centre of its junction with Canal Road, thence south-eastwards along the centre line of the Canal Road upto the centre of its junction with Chilaw Road, thence southwards along the centre line of Chilaw Road to the centre of its junction with St. Sebastian's Road.

South From the last-mentioned point north-westwards and southwards along the northern and western limits of Ward No. 3 to the starting point of the eastern limit of Ward No. 2, thence westwards along the northern limit of Ward No. 2 to the western limit of the Municipal Council area.

West From the last-mentioned point northwards along the western limit of the Municipal Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No 5 (Kudapaduwa)

North From the western extremity of the northern limit of the Municipal Council area eastwards, southwards and again eastwards along the said limit to its eastern extremity.

East From the last-mentioned point southwards along the eastern limit of the Municipal Council area to the centre of Chilaw Road.

South From the last-mentioned point, south-westwards along the centre line of Chilaw Road to the centre of its junction with Canal Road, thence north-westwards along the eastern limit of Ward No. 4 to the centre of the junction of the road opened up recently north of the Gem land and Lewis Place.

West From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limit of Ward No. 4 to the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Ward No. 4, thence westwards along the northern limit of Ward No. 4 to its western extremity, thence northwards along the western limit of the Municipal Council area to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No 6 (Hunupitiya)

North From the centre of the junction of Fernando Avenue with Chilaw Road north-eastwards along the eastern limits of Ward Nos. 3 and 4 and the southern limit of Ward No. 5 to the centre of the junction of Chilaw Road with Mosque Road.

East From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the centre line of Mosque Road to the centre of its junction with Mirigama Road.

South From the last-mentioned point south-westwards along the centre line of Mirigama Road and Main Street upto the centre of the junction of Main Street and Green's Road.

West From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the centre line of Main Street to the southern extremity of the eastern limit of Ward No. 3 thence northwards along the eastern limit of the said Ward to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 7 (Maha Hunupitiya)

North From the northern extremity of the eastern limit of Ward No. 6 north-eastwards along the southern limit of Ward No 5 to the southern extremity of the eastern limit of Ward No. 5.

East From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the eastern limit of the Municipal Council area to the centre of Mirigama Road.

South From the last-mentioned point south-westwards along the centre line of Mirigama Road to the south-eastern corner of Ward No 6.

West From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the eastern limit of Ward No. 6 to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No 8 (Kundanwala)

North From the western extremity of the southern limit of Ward No. 6 north-eastwards along the said limit to the centre of the junction of Main Street and Colombo Road, thence south-eastwards along the centre line of Colombo Road to the centre of its junction with Katuwapitiya Road, thence eastwards along the centre line of the said road to the centre of its junction with Temple Road.

East From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the centre line of Temple Road to the centre of its junction with Kumbulapitiya Road.

South From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre line of Kumbulapitiya Road and St. Joseph's Street to the centre of the junction with Green's Road.

West From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the centre line of Green's Road to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 9 (Udayartoppuwa)

North: From the centre of the junction of the Colombo Road and Mirigama Road north-eastwards along the southern limits of Wards Nos 6 and 7 to the eastern limit of the Municipal Council area.

East: From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the eastern limit of the Municipal Council area to the centre of the Road to Kimbulapitiya.

South: From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre line of the road to Kimbulapitiya to the centre of its junction with Weboda Road, thence northwards along the centre line of the said road to the centre of its junction with Kimbulapitiya Road, thence westwards along the centre line of the said road to the south-eastern corner of Ward No. 8.

West: From the last-mentioned point north-westwards along the eastern and northern limits of Ward No. 8 to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 10 (Grand Street)

North: From the centre of the bridge on Mam Street across the canal south-east wards along the southern limit of Ward No. 3, the western limit of Ward No. 6 and the western and southern limits of Ward No. 8 to the centre of the junction with St. Joseph's Street and Colombo Road.

East: From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the centre line of Colombo Road to the centre of its junction with Taladuwa Road, thence westwards along the centre line of the said road to the centre of the bridge over the Ela across Taladuwa Road, thence southwards along the centre line of the Ela to the shore of the lake.

South: From the last-mentioned point westwards along the shore of the lake to a point 50 links south of the south-western corner of lot 2 in Negombo Town Survey Sheet L 1/5. 1 East.

West: From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limits of Wards Nos. 1 and 2 to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No 11 (Kurana-Bolawalana)

North: From the eastern extremity of the northern limit of Ward No 10 south-eastwards along the southern limits of Ward Nos 8 and 9 to the south-eastern corner of Ward No. 9.

East: From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the eastern limit of Municipal Council area to the centre of the continuation of Parakrama Road.

South: From the last-mentioned point westwards along the centre line of the continuation of Parakrama Road and Parakrama Road to the centre of the junction with Colombo Road and again along the centre line of the western continuation of Parakrama Road to the shore of the lake.

West: From the last-mentioned point northwards along the eastern limits of Wards Nos. 1 and 10 to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

Ward No. 12 (Kurana)

North: From the western extremity of the southern limit of Ward No. 11 eastwards along the southern limit of the said ward to its south-eastern corner.

East: From the last-mentioned point south-eastwards along the eastern limit of the Municipal Council area to its southern extremity.

South: From the last-mentioned point westwards along the southern limit of the Municipal Council area to the south-eastern corner of Ward No. 1.

West: From the last-mentioned point northwards along eastern limit of Ward No. 1 to the starting point of the northern limit of the ward.

THE ENTERTAINMENT TAX ORDINANCE, No. 12 OF 1946

THE following resolution passed by the Village Committee of the Rambodagalla village area in the Kurunegala District, under sub-section (1) of section 2 of the Entertainment Tax Ordinance, No. 12 of 1946, has been approved by the Minister of Health and Local Government and is published in terms of sub-section (2) of that section:—

Resolution

“ This Village Committee, under sub-section (1) of section 2 of the Entertainment Tax Ordinance, No. 12 of 1946, hereby imposes and levies, with effect from the date on which this resolution is published in the *Gazette*, a tax at the rates set out hereunder on payments for admission to entertainments (as defined in the Ordinance) held in the area within the administrative limits of the Committee.

By-law

The by-laws relating to the tax on vehicles and animals published in *Gazette* No 8,672 of October 18, 1940, are hereby amended as follows—

- (1) by the renumbering of by-law 8 as by-law 9; and
- (2) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 7, of the following new by-law:—

“ 8. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any officer authorised by him in writing, to stop and detain any vehicle proceeding on any road or path, for the purpose of inspecting the plate required by by-law 7 to be affixed on such vehicle, and the driver or person in charge of such vehicle shall on being required to do so by the Chairman or such officer, stop the vehicle and permit and assist the Chairman or such officer to inspect such plate.”

1. The annual tax imposed by the Council in respect of vehicles and animals under sections 175 and 176 of the Ordinance shall be paid on or before the thirty-first day of March in every year at the office of the Council.

2. (1) The Chairman shall issue or cause to be issued, in respect of every vehicle for which the annual tax has been paid a metal plate with such of the distinguishing letters for vehicles specified in the Schedule hereto as are appropriate to that vehicle and with figures denoting the year for which the plate is issued and the corresponding number in the register of vehicles.

(2) When any plate issued under paragraph (1) of this by-law becomes indistinct or defaced by use or otherwise, the owner of that plate shall, on returning it to the Chairman and on making a payment of twenty-five cents, be entitled to receive a fresh plate.

(3) The Chairman may, on his being satisfied by affidavit or otherwise that any plate issued under paragraph (1) of this by-law has been lost or stolen, issue a fresh plate to the owner of the lost or stolen plate on application made by that owner and on payment by him of fifty cents.

3. (1) The person having possession, custody or control of any vehicle in respect of which a plate has been issued under by-law 2 shall cause that plate to be affixed to a conspicuous part of that vehicle.

(2) Every person who contravenes the provisions of paragraph (1) of this by-law shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding fifteen rupees.

- (1) under the heading "GENERAL BY-LAWS RELATING TO LICENCES", by the substitution, in by-law 2, for the words "or public bathing place", of the words "public bathing place, or hairdressing saloon or barber's shop"; and
- (2) by the insertion, immediately after the by-laws relating to "Dangerous and Offensive Trades", of the following new by-laws—

"Hairdressing Saloons and Barbers' Shops"

1. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop unless the building or part of the building to be used for the purpose, and the equipment of the saloon or shop, are in conformity with the following conditions and requirements—

- (1) The building or part of the building—

- (a) must be substantially constructed, and must have a floor space of not less than 120 square feet. Provided that the requirements of this paragraph shall not apply to any building in which a saloon or shop is carried on or kept at the date of the publication of this by-law in the *Gazette*;
- (b) must have its walls limeplastered and limewashed, its roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white, its floor cemented, and the junction of the floor with the walls rounded off with cement;
- (c) must be well lighted and well ventilated; and
- (d) must be provided with satisfactory drains, and with satisfactory latrine accommodation either within the building or on the premises.

- (2) If any part of the building is used or is intended to be used for residential purposes, that part must be in conformity with the provisions of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199).

- (3) The saloon or shop must be provided with—

- (a) a sufficient supply of water at all times during which the saloon or shop is open to customers;
- (b) means for securing an adequate supply either of boiling water or of disinfectants, for the purpose of washing or sterilizing the instruments or appliances in daily use;
- (c) facilities for the hairdressers or barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work;
- (d) a sufficient number of receptacles for the disinfectants to be used for sterilizing instruments or appliances;
- (e) a sufficient supply of towels and overalls for the use of the customers;
- (f) a sufficient number of spittoons, kept by the side of the seats in such manner as to be readily available to customers and employees; and
- (g) a covered and movable bin made of galvanized iron or other impervious material, for the reception of hair-clippings and refuse.

2. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) keep, affixed in a conspicuous position outside the saloon or shop, a board bearing the words "Licensed Hairdressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop", as the case may be; and
- (b) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position within the saloon or shop, a framed copy of these by-laws relating to hairdressing saloons or barbers' shops in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

3. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall cause—

- (a) the walls of such saloon or shop to be limewashed and the ceiling to be painted at least once in six months, and

- (b) the floor, walls, ceiling, fixtures, furniture, and equipment of such saloon or shop to be kept clean at all times.

4. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall take steps to ensure that every hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop—

- (a) keeps his person and his wearing apparel clean;
- (b) keeps his finger nails short and free from dirt, and
- (c) washes his hands with soap and water immediately before attending to each customer.

5. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause every spittoon in such saloon or shop to be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) cause every hair-brush or comb used in such saloon or shop to be washed or cleaned, and sterilized or disinfected every day, and to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times;
- (c) cause every shaving mug or cup, shaving brush, clipper, razor, or other cutting instrument, used in such saloon or shop to be well rinsed and cleaned in hot water after each occasion on which it is used, and
- (d) cause all hair clippings and other refuse to be collected after each customer has been attended to and to be deposited in the bin provided for the purpose.

6. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use, or permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop to use on any customer—

- (a) any styptic pencil, powder-puff or sponge, or
- (b) any alum or other material for the purpose of stopping any bleeding, unless such alum or other material is in powder or liquid form.

7. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not supply, for the use of any customer, any towel which is not fresh from the wash or any overall which is not clean.

8. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not—

- (a) knowingly permit any person who is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease of any kind, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, to enter the saloon or shop for any purpose;
- (b) employ any person referred to in paragraph (a) in any capacity in such saloon or shop;
- (c) knowingly permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him in the saloon or shop to attend on any person referred to in paragraph (a);
- (d) permit any such hairdresser or barber who, by error or accident, attends on any person referred to in paragraph (a) to attend on any other customer unless that hairdresser or barber washes and cleans his hands before attending on such other customer; or
- (e) permit any instrument that has been used on any person referred to in paragraph (a) to be used on any other person until it is sterilized.

9. No person shall expectorate within any hairdressing saloon or barber's shop, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

10. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use or permit any other person to use the licensed premises—

- (a) as a place for taking meals at any time, or
- (b) as a place for sleeping, except at night when such premises are not open to customers."
