







Minor tremors felt in Kandy for second time

Geological experts have began investigations on a second tremor felt in Ambakotte and Aluthwatte in Kandy yesterday morning, while the Geo-logical Survey and Mines Bureau (GSMB) has initiated discussions with the Disaster Management Centre and Mahaweli Authority on impending contingency measures.

"There is no cause for concern, but we will continue to map out the findings until we locate the epicentre and have fully ascertained the cause of the tremors," Senior Director of the GSMB Geologist Udaya de Silva told the Daily News. "Both tremors measured less than 2 on the Richter Scale and were recorded on three of the four earthquake monitoring centres." TO PAGE **O2**

TURMERIC IMPORTERS REQUEST PRESIDENT TO RELEASE STOCK AT PORT

An alliance of Turmeric importers has written to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa seeking his intervention to release a stock of one million kilogrammes of turmeric which is currently at Colombo Port adding that the importers would in exchange donate Rs. 100 million to local farmers and purchase locally grown turmeric hereafter. The importers cite that the scarcity has led to rampant smuggling of turmeric and exorbitantly priced sales in the black market.

"Our country's dry turmeric demand is 5500 Metric tonnes per annum, but according to the Ministry the country produces only 400 Metric tonnes. At present there are no stocks of turmeric in the market," the letter reads. TO PAGE O2





20A DRAFT BILL CAN BE ENACTED WITH 2/3 MAJORITY - AG **'REFERENDUM NOT NEEDED' CABINET ENDORSES 20A**

Attorney General Dappula De Livera had yesterday informed the Secretary to the Ministry of Justice that there is no need to hold a Referendum on the draft of the 20th Amendment to the Constitution and that it could be passed by a 2/3 majority in Parliament. Coordinating Officer to the

Attorney General State Counsel Nishara Jayaratne told the media that draft of the 20th Amendment to the Constitution does not require a referendum as none of the provisions under Article 83 of the Constitution was related to the 20th Amendment. Accordingly, in terms of Article 82 (5) of the Constitution the draft of the 20th Amendment to the Constitution requires only a two-thirds

majority of the Members of Parlia-

ment to become a new legislation, she said.

Meanwhile, the Cabinet of Ministers endorsed the proposed draft of the new 20th Amendment to the Constitution at their meeting presided by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa yesterday, Government sources said. It was due to be gazetted last night. Justice Minister Ali Sabry, PC, had outlined the salient features of the new Amendment to the Constitution to the Cabinet, along with Education Minister Prof. G.L. Peiris, a former law professor and authority on the Constitution.

Earlier, the Ministry of Justice directed the draft of the 20th Amendment to the Constitution to the Attorney General on September 1. The 20A is likely to retain several features from the 19A, including RTI, the two-term limit for the presidency and independent commissions. TO PAGE O2

In a motion filed before the Supreme Court, a petitioner who filed a Fundamental Rights petition over the Easter Sunday attacks sought an order directing the Secretary of the Presidential Commission

(PCoI) to probe into matters relating to the Easter Sunday bomb attacks, to make all fresh evidence available to the Supreme Court before the arguments are commenced.

President's Counsel Manohara de Silva appearing for petitioner Attorney-at-Law Moditha Ekanayake informed the Supreme Court that the Presidential Commission of inquiry had found a considerable amount of fresh evidence that can be used against the State and some of the respondents. TO PAGE **02**

Pranab Mukherjee a dear friend of Lanka - PM



Sri Lankan Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa on Wednesday paid his last respects to former Indian president Pranab Mukherjee, who died earlier in the week, describing the departed leader "a dear friend of Sri Lanka and its people." Prime Minister Rajapaksa visited the India House and wrote in the condolence book being maintained by the Indian High Commission.

The late President was a dear friend of Sri Lanka and its people. The absence of his friendly leadership would be felt by the Indian public, Sri Lanka and the entire world," the PM said in his condolence message.

The Indian High Commission said he was the first to write in the condolence book. The high commission thanked the prime minister for his tributes. "In this sad moment, the condolences offered by you and the Sri Lankan people would provide solace to the family of the former Presi-dent and the Indian people," the High Commission said in a Twitter post.

Sri Lankan President Gotabaya Rajapaksa ear-

lier condoled Mukherjee's demise. "I am deeply saddened to learn the demise of former Indian president #PranabMukherjee. He will be remembered for his service to the people of #India. My heartfelt condolences to his family and friends," the Sri Lankan president tweeted on August 31.

Mukherjee, India's 13th President, died on Monday following a 21-day battle with multiple ailments. He had tested positive for COVID-19 on August 10 and was operated the same day for removal of a brain clot. He was 84. (PTI)

"Turmeric is a 10 month crop, after the harvest it takes further two months to get the final product (turmeric fingers). Currently, the country has no turmeric and since the new crop only started in May/June this year, it will be around April 2021 when we get a new volume.'

Referring to the current stocks, the importers allege that 1 million kilogrammes when divided can only allow 200 grammes to each household, which will only be sufficient for two weeks.

"Meanwhile, the shipping demurrage is accumulating on a daily basis and we urge the Government to help us get these consignments released.'

The importers are willing to donate

Rs.100 million to local farmers in order to encourage them to produce more turmeric as well as affirming their commitment to purchase locally grown turmeric hereafter.

"This scarcity has encouraged people to bring Turmeric in illegal ways and sell them at a very high rate up to Rs.4500 for a kilogramme in the black market. Releasing these consignments will enable us to sell them for a government marked price," they said.

The letter signed by P.S.A Importers, Ranjith Traders, SKT Traders, Sana Lanka Trading and Woodland company also said that the use of Turmeric has increased in volume over the last few months due to the spice's medicinal value.

USAID donates 200 portable ventilators

The combined generation capacity of these rooftop systems will be about 60 MW. The LoC will also provide financing for a floating solar power plant. Geologist De Silva dismissed claims that it was an earthquake or an aftershock adding that preliminary findings have revealed that the tremor may have been caused by a man-made explosion, issues at the closest reservoir which is Victoria or fissures and cavities in limestone zones.

The first tremor was reported in Kundasale last Saturday (29) which was recorded only on two Seismic Stations Pallekale and Mahakanadarawa.

The second tremor which was reported around 8:32 yesterday was however recorded in the Pallekale, Mahakanadarawa and Hakmana centres. "The tremor needs to be reported on at least three centers for us to map it. Nevertheless we initiated investigations following the first tremor, and sent a team of six experts including

geologists to the area. They are conducting further investigations."

When asked of a reoccurrence of such tremors, Geologist de Silva added that while the GSMB cannot predict the vicinity of the intensity of it, they have already initiated discussions with the Disaster Management Centre on contingency measures.

"The Bureau met with officials from the DMC on Monday (1) and held discussions with the Irrigation Department as well as the Mahaweli Authority yesterday. We have asked for more data from the Irrigation Department to ascertain if the tremors were caused by the Victoria Dam. Furthermore since many of the reservoirs come under the Mahaweli Authority, we are also in communication with them as investigations progress."

masuriya reports that the highest rainfall over the last 24 hours of 344 mm was recorded in Agalawatta, Kalutara.

Colonel Sujith Kulasekara, Acting Officer of the Kalutara District Disaster Management Centre said that the Kalutara district experienced the most thundershowers and strong winds which continued over the past 24 hours. Meanwhile, rainfall recorded from Bulathsinhala measured at 200mm, Palindanuwara recorded 175 mm, Horana 125 mm, Kalutara 60 mm

and Walallavita 40 mm. Most roads were inundated and traffic was disrupted along the Dul Ella on Agalawatta - Kudaligama road, Kosketiya on Pelawatta - Walallawita road, Meegahatenna on Pelawatta - Neluwa road, while the Agalawatta - Udawela road was completely inundated due to floods waters.

The Meteorological Department states that red notices have been issued for landslides in Kalutara, Galle and Kegalle districts by noon yesterday.

Disputeless lands occupied by public

President instructs granting of deeds within three months

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa instructed officials to grant deeds for disputeless lands occupied by the public within three months.

The President pointed out that during his recent island-wide one of the major issues raised by the people in many districts was that non-availability of title deeds to their lands. President Rajapaksa

said although the people have lived and cultivated lands for generations, not having title deeds have severely affected them. He emphasized that in order to solve the issue the land policy should be amended to suit the needs of the country and the economic policy.

President made these remarks during a meeting to discuss future activities of the State Ministry of Land Management Affairs, State Business Lands and Property Development held at the Presidential Secretariat yesterday (02).

People face severe hardships and the development suffers major setbacks due to non-availability of land deeds.

The President is also of the view that the land policy is very important in boosting an agrarian econ-

omy The transfer of leased lands by the Land Reforms Commission, other agencies or other parties after development

is another issue faced by the cultivators.

The President instructed officials not to allow such a situation to persist.

President Rajapaksa pointed out the importance of using the uncultivated agricultural lands belonging to the Land

The people have to get the approval of more than 20 institutions to clear a land on a lease basis. It was revealed that it would take years.

The President also instructed that steps should be taken to grant clear title deeds to lands subject to simple conditions without allowing such situations.

'BIA Development Phase II-Stage II to commence at month's end'

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga said yesterday that the government expects to commence the much-awaited Bandaranaike International Airport (BIA) Development Proiect's Phase II-Stage II at the end of this month, with the aim of increasing its annual passenger-handling capacity from its current 6 million to 15 million.

The Japanese Government has provided a concessionary loan amounting to ¥74.397 million for this project, while Airport and Aviation Services Limited (AASL) has provided Rs.21.645 million. Under the project, a new multilevel terminal building, two new piers, and a link course will be built.

'Package A' consists of the construction of a new

multi-level terminal building (Terminal 2) with an approximate floor area of 180,000 sqaure-metres, where arrivals and departures are separated vertically; as well as Pier 2 and Pier 3, a link concourse, new parking apron, taxiways, elevated access roads, a multi-storey car park, and public utilities. **TAISEI** Corporation

from Japan is the contractor for this project. Moving ahead with President Gotabaya Rajapaksa's vision, 'Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour', the project is set to increase the efficiency, safety, and customer care services at the BIA even further.

Meanwhile, Package A is expected to be completed at a cost of Rs.108 billion, within three years.

Sri Lanka Police Day today

154 years of triumphs, trials and tragedies

he Sri Lanka Police is one of the oldest police forces in Asia. It has endured a long journey of over 150 years traversing a road laden with triumphs, trials and tragedies. Upholding the law is vital for a crime-free society in any country. The men and women who wear the gabardine uniform (the official name for the khaki material) are also humans, with their strengths and weaknesses. That being said the constabulary is empowered with enforcing the law, and we as citizens have a right to expect the best. It is a legal and moral obligation expected of the entire police service.



For centuries, Sri Lankan kings prudently ruled the nation and had a system of laws, an



induced with professionalism and positive attitudes. Junior policemen and policewomen must be empowered with IT skills. In this manner, documentation processes can be streamlined. The delay in obtaining police clearance certificates is another area which draws criticism and public complaints. English language proficiency of police officers needs to be upgraded as a priority to meet service requirements. English language skills are equally vital for policemen aspiring to serve on UN peacekeeping missions.

Another brilliant project for the police was envisaged by current President and former Defence Secretary Gotabaya Rajapaksa in updating all the fingerprints of the Criminal Records Division (CRD) into a centralized computer data network. This was successfully done in 2012. This enables easy access in searching and tallying fingerprints within min-In keeping with global police trends, we must practice the MARC method of physical arrest, to restrain violent criminals. The MARC process (Mechanics of Arrest, Restrain and Control) uses the S2P3 concept ensuring the safety of the police officer and person being arrested. The use of excessive deadly force can cause legal complications and allegations of human rights violations, which we have seen in the past. Recording public complaints must be done in a streamlined manner at police stations taking into consideration the language requirements of all ethnicities in Sri Lanka. Every station OIC must strive to foster better relations with the public. They must incorporate temples, churches, kovils and mosques in their public relations programmes. The Sri Lankan public has a duty to work alongside their local police stations. Many gallant policemen have made the supreme sacrifice over the decades. We cannot forget that 2,598 policemen have been killed in active duty and 834 remain disabled. Almost 600 brave policemen were killed in the Eastern Province during the war. Police officers have been killed by drunk and negligent drivers on the road. The policemen and policewomen did an excellent job in enforcing the COVID-19 quarantine curfew, helping the Armed Forces and public in many ways. The Police Band did its part in entertaining people residing in housing schemes during the long curfew. The recent police raids, especially in the Western Province to eradicate narcotics is highly commendable and restores public confidence. The police service has come a long way over the years. There are hundreds of honest and efficient officers. The Sri Lanka Police must rise with confidence to build and sustain a peoplefriendly service, as Sri Lankans aspire to become a prosperous nation under a dynamic and prudent political leadership.




custodians to implement them. During the Portuguese occupation of ancient Ceylon, they did not have a uniformed Police Force although there was some form of maintaining order and collecting taxes. Subsequently, the Dutch gained total control of the Maritime Provinces and the Northern Peninsula by 1658. The Colombo Municipality initiated a system of hiring paid guards to patrol Colombo city at night. Once the British began to establish their dominion over Ceylon, the Office of the Fiscal was given authority to supervise Police duties.

As the city was being overcrowded, the Fiscal was unable to administer the Police functions entrusted to him. Governor Frederick North began to redefine the functions of the Police in 1805. A Police Vidane (officer) was appointed in rural villages for the prevention of crime. Governor North directed that Colombo city be divided into 15 divisions - the zones that are in use to date. Police constables were recruited and trained. The Governor was keen to restructure the Police and made a request to the Governor of Bombay to recommend a diligent officer. The name of William Campbell, who was in charge of the Indian Rathnagiri Rangers, was proposed and duly accepted. Campbell arrived in Ceylon and assumed duties as the first Chief Superintendent of Police on September 3, 1866. This date is recorded as the day that the uniformed Police Force was established in Ceylon.

In 1867, the first Police Headquarters was set up in Maradana. In Colombo, the ranks were restructured to recognize police inspectors, sergeants and constables. For the first time, the rank of Assistant Superintendent of Police (ASP) was created. The Criminal Investigation Department (CID) was established in 1870. The CID is the coordinating point of contact for Interpol.

The Police Headquarters was relocated in Fort in 1932 from where it operates to this day. In 1947, Richard Aluwihare became the first Sri Lankan to be appointed as the Inspector General of Police. He is credited with transforming the Force. IGP Richard Aluwihare recruited female cadre into active regular service. Today the number of policewomen has significantly increased.

Sri Lanka was plagued with many forms of internal insurgency. Realizing this threat, the Police Department established the Special Task Force (STF) in 1983. The training academy was set up in Katukurunda. These officers received training in counter-terrorism operations. During the past 37 years, the STF has made significant progress in the areas of explosive ordinance disposal, VIP security and SWAT teams who respond to dangerous confrontations. Over the past few months, the STF teams have played a key role in arresting



members of organized criminal gangs. They have also been tasked to enhance security for the prisons in Colombo.

Reaching aspirations

The Sri Lankan public has many expectations from the police service. Today we live in a world that is influenced by social media. There is a tremendous need to enhance a good rapport with the public. The negative actions of police personnel go viral on social media within minutes. Today public information is vital to prevent crime and helps in narcotics detection. This can happen when there is trust between police and public. A new Code of Ethics for the police was launched in 2016 to address this requirement for a people-friendly law enforcement entity. The National Police Commission was mandated among other tasks with creating an efficient police service. However, many citizens insist that the police service needs pragmatic change from ground level, with emphasis on the constabulary. In the recent past, the image of the police service received a severe blow when a dozen officers of the Police Narcotics Bureau (PNB) were arrested on charges of corruption and fraud.

The negative actions of a few always affect any organization, and this cannot be accepted from the Police Force. Another area receiving adverse comments is the way policemen in the ranks of sergeant and constable speak to people in a rude manner with no courtesy at certain police stations and also at traffic checkpoints on the road. This shows a lack of consistent in-service training and motivation. In fairness to police constables and sergeants, many have stagnated without timely promotions, which is a direct factor in their mood swings. Their other concerns were better facilities at barracks. Serving far away from their families and homes can have an impact

on their attitudes. Mess facilities (dining) for junior police officers and the inspectorate must be revamped to meet the standards of mess facilities seen in the Armed Forces. Timely appreciation is vital in building efficient teamwork. The Inspectorate (ranks of SI/IP/CI) is the backbone of the Sri Lanka Police. They must be given good welfare facilities and career development.

Central Expressway Kadawatha – Meerigama Section construction expedited

Highways Minister Johnston Fernando has expedited the construction of the Central Expressway's Kadawatha – Meerigama Section which was delayed by the Good Governance Government.

Minister Fernando told the Daily News that instructions have been given to Ministry Secretary R.W.R. Premasiri to expedite the construction work related to the project, which covers a road distance of 37km. The minister said that the Central Expressway Project comes under four stages: from Kadawatha to Mirigama (37km), Mirigama to Kurunegala (39km), Pothuhera to Galagedara (32km), and Kurunegala to Dambulla (60km). The estimated cost of the project is Rs.158 billion, he added.

Minister Fernando also said that the construction work of the Kadawatha - Meerigama section would be completed within three years. He added that a basic advance of Rs.16.67 billion (15% percent of the estimated project cost), was provided to the contractor company on August 25.

Anthony Morais

Versatile journalist

It has been one year since the sudden demise of the famous artist and Tamil cinema journalist, my dear friend Anthony Augustin Morais. Born on September 13, 1941, he passed away peacefully on August 26, 2019, at the age of 79. I still remember the last conversation I had with him before I got the shocking news of his death, early in the morning on the 26th.

Augustin Morais served as a lead artist and composer of the Cinema Page in the leading Tamil newspaper Virakesari, in its weekly edition for 40 years, from 1970.

Anthony's father, Charles Morais, was originally from the South-Indian port city of Tuticorin and migrated to Sri Lanka to set up a lucrative import/export business here. He had two sons: Lenin and Anthony Morais. While Anthony entered the art and journalism field, his brother Lenin entered the Sinhala Cinema field and produced and directed almost 185 films such as 'Hatharadenama Suraya', 'Edath Suraya, Adath Suraya', 'Surangay Suraya', and 'Bicycle Hora', starring Vijay Kumaratunga, Malani Fonseka, Tony Ranasinghe, and so on. Lenin was also an expert cameraman.

Anthony Morais was educated at St. Anthony's College, Wattala. From his early days, he was very interested in art. After he grew up, his father, having observed his passion for arts, sent him to Chennai and Tamil Nadu in India to learn Arts at the School of Fine Arts there. After studying the finer points of art diligently, Morais returned to Sri Lanka with his diploma. Although his father wanted Morais to enter the business field, he was not inclined to it and chose the arts field instead. Anthony became a full-time artist, drawing pictures for various Tamil journals, novels, short stories, and banners. Morais has three children. Because of his love for art, he named his eldest son as Picasso, his daughter as Mona Lisa, and his youngest son as Charles, after his late father. The name Mona Lisa stuck to Morais' name right throughout his life. He also leaves behind his wife Madonna, who was a tower of strength throughout his life.

Anthony treasured his family the most and was very sad that both his father and brother Lenin passed away prematurely at the age of 47 and 43, respectively. He used to say that had they lived longer, his life would have been fuller and much more enriched. Perhaps, now that he has joined them, his soul may be gratified.

Morais was nothing less than a brother to me, and if such a thing as life after death exists, I would wish to be reborn as Morais' brother. He was a genial man; calm, composed, and unruffled. Anthony is missed dearly by his loved ones. May his soul rest in peace. **A.N.**



Work, his priority

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa's decision not to accept invitations for events outside his official duties indeed is fully in keeping with his resolve to give priority and pride of place to the people's needs and aspirations. According to a Presidential Media statement President Gotabaya Rajapaksa will henceforth not attend occasions such as weddings, prize givings and tamashas, and, instead, will devote this time to attend to the burning issues confronting the people for which they have entrusted him with a tremendous responsibility.

This though should not be misunderstood since the President is all too aware of the love and respect showered on him by individuals who consider it a unique honour and privilege to have him as the chief guest and attesting witness at weddings and grace similar events with his presence, the statement added. However, the President has decided to devote his time towards fulfilling his responsibility towards the people, particularly by attending to the needs of the grassroots segments. Therefore the President has decided not to attend events such as weddings, parties and prize givings etc. and has asked people not to extend invitations to him for these occasions. It is the expectation of the President to dedicate every single moment outside his official duties towards the well-being of the ordinary people.

No citizen of this country, who has been observing the President's style of Governance since assuming office will doubt his bona-fides on this score. Also those observing the passing scene would, no doubt, have noticed that President Rajapaksa not being a professional politician, though immensely popular with the electorate, does not like to bask in the glory and limelight at public or private events.

What the public has been seeing is a leader with simple habits whose priority has been to attend to the needs of the public and deliver on his promises, with less fanfare than we have been seeing from most other politicians. From the very outset, President Rajapaksa dispensed with all his official trappings, doing away with elaborate ceremonies as one witnessed on the two occasions he came to Parliament for its inaugurations with no vehicle escorts. He also ordered the removal of his portraits from all Government offices. His hands on approach won many accolades from the public like when he took to task officials of the state banks and the Central Bank for being remiss in the delivery of relief to small-time businesses during the height of the Coronavirus pandemic. His handling of the health crisis came in for high praise from US Defence Secretary Mark Esper in a personal telephone conversation on Sunday. Over the weekend, he walked nearly three Km in remote Lankagama, listening to the people's woes. Besides, there is no time to waste, with almost one year of the President's tenure already consumed by the pandemic response and there is a lot more to be done. The Coronavirus has taken a heavy toll on the economy not to mention all aspects of life with job losses and closure of businesses posing serious problems. There are also other multifarious issues connected to rural life like the lack of drinking water, farmers' woes and the human elephant conflict that the President wants resolved completely within the next two years. The President also has to focus attention on the proposed new Constitution that will hopefully hand him the requisite powers to implement his programmes without let or hindrance. Not just President Rajapaksa, the entire Cabinet and Government ought to be on the ball to fulfill the people's mandate and their gigantic expectations. There is no time for honeymooning. True, the Ministers will have to demonstrate the quantum of work they put in and they would naturally court publicity for this exercise. But ceremonies should be kept to a minimum as these are wasteful expenses that could be put to better use. In this respect we once commended then Education Minister Dullas Alahapperuma who vowed not waste time attending school functions, and, what is more, causing agony to the children by keeping them in the hot sun. Hopefully, this attitude will rub off on the new Cabinet and State Ministers who are advised to carry out their duties with less fanfare. They have been shown the way in this respect by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, no less. The Ministers should also do away with luxury lifestyles and pomposity and adopt simple habits and qualities that will endear them to the people. People still view our politicians with a jaundiced eye chiefly due to their extravagances and questionable conduct. Hopefully, the Cabinet of Ministers will emulate the President not just in adopting simple ways and shunning the limelight but also by being true servants of the people in every way.



Govt, Opposition focus on different priorities



he dust appears to have finally settled on the August 5 General Election with ministers being sworn in, Parliament being convened and political parties getting accustomed to their respective new roles in the Government and the Opposition. Two entirely different issues are dominating the interest of the Opposition and the Government. In the opposition, the United National Party (UNP) is facing a 'make or break' leadership crisis. The Government meanwhile is focused on proposed amendments to the Constitution.

There is still considerable unrest in the United National Party (UNP) which is struggling to find a new leader with different candidates offering themselves as potential leaders, the latest being former Speaker Karu Jayasuriya and former Minister of State for Defence Ruwan Wijewardene.

Jayasuriya was not mentioned as a potential successor initially but he has since stated that he had been receiving numerous requests from many grassroots UNP organisations requesting him to accept the leadership as they believe he had the ability to unite the party.

New UNP leader

Two UNP affiliated organisations, the United Professional Group (UPG) and the Young Professional Organisation of United National Party (YPOUNP) made similar appeals to Jayasuriya, who also visited the Malwatte and Asgiriva temples in Kandy to obtain the blessings of the chief prelates there. Jayasuriya will celebrate his 80th birthday later this month. As such, he would not be ideally placed to lead the UNP to the next national elections which are not due for another five years. However, the expectation is that leadership should be handed to him as an 'interim' measure to unify the party. The first 'official' intimation of Jayasuriya's aspirations came in the form of a statement issued by him last week. In this statement Jayasuriya traced his association with the UNP since 1994, the requests he had received to lead the party and declared that he considers himself suitable for the role. After the release of the statement, a faction within the UNP protested against the prospect of Javasuriva leading the party. There were claims that he was not a member of the party at present. It is believed that these public statements had UNP leader Ranil Wickremesinghe's blessings. The relationship between Wickremesinghe and Jayasuriya has been a difficult one. It was Wickremesinghe who brought Jayasuriya in to politics in 1994. Prior to that he had served as Sri Lanka's ambassador to Germany during the tenure of President Ranasinghe Premadasa. Wickremesinghe was instrumental in Jayasuriya's meteoric rise in the UNP. He was appointed Chairman of the UNP in 1995. He first attracted countrywide public attention when he contested the mayoral election in Colombo in 1996 as the UNP candidate and won comfortably. He contested the 2000 General Election, polling the highest number of preferences among all political parties in the Gampaha district with 237,000 votes. He was then appointed deputy leader of the UNP. Following the UNP-led coalition's victory in 2001, he was appointed Minister of Power and Energy. Jayasuriya was a virtual 'running mate' for Wickremesinghe at the 2005 Presidential Election, being declared the prime ministerial nominee in the event of Wickremesinghe winning the election. However, Wickremesinghe narrowly lost the 2005 presidential election to present Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa. Thereafter there were several calls from within the UNP to replace Wickremesinghe with Jayasuriya but the former was determined to remain as leader of the party. This paved the way for the first estrangement between Wickremesinghe and Jayasuriya which occurred in January 2007. Jayasuriya led a group of 18 Opposition Parliamentarians who joined the Government. He was offered the Ministry of Public Administration and Home Affairs by then President Mahinda Rajapaksa. UNPers loyal to Wickremesinghe saw this as a betrayal of the party and its leader by Jayasuriya. Some of those who joined then President Rajapaksa with Jayasuriya have remained with him to this day. They include Prof. G. L. Peiris, Gamini Lokuge and Bandula Gunawardena, all of whom hold Cabinet portfolios today. They maintained that they were crossing over to support the battle against terrorism. However, Jayasuriya did not last long within the Government of President Mahinda Rajapaksa, resigning from his Cabinet Portfolio and returning to the

Wickremesinghe again appointed him Deputy Leader of the party which was a condition for his return.

Jayasuriya remained an active member of the UNP Opposition but calls for Wickremesinghe to be replaced as the party leader were growing. Late in 2011, Jayasuriya formally challenged Wickremesinghe for the party leadership. Other party posts were also contested.

The decision was left to the party's Working Committee. Wickremesinghe easily won that contest, defeating Jayasuriya by 72 votes to 24. However, Sajith Premadasa emerged as deputy leader, beating Ravi Karunanayake by 52 votes to 44. Karunanayake was later appointed assistant leader.

Following Maithripala Sirisena's election as President, Jayasuriya returned to the Cabinet. He was appointed Speaker following the General Election. As Speaker, he earned praise for his conduct during the Constitutional crisis sparked by Wickremesinghe's sacking as Prime Minister in 2018.

In the run up to the 2019 Presidential Election Jayasuriya was mentioned by some as a potential UNP candidate. This was as a 'compromise' candidate as there was a tussle between Ranil Wickremesinghe and Sajith Premadasa for the UNP candidacy which was handed to Premadasa only a few weeks before the poll.

Since then, Jayasuriya had maintained a low profile. However, as it became clear that Wickremesinghe was not stepping down immediately as UNP leader, he has emerged as a potential candidate for the leadership, promising to unite the party before handing it over to a new leader.

Jayasuriya's claims are complicated by his chequered history within the UNP and the fact that another potential leadership candidate, Navin Dissanayake, who is the son of former UNP stalwart Gamini Dissanayake, is his son-in-law. Some believe this is a ploy to pave the way for Dissanayake.

The next few weeks will be crucial for the UNP as it decides on the leadership issue. Nevertheless, the task of choosing the leader lies with the party's Working Committee and it is no secret that the Working Committee is stacked with Wickremesinghe's appointees, so his choice is likely to prevail.

Within the Government ranks meanwhile, work is underway to replace the 19th Amendment and replace ably more time.

À draft of the proposed 20th Amendment has been sent to the Attorney General for perusal and is expected to be discussed by the Cabinet of Ministers this week. Therefore, it is clear that the government believes the 20th Amendment to be a matter of priority and is keen to have it enacted.

During the General Election campaign, Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP) candidates claimed that the 19th Amendment will be discarded altogether in the event of the SLPP securing a two-thirds majority at the poll. That will not be the case apparently; some aspects of the 19th Amendment will be retained.

Amendments to the Constitution

These include the five-year terms of office imposed on the President and Parliament, which were reduced from six years by the 19th Amendment. The two-term limitation on an individual holding the office of President is also likely to be retained in the proposed 20th Amendment to the Constitution.

However, two aspects of the 19th Amendment have been earmarked for change. They are the clause that prevents dual citizens from running for Parliament or President and the barrier imposed on the President from dissolving Parliament until four and a half years have elapsed.

The abolition of the former provision will pave the way for the mastermind behind the formation of the SLPP, Basil Rajapaksa- who is also a citizen of the United States- to return to Parliament through the National List. He is tipped to be appointed to a key Cabinet portfolio on his return.

The clause preventing the dissolution of Parliament for four and a half years was the provision that led to the Constitutional crisis in December 2018. Given the uneasy period the country experienced during that time, the Government is of the view that this provision should be repealed immediately.

There is much speculation about the Independent Commissions and the Constitutional Council with many civil society organisations arguing that these should be retained to enhance democratic governance. The opposition too has been demanding that these aspects of the 19th Amendment be retained.

It is understood that the Government is considering this aspect of the 19th Amendment carefully. It is mindful that some aspects of the independent commissions are beneficial. However, it is also aware of the need to make modifications to the current provisions to enable enhanced efficiency in governance.

There is no doubt that the Government will be able to pass the 20th Amendment through Parliament with ease as it enjoys a two-thirds majority. However, the precise shape and form of the 20th Amendment will reflect the Government's thinking and its plan of action for the next five years.

While in flow, historical happenings do not always presage their latent potential. It is later, with the benefit of time, that the historian sketches the full picture of the direct, as well as the indirect developments of history changing events. In violent upheavals, in bloody wars and revolutions, there are immediate winners and there are apparent losers. The winner, carrying his trophy, struts on the public stage, while the loser sulks, sometimes even losing his head – literally in some cases. But in large human conflicts, appearances are often deceiving, or do not tell the whole story.

Around the 13th Century the fearsome Mongol horsemen brought most of China under their hooves. But soon the conqueror was conquered, the Mongols settled in China and went on to establish the Yuan dynasty, very much in the Chinese fashion. Similarly, in the Roman times the overriding ambition of many barbarian leaders fighting the might of Rome was to eventually become Romans themselves. More recently, in the 20th Century, we saw mighty America challenged by infinitely weaker Vietnam. Not only were the antagonists racially different, ideologically, Vietnam stood diametrically opposed, an avowedly Communist country. It was a David and Goliath battle, though much bloodied, the plucky Vietnamese denied the Americans military success, eventually bringing the entire country under their red banner. However today, in all but name, Vietnam is a Capitalist country. Who won and who lost?

European empires

Not so long ago, the world belonged to European imperial powers, Great Britain, France, Spain, Portugal, Netherlands even tiny Belgium had carved out far flung empires, spread around the world. In addition to these seafaring powers, there were other European empires, the Russian, German and Austro-Hungarian empires, a power-keg of rival, competing imperial interests.

Yet to the casual observer, 19th – early 20th Century Europe was a picture of peace and solidity; successful and stable. Having created the ground for the industrial revolution, Europe now carried limitless potential; high productivity, global trade, broadening literacy, strengthening rule of law and the rapid advancement of both public as well as personal rights; the small, but dominant continent epitomized progress.

In the three Centuries preceding, European abilities and methods had dominated the world like none other imperial era. Relatively small coun-

that the sun never set on their globally spread empire. Victoria reigned from 1837, for 63 years, the longest reign for a British monarch, and the longest reigning queen in the world, until surpassed by her great-greatgrand daughter, Elizabeth II, in 2015.

During her rule, the Empire faced many challenges, including the costly Boer War (1899-1902) in what is now South Africa. The Boers (European farmers settled there from the 17th Century), well- armed and well- led, gave the British soldiers a determined fight. During what was referred to as the "Black Week" they caused alarmingly high casualties among the British soldiers and consternation spread throughout the British Empire. Queen Victoria rallied her men, telling a crestfallen Balfour "Please understand that there is no one depressed in this house. We are not interested in the possibilities of defeat. They do not exist".



Like a gigantic engine that cannot be stopped once started, the World moved inexorably to the Great War, engulfing whole of Europe, spreading eventually to other continents, Africa, Asia and the Middle East, causing the East. The Germans, true to their methods, had developed a superb railway and transport system for the purpose. Ten years later, this was basically the plan that the German Army used in the Great War.

For the plan to work, a quick and decisive victory in the West was crucial. In the Schlieffen Plan the attack on France had two prongs. The left prong, a thrust in the Alsace-Lorraine area was a feint, calculated to draw the French forces there, while the main effort was the right prong, a massive concentrated attack through Belgium going right up to Paris, while also closing the north coast to British intervention. Here again, overwhelming forces were to be concentrated on the right prong.

Schlieffen's successor, Helmuth von Moltke the junior (of the illustrious military family), apprehensive of the risks inherent in a weak left prong, subsequently changed the ratio of forces considerably between the two wings. And, eventually as real fighting (in the World War) would show, this weakening of the right wing left it just a little too weak to fulfil the decisive task of vanquishing France in one single thrust.

Great Britain could ignore neither the German trampling over of Belgium, nor its attack on France. Any move thus by the Germans in the West, necessarily drew in Britain.

Like a gigantic engine that cannot be stopped once started, the World moved inexorably to the Great War, engulfing whole of Europe, spreading eventually to other continents, Africa, Asia and the Middle East, causing the deaths of roughly 40 million in the four years of fighting (the world population was much less then, making this a horrendous blood bath).

Despite their angry declaration of war, Austro-Hungary did not fare well against the Serbs, needing a military "stiffening" from their more martial German allies. Initially, the Russians too performed well, requiring a greater German effort in the East than anticipated, to contain them. But it was the Western Front, which soon developed into a stalemate, giving rise to the horrible trenches, that came to epitomize the agony of the war.

This was the war that demonstrated with bloody clarity, the horrific killing power of science and technology. Heavy guns that could fire highly destructive missiles, tanks, fighter planes, submarines all made their entry during this gigantic struggle. A most pernicious weapon was used by the combatants in the form of poison gas. There was universal despair, human beings were massacring each other like never before, and there was no end in sight.

In 1917, the Americans joined the allied powers, tilting the balance somewhat. Then in mid-1918 the Germans launched an all-out attack in the West, helped by the Russian pullout from the war, post- Bolshevik revolution. When this offensive failed, the wind went out of the German sails. There were revolts and unrest in Germany. The Kaiser abdicated, paving the way for the Weimar Republic. On November 11, 1918 Germany signed the armistice. The impact of these four blood soaked years hastened the end of the 'Old World'. Many Empires which had stood like immovable features, collapsed after the war; the Russian, German, Austro-Hungarian, Ottoman empires went out of history. For the first time in the human story, we saw in Russia the establishment of a socialist government, holding allegiance to neither a king nor a religion. Austro-Hungary broke up into several countries, new countries emerged. Germany lost territory, burdened with huge war reparations, went into a period of instability, ending in the emergence of the Nazis in 1933. Great Britain although victorious, was badly battered and as subsequent events showed too exhausted to sustain its imperial dreams. America emerged ever stronger. In the colonies, men's thoughts were moving towards independence. But that had to await another World War to bear fruit. An orderly, seemingly fixed world was turned into a chaotic, uncertain place by the First World War. Worldwide, the millions affected by the war were profoundly impacted by the carnage; traumatized by the human capacity for cruelty and violence on an industrial scale. In their hearts and minds something changed, an intense questioning of faith and a loss of innocence, ensued.

tries like Portugal, Holland, England and Spain had built themselves worldwide empires, several times larger and numerous than themselves. They were not always won by a feat of arms; the intellectual hollowness as well as the corruption of the old societies made them untenable in a changing world. Advancements in transport and communication shrank the globe, laying bare the pitiable state of these once viable countries. History tells us that decay and vacuity is an irresistible invitation, invariably pulling in stronger forces.

The conquistadors did subjugate and plunder, with fire and sword. But in many places, the local communities welcomed the takeover, hoping for an improvement in their forlorn lives. And, it was not only military prowess that won the day. With the conqueror came a wealth of new ideas plus advances; Parliaments, legal systems, science, education in addition to developed technology; concepts, which to this day guide these countries. Even mighty China, at least putatively, claims its moral legitimacy on the basis of the philosophy of Karl Marx, a German Jew. In the model that created an economic juggernaut out of that country, there is very little of the indigenous. It seems that in the centuries of conquests, Europe was so pre-eminent that it virtually made the rest of the world, in their own image.

When Queen Victoria passed away in 1901 (Born 1819), British power was at its zenith, famously claiming At her deathbed (on January 22, 1901), were her son and successor King Edward VII, and her eldest grandson, Emperor Wilhelm II, who was to later lead Germany during World War I. Unbeknown to them, the door was about to close on this familiar, secure world.

The guns of August (1914) blew Europe to smithereens, disarranged unrecognizably a continent put together with great difficulties, disillusioned a hopeful world, and gave rise to a cynical and dark view of man and his ways. What led to that fateful August?

Europe was not only England, there were several equally powerful empires; the German, the French, Austro-Hungarian, Russian, Ottoman; powerful, ambitious and competing powers. The rapid economic/industrial rise of Germany, combined with the masterful manoeuvring of Bismarck its renowned Chancellor, had created a powerhouse in the centre of Europe that would not be denied. These different empires sought to further their interests by way of alignments and treaties with each other, and if necessary, by waging war.

On June 28, 1914, Archduke Franz Ferdinand heir presumptive to the Austro-Hungarian Empire, was visit-

ing the Bosnian capital of Sarajevo. A former Ottoman territory, Bosnia/ Herzegovina had been annexed by the Austro-Hungarian Empire to the displeasure of Slavic Serbia, consequently a troubled area. A group of conspirators, encouraged by Serbia determined to assassinate the Archduke during his visit.

The original assassination plan for the June 28, failed; the grenade thrown by an assassin only injured some bystanders. Unharmed, the Archduke insisted on visiting the injured at the Sarajevo hospital. While returning an hour later from the hospital visit, his convoy took the wrong turn, going down a street where, coincidentally, one of the assassins was passing by. This time there was no mistake, the assassin shot dead both the Archduke and his wife.

Those shots on June 28, 1914, a terrorist act committed by a small gang of Serbian nationalists in an insignificant corner of Europe, were to set in motion a series of actions and reactions which led to a World War, changing the course of history, shattering a familiar and long established world order for good.

War against Russia

Austro Hungary was outraged by the assassination. Serbia rejected their harsh demands as unacceptable, whereupon Austro-Hungary declared war on her. This led to the Russian Empire, ethnically as well as politically aligned to Serbia, coming to her aid, mobilizing the massive Russian army. The German Kaiser Wilhelm II, bound by treaty as well as ethnicity to assist Austro-Hungary asked his cousin, the Czar Nicolas II to call off the Russian mobilization. Russia refused, which led to the mobilization of Germany and the declaration of war against Russia on August 1, 1914. France, committed to come to Russia's aid, declared war on Austro-Hungary and then Germany.

deaths of roughly 40 million in the four years of fighting (the world population was much less then, making this a horrendous blood bath).

The German strategists confronted a historical dilemma, imposed by her geography. With two very powerful neighbours, France on her West and Russia in the East, in the event of a war, Germany would be compelled to fight on two fronts, with hundreds of miles in between. Grappling with the problem, Alfred von Schlieffen, Germany's outstanding Chief of General Staff (1891-1906) had come up with a plan which was predicated upon a superlative performance from the German soldiery.

In essence, the eponymous plan, envisaged a quick victory in the West before transferring the army to the East to deal with that theatre. Accordingly, nearly 80% of the German army were to be committed to the West in order to gain a decisive victory against France and her allies, while the balance would act as a 'screen' in the East, playing for time. After the issue is decided in the West, necessary forces could be transferred to the

impounded and, a court ordered him to report to police investigators for an inquiry into Liyanarachchi's death. He was not allowed to leave the country.


When it comes to the situation of Sri Lankan youths three decades ago, it was very dark and full of murders and disappearances. The dark and deadly era existed from around 1987 to 1992. But, the untimely deaths of our heroic Armed soldiers came to an end only on May 18, 2009, under the guidance of the then President and the current Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa and the current President and the then Defence Ministry Secretary Gotabaya Rajapaksa. After that golden day written in the Sri Lankan history, no Sri Lankan mother cried for her son's untimely death due to the conflict with the LTTE. From 1987 to 1992, over 60,000 innocent poor Sri Lankan youths, mostly Sinhalese, were killed by the Deshapremi Janatha Vyaparaya (DJV), the then Government, and various other unofficial and unidentified armed groups such as Black Cats, Yellow Cats and Praa sponsored by various politicians.

Against the broad daylight murders of over 60,000 innocent poor youths including schoolchildren, undergraduates, lawyers and journalists carried out by the regime existed in 1987/1988, the fifth Executive President of Sri Lanka and the current Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa travelled to Geneva in Switzerland to lobby country representatives at the United Nations Human Rights Commission, the international body that preceded the current UN Human Rights Council. Young Parliamentarian Mahinda Rajapaksa carried 533 documents with him to Geneva which contained information about missing persons and 19 pages of photographs of them to make his case to delegations at the UN.

"We have a right to tell this to the world. Tears of innocent grieving mothers compel us to tell their story of pain and sorrow to the world. We will do it today, tomorrow and always," Parliamentarian Mahinda Rajapaksa stated in Parliament.

He took the lead to form the 'Mothers' Front' with over 25,000 Sri Lankan mothers, wives and sisters etc. who lost their loved ones due to the state-sponsored killing field existed in Sri Lanka in 1987 and 1988. Over 60,000 young men and women were killed after torturing at selected locations such as Batalanda and then murdered during this period. Among them, there were prominent professionals such as Richard De Zoysa and Wijedasa Liyanarachchi.

Human-Elephant Conflict

he lives of elephants in Sri Lanka are under threat due to development activities. The human-elephant conflict has a long history. At the beginning of the 19th century, the British colonial Government started planting tea and coffee in the hill country. Eventually, elephants became a problem to their plantations and the British planters started killing a large number of elephants.

Under the orders of British Government Mayor Roger who was also the administrator of the Uva Province, 1,300 elephants, including 60 tuskers, had been killed. Unfortunately, he was also killed by an elephant. This was the beginning of the history of the humanelephant conflict in Sri Lanka.

Today, the human-elephant conflict is common in Sri Lanka. As the largest mammal, the elephant has a remarkable ecological, cultural and generational value. Due to the mass destruction of elephants in

the hill the



country, the elephant population had been restricted to the Dry Zone plains.

At the beginning of the Mahaweli Project, thousands of acres which were prime elephant habitats were cleared for agriculture. These plots of land were given to people to cultivate and some of the lands have been used for irrigation. People settled in areas which belong to wild elephants. which emerged due to this humanelephant conflict cannot be solved overnight.

A herd of wild elephants has recently played havoc in Wandurassa and Rasnayakapura Divisional Secretariat areas, destroying paddy and chena cultivations worth more than Rs. one million. They enter these villages, passing the Deduru Oya bund across the Wilpattu Sanctuary.

The unending invasions of wild elephants to villages and hamlets around the jungle belts in North Western and North Central Provinces, including the Mahaweli division, have been a menace that threatens villagers. The situation in the villages such as Mahawelithenna and Meegalewa is pathetic. According to the Wildlife Conservation Department, the lack of experienced staff is a hindrance for the adaptation of remedial steps.

The electric fence around the Siyambalangamuwa Hakwatuna Oya is also not in operation for a long time. However, those who settled in the dry zone areas under the Mahaweli Project are struggling to save their cultivations from wild jumbos. The Wildlife Conservation Department said in the last three years, 319 elephants and 92 persons had died due to human-elephant conflict. After a long silence, the Wildlife



Conservation Department has decided to pay compensation within three months to those who became victims of wild elephant invasions. A group of hunters killed the crossed tusker of Galgamuwa, known as Dala Puttuwa in February 2019. Eight persons were arrested while attempting to trade off elephant pearls (Gaja Muthu) at Rs. 80,000. The case is still pending in the Kurunegala Magistrate Court.

The number of elephants living in the Kala Oya National Park has also decreased to seven. A 14-year-old she elephant died recently at the Anuradhapura Thuruvilla tank bund. In the same area, two other elephants died of gunshot injuries in Nelum Kulama three months ago.

According to Wildlife Conservation Department reports, about 263 wild elephants and 685 persons had died between 2010 and 2020. However, wild elephants and human deaths were not reported in 2010 and 2011 in Puttalam and Kurunegala Districts. The main reason for the conflict is the clearing of jungles during development projects.

The lack of equipment to repair the malfunctioning electric fences has inconvenienced villagers in rural areas for many years. The Hakwatuna Oya electric fence in the Kurunegala District is also not in operation for a long period though it possesses extra pillars to re-erect the fence.

However, the farmers in the Dry Zone areas, without being able to cultivate their lands, complain that the Wildlife Conservation Department cannot manage this human-elephant conflict. They say the Wildlife Department has still not taken any action regarding this pathetic situation. The electric fence which is about 80 kilometres long was erected by the North Western Provincial Council

with the assistance of the Central Government.

W.A. Sirisena, a farmer of Polpithigama said a herd of wild elephants have been invading certain villages in the Polpithigama Divisional Secretariat division such as Kattam Beriya, Kumbuk Kaduwela and Madiyawa. "Wild jumbos have caused severe inconvenience to the residents of Amunakole Leekola Wewa and Kassi Kote. We complained several times to the Wildlife Conservation Department Zonal Director for which no response has been received," Sirisena said.

Kurunegala District Secretary R.M. Rathnayake said wild elephants cannot enter these villages once the electric fence is repaired. Many complaints have been received by the Kurunegala District Secretariat from the areas around Galgamuwa about the difficulties and damage caused by wild elephants.

LEBANON: French President Emmanuel Macron said Lebanon's embattled leaders had pledged Tuesday to form a crisis Cabinet within two weeks to push forward with key reforms, as he visited the disaster-hit country.

Macron was in Beirut for a second time since an August 4 explosion there which killed more than 180 people, laid waste to entire city districts and fuelled popular rage against the country's political elite.

JAPAN: Japan's ruling party will vote on September 14 on Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's replacement, an official confirmed Wednesday, as powerful chief cabinet secretary Yoshihide Suga consolidated his frontrunner status in the race. A vote in Parliament -expected to endorse the Liberal Democratic Party's (LDP) new leader -- is likely to follow on September 16.

The new prime minister will face a raft of challenges, from the coronavirus pandemic to a tanking economy, as well as ensuring the postponed Tokyo Olympic Games can go ahead.

Pakistan sees drop in COVID-19 cases

PAKISTAN: Six months after the coronavirus arrived in Pakistan, the country appears to have dodged the worst of the pandemic, baffling health experts.

Following an initial surge, the number of infections has plummeted in recent weeks, with COVID-19 deaths hovering in the single digits each day.

"No one has been able to explain this decline... We don't have any concrete explanation," said Salman Haseeb, a doctor at Services Hospital in the eastern city of Lahore.

Pakistanis have proposed numerous hypotheses for their country's seeming ability to weather the pandemic, crediting everything from the young population and the hot and humid climate to unproven claims of natural immunity.

Its median age is only 22 and the coronavirus is known to disproportionately impact older people with prior health complications.

In comparison, Italy, with a median age of 46.5, has recorded more than 35,000 deaths, while Pakistan's official toll is about 6,300.

To date, the South Asian nation has confirmed more from hospitals across Pakithan 295,000 infections and stan supports the downward currently is recording a few trend.



Europe's virus cases top 4 mn as schools open

FRANCE: Millions of mask-wearing European children returned to school on Tuesday with governments determined to get pupils back in class despite still-rising coronavirus infections which surged over four million across the continent for the first time.

In total, there have been 4,006,077 cases in Europe with Russia, Spain and Britain recording the highest number of infections, while 216,080 people have died and 2,281,959 have recovered, the data showed.

Schools reopened in Russia, Ukraine, Belgium and France, where teachers and children aged 11 and older were obliged to wear face coverings, echoing regulations in place across the continent.

Lockdowns imposed from March meant many children have missed months of education, as well as time with their friends.

In Europe, the decision to forge ahead with school reopenings comes as the virus is spreading rapidly again in many countries, raising fears that more lockdowns and disruption are to come in autumn and winter.

An AFP tally of infections, using official data from across Europe, showed that more than four million people have contracted the illness, with Russia accounting for almost a quarter of infections.

The virus emerged late last year in China and has now infected more than 25 million people globally and killed almost 850,000.

The Chinese city at the centre of the initial outbreak, Wuhan, took another leap back to normality on Tuesday when its almost 1.4 million youngsters also returned to schools and kindergartens.

While schools attempt to get back to normal, the virus continues to play havoc with cultural events.

The Italian city of Venice is also gearing up for the annual film festival, with about half the usual number of visitors expected and no Hollywood A-listers prepared to accept invitations from the organisers.

"It's a festival without stars because Hollywood is still in lockdown," Festival Director Alberto Barbera told AFP. "Will there be less glamour? Yes. Will there be fewer stars on the red carpet? Certainly."

Elsewhere, fresh economic data for the second quarter further revealed the extent of the economic devastation caused by the virus's march around the globe.

Brazil's economy, the biggest in Latin America, contracted by a record 9.7 percent in the second quarter of 2020, the official statistics agency said Tuesday.

There is uncertainty about whether the economy will recover strongly over the rest of the year because the virus is still wreaking havoc and room is running out to continue the huge government stimulus spending that has softened the blow so far. On Monday, India said its economy had colapsed by 23.9 percent.

\$6bn AKON city planned in SENEGAL

SENEGAL: Rapper Akon has set his sights on building a sprawling \$6 billion city in his Senegal homeland to welcome Africans of the diaspora to their "home back home"

The R&B star, who boasts two multi-platinum albums, told a news conference Monday he had laid the first stone for the city in the Atlantic Ocean village of Mbodiene around 100 kilometres (60 miles) south of the Senegalese capital Dakar.

As he was growing up in the US state of New Jersey, where his family moved when he was seven, Akon "ran into a lot of African-Americans that didn't really understand their culture," the 47-year-old said.

"So I wanted to build a city or a project like this that will give them the motivation to know that there is a home back home," he said, adding that he had received the blessing - and advice - of Mbodiene's elders.

Akon City will offer hotels, a university, hospitals, business and leisure centres including a casino, as well as movie studios, all featuring futuristic designs by architect Hussein Bakri, with African sculptures for inspiration

Wakanda, the fictional African city of the "Black Panther" comic book series, served as additional inspiration, Akon acknowledged.

Speaking alternately in English and Wolof, the dominant language in Senegal, the talent with hits including "Locked Up" and "Smack That" said that Akon City would also include a "village of African cultures".

"As you come in from America, or Europe or anywhere in the diaspora, and you feel like you want to visit Africa, we want Senegal to be your first stop," said Akon, whose real name is Alioune Badara Thiam.

The musician and green entrepreneur who set up Akon Lighting Africa to boost solar power on the continent said the new city would be built using renewable materials of African origin to the extent possible.

He said the project would cost an overall \$6 billion but would not name the principal investors because of confidentiality claus-"We are still talking with es. partners and investors," Akon said, adding that local investment "no matter how small or how big" would be welcome.

Akon, who said the project would benefit the local people, notably young Senegalese, is not the only international star with West African roots involved in such investments.

British actor Idris Elba -- son of Ghanaian mother and Sierra Leonean father -- plans to build an eco-tourism complex on an island off Sierra Leone.

Trump decries 'domestic terror' on Kenosha visit

Protests as LA Police kill black man

US: US President Donald Trump Tuesday took his tough law and order message to Kenosha, the latest US city roiled by the police shooting of a black man, as he branded recent anti-racism protests acts of "domestic terror" by violent mobs.

Trump has been hoping for months to shift the election battle against Democrat Joe Biden from a verdict on his widely panned coronavirus pandemic response to what he sees as far more comfortable territory of law and order.

And in the Wisconsin city of Kenosha, in upheaval since a white police officer shot 29-year-old African American Jacob Blake in front of his three young sons, the Republican found his mark.

"These are not acts of peaceful protest but really domestic terror," Trump said after touring damage in the city, describing multiple nights of angry demonstrations last week that left two people dead. Crowds lined the barricaded

streets where the President's motorcade passed, with Trump supporters on one side and Black Lives Matter protesters on the other, yelling at one another from a distance and in sometimes tense face-to-face encounters.

"Thank you for saving our town," read the sign of one supporter along the road. "Not my president," read another.

Under heavy security that blocked off the road, Trump visited a burned out store where he told the owners "we'll help you rebuild." "These gentlemen did a fantastic job," he said, in reference to law enforcement

units that quelled the violent protests.

"This is a great area, a great state," Trump said, adding later that his administration was committing at least \$47 million to Wisconsin law enforcement, small businesses and public safety programs. "We'll get Kenosha back in shape," Trump said.

A microcosm of the racial and ideological tensions of the

Trump era, Kenosha has seen Black Lives Matter protests, riots, and the arrival of armed, white vigilantes, culminating in an incident in which a 17-yearold militia enthusiast, Kyle Rittenhouse, allegedly shot dead two people and badly injured

another. Democrats and Police reform advocates view Kenosha as a symbol of institutional racism. Meanwhile, protesters were to hit the streets of Los Angeles on Tuesday, after police officers shot and killed a black man during a violent confrontation.

The man, identified as 29-year-old Dijon Kizzee, was riding his bicycle Monday in a south Los Angeles neighbourhood when deputies tried to stop him for a code violation, according to the sheriff's department.

Mutating terror threat still looms over Europe

FRANCE: The terrorist threat against Europe has mutated in the last half-decade as jihadist groups have seen their Middle East sanctuaries eroded, but analysts say the West must remain braced for more attacks.

Both Al-Qaeda and the Islamic State group -- together responsible for the highest-profile and most horrific terror attacks of the past two decades -- have lost potency as global organisations.

Despite splintering into branches and franchises, their murderous ideology is still able to inspire individuals to carry out random attacks in their name.

On Wednesday, 14 people go on trial in Paris over the massacres in January 2015 at satirical magazine Charlie Hebdo, and the murder of a policewoman and hostages in a Jewish supermarket -- violence claimed by both IS and Al-Qaeda.

The murderous shooting spree heralded an unprecedented wave of attacks in France.

The deadliest were the coordinated attacks in Paris on November 13 that year at the Bataclan music hall and other venues, when gunmen killed 130 in a plan stemming from the IS group's core leadership in Syria.

Experts believe the same style of assault would be unlikely to recur now, not least because IS has seen a dramatic loss of its territory and membership in Iraq and Syria.

This year, incidents have been more typically carried out by "isolated individuals who were not spotted by the intelligence services... and their limited or even non-existent contacts with identified jihadist networks," a source in the French anti-terror prosecutors' office told AFP.

Since 2015, France has seen 17 crimes classified as acts of terror.

Three took place in 2020, none of which were claimed by the terror groups, but were instead perpetrated by isolated individuals suffering from psychological problems.

But anti-terror prosecutors still see signs of operational coordination, including "networks of false documents and funding," the source said.

The risk of terror attacks in France remains "extremely high", Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin said Monday, adding that 8,132 people were on a national database of Islamist radicals seen as a security risk.

Seth Jones, director of the Transnational Threats Project at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) in Washington, said that in recent years, US and other military operations had "decimated" the IS external operations network, killing or capturing many of its key operational leaders.

Its military rout and the loss of territory IS had declared as a caliphate in Iraq and Syria have also diminished its status, and the motivation for individuals to carry out attacks in its name.

It remains possible that Al-Qaeda could carry out a major attack in Europe, Jones said, either directly or through individuals inspired by its ideology, though this was "not a high probability"

The coronavirus pandemic may have taken some focus off terrorism for security forces worldwide.

But it has also complicated the task of the jihadists, who have been active on a local level, but very cautious about operating further afield. - AFP

"The first time I read 'The Three-Body Problem' trilogy (Remembrance of Earth's Past), it changed what science fiction meant to me forever," said Netflix original series drama vicepresident Peter Friedlander.

Benioff, Weiss and the other producers exchange frequent e-mails and "discuss the books compulsively," he added. - AFP

Twelve killed in Nigeria boat mishaps

NIGERIA: Twelve people have been killed in two separate boat accidents in Nigeria, officials said on Tuesday.

In the first incident on Monday, two people died and another went missing after a fishing boat taking mourners to a funeral capsized outside the commercial capital Lagos, a government safety agency said.

Four people were rescued. None of the seven people on board were wearing life jackets, it said. In a separate incident on Monday, 10 wedding guests drowned when their boat capsized in the Jega district of the northwestern Kebbi state, an emergency official said. The victims were heading to a wedding ceremony in a village on the other bank of the river, said Sani Dodo-



42nd Observer-Mobitel School Cricketers of the Year

Dinesh Chandimal won top title in 2009

It was glad to see former Observer-Mobitel Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year Dinesh Chandimal going great guns in domestic cricket as the 42nd Observer-Mobitel School Cricketers of the Year is set to unveil next month.

Ex-Sri Lanka captain Dinesh Chandimal, who emerged the Obsever-Mobitel Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year 2009, was at his best last Wednesday, cracking an unbeaten 354 for Army Sports Club in their Premier League Tier 'A' match against Saracens SC at Katunayake. Chandimal's marathon innings included nine hits over the rope and another 33 powerpacked boundaries in a 391-ball innings.

Chandimal's mammoth knock accounted for more than half of Army SC's first innings total of 642 for 9 wickets declared. The aggressive wicket-keeper-batsman proved that he has not lost his old magical touch as he played this match-winning knock. He once again proved his tremendous potential and drew the attention of the cricketing world.

The 30-year-old made the highest individual score in an innings this season. He became the second Sri Lankan batsman to score the most runs in an inning in first class cricket.

What was unique in Chandimal's gallant innings was that there were no other centurions to support his triple century, other than for two fifties by Pethum Dilshan (67) and Ashan Randika (63).

Chandimal has now scored 1,027 runs in eight matches with three centuries and four fifties. Thus, he became the second batsman to pass 1,000 runs in this domestic Premier league season. Chandimal's historic triple ton enabled him to go past 8,500 runs with a first class aggregate in 120 matches in 204 innings with 24 centuries and 41 half tons.

Chandimal's elegant innings is the second highest in the all-time list of first class triple hundreds behind Mahela Jayawardena's best Test innings of 374. Besides Jayawarndena (374) and Chandimal (354 no), the other who scored triple centuries were Kithruwan Withanage (351), Minod Bhanuka (342), Thilina

Born on November 18, 1989 in Balapitiya, Lokuge Dinesh Chandimal made his Sri Lanka debut in less than one year after his Observer-Mobitel Schoolboy Cricketer glory in 2009. He first made his ODI debut on June 1, 2010. In the following year, he made his Test debut in the Boxing Day Test against South Africa in 2011.

Playing in 57 Test matches, he has scored 3,877 runs in 103 innings at an average of 40.81 with 11 centuries and 18 half tons and a career-best 164. In 164 ODI innings, Chandimal has scored a 3,599 aggregate with an average of 32.42 inclusive of four tons and 22 fifties. In 54 T20 Internationals for Sri Lanka. he has aggregated 800 runs with four fifties.

Meanwhile, the final selections of the 2020 Observer Schoolboy and Schoolgirl Cricketers of the Year are expected to be held sometime next month. The Sri Lanka Schools Cricket Association (SLSCA), the Umpires Association, along with the organisers, the Sunday Observer and the sponsors Sri Lanka Mobitel will meet next month to decide the grand prize winners and the Observer-Mobitel Schoolboy and Schoolgirl Cricketers of the Year.

The statistical data provider of the event is the popular cricket website batsman.lk which is playing a big role in this contest under its CEO Kumara Gamhewage.

This year, the overall champion team will not be named as the official final leg matches were not played, although the provincial cham-

Hafeez hails debutant Haider as Pakistan beat England

MANCHESTER, TUESDAY: all-rounder Veteran Mohammad Hafeez praised teenage debutant Haider Ali's composure after the pair combined to set up Pakistan's five-run victory over England in their tour-ending third Twenty20 international at Old Trafford on Tuesday.

It was Pakistan's first victory in 66 days of being in a bio-secure bubble in England amid the coronavirus and meant they squared this three-match series at 1-1 after a 1-0 loss in last month's three-Test series.


Hafeez made 86 not out and Haider 54 in Pakistan's 190-4.





EDB, Foreign Ministry to help increase export revenue

The Export Development Board (EDB) and the Foreign Ministry are working closely to increase the country's export revenue and mitigate the negative impact of the COVID 19 pandemic on the export industry

Sri Lanka's export income which stood at US \$ 277 million in April 2020 has increased to US\$ 1,090 million in July and is projected to grow in the coming months.

There are several joint initiatives taken by the EDB and the Foreign Ministry to enhance exports.

This includes identifying new market opportunities, creating awareness by disseminating market alerts, addressing supply chain issues, enhancing capacity building through webinars, and creating business linkages to support existing exporters to sustain their exports.

During the COVID 19 lockdown which began in late March, Sri Lanka's Missions and Posts overseas continued to share updates and developments relevant to the markets they covered. These updates included available market opportunities as well as changes to trade and policy regulations during the pandemic which enabled Sri Lanka's exporters to adapt accordingly.

The functioning of this mechanism also enabled Sri Lanka's exporters to share their supply capability information with buyers swiftly, via the Foreign Ministry and its network of overseas Missions. The export opportunities that were identified and made use of in this manner related in particular to face masks, protective gowns, PPE, rubber gloves, hand sanitizers, tea and food products.

EDB being the facilitator for Sri Lankan exporters made efficient arrangements to circulate market updates rapidly among exporters via email and its website, and made use of IT based solutions to connect exporters and importers by organizing a series of webinars in collaboration with foreign trade chambers with the assistance of Sri Lanka's Missions overseas.

Although lockdowns are easing in several countries including Sri Lanka, the EDB and the Foreign Ministry continue to collaborate with the assistance and support of the network of Sri Lanka Missions overseas to connect buyers and sellers virtually, assessing and responding to market trends.

Virtual trade fairs and displays in year-long virtual shopping malls are being considered as alternative ways to physical trade fairs to link exporters with potential overseas buyers.

With the objective of assisting SMEs in Sri Lanka under the concept of "One Village One Product", EDB and the Foreign Ministry are coordinating with Sri Lanka Missions overseas on attracting investments from migrated Sri Lankans.

Since the Government has set a revised target of US\$ 10.75 billion exports for 2020 further steps will be taken to work closely with other relevant local partners as well as partner nations and organizations to explore new opportunities and utilization of technology.



Statutes and Regulations associated with Regulated Finance Companies

Regulated Finance Companies (RFCs) are major financial intermediaries which are duly regulated and governed by the laws of Sri Lanka. RFCs are strictly governed by virtue of statutes and Acts such as Finance Business Act No. 42 of 2011. The other statutes which are applicable are Finance Leasing Act No. 56 of 2000 as amended, Consumer Credit Act, Mortgage Act, Motor traffic Act, Inland Trust Receipts Act, Debt Recovery Special Provisions Act, Criminal Procedure Amendment Act, Companies Act and so on.

The Finance Business Act No. 42 of 2011 is an act to provide control and supervision of finance companies registered in the Central Bank and the act has repealed the Finance Companies Act No. 78 of 1998. The act outlines the licensing procedures, directions, rules and requirements of finance companies, including core capital reserve funds, admissible business activities by finance companies. Under this act, it is mandatory that a company cannot accept public deposits unless it is registered and licensed as a finance company under the Act and to be registered as a Licensed Finance Company, that company needs to have registered under the Companies Act, No. 7 of 2007. The act also provides for a separate director in the CBSL to monitor and control NBFIs. According to the sections 13 and 14 of the Act, the director is vested with power to act upon NBFIs if they fail to comply with the directions which are listed in sections 13 and 14 suggested under the Finance Business Act.

All RFCs are legally bound and obliged to comply with all the directions and circulars issued under the Finance Businesses Act No. 42 of 2011.

The Finance Leasing Act No. 56 of 2000 as amended by Act No. 24 of 2005 and Act No. 33 of 2007 makes it that it is mandatory to have a license under the Finance Leasing Act to carry on finance leasing businesses. Section 32 of the Finance Leasing Act clearly sets out the repercussions of carrying on Finance Leasing Businesses without registration. Under this section, the director of the Central Bank has the right under Section 32(2) and Section 32(3) (a) (b) to apply to the High Court and obtain an injunction.

Under the finance leasing Act, there are 4 mandatory provisions which has to be strictly followed as provided by Section 31 of the Finance leasing Act No. 56 of 2000.

For RFCs – To carry out finance business and to accept public deposits, a license has to be obtained from the monetary board which has to be annually renewed and for finance leasing businesses a separate license which is again renewable annually has to be obtained.

Approved credit agency status is granted under the Mortgage Act No. 06 of 1949 as amended. The Trust receipt ordinance No. 12 of 1947 and the Inland trust receipt Act of No. 14 of 1990 also are Acts under which businesses can be carried on.

Under these Acts, with the relevant authority given, a finance company can engage in mortgage of movables and mortgage of shares and allied businesses.

The mortgage of corporeal movables such as gold articles, Motor vehicles can be carried on by finance companies who are also approved credit agencies and can enjoy the special benefits granted under these Acts in their recovery process.

It is evident from the above statues and regulations that RFCs are well regulated and governed and are legally bound to abide by the said regulations and directions. RFCs are aware of the consequences of failing to abide by these regulations, accordingly 99% of RFCs do comply with these regulations which is an encouraging sign for customers to embrace the services of RFCs.
