The Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance

THE following resolution passed by the Senate at a meeting held on December 13, 1949, and by the House of Representatives at a meeting held on December 6, 1949, is published for general information:—

“ This House resolves under the provisions of section 3 (b) of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199), as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947, that from the first day of March, 1950, the aforesaid Ordinance shall be in force within the area defined in the schedule hereto

Schedule

All that area of land situated in Mahawewa (Bazaar) in Yatakalan Pattu village area in Pitigal Korale South in the Chilaw district and bounded as follows:—

North. By a line drawn from the north-western corner of Kohombagahawatte claimed by A. M. K. Appuhamy, eastwards along the northern boundary of the said land till it meets the Mahawewa Palliya Village Committee road, thence by a line drawn north-eastwards crossing the said Village Committee road to its outer boundary, thence by a line drawn eastwards and southwards along the said boundary of the Village Committee road to north-western boundary of Bulugahawatta claimed by W. Wilfred Leo de Waas, thence by a line drawn north-eastwards along the said boundary to the centre of Mahawewa Channel or Ela, thence by a line drawn south-eastwards along the centre of the said Ela till it meets the culvert No. 41/4 on the Colombo-Puttalam Public Works Department road.

BY-LAWS

Roads and paths

1. (1) No person shall—
 - (a) injure, damage, obstruct, encroach upon, or otherwise interfere with the use of any thoroughfare; or
 - (b) except with the permission of the Council, divert the line of any thoroughfare.
- (2) For the purpose of this by-law "thoroughfare" includes a thoroughfare which is in the course of construction.
- 2 (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of any paddy field through which a thoroughfare runs to maintain such thoroughfare at its customary width.
- (2) No person shall cut or encroach upon any thoroughfare running through a paddy field so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.
3. When a range of paddy fields through which any thoroughfare passes is under cultivation, the cultivators of such range shall be entitled, with the previous permission of the Chairman and subject to such terms and conditions as he may impose, to put up a suitable gate across such thoroughfare during the period of cultivation in order to prevent cattle from trespassing on the paddy fields.
4. (1) When any work of construction or of repairs is commenced on any thoroughfare the Chairman may prohibit the use of such thoroughfare by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice by beat of tom-tom or otherwise.

(2) It shall be lawful for the Council, by a resolution in that behalf to restrict or to prohibit the use of any thoroughfare by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.

(3) Where a restriction or prohibition is imposed under paragraph (2) in respect of any thoroughfare the Chairman shall cause notices setting out the restriction or prohibition in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be displayed conspicuously at the beginning and at the end of such thoroughfare and at its junction with any other thoroughfare.

(4) No person shall fail to conform to the requirements of any notice displayed under paragraph (3).

5. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorised in writing by the Chairman—

- (1) to enter between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. with all the necessary workmen, vehicles, animals, and implements upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed thoroughfare for the purpose of doing any work connected with such thoroughfare,
- (2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed thoroughfare such earth, rubbish, or materials as it may be necessary to remove from the place of any work connected with such thoroughfare;
- (3) to make any temporary thoroughfare through the grounds near any existing or proposed thoroughfare during the execution of any work in any way connected with such thoroughfare.
- (4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing or cleaning such drains or water courses, or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair, or construction of any thoroughfare: Provided that the earth, rubbish or materials referred to in paragraph (2) shall be removed within a reasonable time, and the temporary thoroughfare referred to in paragraph (3) shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands, or over any enclosed garden or yard.

Public health, amenities and disorderly conduct

6. The occupier or if there is no occupier the owner, of every house or land in the urban area shall keep his premises clean and free from all weeds, rank or noisome vegetation, and all refuse or rubbish or receptacles likely to form breeding places for mosquitoes for a distance of thirty yards from such house or to the boundary of his premises, whichever is less.

7. (1) When any tree or any branch or fruit or other part of a tree is causing or is likely to cause damage to any building or is in a condition dangerous to the occupants of any building or to the property, or to the safety of passers-by along any public thoroughfare, the Chairman may by a notice in writing served on the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands require such owner or occupier to tie up and make secure, or to cut down and remove such tree or such branch or fruit or other part of the tree, within such time as may be specified in the notice.

(2) Every person on whom a notice is served under this by-law shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, and in the event of the refusal or neglect of such person to comply with such requirements within such time, the Chairman, or any officer or workman authorised in writing by the Chairman, may enter upon the land referred to in such notice and do what such person was required to do by such notice, and the expenses thereby incurred shall be recovered from such person as a debt due to the Council.

8. No person shall cause any annoyance to any other person by publishing any obscene writing or by making any obscene drawing or by singing or reciting any obscene song or ballad or do any other act which is likely to outrage public decency.

9. No person shall throw stones or filth at the house or into the compound of any other person.

Washing and bathing

10. No person shall bathe, or wash any animal or article at a communal well, spout, spring or other watering place set apart by the Council for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

11. Where any place has been set apart by the Council as a public bathing place or as a place for washing animals and clothes, no person shall use such place for any purpose other than that for which it has been set apart. Provided, however, that a person may wash at a public bathing place the clothes worn by him whilst bathing at such place.

12. No person of one sex shall enter any enclosure at a public bathing place set apart by the Council for the exclusive use of persons of the other sex.

13. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at any public bathing place until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

14. No person shall drive or take any animal to a public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

Gambling, cock-fighting and cart-racing

15. No person shall gamble with dice or cards, play any game for a stake or take part in betting of any kind within the urban area.

16. No person shall allow gambling with dice or cards, or the playing or any game for stake in any house, premises, boat, vessel, or vehicle occupied by that person or belonging to him or under his control.

17. No person shall engage in cart-racing on any public road or path.

Spring guns and traps

18. No person shall set any spring gun or trap without the written permission of the Chairman. The fact that such permission has been granted shall be proclaimed by beat of tom-tom by an officer authorised in that behalf by the Chairman.

The disposal of the bodies of dead animals

19. On the death of any animal, it shall be the duty of the owner thereof, or in the absence of the owner, of the occupier of the premises in which the death occurs to cause the body of the animal to be buried before the expiry of a period of twelve hours from the time of death.

20. Where any person who is responsible under by-law 19, for the burial of any dead animal fails to bury such animal within a period of twelve hours the Chairman shall cause such dead animal to be buried, and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered from such person as a debt due to the Council.

Public notices

21. No person shall deface or destroy any notice which is exhibited by order of the Council.

Galas

22. No person shall establish or keep a private gala except on a licence issued by the Chairman in that behalf.

23. Every licence for a private gala shall be subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The licensee shall cause a table of rents and fees leviable at the gala to be written in Tamil and to be exhibited in a conspicuous place at the gala.
- (2) The licensee shall not permit any person who is suffering or has recently suffered, from any contagious, cutaneous, or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, to occupy any place in the gala, until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.
- (3) The licensee shall keep the gala in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (4) The licensee shall cause any refuse or rubbish from the gala to be buried or burned so as to prevent the breeding of flies or the creation of any nuisance.
- (5) The licensee shall maintain order within the gala.
- (6) The licensee shall not permit any gambling or disorderly conduct to take place at the gala.
- (7) The licensee shall not allow any person to keep within the gala any cattle suffering from a contagious disease.

24 The Chairman may suspend any licence for a private gala during the prevalence of an epidemic, if the suspension is essential in the public interest.

25. No person shall establish or keep a private gala within fifty yards of a dwelling house.

26. It shall be lawful for the Magistrate's Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of the conditions specified in by-law 23 and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Loitering and the use of abusive language

27. No person shall loiter in any public road or path, or in any public place, after twelve midnight without a light and without lawful cause. The mere possession of an electric torch or other lighting device, without the light being actually put on, shall not be deemed to be sufficient for the purpose of this by-law.

28. No person shall use abusive language with intent to annoy any person, or knowing or having reason to believe that it is likely to annoy any person, or to cause a breach of the peace.

29. No person shall disturb the public repose after 11 p.m. by shouting, singing songs, or by making any other noise: Provided that nothing in this by-law shall be deemed to affect the rights of the people in the matter of religious ceremonies and orderly gatherings.

The sale of spirits

30. No person shall sell to any boy under sixteen years of age, or to any female, any spirit or other intoxicating liquor, or toddy drawn from any species of palm, or the fermented juice of the sugar cane.

Markets and fairs

31 The area within a circle having a radius of one mile from any public market is hereby declared to be the market area for that market.

32 Within any market area, no person shall on any day on which the public market is open, sell or offer or expose for sale, any vegetables, fruit, fish, or meat at any place other than such market:

Provided that the preceding provision of this by-law shall not apply to—

- (1) the sale of vegetables or fruit by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed prices, or do not for the purpose of such sale establish themselves on the public roads or other public places;
- (2) the sale by the licensee of any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique of ripe plantains or other fruit for consumption on the premises; or
- (3) the sale by any person of young coconuts

33. Every public market shall be open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. on such days of the week as may be approved by the Council.

34. Where the Council has set apart any portion of a public market for the sale of any article or class of articles, no person shall—

- (1) sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in any place in such market other than in the portion so set apart; or
- (2) sell or expose for sale any other article or class of articles in the portion so set apart.

35. A fee at the following rates shall be levied and paid for the use of any stall or space in any public market:—

The fee for the use of any stall or space employed for the sale of commodities by public auction shall be two per centum of the gross proceeds of the sale of such commodities

36. No person shall hold, use, or occupy any stall, seat, or space in any public market unless he is the holder of a permit issued in that behalf by, or under

the authority of, the Chairman, or otherwise than in accordance with the terms and conditions of such permit. Every such permit shall expire on the date specified thereon.

37. The fees payable under by-law 35 shall be paid to the Chairman or to such other person as may be authorised by the Chairman, and no permit under by-law 36 shall be issued to any person until he has paid the fees due from him.

38. The Chairman shall cause to be exhibited in a conspicuous place in each public market a notice setting out in English, Tamil and Sinhalese, the fees payable for the use and occupation of that market and no person shall demand or receive any sums higher than those set out in such notice.

39. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman, the Medical Officer of Health, the Sanitary Inspector, or any other person authorised in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times, to enter and inspect any market or fair or any article of food exposed or kept for sale therein and no person shall obstruct or resist any officer aforesaid in the exercise of his powers under this by-law.

(2) Whenever the Council is satisfied, after consultation with the the Medical Officer of Health that the use or consumption by the public of any particular article of food is injurious or harmful, it shall be lawful for the Council, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the Council may appear necessary, the introduction and sale of such article of food in any public market or fair

40. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any public market or fair—

- (1) the carcase or meat of any animal which has not been slaughtered in a public slaughter-house declared and proclaimed under section 21 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201), or in a place appointed for the purpose of slaughtering animals under section 11 of that Ordinance, or under a permit issued under section 14 of that Ordinance.
- (2) any article the keeping or sale of which is prohibited by or under any by-law made by the Council. Provided that the provisions of paragraph (1) of this by-law shall not apply to the sale of frozen meat or game

41. No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall use or occupy any stall, seat, or space in any public market, or expose for sale thereat any article whatsoever until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

42. No person using any public market shall—

- (1) behave in any disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market;
- (2) carry on cooking in any such market; or
- (3) remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 10 p.m. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself; or
- (4) damage or in any way deface any portion of the building, stalls, lamps or any property of the Council in or about such market, or defile or pollute the water provided for use in such market, or
- (5) enclose in any way any portion of the building or premises of the market or erect any permanent awning or screen or fixture of any kind, or
- (6) leave any goods in or about the premises of such market between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. without the special permission of the Chairman; or
- (7) place any fruit, vegetables, meat, fish, flesh, or other article of food exposed thereat for sale, on any unclean or insanitary surface; or
- (8) expose for sale any article of food, whether cooked or uncooked otherwise than in clean and properly constructed fly-proof glass cases.

43 Every person using or occupying any stall in a public market shall keep in or near such stall a fly-proof receptacle with a close-fitting lid or cover, and shall deposit all rubbish and refuse in such receptacle.

44. No person shall throw any rubbish or refuse, or any bone or skin of any animal or any article likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health, on the premises of any public market or fair.

45. No person shall obstruct or resist the keeper of any public market or any other person appointed by the Council to superintend any public market or to collect rents and fees or to enforce order and cleanliness therein in the lawful execution of his duties.

46. The driver of a vehicle shall not keep that vehicle within or alongside the premises of any public market for a longer period than is necessary for loading goods into, or unloading goods from that vehicle.

47. The Chairman shall give notice, by beat of tom-tom or in such other manner as he may deem adequate, of the temporary closing of any town market or fair.

Conservancy and scavenging

48. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by such Medical Officer.

49. If the Medical Officer of Health certifies that any cesspit or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 48) situated on any premises within the area for which a conservancy service has been established is insanitary and dangerous to health, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.

50. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 48 or by-law 49 has been served, shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.

51. Every occupier of premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.

52. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Council shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.

53. (1) The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Council on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Council a conservancy fee calculated at the rate of one rupee for each conservancy bucket used in any latrine on those premises.

(2) The fee referred to in paragraph (1) shall be paid at the office of the Council on or before the tenth day of the month following that in respect of which it is due.

54. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine, whether constructed or in the course of construction, on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorised by him, to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such inspection.

55. Upon the establishment of a scavenging service for the whole or any specified part of the urban area, the occupier of any premises situated within an area for which such service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and all other refuse from his premises to be deposited in a bucket or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.

56. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 55 shall—

- (1) daily, between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause such bucket or bin to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises, but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road, and

(2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Council.

57. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 55 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 56.

58. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Council on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Council a scavenging fee of twenty-five cents.

59. The scavenging fee referred to in by-law 58 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Council or to any person duly authorised by him in writing to collect such fee, on or before the tenth day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fee is due: Provided that, when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month, and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman that such premises were in fact not occupied during that month, no scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of those premises for that month.

The housing and penning of animals

60. (1) No building or shed shall be used for the accommodation of cattle, horses, sheep, goats or pigs—

- (a) if it is situated at a distance of less than forty feet from any habitable room, or
- (b) if its floor is not paved and drained and maintained in a clean and sanitary condition.

(2) In this by-law, "habitable room" means a room constructed or adopted to be inhabited.

61. Every contravention of by-law 60 shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

Interpretation

62. "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Council,

"Council" means the Kalpitiya Town Council; and
"urban area" means the area within the administrative limits of the Council.

REGULATIONS

1 No person shall leave or permit any vehicle to remain in that portion of Lotus Road which lies between its junction with Queen Street and a point 250 yards east of that junction, except for such time as shall be necessary only for loading and unloading goods and the taking up and setting down of passengers.

2. (1) Where any vehicle is left or permitted to remain in that portion of Lotus Road referred to in regulation 1 in contravention of that regulation, the person liable for such contravention shall be the driver of the vehicle.

(2) In this regulation, "driver", in the case of a bicycle or tricycle, means the rider thereof; in the case of a hand-cart or push cart, the person drawing or pushing the cart; and in the case of a jinricksha, the person drawing the jinricksha.

BY-LAWS

1. These by-laws may be cited as the Advertisement (Kandy Municipality) By-laws, 1949.

2 Where the display of any advertisement has commenced before the date on which these by-laws come into force, the succeeding by-laws shall not apply to that advertisement for a period of two years from such date.

3 No person shall cause any advertisement to be displayed so as to be visible from any street, road, canal or lake, except under the authority of a licence issued in that behalf by the Commissioner:

Provided, however, that the preceding provisions of this by-law shall not apply to any of the following advertisements unless such advertisement is an illuminated advertisement or a sky sign:—

- (a) an advertisement relating to any entertainment the net proceeds of which are to be used for the purposes of charity;
- (b) an advertisement relating to any entertainment to be held in the premises upon which such advertisement is displayed;
- (c) an advertisement displayed by the Government;
- (d) an advertisement relating to a religious, political or public meeting;
- (e) an advertisement in the window of any building;
- (f) a 'To Let' advertisement;
- (g) a 'For Sale' advertisement;
- (h) a domestic name plate;
- (i) a name plate, not exceeding one square foot in area, used for professional purposes;
- (j) an advertisement, on a vehicle used for trade purposes, displaying the name and address of the owner of that vehicle; or

(h) an advertisement relating to the trade or business carried on in the premises upon which such advertisement is displayed

4. (1) Every application for a licence to display any advertisement shall be made to the Commissioner, in the form provided by the Council, at least seven days before the date on which the display of the advertisement is intended to commence:

Provided, however, that the Commissioner may in special circumstances entertain any such application which is not made within the time limit specified in the preceding provisions of this paragraph.

(2) Every application referred to in paragraph (1) shall be accompanied by a copy of the advertisement which the applicant intends to display.

(3) Where the Commissioner approves an application referred to in paragraph (1), he shall direct the applicant to pay, for the licence to display the advertisement, a fee calculated at such rates in respect of licences to display advertisements as may be determined by the Council under section 304 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 29 of 1947, and such licence shall not be issued to the applicant until such fee is paid.

5 (1) Where a licence to display an advertisement is issued to any person, the Commissioner shall direct that person—

- (a) to insert the number and date of the licence in every copy of that advertisement, or
- (b) to cause every copy of that advertisement to be produced to the Commissioner for the purpose of being stamped in token of the payment of the fee for that licence

(2) Every person to whom a direction under paragraph (1) of this by-law is given by the Commissioner shall carry out that direction.

6. No person shall cause—

- (1) an advertisement to be displayed in such a manner as to project over any street or road for a distance of more than six inches, measured horizontally, from the building line unless such advertisement is a projecting sign constructed and erected in a manner approved by the Municipal Engineer;
- (2) an advertisement to be displayed on any hoarding which exceeds more than twenty-five feet in height from the ground or projects over any street or road;
- (3) to be affixed to or suspended from the facade of a building abutting on any street or road, any shop sign which in length extends beyond the limits of such facade, or which in height at any point exceeds one-fourth of the distance of the bottom of such sign from the pavement or the mean level of the ground; or
- (4) any sky sign to be constructed and erected in a manner which is not approved by the Municipal Engineer.

7. No person shall cause any advertisement to be displayed on any place of public worship, any public park or latrine, or any bridge, street lamp post, or telegraph or telephone post.

8. (1) Where any advertisement is, in the opinion of the Commissioner, in an unsightly or objectionable condition, he may by written notice order the person causing the display of such advertisement to stop such display within the time specified in such notice.

(2) A person to whom a notice under paragraph (1) is sent by the Commissioner shall comply with such notice within the time specified therein.

9. The owner or lessee of any hoarding used for the display of advertisements shall—

- (a) maintain such hoarding in a proper state of repair and security, and
- (b) exhibit his name and address in clear and legible characters in a conspicuous position on the front of such hoarding.

10. No person shall deface or cause to be defaced any sign, mark, letter, word or figure which has been put on any advertisement by the Commissioner in token of the payment of the fee for the licence to display that advertisement.

11. No person shall cause—

- (a) any advertisement to be displayed on a vehicle in a manner or form other than that approved by the Commissioner, or
- (b) any vehicle bearing any illuminated advertisement, other than an illuminated advertisement approved by the Superintendent of Police, to be driven on any street or road.

12. Any person who acts in contravention of any of the provisions of these by-laws shall be guilty of an offence, and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and, in the case of a continuing contravention, to a further fine not exceeding twenty-five rupees for every day during which the contravention is continued after conviction or after service of a written notice from the Mayor directing attention to such contravention.

13. In these by-laws, unless the context otherwise requires—

- “ advertisement ” includes any word, letter, number, sign, placard, board, notice, device, model or representation in the nature of or used wholly or partly for the purposes of advertisement, over or resting upon any land, building or structure,
- “ Commissioner ” means the Commissioner of the Council;
- “ Council ” means the Municipal Council of Kandy;
- “ hoarding ” means any structure, support, post, board, wall, case or any other contrivance erected or used for the purpose of displaying any advertisement; and
- “ sky-sign ” means any word, letter, model, sign, device or representation used for the purposes of advertisement and supported or attached to any post, pole, standard, framework, or other support on or over any land, building or other structure and wholly or partly visible against the sky from some point in any street, road, canal or lake, and includes any balloon, parachute, trailer or other similar device used wholly or partly for the purposes of advertisement on or over any land, building, structure, street or road.

BY-LAWS

Sale of Fish

1. No person shall use any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of fish unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

2. No person shall be entitled to a licence to keep a shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of fish unless the premises to be licensed are in conformity with the following conditions.—

(1) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows capable of being opened, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenths of the superficial floor space.

(2) The walls of every room in every part of the premises must be not less than 7 feet in height and must be limeplastered and limewashed, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement.

(3) All the eaves must be at least 6 feet from the ground.

(4) All the woodwork must be oil-painted or limewashed.

(5) The floor must be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered and emptying into a bucket.

(6) Every table on which fish is kept must be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

(7) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust-bin and with sufficient latrine accommodation.

(8) The premises must be at least 50 feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap, or open sewer.

(9) There must be no cesspit, latrine, or ashpit within or directly communicating with the premises.

3. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of his premises a board with his name and the words “Licensed Fish Stall” legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil.

4. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to the sale of fish in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep on the premises a list of the names and addresses of all the employees including the vendors of fish so as to be at all times available for inspection.

5. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall cause the walls of every room forming part of the fish stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be limewashed, and all the woodwork to be limewashed, or if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

6. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls, the tops of the tables, and the chopping blocks to be scrubbed and washed once every day at such hour as is specified in the licence. He shall cause all hooks for hanging fish to be kept polished and free from rust.

7. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall keep every part of the fish stall, its surroundings, drains, furniture, utensils and equipment used in connection with the storing, preparation, or sale of fish in good repair, clean and free from effluvia arising from any drain cesspit, latrine or other nuisance.

8. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall cause a sanitary dust-bin and at least one spittoon to be kept on the licensed premises, so that those employed on the premises may have easy access to them.

9. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall cause all trade and domestic refuse to be immediately placed in an impervious covered receptacle and to be removed daily from the licensed premises. He shall cause the said receptacle to be kept always covered except when refuse is being actually placed therein.

10. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall keep the licensed premises free from rats and shall fill up all the rat holes with broken glass and plaster them with cement as soon as he discovers them.

11. No person shall keep any animal or bird in the licensed fish stall on any pretext whatsoever.

12. No person shall spit within a licensed fish stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

13. No person suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious or cutaneous disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall enter a fish stall or take part in the storing, preparation, or sale of fish therein, or in the transport of any fish thereto or therefrom.

14. No holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall connive at or permit the contravention by any person of any of by-laws 11, 12 and 13.

15. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats, or other articles except those used for the purpose of storing, preparation or sale of fish.

16. No holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall allow any place on the same level with the fish stall and forming part of the same building to be used as a sleeping place unless it is effectually separated from the fish stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

17. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall keep in the licensed premises an ample supply of potable water.

18. Every holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall keep the licensed premises open daily for the sale of fish.

19. No holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall allow any person to transport fish for sale from his licensed premises unless he is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by the licensee of the fish stall.

20. No holder of a licence under by-law 1 shall permit any person to transport for sale from his licensed premises any fish except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle is at all times kept clean and wholesome.

21. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a fish stall, issue cards of registration free of charge for the use of every person employed by such licensee in transporting fish for sale.

Officers and Servants

22. The Chairman may authorise in writing any officer or other person to collect all taxes or fees due to the Committee and to issue printed receipts bearing the facsimile of his signature and the seal of the Committee.

23. No person shall wilfully obstruct—

(a) the Chairman or any other officer of the Committee in the exercise, performance or discharge of any power, duty or function, conferred, imposed, or assigned to such Chairman or officer by or under any of the provisions of the Village Communities Ordinance, or of any by-laws made thereunder; or

(b) any servant or labourer employed by or on behalf of the Committee in the performance of any duty lawfully imposed upon him by the Chairman or any other officer of the Committee.

Regulation of Traffic, &c.

24. No person shall pull, or push along, or drive any kind or class of vehicle on any road or path within the

village area at night without a lighted lantern attached to each side of the front of the vehicle.

25. No person shall lead or drive any animal along any road or path within the village area without a light between the hours sunset and sunrise.

Land and Property

26. No person shall destroy, damage, or interfere with the use of any anbalam, madam, open space or place for public recreation.

27. No person shall destroy or damage, or encroach upon, any waste or public land vested in, or under the control of the Committee.

28. No person shall remove any sand, earth, stone, or growing plants or trees from, or in any way alter or deface the surface of, any waste or public land without the authority of the Chairman.

29. No horse, cattle, sheep, goat or swine shall be tethered or grazed upon any public land vested in the Committee without a permit from the Chairman. Every such permit shall be valid for a year or such shorter period as the Chairman may determine.

30. Any person thereto authorised in writing by the Chairman may seize any horse, cattle, sheep, goat or swine which he may find tethered or grazing on any public land without a permit under by-law 29.

31. Where any common pasture land has been set apart by the Committee for the use of any specified village, no person who is not resident in such village shall tether any cattle, or permit any cattle to stray, upon that pasture land without the written permission of the Chairman.

32. No person shall damage any fence, or obstruct any gateway, or befoul or poison any pond situated on any land set apart as a communal pasture.

Epidemic, endemic or contagious diseases

33. (1) It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorized by him in writing to place or caused to be placed a mark in a conspicuous part of the exterior of any house or building where a person is suffering from a disease of an epidemic or endemic or contagious nature, and to keep such mark affixed for such time as he may deem necessary.

(2) No person shall, without the permission of the Chairman, remove or obliterate any such mark.

34. No person who is suffering from any of the diseases referred to in by-law 33 shall wilfully go abroad into any public road or path or public place.

35. No person shall wilfully expose in, take into any public road or path or public place, any child or other person who is suffering from any disease referred to in by-law 33.

36. Where any person suffering from any of the diseases referred to in by-law 33 dies, the owner or occupier of the premises where the death took place, or the nearest adult male relative of the deceased shall be responsible for the speedy burial or cremation of such person; and in the absence or default of such owner, occupier or relative, the Committee shall cause the dead body to be buried or cremated, and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered as a debt due to the Committee from such owner, occupier or male relative.

Disease amongst animals

37. It shall be the duty of the owner or person in charge of any animal suffering from murrain or other infectious or contagious disease—

(1) to segregate such animal, and to give immediate information of such disease to the Chairman;

(2) to remove such animal to any place specified by the Chairman and to leave it in such place in charge of such person as may have been authorized by the Chairman to tend or treat it;

(3) to burn or to bury at a depth of not less than 6 feet, the dung, litter or refuse of such animal, and, in the event of its death, its carcase, and to disinfect the shed or spot where such animal has lain;

(4) to clean and disinfect his own person and clothing before he approaches healthy cattle, and

(5) to take all such precautions and steps as may be necessary to prevent any such animal from mixing with any other healthy animal until fourteen days have elapsed after its complete recovery

38. (1) On receipt of information given under by-law 37 (1), the Chairman shall, by beat of tom-tom or in such manner as he may deem fit, declare the village area or any specified part thereof to be an infected area

(2) Where the village area or any part thereof has been declared to be an infected area under paragraph (1), the Chairman shall, upon the expiry of fourteen days from the recovery of the animal last known to be affected by the disease or from the death of such animal, declare in the manner referred to in paragraph (1), that the village area or such part thereof is free from disease

39. Where the village area or any specified part thereof has been declared to be an infected area under by-law 38 (1)—

(1) no person shall bring any cattle into, or remove any cattle from the infected area;

(2) all owners and persons in charge of cattle in the infected area, and in every village within a radius of one mile from the infected area, in case where the infected area is a part of the village area, shall keep their cattle tethered or securely penned so as to prevent them from straying;

(3) every person, who within an infected area finds the carcass of any animal lying unburied, shall report the fact to the Chairman, and the Chairman shall cause it to be buried in the manner specified in by-law 37 (3);

(4) no person shall disinfect the carcass of any animal which has died of the disease or remove or keep for any purpose the flesh, hide, horns, hoofs or other parts of the carcass of such animal; and

(5) every owner of cattle in the infected herd shall, whenever the Chairman so directs, have his cattle subjected to such treatment or inoculation at such spot and by such persons as may be specified by the Chairman in writing

The measure or dimension of bread, &c

40. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and it shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorised by him in writing from time to time demand and obtain samples thereof

41. In these by-laws—

“Chairman” means the Chairman of the Committee,
“Committee” means the Village Committee of the village area; and
“Village area” means the Kaduwela village area.

Memorandum to Council from the Municipal Commissioner

No. 127 of October 25, 1949.

Subject—Reorganization of the Accounting System.

Through the Mayor and Standing Committee on Finance.

With reference to the report of Mr. P. Perera, the newly appointed Accountant of the Council, on the above subject, before I make any comments on the report submitted by him, I would like to make a few general observations on the duties attachable to the office of Accountant. Unlike in the case of the Municipal Commissioner, the Municipal Magistrate, or the Charity Commissioner, the post of Municipal Accountant is not created by Statute, and therefore no powers, duties and functions are conferred or imposed upon or vested in the office by Ordinance. The post as been created by virtue of the General powers to create posts provided for the Council by Section 41 (1) (a) of the Ordinance. The mere creation of the post does not vest in its holder any powers, duties and functions although it may be "implied law" that he is charged with the functions of collection and disbursement of public funds. I believe it is only a court of law that can establish "implied law" and it would not be wise and proper to leave the matter in doubt until it is contested in a court of law. The better course would be to act in terms of the provisions of written law. The powers, duties and functions which may be conferred, imposed upon, or vested in or delegated to the Accountant in terms of the Ordinance fall under six main categories:

- (a) Powers, &c., which may be conferred on him by by-law in terms of Section 272 (1) (e) with the approval of Parliament,
- (b) Powers of the Council which may be delegated to him by the Council by Resolution in terms of Section 33 in respect of which the provisions of Section 174 will apply,
- (c) Powers of the Mayor which may be delegated to him by the Mayor with the consent of the Council in terms of Section 14 (c) in respect of which the provisions of Section 14 (7) will apply,
- (d) Powers of the Commissioner which may be delegated to him by the Commissioner with the consent of the Council in terms of Section 172 (1) in respect of which the provisions of Section 172 (2) will apply,
- (e) Powers which may be conferred on him by the Local Government Service Ordinance or any regulation made thereunder in terms of Section 290 and,
- (f) Powers which may be conferred on him by the Minister by regulations under Section 289.

2. Of the above categories of powers, the Council can initiate action only under (a) and (b). Of these two categories, a period of time must of necessity elapse before legal effect can be given to powers conferred

under (a). For immediate grant of power the Council is therefore left with action under category (b) only. No powers have so far been vested in the Accountant under categories (e) and (f). To be able, however, to delegate powers under category (b) the Council must be in possession of the powers to be delegated. I have not been able to find any provision in the Ordinance whereby the Council is made the general accounting authority for the purposes of the Ordinance, although the Council is vested with limited specific powers relating to accounts, e.g., the power to decide who should sign orders or cheques for payment of moneys out of the Municipal Fund (Section 189). The Executive authority appears to be vested only in the Mayor and the Commissioner (Section 171). The position, however, is not very clear, and as it is not free from doubt the best course to adopt is to confer powers and duties on the Accountant by by-laws instead of by resolution. These observations are made for the information of the Council, but the recommendations made by me in subsequent paragraphs are based on the assumption that the Council can by resolution delegate powers and duties to the Accountant.

3. As regards the report itself I am in general agreement with the recommendations made therein. My recommendations to Council are as under:—

- (a) That the post of Accountant be declared an Executive post in terms of Section 176.
- (b) That the duties assigned to the post be the duties enumerated in paragraph 32 of the Accountant's report, subject however, to the powers, duties and functions reserved to the Mayor, the Commissioner or other authority by written law.
- (c) That a Finance and Accounts Department be established according to the lay out and recommendations made by the Accountant with effect from January 1, 1950.
- (d) That the following two new posts necessary for this department be created as recommended by the Accountant, viz.:—
 - (i) Grade I Clerk—(For Book-keeper's post).
 - (ii) Grade II Clerk—(For Cash Book and Ledger Clerk's post).

- (e) That the Accountant do assume the duties assigned to his post under (b) above as from January 1, 1950.
- (f) That the Accountant be assigned the following special duties during the interregnum, viz.:—
 - (i) Preparation of the Budget for the year 1950.
 - (ii) Preliminary work necessary before the introduction of the new system on January 1, 1950.
- (g) That the general principles enumerated in paragraph 33 of the Accountant's report be accepted as the basis for the framing of new financial regulations.
- (h) That Resolution No. 10 of January 11, 1949, re special powers provisionally given to the Municipal Commissioner relating to adaptation of Financial Regulations, be rescinded with effect from January 1, 1950.
- (i) That with effect from January 1, 1950, and until by-laws are made in terms of Section 272 (1) or other provisions of written law prescribing financial procedure, the Accountant's directions regarding Financial Rules and Procedure as may be approved by the Commissioner be made binding on officers.
- (j) That expenditure of a sum of money not exceeding Rs 3,225 as per details appearing in paragraph 41 of the report be sanctioned to purchase printed forms, registers and equipment necessary to introduce the new system, and the Commissioner be authorized to make these purchases in manner he deems fit.
- (k) That at an early date action be taken to enact by-laws defining the duties of the Accountant and prescribing Financial Rules and Procedure.

Memorandum to Council from the Municipal Commissioner

No. 119 of October 7, 1949.

Subject.—Increase in limit of holiday allowances payable to Officers.

Through the Mayor and Standing Committee on Finance.

1. The Officers of the Council forwarded a Memo through the Mayor to the Chairman, L. G. S. C., that the holiday allowance paid to them is insufficient in view of the increased railway fares which have been brought into effect several times since the fixing of this rate. The rate now in force had been fixed at the time of the Local Board and had not been revised by Council thereafter.

2. In reply, the Chairman, L. G. S. C., by his letter No. EB/47/4 of September 30, 1949, addressed to the Mayor, states as follows:—"that the Commissioner will soon introduce a scheme of allowances, privileges, &c., which will be applicable to all members of the Local Government Service. Pending the introduction of the new scheme, the Commission will consider any recommendation your Council may wish to make. I have therefore to suggest that the matter be placed before the Council and its recommendations be forwarded to me."

3. At present only the following classes of Officers are regarded as eligible for holiday allowances and provision is made only for them, viz.:—

- (a) Officers of the status of clerks and above (maximum) Rs. 50.
- (b) Peons and Linesmen (maximum) Rs. 15.
- (c) Driver Mechanic (maximum) Rs. 25.

They draw their allowances generally in terms of the Government Financial Regulations on the subject provided that (a) the maximum fixed is not exceeded for a year, and (b) mileage may be claimed in terms of Government F.R., if the railway is not used. These conditions had received the approval of the Local Government Board which was functioning at the time.

4. I am of opinion that it is unfair to grant this allowance to the above classes of officers only and deny it to the large majority of the other employees of the Council including daily-paid employees. I would therefore wish to take this opportunity to recommend to Council to rectify this omission from the year 1950. My recommendations therefore are as follows:—

- (a) That all officers and employees be paid this allowance as from January 1, 1950, in terms of Government Financial Rules Chapter XVII, Section 3, the more important provisions of which are given in the annexure.
- (b) That if an officer or employee elects to travel on any journey other than by rail, mileage be paid to him in terms of Government Financial Rule 1564, subject to the following maximum amounts in respect of each single journey:—

Officers entitled to travel	First Class	Rs.	40.00
do.	do.	2nd Class	Rs. 25.00
Employees	do.	3rd Class	Rs. 7.50

- (c) That if payment is claimed in terms of (b) the Officer shall forfeit his right for one set of railway warrants for a single journey for his family for each such journey.
- (d) That provision be made in the Budget for the year 1950 for payment on the above basis, and that the question whether officers and employees who are not eligible for holiday allowances should be given such allowances be considered at the Budget meeting and a decision made thereon.
- (e) That as a measure of giving immediate relief to officers and employees who are now eligible for holiday allowance, two single journeys or one double journey be allowed to these officers for the year 1949, in terms of the above rules in addition to the journeys they are entitled to in terms of para 3.
- (f) That as the Council's financial year ends during the Christmas and New Year Holidays, the financial year for the purpose of calculation of holiday allowance be reckoned as commencing

on the first working day of the calendar year and terminating on the day before the first working day of the succeeding year.

Supplementary Provision in current year's Budget if the above recommendations are adopted is approximately Rs. 1,265, but it is unlikely that more than half this amount will be used from current year's votes as the claims for travelling made during the X'mas and New Year Holidays will be met from 1950 Budget.
