The Village Communities Ordinance

BY-LAWS under section 49 of the Village Communities Ordinance (Chapter 198), made by the Village Committee of the Kandupita Pattu North and Kandupita Pattu South village area in the Kegalla District, and approved by the Minister of Health and Local Government by virtue of powers vested in him by sub-section (3) of that section as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947.

BY-LAWS.

Roads and paths

1. Every public road or path shall be constructed or reconstructed and maintained in accordance with the decision of the Committee as to the width of such road or path and the course which it is to take.

2. (1) Whenever any work of construction or of repair is commenced on any public road or path, the Chairman shall have the power to prohibit the use of such road or path by the public for such time as may be necessary, after giving at least three days' notice of such prohibition by beat of tom-tom or otherwise.

(2) It shall be lawful for the Chairman, whenever authorized by the Committee by a resolution in that behalf, to restrict or to prohibit the use of any public road or path, by any kind or class of heavy vehicular traffic.

3. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorized in writing by the Chairman—

- (1) to enter between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., with all necessary workmen, vehicles, animals and implements, upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed public road or path, for the purpose of executing any work connected with such road or path;
- (2) to throw upon any land adjacent to or near any existing or proposed public road or path such earth, rubbish or materials as it may be necessary to remove from the place of any work connected with such road or path,
- (3) to make any temporary road through the grounds near any existing or proposed public road or path during the execution of any work connected with such road or path; or
- (4) to enter upon any land for the purpose of constructing, repairing or cleaning such drains, water-courses, fences or culverts as may be necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair or construction of any public road or path:—

Provided that the earth, rubbish or materials referred to in paragraph (2) shall be removed within a reasonable time, and the temporary road referred to in paragraph (3) shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands, or over any enclosed garden or yard.

4. No person shall—

- (a) injure, damage, obstruct, encroach upon or otherwise interfere with the use of any public road or path, whether constructed or in the course of construction, or
- (b) except with the permission of the Committee, divert the line of any public road or path, whether constructed or in the course of construction.

5. (1) It shall be the duty of the proprietors and cultivators of any paddy field through which any public foot-path runs, to maintain such foot-path at its customary width.

(2) No person shall cut or encroach upon any such foot-path so as to reduce its width to less than its customary width.

Offensive and dangerous trades

6. (1) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive trades:—

Manufacturing soap; curing or storing arecanuts; manufacturing crepe rubber; storing tobacco in any quantity not less than ten sippams.

(2) The following trades shall be deemed to be dangerous trades:—

Any trade in which machinery driven by oil or other fuel, steam, or electricity is used; storing copra; curing or storing plumbago; manufacturing aerated waters.

(3) The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive and dangerous trades:—

Burning bricks or tiles

7. (1) No person shall carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(2) Every licence shall, unless it is cancelled under by-law 9, expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

(3) No licence shall be transferable.

8. No person shall be entitled to a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade unless—

(i) the place at which that trade is to be carried on is approved by the Medical Officer of Health; and

(ii) the building or buildings, if any, to be used for the purpose of that trade are in conformity with the following requirements:—

(a) the building must be in good repair, well ventilated, well lighted, and provided with adequate drainage and latrine accommodation;

(b) the roof of such building must be made of some permanent material and the floor must be cemented;

(c) the eaves of such building must be not less than six feet from the ground;

(d) every room in such building must be provided with windows capable of being opened and the area of such windows when open shall be not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space;

(e) the walls of every room in such building must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of brick, stone or cabook;

(f) the internal surface of such walls to a height of at least four feet from the floor, must be plastered in cement and the rest of the walls must be lime plastered and lime washed;

(g) the woodwork of such building must be oil-painted or limewashed.

9. If at any time during the period for which a licence has been issued, in respect of any offensive or dangerous trade, any building used for the purposes of such trade ceases to conform to the provisions of by-law 8, the Chairman may, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health, cause a notice to be served on the licensee requiring him to do, before a day to be specified in the notice, all things necessary to make such building conform to such provisions and if the licensee fails to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, the Chairman may cancel the licence.

10. Any notice under by-law 9 shall be deemed to have been served on the holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade if it is affixed to the premises at which he carries on that trade, or if it is left with any person employed by him in such premises.

11. The holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause—

- (a) the floor of every building used for the purposes of such trade to be swept and cleaned daily;
- (b) the walls of every such building to be limewashed at least once in every twelve months;
- (c) all apparatus, implements and vessels used in such trade to be kept clean;
- (d) all refuse, sweepings, scrapings and waste and by-products which are not to be subjected to further trade processes to be removed daily in covered receptacles from the premises in which such trade is carried on.

12. No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall pollute or contaminate any well or tank or any river, stream, canal, channel, lake or other inland water.

13. No holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall carry on such trade in any manner likely to cause a nuisance to, or to be injurious to the health or comfort of persons in the neighbourhood.

14. Every holder of a licence to carry on any offensive or dangerous trade shall cause any offensive vapours or gases which are emitted in the course of carrying on such trade—

- (a) to be discharged into the external air in such a manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effect; or
- (b) to be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus.

15. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Inspector or any officer of the Committee authorized in writing by the Chairman, at all reasonable times to enter upon and inspect any premises at which any offensive or dangerous trade is being carried on, and the licensee or person in charge thereof shall permit the inspection to be made.

Unwholesome food and drink

16. No person shall keep or expose for sale any article of food or drink which is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.

17. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Inspector or any person authorized by the Chairman in writing, to seize any article of food or drink kept or exposed for sale, if such article appears to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption.

18. Where any officer or person, other than the Medical Officer of Health, seizes an article of food or drink under by-law 17, he shall place a sample of the seized article in a receptacle and shall, after sealing the receptacle in the presence of the person from whose possession such article was seized, produce that article with the least possible delay before the Medical Officer of Health or any other Government Medical Officer.

19. Where an article of food or drink is seized under by-law 17, the person seizing such article shall, upon demand of a sealed sample by the person from whose possession the article was seized, place a sample of the seized article in a receptacle, and shall after sealing the receptacle in the presence of the person from whose possession the article was seized, give that sample to that person.

20. If the Medical Officer of Health who seized an article of food or drink under by-law 17, or the Medical Officer before whom an article of food or drink is produced under by-law 18, certifies such article to be unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, the Chairman shall cause such article to be destroyed or to be so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for human consumption. If the Medical Officer certifies that the article of food or drink is wholesome and fit for human consumption, such article shall be returned to the owner.

21. No person shall sell or expose for sale the flesh of any animal that has died of natural causes or of any disease or by drowning, or has been killed by a wild beast or by the bite of a snake or of a rabid dog.

The cleansing of houses

22 Whenever any house appears to be in an insanitary condition or in such a state of disrepair as to be prejudicial to the health of the inmates or of the neighbours, the Chairman shall cause a notice in writing to be served upon the owner of the house specifying what action the owner should take within a time set out in the notice.

23 (1) Every owner of a house served with a notice under by-law 22 shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the specified time.

(2) In the event of failure or refusal to comply with the requirements of a notice under by-law 22, the Chairman may cause the work to be done, and the expenses thereby incurred may be recovered as a debt due to the Committee.

Dwelling compounds

24. The occupier, or if there is no occupier the owner, of any house within the village area shall keep the land pertaining to such house in a clean and sanitary condition and free of undergrowth and rubbish.

Construction of latrines

25 (1) Where the Committee defines an area within which the owner or lessee of any premises used for human habitation shall be required to construct and maintain a latrine, the Chairman may, by notice in writing, require the owner or lessee of any such premises to construct a latrine of such type and size, and in such a position on the premises and with such connecting drains, as may have been determined by the Committee. The Chairman shall specify all such requirements in the notice.

(2) Every owner or lessee of premises on whom a notice under paragraph (1) of this by-law is served, shall within thirty days of the service of any such notice, construct a latrine conforming in all respects to the requirements specified in such notice.

26. No person shall, except with the permission of the Chairman, construct or maintain a pit latrine within a radius of one hundred feet from any well supplying water for domestic purposes.

Sale of meat

27 (1) No person shall, within the village area, use any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of meat unless he is the holder of a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) Every licence issued under paragraph (1) of this by-law shall, unless it is earlier cancelled under by-law 51 expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

28. No person shall be entitled to a licence under by-law 27 unless the premises to be licensed are in conformity with the following conditions:—

- (1) The premises must be in good repair and well ventilated and well lighted, and every room must be provided with windows which are capable of being opened, the area of which when open is not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.
- (2) The walls of every room must be not less than seven feet in height, and must be built of brick, stone or cabook, with the inside thereof lime-plastered and limewashed and the lower internal surface of each such wall must be covered with glazed tiles or be plastered in cement up to a height of four feet from the ground.
- (3) All the eaves must be at least six feet from the ground.
- (4) The roof must be made of some permanent material.
- (5) All the woodwork must be oil-painted or lime-washed.
- (6) The floor must be cemented throughout.
- (7) The premises must be provided with adequate drainage.
- (8) The premises must be provided with a sanitary dust bin and at least one spittoon and with sufficient latrine accommodation.
- (9) The premises must be at least fifty feet distant from any latrine, cesspit, manure heap or open sewer.

(10) There must be no cesspit, latrine or ashpit within, or directly communicating with, the premises.

29. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the outside of that stall a board with his name and the words "Licensed Meat Stall" legibly painted thereon in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

30. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause a copy of these by-laws relating to meat stalls in English, Sinhalese and Tamil to be framed and hung in a prominent place in the licensed premises. He shall also keep in that stall a list of the names and addresses of his employees so as to be at all times available for inspection.

31. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause the walls of every room forming part of that stall, except such parts as are covered with glazed tiles or are plastered in cement, to be lime-washed, or if oil-painted, to be washed with hot water and soap, at least four times a year in the months of March, June, September, and December, and at such other times as may be ordered by the Chairman in writing.

32. The licensee of a meat stall shall not cause or permit any furniture which cannot be moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor and the walls of that stall to be used in that stall.

33. The licensee of a meat stall shall cause the top of every table on which meat is kept to be covered with zinc or other impermeable material.

34. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause the floor, the tiled or cemented portions of the walls of that stall and the tops of the tables and the chopping blocks used in that stall to be scrubbed and washed once every day. He shall cause all hooks for hanging meat to be kept polished and free from rust.

35. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep every part of that stall and the furniture, utensils and equipment used in connection with the storing preparation or sale of meat in good repair, clean, and free from effluvia arising from any drain, latrine, cesspit, or other nuisance.

36. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause a sanitary dust bin, and at least one spittoon to be kept in that stall so as to be easily accessible to those employed in that stall.

37. Every licensee of a meat stall shall cause all refuse to be immediately placed in a covered receptacle made of zinc or galvanized iron and to be removed daily from that stall. He shall cause such receptacle to be kept always covered except at the times when refuse is being actually placed in it.

38. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep that stall free from rats, and shall cause all rat holes in that stall to be filled up with broken glass and plastered with cement as soon as found.

39. No person shall keep any animal or bird in a licensed meat stall on any pretext whatsoever.

40. No person shall spit within a licensed meat stall except into a spittoon provided for the purpose.

41. No person who is suffering or who has recently suffered from any infectious, contagious, or cutaneous disease or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such a disease shall enter a licensed meat stall, or take part in the storing, preparation or sale of meat therein, or in the transport of any meat thereto or therefrom.

42. No licensee of a meat stall shall permit the contravention by any person of by-law 40 or by-law 41.

43. No person shall keep in the licensed premises any furniture, clothes, sleeping mats or articles other than those used for the purposes of storing preparation or sale of meat.

44. No licensee of a meat stall shall allow any place on the same level as that stall and forming part of the same building to be used as a sleeping place unless it is effectually separated from that stall by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and unless such sleeping place is provided with an external window, the area of which when open is not less than one-fifteenth of the superficial floor space.

45. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep in that stall an ample supply of potable water.

46. No licensee of a meat stall shall sell or expose for sale in that stall, the meat of any animal which has not been slaughtered in a public slaughter-house situated within the village area and declared and proclaimed under section 21 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201), or in a place appointed for the purpose of slaughtering animals under section 11 of that Ordinance or under a permit issued under section 14 of that Ordinance.

47. Every licensee of a meat stall shall keep that stall open daily for the sale of meat during the hours 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

48. No licensee of a meat stall shall allow any person employed by him to transport meat for sale from that stall unless such person is in possession of a card of registration signed by the Chairman and by such licensee.

49. No licensee of a meat stall shall permit any person employed by him to transport for sale from that stall any meat otherwise than in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin or other suitable receptacle. He shall see that every such vehicle, basket, tin or other receptacle is at all times kept clean and wholesome.

50. The Chairman shall, on application made to him by the licensee of a meat stall, issue a card of registration in respect of each person employed by such licensee in transporting meat for sale.

51. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of the licensee of a meat stall convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to meat stalls, and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Public health and amenities, disorderly conduct and overhanging trees

52. The owner or occupier of every house or land shall keep his premises clean and free from all weeds, rank or noisome vegetation and all refuse or rubbish or receptacles likely to form breeding places for mosquitoes, for a distance of thirty yards from such house or to the boundary of his premises, whichever is less.

53. (1) Whenever any tree, or branch or fruit or other part of a tree, is causing or is likely to cause damage to any building, or is in a condition dangerous to the occupants of any building, or to the property or to the safety of the passers-by along any public thoroughfare, the Chairman may, by a notice in writing served on the owner or occupier of the land on which such tree stands, require such owner or occupier to tie up and make secure, or to cut down and remove such tree, within such time as may be specified in the notice.

(2) Every person on whom a notice is served under this by-law shall comply with the requirements of such notice within the time specified therein, and in the event of the refusal or neglect of such person to comply with such requirements within such time, the Chairman, or any officer or workman authorized in writing by the Chairman, may enter upon the land referred to in such notice and do what such person was required to do by such notice, and the expenses thereby incurred may be recovered from such person as a debt due to the Committee.

54. No person shall cause any annoyance to any other person by publishing any obscene writing or by making any obscene drawing or by singing or reciting any obscene song or ballad, or do any other act which is likely to outrage public decency.

55. No person shall throw stones or filth at the house or into the compound, of any other person.

Public bathing places, washing and bathing

56. (1) No person who is suffering or has recently suffered from any contagious, infectious, cutaneous disease, or has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall bathe or wash at any public bathing place until the periods of infection and incubation have elapsed.

(2) Water for the use of any person referred to in paragraph (1) shall not be drawn except by a healthy person and shall not be used within a distance of twenty feet from the public bathing place.

57. Whenever a public bathing place is served by a well, no person shall use such well for washing animals, mats, or other things, or any clothes, except those worn at the time of bathing, and such clothes shall be washed at such distance from the well that the splash therefrom cannot fall into the well.

58. No person shall commit a nuisance by obeying a call of nature at or near any public bathing place, except in a latrine provided for such purpose.

59. No person shall bathe, or wash any animal or article at a communal well, spout, spring or other watering place for the supply of water for domestic purposes.

60. No person shall drive or take any animal into a public bathing place for any purpose whatsoever.

The inspection and cleaning of drains, privies, cesspits, ashpits and sanitary conveniences

61. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, or the Medical Officer of Health or the Sanitary Inspector, or any person authorized by the Chairman in writing, to inspect any drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit or sanitary convenience in any premises within the village area, and for the purpose of the inspection to enter such premises at any reasonable time; and the owner or occupier of such premises shall render all such assistance as may be necessary.

62. The Chairman may by notice require the owner or occupier of any premises within the village area forthwith or within such time as may be specified in the notice, to carry out such measures as may be specified in the notice, being measures necessary to maintain such drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit or sanitary convenience in such premises in a sanitary condition.

63. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, by notice in writing, to require the owner or occupier of any premises within the village area, within such time as may be specified in the notice, to remove the contents of any drain, privy, cesspit, ashpit or sanitary convenience in those premises, or to cause the contents to be removed to such other place, for disposal in such manner, as may be so specified.

Sale of provisions

64. No person shall keep any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, vegetables or other perishable articles of food for human consumption except on an annual licence duly obtained in that behalf from the Chairman. Every such licence shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect of which it is issued.

65. The owner or seller of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, vegetables or other perishable articles of food for human consumption in any shop or place (other than a market) shall keep the meat, poultry, and fish apart from the fruit and vegetables, and the poultry in baskets so made that the birds may not suffer unnecessary discomfort.

66. The Chairman or any person duly authorized by him in writing may inspect any shop or place (other than a market) used for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, vegetables or other perishable articles of food for human consumption.

67. (1) No meat shall be transported from any slaughter-house to any shop or place where meat is sold except in a box or vehicle which satisfies the conditions set out in the next following paragraph.

(2) (a) Every box used for the transport of meat must have the inside lined with zinc or other impermeable material and be fitted with a lid.

(b) Every vehicle used for the transport of meat must be provided with—

- (i) a roof to protect the meat from sun or rain or from contamination by flies or dust.
- (ii) a covering at each open end to screen the meat from public view; and
- (iii) a compartment the inside of which is lined with zinc or other impermeable material for storing the meat.

(3) Where any meat is transported in contravention of paragraph (1), the person liable for such contravention shall be the person on whose behalf or at whose directions the meat was so transported.

68. The holder of a licence to keep any shop or place (other than a market) for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables or other articles of food shall—

- (a) keep such premises in a clean and sanitary condition and close up all rat holes with cement and glass, and
- (b) keep affixed in a conspicuous position on the premises in which such trade is carried on the licence obtained under by-law 64 or, where such licence cannot be so affixed, shall cause a board to be affixed in a conspicuous place on the premises with the number of the licence and the name of the holder of the licence clearly painted thereon.

69. It shall be lawful for the Rural Court, in addition to any other punishment that it may impose, to cancel the licence of any licensee convicted twice or oftener of any breach of any of these by-laws relating to the sale of provisions and the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation in respect of the cancellation.

Conservancy and scavenging

70. The Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of any premises situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, require such owner to provide a pail latrine of such size and type and in such a position on the premises as may be approved by the Chairman on the recommendation of the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorized by such Medical Officer.

71. If the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorized by such Medical Officer certifies that any cesspit or latrine (not being a pail latrine of the size and type referred to in by-law 70) situated on any premises within the area for which a conservancy service has been established, is insanitary and dangerous to health, the Chairman may, by notice in writing served on the owner of such premises, require such owner to close such cesspit or latrine.

72. Every owner on whom a notice referred to in by-law 70 or by-law 71 has been served shall comply with the requirements of such notice within such time, in no case to be less than two months, as may be specified in such notice.

73. Every occupier of premises provided with a pail latrine and situated within an area for which a conservancy service has been established, shall maintain such latrine at all times in a sanitary condition and in good repair.

74. No person other than a conservancy labourer employed by the Committee shall remove or otherwise dispose of the night soil from any pail latrine within the area for which a conservancy service has been established.

75. The occupier of any premises served by the conservancy service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a conservancy fee calculated at the rate of two rupees for each bucket used on the premises.

76. For the purpose of inspecting any cesspit or any latrine, whether constructed or in the course of construction on any premises, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health or an officer authorized by him, to enter the premises at any time between sunrise and sunset, and the occupier of the premises shall render such officer all such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of the inspection.

77. The occupier of any premises situated within an area for which a scavenging service has been established, shall cause all ashes, sweepings and other refuse from those premises to be deposited in a bucket or bin with a suitable cover and of such shape and size as may be approved by the Chairman.

78. The occupier of any premises referred to in by-law 77 shall—

- (1) daily, between such hours as the Chairman may from time to time notify by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, cause the bucket or bin mentioned in that by-law to be placed by the edge of the road outside such premises but so as to cause no obstruction to traffic on the road, and

- (2) cause such bucket or bin to be removed within half an hour of the emptying of such bucket or bin by the scavenging labourers of the Committee.

79. No person shall place on any road any bucket or bin referred to in by-law 77 except between such hours as are referred to in by-law 78.

80. The occupier of any premises served by the scavenging service, other than an occupier who is exempted by the Committee on the ground of poverty, shall pay monthly to the Committee a scavenging fee calculated at the rate of fifty cents for each bucket.

81. The conservancy fee referred to in by-law 75 and the scavenging fee referred to in by-law 80 shall be paid to the Chairman of the Committee or to any person duly authorized by him in writing to collect such fees, on or before the tenth day of the month immediately following the month in respect of which such fees are due. Provided that when the owner or occupier of any premises has given written notice in advance to the Chairman that the premises will not be occupied during the whole of any specified month, and such owner or occupier subsequently satisfies the Chairman, that such premises were in fact not occupied during that month, no conservancy or scavenging fee shall be payable in respect of those premises for that month.

Interpretation

82. In these by-laws—

- “ Chairman ” means the Chairman of the Committee.
- “ Committee ” means the Village Committee of the Kandupita Pattu North and Kandupita Pattu South village area;
- “ licence ” means a licence issued under any of these by-laws,
- “ licensee ” means a person to whom a licence is issued under any of these by-laws; and
- “ village area ” means the village area of Kandupita Pattu North and Kandupita Pattu South.

The Butchers Ordinance

REGULATIONS made by the proper authority in that behalf, to wit, the Village Committee of the Hanwella Udugaha Pattu village area in the Colombo District, under section 22 of the Butchers Ordinance (Chapter 201), and confirmed by the Minister of Health and Local Government by virtue of the powers vested in him by that section, as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary*, No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947.

REGULATIONS

1. The public slaughter-house proclaimed under section 21 of the Ordinance shall be in charge of the Sanitary Inspector. Such officer shall be responsible for the discipline and sanitary conditions within such slaughter-house.

2. (1) No person shall slaughter any animal at the slaughter-house—

- (a) unless such animal has been inspected by the officer appointed by the Committee for the purpose, and approved by him as fit to be slaughtered for human food; or
- (b) except between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 a. m. :
Provided that the Chairman may in any case authorise the slaughter of any animal at any time other than that specified herein.

(2) No person shall slaughter any animal at the slaughter-house—

- (a) at any time after the expiry of a period of 72 hours from the time of the approval of that animal under paragraph (1), or
- (b) if it has been removed alive from the slaughter-house premises after it was approved under paragraph (1), unless it is again inspected and approved under that paragraph as fit to be slaughtered for human food.

3. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of the slaughter-house shall take all such measures as may be necessary to ensure that that animal is adequately fed and watered while it remains in those premises.

4. Every person who brings any animal into the premises of the slaughter-house shall, if the animal is rejected as unfit for slaughter, immediately after such rejection, remove the animal or cause it to be removed from those premises.

5. The Medical Officer of Health, or the officer referred to in regulation 2 may prohibit the slaughter of any animal if, after it has been approved under regulation 2, it is found to be diseased or unfit to be slaughtered for human food.

6. If the meat or offal of any animal slaughtered in the slaughter-house is, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health or of the officer referred to in regulation 2, diseased or unfit for human consumption, he shall cause the meat or offal to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent such meat or offal being exposed for sale or used for human consumption.

7. The officer in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animal which has not been approved as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption, or the slaughter of which has been prohibited under the provisions of regulation 5.

8. (1) No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the Medical Officer of Health or the officer referred to in regulation 2, any meat or offal which has been declared under regulation 6 to be unfit for human consumption.

(2) No person shall remove the carcase of any animal intended for human consumption from the slaughter-house, unless that carcase has been stamped on its fore-quarters and hind-quarters with the mark "V. C. Hanwella Udugaha Pattu" by the officer in charge of the slaughter-house.

9. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of any other animal, or until the carcase of every animal previously slaughtered in the premises shall have been removed or screened off and the premises cleaned.

10. (1) A fee at the following rates shall be paid in advance to the Committee for the use of the slaughter-house, and no animal shall be permitted to be slaughtered without an official receipt in proof of payment of the fee:—

For cattle	0 50 per head
For sheep, goats or pigs	0 25 per head

(2) Where an animal has been approved under regulation 2, as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption, the production of an official receipt in proof of payment of the fee shall not be necessary prior to the admission of that animal to the slaughter-house.

11. The keeper of the slaughter-house shall maintain a register in the following form of all cattle removed to the slaughter-house:—

BY-LAWS*Hairdressing Saloons or Barbers' Shops*

1 No person shall be entitled to a licence to use any premises or place as a hair-dressing saloon or barber's shop unless the building or part of the building to be used for the purpose, and the equipment of the saloon or shop, are in conformity with the following conditions and requirements:—

(1) The building or part of the building must—

- (a) be substantially constructed, and must have a floor space of not less than 120 square feet;
- (b) have its walls lime-plastered, its roof provided with a wooden or other similar ceiling painted white, its floor cemented, and the junction of the floor with the walls rounded off with cement;
- (c) be well lighted and well ventilated; and
- (d) be provided with satisfactory drains, and with satisfactory latrine accommodation either within the building or on the premises; Provided that the requirements of sub-paragraph (a) shall not apply to any building in which a saloon or shop is carried on or kept at the date of the publication of this by-law in the *Gazette*.

(2) If any part of the building is used or intended to be used for residential purposes, that part must be in conformity with the requirements of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance (Chapter 199).

(3) The saloon or shop must be provided with—

- (a) a sufficient supply of water at all times during which the saloon or shop is open to customers;
- (b) means for securing an adequate supply either of boiling water or of disinfectants, for the purpose of washing or sterilizing the instruments or appliances in daily use;

- (c) facilities for the hairdressers or barbers to wash their hands during the course of their work;
- (d) a sufficient number of receptacles for the disinfectants to be used for sterilizing instruments or appliances;
- (e) a sufficient supply of towels and overalls for the use of the customers;
- (f) a sufficient number of spittoons kept by the side of the seats in such manner as to be readily available to customers and employees; and
- (g) a covered and moveable dustbin made of galvanized iron or other impervious material, for the reception of hair-clippings and refuse.

2. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position outside the saloon or shop, a board bearing the words "Licensed Hairdressing Saloon" or "Licensed Barber's Shop", as the case may be; and
- (b) keep affixed, in a conspicuous position within the saloon or shop, a framed copy of these regulations in English, Sinhalese and Tamil.

3. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause the walls of such saloon or shop to be lime-washed and the ceiling painted at least once in every six months; and
- (b) keep clean the floor, walls, ceiling, fixtures, furniture, and equipment of such saloon or shop.

4. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall cause every hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop—

- (a) to keep his person and his wearing apparel clean,
- (b) to keep his finger nails short and free from dirt, and
- (c) to wash his hands with soap and water immediately before attending to each customer.

5. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall—

- (a) cause every spittoon in such saloon or shop to be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition;
- (b) cause every hair-brush or comb used in such saloon or shop to be washed or cleaned, and sterilized or disinfected every day, and to be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times;
- (c) cause every shaving mug or cup, shaving brush, clipper, razor, or other cutting instrument, used in such saloon or shop to be well rinsed and cleaned in hot water after each occasion on which it is used; and
- (d) cause all hair-clippings and other refuse to be collected after each customer has been attended to, and to be deposited in the dustbin provided for the purpose.

6. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use, or permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him in such saloon or shop to use, on any customer—

- (a) any styptic pencil, powder-puff or sponge, or
- (b) any alum or other material for the purpose of stopping any bleeding, unless such alum or other material is in powder or liquid form.

7. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not supply, for the use of any customer, any towel which is not fresh from the wash or any overall which is not clean.

8. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not—

- (a) knowingly permit any person who is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease of any kind, or who has recently been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease to enter the saloon or shop for any purpose; or

- (b) employ any person referred to in paragraph (a) in any capacity in such saloon or shop; or
- (c) knowingly permit any hairdresser or barber employed by him to attend in the saloon or shop on any person referred to in paragraph (a); or
- (d) permit any such hairdresser or barber who, by error or accident, attends on any person referred to in paragraph (a), to attend on any customer unless that hairdresser or barber washes and cleans his hands before attending on such other customer, or
- (e) permit any instrument that has been used on any person referred to in paragraph (a) to be used on any other person until it is sterilized

9 No person shall expectorate within any hairdressing saloon or barber's shop, except into a spittoon provided for the purpose

10. The licensee of a hairdressing saloon or barber's shop shall not use or permit any other person to use the licensed premises—

- (a) as a place for taking meals at any time, or
- (b) as a place for sleeping, except at night when such premises are not open to customers

Unwholesome articles of food or drink

1. No person shall hawk, keep or expose for sale, otherwise than in a case or receptacle so constructed of permanent material as to prevent the contamination of its contents by dust or flies, any cooked food, pastry, confectionery, sweetmeat, sherbet, sweet drink, preserved fruit, or fruit peeled, skinned, cut or otherwise

prepared for immediate consumption. Such case or receptacle shall always be maintained in a clean condition and shall not be left open except for the purpose of placing articles therein or cleaning it.

2. (1) No person shall hawk or keep or expose for sale on any public thoroughfare, any vegetables, fruit or perishable articles except on a licence issued in that behalf by the Chairman.

(2) Every licence issued under this by-law shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in respect on which it is issued.

3. (1) It shall be lawful for the Sanitary Inspector or any other officer appointed for the purpose by the Council to inspect any article of food or drink kept or exposed for sale, and, if it appears to him that such article of food or drink is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, to seize and convey such article to the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health.

(2) If the Chairman or the Medical Officer of Health certifies that any article of food or drink seized under paragraph (1) is unwholesome or unfit for human consumption, such article may be destroyed without payment of compensation to the person from whose possession it was seized.

4. Every contravention of by-law 1, shall be punishable with a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, and, in the case of continuing contravention with an additional fine not exceeding twenty-five rupees for every day during which the contravention is continued after conviction thereof by a court of competent jurisdiction or after service of a written notice from the Chairman directing attention to such contravention.



The Minutes of Proceedings of the General Monthly Meeting of the Jaffna Municipal Council held at the Office of the Council on Friday, January 13, 1950, at 5 p.m., pursuant to notice dated January 9, 1950

Present: C. Ponnambalam, Esq. (Mayor); S. R. Thalayasingham, Esq. (Deputy Mayor); Messrs. R. R. Nalliah, P. M. John, J. Sebastiampillai, P. Casippillai, A. M. Brodie, S. Visuvalingam, S. S. Navaratnam, T. S. Durairajah, S. M. M. Abdul Cader, Kathi S. M. Aboobucker, S. A. Sabapathy and E. T. Hitchcock.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the General monthly meeting of the Council held on December 9, 1949, of the Special Meeting of the Council held on December 17, 1949, and of the meeting of the Council held in terms of section 15 (sub-section 1) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance on January 6, 1950, copies of which had been previously furnished to each member of the Council were taken as read and confirmed.

2. No memorials or petitions were presented.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. S. Durairajah moved:—
“This Council recommends to the Governor-General through the Cabinet the establishment of a permanent Bribery Commission to inquire into allegations and complaints of bribery and corruption in connection with or regarding elections in local authorities, bodies or institutions and in and from Government.” Mr. P. Mr. A. M. Brodie seconded pro forma.

Messrs. S. A. Sabapathy, P. M. John, T. S. Durairajah, Kathi S. M. Aboobucker, Mr. A. M. Brodie and the Mayor participated in the discussion. The House went into Committee and on resuming Mr P. It was decided to spend Rs. 350 out of the amount provided in the Budget (Rs. 1,000) for civic receptions to the Governor-General and the Prime Minister for getting the casket made, the address engraved. Copies of addresses printed in Tamil and English, &c.

It was also decided to appoint a Committee consisting of Messrs. R. R. Nalliah, A. M. Brodie, S. A. Sabapathy and the Mayor to draft the address in English and get it translated in Tamil.

It was further decided to present the address in Tamil to the Governor-General and furnish him with a printed English translation (of same).

It was also further decided to restrict by issue of tickets the entry into Town Hall on the 24th instant.

It was finally decided to inform the Minister for Home Affairs and Rural Development that the Members of the Municipal Council should be present at the Jaffna Railway station to welcome the Governor-General on his first official visit to Jaffna (and that precedence be given to the Mayor and Members over others).

8. Considered the application made by the Principal, Kokkuvil Hindu College for a temporary extension from Kankasanturai Road terminus to the Kokkuvil Hindu College for providing electrical illumination for a Carnival to be run from March 24, 1950 to April 3, 1950, in aid of the College. It was decided to extend the service mains and give temporary service connection to the College.

It was further decided to get on loan a transformer from the Anuradhapura Urban Council.

Minutes of proceedings of the monthly general meeting of the Kandy Municipal Council held at the Town Hall, Kandy, at 9 a.m. on November 26, 1949, in pursuance of the notice dated November 21, 1949.

Present. Senator W. A. B. Soysa (Mayor), presiding, D. Ramanujam, Esq. (Deputy Mayor); Gate Mudaliyar N. Canaganayagam; Messrs. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, A. C. L. Ratwatte, A. S. Karunaratne, E. L. Senanayake, P. L. P. Alwis, S. L. Ratwatte, D. B. Wadugodapitiya, A. Dissanayake, N. Wimalasena, T. B. Tennekoon.

1. The minutes of proceedings of the monthly general meeting held on October 29, 1949, copies whereof had been previously furnished to the members, were taken as read, and it was resolved that these minutes be approved and be signed by the Mayor as a true record of the proceedings of the Council on this date.

2. *Announcements by the Mayor.*—The Mayor announced that he had received a communication from the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Transport and Works, in reply to inquiries he had made regarding the progress of work on the Peradeniya River Pumping Scheme, stating that the two pumps had now been transported to Kandy, and one of them at least would be installed and working by about December 15.

Mr. N. Wimalasena inquired what progress had been made in connection with the construction of the Lewella River Pumping Scheme.

The Mayor stated that the Electrical Engineer had called for tenders for the supply of electrical materials required for this scheme, and these tenders were being submitted to the Electricity Committee.

3. The following reports and statements were tabled.—

- (1) Statements of receipts and disbursements in respect of the General Revenue Account for September 1949, and in respect of the Electricity Department Revenue Account for July 1949.
- (2) Progress Report of the Municipal Electrical Engineer for June 1949.
- (3) Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the month of September 1949.
- (4) Inspectors' Reports on Laundries and Bakeries for September 1949.
- (5) Reports on Public Latrines for September 1949.
- (6) Reports of the Municipal Free Ayurvedic Dispensaries for the month of September 1949.
- (7) Works Engineer's report for the month of September 1949.
- (8) Minutes of the meeting of the Public Assistance Committee held on October 28, 1949.
- (9) Reservoir Readings for the week ended November 25, 1949.

4. *Memorials, petitions, complaints, and communications addressed to the Council.*—Mr. D. Ramanujam stated that he had received a number of complaints from the residents of the southern portion of Cemetery Road that they were not getting any water at present. There were several tenements in this area which did not have water service connections, and the tenants suffered serious hardship. He asked the Mayor to see that arrangements were made to have water available for them by lorry.

(b) Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne asked the Mayor to take early steps to have the necessary regulations enacted with a view to prohibit the sounding of motor horns within the area which the Council some time ago approved of being proclaimed a "Silence" zone.

(c) Mr. N. Wimalasena asked the Mayor to cause tenders to be called for the construction of the houses of the Dangolla Housing Scheme without delay.

The Mayor undertook to look into the matters referred to by Messrs. Ramanujam, Wickremaratne, and Wimalasena.

5. *Questions.*—Nil.

6. *Notice of Motions.*—Nil.

7. *Motions.*—Pursuant to notice, Mr. N. Wimalasena moved:—"This Council urges the Central Government to subsidize further, and take all such other steps as are deemed necessary to bring down immediately the rising cost of foodstuffs, clothing, and other articles essential for the daily needs of the masses of this country to at least the pre-devaluation level, to relieve the hardship increasingly felt today".

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte seconded the motion.

Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, in supporting the motion, suggested to the mover that he should delete the words "subsidize further" from the motion, as it lacked precision in the present form and was ineffective since it did not mention what particular items were to be further subsidized.

The mover and seconder having consented to the amendment, the motion was submitted in the following amended form to the house and was carried:—"This Council urges the Central Government to take all such steps as are deemed necessary to bring down immediately the rising cost of foodstuffs, clothing, and other articles essential for the daily needs of the masses of the country to at least the pre-devaluation level, to relieve the hardship increasingly felt today".

7A. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. B. Wadugodapitiya moved, together, the following motions which stood in his name:—

(1) "That 3 stand pipes be installed in Slaughter House Road and Suduhumpola Road".

(2) "That the portion of Crown Land opposite the Kandy Police Station be opened up as a Children's Recreation Park".

(3) "That a mercury vapour light be installed at the junction of Police Station—Peradeniya Road—Station Road".

(4) "That immediate steps be taken to remove the Slaughter House to Gohagoda and a token vote be given".

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte seconded the motions.

It was resolved that motions (1) and (3) be referred to the Works and Finance Committees and Electricity and Finance Committees respectively for consideration and report, and that motions (2) and (4) be referred to the Works, Health, and Finance Committees for consideration and report.

7B. Pursuant to notice, Mr. A. S. Karunaratne moved:—"That a site be leased to the Kandy Buddhist Association near Wace Park for the purpose of building the Head Quarters of the Association".

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte seconded the motion.

It was resolved that the motion be referred to the Law and Finance Committees for consideration and report.

7C. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. B. Wadugodapitiya was to have moved the following motion, which stood in his name:—

"In view of the fact that residents of Suduhumpola, numbering over 2,000, suffer great inconvenience and danger to their lives by having to walk over the railway line and the railway bridge at Suduhumpola, this Council is of opinion that the funds voted under head 23/49 of 1949, be utilized to construct a temporary footbridge over the Meda Ela by obtaining way leave from the C. G. R. to construct this footbridge on railway land, without interfering in any way with the railway or its wing walls".

Mr. Wadugodapitiya withdrew the motion with the leave of the house, and suggested that an estimate for this purpose might be prepared and submitted for consideration by the 4 Standing Committees at their meeting to be held on December 9 in connexion with the budget proposals for 1950.

8 *Reports of Standing Committees.*—Mr. N. Wimalasena moved "that the Council do resolve itself into a committee of the whole Council for the purpose of considering the extracts from the proceedings of the Standing Committees, annexed to the Agenda".

Mr. E. L. Senanayake seconded.—Carried.

COUNCIL IN COMMITTEE

The following extracts from the minutes of the joint meeting of the Standing Committees on "Finance" and "Law" held on November 14, 1949, were considered:—

(1) With reference to the recommendation made by the Law and Finance Committees at their joint meeting held on October 19, 1949, that the Commissioner be directed to terminate Mr. Jainulabdeen's tenancy of market stalls Nos. 28 and 29 in view of his contravention of market by-law 68, which was before the Council for disposal on October 29, 1949, the Council resolved that the matter be referred back to the Law and Finance Committees for further consideration and report, having regard to the opinion expressed by the Council's lawyer that although it was clear that Mr. Jainulabdeen had committed a breach of by-law 68 and was liable to punishment, it was debatable that he was liable to forfeit the right to trade in the stall.

All relevant papers are submitted including the by-laws. The opinion of Mr. N. W. Weerasooriya, K. C., to which Mr. Alfred Fernando refers, is flagged in file No. D/105.

As Mr. Jainulabdeen had committed a punishable offence under the market by-laws in sub-letting the stalls, the Law and Finance Committees recommend that the Council's lawyer be instructed to institute an action against him for breach of market by-law 68.

It was resolved that the recommendation of the Law and Finance Committees be adopted.

(2) Mr. V. A. Caruppiah was informed that if he did not complete the agreement in connection with the lease of Empire Theatre site to him on or before November 25, and take possession of the site, that his occupation of the Wales Theatre site would be terminated on December 31, 1949, with reference to M. C. resolution No. 8 (31) of October 29, 1949.

Mr. Caruppiah's lawyers met the Municipal Commissioner and Mr. Alfred Fernando, the Council's lawyer, by arrangement on November 5, 1949, and have suggested certain amendments to the original conditions proposed for the lease. These are indicated in the accompanying memo. from the Municipal Commissioner. The Council's lawyer's observations on the suggested amendments are submitted, as well as a letter from Messrs. Julius and Creasy, Mr. Caruppiah's lawyers, suggesting certain variations in the terms of the lease for consideration by the Council.

The Law and Finance Committees recommend—

- (a) That no reduction of rent be made.
- (b) That no extension of the time limit of one year fixed under the original terms for completing the construction of the new theatre and the demolition of Wales Theatre be granted.
- (c) That although it is unlikely that the Council would grant any renewal of the lease of the Bogambara site held by Mr. Manapperuma on the expiry of the present term, the Council inform Mr. Caruppiah's lawyers that it regrets it is unable to give any undertaking to that effect.
- (d) That the original requirement in clause 2 (3) that Mr. Caruppiah should provide seating accommodation for 900 persons in the new theatre be varied, and Mr. Caruppiah be allowed to provide seating capacity for not less than 500 persons.
- (e) That the minor amendments to clause 2 (5), 2 (8), 2 (15) and 3 suggested by the Municipal Commissioner be approved, since they will not affect the Council's interests.

Further letter dated November 23, 1949, received from Messrs. Julius & Creasy, stating that Mr. Caruppiah was prepared to enter into the lease on the terms indicated in these recommendations, but as it might not be possible to execute the agreement by November 30, they were asking Mr. Caruppiah to take possession of the Empire Theatre site pending completion of the lease bond, and the Council's lawyer's report thereon were tabled.

F 4

It was resolved that recommendations (a), (b), (c), and (e) be adopted, and as regards recommendation (d), that Mr. Caruppiah be required to provide seating accommodation for 750 persons in the new theatre.

It was further resolved (1) that Messrs. Julius & Creasy be asked to make arrangements for the execution of the lease by Mr. Caruppiah on November 30, and for his taking possession of the Empire Theatre site thereafter, as in the view of the Council's lawyer it is not proper for the Council to give Mr. Caruppiah possession of the Empire Theatre site on December 1 before he executes the lease, nor has the Council the power to do so; (2) that the Municipal Commissioner be instructed to serve notice on Mr. Caruppiah on November 28, requiring him to quit and vacate and deliver quiet possession to the Council of the site on which the Wales Theatre stands on January 1, 1950. The question of withdrawing this notice to be considered by the Council after Mr. Caruppiah executes the lease in respect of the Empire Theatre site.

The following extracts from the minutes of the Standing Committee on "Finance and Establishment" held on November 14, 1949, were considered:—

(3) To consider memo. dated October 6, 1949, from the Works Engineer suggesting that the Council engage the services of a surveyor for a few months for the purpose of expediting work connected with a large number of pending surveys which it is impossible for the permanent surveyor to cope with owing to the demands made by more urgent work on his hands.

The Works Committee recommends that the Council sanction the employment of a temporary surveyor for 6 months on a salary of Rs. 350 and a travelling allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(4) To consider applications received for the post of Peon, Secretariat. (Cir. 692 C)

Recommend that the Mayor and the Commissioner be authorized to appoint a suitable candidate for the post, after interviewing all the eligible candidates.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(5) To consider application from Mr. M. S. Jainu Deen, Registrar of Public Assistance, for a loan of Rs. 4,700 to enable him to purchase a second-hand motor car for use in connection with his official travelling.

The Accountant recommends that a loan of Rs. 2,268 representing one year's salary be advanced to him, repayable in 36 monthly instalments with interest at $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, and on the usual conditions (Cir. 754 C.)

Recommend that a loan of Rs. 2,268 be granted to Mr. Jainu Deen for the purpose, on the terms suggested by the Accountant.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(6) With reference to M. C. Resolution No. 8 (47) of July 30, 1949, the Local Government Service Commission advertised the post of Sinhalese Stenographer on the scale Rs. 2,100—17 of Rs. 120; 1 of 60—Rs. 4,200.

The Chairman of the Commission reports that the only eligible candidate was given a test and was found unsuitable for appointment as he did not possess a speed of more than 20 words a minute.

Papers are submitted for information of members and for an expression of views as to what further action is necessary in these circumstances. (Cir. 757 C.)

Recommend that the Local Government Service Commission be asked to subject the candidate referred to, to a further test three months hence, and if he is found suitable, to appoint him for the post.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted subject to the Commission being asked to test the candidate six months hence, as it is unlikely that he will be able to acquire the necessary proficiency within the short period of three months.

(7) To obtain a supplementary vote of Rs. 200 under Head 7 Minor Sanitary Services—Sub-Head (9) Sick Pay Health Department—as the M. O. H. reports that the sum of Rs. 1,000 provided in the Budget is inadequate

for meeting the expenditure on account of sick pay claims of the Health Department labourers until the end of the year.

Recommend that a supplementary vote of Rs. 200 be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(8) The Municipal Council by its resolution No. 8 (11) of June 26, 1948, decided that a charge of Rs. 5 per hour be levied in connection with the hire of its electric gramophone to the public for use at the Phoenix Tea Garden and the Town Hall at social functions. The charge is considered excessive. The Works Engineer suggests that Rs. 3 per hour be charged and that the maximum charge per diem be fixed at Rs. 15. He also suggests that the Municipal Electrical Engineer be responsible for the custody of the gramophone.

Recommend that Rs. 3 per hour be charged for the hire of the gramophone subject to the maximum charge per diem not exceeding Rs. 15 as suggested by the Works Engineer, and that the Electrical Engineer be entrusted with the custody of the gramophone.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(9) To obtain a vote of Rs. 500 for effecting repairs to the Venturi Meter at the Reservoir.

Recommend that a vote of Rs. 500 be allowed for the purpose.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(10) The Finance Committee's recommendation of October 19, 1949, disapproving of the proposal contained in the motion of Mr. P. B. A. Weerakoon to change the designation of Distraining Inspectors to Revenue Inspectors has been referred back by the Council to the Finance Committee for further consideration and report after hearing the officers concerned.

The papers are re-submitted. (Cir. 800 C.)

The three Distraining Inspectors concerned were heard by the Committee.

The Finance Committee's attention having been drawn to the fact that officers who performed similar duties under all other local authorities were designated as Revenue Inspectors, it recommends that the Local Government Service Commission be requested to change the designation of these officers to Revenue Inspectors.

It was resolved that the Local Government Service Commission be requested to change the designation of these officers to Revenue Inspectors, as recommended by the Finance Committee.

(11) The following item from the minutes of the Finance Committee of October 19, 1949, which was submitted to the Municipal Council for disposal at their meeting held on October 29, 1949, has been referred back to the Finance Committee for further consideration and report, at the request of Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne who wished to go into the qualifications of Mrs. L. A. de Silva, one of the applicants for the post:—

“ With reference to S. C. (B) resolution No. 4 of September 2, 1949, to consider the further report of the M. O. H. stating that in his opinion Mrs. Amarasinghe is the best out of the candidates interviewed and recommending that if this candidate is unable to obtain her release from Government from the undertaking given by her to serve 3 years, that Mrs. D. L. Peter, the next suitable candidate be appointed. (Cir. 710 B & C)

The Health Committee recommends that the appointment of Mrs. Amarasinghe for the post be approved, and if Mrs. Amarasinghe is unable to obtain her release in consequence of the undertaking given by her to Government, that the post be offered to Mrs. D. L. Peter.

Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be adopted.”

The affidavit relative to her age which Mrs. de Silva furnished is flagged. (Cir. 818 C.)

The Finance Committee adheres to its recommendation of October 19, 1949.

It was resolved that the Finance Committee's recommendation of January 19, 1949, be adopted.

(12) With reference to the application made by Mr. D. L. Weerasinghe, Revenue Inspector, for

re-imbusement of his travelling expenses from Galle to Kandy, which the Council by its resolution No. 8 (41) of July 30, 1949, disallowed on the ground that his letter of appointment did not appear to indicate that he could be regarded as a “ transferred ” officer, a further letter has been received from the Chairman, Local Government Service Commission, indicating that Mr. Weerasinghe had been transferred from the Galle Municipal Council to the Kandy Municipal Council and his travelling expenses are payable in terms of the principle laid down by the Commission.

The expenditure incurred by Mr. Weerasinghe amounts to Rs. 96.10 and a vote is required to enable payment to be made to him.

The Finance Committee's view that only officers who are transferred from one post to another at the instance of the Local Government Service Commission could be regarded as being eligible to be re-imbursed with their removal expenses was conveyed to the Commission.

The Chairman of the Commission holds that Mr. Weerasinghe is entitled to be paid travelling expenses incurred by him on change of station, as once a person becomes a member of the Service, any subsequent appointment on promotion or transfer from one station to another which is approved by the Commission should be considered as a transfer for purposes of travelling expenses payable to the officer on change of station. Mr. Weerasinghe was in the Local Government Service at the time of his appointment as Revenue Inspector and of his transfer to Kandy. (Cir. 795 C.)

The Finance Committee does not agree with the view of the L. G. S. C. Chairman, but it can see no alternative under the provisions of the law but to recommend the payment of the claim.

It was resolved that the Finance Committee's recommendation be adopted.

(13) The following extracts from the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting of October 19, 1949, were submitted to the Municipal Council for disposal at its meeting held on October 29, 1949.

(i) “ To consider submission made by Mr. P. L. A. Alwis, Waterworks Inspector, Works Department, who has been graded by the Local Government Service Commission as a Junior Waterworks Inspector, in connection with the conversion of his salary to the L. G. S. C. Salary Scheme, urging his claims to be placed on the salary scale prescribed for Waterworks Inspectors.

The Works Engineer is of opinion that an equitable salary scale for this officer is Rs. 1,440—120—Rs. 3,480 and that he should be designated as Water Works Inspector and placed on Rs. 1,680 on this scale from April 17, 1949, with due regard to the character and nature of the duties of the officer. (Cir. 634 D & C.)

The Works Committee recommends that the Local Government Service Commission be requested (1) to review its earlier decision in view of the submissions of the officer and the Works Engineer's report on this case, (2) to designate the officer as Waterworks Inspector; and (3) to place him on the salary of Rs. 1,800 per annum on the scale Rs. 1,440—120—Rs. 3,480. (Rs. 1,800 is suggested as it is reported that he is in receipt of a salary in excess of Rs. 1,680 at present).

The Finance Committee disapproves of any reviewer of the salary scale laid down for this officer in the L. G. S. C. Salary Scheme which was approved by the Council in September 1948, in view of the original terms of his employment and of the fact that the salary scale to which he has been converted places him in a favourable position, having regard to the fact that on the terms of his appointment he was entitled to receive a maximum salary of Rs. 1,800 per annum only allowing for the merger of the special temporary allowance.”

(ii) To consider submission made by Mr. E. N. de Lanerolle, Electrical Inspector, Power Station, that the salary scale laid down for his post be revised in view of the revised scale of salary adopted by the Council for the post of Senior Waterworks Inspector, with Accountant's report thereon.

The Law and Electricity Committee recommends that in view of the fact that the general revision of salaries took place as recently as September 1948, and the

Council had given careful consideration to the merits of each case on that occasion before arriving at a decision, the application be refused. The Accountant points out that the granting of this application would create an undesirable precedent and that aspect of the matter is one which cannot be ignored.

Recommend that Law and Electricity Committee's recommendation be approved.

The Council resolved that both items be referred back to the Finance Committee for further consideration and report. (M. C. 8 (41) and (50) of October 29, 1949.)

Papers are re-submitted accordingly. (Cir. 810 C.)

Reconsidered.

The Finance Committee can see no justification for varying the previous recommendations which it made in these two cases.

It was resolved that the recommendations made by the Finance Committee in these two cases be adopted as the Council sees no reason to vary them.

(14) To consider memo. dated October 11, 1949, from the Works Engineer suggesting that the rates at present charged by the Council for letting the Bogambara grounds for different games of sport be revised, so that the rates may include expenditure incurred by the Council in preparing the ground for such purposes. The new rates suggested by him are as follows for the letting of the ground for a day or part thereof.—

Additional charge of Rs. 5 to be levied where parties booking the ground desire the use of the Ratwatte Sports Pavilion.

Additional charge of 25 cents to be levied for each chair or bench used by parties outside the pavilion, where such parties have not booked the pavilion, but desire to use such furniture on the grounds.

Recommend that the new rates suggested by the Works Engineer be approved, and that charges be recovered at these rates for bookings after January 1, 1950.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(15) To obtain sanction for writing off the sum of Rs. 9.16 being amount of rent for November and December 1948, due from Mr. D. Ponniah, the tenant of Model Dwelling No. 114 at Deiyannewela, which is irrecoverable. (Cir. 793 C.)

Recommend that the amount of Rs. 9.16 be written off accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(16) To obtain a vote of Rs. 27.50 for meeting the cost of printed posters supplied to the Police by the Union Printing Works in connection with the One Way Traffic Scheme introduced by the Police on the occasion of the 1949 Tooth Relic Exposition. (Cir. 799 C.)

Recommend that a vote of Rs. 27.50 be allowed for this purpose.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(17) To obtain a vote of Rs. 785 for meeting the cost of purchase of an Imperial typewriter with Sinhalese characters from Messrs. Cargills Ltd. (Cir. 819 C.)

Recommend that a vote of Rs. 785 be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(18) To obtain a vote of Rs. 65.35 for procuring from the Government Factory Engineer a new set of 7 seals for stamping weights and measures. (Cir. 816 C.)

Recommend that a vote of Rs. 65.35 be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(19) The Works Engineer purchased an electric pump and G. I. piping and pipe fittings from Messrs. The Gampaha Stores with the Commissioner's approval, as these were urgently required, after calling for quotations from this firm as well as other reputable firms. He did not, however, call for tenders by advertisement in the press as contemplated in section 229 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 29 of 1947, in this case.

The amount quoted by Gampaha Stores for the pump was not the lowest out of the quotations, Messrs. Roche & Co. having quoted Rs. 50 less than Gampaha Stores for this item. The Works Engineer was of opinion that the pump quoted for by Messrs. Roche & Co. was not suitable for his purposes and he recommended acceptance of the tender of Messrs. Gampaha Stores.

In regard to the G. I. piping, the Gampaha Stores' quotation for this item was the lowest.

In regard to pipe fittings, while the Gampaha Stores' quotation was the lowest in respect of the G. I. 2" bends, their quotations were not the lowest in respect of the following items.—

- 1—2" valve and strainer; 8—2" G. I. couplings,
- 1—Reflux valve; 10 Tee branches 2" x 1", and
- 5—Tee branches 2" x 1/2".

In making his recommendation, the Works Engineer had taken into account the sum total of all the items constituting the quotations of the firms, and from this point of view Messrs. Gampaha Stores' was the lowest. In these circumstances authority of Council is required for having purchased these requirements without calling for tenders by advertisement in the press, and for having accepted the quotations of the Gampaha Stores in respect of the items specified above. (Cir. 838 C and D.)

Recommend that authority be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(20) Mr. S. R. de Silva, Municipal Electrical Engineer, points out that deductions made from his salary in respect of quarters allowed to him amount to Rs. 144.40 per mensem, as he has been called upon to forego his rent allowance and contribute 6 per cent of his salary in addition.

As his predecessor was provided with the quarters free of rent and had only to forego his rent allowance, he asks that he be allowed the same concession as well as the free use of 40 units of electricity current per month which his predecessor enjoyed.

The Chairman of the Local Government Service Commission who was addressed on the matter has indicated that no rent allowance should be paid as he is in occupation of M. C. quarters and that there is no objection to rent at 6 per cent. of his salary being recovered therefore. (Cir. 506 A and C.)

As the Law Committee is satisfied that the fair and economic rental for the bungalow would be Rs. 100 per mensem, it recommends that the Municipal Electrical Engineer be allowed to occupy the bungalow in lieu of the rent allowance of Rs. 100 payable to him in ordinary circumstances, and that the further deduction of 6 per cent. contemplated in the F.R.R. be not made from his salary. As regards his application for a free allowance of electric current, as in the case of his predecessor, the Law Committee does not recommend the request as it can see no justification for such a free allowance of current.

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(21) To consider letter No. E. 31 of September 20, 1949, from the Chairman, Local Government Service Commission, inviting the observations of the Council on the regulations proposed to be framed by the Local Government Service Commission relating to the grant of leave, overtime, and acting pay to members of the Service.

The Law Committee recommends that the Council agree with the views expressed by the Municipal Commissioner in his memorandum dated October 11, 1949.

and suggests the amendment of regulations Nos. 3, 5, 6 (i), 6 (iii), 9 (v) and 20 (i) accordingly. It also suggests that provision should be made in the regulation for the delegation by the Mayor of the Powers vested in him under the regulations in regard to grant of acting pay, overtime, &c., to the Municipal Commissioner.

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(22) With reference to M. C. resolution No. 8 (12) of March 26, 1949, by which the Council decided that only persons in receipt of incomes below certain prescribed limits be considered to be eligible to occupy its model tenements and dwellings, and that action be taken against persons now in occupation of the tenements and dwellings who were in receipt of incomes in excess of these limits, with a view to the termination of their tenancies, the M. O. H. having furnished lists of such persons the Council's lawyer was consulted as to whether it is competent for the Council to take action against these persons to terminate their tenancies having regard to the provisions of the Rent Restriction Ordinance.

The Council's lawyer's report is submitted for consideration. (Cir. 729 A and C.)

The Law Committee recommends that as in present circumstances it is not possible for action to be taken in these cases, the Commissioner of Local Government be asked to take immediate steps to have the provisions of the Rent Restriction Ordinance amended with a view to exempt M. C. property therefrom. In view of the fact that in 1944 the Minister of Health and Local Government had conceded that it was necessary to exempt such properties and the earlier act contained provision for that purpose, it would appear that the omission of similar provision in the new Ordinance is an oversight

The Committee notes that representations have been made by the Council on this subject in January 1949, to the Commissioner of Local Government and it deplors the delay on the part of the C. L. G. in taking action in the matter.

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted and that no actions be instituted until the necessary legislation exempting M. C. premises from the operation of the Rent Restriction Ordinance is enacted

The Council having observed that actions had been instituted in certain other cases for ejection of tenants after the new Rent Restriction Ordinance came into force desired an explanation to be obtained from the Executive as to why such actions were instituted.

(23) To consider the memo. from the Librarian applying for the services of a full time labourer for the M. C. Free Library. (Cir. 739 A and C.)

The Law and Electricity Committee recommends that a labourer be employed at the Library on daily pay.

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(24) The Municipal Council at its meeting held on September 24, 1949 (M. C. 8 (28) of September 24, 1949), resolved that a member of the Local Government Service who is in employment of the Council be required to register the Council's name as claimant of the motor vehicle in the certificate of registration where a loan is granted to him for the purchase of a motor vehicle, as a necessary safeguard against any financial loss which the Council may suffer by reason of such officer transferring or otherwise disposing of the vehicle without reference to or consent of the Council obtained for that purpose.

The Commissioner of Motor Transport was consulted as to the procedure to be adopted for that purpose. He states that the Council can be registered as absolute owner of a vehicle if the provisions of sections 16 and 20 of the Motor Car Ordinance No. 41 of 1947, are complied with, but it would not be possible to ensure that any vehicle so registered will not be transferred or otherwise disposed of without the consent of the Council, as it is not the practice of his department to inform absolute owners of transfers of cars, nor can transfers be stopped at the request of the absolute owners.

Papers are submitted for the views of the Council. (Cir. 762 A and C.)

The Law and Electricity Committee recommends that steps be taken to have the Council registered as absolute owner of the vehicle in such cases, and the Council also insist on the borrower taking a comprehensive insurance policy in respect of the vehicle.

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that consideration of the recommendation be deferred to permit of Council's lawyer's opinion being obtained as to whether under the provisions of the new Mortgage Ordinance it would be possible to have the officers concerned to execute mortgages of the vehicles in favour of the Council, such mortgages being in force until the redemption of the loan.

(25) To consider reports from the Medical Officer of Health and the Works Engineer in connection with Mrs. Palliyaguru's claim of a sum of Rs. 410 through her lawyer, Mr. P. H. P. Sugathadasa, as cost of repairing damage alleged to have been caused to premises No. 895, Peradeniya Road, which were used by the Council for housing the Maternity & Child Welfare Clinic.

A further report desired by the Committee from the M. O. H. touching the matters referred to in the concluding paragraph of the Works Engineer's report is submitted (Cir. 771 A.)

The Law Committee having given careful consideration to all facts connected with this case recommends that no liability be admitted

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(26) To consider circular letter No. 47 of October 13, 1949, from the Chairman, Local Government Service Commission indicating the special leave facilities that are to be granted to members of the Local Government Service suffering from Tuberculosis subject to certain conditions. (Cir. 772 C.)

The Law Committee recommends that the proposals be approved

Recommend that Law Committee's recommendation be adopted

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(27) To obtain sanction for writing off a sum of Rs. 221.90 representing irrecoverable arrears of Electricity Revenue for the years 1940-1944. (Cir. 806 A and C.)

The Law and Electricity Committee recommends that the sum of Rs. 221.90 referred to be written off.

Recommend that the sum of Rs. 221.90 be written off accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(28) With reference to the tender of Messrs. Callendars Cables Ltd., for the supply of 36 pole mounting type terminal boxes at Rs. 32.03 (total cost Rs. 1,153.08) which the Council decided to accept by its resolution No. 8 (26) of August 30, 1947, the conditions of the tender provided for the Council paying any difference in the cost occasioned by fluctuations in the market rate of metals or other materials authorized by the British Ministry of Supply at the time of the supply. The terminal boxes have been supplied and according to the invoices from manufacturers furnished by the firm it would appear that a sum of Rs. 137.56 is payable to the firm in consequence of price fluctuations.

Sanction is required to pay the extra sum of Rs. 137.36 due (Cir. 804 A and C.)

The Law and Electricity Committee recommends that the extra sum of Rs. 137.36 be paid to Messrs. Callendars Cables Ltd.

Recommend that Law & Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(29) To consider memo. from the Municipal Accountant recommending that Mr. G. H. G. Goonewardhana,

Rentals Clerk, who retired from the service, be re-employed on usual terms and conditions temporarily for a period of about three months to permit of arrears in the Electricity Department accounts section being cleared. (Cir. 805 A and C.)

The Law & Electricity Committee disapproves of Mr. G. H. G. Goonewardhana being re-employed, but it can see no objection to a temporary clerk being engaged for this work on a salary of Rs. 70 per mensem with rent and war allowances pending a permanent appointment by the Local Government Service Commission.

Recommend that the Accountant be authorized to employ a temporary clerk on a salary of Rs. 70 per mensem with rent and war allowances thereon for a period of three months, to permit of the arrears being cleared.

It was resolved that the recommendation of the Finance Committee be adopted.

(30) To consider estimate for Rs. 1,365 from the Works Engineer for repairing the ramp, drains and gutter down pipes of the bungalow occupied by the Municipal Electrical Engineer and for constructing a servants' latrine in the premises.

No funds are available for the purpose and a vote is required.

The Law & Electricity Committee and the Works Committee recommend that as a servants' lavatory is urgently needed a vote of Rs. 450 be provided for meeting the cost of this item, and that other repairs referred to in the estimate be considered with the Budget.

Recommend that Law & Electricity Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(31) To consider letter dated September 19, 1949, from Mr. P. P. Segu Mohideen, the licensee of space No. 6, Public Market, stating that owing to his age and general infirmity he is finding it difficult to carry on the business at the space by himself and asking for permission to take in his nephew, Mr. Sinnathamby Haddad, as the joint licensee of the space. (Cir. 752 B.)

The Health Committee recommends that the application be refused. There is no objection, however, to Mr. Sinnathamby Haddad being registered as Mr. Segu Mohideen's servant for the purpose of assisting him to carry on his business.

Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(32) To consider quotations received for the supply of 500 bags of cement each of 112 lb. to the Works Department.

The Works Engineer recommends the acceptance of the quotation of Mr. A. M. P. Charles Silva to supply the required quantity of cement of Belgian manufacture at Rs. 8.25 per bag. (Cir. 730 C and D.)

The Works Committee recommends that the quotation be accepted accordingly.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(33) With reference to the proposal to construct a road linking up Udamadapotha Road with Cemetery Road, the Works Engineer reports that Mr. F. A. E. Price is prepared to undertake the construction of a 12' gravel road up to Poorana Estate boundary involving 2,370 feet and to donate a 30' reservation from this estate, if the Council is prepared to pay him Rs. 1,500 for the work. The Works Engineer considers the estimate fair and reasonable and is of opinion that it would be to the advantage of the Council to accept Mr. Price's offer. (Cir. 734 C.)

The Works Committee recommends that the cost of construction of the road up to Poorana Estate boundary be apportioned among the owners of properties concerned in terms of section 26 of the Housing & Town Improvement Ordinance, and that a vote of Rs. 1,500

be allowed for the acquisition of the land required from Poorana Estate for the road and for meeting any small contribution which it might be necessary for the Council to make towards the cost of construction of the road.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(34) To consider tenders received for the supply of metal during 1950

The Works Engineer recommends the acceptance of the following rates quoted by Mr. P. G. Mendis Appuhamy which are the lowest:—(Cir. 737 C & D.)

The Works Committee recommend that the rates quoted by Mr. Mendis Appuhamy be accepted, and that he be entrusted with the contract for the supply of metal during 1950, at these rates.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

A letter from the contractor asking, in view of the recent increase in the price of petrol which would involve him in additional expenditure in the transport of the metal, that the Council grant him an increase of 7½ per cent. on the rates quoted by him was tabled together with a report from the Works Engineer recommending the rejection of this request.

It was resolved that papers be referred back to the Works & Finance Committees for further consideration and report.

(35) To consider tenders received for the supply of materials during 1950.

Sanction is required to accept the rates quoted by the tenderers in respect of items in sections A, B & C, which are recommended by the Works Engineer in his memo of October 25, 1949. (Cir. 739 C & D.)

The Works Committee recommends that the rates of the tenderers in respect of sections A, B & C recommended by the Works Engineer in his memo. of October 25, 1949, be accepted and purchases be made from them at these rates

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(36) The Municipal Council by its resolution No. 8 (17) of September 24, 1949, approved of the proposal to remove standpost No. 4, Peradeniya Road, from the present location and re-erect it on a site opposite the side entrance to the lane, so that tenements in the lane which were experiencing difficulty in obtaining water may be conveniently served.

No funds are available for this work and a vote of Rs 199.25 is required. (Cir. 797 C & D.)

The Works Committee recommends that a vote of Rs. 199.25 be allowed for the purpose.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(37) To obtain a supplementary vote of Rs. 35,000 towards the cost of operating the Katugastota Pumping Scheme until the end of the year.

The Works Committee recommends that a supplementary vote of Rs. 35,000 be allowed accordingly.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(38) The Municipal Council at its meeting held on June 25, 1949, resolved to ask the Local Government Service Commission to make the maximum salary of Rs. 6,060 which the commission decided should be personal to the present holder of the office of Chief Revenue Inspector, also applicable to the other Revenue Inspector, Mr. W A de Alwis Seneviratne, in the event of the latter being promoted as Chief Revenue Inspector on the vacation of the post by Mr. Abeysinghe, and this request has been conveyed to the commission.

Mr. Abeysinghe has given notice of his intention to retire from the service from December 31, 1949, and the post of Chief Revenue Inspector will be vacant from January 1, 1950.

Mr. de Alwis Seneviratne has asked that he be promoted to the post of Chief Revenue Inspector as from January 1, 1950, that he be placed in the Special Grade "A" post held by Mr. Abeysinghe in the salary scale Rs. 4,500—Rs. 6,060, and that he be placed on Rs. 5,520 on this scale with effect from January 1, 1950, in consideration of his long and efficient service under the Council, so that he may be enabled to retire on the maximum salary of Rs. 6,060.

Recommend that the Council request the Local Government Service Commission to promote Mr. de Alwis Seneviratne to the post of Chief Revenue Inspector on the same salary scale which was applicable to Mr. Abeysinghe with effect from January 1, 1950, i.e. Rs. 4,500—Rs. 6,060 and to place him on an appropriate step in this scale having regard to his length of service.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted subject to the words 'to enable him to retire on the maximum salary of Rs. 6,060 in this scale' being added after the word 'service' therein.

It was also resolved that the L. G. S. C. be asked to make immediate arrangements for appointing a Revenue Inspector in Grade II, with assessing experience, to fill the vacancy in the Inspectorate which will be caused by the retirement of Mr. Abeysinghe.

(39) K. Sandanam who was appointed as cemetery labourer and assumed duties on February 1, 1948, in the post completed his probationary period of one year on February 1, 1949.

The M. O. H. reports that his work has been satisfactory during the probationary period and recommends that he be confirmed in the post with effect from February 1, 1948 (Cir. 828 C.)

Recommend that Cemetery Labourer Sandanam be confirmed in his post with effect from February 1, 1948.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(40) With reference to M. C. Resolution No. 8 (38) of October 23, 1948, to obtain sanction for the payment of a sum of Rs. 14,250 to Messrs. Walker and Greig Ltd., representing the cost of 150— $\frac{1}{2}$ " Justa Cold Water Meters supplied by them to the Works Department (Cir. 829 C.)

Recommend that the payment of the sum of Rs. 14,250 to Messrs. Walker and Greig Ltd on this account be sanctioned.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(41) To approve of the acceptance of the tender of Mr. R. M. Punchirala to supply the gravel required for 1950 at Rs. 14.75 per cube which is recommended by the Works Engineer.

Only one tender was received. (Cir. 736 C and D)

The Works Committee recommends that Mr. Punchirala's tender be accepted accordingly.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(42) To consider tenders received for the supply of medicinal herbs, &c to the Council's Free Ayurvedic Dispensaries during the year 1950 (Cir. 836 B.)

Recommend that the purchases be made from Messrs. Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy and Messrs. D. Peris and

Co. the two tenderers, the lower rate quoted by each of them in respect of individual items of the requirements being accepted for such items.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(43) To consider question of making suitable arrangements for providing additional clerical assistance of the M. O. H.

The Finance Committee had earlier recommended that Mr. J. L. Rodrigo be relieved of his duties at the Slaughter-house to permit of his doing full-time work in the M. O. H.'s Department and that an officer be appointed to the Slaughter-house on the salary scale Rs. 720—60—Rs. 1,200.

In view of representations made by Mr. Rodrigo, the Council decided that Mr. Rodrigo be permitted to continue to perform dual duties until the end of the year.

Papers are now submitted for consideration of the matter. (Cir. 837 B and C.)

Recommend that Mr. Rodrigo be transferred to the M. O. H.'s Office for full-time work there and that a clerical assistant be appointed to work at the Slaughter-house and the M. V. S' Office on the scale Rs. 720—60—Rs. 1,200; Mr. Rodrigo's transfer for full-time work in the M. O. H.'s Office to take effect as soon as the new appointment is made.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(44) To consider memo. from the Works Engineer suggesting that a sum of Rs. 4,000 be provided for the purpose of enabling him to purchase a 60-gallon capacity tar sprayer and a 60-gallon capacity tar boiler for the use of the Works Department.

The Works Committee recommends that a vote of Rs. 4,000 be provided for the purpose.

Recommend that Works Committee's recommendation be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(45) To obtain sanction to employ Mr. R. L. de Silva on a fee of Rs. 150 for the purpose of taking out quantities and preparing necessary data for calling for tenders for construction of the houses of the Dangolla Scheme, in view of the urgency of this work. (Cir. 855 C.)

Recommend that the council approve of Mr. de Silva being paid a fee of Rs. 150 for this work.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(46) To consider letter addressed by Mr. M. Ponniah Pillai and Mr. Nadasan Chettiar indicating that they are prepared to take a lease of 50 acres of tea of the Rose-neath Estate for a period of five years at a rental of Rs. 550 per mensem on terms and conditions to be agreed on.

The Works Engineer can see no serious objection to the lease of the area in tea which is outside the effective catchment, if arrangements can be made to lease it without providing access to it through the effective catchment (Cir. 841 C.)

The Finance Committee does not recommend the lease of the tea area.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(47) To consider tenders received for the supply of straw to M. C. Slaughter-house during 1950

The Medical Officer of Health recommends the acceptance of the tender of Mr. R. N. Puchi Appuhamy to supply 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb bundles of straw at Rs. 65 per 1,000 bundles. This is the lowest out of the tenders. (Cir. 844 C.)

Recommend that the tender of Mr. R. M. Puchi Appuhamy to supply the straw at Rs. 65 per 1,000 bundles be accepted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(48) The Planters' Association of Ceylon is in communication with the Comrades of the Great War (Ceylon) Association on the question of the maintenance by the former of the War Memorial on the M. C. land which was leased to the P. A. and which has now been surrendered. The Secretary of the P. A. wishes the

Council to arrange for the upkeep of the memorial on the Association paying an annual fee of Rs 25 until the question is settled with the Comrades of the Great War (Ceylon) Association.

Sanction of Council is required to undertake the maintenance of the memorial on these terms. (Cir. 846 C.)

Recommend that sanction be allowed for undertaking the maintenance of the memorial on these terms.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(49) To obtain supplementary votes in the sums stated against the following heads of the 1949 Budget Estimates for meeting the excesses of anticipated expenditure thereon at December 31, 1949:—

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(50) To obtain sanction for having re-employed Marimuttu, Cemetery Labourer, in a temporary capacity from April 1, 1947, to April 30, 1948, until a successor to him was appointed Marimuttu was retired as from March 31, 1947, as a result of his attaining the age of 60 years on that date (Cir 850 C.)

Recommend that sanction be allowed for having re-employed Marimuttu for the period in question.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(51) To obtain sanction for writing off the sum of Rs 3,936.63 claimed from the Kandy Civil Hospital on account of charges for water consumed at the Kandy Civil Hospital for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd quarters of 1948.

The Council at its meeting held on February 26, 1949, resolved that the charges claimed in respect of the earlier periods be written off in consequence of the opinion expressed by Mr. N. E. Weerasooriya that under the existing by-laws the claim could not be maintained. The C. L. G. has been addressed with a view to the amendment of existing by-laws to permit of Hospitals being treated as other than domestic users of water and charges being recovered. The necessary amendment has not been sanctioned yet. (Cir. 854 C.)

Recommend that the sum of Rs. 3,936.63 be written off accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(52) To obtain a re-vote of the unexpended balance of Rs. 3,272.52 in the vote allowed by the Council in connection with the visit of the Duke of Gloucester last year, for the purpose of meeting certain items of expenditure incurred by the Electricity Department which had not been debited to this Account in 1948. (Cir. 856 C.)

Recommend that a re-vote of the sum of Rs. 3,272.52 be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(53) To obtain sanction for allowing the Assistant Elections Officer the use, free of rent, of the Town Hall, Ratwatte Sports Pavilion, Municipal Playground at Deiyannawela and the Phoenix Tea Gardens as polling booths on December 17, 1949, in connection with the K. M. C. General Elections fixed for that date, and of the Town Hall on December 18, 1949, in connection with the counting of votes. Charges will, of course, be recovered for any electricity used on the occasions. (Cir. 859 C.)

Recommend that sanction be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

The Council having noted the Elections Officer's decision to count the votes on the following day, unanimously resolved to ask him to vary this decision and to arrange for the counting of votes to take place on the same day soon after the elections, since in the Council's view this would be in the public interest inasmuch as the voters concerned would have little time to organise post election demonstrations which invariably result in clashes and disturbances of the public peace.

(54) To obtain sanction for the payment of Rs. 68.44 to Vellayamal, the widow of Conservancy Labourer No. 132 Sadayam, and Rs. 159.68 to her seven minor children representing the gratuities for which they are eligible under M. C. pension rule 24.

Recommend that the payment of gratuities to the widow and seven minor children accordingly be approved

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte moved 'that the Council do resume and that it adopt the decisions made in Committee in regard to the several recommendations of the Standing Committees'

Mr. N. Wimalasena seconded.—Carried.

The following matters were considered by the Council, in its capacity of Excise Advisory Committee for the Kandy Municipal Area.—(a) To consider letter No. X of November 2, 1949, from the Government Agent, Central Province, indicating that the renter of the Wata-puluwa Toddy Tavern for 1949-1950 has applied for sanction to remove the tavern from the present site to a new one shown hatched in red in the accompanying plan, but he considers the new site objectionable from the point of view of its proximity to the playground and of users of Lady Anderson's Drive which is a narrow road.

The Government Agent is of opinion that the tavern should be on a site adjoining the main road, but as he gathers that the only Crown land available for the purpose is considered unsuitable, he suggests that the renter should have to make private arrangements to get some suitable private land.

It was resolved that consideration of the matter be deferred for the next meeting to be held on December 19, 1949.

(b) To consider whether the area in the Town within which Arrack, Toddy and Foreign liquor Taverns and places licensed for the sale of foreign liquor, Beer and Porter are situated, should be divided into six portions as contemplated in Local Option rule 10, for purposes of the local option poll for which an application has been made, or whether the whole of the M. C. area should be taken as the voting area with a sufficient number of polling stations provided therein.

The Government Agent and the Excise Commissioner are in agreement that the whole M. C. area should be taken as the voting area.

It was resolved to recommend that the voting area be divide into six portions and that the divisions suggested for this purpose by the Government Agent in para. 3 of his letter No. X of October 27, 1949, to the Excise Commissioner, be approved.

1. Every application for a grave shall be made to the cemetery keeper not less than six hours before the time fixed for the burial, provided that the Chairman may in his discretion direct the cemetery keeper to entertain an application made at any later time.

2. Every application for a cremation shall be made to the cemetery keeper not less than twenty-four hours before the time fixed for the cremation to enable the cemetery keeper to point out the site for constructing the pyre, provided that the Chairman may in his discretion direct the cemetery keeper to entertain an application made at any later time.

3. The cemetery keeper shall intimate the line to be followed by the funeral party on arriving at the cemetery and where two or more parties arrive at the same time the cemetery keeper shall intimate the order in which they are to move to the respective graves.

4. For the purpose of preventing the disturbance of one funeral party by another funeral party and for no other purpose, the cemetery keeper may require that one burial service should be concluded before the other is commenced.

5. The cemetery keeper shall maintain order within the cemetery and every person shall obey any directions given by him in that behalf.

6. No grave shall be less than four feet in depth or less than two feet distant from any other grave.

7. Except on the orders of an authority competent to order the disinterment of any corpse, no person shall re-open—

- (a) any grave within three years of the burial of any dead body therein; or
(b) any vault within six months of any interment therein.

8. No person shall bury or cremate a dead body without the permission of the cemetery keeper and such permission shall not be granted until the fees payable under these regulations for burial or cremation, as the case may be, shall have been paid and the certificate of registration of death produced.

9. Subject to the provisions of regulation 10, the fees specified in the schedule hereto, shall be paid to the cemetery keeper by the person making the arrangements for any burial or cremation, at the time he applies for the permission required under regulation 8

10. No fees shall be charged by the cemetery keeper for the burial of—

- (a) any pauper who dies in the Cooray Maternity Home, Wadduwa, and whose body is buried by the Maternity Home labourers under the directions of the cemetery keeper; or
- (b) any deceased person whose relatives and friends are certified in writing by a Minister of any Christian denomination, or by a Mudaliyar, or by a Justice of the Peace, or by an Inquirer appointed under the Criminal Procedure Code, or by the Chairman or by a Member of that Council or by its Secretary, to be unable to pay the fee prescribed by these regulations.

11. The regulations made by the Sanitary Board of the Kalutara District in respect of the Wadduwa East Cemetery, (therein referred to as the Wadduwa General Cemetery) and published in *Gazette* No. 7,755 of January 17, 1930, are hereby rescinded
