The President said that as a result of laws that are not sensitive to the needs of traditional industries, those industries had collapsed and the lives of those who depended on them had been disrupted.

"Those who engage in industries adhering to the relevant laws should not be allowed to suffer because of a small number of wrongdoers," the President added.

The President made these observations at a discussion held at the Presidential Secretariat on Tuesday (August 18) on the future plans of the State Ministry of Cane, Brass, Clay,

Furniture and Rural Industry Promotion.

"It is necessary that officials be innovative to develop local industries.

Grassroots level issues need to be prioritized. After the implementation of a Government decision at grassroots level, continuous follow up action is also vital. The development of traditional industries which have not received proper attention for long is a task that needs to be carried out according to well-designed plans," the President emphasized.



## Minister calls for mechanism to help poor people seeking jobs in Japan

Labour Minister Nimal Siripala de Silva said yesterday that a certain percentage has to be given to the poor and Samurdhi families when sending skilled Sri Lankans

for jobs in Japan.
"Today, recruitment agencies normally charge around Rs.500,000 from a person who intends going to Japan for employment. Most people are forced to pawn their jewel-

lery or sell their properties to find the required money. People from poor and Samurdhi beneficiary families cannot bear these high charges and will therefore never get an opportunity to seek employment in Japan. Therefore, it is necessary to allocate a certain percentage for these underprivileged categories," the added.

Minister De Silva was speaking at a meeting held with representatives from IM Japan Company and other government approved Japanese Agents who are authorised to recruit trainees for the Technical Intern Training Programme in

The Minister said that charging money for sending people for foreign employment opportunities is against the international labour rules. However, the government can be entrusted with the responsibility of training skilled workers. Eventhough the government appreciates the role play by the private sector in providing foreign job opportunities to Sri Lankans, the system of charging money from the people who seek foreign employment cannot be accepted," he added. We will provide recruiting agencies three months to adopt a new system to carry out this procedure," he added.

A wide range of issues and Cabinet Papers were discussed at this meeting.

Co-Cabinet Spokesman Energy Minister Udaya Gammanpila said that several important decisions related to a new Constitution as well as the 20th Amendment were discussed at the Cabinet meeting.

A decision had been taken to appoint a fivemember ministerial subcommittee to study Cabinet papers and drafts related to the proposed Amendment to the Constitution. Accordingly, a committee comprising

Ministers Prof G.L. Peiris, Nimal Siripala de Silva, Dinesh Gunawardena, Udaya Gammanpila and Ali Sabry, PC, was appointed to submit recommendations on the proposed Amendment to the

Constitution. Power had been granted to Justice Minister Ali Sabry, PC, to propose names for the expert committee to work on the new Constitution. Accordingly, those names are scheduled to be submitted for approval of the Cabinet of Ministers soon.

Ponnambalam made these observations during a debate between Minister Douglas Devananda and Gajendra Kumar Ponnambalam on August 16.

However, the Minister pointed out that this is not the case in the party Constitution at present, where there is no mention of the Federal System and in such a situation, stating that Federalism will be given to people at times of election, amounts to cheating the public.

The UNP which was unable to win a single seat at the recently held General Election only managed to secure a seat from the National List based on the votes it achieved as a whole. However, as the party has so far been unable to nominate a person for the seat, the Election Commission has gazetted the names of the Parliamentarians without two seats, including the UNP member. The Ape Janabala Pakshaya (AJP) too has so far failed to nominate a person for the seat they secured from the National List.

However, the other country's other main political party, the SLFP which established governments from time to time has only one directly elected seat in the Ninth Parliament which is also a significant feature.

The Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) also creates history in the Ninth Parliament which has 145 MPs. However, the Ninth Parliament too shares a common feature with the other previous Parliaments as it comprises only 12 female representatives. Sri Lankan Parliaments have so far not had more than 13 female MPs.

The first sitting of the Ninth Parliament will commence at 9.30 am to elect the Speaker in accordance with Standing Order No. 1 of Parliament. All the new Members of Parliament will then take their official oaths or affirmation before the new Speaker.

This is followed by the appointment of a Deputy Speaker and a Deputy Chairperson of Commit-

Accordingly a four-member committee has been appointed to formally study the irregularities, instances of violating the objectives and procedures of respective institutions, provision of the Banking Act as well as the unproductive activities and

transactions at the Bank of Ceylon, People's Bank, National Savings Bank (NSB), Regional Development Bank (RDB) and affiliated institutions after January 08, 2015.

The committee will also make recommendations to transform

the state banking system into a more people-friendly service. The Committee is chaired by

former High Court Judge Sisira Ratnayake and also includes Charted Accountant Susantha de Silva and retired Additional Auditor General W. Premananda. A representative of the Finance Ministry will serve as the Secretary of the Committee.

Traditional industrialists were worried due to the lack of state patronage. President Rajapaksa said that this was clearly exposed during his visits across the country during the election campaign.

Issues affecting the rural industrial sector including cane, brass, pottery and furniture were discussed in depth. The President emphasized the importance of implementing short-term and longterm strategies to solve these issues to uplift those industries while monitoring the progress regularly. President Rajapaksa instructed the officials to investigate the problems

industrialists encounter in the processes of collecting and transporting clay and to reopen the closed entities which manufactured clay related products.

"Children need to be educated about the importance of traditional industries from a young age. Traditional industry is also an appropriate subject for research dissertations of university students. It can make a considerable contribution to the development of the industry", President stated.

President Rajapaksa highlighted the importance of close coordination between the Provincial Minis-

tries and Line Ministries in the development of local industries and the need to attract the youth to the field. He added that it was the responsibility of the Ministries to which these subjects have been assigned to give professional recognition to the traditional industrial-

"Wetlands that have no agricultural value can be used to plant industrial crops like cane. A large sum of foreign exchange is spent annually on the importation of bamboo sticks used for the production of incense sticks. We can manufacture them locally and stop

foreign exchange being drained to other countries," the President advised the Industrial Development Board.

# Schools reopen with safety measures

After months of closures, the lights have been turned on again in Sri Lankan schools, and students of all grades are walking through their doors once again, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) stated in a press release

"We are happy to note that the reopening of schools was made possible following collaboration of the Ministry of Education with the Ministry of Health. All measures are being put in place to ensure that all students and teachers can safely return to school and continue their learning process," said Dr. Punchi Nilame Meegaswatte, Secretary-General of the

Sri Lanka National Commission for UNESCO. Eric Falt, Director and Representative of UNESCO in New Delhi (which covers South Asia), added: "It is vital that we continue to seize this pivotal moment to open up safer and better schools, and reach the most marginalised. While things may never return to the way they were, we can ensure that the 'new normal' for every child, adolescent, and youth, includes quality learning."

Across the region, there will be continuous efforts to focus on reaching the most vulnerable children, who have likely fallen further behind since the pandemic and who face the greatest risk of not returning to school at all. In the coming months, it is likely that schools in South Asia will reopen and close again as COVID-19 outbreaks reoccur.

With education systems navigating as best they can through this turbulent time, flexibility of decision-making at local levels will be important, so that containment measures can be applied locally if and when outbreaks occur, rather than complete national lockdowns.

In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, UNESCO had earlier launched the Global Education Coalition in March 2020 to ensure that learning never stops even during the lockdown period. Furthermore, the safe reopening of schools has been of utmost priority for all stakeholders.

In this regard, UNESCO, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the World Food Programme (WFP), and the World Bank jointly issued a "Framework for Reopening Schools" in April, to ensure that all students and teachers can safely return to schools.

UNESCO and UNICEF have also continued to work collaboratively with the South Asia Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC), to promote regional cooperation in education and progress towards achieving "Sustainable Development Goal 4: Quality Education for All".

Pending confirmation from member states to the SAARC Secretariat, UNESCO and UNICEF are planning to organise technical consultations focusing on safe school reopening in the region, the continuity of learning, and building back better.

While COVID-19 has disrupted learning for over 430 million children in South Asia, it has also provided a once-in-a-generation opportunity to strengthen the resilience of education systems. In only a few months, there have been significant changes to teaching and learning, which should inspire greater opportunities for change in the future.

# Sri Lanka: The Coronavirus success story in South Asia

s the subcontinent struggles to flatten the Coronavirus curve, with India alone recording 2.7 million cases and taking the third spot in the world, Sri Lanka offers a glimmer of hope in curbing the daily infection rate.

So far the country has recorded 2,893 cases among its population of 21.67 million people.

21.67 million people.

How did the Sri Lankan Government manage to keep the deadly virus at bay?

Early lockdown, a high testing rate and effective social distancing measures have proved to be key for Sri Lanka in their fight against the pandemic and keeping the infection rate low

From March to the end of April, the country had conducted 930 tests per one million people, while its South Asian neighbours had a very low testing rate: Bangladesh (393), India (602) and Pakistan (703)

India (602) and Pakistan (703).

"More than 50 percent of the
COVID-19 cases in Sri Lanka are of
people between the ages of 20 and

mild may be that the lockdown in Sri Lanka started very early," said Razia Pendse, WHO representative to Sri Lanka.

Another major source of support came in the form of The Central Bank of Sri Lanka (CBSL) - it came up with policies for monetary easing from the start of 2020. The CBSL suspended loan payments and launched a concessional refinancing programme of US\$ 27 million (Rs. 50

billion), which is 0.33 percent of the country's GDP, for activities affected by the pandemic.

### **Robust healthcare**

The Sri Lankan Government, led by Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa, also committed 0.1 percent of GDP for quarantine and containment measures, and an additional US\$ 5 million to the SAARC COVID-19 Early lockdown,

Emergency Fund. A Petroleum Stabilization Fund (PSF) was built to utilise the lower international prices of oil. A separate presidential contributory fund was also raised, which is worth US\$ 7.4 million to date.

Apart from all these measures, the Government laid a strong emphasis on the surveillance system to keep COVID-19 mortality at bay.

In light of a remarkable response to the pandemic, health experts from around the world have lauded Sri Lanka's healthcare system, which has already been made a case study for other countries since the 1980s.

For instance, the Rockefeller Foundation's report published in 1985.

described Sri Lanka as a country that has created an affordable healthcare system. In most districts of the country, primary healthcare facilities are within three kilometres for each neighbourhood.

The ease of accessing health facilities, coupled with low cost services, has helped the country improve its public health.

Sri Lanka's robust healthcare infrastructure was one of the main reasons the Government was able to act swiftly to respond to the first calls of

COVID-19 infections.

The Government mobilised health-care workers to closely monitor the pandemic's movement right after the

first case was reported in the country, and they ensured that most COVID-19 suspects are traced in potential hotspots.

"The first case came out in Sri Lanka in the last week of January, after which there were no cases till about mid-March. During that gap, the Government ensured that the public health surveillance was activated to find any cases with respiratory illnesses. Once the cases were identified, we conducted the needed diagnostics so that we were able to rule out any suspected COVID-19 cases," the WHO's Pendse told German news organisation, DW.

# Navy arrests four persons with 807kg of illegal turmeric

Naval personnel attached to the Northwestern Naval Command apprehended four suspects transporting 700kg of illegal turmeric on two dinghies, in the seas off the coast of Daluwa in Norochcholai, on Tuesday, the Navy stated in a press release.

Later that day, Naval personnel attached to the North-Central Naval Command also discovered two more sacks of illegal turmeric weighing 107kg that washed ashore on the coast of Vankalai, bringing the total mass of illegal turmeric seized that day to 807kg.

The suspects that were taken into custody have been identified as residents of Kalpitiya who are between the ages of 25 and 58.

They, along with the contraband and dinghies, have been handed over to the Sinnapadu and Jaffna Customs Offices for legal action. Investigations are con-

## A new beginning

arliament will convene today for the first time after the General Election held on August 5 and President Gotabaya Rajapaksa is expected to outline the vision and programmes of the Government for the next five years in his speech to the August Assembly.

It will hopefully be a continuation of the new political culture and dynamism witnessed in this country following his overwhelming victory at the Presidential Election in November last year. He was propelled to power as a result of the public endorsing whole-heartedly his Vistas for Prosperity and Splendour programme that promises a new Sri Lanka for all communities, though it was indeed the majority community that mostly contributed to his stunning victory. A similar pattern was seen on August 5.

Much of the credit for the emergence of this new political dynamism should go to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa. The electorate has essentially given them a massive mandate to effect a change in the current Constitution, which has certain amendments and provisions that impede governance. However, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has appointed a strong Cabinet as well as a team of State Ministers and District Development Committee Chairpersons that can help him 100 percent in his mission even in the face of Constitutional and other obstacles.

Every Parliament needs a strong Opposition, but in this Parliament the Opposition has been reduced to around 60 members, with the Grand Old Party of Sri Lankan politics reduced to just one National List seat. Its place has been taken by the breakaway Samagi Jana Balawegaya. In fact, this is the first Parliament in post-independence history where the UNP-SLFP dynamic has completely changed, with the decimation of both these parties. This has led one SLPP stalwart to comment that the Government itself will have to criticize the Government due to the lack of a strong Opposition. Incidentally, the House will have two former executive Presidents – one is the current Prime Minister while the other is an ordinary MP, at least for the moment.

There are several priorities before the new Parliament. The passing of the 20th Amendment is the main priority, followed by the Vote on Account. One must remember that no new finances (except those from the Consolidated Fund) have been passed since the dissolution of the eighth Parliament. This is essential to fight the economic slump caused by the Coronavirus pandemic. The first step is vital to bolster the country's democratic framework, while the latter will send a clear signal on the new Government's plans for the economy.

The Parliament should also take a firm decision on telecasting its proceedings live. The voters have a right to know about what is going on in the hallowed Chamber and how their representatives are standing up for their needs and aspirations. This is also where the word 'discipline' comes in. With the whole country watching, the MPs will have to guard their tongues, lest they utter unparliamentary words and expletives as some MPs did frequently.

Telecasting the proceedings will give an opportunity for the MPs to express their ideas before the entire nation, a task in which several Members of the previous Parliament failed miserably. It is hard to believe, but many MPs have not spoken at all in Parliamentary debates. This time, political parties should encourage all their MPs to speak up. This Parliament has more than 60 new mainly young faces and shorn of previous political baggage, they should be able to contribute more positively to debates. Moreover, there are many professionals from all parties in the new Parliament whose knowledge and skills will be invaluable in the task of nation building.

The Parliament that we see on television is only half the story. The bulk of the work of the Legislature happens behind closed doors in the various Consultative Committees (these sittings are not usually open to the press). More Members must strive to join these Committees and make a positive contribution to the governance process.

We have seen that during certain debates on less interesting subjects, more than half the chairs in the Chamber are empty. In fact, officials are often compelled to ring the "No Quorum" bell as MPs desert the House in droves at certain times. Party leaders must impress upon their charges the importance of attending Parliamentary sessions regularly. This should apply especially to the young MPs who can learn a lot by participating actively in the debates and committees.

Old timers among us bemoan the fact that the "glory days" of Parliament are long gone, when brilliant orators mesmerized audiences with their intelligent and witty remarks. For the first time in many decades, we have a new Parliament and a new political equilibrium that can equal, if not surpass, those days of yore. The 225 Members should not squander this opportunity at all costs.

# A Legal Perspective: Corporate Governance and Banking Sector

Part 3

### Monetary Law Act No.58 of 1949 (MLA)

In order to promote a safe and sound financial system MLA empowers the CBSL to undertake the regulation and supervision of banks. Sections 28 to 32 of the MLA have granted general powers to CBSL to establish the Department of Bank Supervision, undertake examination of banking institutions and to suspend or restrict businesses of banking institutions. In specifying the functions, the authority and powers of a separate department (Bank Supervision Department) the Exter Report states that "banking is an economic activity which affects the public welfare to an unusual degree; it touches in one way or another almost every phase of a country's economic life. Sound banking is essential to healthy and vigorous economic activities. Supervision of banks helps to protect the public against mis-management, bank failures and loss of confidence in the banking system".

Section 86 of the MLA enables the CBSL to grant extra ordinary loans or advances secured by any assets specified by the Monetary Board (MB) of the CBSL, to commercial banks in periods of emergency or of imminent financial panic, which directly threaten monetary and banking stability. This permits the CBSL to perform its function as the lender of last resort in financial crises. Section 98(1) of the MLA enables the CBSL to provide facilities of clearance of transactions among commercial banks operating in Sri Lanka. This provision in the MLA has been further strengthened by the Payments and Settlements Act in 2005.

## Banking Act No.30 of 1988 (BA)

Banking Act (BA) as amended is an Act (i) to provide for the introduction and operation of a procedure for the licensing of persons carrying the business of accepting deposits and investing such money; (b) for the regulation and control of matters relating to such business; and (c) to provide for matters connected therewith. In terms of

section 2 and 76A of the Banking Act. a company can carry on business as a commercial bank or a specialized bank only under the authority of a license issued by the MB with the approval of Minister of Finance. Sections 2 to 5 of the BA sets out the licesing procedure, including the requirements to be comply with in submitting the application for a license and the criteria to be considered in accessing the suitability of the applicant. Section 19 and section 76G of the BA require licenced commercial banks and licensed specialized banks respectively to maintain as capital an amount not less than that specified by the BM with the concurrence of the Minister of Finance. Further banks are also required to maintain their capital adequacy ratio (CAR) above the minimum requirement stipulated by the MB. CAR is the ratio of a banks' capi-

tal to its risk weighted assets. Banks are vulnerable to liquidity problems, both from institutions specific and systemic point of view. Therefore, the ability to provide liquidity to the customers is essential to maintain customer confidence. Most banking transactions or commitments have implications for banks liquidity. Thus banks are required to maintain part of their assets in the form of liquidity assets as specified by the MB (Sections 21 and 76J of the BA). Any commercial bank that fails to maintain its statutory liquid assets ratio above the minimum requirements will be subjected to a charge on the amount of the deficiency. Banks are required to prepare and furnish financial statements in respect of each financial year in accordance with the format specified by the MB within a

specified period. In terms of provisions of sections 42 to 44 and 76H of the BM, the directors and the senior management of licensed banks should be fit and proper persons and their appointments should be approved by the Director of Bank Supervision. The criteria for accessing the suitability is given in the Act, which also provides the procedure to be followed in granting such approval or rejecting an appointment including submitting written objections to the MB in case of rejection. It is requirement that a Director or an employee of one bank cannot be director of another bank, unless the other bank is a subsidiary or an associate of the first

Thus banks are required to maintain part of their assets in the form of liquidity assets as specified by the MB (Sections 21 and 76J of the BA).

mentioned bank. (Section 42 (3)(a)). Except any foreign bank that does not have the word 'bank' 'banker and banking' in any language in its name, all licensed banks that carry on business in Sri Lanka should use the word bank or any of its derivatives, transliterations etc in their names (Section 16). No other company firm, individual or a group of individual can use the word bank in its name without the prior written approval of the MB. The restriction on the use of word bank is essential to prevent the general public from being misled by unauthorized deposit mobilizing institutions as such name gives the impression to the general public that they are being licensed and supervised by the CBSL.

In terms of section 76A of the BA the business of accepting deposits of money investing and lending such money should be carried on only by commercial banks and specialized banks licensed under the provisions of the BA; finance companies registered under the Finance Companies Act; co operative societies registered under the Co-operative Societies Law No.5 of 1972; building societies incorporated under the National Housing Act and any organisation established primarily not for the purpose of making profit which accept deposits only from its members that has obtained the approval of the MB to accept such deposits, lend and invest monies so accepted. Although the CBSL is continuing its efforts to educate the general public on the dangers of depositing / investing money in unauthorized

institutions, gullible members of the public and those who are greedy for higher interest income, deposit with these institutions and are getting into difficulties. They seek redress from the Regulator or the Government only when they realize that their savings have disappeared.

The BA restricts the forms of the business that a licensed commercial bank and or licensed specialized bank could carry on to those specified in Schedule II (Section 3 (9)) and Schedule IV (section 76D (2)) of the BA respectively. Further section 17 places restrictions on the commercial banks' investment in any other company by way of subsidiary or otherwise. Section 46 (1) of the BA grants powers to the MB to issue directions to commercial banks regarding the manner in which any aspect of the business of such bank is to be conducted in order to ensure soundness of the banking system. Similar powers are given to the MB in respect of specialized banks in terms of section 76J (1) of the Act.

Despite efforts by the Central banks, financial crises have continued to return in different forms requiring ongoing vigilance by the regulator - CBSL. Moreover, the task of maintaining financial system facility has become more difficult over time because of the changing structure of the financial system in particular, the new and complex products which have been facilitated through technological innovations. The rising importance of market-based finance is leading to several significant changes in the banking industry in Sri Lanka and elsewhere. Banks are

changes in the banking industry in Sri Lanka and elsewhere. Banks are expanding their operations into other areas through subsidiary companies and related companies, which include trading, market making, insurance, investment banking, stock-broking and risk management products for themselves and others. Banks and financial institutions have now formed into larger conglomerates with unseen links with their subsidiaries and affiliates using complex products, which require effective conglomerate and consolidated supervision by the regulator - CBSL. While the banking industry is still the largest holder of credit market obligations in Sri Lanka, lending has spread into new areas like credit cards, real estate construction and securitization activities.

he stunning results of the Parliamentary elections in Sri Lanka on August 5 are likely to break the prophecy of President Junius Jayewardene – in whose term, his party United National Party's (UNP) victory of 5/6ths majority, resulted in the Constitution of 1978 – that no mortal will be able to dismantle it.

In the Proportional Representation system, a two-thirds majority is deemed unlikely if not impossible. The newly-minted Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP), under two-time former President and three times former Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa, has achieved that feat by winning 18 of 22 districts with nearly three times more votes than its nearest rival Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB), a breakaway faction of the INP

That SLPP would win the election was never in doubt after it swept local elections in 2018 and the landslide election of President of Gotabaya Rajapaksa, Mahinda's younger brother, in 2019. Another Rajapaksa brother, Basil, who strategised the election, had predicted 130 seats - but Mahinda was confident of cobbling the twothirds number to install a strong government to replace the 'revolving door' system. Even the parliamentary success in 2010, after winning the war against the militant Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) in 2009, was not as astounding as the present achievement. The election was free and fair and with least violence under the COVID-19 cloud. India can draw some lessons from its conduct for its own elections later this year and next year.

## President Gotabaya's track record

It is the margin of victory – 151 seats with allies and two thirds majority - that is surprising. This is the first time that two brothers are President and Prime minister after the Kaczynski twins in Poland scored that rarity in 2002. The SLPP slogan - a two thirds majority for a strong Government – was multiplied by UNP absenteeism and dismal performance of the UNP and SLFP Unity Government which saw rampant corruption, mis-governance and the Easter Sunday terror tragedy. The electorate was attracted to SLPP by the decisive image of two war-winning brothers whose manifesto was couched in Sinhala Buddhist ideology.

The record of President Gotabaya, through his military style of governance during six months of his term, although in a constitutional vacuum – no Parliament and Caretaker Government – was nothing short of stupendous, though as a former Army Colonel he was accused for militarising government institutions.

He established several task forces led by the military and concentrated all intelligence and operational powers under his charge. The President, it was alleged, was running the Government with two other Gajaba Regiment mates, the CDS and Army Commander, Lt Gen Shavendra Silva and Defence Secretary Maj Gen (retd) Kamal Gunaratne, whose division bumped off Prabhakaran near the Nandikadal lagoon on May 19, 2009. Gotabaya's trust in the army and the military's handling of COVID-19 pandemic was the illustration of his belief in military order, discipline and efficiency This display of effective Governance has proved a balm following the Islamic terrorist attacks inspired by ISIS in 2019.

The two grand old parties, SLFP and UNP have been wiped out – SLFP winning just one seat and that too from the Tamil stronghold Jaffna and the UNP surviving in name by one seat secured on the National List. Another surprise was the change in voting pattern among minority Tamils and Muslims in the North and the East, many of whom voted not for the traditional TNA but other Tamil parties linked to the Government. The main Opposition will now be SJB led by Sajith Premadasa, son of former President Ranasinghe Premadasa.

The Cabinet has five Rajapaksas: Gota-

# Why India must 'Win Back' Sri Lanka

baya, Mahinda, Chamal, the eldest brother; his and Mahinda's siblings Shasheendra and Namal, the last two as junior ministers. The Rajapaksas sought a two-thirds majority in order to repeal 19A – the 19th Amendment to the Constitution – which, according to the brothers, was meant to victimise their regime, prevent their re-election (a a third term for Mahinda as President), and ensure a weak and unstable Government.

19A, which was passed in 2015 with just one dissenting vote – has sought to take

away some powers from the President and redistribute them to the Prime Minister and the Parliament. It is believed that totally repealing 19A will be difficult. The Rajapaksas are also considering a new Constitution which was half-heartedly attempted by the previous Government. The worry for India is the effort to erase 13A, a commitment that has appeared in most joint statements – though New Delhi is unlikely to press Colombo for its implementation

The Rajapaksas have always favoured development to devolution.

The priority for the Government is to revive the economy which former Finance Minister Mangala Samaraweera has described as the "worst situation since independence". While Sri Lanka was growing for the last decade at around 5.7 percent of the GDP it has declined to negative – 3 percent recession. Remittances and tourism, the life blood of the economy, have plummeted due to COVID-19. Job-creation is another major task for the government. The country's total debt is US\$ 55 bn, which is 80 percent of GDP. Of this, the debt to China is around US\$ 5 bn plus other repayments to China Development Bank.

This year, Sri Lanka has to repay US\$ 2.9 bn. Colombo has requested New Delhi for two currency swaps and debt deferment. A US\$ 400 mn swap under the aegis of SAARC has been realised, and a US\$ 1.1 bn swap is being negotiated. India has provided a line of credit of US\$ 450 mn of which 50 mn is a grant for counter-terrorism.

Maintaining internal security and social cohesion will be a top concern for the Government. Sri Lanka has seen all shades of radicalisation: Sinhalese extremism through two JVP uprisings, Tamil revolt by LTTE, and Islamic fundamentalism during the Easter Sunday attacks. Protecting Muslim, Tamil and Christian minorities against Sinhalese majoritarianism will be paramount.

India has two strategic neighbours: Nepal in the north, and Sri Lanka in the south. Kathmandu seems to have slipped out of New Delhi's control for the time being with a Communist government enjoying overwhelming political mandate under Beijing's patronage. India is worried about losing Sri Lanka – which could return under China's spell – with the Rajapaksas back in power. Patching up with the Rajapaksas is thus vital for strategic security concerns after Mahinda accused India of 'involvement' in his 2015 electoral defeat. Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi kept some eggs in Mahinda's basket and met him twice when he was out of power.

So when Gotabaya was elected President, India's Foreign Minister S. Jaishankar made an air-dash to Colombo to invite him to New Delhi. Now even before election results have been declared, Modi has gone ahead and congratulated Mahinda for successfully conducting the elections, and his victory. Sri Lanka's veteran diplomat Austin Fernando observed: "Roles have been reversed. Previously, Sri Lanka's leaders used to flock to New Delhi to seek its blessings." Indian ambassador Gopal Baglay became the first foreign envoy to meet Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa before his swearing-in, and invited the Rajapaksas to be the first guests to fly to the new Kushinagar (final resting place of the Buddha) international airport once an air bubble is created.

### India - Sri Lanka ties

Although India was not a factor in the elections, it has been at the receiving end of Sinhala Buddhist nationalism. This is sometimes attributed to the Chola complex which has diminished after the comprehensive defeat of the LTTE and the reduced strategic relevance of India, but residual anti-India sentiments linger. India's inability to provide Sri Lanka with war-fighting stores due to the Tamil Nadu factor during the war, brought in both Pakistan and China who became willing suppli-

Still, the brothers have acknowledged India's assistance (Gotabaya calls it 'managing India' and Mahinda recognises New Delhi's moral and material support) in winning the war. The revived Sinhala nationalism is manifest in the resistance to India's participation in operating Sri Lanka's national assets like Eastern Colombo Terminal in Colombo port, Mattala airport and Trincomalee oil tank farms, even as these are under G to G agreements with past governments. The ISLA embargoes use of Trincomalee harbour by a foreign power inimical to India.

The defence and security ties are comprehensive with a multi-layered tri-service interaction and strategic dialogue. Colombo is privileged to be allocated more than half of India's military training programme vacancies for foreign countries. Along with Maldives, the two countries share a trilateral maritime partnership. India's red lines cross the use of Trincomalee-Colombo-Hambantota ports as military facilities for its adversaries, given that Sri Lanka sits across vital sea lanes of communication accessing the Malacca Straits – known as China's

China pledged US\$ 500 mn loan for fighting COVID-19 and gifted a Type 053 frigate (a class of Chinese ships).

China's support is vital for Sri Lanka in the UNSC over human rights issues, especially when 10 human rights organisations recently targeted it for authoritarianism and militarizing institutions. Pakistan is also a long-standing security partner, and Sri Lanka has always posted a military officer as its High Commissioner in Islamabad. Clearly, Sri Lanka's economic requirements will drive its foreign policy for the foreseeable future.

The assurances given to India over its security concerns are real, given New Delhi's record of interventions across the Palk Straits. Still, India needs to create more strategic space by enhancing outreach to the powerful Buddhist clergy and appointing BJP MP Subramaniam Swamy – who is especially close to Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa – as a special envoy for Sri Lanka.

## **Future of Education is here**

here are moments vhen the world has no choice but to together. Those moments become historic turning points. This is one of them. We are now faced with the greatest education emergency of our time. Over one billion children are out of school. The COVID-19 pandemic has created an unprecedented crisis of such magnitude and depth that the next generation might neither have the capacity and tools, nor the will, to rebuild – let alone build back better.

The world has not planned well for the future. At its worst, education has for too long been underprioritized, and at its best, has been viewed as just one among many competing priorities. Before COVID-19, the funding gap for education in low-income and middlelow income countries - many already plagued with extreme poverty, weak infrastructure, armed conflicts, climate-induced disasters and forced displacement - amounted to \$148 billion. This funding gap is now estimated to increase by up to one-third.

COVID-19 has laid bare our collective failure to prioritize education. "The pandemic has exacerbated inequalities and magnified the global learning crisis. The future of an entire generation is at risk,"

warned United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres when launching his Policy Brief on Education earlier this month, "The COVID-19 pandemic has created the largest disruption of education systems in history."

### **Out-of-school children**

The number of out-of-school children who may never set foot in a school again is now rapidly escalating. An estimated 30 million children and youth are of immediate concern, according to UNESCO's assessment. In a letter to the international community, UN Special Envoy for Global Education and Chair of the Education Cannot Wait's High Level Steering Group, Gordon Brown, together with 275 world leaders, politicians, academics and civil society, calls for urgent action to address the global education crisis triggered by COVID-19.

In support of the mission of Education Cannot Wait, they state: "We cannot stand by and allow these young people to be robbed of their education and a fair chance in life. Instead we should be redoubling our efforts to get all children into school – including the 260 million already out of school and the 75 million children affected by protracted conflicts and forced displacement, including 35 million children living as refugees or internally – with the

comprehensive help they need – and to make it possible for young people to start or resume their studies in school further and higher education."

Similarly, the *Geneva Global Hub* for Education in Emergencies, composed of UN agencies and non-governmental organisations, has issued an urgent call for firm political action to make financial investments in education for those left furthest behind in armed conflicts,

forced displacement and climateinduced disasters, calling on the international community to "act fast and keep recovery and preparedness in sight."

In the same spirit, the global education community has come together to *Save Our Future*, a coalition composed of the UN, the World Bank and civil society, raising the alarm of an entire generation at risk due to the rapidly escalating learning crisis, as a result of the massive

funding gap, "The Covid-19 pandemic brought about the biggest cataclysm to education any of us have seen!"

On the ground, joint programming supported by pooled funding keeps delivering results. Education Cannot Wait's 2019 Annual Results Report, *Stronger Together in Crisis*, launched on August 11, illustrates that it is possible to deliver quality education to those left furthest behind – provided we come together, politically, strategically, programmatically and financially.

### **Financial assistance**

As the global fund for education in emergencies and protracted crises, ECW's joint investments are rolling out the New Way of Working and ensuring humanitarian-development coherence, bringing together all partners: host-governments, affected populations, UN agencies, civil society, private sector, the World Bank, the Global Partnership for Education, and the International Facility for Financing Education, among others. Stronger together, we share a sense of absolute urgency and uncompromising commitment to results, which is put into action thanks to sustained funding by our strategic donor partners.

As a result, Education Cannot Wait has already reached 3.5 million children and youth since its inception. Yet, the scale and the depth of the education emergency in crisis-affected countries needs to be matched by adequate and scaled up financial investments to end the learning crisis for those left furthest behind, and to swiftly shift the course towards the SDGs. With 20 times more funding, the estimated 75 million children and youth can be reached. Indeed, financing stands between what is possible and what is not for these vulnerable girls and

This truly is the defining moment in our time. There can be no sustainable development goals without education. "Education is a fundamental human right, the bedrock of just, equal and inclusive societies and a main driver of sustainable development," the UN Secretary-General stated at the launch of his Policy Brief on Education, "As the world faces unsustainable levels of inequality, we need education - the great equalizer - more than ever. # INDIA AND PAKISTAN: SEARCHING FOR HUMANITY IN SOUTH ASIA

elations between India and Pakistan have entered a period of darkness, as the Indian and Pakistani governments refuse to engage in any sort of dialogue. The South Asian giants continue to spar over a range of issues, including Kashmir and tense Hindu-Muslim relations. However, this period of silence stands in contrast with that of the South Asian scholarly and academic community, which has worked to bring Indians and Pakistanis together to build bridges.


On August 6, I had the opportunity to attend an extraordinary closed-door event hosted by the Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad, featuring a special lecture by Ambassador Akbar Ahmed with Professor Rajmohan Gandhi as the discussant. The discussion was moderated by the former Foreign Secretary of Pakistan and former Pakistani Ambassador to the US, Aizaz Ahmad Chaudhry. Ambassador Ahmed is best known as "the world's leading authority on contemporary Islam" as quoted by the BBC, and Prof. Gandhi is an internationally-known humanist, author and the grandson of Mahatma Gandhi.

The conversation was attended by numerous Pakistani and Indian scholars, academics, diplomats, and ambassadors. Even as distinguished Pakistani and Indian scholars, both speakers displayed great respect for one another. Prof. Gandhi noted "My good friend, Ambassador Akbar Ahmed Sahib...He is a scholar who seeks in word and deed to be a reconciler...I respect him for this" and Ambassador Ahmed stated that he is "honoered to be conversing with Prof. Gandhi and building a bridge of dialogue with a great scholar." This conversation has come at a crucial time as India-Pakistan relations have nosedived and the countries seem to be reading different pages of different books.

In his lecture, Ambassador Ahmed dove into what he saw as the key issues facing India and Pakistan in this time of what he called, citing the French philosopher Bernard Henri Levy, the age of madness. Ambassador Ahmed split his talk into three portions: madness, hatred, and hope. He first argued that the age of coronavirus is revealing the divisions of South Asian society, as India and Pakistan exist in a bubble of hyper-madness.


This bubble of madness is manifested in the mood of extreme hate and nationalism in India today. As India and Pakistan huff and puff against one another, the possibility of nuclear engagement is very real. With the addition of the United States and China in South Asia, there are now four nuclear

armed nations rubbing up against each other in and around the Kashmir region.

Ambassador Ahmed continued his argument with the belief that this age of madness comes from a period of hatred in South Asia. The Hindu population sees historical humiliation of Muslim rule for centuries in the subcontinent, while the Muslim population sees the continued Hindu prejudice and violence against Muslims in India. This reality creates a paradigm of fear and deep division between South Asian Hindus and Muslims. Ahmed argues that the harsh lockdown in Kashmir, Hindutva lynching of Indian Muslims, and the Citizenship Amendment Act all make Muslims second-class citizens in their own

Even though the founders Gandhi and Nehru promoted religious coexistence, their vision of a pluralistic India is quickly fading. With today's news, it may seem that Hindus and Muslims are nothing but enemies, but Ahmed believes that this is an incorrect reading of history. Ahmed spoke of his time with

Hindu scholar Nirad C. Chaudhuri, ex-Supreme Court Judge V. R. Krishna Iyer and numerous other Hindus as his personal warm and welcoming experiences with Indian Hindus. While this idea of hope was based off of personal accounts, it demonstrates that Indian and Pakistanis, Hindus and Muslims, can foster genuine relationships. The headlines of India and Pakistan of today do not paint a complete picture of Hindu-Muslim relations, and this discussion between Prof. Gandhi and Ambassador Ahmed exemplifies exactly

Concluding his lecture, Ahmed ended on one note: the India and Pakistan that we see today are not Gandhi's and Jinnah's visions. Both nations have evolved away from their founding vision into something much harsher and uglier. Following the lecture, Prof. Gandhi opened by saying that Ahmed "has been franker about India's departure from Gandhi and Nehru, than about Pakistan's departure from Jinnah." He firmly agreed that both India and Pakistan have moved away from their founding vision. Prof. Gandhi said that he wants to praise the "silent servants" in both India and Pakistan who speak out and protect the marginalized minorities and the weak, as both governments have failed to do so.

Prof. Gandhi exclaimed that "the megaphone has been seized by merchants of hate" in both nations. However, similar to the sentiment from Ahmed, this seizure does not tell the whole story of Hindus and Muslims in

South Asia. Many Indians and Pakistanis wish to come together - as this event is an example of exactly that. Prof. Gandhi finished his talk with the discussion of Lord Ram, to which he claimed "Ram is a loved name for the unborn, undying, and all merciful all mighty, called by different names by anxious human beings all over the world.'

The dialogue has already had a significant impact in South Asia. Leading Indian politician and intellectual Sudheendra Kulkarnj has said that: "Reading your article on Nayadaur.tv, based on your recent lecture in Islamabad, gave me great joy. It is full of wisdom, as all your writings are...These are depressing times for India-Pakistan and India-China relations. But we must persevere. The idea of Shanti and Salaam, which you have so persuasively explained in your article, is bound to win. We must continue our duty, firm in our conviction that God Almighty will someday show the right path to the peoples and rulers of countries in South Asia."

In this period of tense relations between the governments and the people of India and Pakistan, two South Asian scholars of opposite sides were able to come together for a civil discourse on not only India and Pakistan, but on the greater implications of Hindu-Muslim relations. Both Prof. Gandhi and Ambassador Ahmed urged more South Asians to reach across to the other side and learn more about each other in an effort of bridge building and dialogue.

This conversation between two esteemed scholars highlighted the many reasons why I chose to study South Asia. Firstly, more work has to be put in to avoid a nuclear war. Though not many Americans realize it, four nuclear powers are now one skirmish away from possibly firing a nuclear weapon. Secondly, at their very best, India and Pakistan showcase what is so important in a democracy and the lessons that we can learn from Gandhi and Jinnah. Both Pakistan and India envisioned nations where the rights of all were protected, regardless of religion or class. Gandhi and Jinnah had a vision not seen in many other world leaders, and those of us in the West can greatly learn from their vision. Lastly, I aspire to learn more about both India and Pakistan, as the United States is a firm ally of both nations. However, with the current environment of zero dialogue, the American bilateral relationships in South Asia are endangered. Ambassador Ahmed and Prof. Gandhi shed light and hope on all three of these issues, offering perspectives from both sides.

At the end of the day, this period of hostile silence between India and Pakistan is not sustainable. These honest conversations between Indian and Pakistani civil society leaders are an excellent place to begin in the resumption of dialogue. India and Pakistan should take this call for dialogue and humanity from Ambassador Ahmed and Prof. Gandhi very seriously, as they are setting an excellent example. Both speakers projected hope for the future of the region and faith in the humanity of its people. Without dialogue, an uglier more violent confrontation could easily become a reality in South Asia.

# TAKING WING WITH GOLDEN MEMORIES

hilst engaging in my morning walk at a playground, I came across a smart tall gentleman. His stature resonated a military background. Being curious, I popped the question "Are you retired from the Forces?" The old man smiled and said "Yes. I worked in the Royal Ceylon Air Force.'

Two days later, I visited the resi-

dence of Ivor Malcolm Kwesius, one of the last-surviving burghers of "vintage Ceylon" who served in the Royal Ceylon Air Force (RCyAF). At 73 years, he has a good memory and said, "Son, I was born in March 1947. Ceylon was so different then. I completed my schooling at Arethusa College, Colombo-6. We lived in Dehiwela. I had applied to join the Navy and Army. One night, I heard an announcement in the Radio Ceylon asking for young men to enlist in the RCyAF. The year was 1971 and I was 24 years old. I did not tell my family about the interview and quietly took the bus to Slave Island. Already there was a line of about 500 men. I waited for three hours, and a corporal directed me to the interview desk. Squadron Leader Rex Fernando asked me some questions. I had played cricket, soccer and did athletics. My height gave me the edge and I was asked to come the next day. I remember 255 men were selected. On the second day, our certificates were checked and on the next day, we passed the medical examination."

We paused our conversation as tea was served by his wife. Ivor continued, "We went to Katunayake in six buses of recruits. We were taken to be "kitted"- getting into uniform. The man in charge was Flight Sergeant Bastians. We made new friends on the bus. We reached the large camp. Air Force food was excellent. They served beef steak and ice coffee for dinner. The rice and curries were

also good. Our uniforms were slate grey in colour. Our pack held the mug, plate, groundsheet, and boot webbing. We were enlisted for ground operations. Three days later, we hit the road to Diyatalawa. We reached there by 1700 hours and it was cold. Our billets (large dormitory) had 30 beds. Each morning we got up at 4 am to shave and be ready for the inspection. Flight Lieutenant C.A. Direckze was a stern officer and always swooped in on us. By 6 am, we had the PT run. Breakfast was served at 7 am, bread and eggs with beef. Our classes took place from 8 am. The discipline was strict. We engaged in weapons drill using the .303 rifle. We had to do a nine-kilometre march from Pattipola to Diyatalawa. After one month, we had a passing out parade. Wing Commander A.B. Soza was the chief guest. That night we had an awesome party. We got drinks with short eats given kindly by the Welfare Branch."


He explained, "Two days later, we headed to our jungle training in Hambantota. I enjoyed the sunshine in comparison to the salubrious hills of Diyatalawa. We were trained by the late U.L.A. Gunasekera and our Commanding Officer was Squadron Leader Mark

Seneviratne. We were trained daily. Our hands and legs were pricked by dry thorns. We crossed rivers. After one month, we had another demanding nine-kilometre endurance march. We were proud to wear the Eagle Rose badge. At the end, we had another stunning dinner party."

Ivor was then sent on active duty. He recalls, "The subversive insurgency had begun. I was posted to the Ridiyagama Camp (previously under the Army). We had lots of night duty. To relax, I did some fishing on the weekends. After six months here, I was trained in the armoury and posted to Katunayake. My girlfriend Rita was living in Trincomalee (Her father was in the Navy). So I got a kind transfer to China Bay, one of the best camps. Here due to my English, I was taken into the Air Force Police and I carried a .38 Smith & Wesson pistol. By now, we were SLAF. One night a wild elephant came into the camp. He was near our duty point. We froze and were silent; thank heavens the elephant walked away. I remember a smart young cadet called Roshan Gunathileke and I am very proud that he became the Air Force Commander years later."

The jolly burgher gent remembers guarding the RAF Avro flight which had flown the Queen to India. The aircraft was kept at Katunayake for few days. He said, "Our fleet was slowly growing. We had the Cessna, Sky Master, Herron, Riley and Jet Provost aircraft. Today I see many modern planes and helicopters."

Ivor Kwesius married Rita and had three daughters. Since leaving the SLAF, he served the British High Commission for many years. Still standing strong, he concluded "My training in the Air Force was the best foundation. I cherish those golden years. I wish the SLAF continued success,"

# U.N. PAYS TRIBUTE TO AID WORKERS

**SWITZERLAND:** The United Nations paid tribute Wednesday to humanitarian workers now battling the COVID-19 pandemic after a year in which they found themselves under greater attack than ever before.

The UN marked its World Humanitarian Day by remembering the 125 aid workers who were killed in 2019, and the hundreds of others who were wounded or kidnapped.

'The UN condemns these attacks, and it calls for accountability for perpetrators and justice for survivors. Relief workers cannot be a target," said OCHA, the UN Office for the Coordination Humanitarian Affairs.

According to the Aid Worker Security Database compiled by the Humanitarian Outcomes research group, major attacks

They are responding to the global crisis of COVID-19, and with it the massive increase in humanitarian needs from the fallout of the pandemic.

They are the unsung heroes of the pandemic response -- and they all too often risk their own lives to save the lives of others."

World Humanitarian Day is held on the anniversary of the August 19, 2003 attack on the UN compound in Baghdad which killed 22 people. - AFP

## Pakistan to conduct Chinese COVID-19 vaccine trials

**PAKISTAN:** Pakistan regulators have already approved final-phase testing of a Chinesemade vaccine against the coronavirus, officials said Tuesday, in the country's first ever clinipart, NIH said. 'This will be the first cal trial of its kind.

According to Pakistan's National Institute of Health (NIH), regulators have approved the testing of a vaccine under development by CanSinoBio and the Beijing Institute of Biotechnology China.

The medication is undergoing Phase 3 trials -- or largescale testing on humans - in China, Russia, Chile and Argentina. Saudi Arabia will also take

trial for any vaccine in Pakistan," the NIH said in a statement. Pakistan's inclusion in the trials would help it secure "preferential vaccine supply and pric-

ing", it added.

The trials will be conducted at several medical facilities across Pakistan, including the large Indus Hospital in Kara-

"Hopefully we will come out with the vaccine within three to four months," Abdul Bari, who heads the Indus Hospital, told AFP.

The coronavirus has claimed more than 6,000 lives in Pakistan but cases have been dropping for several weeks. - AFP

## Goa to crack down on revellers

**INDIA:** The Indian resort state of Goa is cracking down on revellers throwing illegal, drug-fuelled parties as coronavirus cases climb in the tourist hotspot, a government minister said Tuesday.

The coastal region has long been a magnet for backpackers and other travellers drawn to its scenic beaches and easygoing vibe, but the pandemic has meant that large get-togethers are now banned.

Lots of bars and restaurants are also unable to operate after many workers fled the state for their home villages when India imposed a strict lockdown in late March.

The partying has not stopped, however -- including in private villas, stone quarries and at secret locations in the jungle involving thousands of dollars' worth of drugs, according to local media.

Azgaonkar warned revellers on Tuesday that the good times are over.

"These parties are happening ille-

## Lebanon reimposes lockdown

**LEBANON:** Lebanese authorities on Tuesday announced a new lockdown and an overnight curfew to rein in a spike in coronavirus infections.

The new measures will come into effect on Friday and last just over two weeks, the interior ministry said, adding that they would not affect the cleanup and aid effort following the devastating August 4 Beirut port blast.

A daily curfew will be imposed from 6:00 pm to 6:00 am.

Malls will be closed and restaurants restricted to delivery, with curtailed operating hours. Social gatherings will also be banned. The airport will operate normally and ministries will be staffed at half capacity.

## France makes masks compulsory at workplace

masks compulsory in the workplace from next month, the government said Tuesday as it moved to add open-plan offices to a growing list of places where people must cover up to halt the quickening spread of the coronavirus.

By the time people in France return to work after the August summer holidays, masks will be required gear in all shared, indoor work spaces, including meeting rooms, corridors, change rooms and open-plan offices, Labour Minister Elisabeth Borne told AFP.

Borne met labour and business representatives Tuesday to discuss the new measure, which she said was based on the advice of the government's public health council.

It took into account a growing scientific consensus that the coronavirus is transmitted not only in large drops projected when a person coughs or sneezes, but also in smaller ones that

Since a two-month lockdown ended in May, new infections have been increasing in recent weeks and the numbers of people admitted to hospital and to intensive care have been rising as well.

As fears mount of a second infection wave renewing strain on France's hospital system and economy, the government is reminding people to keep practicing social distancing.

French President Emmanuel Macron on Monday urged the nation to be vigilant "in the face of an accelerating"

## Biden formally nominated as Trump's Democratic challenger

**US:** US Democrats on Tuesday nominated Joe Biden as their 2020 Presidential candidate, formally designating the Washington veteran as the party's challenger to incumbent President Donald Trump in the November election.

In an unprecedented roll call vote that took place entirely online due to the coronavirus pandemic, all 50 states and seven territories announced their vote tallies that cemented Biden's role as the party flagbearer.

"Well thank you very, very much, from the bottom of my heart," a beaming Biden said in a live video link as he celebrated the nomination.

"It means the world to me and my family," he added, reminding viewers he will deliver a formal acceptance speech on Thursday at the conclusion of the four-day jam-The nomination was a formality as he had already won the majority of the more than 3,900 delegates back in June.

The roll call came on Day 2 of the mostly virtual Democratic National Convention aimed at celebrating the party's candidate and welcoming independents and frustrated Republicans into their political movement to oust Trump from the White House.

The proceedings included a series of presentations by party leaders past and future who unleashed their own arguments against the White House incumbent and urged voters to rally around Biden.

The lineup featured President Jimmy Carter, who served one term from 1977, and 1990s Commander-In-Chief Bill Clinton, who warned that the Trump White House is swirling with chaos instead of the competence neces-

sary to address the nation's crises. "At a time like this, the Oval Office should be a command center. Instead, it's a storm center. There's only chaos," Clinton said.

"Just one thing never changes his determination to deny responsibility and shift the blame,' Clinton said. "The buck never stops there." The President faced a barrage of criticism on opening night too, most notably from former First Lady Michelle Obama who said Trump lacks the character and skills for the job. Later Tuesday on a visit to battleground state Arizona, Trump knocked Obama for delivering taped remarks. "Thursday night I'm doing it live," Trump said, referring to his speech next week when he formally accepts his party's nomination at the Republican convention, which has also shifted online.

Trump said he has chosen the White House South Lawn as the location, after saying in recent weeks that he would pick between the Presidential mansion and the historic battlefield at Gettysburg.

Delivering such an obviously political speech from the White House will stir substantial controversy, as Presidents are required to separate their campaigning from taxpayer-funded governing. In addition to Clinton and Carter, Tuesday's lineup featured Jill Biden, who has been married to the candidate since 1977. In their appeal to middle-of-the-road voters and frustrated Republicans the convention featured a video of the unlikely friendship between Biden and late Republican Senator John McCain, narrated by his widow Cindy McCain.

Republican former Secretary of State Colin Powell also delivered videotaped remarks in which he endorsed Biden and said he shared the Democrat's values.

# Malian President resigns after military mutiny



he Malian President Ibrahim Boubacar Keita has announced early yesterday (Wednesday) that he is resigning from his post saying that he does not wish blood to be shed due to a military mutiny that plunged the country into a political cri-

Yesterday, certain parts of the military have decided that intervention was necessary. So due to that fact, the people have started to hold mass protest. President Keita said in a brief statement that he does not wish blood to be shed and decided to resign. The statement was broadcast on national television. But so far it is unclear whether the Military is now officially in charge of the country.

On Tuesday afternoon, President Keita and Prime Minister Boubou Cisse were detained by soldiers in a dramatic escalation of a month's long crisis in the country. When the escalation developed, soldiers took up arms and carried out a mutiny at a key base in Kati, 15 kms away from the capital Bamako.

The Economic Community of west African States (ECOWAS) and countries in the West African region along with former colonial power France and the European Union, denounced the actions of the soldiers and warned against any unconstitutional change of power. Further, another announcement by the regional alliances of the West African states are closing its borders and will impose sanctions as the crisis continues. United Nations Secretary General Antonio Guterres Condemned the arrest of President Kaita and members of the government. The UN Security Council

cuss the current situation in Mali.

Mali's long conflict, in which ideologically motivated armed groups have stoked ethnic tensions while jockeying for power, has spilled into the neighbouring countries of Niger and Burkina Faso, destabilizing the wider Sahel region and creating a massive humanitarian crisis.

Earlier on Tuesday, Opposition protesters gathered at a square in the capital Bamako in a show of support for the soldiers, whilst foreign embassies advised their citizens to stay indoors. Meanwhile, Mali's coup leaders pledged new elections to resolve a spiralling political crisis in the fragile West African nation. The coup's leaders appeared on televi-

will hold an emergency meeting to dis-sion hours later to pledge a political transition and new elections within a "reasonable time". Malian Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff Ismael Wague said he and his fellow officers had "decided to take responsibility in front of the people and of history".

Mali's neighbours warned against any unconstitutional transfer of power as the coup unfolded on Tuesday.

The United States and France also released separate statements voicing late last month, but stuck by Keita. deep concern about the turn of events and urged against regime change.

Mali is the linchpin of French-led efforts to roll back jihadists in the Sahel, and its neighbours are anxious to avoid the country sliding into chaos. Swathes of

its territory are already outside of the control of the government, which is struggling to contain an Islamist insurgency that first emerged in 2012 and has claimed thousands of lives. The failure to end that conflict fuelled frustrations with Keita's rule, analysts say.

Tensions flared in April when the government held a long-delayed parliamentary election, the results of which are still disputed. ECOW-AS last month suggested the formation of a unity government while sticking by Keita, but the compromise was bluntly rejected by the opposition.

Mali has been in the grip of a deep political impasse since June, with President Keita facing increasingly strident demands for his res-

The opposition June 5 Movement, named for the date of its first protest, has been channelling deep anger over a dire economy, perceived government corruption and a brutal jihadist conflict.

The opposition alliance's anti-Keita campaign veered into crisis last month when at least 11 people were killed over three days of unrest that followed a protest. In an effort to avoid chaos in notoriously unstable Mali, ECO-WAS then stepped in to mediate.

But the June 5 Movement has repeatedly spurned compromise proposals, and has continued to demand Keita's departure. The political opposition declared a new phase of anti-government rallies on





# "Gender parity could boost global economy by \$ 28 tn"

Sri Lankan women make half of what their male counterparts do in employment.

This is above regional peer Bangladesh wherein women make \$.12 for every \$1 their male counterparts do but less than India where women make \$.64 for every \$1 their male counterparts make.

Women are also less likely to establish themselves as entrepreneurs and if

they decide to join wage labour, they are underpaid. 1 in 25 female wage earners are employed within domestic work.

67.1 million people are involved in domestic work. 81.5 percent of domestic workers are female. 11.5 million domestic workers are international migrants. 74.3 percent of the international domestic workers are female.

Professor of Economics University of Peradeniya Dileni Gunawardena detailed these figures at a Centre for Banking Studies lecture held on 18 August.

Female labour is also likely to be time-poor. Time poverty is a measure of the amount of time one has outside their employment and female workers work on average more than their male counterparts.

Nobel Laureate Amartya Sen estimates that every year 4 million women are missing from the population. This phenomenon is caused by sex-selective abortions, female infanticide, and inadequate healthcare and nutrition for female children. It is argued that technologies that enable prenatal sex selection, which has been commercially available since the 1970s, are a large impetus for missing female children.

It is estimated that if the world moved to be in line with gender parity there would be an additional US\$ 28 trillion to the global economy.

If regional countries were just to match the best regional peer in terms of gender parity there would be an additional US\$ 12 trillion to the global economy.

Gunawardane called on stakeholders to realize the importance of unpaid work in the economy. Globally women are less likely to be property-owning than males. Women may also be limited from achieving their full economic potential by their husbands.

Gunawardane tracking male and female incomes found that women tend to have a pivotal shift downwards in their earning potential after the birth of a child.

This is not the case for their male counterparts. Globally female labour force participation in the period from 1990 to 2013 has remained stagnant near 50 percent while in South Asia, it has declined from 35 percent to 30 percent.

# Exchange rate, foreign reserves at comfortable position - First Capital

Sri Lanka's economy contracted by 1.6% in the 1Q2020, as against a 3.7% growth in 1Q2019, prompting flag off concern, as the negative growth was ahead of the COVID-19

"We expect that the impact of COVID-19 disruptions will be felt much more in the 2Q 2020, as it continued to spread throughout the country since mid March 2020," First Capital Research in its 'Pre-Policy Analysis' for August 2020 said. Moreover, decline in global demand for the country's exports and delays in raw material procure-

ment, and no tourist arrivals due to travel restrictions further heightens the risk of lackluster GDP growth concerns for 2020E.

Despite continuous reduction in market interest rates (by 198bps from 9.38% on March 6 to 7.40% in August 7) credit extended to the private sector contracted significantly in May 2020 (Rs 70 bn) and Jun 2020 (Rs 54 bn) due to the impact of COVID-19 while YTD credit growth remains muted at 0.62%.

"However, we expect private credit to gradually pick up only towards 4Q2020 amidst the reluc-

tance to lend due to sluggish economic conditions. Nevertheless, a further rate cut is likely to induce a support for a quick recovery by accelerating credit which is believed to be the govt's current need of the

SL's exchange rate and foreign reserves remained at a much more comfortable position by July 2020 in the midst of USD 400 mn currency swap and with the exchange controls including import restrictions. We believe a comfortable external front reduces the detriment in providing further easing in policy rates.

Despite the improved liquidity position, yields in the secondary market witnessed a slight increase with moderated activities as market participants followed a wait and see approach amidst the upcoming policy review. "We believe a further policy cut would be required to sustain the yields at current levels in line with the low interest rate environment."

With the reduction of SRR by 300bps and further money printing by CBSL, liquidity position reached Rs 182 billion nearly one and half months high. However, despite the

significant SRR cuts since the onset of COVID-19, credit growth has been deteriorating thus inquiring the ability of further easing policy rates to stimulate the demand.

With the expected recovery in economic activities we believe that monetary policy easing can manifest in demand pull inflation.

"However, if private credit picks up at an accelerated level and if import restrictions are relaxed towards the later part of the year, that can create a situation of an overheated economy thus creating inflationary pressures."

The first vessel of the series is scheduled to be delivered in 18 months and the subsequent vessels will be delivered in 4 months intervals.

Amidst the negative impacts from last year's Easter Sunday incident and currently facing COVID-19 pandemic, it showcases the successful marketing efforts carried out by CDPLC in a challenging environment. CDPLC has been targeting the European market extensively, especially for the construction of Eco friendly Bulkers, Cable Laying and Repairing Vessels, Service Operation Vessels, which are in demand and CDPLC is extremely confident of serving these emerging requirements in Europe with the capacity and experience CDPLC has gathered over the past four and half decades of shipbuilding expertise.

## PMI expands in July

Reflecting that manufacturing activities are gradually approaching the pre-COVID levels with the normalization of business activities, the Manufacturing PMI continued to expand in July 2020 recording 64.6 mainly due to the expansion in new orders and production sub-indices.

The new orders and production sub-indices expanded, yet at a slower rate, benefitting from new orders received in July 2020. Meanwhile, employment remained expanded in line with these developments. The Stock of purchases expanded at a higher rate due to intended accumulation of stocks for future productions, anticipating higher demand with the normalization of economic activities.

The suppliers' delivery time continued to lengthen, at a slower pace, during the period. Respondents highlighted that the restrictions imposed on importation of certain categories of goods adversely affected some manufacturing activities.

Services sector continued to expand for the second consecutive month with PMI reaching 51.4 in July 2020. This was underpinned by the expansions observed in new businesses, business activities and expectations for activity compared

to June 2020 indicating a further recovery in the services sector, which was affected by COVID-19 pandemic.

New businesses, particularly in the areas of financial services and insurance sub-sectors improved in July2020, with the gradual recovery in economic activities.

Business Activities in most of the sub sectors expanded during the month indicating abroad-based recovery in service activities. With the rise in financial facilities granted, business activities in the financial services sub-sector improved in July 2020 compared to the previous month.

Employment continued to decline in July2020 for the sixth consecutive month owing to halt in new recruitments. Further, backlogs of work declined in July 2020 since most of the firms are operating under a usual working environment.

Meanwhile, the global manufacturing PMI recorded a value of 50.3 in July2020 with an increase of 2.4 index points from June 2020.Manufacturing PMI of Eurozone, UK, China and USA expanded at a higher rate while Russia and India remained contracted in July2020 with the adverse impact of COVID-19.

## "Govt given specific mandate to change Constitution"

The Professionals' National Front (PNF) has taken it upon itself to organize a public commission to help the government deliver on the people's views to the new constitution. The PNF notes that 'until now, only a few legal experts and NGOs serving foreign interests have participated in legislation. Therefore, the opportunity has arisen to obtain a new propeople constitution for the country.'

Secretary PNF Engineer Kapila Renuka Perera said that as with ETCA and MCC, the broader organizations to which he is associated have always looked to improve transparency in the legislative process.

The Professionals National Front expressed these views on August 19 at the Organisation of Professional Associations to which it is affiliated.

Dr. Sarada Kannangara said that the 1978 constitution was drafted by foreigners and in the interest of concentrating power with certain individuals. Dr. Kannagara noted that the PNF will continue to act as a pressure group in the interests of the broader population. The PNF has not yet studied the Port City Agreement. ## Piramal Glass Ceylon posts Rs 1.33 Bn in Q1- F21

Piramal Glass Ceylon PLC released its results for the first Quarter of FY 2020-21 with Rs. 1,330 million of revenue and a loss of Rs. 44 million, as against the revenue of Rs 1585 million and profit of Rs.21 million during the similar period of the previous year.

The Company commenced operations in a phased out manner and was back to 100% operations by the third week of May 2020, resulting in a loss of sales revenue of Rs 700 million.

During the months of April and May 2020, sales were subdued in the domestic market as customers who were manufacturing only essential products were functioning and that to a tient 50% consists.

ing and that too at just 50% capacity.

From June 2020, the domestic market demand stabilized and international markets opened up for business. The Domestic sale stood at LKR 938 Million as against LKR 1,162 million of the similar quarter of



the previous year, reflecting a de-growth of 19%.

Non-availability of vessels for India, USA and East Africa impacted export performance, but at the same time a spurt in demand for food jars from Australia and New Zealand helped to compensate. The Export sales for the quarter were almost at par at LKR. 393 million as against LKR 396 million during the corresponding quarter of last year.

The Management firmly believes that with the New Product Development and inroads into new markets such as Mexico, Angola and Indonesia as well as the increased demand from Australia, PGC will be able to sustain the ongoing operations profitably. ## **New Cinnamon processing centre at Training Academy**

The Cinnamon Training Academy (CTA) has commenced construction of a cinnamon processing centre or so-called "Bought Tree Factory" (BTF) at Kosgoda, recently.

The laying of the foundation stone took place at the CTA with the participation of Frank Hess, Head of Cooperation, EU Delegation to Sri Lanka and the Maldives, Dr. Jairo Andres Villamil-Diaz of the United Nations Industrial **Development Organization** (UNIDO), Saman De Silva, Chairman of the Balapitiya Pradeseeya Sabha, the Southern Provincial Council in the Galle district, Ms. B. P. S. Anuradhi, Divisional Secretary Balapitiya, Ministry of Home Affairs, Dr. G Jayasinghe, Director, Department of Export Agriculture, and the Board of Directors of the CTA, including Sarada De Silva, Chairman.

The CTA is expanding its existing training premises by adding a cinnamon processing centre with the objective of optimizing their performance and financial sustainability.

The new addition will generate year-round income, particularly during the harvest season when the demand for training is lower and the demand for processing is higher. The processing centre would



purchase cinnamon trees at farm gate, removing the need for a middleman, enabling upstream value chain actors, particularly smallholders in Balapitiya, Karandeniya and Ambalangoda to achieve a higher margin on their products. Foreseen to be fully operational

by the year's end, the cinnamon processing centre will generate 20 new jobs and more than 100 indirect job opportunities. The cinnamon processing centre will have a processing capacity of 24,000 cinnamon trees with an output of 1,350 kilos of processed cinnamon per month in two harvesting sea-

sons.At its full capacity, the cinnamon processing centre could generate an additional sales revenue of Rs. 2.7 mn per month for the CTA.

In his welcome speech, Saradade Silva congratulated the chief guest, Dr. Ramesh Pathirana, the former Minister of Plantation Industries and Export Agriculture, for his recent reappointment to Parliament and honoured him for his service and contribution to strengthening Sri Lanka's agricultural exports, particularly for the cinnamon industry.

De Silva also recognized the financial support of the EU and the technical support of UNIDO towards the construction of the cinnamon processing centre, which takes place within the framework of the EU-Sri Lanka Trade-Related Assistance project co-implemented by UNIDO and the International Trade Centre.

As the Guest of Honor, Frank Hess underscored other milestones for the CTA supported by the project, such as the achievement of the accreditation of National Vocational Qualification (NVQ) by the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission (TVEC) for offering NVQ Level 3 and Level 4 trainings serving the cinnamon industry as well as the approval by TVEC on national competency standards (NCS) and NCS-based curricula on cinnamon field and factory operations

NVQ-certified trainees typically see a 20 to 30 percent increase in productivity, which ultimately lowers production costs, and, as a nationally recognized system for granting of tertiary education, facilitates achievement of higher education. Beyond the CTA, the project also supported value chain development for the spice sector, writ large, including on pursuing Sri Lanka's anticipated first-ever geographical indication (GI) product, Ceylon Cinnamon. Under the technical guidance of UNIDO and partnership of the Sri Lanka Export Development Board, a GI application has been lodged with the EU.

Based in Kosgoda, the CTA was established in 2013 to meet the cinnamon industry's need for technically competent cinnamon processors. The CTA was a result of a public-private partnership between UNIDO, the World Trade Organization's (WTO) Standards and Trade Development Facility (STDF), and the Spice Council (TSC) of Sri Lanka and was also supported by the Government of Sri Lanka though the EDB. The CTA develops vocational skills and competencies for the cinnamon production and manufacturing industry. It trains actors along the cinnamon value chain to increase production capacity, to facilitate compliance with international food safety standards, and to stimulate employment in the cinnamon

## **Condominium industry faces threat**

Attorney-at-Law and Condominium Consultant Kapila Gamage, calls attention to an adverse force that is currently affecting the condominium industry, the submission of caveat notices for ongoing projects. Below are his thoughts on how it has impacted the property developers as well as buyers.

The condominium developers of Sri Lanka are being terrorized by a new kind of threat that is smothering the continuation of the industry in addition to other limitations that developers currently face.

A group who has made it a practice to blackmail condominium developers with the threat of submitting caveat notices for planned projects has been breeding in the recent past. As a result, many condominium projects have experienced prolonged legal processes, immensely endangering the progress. The submission of a single caveat can bring 10 to 15, or in certain instances, 100 to 200 transfers of properties to a standstill.

A property developer has to undergo a rigorous approval process from a series of regulatory bodies, including the Urban Development Authority, Local Government Authorities, Condominium Management Authority and several others before registering the Condominium property in the relevant Land Registry. Once the approvals and clearances from all these institutes are obtained, and the Condominium Deed of Declaration is submitted to the Land Registry, the so-called Caveat notice becomes a major barrier to the developer, and is fast becoming a regular occurrence.

Since all registered Sales and Purchase Agreements become un enforceable, due to registered Caveat Notices, all transfers of apartments to the purchasers who had paid in full, come to a halt. The rest of the buyers who are prepared to pay the balance through Bank loans also become helpless as the banks deny issuing loans.

Property developers are also unable to continue loan repayments and face unwarranted interest rates as a result while having no faultfrom their end. As the prices of the projects are already agreed and finalized with the buyers, the developers cannot increase the unit prices in order to cover this additional cost.

The ease in which a caveat can be registered has made this situation lucrative for a group who have transformed it into a means of business through pure extortion.
According to the Section No. 26 of Registration ofDocument Ordinance, a caveat has to undergo proper inspection prior to registra-

However, in a letter sent to the Attorney General by the Registrar General, dated February 19 2020, practical limitations have been cited as the cause of not being able to conduct substantial investigations. Even though the letter states that the Registrars of Lands have been notified regarding the same, there does not seem to be any inspection in reality.

Condominium developers are facing a loss of millions of rupees as a result of a Caveat Notice that can be registered for a mere Rs. 2,500. The simple solution given to the affected is to file a case in the District Court, which is a time consuming and drawn-out process. Property developers are drowned in debt as interests continue to add to their borrowings. Also the Condominium property developers have to continue to pay unwarranted interests and potential buyers face longer waiting periods to claim ownership unless this matter is sorted out.

# ICC, IOM launch Covid19 guidance for migrant workers

The International Chamber of Commerce (ICC) – the institutional representative of more than 45 million companies in over 130 countries. And the International Organization for Migration (IOM) a related UN Organisation released last week employer guidance for measures to protect migrants during COVID-19.

Migrant workers are a crucial part of the global work force, accounting for 3.5% of the world's population, according to IOM. Worldwide, micro, small and medium sized enterprises (MSMEs), rely upon migrant workers, including sectors providing essential commodities and services, as well as industries hard-hit byCOVID-19.

As the economic and human consequences of COVID-19 continue to shape local communities, businesses can play a decisive role in addressing the unique challenges faced by migrant workers.

Migrant workers are susceptible to jobless, salary cuts and various health and safety concerns. Unlike local populations, migrant workers often are far from family support networks. They face language and/or cultural barriers and often lack social protections. Many suffer from discrimination. Meanwhile, overseas economies that rely on financial contributions from migrant workers-especially low and middle income countries face a steep decline in cross border remittances. In response, ICC and IOM have published a set of guidelines for employers highlighting the private sector's role in addressing the specific challenges of migrant workers during the COVID-19 pandemic. The guidance includes a set of general principles for employers such as treating all workers with 'equality, dignity and respect' not withstanding their gender or migratorystatus. This guidance is presented in five categories: physical and mental health, living and working conditions,

economic support, ethical recruitment and supply chain transparency commitments. ICC Secretary General John W.H. Denton said"COVID-19 has exposed and heightened existing in equalities within our global economic system, including the daily challenges faced by migrant workers around the world," further he noted that "By establishing inclusive policy responses, businesses can assure the health, wellbeing and safety of all employees, while at the sametime, lay the foundations for a more resilient economic recovery." The International Chamber of Commerce (ICC) is represented in Sri Lanka by ICCSL. Dinesh Weerakkody Chairman ICCSL noted that the guidelines will be shared with the ICC member network in Sri Lanka.

## ADB to hold second stage of 2020 annual meeting as virtual event

The first stage of the 53rd Annual Meeting comprised a reduced-scale meeting of the Board of Governors on 22 May at which Governors approved ADB's financial statements and net income allocation in line with ADB institutional require-

Queried on what excites him about his work, Talal says that he firmly believes that the only way for the economy to develop is through entrepreneurship development.

The more entrepreneurs we have, the more jobs they will create which leads to the growth of wealth. Being involved in entrepreneurship development makes my work exciting as I believe it will change the lives of many for the better," he quipped.

Talal notes that the most memorable moment in his career was when he was among the roundtable discussion at Chatham House London.

"I was actively taking part to formulate policy recommendations to the G7/G20 working alongside esteemed global figures such as Dorothy Tembo (Executive Director - International Trade Center) and other global industry leaders from the World Bank, Goldman Sachs and Ernst & Young. It felt good to know that my ideas were taken onto the world stage to the leaders of the most powerful countries in the world. Another significant moment in my career was when the University of Oxford got in touch with me and was considering having

me as a guest speaker on entrepreneurship. Unfortunately, it was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic but if and when that happens, I would consider that a great milestone to speak at the University of Oxford,'

Talal is currently working with Chatham House London on "Leveling the playing field for women entrepreneurs". He says they are formulating policy recommendations to the G7/G20 and the private sector to empower women entrepreneurs.

"One of the recommendations I suggested specifically was to have business accelerators for women owned businesses as women entrepreneurs face many challenges when it comes to scaling the business. We find that most women entrepreneurs are at the micro level and when it comes to ownership of the largest companies, the percentage of women owners are much fewer. I am also a writer for Forbes where I write on entrepreneurship focusing on gender equality," he added.

Speaking about the concept of remote working which he advocates Talal notes that the concept of the modern physical office space came about because of the industrial revolution where there was a need for people to be in the same place for two reasons: documentation and communication. With today's technology, documents can be shared online and communication can be done from far away.

'The question is why are we still having office spaces? Why do people have to spend hours in traffic going to and from the office when this time can be spent with their families? As I am working on the issue of gender equality in the workplace, I believe that remote working will be beneficial to women. One of the main reasons women do not have a level playing field in the workplace is because of family commitments. Most women choose to take time off their careers when they cannot keep up with 9 to 5 being in a physical office. Some even choose different careers when they leave

universities because of this. Remote working will help women in the workplace. I think it is high time, companies allow their employees to work from home whenever it is possible and evaluate employees based on their performance rather than on the amount of time they spend in an office," he

An Old Boy of Colombo International School, Talal later flew to UK for higher studies. He worked in London for a short stint before returning to his motherland and co-founding a few startups as an entrepreneur before getting involved in the development sector in entrepreneurship development. His father, Rafi Rasid, was the greatest inspiration in his life. He was a businessman who had an attitude of taking on any challenge.

Talal strives to develop entrepreneurship on a national level to help drive social change for the betterment of Sri Lanka. His goal is to promote entrepreneurship with a focus on innovation as Sri Lanka has a very talented workforce.

"We need to brand ourselves better. We were number one on Lonely Planet but we do not get the highest number of tourists. We have amazing talent in this country and we need to build a national brand. People buy German products because of the powerful brand of German manufacturing which gives an advantage to any German entrepreneur over others when it comes to exporting. We need to build a national brand for Sri Lanka so whatever field you work in, try to be the best," he stressed.







- □ Lay your index fingers lightly on the top parts of your cheeks, right on top of the muscles and directly under your eyes. Relax the cheek muscles, allowing them to return to their original, relaxed posi-
- □ Smile again with the corners of your mouth to lift the cheek muscles back up. Visualize pushing the muscles up toward your eyes as you smile. This is one cheek lifter "push-up." Do 10.
- On the last rep, hold your cheek muscles up as high as you can. Imagine your cheeks are moving up from your face toward the ceiling.

Hold this position for 20 seconds. Release and relax.

### □ Repeat this sequence three times. Forehead Smoother

This exercise trains the muscle that extends from the eyebrows to the upper forehead, which can smooth the lines on the forehead and lift the eyebrows.

- □ Place your index and middle fingers across your forehead at the hairline. Press the entire length of those fingers down firmly onto your scalp, then slowly slide your fingers down your forehead toward your eye-





very election ends with a unique feature or two. The 2020 General Election is perhaps the most notable one as it was held amid COVID-19 crisis. The globe is still fighting with the pandemic. An economic lockdown has become the talk of the town. Deterioration of health is becoming a global phenomenon. Sri Lanka, however, exercised the supreme authority of sovereignty five years right after they exercised the last.

The 2020 General Election elected a host of new faces. The chosen team also includes National List MPs to represent sovereignty. The National List exists primarily to introduce professionals from varied fields resembling the 'House of Lords' tradition.

Professor Charitha Herath, a National List MP nominated by the Sri Lanka Podujana Party (SLPP), fits the bill. He has been a long-standing figure instrumental in formulating the policy framework of the SLPP, the ruling party of Parliament. Professor of Philosophy at the University of Peradeniya, Herath has held several administrative positions including Secretary to the Ministry of Mass Media and Information and Chairman of Central Environmental Authority.

In an interview with the Daily News, the parliamentarian maintains that the mandate given by the public in faith of the executive must be respected and revered by the legislature

"The incumbent Executive President was elected to office just a few months ago. However, he required a strong legislature to implement the pledges he made in his election manifesto. That requirement had been brewing for months. Although President Gotabaya Rajapaksa led administration in his own inimitable manner, quite competently, he had to face many a crisis owing to the lack of a strong legislature. The voter turnout indicates that the people have been eager for this election," Professor Herath notes.

### MOST OVERWHELMING OCCASION

COVID-19 was an unavoidable phenomenon. The public nevertheless wanted to exercise their sovereignty to strengthen the executive president they elected to office a few months ago. The SLPP reached for the masses with two approaches: reforms in governance and development drive.

Under the 1978 Constitution, the public has exercised sovereignty with much keenness on three occasions. The United National Party received 125 seats leaving the SLFP to 67 seats in 1989. In 2010, it was the then President Mahinda Rajapaksa's prospect to win 144 seats for his United People's Freedom Alliance government leaving 60 seats for the United National Front. In the third, the most over-

whelming occasion, nation has handpicked 145 seats for the SLPP leaving the main rival to mere 54 seats.

"On both previous occasions, 1989 and 2010, the requirement for a new constitution did not emerge. The Rajapaksa government gave prominence to the development drive while introducing certain amendments to the Constitution."

The SLPP's pledge for 2020, however, sought ground for a new constitution. The mandate given, therefore, also speaks for the requirement of a new constitution.

Professor Charitha Herath compares the current situation to the 1970 Ceylonese Parliamentary Election when Sirimavo Bandaranaike pledged that a new constitution will be introduced making Sri Lanka a republic. Until the Bandaranaike government introduced the 1972 Constitution, Sri Lanka was ceremonially a colony headed by a Governor-General who represented Queen. Sirimavo Bandaranaike's Sri Lanka Freedom Party alone secured 91 parties and could well form a government with the allied parties. The main rival, United National Party, headed by Dudley Sirisena shrank down to 17 seats.

### **ABOVE DISTORTIONS**

"The Constitution we have today is 40 years old. Worse, it has been amended 19 times. For example, the thirteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth amendments have occurred during different governments. The Constitution as a whole seems a distorted law now. It has led to a certain crisis."

The thirteenth amendment, in 1987, established Provincial Councils. The seventeenth amendment, in 2001, made provisions for the Constitutional Council and Independent Commissions. The eighteenth amendment was brought forward by the Rajapaksa government in a bid to remedy the incongruities in the previous amendment. It proposed the appointment of a parliamentary council that decides

the appointment of independent posts like commissioners of election, human rights, and Supreme Court judges. Then the Sirisena-Wickremesinghe government introduced an antithesis by way of the nineteenth amendment to replace the defunct seventeenth amendment establishing the Independent Commissions. It also removed the Executive Presidential powers and limited the term of office of the President to five years.

In Professor Charitha Herath's reading, the 2020 mandate has two parameters. The public seeks a developmental change, for one. On the other hand, governmental reform is the need of the hour.

"Now why do the people want a developmental change? It is not really because of COVID-19. Various globalised situations had an impact on the local development drive. But we need to take development to another level. This does not mean that market capitalism should be wiped out. But we need to reach a level where the state and market collaborate. It is beyond the public-private partnership. The government, state and the private sector have the path ahead to move forward. So we need a fresh approach to development."

The SLPP went to the masses with developmental and reformist approaches. The nation has accepted it. The major challenge before the elected is how they could deliver the developmental approach. That involves the govern-

ing system. That is where the reforms in governance are necessary.

"But we need to keep in mind that the people do not want both changes simultaneously. It is important. Most governments fell in trouble in terms of development because of the present governing system. Most statutes, acts and regulations are ancient and expired. That's why we cannot move forward. The previous government had no members who could think anew. They thought the foreign countries will

come for salvage. But it did not happen. And

they did not want to do anything either.'

### **BROAD DISCOURSE**

A fresh twentieth amendment (not the proposed bill to hold all provincial council election on the same day) is within reach according to Justice Ministry. It will be followed by a broad discourse on the new constitution. Most warped issues owing to the nineteenth amendment will be sorted out.

"We accept the two-thirds majority with respect and reverence. We give a big thankyou to the public for having faith in us. An opportunity such as this is possible only if the public has faith. At the same time, we treat this power as a huge responsibility. That was not given to us on a silver platter. We earned it the hard way. If the same constitution prevails, no one will likely secure such power once again. This is a critical period. We accept the requirement for an amendment. The amendment will be known in the future. Using this power, we will implement our social contract with the people through Saubagye Dekma manifesto. We are going to bring that forward."

Professor Charitha Herath views three major duties of a Parliamentarian representing the ruling party. First, they should actively engage in the process of policymaking and lawmaking. Second, they should be aware of the Parliamentary responsibilities such as public finance. Third, they should assist in the executive governance of Prime Minister and President.

"As an active policymaker and a lawmaker, a legislator should be well-read. We are 225 representatives who cannot just idle around. We need to examine statutes made on behalf of the country. That's our first effort to be a good legislator. Public finance is a core responsibility of Parliament. Parliamentarians must oversee the matters of public finance such as monetary deficiencies. Auditor General works with Parliament directly, not only with the government. Parliamentarians of both government and Opposition sit at committees such as COPE."

Professor Herath also notes that he looks forward to supporting the President and Prime Minister with their executive rule and ministerial administration. His administrative, as well as academic experience, will come in resourceful.

"As a fresh Parliamentarian, I would dedicate my time to the major three factors I have mentioned."

The public has delivered their part. They have chosen a team. Professor Charitha Herath MP, on the other hand, is quite hopeful that the chosen team can deliver too.

## **VOICE OF THE PEOPLE**

emocracy and Parliament. Two words that define the way we govern and the way we are governed. Democracy means "Government by the people; a form of Government in which the supreme power is vested in the people and exercised directly by them or by their elected agents under a free electoral system". The word comes from Middle French démocratie<Late Latin démocratia<Greek démokratía or popular government. The Greeks were the first to practice direct democracy, where everyone in a village or town had a say in the affairs of the governing council. However, as cities became larger and populations expanded, this model could no longer work.

Hence the establishment of Parliaments. The use of this term was first recorded in 1250–1300; Middle English: "discourse, consultation, Parliament," from Anglo-Latin Parliamentum. Thus both these words and concepts have a fairly long history around the world.

### **IDEALS OF DEMOCRACY**

Sri Lanka had a monarchy for centuries, though there is ample evidence that the kings listened to the voice of the people. Some kings went incognito to villages to inquire into the well-being of the villagers. This was a rudimentary form of democracy. But as the ideals of democracy swept the world, Sri Lanka too received such institutions along with Universal Franchise. In fact, Sri Lanka was one of the first countries in Asia to grant women the right to vote, whereas even some Western democracies granted this right several decades later.

Parliament has become the forum for the public to raise their voice through the representatives they elect. It is where the Members of Parliament gather to make and pass laws and finances – hence the term lawmaker for MP. The governing party initiates this process with inputs and criticism from the Opposition benches. This is how democracy works - by consensus and also constructive criticism.

Sri Lanka, along with India, holds another distinction. Sri Lanka has

maintained democratic and civilian Governments throughout, while the other South Asian countries with the exception of India and Bhutan have seen military takeovers. There was an attempted coup in Sri Lanka in the 1960s, which was nipped in the bud, thus saving democracy and the people's franchise. There is no doubt that Sri Lanka will maintain this tradition of Parliamentary democracy for centuries hence.

The concept of democracy is so ingrained in our psyche, to the point we almost take it for granted. But it has been challenged before – the Southern insurgencies of 1971 and 1988-89 as well as the war in the North and the East. There was, in fact, one attack on Parliament itself - by a Leftist insurgent in 1987, in which a minister was seriously injured. Democracy in Sri Lanka has survived and thrived in spite of such challenges and obstacles. It is the duty of the people as well as the newly elected Parliamentarians to protect it at all costs.

A word about the Parliamentary edifice itself. When the Government of the day realized that the then Parliament at Galle Face was not adequate to conduct the affairs of the State, a unanimous decision was reached to construct a new building at the newly declared capital of Sri Jayawardhanapura Kotte. Given that it essentially had to reflect nuances of local culture and ethos, there was only one architect on everyone's mind - the incomparable Geoffrey Bawa. He rose to the occasion and designed a building that possibly no other Parliament in the world has. Built on an island in the middle of the waters of the Diyawanna Lake, the Parliamentary complex incorporates local design and cultural elements throughout. The Chamber itself is an unrivalled assembly hall that truly deserves the moniker August Assem-

But not even the world's most iconic or most beautiful building can become significant if it does not serve a purpose. Parliament is a sprawling complex with a substantial staff and other resources that costs millions of rupees a day to maintain. A single sitting is estimated to cost Rs.4 million. Therefore it is up to the people to send representatives who



who can actually make a contribution to uplifting the nation.

This is why it is imperative that Members should make an effort to be present in Parliament on all sitting days. In the eighth Parliament, only three Members had attended more than 400 sittings out of the total of 414 sittings held over a five-year period. Most of the others had played truant on sitting days. We as a nation cannot afford this kind of neglect anymore, for those who evade the sittings or do not speak in any of the debates are doing a huge disservice to the very masses who sent them in.

### **BIGGEST CHALLENGE**

The Government should continue the live telecast of Parliamentary proceedings, so that the voters will know how their MPs behave in the House and whether they actually raise their voce on behalf of the voters. They can then reject the MPs who do not make a good impression. (The voters have done exactly that to many former MPs of the eighth Parliament). And the Parliamentary authorities must also publicize the work of the Parliamentary Select Committees, which is where the bulk of the work of a Parliament happens, away from the glare of television cameras and lights in the main

As a new chapter begins today in local Parliamentary history with the ceremonial opening of sessions by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, we hope the experienced as well as novice MPs will rise to the occasion regardless of party and other divisions to save this country from the socioeconomic crisis precipitated by the Coronavirus. This is the biggest challenge facing the country at the moment and there should be a bipartisan agreement on any revival measures that will be presented before the House. It is only through such collective action that we can expect to extricate ourselves from this unprecedented predicament. Sri Lankans are hopeful that the new Parliament will rise to this great challenge and take Sri Lanka to the front ranks of the Asian comcan truly make it a special forum and munity of Nations.

he Ninth Parliament that will meet today will be the first Assembly since 1977 to be elected with two-thirds majority, outright, which is a unique feature indeed. The Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) obtained 151 seats in the 225 Member Parliament while the Samagi Jana Balavegaya ended up with a distant 54.

The UNP was decimated, being unable get a single Member elected but for a face-saving single National List member coming behind even the JVP which obtained three seats. When JR Jayewardene drafted the new Constitution and declared that no party would be able to change the same under the Proportional Representation system it looked as if the prediction of the Old Fox would stand the test of time.

He had reasons for doing so. When the UNP suffered a humiliating defeat and reduced to only 18 seats in Parliament in 1970, it yet secured the largest proportion of votes nationally but it had to stay in the Opposition due to the then First Past the Post system. However, the SLPP managed to do what most believed was impossible securing a two-thirds majority on its own steam, without having to rely on minority parties in this exercise, as in

The Government under Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa will now have the wherewithal to enact a new Constitution and/or Constitutional amendments to introduce progressive changes to the country's supreme law for the good of the nation.

We call this the Ninth Parliament counting from the number if Parliaments that met since the enactment of the Republican Constitution in 1972 which freed the country from last vestiges of domination by the British.

True, the 1956 revolution that ushered in the era of the common man saw ordinary folk enter the hallowed precincts of the Parliament Chambers that until then was thought to be the preserve of the elite. Yet the fetters that bound us to the Whites still remained and these were done away with by the Republican Constitution enacted on May 22, 1972.

Since then the national Parliament had continued to function without let or hindrance bringing in groundbreaking legislation and progressive reforms for the

benefit of the people. The traditions and norms of the Westminster system, though, are still retained as are the customs and code of ethics of the British House of Commons and the adherence to the manual of Erskine May.

During the period since the enactment of the 1972 Constitution, the National Parliament has striven to take on an indigenous outlook with a one-time Speaker even deciding to do away with the traditional Speaker's wig and cloak though his successors stuck to the tradition. Our Parliament in the past was also graced by many distinguished foreign leaders who addressed the legislature from the Speaker's throne, among them Pakistan Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and more recently the Thai Prime Minister.

The 1978 Constitution which introduced the Presidential form of Government rendered Parliament somewhat irrelevant and reduced it to the status of a rubber stamp of the Executive so much so the Prime Minister who held sway prior to that was sarcastically referred to as a peon. Prime Minister Ranasinghe Premadasa himself said so. The Nineteenth Amendment redressed the balance once again giving the Premier pre-eminent status and Parliament some of its former powers though it is left to be seen if 19A would be amended and some of its features deemed as obstacles to governance

### **GENUINE INTENTION**

Our Parliament over the years has seen many eloquent discourses and contributions from scholarly personalities who had taken to politics with the genuine intention to serve the country and its people. Old-timers still yearn for the calibre of men such as Dudley Senanayake, SWRD Bandaranaike, Dr NM Perera., Dr Colvin R de Silva, Pieter Keuneman et al who left their mark on the country's Legislature with their brilliance. There was also the downside where Parliament descended to lowest nadir by the antics of some of its representatives which cast a slur on the August Assembly.

It has also been the scene of high drama, excitement and theatre. Who can forget the rumpus created by Dr W Dahanayake when he tried to enter the House clad only in a loincloth (amudey) to protest the rationing of cloth by the Government of the day.

This writer had a ringside view of

some of the memorable happenings inside the well of Parliament as a Parliament reporter and lobby correspondent for nearly 15 years.

Perhaps, the Premadasa era provided some of the most exciting moments and heat and thunder particularly during the period of the impeachment drama which kept all on their toes. This phase also witnessed some of the most violent scenes inside the House with legislators trading blows and generally free for alls though it is moot though if these were anywhere close to the happenings witnessed in the House a few years ago.

That era also saw strange and bizarre happenings inside the August Assembly, the standout being the alleged charmed oil applied to the members' seats in Parliament, under cover of darkness, so it was said, to ward off the malefic effects on the President who was being subjected to impeachment.

President Premadasa was also the subject of raucous heckling by the Opposition when he arrived to ceremonial declare open Parliament afresh after proroguing it with the intention of evading the impeachment. The Opposition went berserk tearing off the desk mikes and shouting themselves hoarse while an unruffled Premadasa went about the business of addressing Parliament. Some of the actors in that drama are still present in the present Parliament but appear to have mellowed and quietened, perhaps with age.

Parliament was also the scene of theatrics, the banal and the ridiculous like when UNP MP Buddhika Kurukularatne came running with a catapult into the House to proffer it to Ranjan Wijeratne, during the Emergency debate, as a means of demonstrating to the Opposition, which was protesting the passing of funds to purchase weapons to fight the LTTE, if the Opposition desired to fight the enemy with a catapult. And Minister Lalith Athulathmudali was seriously injured in a bomb attack on Parliament in 1987.

Over the years, Parliament was also given much colour by the presence of film stars and persons with a popular following such as cricketers and other sportsmen. Though the popular cry is for educated and scholarly individuals be brought to Parliament not many would begrudge a touch of glamour to liven up the sometimes dull and technical proceedings in our August Assembly. Now with live television coverage, everyone can virtually enter the Public Gallery to see how their MPs perform, which is a good thing

# INSIGHTS INTO THE OPENING DAY OF PARLIAMENT

**ISHARA JAYAWARDANE** 

he Ninth Parlia-ment which will convene today has one of the strongest governments in Sri Lankan history with the SLPP holding two-thirds majority. The convening of the Ninth Parliament involves intricate arrangements. The Daily News speaks to Secretary-General of Parliament, Dhammika Dasanayake, about the Opening Day of Parlia-

After a general election, certain formalities need to be performed before the new Parliament begins its sittings. First of all, the Election Commission must ascertain the members elected to

"Having ascertained the names of the members, we have to get in touch with the members, and then get their personal details, that we require for communication and other purposes. Once we get these details, we will write to them and get the particulars, and thereafter we will make preparations for the Opening of Parliament. Usually, the opening of Parliament is decided by the proclamation of the President. He will decide the time and day when Parliament will begin its new sessions," said Dasanayake.

Once all this happens, the members will be informed of the days of attendance. On the appointed day, the members will arrive at Parliament. After the bells are rung for five minutes, they will gather in the Chamber. On the very first day, the seats will not be assigned and it will be free seating. After they are seated, the Secretary-General will read the proclamation summoning of Parliament by President. Then the process of electing the Speaker for the new Parliament will

"This is an occasion where a secret ballot is taken to elect the Speaker. However, this takes place only in an instance where there is more than one member of Parliament nominated by the members for this position. One member will have to propose the name of the member who he wants as the speaker, and another will have to second it. However, there is a requirement in the standing order that before some member's name is nominated, that person should agree to be the speaker beforehand and he has to be in the chamber at the relevant time. Secret ballot means each member will be given a ballot paper and the member will have to write the name of the candidate according to his preference. Once he writes the name he will fold the ballot paper so that nobody sees it and will put it in the box placed in the

middle of the chamber. When all the members have followed this procedure, the Secretary-General will count the ballot papers and will announce the results. The person who gets the majority of the votes will be elected the Speaker. Then the Speaker will take oaths before the Secretary-General and the House. Thereafter, the Speaker will administer the oath in respect of all the other members of Parliament. He will conduct the election for the deputy speaker and deputy chairman of committees in the same way. Having finished that particular task, parliament will either be adjourned or suspended," explained Dasanayake.

### **SEATING ARRANGEMENT**

The office bearers are entitled to sit in certain seats. The Prime Minister has his seat and then there is another for President. The Leader of the House will sit next to the Prime Minister. The Cabinet Ministers are seated in the front row of the government's side. This is on the right side. The Cabinet Ministers are followed by state ministers. The Members of Parliament sit according to their seniority. If two members are of the same senior ity, it will be according to the Sinhala alphabetical order. As for Opposition, there is a particular seat reserved for Leader of the Opposition. The party leaders are also accommodated in the front seats in the opposition side. The rest of the members will take their seats depending on their seniority.

Sergeant- at-Arms, of course, is in charge of seating, security, ceremonial aspects of parliament and making

arrangements for the first day. This official has a busy schedule on the opening day of Parliament. He makes sure the parliamentary proceedings are carried out smoothly.

The swearing of MPs will be done by the Speaker. The members, depending on their religious requirements, will either take an oath or an affirma-

When the President is ushered in on the first day of Parliament at the entrance there will be a cultural troupe playing music. He will come in a procession to the chamber being led by the Sergeant-at-Arms. This procession includes the Speaker and Secretary-General. Thereafter, the President will deliver the Government's Policy Statement. Then the House will be adjourned for the next sitting day.

Following the first day, they will all meet the next day. The normal proceedings of Parliament will take place.

### **COVID 19 PANDEMIC**

Due to Covid19 pandemic, certain safeguards will be taken. Dasanayake noted that they discussed with health authorities, particularly Director-General of Health Anil Jasinghe and several other consultants from the community medicine division. They have introduced guidelines for Parliament

"We have taken the necessary steps for some time now. Where the staff is concerned, we have been adhering to these rules for a long time now with the members coming in. We have to stick to the guidelines that have been set forth by the health authorities.

Dasanayake also pointed out that this time there is an additional problem. They cannot accommodate the full number in the galleries because of the health regulations. People can only be seated in alternative seats since all seats cannot be occupied. Since there is a necessity of leaving a seat in between, the number of invitees/guests has to be reduced in number. There will be 600 seats but only 300 can be occupied. The guests will include the diplomat chief ministers, governors, secretaries and relatives of the members.

ri Lanka's sixteenth legislature since Independence will convene for the first time today, marking yet another era in the country's rich democratic history that dates back to 1931 when, as a British colony, it granted the universal franchise to all its citizens, becoming the oldest democracy in Asia to do so.

Universal franchise- the right to vote without discrimination regarding race, ethnicity or gender- was a rarity at that time. Few countries enjoyed that privilege. Following the granting of universal franchise, the country's first elections to choose representatives for its State Council were held in 1931.

Elections to the State Council were not based on a party system. The State Council consisted of fifty members. They met at the old Parliament building at Galle Face which now houses the Presidential Secretariat. The Second State Council, elected in 1936, was in office from 1936 until 1947.

The country's first Parliament was elected in 1947, prior to the granting of independence from Britain. The oldest political party, the Lanka Sama Samaaja Party (LSSP), formed in 1935 and the United National Party (UNP), founded in 1946, were in contention. The UNP won the 1947 general election.

The first parliament consisted of 95 seats. The UNP won 42 seats and fell short of an absolute majority. However, it formed a government in alliance with the All Ceylon Tamil Congress led by G.G. Ponnambalam, which won seven seats in the North of the country. The LSSP won ten seats.

It was to this government that the British handed over power after granting independence to Sri Lanka, then known as Ceylon. The leader of the UNP, D.S. Senanayake, was the country's first elected Prime Minister, even prior to the granting of independence.

S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike, who realised that his political ambitions were unlikely to materialise in the UNP which also had D.S. Senanayake's son Dudley in its ranks broke away from the UNP and formed the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (UNP) in 1951. The SLFP had more nationalist policies.

D.S. Senanayake passed away suddenly on March 22, 1952. The mantle of the premiership, for which John Kotelawala made a bid, however, passed on to Dudley Senanayake who led the UNP to the General Election in May that year. The UNP won 54 seats. The SLFP and the LSPP won 9 seats each.

This election was arguably the first which marked the beginning of a two-

party system of politics in the country. From then onwards right until the general elections held in 2015, the UNP and the SLFP- or coalitions led by them- vied for power and ruled the country alternatively.

In 1953, a civil disobedience campaign styled the 'hartal' was staged to protest against a series of economic measures introduced by the government. This led to Dudley Senanayake's resignation as Prime Minister. The UNP remained in power. John Kotelawala assumed duties as the new Pre-

### **VICTORY**

The 1956 elections are considered a watershed in Sri Lankan politics. The SLFP led coalition, the Mahajana Eksath Peramuna (MEP) led by S.W.R. D. Bandaranaike offered to declare Sinhala as the official language. The MEP swept the poll, winning 51 seats, to the LSSP's 14 and the UNP's eight.

Bandaranaike introduced radical language and economic reforms upon being elected to power but his political journey was cut short when he was assassinated on September 26, 1959. Wijeyananda Dahanayake, Minister of Education in Bandaranaike's Cabinet took over as Prime Minister.

Dahanayake was unsuccessful in holding the MEP-led coalition together. When elections were called, the SLFP contested separately. The UNP, which was again led by Dudley Senanayake who had returned to politics, won the March 1960 general election, with 50 seats, to the SLFP's 46 seats.

However, Senanayake's government was short-lived. Lacking an absolute majority in Parliament with only 50 seats in the legislature which now had 151 seats, Senanayake was unable to form a stable government and was forced to call for fresh elections which

were held in July 1960. By this time, the SLFP has regrouped and put forward Sirimavo Bandaranaike as its leader and Prime Ministerial candidate. The sight of the weeping Ms Bandaranaike on political platforms struck a powerful chord with voters. The SLFP won the election with 75 seats to the UNP's 30 seats.

Illankai Tamil Arasu Katchchi (ITAK). Dudley Senanayake and Sirima

Bandaranaike were rivals for a third general election in 1970. The SLFP, now partnering with the LSSP and the Communist Party (CP) and forming the United Front (UF) won a two-thirds majority, winning 110 of the 151 seats. The UNP was reduced to 17 seats.

### **REPUBLICAN CONSTITUTION**

The Sirimavo Bandaranaike government of 1970 used this victory to replace the Soulbury Constitution. The 1970 election was the last held under the Soulbury constitution. The United Front government established the Republic of Sri Lanka on May 22, 1972, enacting a republican constitution.

The Bandaranaike government declared that its term of office was five years from the day the new Constitution was enacted, leading to mass-scale protests from the opposition which was

Sirimavo Bandaranaike also made history as the world's first female Prime Minister. However, she was unable to last her full term as Prime Minister. In December 1964, the government lost its majority in trying to enact legislation to nationalise Lake House, forcing

an early election in 1965. The 1965 elections saw a reversal of political fortunes for the two major parties. Again led by Dudley Senanayake and Sirima Bandaranaike, the UNP now led by J.R. Jayewardene who was the new leader of the UNP after Dudley Senanayake passed away in 1973.

The 1977 election marked another watershed in Lankan parliamentary politics. The UNP recorded a resounding five-sixth majority, winning 140 of the now 168-seat Parliament, the SLFP winning just eight seats. The Tamil United Liberation Front (TULF) won 18 seats, mostly in the North.

Again, Jayewardene used his majori-

ty to enact a new Constitution with radical changes to the parliamentary system. A presidential system of government with an elected President wielding executive powers was introduced in the 1978 Constitution. Parlia-

ment retained legislative authority. The next General Elections were due in 1983 but, after winning the country's first presidential election in October 1982, Jayewardene opted to extend the life of Parliament by conducting a Referendum in December 1982. The results of the controversial referendum allowed him to do so.

The next Parliamentary Election was held in 1989 and was the first Parliamentary Election held under the proportional representation (PR) system. With Ranasinghe Premadasa replacing Jayewardene as leader of the UNP and President, the UNP won with 125 seats; the SLFP won 67 seats.

By 1994, with the UNP's popularity was waning and D.B. Wijetunge had replaced Premadasa who was assassinated. The SLFP-led coalition, the Peoples' Alliance (PA) swept into power ending 17 years of UNP rule, winning 105 seats, to the UNP's 94. It governed with the support of other parties.

Chandrika Kumaratunga, who led the PA to victory was initially sworn in as Prime Minister but went on to be elected President, paving the way for Sirimavo Bandaranaike to become the only elected and appointed Premier the country ever had. The UNP leadership passed on to Ranil Wickremesinghe.

The December 1999 Presidential Elections saw Kumaratunga being reelected. She called for elections in October 2000. The PA emerged the single largest party with 107 seats and the UNP won 89 seats. However, the PA lost the support of its allied parties and elections were called in December 2001.

The 2001 election returned the UNP to power with Wickremesinghe as Prime Minister. Now it was the turn of the UNP to form a coalition in the form of the United National Front (UNF) which won 109 seats to the PA's 77.

Again, the UNF had to govern with the support of other parties.

Tensions between the two major parties, the UNP and the SLFP, and its leaders Kumaratunga and Wickremesinghe escalated in 2004, with Kumaratunga dissolving Parliament prematurely. The SLFP-led United Peoples' Freedom Alliance (UPFA) won the 2004 election with 105 seats to the UNP's 82.

### **SIGNIFICANT CHANGES**

The life of Parliament now being six years, this Parliament lasted its full tenure until 2010. By that time significant changes had occurred in the political landscape. Kumaratunga had retired after two terms as President and was succeeded by Mahinda Rajapaksa both as President and UPFA leader.

President Rajapaksa gave leadership to the Eelam war effort to defeat the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam in 2009. Riding on this wave of popularity, he led the UPFA to victory at the 2010 poll, winning 144 seats. The UNP won only 67 seats. The Tamil National Alliance (TNA) won 14 seats.

The next General Elections were held in August 2015. This was against a backdrop of Maithripala Sirisena being elected President in January that year. The UNP led coalition, the United National Front for Good Governance (UNFGG) won 106 seats to the UPFA's 95. The TNA won 16 seats.

Due to the fact that President Sirisena was in office, a group of MPs elected from the UPFA supported the UNFGGled government and joined the Cabinet. This enabled the government to enact the 19th Amendment which, among other changes, reduced the term of office of Parliament to five years.

The recently concluded general election and the resultant 16th Parliament mark a significant departure from Parliaments in the past. That is because the two major parties are the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) and the Samagi Jana Balavegaya (SJB) winning 145 and 54 seats respectively.

They are offshoots of the SLFP and the UNP respectively. Some SLFPers have been returned while contesting on the SLPP ticket while the UNP has been reduced to the ignominy of one National List seat. It remains to be seen whether this Parliament will see the demise of these two major parties.


