THE URBAN COUNCILS ORDINANCE, No 61 of 1939

Special Conservancy Rate for 1949

IT is hereby notified that (a) the Talawakelle-Lindula Urban Council has, under section 143 (b) of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No 61 of 1939, and with the sanction of the Minister of Health and Local Government given by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947, imposed for the year 1949, subject to such limits and exemptions as may be prescribed by by-laws, a special conservancy rate of eight per centum of the annual value of all immovable property situated within the area which is benefited by the conservancy service, and which is specified in the Schedule hereto, such rate being payable in four equal instalments on March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31, respectively, and

(b) the notification of the Talawakelle-Lindula Urban Council, published in *Gazette* No. 9,914 of October 22, 1948, imposing for the year 1949, the special conservancy rate specified therein, has been rescinded

By-laws

The by-laws published in *Gazette* No. 9,853 of April 16, 1948, are hereby amended as follows—

- (1) in by-law 1, in the definition of "offensive or dangerous trade", by the substitution, for the words "keeping a saw pit", of the words "keeping a lime kiln, keeping a saw pit";
- (2) by the re-numbering of by-law 241 as by-law 247, and

- (3) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 240, of the following new by-laws—

" *Lime kilns*

241 No person shall be entitled to a licence in respect of a lime kiln unless—

- (a) the site on which the lime kiln is to be established is approved by the Chairman,
- (b) the roof of the building which is to be used as a lime kiln is made of some permanent material,
- (c) such building is at least one hundred and fifty feet distant from any dwelling-house;
- (d) such building is provided with outlets to convey any noxious or offensive effluvia, vapours, or gases, that will be emitted, in a manner that is not prejudicial to the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood;
- (e) the premises are provided with adequate latrine accommodation,
- (f) the premises are provided with an adequate supply of water for washing and drinking purposes, and
- (g) there is a separate room made of permanent materials and with a floor area of at least one hundred and twenty square feet for the storing of burnt lime.

242. Every licensee shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board on which his name in English, Sinhalese and Tamil and the phrase 'Licensed Lime Kiln' and its Sinhalese and Tamil equivalents are clearly painted.

243. Every licensee shall take all necessary steps to ensure that the premises are kept in a clean and sanitary condition

244. Every licensee shall produce his licence whenever he is called upon to do so by the Chairman or by any person duly authorised by him in writing.

245. No licensee shall burn lime in such a manner as to be a nuisance to or injurious to the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood.

246. Every licensee shall cause a copy of these by-laws in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be exhibited in a prominent place in the licensed premises."

By-laws

Overhanging Trees

1. Whenever any tree within the village area or the branch, fruit, or any other part of such tree is causing or is likely to cause damage to any building, or is in a condition dangerous or likely to be dangerous to the occupants of any building, or to the safety of passers-by along any public thoroughfare, the Chairman may, by a notice served on the owner or the occupier of the land upon which the tree stands, require such owner or occupier within such time as may be specified in the notice to cut down and remove or tie up and make secure such tree or the branch, fruit or the part of such tree, as the case may be, and if such owner or occupier fails therein to comply with the requirements of the notice within the time specified, any officer or workman authorised in writing by the Chairman may enter upon such land and at the expense of such owner or occupier do what such owner or occupier was required to do by the notice.

Boundaries and Fences

2. The owner, lessee, occupier, or person in charge of every land which is not cultivated shall mark the boundaries of such land by live fences or ditches or stones firmly embedded in the ground, or in any other way which is in accordance with the custom of the village area.

3. The owner, lessee, occupier, or person in charge of every land which is cultivated shall erect a fence along the boundary of such land and shall maintain such fence in good repair.

4. In the case of any two adjoining lands, the owners, lessees, occupiers or persons in charge of such lands shall be jointly responsible for laying down, making or erecting the marks, ditch or fence forming the common boundary and for maintaining them in good order: Provided that it shall be lawful for the owner, lessee, occupier or person in charge of either of such lands to erect the fence on the common boundary at his own expense, all due precautions being taken to prevent damage being caused to trees or plants on the other land.

5. Any person erecting a boundary fence at his own expense shall have the right to enjoy the produce of the fence sticks and no person shall pluck leaves or cut down branches from any such fence sticks without his consent.

6. For the purpose of making or repairing any fence, ditch or boundary mark on any land, it shall be lawful for the owner, lessee, occupier or person in charge of that land or his employees to enter any of the adjoining lands with the necessary materials and implements.

7. No person shall wilfully alter or deface or do any act likely to damage any fence or boundary of, or remove any landmarks from, any land.

Roads and Paths

8. (1) No person shall—
(a) injure, damage, obstruct, encroach upon or otherwise interfere with the use of, any public road or path; or
(b) except with the permission of the Committee divert the line of any public road or path.

(2) For the purposes of this by-law, "public road or path" includes a public road or path which is in course of construction.

9. (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of any paddy field through which a public path runs, to maintain such path at its customary width.

(2) No person shall cut or encroach upon any such path so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.

10. When a range of paddy fields through which any public road or path passes is under cultivation, the cultivators of such range shall be entitled, with the previous permission of the Chairman, and subject to such terms and conditions as he may impose, to put up a temporary gate across such road or path during the period of cultivation in order to prevent cattle from trespassing in the paddy fields.

11. (1) Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any public road or path, the Chairman may prohibit the use of such road or path by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice by beat of tom-tom or otherwise.

(2) It shall be lawful for the Committee, by a resolution in that behalf, to restrict or to prohibit the use of any public road or path by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.

(3) Where a restriction or prohibition is imposed under paragraph (2) of this by-law in respect of any public road or path, the Chairman shall cause notices in English, Sinhalese and Tamil setting out the restriction or prohibition to be displayed conspicuously at the beginning and at the end of such road or path and at its junction with any other road or path.

(4) No person shall fail to comply with the requirements of any notice displayed under paragraph (3) of this by-law.

12. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorised in writing by the Chairman—

(1) to enter between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. with all necessary workmen, vehicles, animals, and implements upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed public road or path for the purpose of doing any work connected with such road or path;

(2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed public road or path such earth, rubbish or materials, as it may be necessary to remove from the place of any work connected with such road or path;

(3) to make any temporary road through the grounds near any existing or proposed public road or path during the execution of any work in any way connected with such road or path;

(4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing or cleaning such drains, watercourses or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair or construction of any public road or path.

Provided, that the earth, rubbish or materials referred to in paragraph (2) shall be removed within a reasonable time, and that the temporary road referred to in paragraph (3) shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands or over any enclosed garden or yard.

13. (1) This by-law shall apply to the area—

(a) within fifteen feet from the centre of any public path, or
(b) within twenty feet from the centre of any public cart road.

(2) No person shall erect any new building or wall within any area to which this by-law applies.

14. The by-laws made by certain Village Committees in the Kandy District, and published in *Gazette* No. 7,727 of August 9, 1929, and therein called "Rules", are hereby amended, in so far as they relate to the village area, by the rescission of by-laws 11, 12, 13, 14, 48, 49, 55 and 56.

15. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee,
"Committee" means the Village Committee of the village area; and

"village area" means the Galasiya Pattuwa village area.

By-laws

1. No person shall keep any pig within the limits of the Council except in a sty or enclosure situated, if land is available, at a distance of not less than 50 feet, and in every other case, at a distance of not less than 20 feet, from any dwelling house or place of human habitation or from any well, spring or water supply.

2. Every pig sty or enclosure must have a cemented floor and shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and shall be subject to inspection by the Medical Officer of Health or by an officer of the Council authorised in writing by the Chairman.

3. Any person who contravenes the provisions of by-law 1 shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred and fifty rupees for each offence.

4. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Council; and
"Council" means the Wattala-Mabole-Peliyagoda Urban Council.

By-laws

The by-laws of the Akuressa village area relating to "Paths and Roads" published in *Gazette* No. 8,672 of October 18, 1940, are hereby amended as follows—

- (1) by the re-numbering of by-laws 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 as by-laws 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, respectively; and
- (2) by the insertion, immediately after by-law 1, of the following new by-laws—

"2. (1) Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any village path or road, the Chairman shall have the power to prohibit the use of such path or road by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice of the prohibition by beat of tom-tom or otherwise

(2) It shall be lawful for the Chairman, whenever authorised by the Committee by a resolution in that behalf, to restrict or to prohibit the use of any village path or road by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.

(3) Where a restriction or prohibition is imposed under paragraph (2) in respect of any village path or road, the Chairman shall cause notices setting out the restriction or prohibition in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be displayed conspicuously at the beginning and at the end of such path or road and at its junction with any other path or road

(4) No person shall fail to conform to the requirements of any notice displayed under paragraph (3)

3 It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorised in writing by the Chairman—

- (1) to enter between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. with all necessary workmen, vehicles, animals and implements upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed village path or road for the purpose of executing any work connected with such path or road;
- (2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any such path or road such earth, rubbish or materials as it may be necessary to remove from the place of any such work;
- (3) to make any temporary road through the grounds near any such path or road during the execution of any work connected with such road or path, and
- (4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing or cleaning such drains, watercourses, fences or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair or construction of any village path or road:

Provided that—

- (a) the earth, rubbish or materials referred to in paragraph (2) shall be removed within a reasonable time, and
- (b) the temporary road referred to in paragraph (3) shall not be constructed over any ground whereon any building stands, or over any enclosed garden or yard".

By-laws

Dwelling Compounds

1 The occupier, or if there is no occupier the owner, of any house within the urban area shall keep the land pertaining to such house in a clean and sanitary condition and free of undergrowth and rubbish.

The Disposal of the Bodies of Dead Animals

2. On the death of an animal, it shall be the duty of the owner thereof, or in the absence of the owner, of the occupier of the premises in which the death occurs, to cause the body of the animal to be buried before the expiry of a period of twelve hours from the time of death.

3 Where any person who is responsible under by-law 2 for the burial of any dead animal fails to bury such animal within a period of twelve hours, the Chairman shall cause such animal to be buried, and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered from such person as a debt due to the Council

The Cleansing of Houses

4. Whenever any house appears to be in an insanitary condition or in such a state of disrepair as to be prejudicial to the health of the inmates or of the neighbours, the Chairman shall cause a notice in writing to be served upon the owner of the house specifying what action the owner should take within a time set out in the notice

5. (1) Every owner of a house served with a notice under by-law 4 shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the specified time.

(2) In the event of failure or refusal to comply with the requirements of a notice under by-law 4, the owner shall be guilty of an offence punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and in the case of a continuing contravention with an additional fine of twenty-five rupees for every day during which the contravention is continued after conviction thereof by a court of competent jurisdiction, or after service of a written notice from the Chairman, or other officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman, directing attention to such contravention.

Overhanging Trees

6. Whenever any tree within the administrative limits of the Hambantota Urban Council, or any branch, fruit or any other part of such tree, is causing or is likely to cause damage to any building, or is in a condition dangerous or likely to be dangerous to the occupants of such building, or to property or to the safety of passers-by along any public thoroughfare, the Chairman may by a notice in writing served on the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands, require such owner or occupier to tie up and make secure, or cut down and remove such tree or the branch, fruit or other part of such tree, as the case may be, within such time as may be specified in the notice, and where such owner or occupier on whom such notice is served fails to comply with its requirements within the time specified therein, any officer or workman authorised in writing by the Chairman may enter upon such land and at the expense of the owner or occupier do what the owner or occupier was required to do by the notice. The expense incurred thereby may be recovered as a debt due to the Council.

7. Every owner or occupier who fails to comply with the requirements of a notice served on him under by-law 6 within the time specified in such notice, shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees

8. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Hambantota Urban Council;

"Council" means the Hambantota Urban Council; and

"urban area" means the area within the administrative limits of the Council.

Special Water Rate for 1949

IT is hereby notified that—

- (a) the Talawakelle-Lindula Urban Council has, under section 143 (b) of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No. 61 of 1939, and with the sanction of the Minister of Health and Local Government given by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947, imposed for the year 1949, subject to such limits and exemptions as may be prescribed by by-laws, a special water rate of eight per centum of the annual value of all immovable property situated within the area which is benefited by the water service and which is specified in the Schedule hereto, such rate being payable in four equal instalments on March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31, respectively; and
- (b) the notification of the Talawakelle-Lindula Urban Council published in *Gazette* No. 9,914 of October 22, 1948, imposing for the year 1949, the special water rate specified therein, has been rescinded.

By-laws

1. In these by-laws —

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee;
“Committee” means the Village Committee of the village area; and
“market area” in relation to any village market means the area described in by-law 2

Markets and Fairs

2 The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any village market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market

3 Within any market area, no person shall, on any day on which the village market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale any vegetables, fruits, fish, meat or other perishable articles of food at any place other than the village market. Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to—

- the sale of vegetables or fruits by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places,
- the sale by the licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique of ripe plantains or other fruits for consumption on the premises, or
- the sale by any person of young coconuts

4 Every village market shall be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on such days of the week as may be approved by the Committee

5 Where the Committee has set apart any portion of a village market for the sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—

- sell or expose for sale such articles or class of articles in any place in such market other than the portion so set apart, or
- sell or expose for sale any other articles or class of articles in the portion so set apart

6 A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use and occupation of any stall, seat or space in any village market.—

Stalls—

For a stall not exceeding 100 square feet in area	50 cents per day
For every additional square foot	1 cent per day

Open space—

For a space not exceeding one square yard 5 cents per day

7 (1) No person shall hold, use or occupy any stall, seat or space in a village market unless he is the holder of a permit issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such permit

(2) Every such permit shall expire on the date specified thereon.

8 The fees payable under by-law 6 shall be paid to the Chairman or to such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman, and no permit under by-law 7 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fee due from him

9 The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each village market a notice setting out in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, the fees payable for the use and occupation of that market, and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.

10 Whenever the Committee is satisfied, after consultation with the Medical Officer of Health, that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Committee by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice to prohibit for such time as to the Committee may appear necessary, the introduction and sale of such article of food in any village market or fair

11 No person shall sell or expose for sale in any village market—

- the carcase or meat of any animal which has been slaughtered at any place other than a village slaughter-house or a licensed slaughter-house, or
- any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat, game or fish

12 No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use or occupy any stall, seat or space in any village market or fair, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed

13 No person using or occupying any village market shall—

- behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market,
- carry on cooking in any such market,
- remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 6 p.m. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself,
- damage or in any way deface, any portion of the building, stalls, lamps or any property of the Committee in or about such market, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market,
- enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of the market or erect any permanent awning, screen or fixture of any kind,
- leave any goods in or about the premises of such market between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. without the special permission of the Chairman,
- place any fruit, vegetables, meat, fish, flesh or other articles of food exposed thereat for sale, on any unclean or insanitary surface, or
- expose for sale any article of food, whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

14 Every person using or occupying any stall in a village market or fair shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a close fitting lid or cover, and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

15 No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal, or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any village market or fair

16 No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any village market or fair or any other person appointed by the Committee to superintend any village market or fair or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein in the lawful execution of his duty.

17 The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or alongside the premises of any village market for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into or unloading goods from that vehicle

18 The Chairman shall give notice by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the temporary closing of any village market.

Private Markets and Fairs

19. No private market or fair shall be established or held within any market area.

20. (1) No private market or fair shall be established or held within any area (other than a market area), except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(2) Every licence issued under paragraph (1) shall—

- be substantially in the form set out in the Schedule hereto,
- be subject to the conditions specified therein; and
- expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it was issued.

(3) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (1) shall be fifty rupees.

(4) No person to whom a licence under paragraph (1) is issued shall contravene any of the conditions specified therein.

21. No person shall be entitled to a licence to establish or hold a private market or fair unless the site is approved by the Medical Officer of Health.

22. A licence issued under by-law 20 may be cancelled by a Rural Court on the second or subsequent conviction of the licensee for a breach of any of these by-laws, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such cancellation.

23. The Chairman may refuse to issue a licence under by-law 20 to any person whose previous licence has been cancelled by a Rural Court.

General

24. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Assistant or any person authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter and inspect any market or fair or any article of food exposed or kept for sale therein, and no person shall obstruct or resist the Chairman or such Officer aforesaid in the execution of his duties under this by-law.

Conditions of the above licence

1. A table in English, Sinhalese and Tamil of the rents and fees leviable at the private * market/fair shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in the * market/fair.

2. The licensee shall not allow any person to sell or expose for sale in the private * market/fair any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

3. The licensee of every private * market/fair shall take all steps necessary to ensure that fruits, vegetables, meat, fish or other articles of food are not placed on an unclean or insanitary surface.

4. The licensee shall not expose for sale any article of food, whether cooked or uncooked, otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

5. The licensee shall not allow any person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious, or cutaneous disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to use or occupy any stall, seat or space in the * market/fair or to expose for sale thereat any articles whatsoever until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

6. The licensee shall keep the premises of the * market/fair clean and free from filth and rubbish and shall cause all sweepings and refuse from the premises to be burnt, buried or otherwise disposed of in such manner as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.

7. The licensee shall maintain order within the premises of the * market/fair.

8. The licensee shall provide a separate portion of land in or near the premises of the * market/fair for the parking of vehicles.

9. The licensee shall provide a sufficient number of fly-proof receptacles with close-fitting lids for the deposit of rubbish and refuse.

10. The licensee shall provide on the premises of the * market/fair a sufficient number of latrines of a type approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

11. This licence may be suspended by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, during any epidemic, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of such suspension.

By-laws

Dairies

1. (1) No person shall keep a dairy of two or more cows unless he is the holder of a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.

(2) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (1) shall be calculated according to the rates specified in the Schedule hereto.

2. Every person who desires to sell or offer for sale milk from one cow, shall cause himself to be registered in the books of the Committee as a registered supplier of milk and shall obtain a permit from the Chairman in that behalf.

3. No person shall sell, hawk, deliver, expose, carry or offer for sale within the village area, any milk adulterated with water or any other foreign substance or liquid.

4. No person shall at any time sell or expose, keep, carry, hawk or offer for sale any milk within the village area unless he is the licensee of a dairy or a registered supplier of milk or the authorised agent of such licensee or registered supplier.

5. Every licence holder, registered supplier or authorised vendor of milk shall carry his licence, permit or written authority when carrying, delivering, hawking or exposing milk for sale, and shall, on demand made by any Sanitary Assistant or other person authorised thereto in writing by the Chairman, produce such licence, permit or written authority for inspection.

6. The licensee of a dairy shall cause all dung, refuse, urine or washings to be removed from the dairy at least once a day, and to be disposed of at a suitable distance from the dairy in such manner as to cause no nuisance.

7. The licensee of a dairy shall keep every part of the dairy and its surroundings in a clean and sanitary condition.

8. The licensee of a dairy shall not cause or permit milk to be stored in any vessel other than a vessel made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware, tin or enamelled or galvanized iron.

9. No person who is suffering, or has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter a dairy or take part in the preparation, sale or transport of milk, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

10. The licensee of a dairy or a registered supplier of milk shall not milk any stray cow or any cow suffering from any disease for the purpose of obtaining milk for sale.

11. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to suspend, for such time as may be necessary, any licence to keep a dairy issued under by-law 1 or a permit issued under by-law 2 in any locality where cattle disease of any kind prevails.

12. The Chairman, the Sanitary Assistant, or any person duly authorised thereto in writing by the Chairman may, at any time or place within the village area, examine the milk of any dairy or any milk that is offered or carried for sale.

13. Every licence or permit issued under those by-laws shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which such licence or permit is issued.

14. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee;

“Committee” means the Village Committee of the village area; and

“village area” means the Gangabada Pattu village area.

The Abatement of Nuisances

1. Where any building, or wall or anything affixed thereon is in such a condition as to be dangerous to a neighbouring building or to an occupier thereof, or to a passer-by, the

Chairman shall, by notice in writing served on the owner or occupier thereof, require the owner or occupier—

- (a) in any case of urgency, to cause within twenty-four hours after the service of the notice, a proper board or fence to be put up for the protection of any passer-by, and
- (b) in every case, within three days after the service of the notice, to cause such building or wall or anything affixed thereon to be secured or repaired.

2 (1) Every owner or occupier who is served with a notice under by-law 1 shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein.

(2) Where any owner or occupier fails or refuses to comply with the requirements of a notice served under by-law 1, the Chairman may authorise any specified person or persons to do the work which ought to have been done and the expenses thereby incurred may be recovered from such owner, or occupier as a debt due to the Committee.

3. (1) Whenever any house or building appears to be in an insanitary condition or in such state of disrepair as to be prejudicial to the health of the inmates or of the neighbours the Chairman shall, by notice in writing served on the owner or occupier thereof, require the owner or occupier to carry out, within the time specified in the notice, such work as may be specified in that notice.

(2) Every owner or occupier served with a notice under paragraph (1) shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the specified time, and in the event of his failure or refusal to comply with the requirements of such notice, the Chairman may cause the work to be done and the expenses thereby incurred may be recovered as a debt due to the Committee.

4 The owner or occupier of every house within the village area shall cause his house to be whitewashed with lime or other suitable substance at least once a year and at any other time specified by notice in writing by the Chairman, if by reason of an outbreak of any epidemic disease such steps appear to the Committee to be necessary.

5 No person shall dispose of the milk of coconuts split for other than domestic purposes, within a distance of one hundred yards of any village road or path or public place or any dwelling house.

6. No person shall wantonly deposit carcass of any dead animal on any land or premises belonging to any other person.

7 No person shall keep or halt any cart on any village road or path except in the event of a break-down, or longer than is reasonably necessary for the purpose of loading goods into or unloading goods from, such carts.

8 No person shall place or bury any charred plate, leaf or paper or charm in any other form, on the land of any other person.

9. No person shall—

- (a) draw any caricature or indecent picture or write any insulting or offensive expression on any building or conspicuous place, or do any other act by which any member of the public is likely to be insulted or public decency is likely to be outraged, or
- (b) ease himself on his own land or on another's land, or on any village road or path, or in any place other than a place specially provided for such a purpose in such a way as to offend other people's feelings of decency; or
- (c) throw rubbish or noisome matter, or unserviceable articles, or any other thing on land belonging to any other person or in any public place or village road or path; or
- (d) pelt stones or throw filth at the house of any other person.

Sale of Provisions

10. No person shall keep any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables or other perishable articles of food, except on a licence duly obtained in that behalf from the Chairman. Every such licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December in each year.

11 The owner or seller of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables or other perishable articles of food in any shop or place (other than a market) shall keep the meat, poultry and fish apart from the vegetables and the poultry in baskets so made that the birds may not suffer unnecessary discomfort.

12. The Chairman or any person duly authorised by him in writing may inspect any shop, or place (other than a market) used for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, vegetables or other perishable articles of food for human consumption.

13. (1) No meat shall be transported from any slaughter-house to any shop or place where meat is sold except in a box or vehicle which satisfies the following conditions—

- (a) where a box is used, every such box must have the inside lined with zinc or other impermeable material and be fitted with a lid;
- (b) where a vehicle is used, every such vehicle must be provided with—

- (i) a roof to protect the meat from the sun or rain or from contamination by flies or dust;

(ii) a covering at each open end to screen the meat from public view; and

(iii) a compartment, the inside of which is lined with zinc or other impermeable material, for storing the meat.

(2) Where any meat is transported in contravention of paragraph (1) the person liable to such contravention shall be the person on whose behalf or at whose directions the meat was so transported.

Undergrowth and Rubbish

14. The owner or occupier of any land within the village area shall keep such land free of undergrowth and rubbish, and his dwelling compound in a clean and sanitary condition.

Prevention of Malaria

15. The owner or occupier of any land within the village area shall remove or cause to be removed from such land all receptacles likely to be breeding-places for mosquitoes or disease-bearing insects.

The Draining of Ponds, Pools, Open Ditches and Sewers

16 The owner or occupier of any land within the village area shall cause every pond, open ditch, sewer, drain, or other place containing, or used for the collection of, any drainage, filth, water, matter, or thing of an offensive nature or likely to be prejudicial to health, which is situated in that land within a distance of sixty yards from any dwelling house to be drained, cleansed, covered or filled up.

Housing and Penning of Cattle

17. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person duly authorised by him in writing, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any shed, stable, enclosure, or sty used for the housing or penning of any cattle, horses, sheep, goats or pigs.

18. The owner or lessee of any shed, stable, enclosure, or sty shall take any necessary steps to ensure that such shed, stable, enclosure or sty is kept at all times in a sanitary condition, and that dung and other refuse are removed daily from the premises, and are so disposed of that no nuisance is caused thereby.

Water Supply

19. (1) No person shall allow a cesspit, cesspool, pig sty, gala, cattle shed, pit latrine, or defective drain to remain, or regularly manure any land for the purpose of cultivation, within a distance of fifty feet from any communal well, spout, spring, or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

(2) No private well for the supply of water for domestic purposes shall be sunk within a distance of fifty feet from any cesspit, cesspool, pig sty, gala, cattle shed, pit latrine or defective drain or from any land regularly manured for the purposes of cultivation.

20. No person shall block, divert, pollute, or cause any damage to any communal well, spout, spring, or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

21 No person shall fell or destroy any timber or under-wood reserved for the conservation of any communal well, spout, spring, or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

22. (1) Where any tree or branch of a tree overhangs a private well, the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands shall within fourteen days of the service upon him of a notice, signed by the Chairman, requiring such tree or branch to be tied up, cut down or removed, as the case may be, cause such tree or branch to be tied up, cut down or removed.

(2) Where any owner or occupier on whom a notice is served under paragraph (1) fails to comply with the requirements of such notice within fourteen days, the Chairman may cause the work to be done and the expenses incurred thereby shall be recoverable from such owner or occupier as a debt due to the Committee.

The Sale of Intoxicating Liquor

23 No person shall sell to any boy under sixteen years of age, or to any female, any spirits or other intoxicating liquor, or any toddy drawn from any species of palm or the fermented juice of the sugar cane.

Construction of Latrines

24. (1) Whenever the Committee defines an area within which the owner or lessee of any premises used for human habitation shall be required to construct and maintain a latrine, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner or lessee, direct the owner or lessee to construct a latrine of such type and size, and in such a position on the premises and with such connecting drains as may have been determined by the Committee and are specified in such notice.

(2) Every owner or lessee of premises on whom a notice is served under paragraph (1) shall within thirty days of the service of any such notice construct a latrine conforming in all respects to the requirements specified in such notice.

25. No person shall construct or maintain a pit latrine within a radius of one hundred feet from any well except with the permission of the Chairman

Village roads and paths

26. No person shall, without the prior sanction of the Chairman given in that behalf, cause a procession including elephants to be formed, or lead such a procession, on a village road or path

27. No person shall place, or cause to be placed, any sweepings or refuse in any drain which runs on either side of a village road or path

Galas

28. No person shall establish or keep a private gala except on a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf

29. Every licence for a private gala shall be subject to the following conditions —

- (1) The premises must be levelled and drained and the ground must be either paved or consolidated with broken metal, so that it keeps a hard and level surface.
- (2) Every building or shed intended for the accommodation of cattle in a gala must be built of bricks, stone or cabook, and the walls and pillars must be lime-washed and plastered with cement to a height of four feet from the ground. The roof must be of permanent material. The floor must be paved with bricks or stone rendered in cement, cement concrete, or asphalt. Drains similarly constructed, must be provided so as to convey the urine, washings, and rain water into one or more covered receptacles.
- (3) The premises must be provided with an ample supply of water, both for drinking and for washing the premises
- (4) The premises must have sufficient latrine accommodation

30. Every licensee of a gala shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his gala a board with the words "Licensed Gala" and the name of the licensee legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese and Tamil

31. Every licensee of a gala shall keep a copy of those by-laws relating to galas, in English, Sinhalese and Tamil framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises

32. Every licensee of a gala shall, cause the walls and pillars of the gala to be lime-washed or tarred four times a year in the months of March, June, September and December.

33. Every licensee of a gala shall cause the gala and all the buildings therein to be kept in good repair, and in a clean and sanitary condition and to be washed and swept daily.

34. Every licensee of a gala shall cause all dung and other refuse on the premises to be collected at frequent intervals daily so as to keep the premises in a clean and sanitary condition, and the dung and other refuse so collected shall be kept in one or more covered receptacles, which shall be constructed of some impermeable material

35. Every licensee of a gala shall cause all dung, refuse, and washings to be removed from the gala, at least once a day and disposed of, so that no nuisance is caused thereby.

36. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee,
"Committee" means the Village Committee of the Kamnal Pattu village area

THE URBAN COUNCILS ORDINANCE, No 61 of 1939

IT is notified that the following resolution under section 173 of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No 61 of 1939, passed by the Kadugannawa Urban Council on August 27, 1948, has been approved by the Minister of Health and Local Government by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No 9,773 of September 24, 1947 —

"By virtue of the powers conferred by section 173 of the Urban Councils Ordinance, No 61 of 1939, this Council hereby—

- (1) imposes for the year 1949 a rate of fourteen per centum on the annual value of all immoveable property situated within the town of Kadugannawa,
- (2) declares that of the said rate a portion equal to six per centum of the annual value is levied for the purpose of providing the conservancy service; and
- (3) declares that the rate shall be payable in four equal instalments on March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31, respectively."

By-laws

Dairies and the Sale of Milk

1. (1) No person shall keep any dairy except on a licence issued by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

2. (1) No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a dairy unless the building intended for the accommodation of the cows is in conformity with the following requirements—

- (a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated and well lighted;
- (b) the building must be provided with suitable drains for the purpose of conveying urine, washings, and waste water into one or more covered receptacles;
- (c) the building must be of such a size that for each cow intended to be kept therein, there is a floor space of not less than forty square feet and an air space of not less than four hundred cubic feet;
- (d) the building must be provided with a sufficient supply of pure water;
- (e) the walls and roof must be made of some permanent material;
- (f) the woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed; and
- (g) the floor must be paved with cement concrete or with brick or stone rendered in cement.

(2) No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a dairy unless the building intended for use as a milk room is in conformity with the following requirements:—

- (a) the building must be at a distance of not less than twenty-five feet from the building intended for the accommodation of the cows and not less than one hundred feet from any latrine, cesspit, ashpit, permanent manure heap or open sewer;
- (b) the building must be provided with an oil-painted ceiling that prevents dirt and dust falling from the roof;
- (c) the building must be provided with at least one window and one door and the area of the window space must be not less than one-fifteenth of the floor space;
- (d) every door and window must be covered with fly-proof netting;
- (e) one window of the building must face at least one door;
- (f) at least two opposite walls of the building must abut on the open air;
- (g) the walls must be not less than seven feet in height and built of brick, stone or cabook;
- (h) every inside wall must be covered to a height of four feet from the floor with a layer of cement not less than three quarters of an inch in thickness;
- (i) the inside walls must be plastered with lime-mortar or white-washed;
- (j) the floor must be paved with cement concrete, not less than four inches in thickness; and
- (k) the eaves of the roof must be at least six feet from the ground.

3. (1) If at any time the premises in respect of which a licence to keep a dairy has been issued ceases to be in conformity with the requirements specified in by-law 2, the Chairman may cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do, within the time specified in that notice, all things necessary to make those premises be in conformity with those requirements and if the licensee fails to comply with the notice the Chairman may suspend the licence.

(2) Every licensee of a dairy on whom a notice under paragraph (1) is served shall comply with the notice within the time specified therein.

(3) A notice under paragraph (1) shall be deemed to be served on the licensee of a dairy if it is left with any person employed in the dairy.

4. Every licensee of a dairy shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of the licensed premises, a board on which his name in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the phrase "Licensed Dairy" and its Sinhalese and Tamil equivalents, are clearly painted.

5. Every licensee of a dairy shall cause—

- (a) a list of the names and addresses of his employees to be kept in the premises so as to be easily available for inspection;
- (b) the walls of the milk room to be limewashed in June and December in every year, and, at such other times as the Chairman may order in writing;
- (c) the floor of the milk room and the top of each table in such room to be washed at least once every day;
- (d) all utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to the dairy to be kept clean;
- (e) every part of the dairy to be kept clean and in good repair;
- (f) all dung, refuse, urine and washings to be removed at least once a day and disposed of at a suitable distance from the dairy in such a manner as to cause no nuisance; and
- (g) all cattle food, other than grass or straw, to be stored in suitable rat-proof receptacles.

6. The licensee of a dairy shall cause every vessel in the dairy containing milk to be adequately protected with a clean cover or lid, and shall take all precautions to prevent the milk from being contaminated during transit.

7. The licensee of a dairy shall not allow any milk vessel, butter vessel, churn, separator or other articles used in the dairy to be used for any purpose other than a purpose of the dairy and shall cause each such vessel, churn, separator or other articles to be thoroughly washed with boiling water, after each occasion on which it has been used.

8. The licensee of a dairy shall not cause or permit—

- (a) any milk to be poured into any vessel which is not thoroughly cleansed;
- (b) milk to be stored in any vessel other than a vessel made of glass, porcelain, glazed earthenware, or enamelled or galvanized iron;
- (c) any vessel used for the storage of milk to be kept in any place other than the milk room;
- (d) milk for the purpose of sale to be drawn from any cow unless, immediately before the time of milking, the udder and the teats of the cow are thoroughly cleansed and wiped with a clean damp cloth, and unless the hands of the person milking are also thoroughly washed and cleansed;
- (e) milk intended for sale to be kept in any place other than the milk room; or
- (f) any animal or bird to enter or remain in the milk room for any purpose whatsoever.

9. (1) No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any cutaneous, contagious or infectious disease or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, shall enter a dairy or take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of milk until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

(2) No licensee or person in charge of a dairy shall employ or permit any person suffering from any cutaneous, contagious or infectious disease, or who has recently suffered from such disease, or who has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, to enter the dairy or take part in the preparation, sale, or transport of milk, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

10. The licensee of a dairy shall give immediate notice to the Chairman of any case or suspected case of cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease which may occur among the persons employed in the dairy.

11. The licensee of a dairy shall not sell, or permit to be sold, the milk of any cow suffering from tuberculosis, mastitis, foot-and-mouth disease, anthrax, actinomycosis of the udder, or add such milk, or permit it to be added, to the milk of other animals which is intended for sale for human consumption.

12. The licensee of a dairy shall not use the milk room or permit it to be used for any purpose other than that of storing and preparing milk.

13. The licensee of a dairy shall not sell or supply to any person milk obtained from any cow other than a cow kept in a licensed dairy.

14. No person other than a licensee of a dairy shall carry on the business of selling milk produced within the village area.

15. (1) No person shall carry on the business of selling, within the village area, milk produced outside that area unless he has been registered by the Chairman as a purveyor of milk.

(2) The Chairman shall not register any person as a purveyor of milk, unless the Medical Officer of Health of the area within which the dairy from which that person intends to obtain milk is situated has inspected such dairy and recommended the registration of that person as a purveyor of milk.

(3) No fee shall be charged for the registration of any person as a purveyor of milk.

16. (1) No person shall hawk or deliver milk for the purpose of sale unless he has been registered by the Chairman as a vendor of milk.

(2) The Chairman shall not register any person as a vendor of milk unless a Medical Officer nominated by the Chairman has examined that person and certified him to be free from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease.

(3) The Chairman shall issue to every person who is registered as a vendor of milk a card of registration bearing—

- (a) the name and thumb impression of that person; and
- (b) the name and licence number or registration number of the licensee of a dairy or the registered purveyor of milk who will supply the milk which that person will hawk or deliver for the purpose of sale.

(4) No fee shall be charged for the registration of any person as a vendor of milk.

17. Every person hawking or delivering milk for the purpose of sale shall carry with him the card of registration issued to him by the Chairman and shall produce it for inspection when requested to do so by the Chairman or any officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman.

18. The Chairman or any officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman may, at any time, request the licensee or person in charge of a dairy, or any person hawking milk or delivering milk for the purpose of sale, to sell a sample of milk for analysis to the Chairman or such authorised officer.

19. No licensee or person in charge of a dairy, and no person hawking or delivering milk for the purpose of sale, shall refuse or fail to comply with a request made to him under by-law 18 by the Chairman or any officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman.

20. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorised by him in writing, to enter and inspect any dairy in the village area at all reasonable times, and the licensee or person in charge of that dairy shall permit and assist the Chairman or such authorised person to inspect that dairy.

21. No person shall expose for sale, sell, deliver, hawk or carry for sale within the village area—

- (a) any milk from which the cream has been removed, unless such milk is contained in a vessel which bears a label on which is painted the phrase "Skimmed Milk" and its Sinhalese and Tamil equivalents, and is declared at the time of sale to be skimmed milk; or
- (b) any milk contained in bottles of which the mouths are not adequately covered with some impermeable material; or
- (c) any milk adulterated with water or any other foreign substance or liquid. Provided that milk to which tea, coffee or cocoa has been added for consumption on the premises of any tea or coffee boutique or eating-house shall not be deemed to be adulterated for the purpose of this by-law.

22. If any person found guilty of a breach of by-law 21 is proved to be the agent or servant of any other person, such other person shall also be guilty of that breach of that by-law, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the court that he had given all necessary instructions and used due diligence to ensure compliance with that by-law, and that the breach was due to an act or default of his agent or servant without his knowledge, consent or connivance.

23. The licensee of a dairy shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to dairies and the sale of milk in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and the licence to be framed and hung in a conspicuous position in the dairy.

24. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee of a dairy on a second or subsequent conviction by such court, for the breach of any of the by-laws relating to dairies and the sale of milk, and such licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Boundaries and Fences

25. The owner, lessee, occupier or person in charge of every land which is not cultivated shall mark the boundaries of that land with live fences, or ditches or stones firmly embedded in the ground or in any other way which is in accordance with the custom in the village area.

26. The owner, lessee, occupier or person in charge of every land which is cultivated shall erect a fence along the boundary of that land and shall maintain such fence in good repair.

27. In the case of any two adjoining lands, the owners, lessees, occupiers or persons in charge of both lands shall be jointly responsible for making and maintaining the common boundary of those lands. Provided that it shall be lawful for the owner, lessee, occupier or person in charge of either of those lands to make the common boundary at his own expense, all due precautions being taken to prevent being caused to damage trees or plants on the other land.

28. Any person erecting a boundary-fence at his own expense shall have the right to enjoy the produce of the fence-sticks, and no other person shall pluck leaves or cut down branches from any such fence-stick without his consent.

29. For the purpose of making or repairing any boundary of a land it shall be lawful for the owner, lessee, occupier, or

person in charge of that land or his employee to enter into any of the adjoining lands with the necessary materials and implement.

30. No person shall wilfully alter, deface or damage the boundary of a land.

Washing and Bathing

31. No person shall bathe or wash any animal or article at a communal well, spout, spring, or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

32. Where any place has been set apart by the Committee as a public bathing place, no person shall use such place for any purpose other than that for which it has been so set apart. Provided, however, that a person may wash at a public bathing place the clothes worn by him whilst bathing at such place.

33. No person of one sex shall enter any enclosure at a public bathing place set apart by the Committee for the exclusive use of persons of the other sex.

34. (1) No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or who has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at any public bathing place until the period of infection and incubation have elapsed.

(2) Water for the use of any person referred to in paragraph (1) shall be drawn by a healthy person and carried to a distance of at least twenty-five feet away from the well or bathing place.

35. No person shall lead, drive or take any animal to a public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

Spring Guns and Traps

36. No person shall set any spring gun or trap without the written permission of the Chairman. The fact that such permission has been granted shall be proclaimed by beat of tom-tom by an officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman.

Water Supply

37. No person shall sink any well or cause any well to be sunk for the supply of water for domestic purposes within fifty feet from any cesspit, cesspool, pigsty, gala, cattleshed, defective drain, or latrine, or any refuse heap or manure heap which is not removed at intervals of not less than two weeks, or of any land under cultivation which is regularly manured every season.

38. No person shall, within a distance of fifty feet from any well used for the supply of water for domestic purposes—

- (a) construct or cause or permit the construction of a cesspit, cesspool, latrine, gala or cattle shed, or
- (b) allow any cesspit, or cesspool, latrine, pigsty, gala, or cattle shed to remain, or
- (c) deposit, or cause or permit the deposit of, any manure or decaying animal or vegetable matter, or
- (d) manure any land, or
- (e) allow any drain to be in a defective condition.

39. The Committee may, whenever such a course is deemed to be necessary, cause notice in writing under the hand of the Chairman to be served on the owner or occupier of any land in which there is a well supplying water for domestic purposes, requiring such owner or occupier to bale out the water and clean the well and to execute such repairs as the Committee may, in the interest of health, consider necessary, and such owner or occupier shall comply with the requirements of such notice within fourteen days from the date of service thereof.

Galas

40. No person shall establish or keep a gala except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

41. Every licence for a gala shall be subject to the following conditions.—

- (1) The licensee shall cause a table of rents and fees leviable at the gala to be written in Sinhalese and to be exhibited in a conspicuous place at the gala.
- (2) The licensee shall not permit any person who is suffering, or has recently suffered, from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to occupy any place in the gala, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- (3) The licensee shall keep the gala in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (4) The licensee shall cause any refuse or rubbish from the gala to be so buried or burned as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.
- (5) The licensee shall maintain order within the gala.
- (6) The licensee shall not permit gambling or disorderly conduct to take place at the gala.
- (7) The licensee shall not allow any person to keep within the gala any cattle suffering from a contagious disease.

42. The Chairman may suspend any licence for a gala during the continuance of an epidemic, if such suspension is essential in the public interest.

43. No person shall establish or keep a gala within fifty yards from a dwelling house.

44. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of the conditions specified in by-law 41, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Disorderly Conduct, Littering, and use of Abusive Language

45. No person shall loiter in any public road, or path, or in any public place after 9 p.m. without a light and without lawful cause. The mere possession of an electric torch or other lighting device, without the light being actually put on, shall not be deemed to be sufficient for the purpose of this by-law.

46. No person shall use abusive language with intent to annoy any person or knowing or having reason to believe that it is likely to annoy any person or cause a breach of the peace.

47. No person shall disturb the public after 9 p.m. by shouting, singing songs or making any other noise. Provided that nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to affect the rights of the people in the matter of religious ceremonies and orderly gatherings.

48. No person shall cause any annoyance to any other person by publishing any obscene writing or by making any obscene drawing or by singing or reciting any obscene song or ballad, or do any other act which is likely to outrage public decency.

The Sale of Spirits

49. No person shall sell to any boy under sixteen years of age, or to any female, any spirit or other intoxicating liquor of any toddy drawn from any species of palm, or any fermented juice of the sugar cane.

50. (1) Every owner or lessee of trees from which toddy is drawn shall, for the purpose of coupling such trees, use not less than six separate, good, and sound ropes for the feet, and not less than three separate, good and sound ropes for the hands.

(2) Each rope used by such owner or lessee for such purpose shall consist of not less than six strands, and at the end of every three months such owner or lessee shall replace each such rope with a new rope of the kind specified herein.

51. The owner or lessee of every kitul or coconut tree which is tapped for toddy shall cause any pole that may be used for climbing such tree to be renewed at intervals of not more than four months.

52. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any person authorised by the Chairman in writing, at any time to enter any land whereon trees are being tapped for toddy and to inspect the ropes and other appliances used for that purpose.

Stray Cattle

53. The owners of cattle which are believed to have strayed shall forthwith give information to the village headman or to the Chairman.

The Housing and Penning of Cattle, Goats and Pigs

54. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any cattle, goat or pig on those premises, except in an enclosure situated at a distance of fifty feet or more from any dwelling house.

55. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any enclosure for any cattle, goat or pig so as to be a nuisance to any person residing in the village area or making use of any public road.

56. The occupier of any premises or building whereon or where any cattle, goat or pig is kept shall cause every part of such premises or building to be thoroughly cleansed as often as may be requisite.

57. The occupier of any premises or building whereon or where any cattle, goat or pig is kept shall, at all reasonable times, afford free access to the Chairman or any officer duly authorised by him for the purpose of inspecting such premises or building.

Meat Stalls

58. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a meat stall unless the premises to be licensed and the equipment of such stall are in conformity with the following conditions —

- (1) The premises must be in good repair, well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open must be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.
- (2) The walls of every room in every part must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of brick, stone or cabook, with the inside thereof limeplastered and limewashed and the lower internal surface of each such wall must be covered with glazed tiles or be plastered in cement up to a height of four feet from the ground.
- (3) All the eaves must be at least six feet from the ground.
- (4) The roof must be made of some permanent material.
- (5) All the woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed.
- (6) The floor must be cemented throughout.
- (7) The premises must be provided with adequate drainage.
- (8) The tables and all other furniture in the premises must be capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls.

(9) Every table on which meat is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

(10) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(11) The premises must be at least fifty feet distant from any latrine, cess-pit, manure heap or open sewer.

(12) There must be no cess-pit, latrine, or a-hpit within or directly communicating with the premises.

59. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the word "Licensed Meat Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

60. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to meat stalls in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep on the premises a list of the names and addresses of all employees, including vendors of meat so as to be at all times available for inspection.

61. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tile, or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

62. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause the floor, the tile, the cemented portions of the wall, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging meat to be kept polished and free from rust.

63. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep every part of the stall, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils, and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation or sale of meat in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cess-pit, or other nuisance.

64. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises, so that those employed on the premises may have easy access to them.

65. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in a covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always covered except at the times when refuse is being actually placed in it.

66. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep the licensed premises free from rats, and shall cause all rat holes to be filled up with broken glass and shall plaster them with cement as soon as found.

67. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

68. No person shall spit within a meat stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

69. No person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such a disease, shall enter a meat stall, or take part in the storing, preparation or sale of meat therein, or in the transport of any meat thereto or therefrom.

70. No licensee of a meat stall shall permit the contravention by any person of by-law 68 or 69.

71. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or articles other than those used for the purposes of the storing, preparation, or sale of meat.

72. No licensee of a meat stall shall allow any place on the same level with the meat stall and forming part of the same building to be used as a sleeping place, unless it is effectually separated from the meat stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall not be less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

73. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep on the licensed premises an ample supply of potable water.

74. No licensee of a meat stall shall sell or expose for sale on the licensed premises any meat other than the meat of animals slaughtered in a public slaughter-house which is within the administrative limits of the Committee and which has been duly declared and proclaimed under section 21 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201), or in a place appointed for the purpose by the proper authorities under section 11 of the said Ordinance or under a special licence issued under section 14 of the said Ordinance.

75. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of meat during the hours of 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

76. No licensee of a meat stall shall allow any person in his employ to transport meat for sale from his licensed premises unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the meat stall.

77. No licensee of a meat stall shall permit any person in his employ to transport for sale from his licensed premises any meat otherwise than in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle is at all times kept clean and wholesome.

78. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a meat stall, issue cards of registration for the use of every person employed by such licensee in transporting meat for sale.

Fish Stalls

79. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a fish stall unless the premises to be licensed and the equipment of such stall are in conformity with the following conditions:—

- (1) The premises must be in good repair, well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open must be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.
- (2) The walls of every room in every part must be not less than seven feet in height and must be limeplastered and limewashed except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement.
- (3) All the eaves must be at least six feet from the ground.
- (4) All the woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed.
- (5) The floor must be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered and emptying into a bucket.
- (6) Every table on which fish is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.
- (7) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
- (8) The premises must be at least fifty feet distant from any latrine cesspit, manure heap or open sewer.
- (9) There must be no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the premises.

80. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words "Licensed Fish Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

81. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to fish stalls in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep on the premises a list of the names and addresses of all employees including vendors of fish so as to be at all times available for inspection.

82. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the fish stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be limewashed or, if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

83. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables and chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence.

84. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep every part of the fish stall, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of fish in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine cesspit, or other nuisance.

85. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises so that those employed on the premises may have easy access to them.

86. Every licensee of a fish stall shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause such receptacle to be kept always covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

87. Every licensee of a fish stall shall keep the licensed premises free from rats and shall fill up all rat holes with broken glass and plaster them with cement as soon as he discovers them.

88. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed premises on any pretext whatsoever.

89. No person shall spit within a fish stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

90. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter a fish stall or take part in the storing, preparation or sale of fish therein, or in the transport of any thereto or therefrom.

91. No licensee of a fish stall connive at or permit the violation by any person of by-law 88, 89 or 90.

92. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any bare clothes, sleeping mats, or other articles except those for the purpose of the storing, preparation or sale of

96. No licensee of a fish stall shall allow any person to transport fish for sale from his licensed premises unless he is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of that fish stall.

97. No licensee of a fish stall shall permit any person to transport for sale from his licensed premises any fish except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin or other receptacle is at all times kept clean and wholesome.

98. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a fish stall, issue cards of registration free of charge for the use of every person employed by such licensee in transporting fish for sale.

99. In these by-laws—

"Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee;

"Committee" means the Village Committee of the Boyagane village area; and

"village area" means the Boyagane village area.

By-laws

Roads and Paths

1. (1) No person shall—
 - (a) damage, obstruct, encroach upon, or otherwise interfere with the use of, any public road or path, or
 - (b) except with the permission of the Committee, divert the line of any public road or path.
- (2) For the purposes of this by law "public road or path" includes a public road or path which is in the course of construction
2. (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of any paddy field through which a public path runs to maintain such path at its customary width.
- (2) No person shall cut or encroach upon any public path running through a paddy field so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.
3. Where a range of paddy fields through which any public road or path passes is under cultivation, the cultivators of such range shall be entitled, with the previous permission of the Chairman and subject to such terms and conditions as he may impose, to put up a temporary gate across such road or path during the period of cultivation in order to prevent trespass by cattle.
4. (1) Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any public road or path, the Chairman shall have the power to prohibit the use of such road or path by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice by beat of to-n-tom or otherwise.
- (2) It shall be lawful for the Committee, by a resolution in that behalf, to restrict or to prohibit the use of any public road or path by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.
- (3) Where a restriction or prohibition is imposed under paragraph (2) of this by-law in respect of any public road or path, the Chairman shall cause a notice setting out the restriction or prohibition in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be displayed conspicuously at the beginning and at the end of such road or path and at its junction with any other road or path.
- (4) No person shall fail to conform to the requirements of any notice displayed under paragraph (3) of this by-law.
5. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorised in writing by the Chairman—
 - (1) to enter between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. with all necessary workmen, vehicles, animals and implements upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed public road or path for the purpose of doing any work connected with such road or path,
 - (2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any such road or path any earth, rubbish or materials which it may be necessary to remove from the place of any such work;
 - (3) to make any temporary road through the grounds near any such road or path during the execution of any such work; or
 - (4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing or cleaning such drains, watercourses or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair or construction of any public road or path:

Provided that the earth, rubbish or materials referred to in paragraph (2) are removed within a reasonable time and the temporary road referred to in paragraph (3) shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands, or over any enclosed garden or yard.

THE VILLAGE COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE

BY-LAWS under section 49 of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), made by the Village Committee of the Kandapahala village area in Uda Dumbara in the Kandy District, and approved by the Minister of Health and Local Government by virtue of the powers vested in him by sub-section (3) of that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947.

By-laws

Interpretation

1. In these by-laws—
 - "building" includes any hut, shed or roofed enclosure, whether used for human habitation or otherwise;
 - "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Committee;
 - "Committee" means the Village Committee of the village area;
 - "village area" means the Kandapahala village area.
2. For the purposes of the assessment tax, the percentage or rate to be deducted from the annual value for the probable annual average cost of insurance, repairs, maintenance and upkeep, shall be as follows—
 - (a) in the case of any building which has a thatched roof of any description or which is covered with any other material which requires replacement as frequently as thatch, twenty per centum of the annual rent;
 - (b) in the case of any building other than a building referred to in paragraph (a), fifteen per centum of the annual rent;
 - (c) in the case of any land on which there is no building (other than a building used solely for the purpose of housing animals or poultry) and which is under regular cultivation of any kind, four per centum of the annual rent; and
 - (d) in the case of any land on which there is no building (other than a building used solely for the purpose of housing animals or poultry) and which is under permanent cultivation, one per centum of the annual rent.
3. (1) For the purpose of the land tax, the Chairman may by notice in writing require any person who is liable or may be supposed to be liable to such tax—
 - (a) to render a return substantially in the form prescribed in the First Schedule hereto, and
 - (b) to furnish such other information or to produce or cause to be produced such documents as may, in the opinion of the Chairman, be necessary for that purpose.
- (2) Every person on whom a notice under sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (1) is served shall, within fourteen days from the date of such service, correctly and truly fill up, sign, date and deliver or transmit to the office of the Committee the form served with such notice, and every person on whom a notice under sub-paragraph (b) is served shall comply with the requirements of such notice.
- (3) For the purposes of this by-law, any notice which is addressed to any person and which is (a) delivered to an adult member of the household or his servant, or (b) affixed on a conspicuous part of the premises in respect of which the tax is to be imposed, in any case where such adult member or servant refuses to accept the notice or where there is no such adult member or servant on the premises, shall be deemed to have been duly served on that person.
4. No person shall obstruct any assessor or any person acting under the orders of an assessor, in the lawful discharge of his duties.

Markets and Fairs

5. The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any village market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market.
6. Within any market area, no person shall, on any day on which the village market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale any vegetables, fruits, fish, meat or other perishable articles of food at any other place other than the village market:

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to—

 - (a) the sale of vegetables or fruits by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or do not for the purposes of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places;
 - (b) the sale by the licensee of an eating-house or a tea or coffee boutique of ripe plantains or other fruits for consumption on the premises; or
 - (c) the sale of young coconuts by any person

7. Every village market shall be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on such days of the week as may be approved by the Committee.

8. Where the Committee has set apart any portion of a village market for sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—

- (a) sell or expose for sale such article or class of articles in any place in such market other than the portion so set apart; or
- (b) sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in the portion so set apart.

9. A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use and occupation of any stall, seat or space in any village market—

	<i>For a Day Cents</i>
For a stall not exceeding 12 square feet in area	15
For a space not exceeding 12 square feet on the floor	15
For a space not exceeding 12 square feet on the market compound	10
For a square yard of floor space in the fish market	20

10. No person shall use or occupy any stall, seat or space in a village market unless he is the holder of a permit issued in that behalf by or under the authority of the Chairman or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such permit. Every such permit shall expire on the date specified thereon.

11. The fees payable under by-law 9 shall be paid to the Chairman or such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman, and no permit under by-law 10 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fees due from him.

12. The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each village market a notice setting out in English, Sinhalese and Tamil, the fees payable for the use of the premises of such market or any part thereof, and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.

13. Whenever the Committee is satisfied, after consultation with the Medical Officer of Health, that the consumption by the public of any article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Committee, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the Committee may appear necessary the introduction of such article of food to, and the sale thereof in any village market or fair.

14. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any village market—

- (a) the carcase or meat of any animal which has been slaughtered at any place other than a village slaughter house; or
- (b) any article the keeping or sale is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Committee.

Provided that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat or of game.

15. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use or occupy any stall, seat or space in any village market, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

16. No person using or occupying any village market shall—

- (a) behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market, or
- (b) carry on cooking in any such market; or
- (c) remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 6 p.m. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself, or
- (d) damage or in any way deface any portion of the buildings, stalls, lamps or any property of the Committee in or about such market, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market, or
- (e) enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of the market or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind, or
- (f) leave any goods in or about the premises of such market between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. without the special permission of the Chairman; or
- (g) place any fruits, vegetables, meat, flesh, fish or other article of food exposed for sale on any unclean or insanitary surface; or
- (h) expose for sale any article of cooked food, otherwise than in a clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass case.

17. Every person using or occupying any stall in a village market or fair shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a closely-fitting lid or cover and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

18. No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal, or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any village market or fair.

19. No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any village market or any other person appointed by the Committee to superintend any village market or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein in the lawful execution of his duties.

20. The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or alongside the premises of any village market for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into or unloading goods from that vehicle.

21. The Chairman shall give notice, by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the temporary closing of any village market or fair.

Private Markets and Fairs

22. (1) No private market or fair shall be established or held within any market area.

(2) No private market or fair shall be established or held within any area (other than a market area), except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(3) Every licence issued under paragraph (2) shall—

(a) be substantially in the form set out in the Second Schedule hereto,

(b) be subject to the conditions specified therein; and

(c) expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(4) The fee for each licence issued under paragraph (2) shall be fifty rupees.

23. No person shall be entitled to a licence to establish or hold a private market or fair unless the site is approved by the Medical Officer of Health.

24. A licence issued under by-law 22 may be cancelled by a Rural Court on a second or subsequent conviction of the licensee for any breach of any of these by-laws or of the conditions of the licence and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

25. The Chairman may refuse to issue a licence under by-law 22 to any person whose previous licence has been cancelled by a Rural Court.

Unwholesome Food and Drink

26. No person shall keep or expose for sale any article of food or drink which is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.

27. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or the Medical Officer of Health, or the Sanitary Assistant, or any person authorised by the Chairman in writing to seize any article of food or drink kept or exposed for sale, if such article appears to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.

28. Where any officer or person other than a Medical Officer of Health seizes an article of food or drink under by-law 27, he shall place a sample of the seized article in a receptacle and shall, after sealing the receptacle in the presence of the person from whose possession such article was seized, produce that sample with the least possible delay before the Medical Officer of Health or any other Government Medical Officer.

29. Where an article of food or drink is seized under by-law 27, the person seizing such article shall, upon demand of a sealed sample by the person from whose possession the article was seized, place a sample of the seized article in a receptacle and shall after sealing the receptacle in the presence of the person from whose possession the article was seized give that sample to that person.

30. If the Medical Officer of Health who seized an article of food or drink under by-law 27, or the Medical Officer before whom an article of food or drink is produced under by-law 28, certifies such article to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, the Chairman shall cause such article to be destroyed or to be so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human consumption. If the Medical Officer certifies that the article of food or drink is wholesome and fit for human consumption, such article shall be returned to the owner.

31. No person shall sell or expose for sale the flesh of any animal that has died of natural causes or of any disease or by drowning, or has been killed by a wild beast or by the bite of a snake or of a rabid dog.

The Inspection and Cleansing of Drains, Privies, Cesspits, Ashpits and Sanitary Conveniences and Appliances

32. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or the Medical Officer of Health, or the Sanitary Assistant, or any person duly authorised in writing by the Chairman to inspect any drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit, or sanitary convenience in any premises within the village area and for the purposes of inspection to

enter such premises at any reasonable time, and the owner or occupier of such premises shall render all such assistance as may be necessary.

33. The Chairman may by notice require the owner or occupier of any premises within the village area forthwith or within such time as may be specified in the notice, to carry out such measures as may be specified in the notice, being measures necessary to maintain such drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit, or sanitary convenience in such premises in a sanitary condition.

34. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, by notice in writing, to require the owner or occupier of any premises within the village area, within such time as may be specified in the notice, to remove the contents of any drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit or sanitary convenience in those premises or to cause the contents to be removed to such other place, for disposal in such manner, as may be specified.

Disposal of the Bodies of Dead Animals

35. On the death of any animal within the village area, it shall be the duty of the owner thereof, or in the absence of the owner, of the occupier of the premises in which the death occurs, to cause the body of the animal to be buried before the expiry of a period of twelve hours from the time of death.

36. Where any person who is responsible under by-law 35, for the burial of any animal, fails to bury such animal within a period of twelve hours, the Chairman shall cause such animal to be buried, and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered from such person as a debt due to the Committee.

Dwelling Compounds

37. The occupier, or if there is no occupier, the owner of any house within the village area shall keep the land pertaining to such house in a clean and sanitary condition and free of undergrowth and rubbish.

Washing and Bathing

38. No person shall bathe, or wash any animal or article at a communal well, spout, spring, or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

39. Where any place has been set apart by the Committee as a public bathing place or as a place for washing animals and clothes, no person shall use such place for any purpose other than that for which it has been set apart. Provided, however, that a person may wash at a public bathing place the clothes worn by him whilst bathing at such place.

40. No person of one sex shall enter any enclosure at a public bathing place set apart by the Committee for the exclusive use of persons of the other sex.

41. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or who has been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at any public bathing place until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

42. No person shall drive or take any animal to a public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

Gambling, Cock-fighting and Cart-racing

43. No person shall gamble with dice or cards, play any game for a stake or take part in betting of any kind within the village area.

44. No person shall allow gambling with dice or cards, or the playing of any game for a stake in any house, premises, boat, vessel or vehicle occupied by that person or belonging to him or under his control.

45. No person shall engage in cart-racing on any public road or path.

Spring Guns and Traps

46. No person shall set any spring gun or trap without the written permission of the Chairman. The fact that such permission has been granted shall be proclaimed by beat of tom-tom by an officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman.

Public Notices

47. No person shall deface or destroy any notice which is exhibited by order of the Committee.

Disorderly Conduct, Loitering and Use of Abusive Language

48. No person shall loiter in any public road or path, or in any place, after 9 p.m. without a light and without lawful cause. The mere possession of an electric torch or other lighting device, without the light being actually put on, shall not be deemed to be sufficient for the purpose of this by-law.

49. No person shall use abusive language with intent to annoy any person, or knowing or having reason to believe that it is likely to annoy any person, or to cause a breach of the peace.

50. No person shall disturb the public after 9 p.m. by shouting, singing songs, or making any other noise: Provided that nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to affect the rights of the people in the matter of religious ceremonies and orderly gatherings.

The Sale of Spirits

51. No person shall sell to any boy under sixteen years of age, or to any female, any spirit or other intoxicating liquor, or toddy drawn from any species of plam, or any fermented juice of the sugar cane.

Toddy Drawing

52. Every owner or lessee of trees from which toddy is drawn shall, for the purpose of coupling such trees, use not less than six separate, good and sound ropes for the feet and not less than three separate, good and sound ropes for the hands.

53. Each rope used by such owner or lessee for such purpose shall consist of not less than six strands, and at the end of every three months such owner or lessee shall replace each such rope by a new rope of the kind specified herein.

54. The owner or lessee of every latal or coconut tree which is tapped for toddy shall cause any pole that may be used for climbing such tree to be renewed at intervals of not more than four months.

55. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any person authorised by the Chairman in writing, at any time to enter any land whereon trees are being tapped for toddy and to inspect the ropes and other appliances used for that purpose.

Stray Cattle

56. All cattle owners shall tie up or pen their cattle at night, and by day shall tie up or pen or tend their cattle, and if penned shall suspend a stick across the necks of their unruly animals, or yoke them in pairs.

57. The owners of cattle which are believed to have strayed shall forthwith give information thereof to the village headman or to the Chairman.

The Housing and Penning of Cattle, Goats, and Pigs

58. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any cattle, goats or pigs except in an enclosure situated at a distance of fifty feet or more from any dwelling house.

59. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any enclosure for any cattle, goats or pigs so as to be a nuisance to any person residing in the village area or making use of any public road.

60. Every occupier of any premises or building where on or whereon any cattle, goats or pigs may be kept shall cause every part of such premises or building to be thoroughly cleaned from time to time as often as may be requisite.

61. Every occupier of any premises or building whereon or whereon any cattle, goat or pig is kept shall at all reasonable times afford free access to the Chairman or any officer duly authorised by him for the purpose of inspecting such premises or building.

Galas

62. No person shall establish or keep a gala, except on a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.

63. Every licence for a gala shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The licensee shall cause a table of rents and fees leviable at the gala to be written in the Sinhalese language and exhibited in a conspicuous place at the gala.
- (2) The licensee shall not permit any person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to occupy any place in the gala, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- (3) The licensee shall keep the gala in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (4) The licensee shall cause any refuse or rubbish from the gala to be so buried or burned as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.
- (5) The licensee shall maintain order within the gala.
- (6) The licensee shall not permit any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place at the gala.
- (7) The licensee shall not allow any person to keep within the gala any cattle suffering from a contagious disease.

64. The Chairman may suspend any licence for a gala during the continuance of an epidemic, if such suspension is essential in the public interest.

65. No person shall establish or keep a gala within fifty yards of a dwelling house.

66. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of the conditions specified in by-law 63, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Conservancy and Scavenging

67. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such medical officer.

68. If the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such Medical Officer certifies that any cesspit, or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 67) situated on any premises within the area for which a conservancy service has been established is insanitary and dangerous to health, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.

69. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 67 or by-law 68 has been served shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.

70. Every occupier of any premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.

71. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Committee shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.

72. The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than any occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a conservancy fee at the rate specified in the Third Schedule hereto.

73. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine whether constructed or in course of construction, on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by him, to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset, and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of the inspection.

74. Upon the establishment of a scavenging service for the whole or any specified part of the village area, the occupier of any premises situated within an area for which such service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and other refuse from his premises to be deposited in a bucket or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.

75. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 74 shall—

- (1) daily, between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause such bucket or bin to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road; and
- (2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Committee.

76. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 74 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 75.

77. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a scavenging fee at the rate specified in the Third Schedule hereto.

78. The conservancy fee referred to in by-law 72 and the scavenging fee referred to in by-law 77 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Committee or to any person duly authorised by him in writing to collect such fees, on or before the tenth day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fees are due. Provided that when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month, and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman that such premises were in fact not occupied during that month, no conservancy or scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of those premises for that month.

79. The by-laws made by certain Village Committees and published in *Gazette* No. 7,727 of August 9, 1929, and therein called "Rules" are hereby amended in so far as they apply to the Kandapahala village area in Uda Dumbara, by the rescission of by-laws 21, 23, 29, 33, 34, 35, 37 (b), 39, 40, 50 to 53, 58, 62, 63, 65, 67 to 70, 76 to 79 and 85.

(Conditions of the Licence)

1. A table in English, Sinhalese and Tamil of the rents and fees leviable at the private market*/fair shall be exhibited in a conspicuous place in the market*/fair.

2. The licensee shall not allow any person to sell or expose for sale in the private market*/fair any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by, or under any by-law made by the Committee.

3. The licensee of every market*/fair shall take all steps necessary to ensure that fruits, vegetables, meat, fish or other articles of food are not placed on an unclean or insanitary surface.

4. The licensee shall not expose for sale any article of cooked food otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

5. The licensee shall not allow any person who is suffering or has suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, to use or occupy any stall, seat or place in the market*/fair or to expose for sale thereat any articles whatsoever until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

6. The licensee shall keep the premises of the market*/fair clean and free from filth and rubbish and shall cause all sweepings and refuse from the premises to be burned, buried or otherwise disposed of in such manner as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.

7. The licensee shall provide a separate portion of land in or near the premises of the market*/fair for the parking of vehicles.

8. The licensee shall maintain order within the premises of the market*/fair.

9. The licensee shall provide a sufficient number of fly-proof receptacles with closely-fitting lids for the deposit of rubbish and refuse.

10. The licensee shall provide on the premises of the market*/fair a sufficient number of latrines of a type approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

11. This licence may be suspended by the Chairman, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, during any epidemic, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the suspension.

Regulations

1. Every vehicle (except jirikshas carrying passengers) used on any street which is specified in column 1 of Schedule I hereto, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., shall be driven in the direction indicated in the corresponding entry in column 2 of that Schedule, and shall, when halted on any such street, be kept facing that direction only.

2. Every vehicle used on any street which is specified in column 1 of Schedule II hereto shall be driven in the direction indicated in the corresponding entry in column 2 of that Schedule and shall, when halted on any such street, be kept facing that direction only.

3. Where any vehicle is driven or halted on any street in contravention of regulation 1 or regulation 2, the person liable for such contravention shall be the driver of the vehicle.

4. In these regulations, "driver", in the case of a bicycle or tricycle, means the rider thereof, in the case of a handcart or push cart, the person drawing or pushing the cart; and in the case of a jiriksha, the person drawing the jiriksha.

5. The regulation published in *Gazette* No 7,990 of June 30, 1933, and therein called a "by-law", is hereby rescinded.

50. No person shall disturb the public after 9 p.m. by shouting, singing songs, or making any other noise: Provided that nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to affect the rights of the people in the matter of religious ceremonies and orderly gatherings.

The Sale of Spirits

51. No person shall sell to any boy under sixteen years of age, or to any female, any spirit or other intoxicating liquor, or toddy drawn from any species of plam, or any fermented juice of the sugar cane.

Toddy Drawing

52. Every owner or lessee of trees from which toddy is drawn shall, for the purpose of coupling such trees, use not less than six separate, good and sound ropes for the feet and not less than three separate, good and sound ropes for the hands.

53. Each rope used by such owner or lessee for such purpose shall consist of not less than six strands, and at the end of every three months such owner or lessee shall replace each such rope by a new rope of the kind specified herein.

54. The owner or lessee of every ktul or coconut tree which is tapped for toddy shall cause any pole that may be used for climbing such tree to be renewed at intervals of not more than four months.

55. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or any person authorised by the Chairman in writing, at any time to enter any land whereon trees are being tapped for toddy and to inspect the ropes and other appliances used for that purpose.

Stray Cattle

56. All cattle owners shall tie up or pen their cattle at night, and by day shall tie up or pen or tend their cattle, and if penned shall suspend a stick across the necks of their unruly animals, or yoke them in pairs.

57. The owners of cattle which are believed to have strayed shall forthwith give information thereof to the village headman or to the Chairman.

The Housing and Penning of Cattle, Goats, and Pigs

58. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any cattle, goats or pigs except in an enclosure situated at a distance of fifty feet or more from any dwelling house.

59. The occupier of any premises shall not keep any enclosure for any cattle, goats or pigs so as to be a nuisance to any person residing in the village area or making use of any public road.

60. Every occupier of any premises or building where on or whereon any cattle, goats or pigs may be kept shall cause every part of such premises or building to be thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be requisite.

61. Every occupier of any premises or building whereon or whereon any cattle, goat or pig is kept shall at all reasonable times afford free access to the Chairman or any officer duly authorised by him for the purpose of inspecting such premises or building.

Galas

62. No person shall establish or keep a gala, except on a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.

63. Every licence for a gala shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The licensee shall cause a table of rents and fees leviable at the gala to be written in the Sinhalese language and exhibited in a conspicuous place at the gala.
- (2) The licensee shall not permit any person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, cutaneous or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to occupy any place in the gala, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- (3) The licensee shall keep the gala in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (4) The licensee shall cause any refuse or rubbish from the gala to be so buried or burned as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.
- (5) The licensee shall maintain order within the gala.
- (6) The licensee shall not permit any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place at the gala.
- (7) The licensee shall not allow any person to keep within the gala any cattle suffering from a contagious disease.

64. The Chairman may suspend any licence for a gala during the continuance of an epidemic, if such suspension is essential in the public interest.

65. No person shall establish or keep a gala within fifty yards of a dwelling house.

66. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or offender of any breach of any of the conditions specified in by-law 63, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Conservancy and Scavenging

67. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such medical officer.

68. If the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such Medical Officer certifies that any cesspit, or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 67) situated on any premises within the area for which a conservancy service has been established is insanitary and dangerous to health, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.

69. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 67 or by-law 68 has been served shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.

70. Every occupier of any premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.

71. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Committee shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.

72. The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than any occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a conservancy fee at the rate specified in the Third Schedule hereto.

73. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine whether constructed or in course of construction, on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by him, to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset, and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of the inspection.

74. Upon the establishment of a scavenging service for the whole or any specified part of the village area, the occupier of any premises situated within an area for which such service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and other refuse from his premises to be deposited in a bucket or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.

75. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 74 shall—

- (1) daily, between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause such bucket or bin to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road, and
- (2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Committee

76. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 74 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 75.

77. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a scavenging fee at the rate specified in the Third Schedule hereto.

78. The conservancy fee referred to in by-law 72 and the scavenging fee referred to in by-law 77 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Committee or to any person duly authorised by him in writing to collect such fees, on or before the tenth day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fees are due. Provided that when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month, and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman that such premises were in fact not occupied during that month, no conservancy or scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of those premises for that month.

79. The by-laws made by certain Village Committees and published in *Gazette* No. 7,727 of August 9, 1929, and therein called "Rules" are hereby amended in so far as they apply to the Kandapahala village area in Uda Dumbara, by the rescission of by-laws 21, 23, 29, 33, 34, 35, 37 (b), 39, 40, 50 to 53, 58, 62, 63, 65, 67 to 70, 76 to 79 and 85.
