#### By-Laws

#### Local Government Clerical Service Grade II Examination

Date of Examination.—A competitive examination for male candidates wishing to enter Grade II of the Local Government Clerical Service will be held in Colombo, Kandy, Galle and Jaffna, on May 20, 1950. The examination will be conducted by the Director of Education.

2. (i) Salary —Successful candidates will be appointed as vacancies occur to posts in Grade II of the Local Government Clerical Service to serve Local Authorities (other than Village Committees) on the salary of Rs. 840 per annum rising by annual increments of Rs. 72 to Rs 2,424 per annum. In this scale efficiency bars operate before Rs. 1,488 and Rs. 2,064 per annum. Rent allowance and a temporary cost of living allowance will be payable.

(ii) Conditions of Service.—(a) Candidates selected for appointment in the Local Government Clerical Service will not be permitted to sit for an examination for entrance to any service under the Government or to apply for or accept an appointment in any Government Department during the first three years of their service

in the Local Government Service;

(b) The grant of leave and other conditions will be governed by the by-laws and regulations of the Local Authority subject to the provisions of the Local Government Service Ordinance, No. 48 of 1945, and any

regulations framed thereunder;

- (c) Successful candidates will be appointed on two years' trial or probation. Those appointed to a Local Authority (other than a Municipal Council) will be liable to transfer within an area specified in the Second Schedule to the above Ordinance, and may be posted to any station within the specified area in Ceylon will be required to pass a test in typewriting within one year of the date of appointment and no increment of salary will be given until the test is passed.     - The Cambridge Junior, the Junior School Certificate (English) Examination of the Education Department, Ceylon, or the Junior School Certificate (English) Examination held by a school approved by the Education Depart-ment for the Senior School Certificate (English) Examination; together with either (1) the Higher Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce, or (ii) the Commercial Certificate Examination (either section) of the London Chamber of Commerce.

Note.—Original certificates of educational qualifications should be attached to the application form.

- (iv) Candidates must be within the age limits laid down in paragraph 6 (iv) except that, if necessary-
  - (a) Service candidates may deduct the period of their mobilized service in the last war from their age; and
  - (b) Candidates, who were or are temporary clerks in continuous Government service for any period of 2 years or more, may deduct such period of temporary service from their age: provided that they were in such temporary employment on a date subsequent to April 1,
- (v) Candidates should have been resident for at least three years immediately prior to May 1, 1950, within an area specified in the Second Schedule to the Local Government Service Ordinance, No. 43 of 1945.

5. Candidates in the permanent employ of a Local Authority and temporary clerks in Local Authorities with not less than two years' satisfactory service will be permitted to sit for the examination, irrespective of age, provided they possess the educational qualifications prescribed in paragraph 4 (iii) (a), (b) or (c) above.

6.   - (a) A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to have been born not earlier than May 1, 1925, and not later than May 1, 1933

Note.—(1) Affidavits will not ordinarily be accepted as substitutes for birth certificates

- (2) A certified copy of a birth registration entry effected more than one year after the date of the birth, under section 18 (1) (b) of the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance (Cap. 94), will be accepted only after consideration of the evidence by which the date of birth was established. Where the name appearing in the birth certificate differs from the name which the candidate ordinarily uses, satisfactory evidence will have to be adduced that the birth certificate is that of the candidate and not that of any other person. Where the candidate is under 21 years of age or is more than 21 years of age and has a parent living, applications should be made to the Registrar-General's or to the Provincial Registrar's or Assistant Provincial Registrar's Office in the district in which the birth took place, under section 19 of the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, for the amendment of the entry in cage 2 of the birth registration entry, and in other cases application should be made to the District Court under section 20 for rectification of the entry in cage 2
  - (b) A certificate of good character signed by a responsible person to the satisfaction of the Chairman, Local Government Service Commission. - N. B.—ANY APPLICATION WHICH IS NOT ACCOMPANIED WITH ALL OR ANY ONE OF THE DOCUMENTS REQUIRED BY THIS NOTIFICATION WILL BE REJECTED.
- (v) The Chairman, Local Government Service Commission will issue admission form to those candidates whose applications are accepted. Candidates presenting themselves for the examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of admission. A candidate not producing such form will be refused admittance to the examination.

Candidates must sit for the examination at the examination hall assigned to them. A candidate presenting himself at an examination hall other than the one assigned to him will be refused admission to the examination

A copy of the time table and the rules for the guidance of candidates for the examination will be forwarded together with the admission form. These should be read carefully by candidates. - 1. The minutes of proceedings of the meetings of the 4 Standing Committees held on November 21. December 9 and 20, 1949, copies whereof had been previously furnished to the members, were taken as read and confirmed by the Mayor.
- 2. To consider and dispose of finally, in terms of section 213 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 29 of 1947, the Budget submitted to the Council by the Mayor in consultation with the 4 Standing Committees, containing an estimate of the available Municipal income and details of the proposed expenditure for the year 1950.

The Mayor made the following statement on the finances of the Council.—

The draft Budget which has been approved by the various Standing Committees at their meeting on November 21, 1949, is now before us for final disposal.

On the General Revenue Account the Budget shows:---

Revenue for the year when compared with the current year shows an increase of Rs. 36,000, while the expenditure has increased by Rs 122,771 on account of routine services.

Provision made in the 1949 Budget for various technical posts which had to be filled in the course of the year contemplated the appointment thereto of candidates on the initial salaries of the relevant scales. When the posts came to be filled it was found that candidates with requisite experience and qualifications could not be attracted on the initial salaries, and in consequence they had to be placed on some step in the scale having regard to their qualifications and experience. This circumstance largely accounts for the increase of the salaries bill by Rs. 21,890. Incidentally it may be mentioned that even allowing for this factor the percentage of revenue which will be absorbed by salaries during the year is only 31 per cent.

I admit that atthough we have endeavoured in the present Budget not to starve the local services it is still not a Budget providing for any revolutionary civic improvements. We have been budgeting for deficits from year to year during the last few years and it is anticipated that the sum total of these deficits at the end of the year will amount to Rs 360,000.

In these circumstances it has not been possible for the Standing Committees to map out a progressive scheme of improvements as that would have further embarassed the Council in the new year and only added to its financial difficulties. We all realize the need for improving the civic amenities of this Town, but as in present circumstances we have not the wherewithal to do so, these must be deferred and first things must come first. I would urge the Council to exercise the most rigorous economy in the next year and desist from undertaking ambitious schemes for improving the present amenities until at least we are in a position to wipe out the present deficit. It is our duty to start husbanding the resources of the Council, and as any increase of rates is unthinkable, the obvious way is to go slow.

The Central Government has been hitherto niggardly in meeting its obligations to local authorities. The position in England is that grants are about 26 per cent. of the total revenue In this country these grants are based on a population basis and do not in the case of Kandy represent even 12 per cent. of its normal revenue.

An attempt has recently been made by a Committee appointed for that purpose by the Minister to offer a panacea for the financial ills from which local bodies are suffering by allowing them to appropriate certain sources of local texation. The formula evolved by the Committee, if adopted, although carrying us some way on the road to financial recovery, does not still offer sufficient latitude to local authorities to expand the scope of their services.

The report has been referred to the Council for its observations and I have no doubt that when the Council comes to consider it in due course the Council will point out the many deficiencies and press for the acceptance of a more liberal formula.

The Council went into Committee to consider the details of revenue and expenditure.

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte, Mr. H. A. C. Wickremaratne, Mr. A. S. Karunaratne, Mr. Fred E de Silva and Mr. N. Wimalasena offered comments and urged on the Council the need to made representations to the

Central Government pressing for the settlement of the financial relations between the Central Government and local bodies on a more equitable footing than that proposed by the Special Committee which recently reported on the question.

It was suggested, in particular, that an attempt should be made to obtain from the Government the full expenditure incurred by the Council in meeting the obligations cast on it by the Poor Rehef Ordinance, or in the alternative that Government should be asked to take over the administration of Poor Relief in the Municipal area, in terms of the resolution which had been passed by the Council earlier and which had been communicated to the Government.

It was resolved that the Budget be approved subject to the following adjustments, which were necessitated by the decisions made by the 4 Standing Committees at their meetings held on December 9 and 20:—

Whilst agreeing with Mr. Karunaratne, he remarked that the polling stations were under-staffed and unnecessary restrictions had been placed on the successful candidates in that they were not permitted to address the voters from the balcony and were required to leave the Town Hall immediately after the results pertaining to their elections were announced. While the poll itself was conducted fairly and impartially, the arrangements left much to be desired.

(3) To obtain sanction for the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 100 under M. C. Pension Rule 30A to Rengasamy No. 34, late labourer of the Health Department, and for having continued him in employment for a period of 3 years after he attained the age of 60 years. (Cir. 899 C).

Recommend that the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 100 to Rengasamy and his employment for the period of three years after he had attained the age of 60 years be sanctioned.

With reference to the proposals for traffic control in the Municipality which were adopted by the Council early this year, these proposals contemplated certain streets in the Municipality being declared silence zones for 24 hours of the day and night and certain other streets being declared silence zones during the hours of 10 p.m. to 6 a.m., and the Commissioner of Motor Transport was asked to enact regulations under the Motor Car Ordinance, for the purpose.

The Commissioner of Motor Transport has furnished the draft of the regulations proposed by the Legal Draftsman and he enquires whether these would meet the Council's requirements.

The Council's lawyer observes that according to the draft prepared by the Legal Draftsman a warning instrument can be sounded in the area which the Council proposes to declare a silence zone for 24 hours of the day and night between midnight and 1 a.m. He can see no objection to this, but suggests a fresh resolution is necessary by the Council in terms of the draft.

The Law Committee recommends that the Legal Draftsman's revised notification be approved as it can see no objection to the streets in question being declared a "Silence Zone" between the hours of 1 a.m. and 12 midnight.

The Council has, however, power to consider and decide any case for which there is no provision in the leave by-laws, due regard being had to the Government Leave Rules. In the case of maternity leave, F. R. 1460 lays down that all female employees shall be granted six weeks' full pay leave, the relevent provisions reading as follows:

"In the case of officers other than monthly paid minor employees and daily paid employees this period of 6 weeks full pay shall be set off against available accumulated leave, i.e., vacation leave of the previous year, and any balance against lapsed vacation leave It shall not be set off against vacation leave of the year in which the officer is confined. So much of the six weeks full pay maternity leave as is not covered by the accumulated and/or lapsed leave shall be treated as special full pay leave in addition to the ordinary leave for the year "."

" In the case of monthly paid minor employees and daily paid employees, the 6 weeks full pay maternity leave shall be treated as special full pay leave in addition to the ordinary leave for the year.".

It is suggested in these circumstances that the Council approve of the provisions of the F.B. referred to being applied to all cases, where maternity leave is granted to female employees. (Cir. 871 A & C).

The Law Committee recommends that the leave in excess of six weeks granted to these officers be sanctioned and that the Council approve of the provisions of F. R. 1460 being applied in all cases where leave is granted for maternity purposes.

Recommend that the Law Committee's recommendation be adopted.

In regard to Mr. Wijesekera's application, the Committee recommends that Mr. Wijesekera be granted any available leave for which he is eligible, provided he is prepared to undergo the necessary training at his own expense.

Recommend that the recommendation made by the Health Committee be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendations be adopted.

38. To consider report from the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon recommending that in terms of condition 3 of the notice of tender, tenders of one tenderer be accepted in respect of the rights (a) to recover fees from vegetable vendors at the Fair Day, and (b) to recover daily rents from the 66 registered tenants of the spaces reserved for the sale of vegetable in the old coconut fair area, instead of accepting the highest tender in each case, in view of the remuneration derived by the tenderer for right (a) being negligible.

The Commissioner has accepted the highest tender received in respect of each right subject to M. C's sanction. (Cir. 892 B & C).

The Health Committee recommends that the Council approve of the action of the Municipal Commissioner in accepting the highest tender received in respect of each right.

Recommend that Health Committee's recommenda-

tion be adopted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

39. The M. O. H. having reported that Mr. N. W. Handy Silva, the tenant of market stall No. 107, has been certified to be suffering from leprosy, the Commissioner has, after consulting the Council's Lawyer and the M. O. H., served notice on Mr. Silva informing him that his licence would not be renewed and requiring him to quit and yield possession of the stall forthwith.

Approval is required for the action taken in this case.

(Cir. 891 B & C).

The Health Committee recommends that the action taken by the Commissioner in this case be approved. Recommend that Health Committee's recommendation be adopted.

A letter received from Mr. Handy Silva praying that the licence of the stall be transferred in favour of his

brother was tabled.

It was resolved that the Health Committee's recommendation be adopted and that action be taken to call for tenders for the letting of the stall

40. To consider representations made by the butchers in occupation of beef stalls at the Katugastota Public Market stating that the rents charged from them are excessive and asking that these rents be reduced to the former level.

The M. V. S. points out that these rents are 50 per cent. less than those charged in respect of beef stalls in the Kandy Public Market and he can see no justifica-

tion for any reduction. (Cir. 897 B & C). The Health Committee does not recommend any

reduction of the rent. Recommend that no reduction of the rent be allowed

as recommended by the Health Committee.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted. 41. To obtain sanction for allowing the period of Mr. D. A. S. Senaratne's service as a temporary clerk from September 20, 1926, to July 31, 1927, which is continuous with his permanent employment thereafter, to be reckoned as service for pension purposes in terms

of Rule 4 of the Council's Pension Rules (Cir. 928 C)
Recommend that sanction be allowed for counting Mr. Senaratne's period of temporary service referred to

for pension purposes.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

To obtain sanction for the payment of a sum of Rs 2,887.50 to Messrs. A. Mohamed Cassim & Co. on account of 350-112 pound bags of cement purchased from them by the Works Department at Rs. 8.25 per bag. (Cir. 929 C).

Recommend that sanction be allowed for the payment of Rs. 2,887.50 to Messrs. A. Mohamed Cassim & Co.

on this account.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

43. To consider quotations received for the supply of 20 scavenging handcarts to the Health Department. The M. O. H. recommends that the quotations of Mr. B. William to make and supply the handcarts at Rs. 340—be accepted, subject to Mr. William making a sample cart for approval, and the order for the balance

number of carts being placed with him if the sample

is satisfactory. (Cir. 931C).

Recommend that Mr. B. William's tender be accepted on the terms suggested by the Medical Officer of Health.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

 $\Lambda$  re-vote of the sum of Rs. 1,445 provided in the 1948 Budget was obtained this year in connection with the purchase of a standard yard measure. standard yard measure has been supplied by Messrs W & T. Avery. Ltd A supplementary vote of Rs. 100 is required towards meeting the cost of the measure, which is in excess of the Budget provision. (Cir. 932 C)

Recommend that a supplementary vote of Rs 100 be allowed accordingly.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

45. To consider application from F. W. Pandithanayake, Process Server, Municipal Court, for a loan of Rs. 200 to enable him to purchase a cycle for his work.

The Accountant recommends the grant of the loan subject to the usual conditions, repayment thereof being made in 18 monthly instalments with interest at 1½ per cent. (Cir. 936 C)

Recommend that the loan be granted on the terms and conditions suggested by the Accountant.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

46. With reference to M C. Resolution No. 8 (42) of November 26, 1949, Messrs. The Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy and D. Peiris & Co. were informed that the rates quoted by them for certain items of medicinal herbs, &c., in their tenders had been accepted and they were asked to enter into the necessary agreements.

Messrs D. Peiris & Co. have furnished the names of their sureties with a view to the agreement being pre-pared in respect of the portion of their tender which had been accepted, but Messrs. The Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy are not prepared to undertake the supply on this basis. There was provision in the tender notice for the acceptance of the whole or any part of a tender.

In these circumstances sanction is required to forfeit the security deposit of Rs. 40 made by the Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy, to accept the tender rates of Messrs. D. Peiris & Co. in respect of the remaining items and to entrust the contract to Messrs. D. Peiris & Co. for the supply of the full requirements.

Recommend that the tender deposit of Rs 40 made by the Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy be forfeited in these circumstances and that the tendered rates of Messrs. D. Peiris & Co. for these items be accepted and the contract be entrusted to them for the supply of all items of the herbs, &c., required.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

47. Government allows its officers wishing to travel by air on holiday to surrender the requisite number of railway warrants to cover the cost of the air passage and obtain air passages The terms and conditions governing the concession are indicated in Treasury Circulars of February 9. and April 6, 1949, copies of which are annexed Sanction is required for extending the concession to M. C. Officers on the same terms. (Cir. 937 C).

Recommend that the Council approve of the concession of air travel being allowed to M. C. Officers on the same terms.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

To consider application from E. H. Ranawaka, Peon, Secretariat, for a loan of Rs. 200 to enable him to purchase a cycle for his work.

The Accountant recommends the grant of a loan of Rs. 165 subject to the usual conditions, repayment thereof being made in 18 monthly instalments with interest at  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent (Cir. 939 °C).

Recommend that the loan be granted on the terms and conditions suggested by the Accountant.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

49. To consider quotations received for the supply of expanded metal, Tee iron \( \frac{3}{4}'', \) cement and disinfectant.

The Works Engineer recommends that the quotations of Messrs. Mohamed Cassim & Co. to supply expanded metal at 40 cents per square foot, Belgian cement at Rs. 8.35 per cwt. and disinfectant at Rs. 5.50 per

gallon and of Messrs Walker, Sons & Co., Ltd., to supply Tee iron \( \frac{1}{2}'' \) at Rs. 36.25 per cwt. be accepted. Sanction is required for accepting these quotations and purchasing 400 square feet of Expanded metal, 1 cwt. of Tee iron \( \frac{1}{2}'' \), 500 cwt. of Belgium cement and 30 gallons of disinfectant at these rates. (Cir. 938 C).

Recommend that the tenders recommended by the Works Engineer be accepted and sanction be allowed for purchasing the requirements mentioned at the rates quoted by the tenderers.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

50. To consider tenders received for the supply of milk to K. M. C. Climes during 1950. (Cir. 942 C)

The M. O. H. recommends that the tender of Mr.

M. A. Krishnasamy to supply the milk requirements of the clinics at 37 cents per bottle be accepted, as this is the lowest one of the rates quoted by the tenderers. (Cir. 942 C).

Recommend that Mr. Krishnasamy's tender to supply milk to the clinics at 37 cents per bottle be accepted.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted. The following extracts from the minutes of the meeting of the 4 Standing Committees held on December 20, 1949, were considered:

(51) To consider proposal to register temporary labourers in the Works and Health Departments who have put in 250 days' work a year continuously for 2 years. The M O. H. has recommended that 25 temporary labourers of the Conservancy Department and 70 ary labourers of the Conservancy Department and to temporary labourers of the Scavenging Department who fulfil the requirements be registered. The Works Engi-neer reports that it is not possible for him at present to recommend the registration of such labourers in his Department and the matter is one which would have to be carefully considered with reference to the labour needs of his Department and the needs would largely be influenced by a decision as to whether the capital works should be done departmentally or by contract.

The Standing Committees recommend that the 95 temporary labourers in the Health Department referred to in the M. O. H's recommendation be registered as permanent labourers with effect from January 1, 1950, and in regard to the temporary labourers of the Works Department that the question be considered after the Works Engineer examines the cases of individual labourers and makes his recommendation as to the number who can be absorbed in the permanent labour staff and for whom work can always be found.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(52) To consider application made by blacksmith Ran Naida of the Works Department who has put in over 25 years' service and is on daily pay for permanent employment on a monthly pay basis

The Standing Committees recommend that blacksmith Ran Naida be placed on the wage scale Rs 2.60-.05-Rs. 3.20 prescribed in the salary scheme of the Council for the blacksmith of the Works Department, and that the Commissioner be authorized to fix the step on this scale at which he should be placed having regard to his length of service in the Council.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(53) To consider proposal made on a motion moved by Mr. P. L. P. Alwis that drivers Lewis Hamy and Rupasinghe, and fitter Nallathamby attached to the Katugastota Pumping Scheme on a temporary basis be placed on the permanent establishment and be paid monthly salaries

The Works Engineer does not recommend the proposal and he thinks it should await the completion of the Lewella Pumping Scheme as then these employees may not be needed and may have to be retrenched.

The Standing Committees Recommend that Lewis Appuhamy be placed on the Grade 1 wage scale prescribed in the Council's salary scheme for fitters and that Rupasinghe and Nallathamby be placed in Grade II thereof, and that the Commissioner be authorized to fix the steps on which the 3 employees concerned should be placed in the scales, with due regard to the wages drawn by them at present.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

- (54) Arising from representations made by the Ka.idy Muncipal Workers' Union the following recommendations previously made by the Finance Committee need further consideration in the light of financial implications and other factors involved.
- (a) Payment of house allowance to workers not provided with free quarters. The Committee previously recommended that an allowance of Rs. 2.50 per mensem in the case of a married labourer and Rs. 1.25 in the case of an unmarried labourer be paid subject to the condition that not more than one member of each household should be eligible to receive such allowance.

The Works Engineer estimates that a sum of Rs. 780 per annum would be required for the payment of house allowances to labourers in his Department who are not in occupation of line rooms.

The Medical Officer of Health estimates that a sum of Rs. 1,470 per annum would be required for the payment of allowances to such labourers in his Department.

It has been ascertained that no rent allowances are paid to daily-paid labourers in Government Service in lieu of free quarters.

(b) Payment of overtime for Sunday work. The Committee recommended earlier that overtime be paid to labourers at time and a half for Sunday work, the hourly rate being calculated at 1/8th of a day's pay, according to Government practice.

The M. O. H. estimates that payment of overtime on this basis to labourers of his Department would cost Rs. 8,000 per annum.

The Works Engineer states that payment of overtime similarly to labourers of his Department would cost Rs. 1,250 per annum.

The M. E. E. estimates that a sum of Rs. 4,160 would be necessary to meet the cost of overtime and Rs. 1,640 to meet the house allowance, if payment is to be made on this basis.

The Standing Committees recommend in regard to (a) that no rent allowances be paid to labourers in lieu of quarters, but that the Works Engineer be instructed to report on a scheme for providing housing for labour gangs in different areas central to and easily accessible from their working places.

In regard to (b), the Standing Committees resolved that consideration of the matter be deferred to permit of information being obtained as to the practice in vogue in the Colombo M. C. in respect of its labourers.

It was resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committees in regard to (u) be adopted, and as regards (b) that further consideration of the matter await information from the Colombo M. C. as to the practice there.

- (55) To consider, with reference to the proposal made in a motion which Mr. T. B. Tennekoon moved at the meeting of the Council held on March 26, 1949, that employees who have served for 3 years in various temporary capacities be absorbed into the permanent establishment:—
  - (a) Lists of such employees in the various Departments.
  - (b) A scheme submitted by the Municipal Electrical Engineer indicating the needs of his Department as regards permanent staff for carrying on the work of the Department in shifts each employee working 8 hours a day.

The Standing Committees recommend that consideration of item (a) be deferred, and in regard to (b) that the scheme suggested by the Municipal Electrical Engineer be approved.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(56) The Finance Committee has previously reported on an application made by the Overseers of the Health Department that they be placed on a suitable salary scale and be taken into the permanent establishment. The salary scheme suggested for such Overseers was Rs. 744—10 of 42 and 1 of 36—1,200.

The Finance Committee on that occasion approved of the principle that all Overseers and Sub-Overseers should

complete 5 years' continuous service and have a uniformly good record throughout such period of service before they can be deemed to be eligible to be placed on the permanent establishment on this salary scale.

According to a report furnished by the M. O H. all Overseers and Sub-Overseers in his Department, except Packeer Ally, have completed over 5 years' service.

The Standing Committees recommend that the Council approve of the principle laid down by the Finance Committee in this connection, and that the Commissioner be authorized to fix the salaries to be paid to the 6 Overseers concerned on this scale, having regard to the period of service put in by each of these Overseers.

It was resolved that the principle laid down by the Finance Committee in this connection be adopted, and that Overseer B. W. de Silva, Sub-Overseers E. C. Smith, T. Veeran, C. S. Ratnayake and G. F. Burke and Field Attendant Edwin, who are eligible to be placed on the permanent establishment having completed the requisite period of service be taken on the permanent establishment with effect from January 1, 1950, but that all these 6 employees be paid the initial salary of Rs. 744 on the scale.

(57) To consider application made by Sub-Overseer T. Amith of the Works Department for promotion to the Overseer's Grade.

The Standing Committees recommend that the L. G. S. C. be asked to promote Mr. Amith to Grade II of the salary scale prescribed for Overseers by the L. G. S. C. in its salary scheme and the cadre in Grade II be increased to 8 posts.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(58) To consider application from R. A. Punchi Banda, labourer, M. C. Free Ayurvedic Dispensary, Katukelle, who is now employed on daily pay for employment on a permanent basis in the monthly-paid establishment.

The Standing Committees recommend that the designation of the post be changed to Dispensary Orderly, and that Punchi Banda be placed on the scale Rs. 480—12—Rs. 720 with effect from January 1, 1950.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(59) The following recommendations made by the Finance Committee at its meeting held on October 19, 1949, in connection wth the L. G. S. C. Scheme for the payment of travelling allowances to members of the service in the employment of the Council outlined in Chairman, L. G. S. C's letter No. EA. 2/4 of September 2, 1949, were submitted to the Council at its meeting held on October 29, 1949.

The Council having resolved that the recommendations be referred back to the Finance Committee for further consideration and report, the matter was re-submitted to the Finance Committee at its meeting held on November 14, 1949. The Finance Committee resolved to refer the matter to the 4 Standing Committees for consideration with the Budget:—

(a) that the Council adopt the L. G. S. C's rates of allowances, subject to reduction of the rates suggested by the L. G. S. C. in respect of the user and maintenance of motor vehicles by 25 per cent.;

(b) that no such reduction be made in the case of the rates of allowances prescribed for the user and maintenance of rickshaws and bicycles, but that no minimum mileage be insisted upon for purposes of the rickshaw allowance;

(c) that travelling allowances drawn by officers at present be revised to accord with the new rates and no allowances be paid to such officers in excess of the amount they are eligible to receive for the user and maintenance of the vehicle applicable to each case; and

(d) that the user and maintenance of the following modes of conveyance be prescribed in respect of the various officers under the Council:—

Motor Car.—(Rate of allowance to be according to weight of our and category (a) of the L. G. S. C. Scheme).

Municipal Commissioner, Medical Officer of Health, Works and Waterworks Engineer,
Municipal Electrical Engineer
Municipal Veterinary Surgeon,
Assistant Medical Officer of Health and Medical
Officer, Maternity and Child Welfare,
Assistant Municipal Electrical Engineer,
Assistant Works Engineer,
Chief Revenue Inspector, and
Revenue Inspector

Motor Car -- (Rate of allowance to be according to weight of car and category (b) of the L G S C Scheme)

Fire Brigade Officer, Municipal Surveyor, Senior Waterworks Inspector, Waterworks Inspector, and Registrar of Public Assistance

Motor Cycle or Rickshaw or Push Cycle Electrical Inspectors, Sanitary Inspectors, Playground Instructor, Supervisor of Conservancy, Supervisors of Scavenging, and Entertainment Tax Inspectors

Motor Cycle or Push Cycle Bus Stand Inspector

Rickshaw
Public Health Nurses

Push Cycles

Overseers,

Pharmacist, and

Distraining Inspectors (Distraining Inspectors now in receipt of a higher allowance to be permitted to draw the allowance fixed for motor cycles, if they use and maintain motor cycles, but new entrants to be paid the allowance fixed for push cycles).

Representations made by the Secretary, Kandy Municipal Services Union and the Sanitary Inspectors protesting against the proposed reduction of the travelling allowances, and a memo from the Works Engineer asking that he be paid a higher travelling allowance than Rs 80 per mensem which he drew at present, in consideration of the extensive travelling which his official duties required him to perform were also tabled at the meeting of the Council and are submitted for consideration Considerd

The Standing Committees recommend that the Finance Committee's recommendations be adopted except as regards (a) and (c) thereof. In regard to (a), the Standing Committees recommend that no such reduction be made in view of the increase in the price of petrol which has come into force since. In regard to (c), the Committees recommend that where the allowances now drawn are higher than these prescribed in the L. G. S. C's Scheme the higher allowances paid to the officers concerned be continued so long as they use the vehicle prescribed by the Council in respect of the posts they hold, but where such vehicle is not used by them, that the allowance paid should be strictly in accordance with the vehicle used

In regard to the Works Engineer's memo the Committees recommend that as all other executive officers are paid a travelling allowance of Rs 100 per mensem and the Works Ergmeer's duties require him to do very extensive travelling in the M C area, that he be paid Rs 100 per mensem

It was resolved that the recommendations of the 4 Standing Committees be adopted

(60) The Finance Committee's recommendation of October 19, 1949, that Messrs. Harris de Silva and L P Wijetinge, Electrical Sub-Inspectors, be paid allowances of Rs 7 per mensem each, to enable them to use and maintain push bicycles for their travelling, was referred back to the Finance Committee for further consideration and report by the Municipal Council at its meeting held on October 29, 1949 (M C 8 (11) of October 29, 1949)

Papers were re-submitted to the Finance Committee on November 14, 1949, and it has decided that the matter be referred to the 4 Standing Committees for consideration with the Budget

The Standing Committees recommend that each of the Sub-Inspectors be paid a travelling allowance of Rs 7 per mensem to enable them to use and maintain bicycles for their travelling

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(61) To consider application from Mi J L Rodingo for a promotion to Grade I together with the observations of the Municipal Accountant thereon

The Health Committee at its meeting held on October 7, 1949, resolved that a report be obtained from the Municipal Accountant as to how many officers there were at present in Grade II whose cases deserved consideration in connection with promotions to Grade I, and who among them were senior to Mi Rodrigo. The Accountant reports that Mr Rodrigo is the most senior of the present officers in Grade II. He also states Messrs W. E. Wadugodapitiva, D. T. Ramanayake, and C. M. de Silva are other officers who have completed 2 years' stagnation on the maximum salary of Grade III in the old scheme and who are eligible for promotion to Grade I in the new salary scheme as from October 8, 1949. These officers have also made an application for promotion and their promotion is recommended by the Accountant. (Cir. 733 B & C)

The Standing Committees recommend that the Commissioner be authorized to make suitable recommendations in the cases of these officers to the Local Government Service Commission for their promotion to Grade I, Mr R F Gunawardane's promotion thereto receiving priority over others in view of his academic qualifications and the meritorious services rendered by him which entitle him to a position of seniority in this Grade over the other officers

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(62) To consider recommendations made by the Accountant, with reference to applications made by Mr B P Wijesinghe, Night Telephone Attendant, Power Station, and the Meter Readers of the Electricity Department, now on daily pay, that they may be placed on the permanent establishment in the case of Mr B P Wijesinghe, the Accountant recommends that he be placed on the monthly paid establishment and that the salary scale Rs 600—30—900 be attached to his post in the case of the Meter Readers the Accountant recommends the adoption of the principle of placing such employees on monthly pay after 10 years' service on the salary scale Rs 660—42—Rs 1,164 Meter Readers P A Martin and P E H Perera have completed 10 years' service and are eligible to be placed on the monthly-paid establishment if this principle is adopted

The Standing Committees recommend that the officers concerned be placed on the permanent establishment and on the salary scales suggested by the Accountant in his recommendation, 10 years' service in the case of the Meter Readers being considered as the requisite qualification for purposes of placing them on the monthly-paid establishment

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(63) To consider application from Steam Roller Driver Gabriel that he be placed on the permanent establishment, with reports from the Works Engineer and Accountant (Cir 921 C)

The Standing Committees recommend that Gabriel be placed on the daily wage scale Rs 2 60—05—Rs 3 20 and that he be paid a wage of Rs 2 65 per diem with effect from January 1, 1950

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted

(64) To consider memo dated December 19 1949, from the Municipal Works Engineer, recommending the appointment of a temporary officer-in-charge for the work connected with the supervision of the construction of the remaining houses on the Mawilmada Scheme and the houses on the Dangolla Scheme, on a salary of

Rs. 3,000 per annum, plus a travelling allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem and rent and war allowances at the prescribed rates.

The Standing Committees recommend that the Council approve of applications being called for the post of officer-in-charge of these schemes, on the terms suggested by the Works Engineer.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted.

(65) To table papers re the appointment of Mr. B. G. Liard as Typist, Secretariat, by the Local Government Service Commission.

The Standing Committees recommend that the L. G. S. C's attention be drawn to the fact that in view of the L. G. S. C's failure to make an appointment to the post on the initial salary of Rs. 840 per annum when the Commission was originally asked to fill the post, the Council had reviewed its earlier recommendation. reviewing the question it had transpired that as purely routine typewriting work was involved in the post, a Junior Typist would meet the Council's purposes and the Council had decided that a Junior Typist be appointed on the scale Rs. 720—60—Rs. 1,200, as a measure of economy. It is not in the Council's interests to pay a salary in excess of the scale of Rs. 720-60-Rs. 1,200, having regarded to the duties of the post. The Council does not consider the higher scale warranted in the circumstances, but it is prepared to appoint Mr. Liard on the scale Rs. 720-60-Rs. 1,200 in view of Mr Liard's services under the Council as a temporary Typist over a long period.

It was resolved that the recommendation be adopted. With the leave of the Council the Mayor submitted the following matter considered by a joint meeting of the Works and Finance Committees, earlier in the day, for disposal by the Council in Committee:—

(66) To consider tenders received for constructing houses, approach roads. &c., connected with Group 'D' of the Mawilmada Housing Scheme.

The Works Engineer recommends the acceptance of the tender of Mr. V. Navaratnam for Rs. 68,925, which is the lowest out of the tenders received, for this work.

The Works and Finance Committees do not approve of this tender, being accepted in view of the Works Engineer's report that the rates quoted by the tenderer for several items connected with road works are below the actual cost of such works and are unworkable, and the Committees recommend that the next lowest tender, tender of Mr. D. D. I. Fernando for Rs. 74,542 be accepted.

It was resolved that the tender of Mr. D. D. I. Fernando be accepted, as recommended by the Works and Finance Committees.

Mr. A. C. L. Ratwatte moved: "that the Council do resume and that it adopt the decisions made in regard to the several recommendations of the Standing Committee on 'Finance and Establishment' and the 4 Standing Committees, which were considered by the Council in Committee."

Mr. E. L. Senanayake seconded.—Carried.

9 (a) Considered recommendation made by the Mayor and Municipal Commissioner that quantities of oils, pills and kalkes shown in schedule 'B' attached to the Municipal Secretary's memo. of December 12, 1949, be obtained from Messrs. The Kandy Ayurvedic Pharmacy at the rates quoted by them in their tender for use at the K. M. C Free Ayurvedic Dispensaries during the first half-year of 1950, with reference to the authority given to the Mayor and Commissioner by the Finance Committee's Resolution No. 11 of December 9, 1949 to examine the tenders received in this connection and to make a direct recommendation to the Council.

It was resolved that the recommendation made by the Mayor and Municipal Commissioner be adopted.

9 (b) Considered Commissioner's report on the application made by Mr. S. M. Deen, partner of the Sri Lanka Amusement Co., for the use of the market square for purposes of an amusement park which the Company proposes to conduct during the Christmas Holidays,

with reference to the authority given to the Municipal Commissioner by F. C. Resolution No. 29 of December 9, 1949, to inspect the site applied for an to suggest the extent of land to be allowed and the rental to be charged therefor,

It was resolved that the further application made by Mr. Deen that he be allowed the use of space in the market square for the period January 25 to February 10, 1950, in lieu of the period mentioned in his original application, be refused, and that a space in the area shown in the Works Engineer's plan dated December 15, hatched in blue, be allowed to Mr Deen for any period between December 22, 1949, and January 10, 1950, subject to his paying rent therefore in advance calculated at one cent per square foot per diem for such period, and depositing Rs. 100 as security to cover the cost of repairing any damage which may be caused to the grounds.

The Government Agent is of opinion that the tavern should be on a site adjoining the main road but as he gathers that the only Crown land available for the purpose is considered unsuitable, he suggests that the rentershould have to make private arrangements to get some suitable private land.

It was resolved that the Government Agent be informed that the Committee objects to the use of the new site proposed by the renter or of any other site near the playground, for the tavern.
