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Airports to re-open only after health sector recommendations - Minister

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga emphasized that the airports will not reopen until a certification by health authorities is given that the health safety of the citizens has been ensured.

Minister Ranatunga expressed these remarks to journalists addressing a District Committee meeting held at the District Secretariat Office in Gampaha. Minister Ranatunga further emphasized that although the government has controlled the COVID-19 epidemic, we cannot be complacent. We cannot allow the

people to take any risks.

However, the Minister

emphasized that all arrangements have been made for the opening of airports and that the recommendations of the health sector were essen-

"The COVID-19 epidemic cannot be allowed to enter the country for any reason. Therefore, we have to control all this in a very strict

and prudent manner. We made recommendations to the Cabinet on the opening of the airports. So, we are ready to open Mattala and Katunayake airports accord-

We are waiting for the approval of the health sector for those recommendations," Minister Ranatunga added.

Water samples contained bunker oil, not crude oil - MEPA Chairperson

Marine Environment Protection Authority (MEPA) Chairperson Dharshani Lahandapura said the report of the Government Analyst's Department stated that the water samples checked by the Department contained bunker oil and not crude oil from the ill-fated MT New Diamond Oil Tanker. Speak-

ing to the media on Tuesday, she observed that the report confirmed that there was no leakage of crude oil stored in the vessel.

Responding to questions by journalists on claiming the 'salvation reward', she pointed out the responsibility of the country was to assist the vessel in distress and avoid a large scale contamination of sea areas around the

"We can recover our expenses from the vessel's insurance firm. Keeping the ship within our maritime boundary is a heavy responsibility that a small country like us can hardly bear. That is why we asked to take it away from our sea boundary. Arresting it and bringing it back to our seas is not something we can recommend," she pointed out.

Lahandapura said oil samples were collected by the MEPA scientists from different locations of the sea close to

Contempt of court proceedings against Wigneswaran terminated

The Court of Appeal yesterday decided to terminate contempt of court proceedings against former Northern Province Chief Minister and Retired Supreme Court Justice C.V Wigneswaran and two others.

Filing a contempt of court action in Court of Appeal, B.Denishwaran alleged that former Northern Province Chief Minister C.V Wigneswaran and Ananthi Sasitharan and K. Sivanesan have willfully acted in contempt of the Court of Appeal order since

they prevented him from acting as a Minister of the Northern Province.

Counsel Suren Fernando appearing for Denishwaran informed the Court that his client was willing to reach a settlement, if Wigneswaran withdrew the appeal petition filed in the Supreme Court.

President's Counsel K. Kanag-iswaran appearing for former Chief Minister Wigneswaran expressed his client's willingness to withdraw the appeal petition filed in Supreme Court.

Accordingly, the Court of

Appeal two-judge-bench comprising Justices Mahinda Samayawardhena and Priyantha Fernando decided to terminate case proceedings against Wigneswaran and three others.

In his complaint, Denishwaran stated that the first respondent, Justice Wigneswaran has, by his conduct and statements, acted in contumacious and willful disobedience of the order of the Court of Appeal and thus committed an act of contempt against the authority and dignity of the Court of Appeal.

The Court of Appeal on June 29, 2018 issued an Interim Order preventing the decision of former Northern Province Chief Minister C.V. Wigneswaran to expel B. Denishwaran from functioning as the Fisheries and Transport Minister in the prov-

The petitioner B.Denishwaran had challenged Northern former Province Chief Minister C.V. Wigneswaran in the Court of Appeal, complaining that the Chief Minister had no power to appoint or remove any Provincial Council minister.

Former Chief Minister C.V Wigneswaran had also filed an appeal in Supreme Court challenging the Court of Appeal's Interim Order to prevent Wigneswaran's decision to remove B. Denishwaran from functioning as the Minister of Fisheries and Transport in the province.

Counsel Suren Fernando appeared for the petitioner Denishwaran. President's Counsel K. Kanag-iswaran appeared for former Chief Minister Wigneswaran.

We hope that this Council would appreciate that Sri Lanka while successfully containing the spread of COVID-19 through a balanced, multisectoral approach and despite this challenge, held its commitment to the democratic processes, and conducted Parliamentary elections successfully and peacefully, last month, which the EU has acknowledged.

"Sri Lanka made it clear even as it withdrew from the co-sponsorship of Resolution 30/1, that it will remain committed to achieve reconciliation, accountability and human rights within the framework of the Sri Lankan Constitution, through a domestically designed and executed process in line with the Government's policy framework. Sri Lanka would like to state further that the new Government which assumed office with the election of the new Parliament on 5 August remains committed to the assurances given before this Council in February this year.

"The GoSL wishes to state that the pardon to the former Army sergeant was granted in terms of the powers and provisions of the Constitution of Sri Lanka.

"The Government rejects the references made to false and unsubstantiated allegations leveled against senior military officials being appointed to key positions of institutions. Sri Lanka has consistently refuted the credibility of these allegations and wishes to highlight that the domestic processes such as the LLRC and Paranaga-

ma Commissions that examined these allegations particularly with regard to the last stages of the conflict, have not found substantive evidence against any of the senior military officials referred to in this regard.

"In the absence of any substantive proof, Sri Lanka considers that the continued arbitrary accusations on crimes or crimes against humanity made against these senior military officials are unacceptable and a violation of the principles of natural justice.

"In conclusion, with regard to allegations of surveillance and intimidation, the Government has already publicly refuted these allega tions, and is committed to protecting and promoting freedom of expression and civil society space, and ensuring that complaints

received on alleged attacks against journalists, human rights defenders and civil society are investigated and prosecuted.

The prime focus of this Government is to ensure national security, and to uphold the rule of law and order in the country for all its citizens, with the aim of creating 'an environment where any citizen can live freely without any fear for the safety of themselves and their families'.

President Rajapaksa made these comments during the discussion to review future activities of the State Ministry of Rural Roads and Other Infrastructure Facilities at the Presidential Secretariat yesterday (September 15).

The President stated that new bridges will be built replacing hanging, wooden plank and small bridges. The construction of 8000km of roads has commenced and 400km of it has already been completed in the last few months.

President Rajapaksa noted that the District Secretaries are tasked with ensuring the supply of required soil, stones and sand for the constructions. President emphasized that prior approval should be granted to those who seek necessary resources from the authorities such as Wildlife Conservation and Archaeological Departments at district level meetings. It was also decided during the discussion to plant 2 million trees along the main roads to shelter the pedestrians. The President highlighted that no room should be left for interruptions and delays in the construction process.

'The supervision of the constructions should be carried out by both government representatives and contractors and no subcontracts are allowed," the President added.

President Rajapaksa advised to strictly prohibit vehicle parking on the pedestrian walkways along the main roads. The President further added that it should be made mandatory to allocate parking spaces when residential flats and

shopping complexes are constructed. Minster Johnston Fernando, State Minister Nimal Lansa, Head of the Presidential Task Force for Economic Revival Basil Rajapaksa, Secretary to the President P.B. Country has successfully faced COVID-19 challenge

countries in the world were left with a substantial challenge in the wake of the COVID – 19 pandemic, Sri Lanka was able to successfully face the challenge by containing its spread, thanks to a wellcoordinated mechanism of preventive measures at the national level, assisted by a robust local healthcare system, Sri Lankan Mission in Geneva told the 45th Session of the Human Rights Council.

Taking part in an interactive dialogue on 'The oral update of the High Commissioner on the human rights impact of the COVID-19 pandemic', the Sri Lankan Mission said the country is currently in the process of expediting the return of nearly 40,000 migrant workers, through a whole-of-Government approach to overcome the challenges and manage the health, quarantine and travel logistics aspects.

"During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, approximately 1.5 million migrant workers from Sri Lanka were overseas. Many of these migrant workers are facing the grim prospect of losing their jobs and means of livelihood, while some are faced with the challenge of enforced return.

The Government of Sri Lanka has given high priority towards addressing their concerns, providing food and medicines where required, and where possible, working with the host countries to obtain legitimization of their status and medical facilities including testing for COVID-19," the statement said.

The statement said the country's success with regard to containing COVID-19 was a result of a series of measures taken by the Government to mitigate the challenges posed by COVID-19, which have been inclusive, non-discriminatory and holistic, providing foremost importance to safeguarding the health and safety of its people.

"Such measures included, financially supporting low income families, pensioners and differently-abled, day-income earners and farmers, managing the repatriation of Sri Lankans in a coordinated manner, exploring avenues of business to cre-

ing existing industries and moving forward to the use of the digital technology including to connect the farmer, consumer and supplier, delivery of essential items and services, and distant educa-

"The WHO has commended Sri Lanka's efforts to control COVID-19 more effectively than more resourced countries even with modest means. Sri Lanka is the first in South Asia to have successfully conducted Parliamentary elections early last month with a 71% voter turnout and was among the first countries in South Asia to open schools and bring back children in a safe way, as commended by UNICEF. Furthermore, the World Travel and Tourism Council (WTTC) has recently stamped Sri Lanka as a safe haven for tourists," it added.

"As this Council is aware, last November, the people of Sri Lanka gave a resounding mandate to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to pursue a policy framework aimed at achieving the fourfold outcome of 'a productive citizenry, a contented family, a disciplined and just society and a prosperous nation'. But some individuals run away from quarantine centres putting the entire country at risk. Some individuals go to the rooms of others in Quarantine Centres without obeying rules and regula-

Dr. Samaraweera pointed out that all should wear masks in public at all times covering both their nose and mouth and

not only mouth. People should keep one metre minimum distance in public and wash hands with soap and water for 30 seconds. A standard hand sanitizer should be used whenever soap and water is not available. This is the

only way of

protecting the victory achieved in Sri Lanka when some countries in the world became full with overflowing ICUs and Corona patients.

"It is the sole responsibility of Institutional Heads to make sure that their respective institutions follow all health guidelines all the time. Some organisations are organising huge public events which are not recommended at all. People, especially elders and those who suffer from chronic diseases should always avoid visiting public places and crowded places. It is not recommended to hold any big events that attract large crowds," he added.

Hector Kobbekaduwa Agrarian Research and Training Institute

ector Kobbekaduwa can be described as one of the most indelible heroes in recent history, who joined the noble Kandyan Jananayaka Veeravaliya like Ven. Wariyapola Sumangala Thera and Weera Keppetipola Disawe. Hector Rajakaruna Senevirath Bandara Kobbekaduwa was born on August 29, 1916 into a great generation of the Kandyan dynasty that took the lead against the imperialists to save the country and Buddhism.

His father was Dr. Tikiri Banda Kobbekaduwa, a descendant of a leader of the Uva Wellassa Rebellion. His father who graduated from the University of London as a medical practitioner was the first Western physician to be born in the upcountry. Dr. Tikiri Banda Kobbekaduwa passed away suddenly while working at the Colombo Hospital. Since then, his estranged wife Sangamitta Dullewa had been responsible for the care of their four children, the eldest child, Ashley Kobbekaduwa, the only daughter of the family, Glarice Mallika

tor Kobbekaduwa and the family's youngest Lionel Kobbekaduwa.

Hector Kobbekaduwa was born at the Deldeniya Walawwa in Yatinuwara and educated at the Trinity College Kandy. He entered the Law Faculty of the Colombo University, which was then known as the University College and began his exemplary career as a lawyer in 1942 in his hometown of Kandy. Due to the untimely

demise of his father, young Kobbekaduwa had to face various economic difficulties.

His contemporaries reveal that he had only 25 cents in his pocket when he walked from Bambalapitiya to Hulftsdorp Court to be sworn in as a lawyer. While working as a lawyer in Kandy, he was very sensitive to the complexities and sensitivities of villagers with regard to their poverty, ignorance, land deprivation as well as the exploitation of the poor by the middle class, land grabbing and the debt of the poor.

At one point, while he was campaigning in the Yatinuwara area, he saw a mother and her three children eating boiled manioc leaves for lunch. He described this incident on several occasions and informed society that he strongly believed such poverty should be eradicated through politics.

When his character is studied, it is clear that it was because of his sensitive thinking and philosophy that he came into public politics after seeing poverty, innocence and freedom of Kandyan villagers in accordance with his own political philosophy. Kobbekaduwa appeared for the court cases of the poor upcountry villagers at no charge, further intensifying his humanitarian character.

He got married to Chandra Kiriella who descents from a respectable Kandyan family through an arranged marriage and they had two daughters. The eldest daughter is Nimali Kobbekaduwa and the youngest is Varini Kobbekaduwa. Kobbekaduwa, who has been a progressive thinker since childhood joined with the Kandy Socialist Front and joined hands with Sri Nissanka, T.B. Illangaratne, T.B. Tennakoon, C.A.S. Marikkar, and Vernon

Gunasekera and it was the opening for him to enter politics. In 1952, he joined active politics as a Kandy Municipal Councilor and in 1954, he joined the

Ceylon Freedom Party and contested for the Yatinuwara electorate in 1960. He won that seat in 1970 and entered Parliament.

Kobbekaduwa who came to power in 1970 under the leadership of Sirimavo Bandarana ike, became the Minister of Lands and Agriculture, and established agricultural settlements for 13,000 unemployed youth in the buntry and led to the tivation of 50,000 acres

Reforms Act of 1972, which he introduced and got passed in Parliament to be enacted, 559,337 acres of estate lands owned by private wealthy persons and certain companies in the country were transferred to the Government. According to this Act, one person could own only 50 acres of land.

He was also able to introduce the following Acts and Bills in Parliament within a period of six years with the approval of the Government and the Cabinet for the betterment of the farming community affected by poverty.

Kobbekaduwa acquired 415,508 acres of estates under the Land Reforms Act on October 17, 1975 under the control of one foreign company. He also established the Land Reforms Commission and the State Plantation Corporation for the management of the acquired estates and lands. Agrarian Service Centers were set up to cover each Grama Niladhari area for the development of agriculture and the rural economy. These centers also settled disputes between farmers regarding distribution, water and land.

His vision provides the foundation for the current agriculture development policy of the President, 'Vision for Prosperity'. His efforts to strengthen agrarian communities through the provision of land and other agricultural inputs in order to curtail agricultural food imports to the country has now been considered to be a high priority in the President's agenda. Accordingly, it is obvious that the present Government is adopting policies related to agriculture, making the late Kobbekauwa's vision and patriotic expectations a reality on the ground.

Kobbekaduwa served as a Member of Parliament and Minister of Lands and Agriculture in the Samagi Peramuna Government until 1977 and rendered a great service to agriculture and the farming community. He ran as the Presidential Candidate of the Ceylon Freedom Party in the first Presidential Election held in 1982 after the deprivation of Sirimavo Bandaranaike's civic rights. But, at that time there were many divisions within the SLFP.

In the midst of these issues and various obstacles from the powerful UNP Government, Kobbekaduwa lost the Presidential Election, raising an indelible question for people about democracy.

However, he received 2,548,438 votes in this Presidential Election. President J.R. Jayewardene won with 3,450,811 votes. However, Kobbekaduwa received the highest number of votes from the Jaffna District.

During the seven years as the Minister of Agriculture and Lands, Kobbekaduwa had the opportunity to earn millions of rupees, but he was dedicated to serving people as an honest, respectable and modest person.

This venerable and immortal humanist

died on September 18, 1983 as an extremely ordinary person. There are many examples that today's politicians can learn from his biography.

Kobbekaduwa established the Agrarian Research and Training Institute in 1972 with the objective of expanding research and training in agriculture. Today, it is renamed as the Hector Kobbekaduwa Agrarian Research and Training Institute in recognition of his silent service. Plans are being developed to expand the scope of the work of the institute towards a National agricultural university. The market intelligence platforms are also modernized to be presented on digital platforms.

The 37th commemoration ceremony of the late Hector Kobbekaduwa, a great personality of the century has been arranged with the participation of Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa, Cabinet and State Ministers and Members of Parliament, Heads of Agriculture related institutions and his family and friends tomorrow, September 18, at the Hector Kobbekaduwa Agrarian Research and Training Centre which is a premier agrarian institute established by the late minister.





Navy seizes explosives in Mullivaikkal

Accordingly, about one million paddy farmers are to get



Sri Lanka ranks 83 on 'Economic Freedom of the World' index

Sri Lanka has ranked 83 out of 162 countries and territories included in the 'Economic Freedom of the World: tile, the average income of the released by Canada's Fraser Institute in association with the Advocata Institute of Sri Lanka.

Hong Kong and Singapore top the index, continuing their streak as 1st and 2nd, respectively. New Zealand, Switzerland, the United States, Australia, Mauritius, Georgia, Canada, and Ireland round out the top 10.

Research shows that people living in countries with high levels of economic freedom enjoy greater prosperity, components of economic freemore political and civil liberties, and longer lives. For example, countries in the top quartile of economic freedom had an average per-capita GDP of \$44,198 in 2018 com-





The death knell to ragging?

he decision taken by the authorities to deploy the State Intelligence Service (SIS) to arrest ragging in State Universities is certainly a move in the right direction that at last could see an end to this scourge plaguing our higher education institutes, thus creating a conducive atmosphere for the genuine students to engage in their academic activities free of fear and tension.

Defence Secretary Major General (Retd.) Kamal Gunaratne has told a weekend English newspaper that he had assured the University Grants Commission (UGC) that the SIS and other 'Intelligence agencies' would be provided to end ragging in the universities. Major General Gunaratne has increasingly being in the media spotlight these days with his efforts to eliminate the drugs menace and his relentless battle against the underworld which has so far yielded unprecedented success, with many a drug lord and masterminds in crime and the narcotics trade thrown in the slammer. Following in the same vein there can be little doubt that the measures he has taken to rid our universities of the nightmare of ragging too will pay rich dividends much to the delight of the parents who aim to provide a sound university education to their offspring. The move also comes in the wake of steps taken by the Government to increase the university intake. In a statement to the same newspaper Chairman of the UGC Sampath Amarartunga said they did not have a network to find those responsible or involved in ragging in universities despite introducing various measures for the victims to inform the authorities about the identity of the culprits. Naturally the victims among the freshers will be the last persons to complain after undergoing such sadistic ordeals. Now with the State Intelligence being entrusted with this task the students will have nothing to fear. In fact such a measure should have been taken at the very inception by the authorities that would have resulted in the rogue elements in the universities responsible for inhuman ragging being smoked out. Had that been the case many lives would have been saved and the flight of students from the universities prevented.

The issue of ragging in State Universities has been the subject of much discussion even in the earlier days and remedies sought to redeem our seats of higher learning from this scourge. It is only all too well known that our universities have right along been hotbeds of violence fanned by radical politics. Ragging is only one dimension of this aspect. Things though appear to be getting out of hand, with sadism being practised in the name of ragging, leaving permanent scars on the victims. Some say that social instability has found expression in inhuman forms of ragging in our universities. Whatever the cause, concrete measures are called for to arrest the decline and preserve the exalted status of the country's seats of higher learning.

The Anti-Ragging Act was passed into law in 1998 under late Education Minister Richard Pathirana but not fully implemented. The law was firm and unambiguous against those who engage in ragging in universities and even the bailing out of a ragging suspect does not come within the jurisdiction of a magistrate. A ragger, if convicted, faced a sentence of 10 years RI.

It is pertinent to ask as to why successive governments, since 1998, failed to implement the Anti-Ragging Act to the letter. Had they done so we could have prevented the flight of many bright students to foreign universities, which, needless to say, is a loss to the country. The late Minister who fathered the anti-ragging law, too made bold statements when the Bill was passed in Parliament. However ragging continued unabated with even deaths being reported

of victims subjected to sadistic ordeals. Researchers on the subject of ragging are of the view that most of those bent on inflicting the most inhuman forms of ragging on their victims are products of unsettled social backgrounds and those with an inferiority complex. These are mostly rural youth who gained entry to the universities thanks to the district cut off marks. It is no accident that the bulk of these types are students in the arts stream who naturally harbour a grudge against city bred students of more affluent backgrounds. Add to this the class-distinction that is most marked in the universities and you have the ideal milieu for the type of ragging that is presently witnessed in our campuses. Hence one's social outlook, accumulated frustrations, and lack of an English knowledge, or the kaduwa, too play a significant role that have their release in the sadism one hears of in the universities.

Ragging is also a by-product of youth unrest. Hence, every effort should be made to prepare the background to mitigate this phenomenon. Today university students are confronted with the bleak prospects for their futures. A good majority of them are not equipped to fit into the prevailing job market and would most likely add up to the ballooning unemployment figures. Hence, the whole aspect of university education should be subjected to a reappraisal by the authorities so that the vast investment made by the government on higher education will not be in vain.

20TH AMENDMENT AND STEAM-ROLLER MAJORITY IN PARLIAMENT

proposed 20th Amendment to the Constitution has attracted much criticism and generated plenty of controversy but the government is keen to go ahead with plans to expedite its passage through Parliament despite some strong reservations emerging from within its own ranks.

The objective of the proposed 20th Amendment which has now been gazetted is to reverse most of the changes brought about by the 19th Amendment which was enacted by the previous government. It was also a key election pledge of the ruling Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP).

The 19th Amendment was aimed at shifting the balance of power from the Executive Presidency to Parliament. It pruned the powers of the President and placed some of those powers in a Constitutional Council headed by the Speaker of Parliament. It also diminished presidential immunity.

In contrast, the 20th Amendment seeks to restore the President's powers. For example, the President will be able to dissolve Parliament after one year instead of four and a half years. The Constitutional Council has been replaced by a Parliamentary Council which does not have overarching pow-

However, the five-year term limits on both the President and the Parliament imposed by the 19th Amendment have been retained in the proposed 20th Amendment. The bar on dual citizens contesting for the Presidency and Parliament imposed by the 19th Amendment has been removed.

19th Amendment

The SLPP government and its leaders including President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa have argued that the 19th Amendment led to two power centres within the government which in turn weakened governance and was therefore detrimental to the country.

They cite the constitutional crisis in late 2018 triggered by then President Maithripala Sirisena's actions to dissolve Parliament and the 2019 Easter bomb attacks as examples of how having two centres of power destabilised the country and resulted in serious and tragic consequences.

Critics of the 20th Amendment argue that it is a regressive step and concentrates too much authority in one individual, the President. They query the need to rush the 20th Amendment through Parliament when the government has already announced plans to enact a totally new Constitu-

They also point out that, in the current climate, there is no need to rush through a 20th Amendment because the government has an overwhelming majority and also because President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa have an excellent working relationship.

Nevertheless, the government is very keen to legislate the 20th Amendment as soon as possible. This is notwithstanding several issues raised by ministers both at the Cabinet and in public comments. Ministers Vasudeva Nanayakkara and Wimal Weerawansa are reported to have made these

Minister Nanayakkara, the veteran leftist who entered Parliament fifty years ago along with Prime Minister Rajapaksa reportedly raised issue about allowing dual citizens to run for high office. He appeared to imply that the change was aimed at enabling the return of Basil Rajapaksa to Parlia-

Election victories

Nanayakkara's argument was that such changes should not be made to accommodate individuals but that discussion only resulted in a wholehearted endorsement of Basil Rajapaksa's achievement in conceptualising the birth of a new political party, the SLPP, and then guiding it to election

ment was more in the line of how the 20th Amendment should not be a priority of the government. A constitutional amendment will not fill people's stomachs, the minister is reported to have said, implying that there are more pressing matters to be dealt with.

In the midst of such criticism, Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa appointed a committee to study the proposed 20th Amendment. The committee consisting of parliamentarians was tasked with reviewing the proposed 20th Amendment and reporting back to the Premier with its own observations.

The committee, headed by Minister Prof. G. L. Peiris included ministers Udaya Gammanpila, Ali Sabry, Nimal Siripala de Silva and Wimal Weerawansa, State ministers Susil Premajayantha and S. Viyalendran and parliamentarians Dilan Perera and Premanath C. Dolawatte.

Following the appointment of the committee, Prof. Peiris said the government was open to entertaining criticism regarding the 20th Amendment and that the committee would 'thoroughly analyse' the proposed legislation before making its recommendations to Cabinet. The committee, formed over the weekend, handed over its report to Prime Minister Rajapaksa on Tuesday. It was reported that committee members have briefed the Premier on what should be added anew to the proposed 20th Amendment and other amendments that have also been recommend-

Explaining the need for the 20th Amendment, Prof. Peiris said that the amendment was brought to find solutions to pressing issues. "A completely new Constitution is the need of the hour but it is a time-consuming process," he said and added that electoral reforms are a priority in the new Constitution.

The country's leading opposition parties, the Samagi Jana Balayegaya (SJB), the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) and the United National Party (UNP) have all vehemently opposed the proposed 20th Amendment, but their ability to stall the amendment in the current political climate is questionable.

That is because the ruling SLPP has a near two-thirds majority in Parliament and will be able to muster the support of smaller parties to secure the required 150 votes to ensure that the 20th Amendment is endorsed by Parliament. This is against a backdrop

of a convincing election victory. The wave of popularity the SLPP government is riding on, the implications of the Covid-19 pandemic, the divisions in the UNP and its tussle with the SJB all mean that the opposition will struggle to unite and launch and sustain a concerted public campaign against the proposed 20th Amendment.

Explaining the need for the 20th Amendment, Prof. Peiris said that the amendment was brought to find solutions to pressing issues. "A completely new Constitution is the need of the hour but it is a time-consuming process," he said and added that electoral reforms are a priority in the new Constitution. The country's leading opposition parties, the Samagi Jana Balavegaya (SJB), the Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna (JVP) and the United National Party (UNP) have all vehemently opposed the proposed 20th Amendment, but their ability to stall the amendment in the current political climate is questionable.

Opposition parties

As such, the opposition is banking on challenging the proposed 20th Amendment in courts. This will be on the basis that it impinges on the sovereignty of the people which is enshrined in the Constitution. These challenges can be launched only after the Amendment is presented to Parliament.

Opposition parties will do their best to convince the courts, arguing that some changes affect the sovereignty of the people, particularly the amendment relating to the President's ability to dissolve Parliament after one year. If the courts uphold this view, such changes will require a referendum.

In this context it is noteworthy that the Attorney General has already submitted his opinion regarding the 20th Amendment, indicating that it can be enacted with a two-thirds majority in Parliament. That, in effect, means the Attorney General is of the view it does not require the approval at a referen-

The government is working on a timetable of having the 20th Amendment presented in Parliament on September 22. Then, the opposition- and other interested parties- will have a period of two weeks to challenge the legislation in courts. The government expects to enact the Amendment in October.

This will not be the first tussle between the new government and the opposition. They have already been at loggerheads over the swearing in of Ratnapura district parliamentarian Premalal Jayasekara last week. Jayasekara prevailed in this dispute and eventually took his oaths in Parliament.

Earlier, in August this year, Jayasekara and two others who were found guilty of shooting to death a person and critically injuring two persons who were putting up a stage at Kahawatte during the 2015 Presidential Election campaign. They were sentenced to death by the Ratnapura High Court.

Now in prison, Jayasekara requested permission from prison authorities to attend the first session of Parliament. He was denied this. Jayasekara's request was denied by prison authorities based on a ruling provided by the Attorney General. Jayasekara challenged the ruling in the Court of Appeal.

The Attorney General had ruled that according to Article 91 (1) (a) of the Constitution, no person is qualified to be elected as a Member of Parliament or to sit and vote in Parliament if he is subject to the disqualifications specified in Article 89. Article 89 also specifies the death sentence.

Jayasekara taking oaths

The Court of Appeal, in granting permission to Jayasekara to attend Parliament noted that, as the election of the petitioner itself was not challenged, as an elected representative he has the privilege of taking oaths in Parliament. Jayasekara was elected in the Ratnapura district with over 100, 000 votes.

An interim order was issued by the Court of Appeal stating the permission which was granted will be in effect until the petition filed by Jayasekara is taken up for examination and a verdict is delivered. The matter will be taken up again by the Court of Appeal on September 29.

Based on this premise, the opposition protested the entry of Jayasekara to Parliament and his taking oaths. SJB parliamentarians sporting black shawls, staged a walk out in protest. However, Speaker Mahinda Yapa Abeywardena administered the oath to Jayasekara, despite the protests.

In this tussle, the government maintained that it was only abiding by the decision of the Court of Appeal. President Rajapaksa was to note that the judges delivering the ruling were appointed during the previous government. However, the incident did attract negative publicity internationally.

More such disputes between the government and the opposition are only to be expected in the weeks to come as the ruling SLPP pushes ahead with the proposed 20th Amendment. However, due to their steam-roller majority in Parliament, the final impact of the opposition's efforts is likely to be minimal.

Humans exploiting and destroying nature on unprecedented scale

populations are in freefall around the world, driven by population tion. growth and intensive agriculture, according to a major new assessment of the abundance of life on Earth.

On average, global populations of mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles plunged by 68% between 1970 and 2016, according to the WWF and Zoological Society of London (ZSL)'s biennial Living Planet Report 2020. Two years ago, the figure stood at 60%.

The research is one of the most comprehensive assessments of global biodiversity available and was complied by 134 experts from around the world. It found that from the rainforests of central America to the Pacific Ocean, nature is being exploited and destroyed by humans on a scale never previously recorded.

The analysis tracked global data on 20,811 populations of 4,392 vertebrate species. Those monitored include highprofile threatened animals such as pandas and polar bears as well as lesser known amphibians and fish. The figures, the latest available, showed that in all regions of the world, vertebrate wildlife populations are collapsing, falling on average by more than two-thirds since 1970.

Robin Freeman, who led the research at ZSL, said: "It seems that we've spent 10 to 20 years talking about these declines and not really managed to do anything about it. It frustrates me and upsets me. We sit at our desks and com-

Wildlife populations

Latin America and the Caribbean recorded the most alarming drop, with an average fall of 94% in vertebrate wildlife populations. Reptiles, fish and amphibians in the region were most negatively affected, driven by the overexploitation of ecosystems, habitat fragmentation and disease.

Africa and the Asia Pacific region have also experienced large falls in the abundance of mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles, dropping 65% and 45% respectively. Europe and cen-

populations dropped 33% on average in North America. To form the Living Planet Index (LPI), akin to a stock market index of wildlife, more biodiverse parts of the world, such as tropical regions, are given more weighting.

Experts said the LPI was further evidence of the sixth mass extinction of life on Earth, with one million species at risk because of human activity, according to the UN's global assessment report in 2019.

Deforestation and the conversion of wild spaces for human food production have largely been blamed for the destruction of Earth's web of life.

The report highlights that 75% of the Earth's ice-free land has been significantly altered by human activity, and

been lost since 1700. Mike Barrett, executive director of conservation and science at WWF, said: "Urgent and immediate action is necessary in the food and agriculture sector. All the indicators of biodiversity loss are heading the wrong way rapidly.

As a start, there has got to be regulation to get deforestation out of our supply chain straight away. That's absolutely vital."

Freshwater areas are among the habitats suffering the greatest damage, according to the report, with one in three species in those areas threatened by extinction and an average population drop of 84%.

The species affected include the critically endangered Chinese sturgeon in

Using satellite analysis, the report also finds that wilderness areas defined as having no human imprint only account for 25% of the Earth's terrestrial area and are largely restricted to Russia, Canada, Brazil and Australia.

Tanya Steele, chief executive at WWF, said: "We are wiping wildlife from the face of the planet, burning our forests, polluting and over-fishing our seas and destroying wild areas. We are wrecking our world - the one place we call home – risking our health, security and survival here on Earth.'

Sir David Attenborough said that


humanity has entered a new geological age – the anthropocene – where humans dominate the Earth, but said it could be the moment we learn to become stewards of our planet. "Doing so will require systemic shifts in how we produce food, create energy, manage our oceans and use materials. But above all it will require a change in perspective," he wrote in a collection of essays accompanying the report. "The time for pure national interests has passed, internationalism has to be our approach and in doing so bring about a greater equality between what nations take from the world and what they give back. The wealthier nations have taken a lot and the time has now come to give." While the data is dominated by the

decline of wildlife populations around the world, the index showed that some species can recover with conservation efforts. The blacktail reef shark in Australia and Nepalese tiger populations have both shown signs of recovery.

ZSL research associate Louise McRae, who has helped compile the LPI for the last 14 years, said: "Whilst we are giving a very depressing statistic, all hope is not lost. We can actually help populations recover."

"I feel frustrated by having to give a stark and desperate message but I think there's a positive side to it as well."

A separate study released today by Newcastle University and BirdLife International says that at least 28 bird and mammal extinctions have been prevented by conservation efforts since the UN Convention on Biological Diversity came into force in 1993.

thugalpura in the North Western Province (NWP) has two administrative districts, namely Kurunegala and Puttalam, in an extent of 7,888.2 square kilometres. This is 12 percent of the total extent of the island.

The NWP has four main waterways - Mee Oya, Deduru Oya, Maha Oya and Kala Oya. The NWP is the third-largest agricultural land in the country. Paddy is cultivated in two seasons - Yala and Maha. Kurunegala is the leading paddy-producing district in Sri Lanka. The chena cultivation is also a prominent moneymaking industry in the NWP.

The economy of the NWP is mainly based on

industries associated with coconut cultivation. Of them, the coir industry takes a prominent place. Coir dust, which is exported mainly to the Middle-East countries, is a major foreign exchange earner in Wayamba. In addition, poultry farming has developed a major industry in the NWP. Poultry feed is also manufactured in special factories. It adds to the country's National economy.

Cut flowers and foliage plants industry, garment industry and artificial flower-making industry are also good businesses in Wayamba. All these industries solve the unemployment issue in the area to a great deal. The capital city of Kurunegala is Ethugalpuraya. The lake around which many hotels and restaurants are located adds beauty to the cityscape. If you watch around from the top of the elephant rock, the whole city can be seen.

The Janakala Kendraya which borders the Kurunegala-Kandy Highway also gives you an amazing experience. It displays ornaments, mementos, handicrafts, and jewelry made of coconut husks and shells. Most of the people in Wayamba depend on Ayurvedic or traditional indigenous medicines, especially in the treatment of rheumatic disorders and snakebites.

According to rural folks, the first king of Kurunegala, King Buwanekabahu II ruled the country for seven years. He built a temple for the tooth relic and a royal audience hall. Recently, this royal audience hall was destroyed by the Kurunegala Municipal Council under the instructions of the Mayor. The case is still pending in the Kurunegala Magistrate's Court.

The Kurunegala Clock Tower which is located in the heart of Kurunegala, was built in 1922 in memory of the soldiers from the North Western Province who participated in the First World War and died. Nearly 212 garment factories are there in Wayamba and more than 6,000 youths are working in these factories. About 850 farmer families are engaged in industries related to dairy, poultry, cattle and sewing in the NWP, according to statistics of the Livestock and Rural Community Department Min-

istry. Kurunegala Government Agent R.M. Rathnayake has given instructions to agricultural authorities in the Kurunegala District with regard to the development of progressive agricultural schemes, preparation of compost manure and the upliftment of agriculture-based youth committees in rural areas in the district.

In addition, 7,000 barren paddy lands in Wayamba have been brought under the plough once again and two fertilizer stores are being constructed in Galgamuwa and Mahananneriya for the convenience of farmers.

By December this year, with the opening of the Central Expressway that runs through Kurunegala city, the transport system in Wayamba would undergo a major transformation. Three tourist information centres are located in Kurunegala, Badaga-



SLAF imports 10 sniffer dogs for drug detection

The Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) had imported 10 sniffer dogs to be used for the detection of drugs and with the assistance of the Police, they are currently being trained in sniffing out drugs and will be ready to be deployed at key locations in the near future, Air Force Commander Air Marshal Sumangala Dias told the Daily News.

"We are training them purely on narcotics and definitely they will be deployed at airports for the purpose of detecting drugs being smuggled into the country. This would be a very productive effort in the drive to prevent drugs being smuggled into the country," he

The Commander said that currently, the Police possess sniffer dogs and trainers knowledgeable on how to train sniffer dogs. He said that these are internationally trained personnel and they would be training the Air Force Trainers on training and handling these sniffer dogs.

During the war the Sri Lanka Air Force had deployed sniffer dogs at airports to detect explosives. Similarly, the Air Force Commander said that these new set of sniffer dogs would be trained exclusively to sniff out narcotics.

"Currently, we have a team, any suspicious activities are

including 8-10 sniffer dogs that are thoroughly trained in this process and they would be deployed for drug detection operations within the next few weeks," the Commander said.

In addition, the Sri Lanka Air Force has also deployed Y-12 aircrafts for surveillance of the waters surrounding the country to detect any drugs or other illegal substances being smuggled into the country via sea route and also illegal migrants entering the country by boat from neighbouring India.

Air Marshal Dias noted that these surveillance operations are conducted on a daily basis and if and when observed, the Navy is alerted and given the coordinates in order to intercept such illegal operations and arrest the suspects.

The Air Force has also been actively engaged during the recent past in destroying illegal Cannabis cultivations being carried out in deep forest areas out of the reach of law enforcement officers. However, as the Air Force has the capabilities to carry out surveillance operations from above giving them a birds-eye view of vast areas, they are better equipped to detect such illegal cultivations and even illicit liquor manufacturing operations deep within

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India's COVID-19 cases top 5 mn

INDIA: India's total COVID-19 coronavirus cases passed five million on Wednesday, health ministry data showed, as the pandemic extends its grip on the vast country at an ever-faster rate.

With its latest one million cases recorded in just 11 days, a world record, India now has 5.02 million infections. Only the United States has more, with 6.59 million.

India has for some time been recording the world's biggest daily jumps in cases, and on Wednesday, the rise was just over 90,000 with a record 1,290 deaths.

Global cases are rapidly approaching 30 million, with more than 930,000 known COVID-19 deaths, the global economy devastated and nations struggling to contain outbreaks.

While India took 167 days to reach one million cases, the next million came in just 21 days, faster than the US and Brazil, according to the Times of India.

Just 29 days later, India became only the third country after the US and Brazil to post four million infections. India passed Brazil earlier this month. Even so, and with India now testing around a million people daily, many experts say that this is not enough and that the true number of infections may be far higher.

This has been borne out in several studies in recent weeks measuring antibodies against the virus among the cramped populations of megacities New Delhi and Mumbai.

The India Council for Medical Research, the country's lead pandemic agency, said last week that its survey had suggested that already in in normal times. The lockdown saw complete urban centres to small towns. - AFP

COVID-19 cost global tourism \$460 bn in six months - UN

crisis cost the global tourism sector \$460 billion in lost revenue during the first six months of 2020 as the number of people travelling plunged, the UN said Tuesday.

Revenue lost between January and June amounted to "around five times the loss in international tourism receipts recorded in 2009 amid the global economic and financial crisis," the Madrid-based World Tourism Organization said in a statement.

International tourist arrivals fell by 440 million during the period, or 65 percent, with Asia, the first region to feel the impact of Covid-19, seeing the steepest decline, it added.

"This represents an unprecedented decrease, as countries around the world closed their borders and introduced travel als to return to 2019 levels. - AFP

SPAIN: The COVID-19 coronavirus restrictions in response to the pandemic," the Tourism Organization said.

While tourism is slowly returning to some destinations, the UN body warned that "reduced travel demand and consumer confidence" would continue to hurt the sector for the rest of the year. It predicted international tourist arrivals will plunge by around 70 percent in 2020 owing to the coronavirus. International tourism arrivals rose by four percent in 2019 to 1.5 billion, with France the world's most visited country, followed by Spain and the United States.

A country strongly focused on agriculture like the Ivory Coast has seen forests reduced to 8.9 percent of the total land area from 10.7 per-

cent in 2015. Kenya, Mali and Rwanda have largely held firm against forest loss. In Latin and Central America, forest covers only 46.7 percent of the total land, compared to 47.4 percent five years ago.

In Brazil, forests declined to 59.4 percent of the country's territory in

2020 from 60.3 percent in 2015. In Haiti, deforestation has continued apace -- falling to 12.6 percent of the total land area from 13.2 percent in 2015. In contrast, in many parts of Asia, Europe and North America forest area has increased or stayed the same in the last five years with policies to restore woodland and allow forests to expand naturally.

In China, forests make up 23.3 percent, up from 22.3 percent in 2015. In Japan, they account for 68.4 percent, the same as it was five years ago. In France, forests cover 31.5 percent of the land in 2020, up from 30.7 percent in 2015. In Italy, they make up 32.5 percent of the national territory, up from 31.6 five years ago. In Britain, they make up 13.2 percent, up from 13 percent five years ago.

In Canada, it is unchanged at 38.2 percent, and in the United States, unchanged at 33.9 percent.

In Australia the figure rose from 17.3 to 17.4 percent and in New Zealand from 37.4 percent to 37.6 percent over the five years. - AFP

Fish exposed to noise pollution likely to die early

UK: Fish stressed by noise are less able to fight off disease and prolonged exposure can lead to an early death, according to research on the consequences of man-made clamour on the natural world.

Human noise pervades the environment, from the roar of engines to the clatter of industry.

Being underwater is no escape, with the whir of ship propellers thought to interfere with whale Researchers at Cardiff University

in Britain said noise pollution has been shown to lead to "stress, hearing loss, behavioural changes and impacted immunity".

But they said the ways in which noise affects resistance to disease had remained "neglected". In their paper, published in the journal Royal Society Open Science on Tuesday, researchers tested the impact of random blasts of white noise played into fish tanks on the susceptibility of guppy fish to parasitic infection. One group of fish was exposed to "acute" noise played

for 24 hours, another group had the noise played for seven days. All fish were anaesthetised and infected with a parasite, either after the noise exposure in the case of the acute group, or during it for the chronic group. A third control group of fish were infected but left in a silent tank

The authors found that while the fish exposed to acute noise had the highest disease burden over a 17-day monitoring period, those in the chronic group were more likely to die earlier -- at day 12, compared with day 14 for both other groups of fish. Co-author Numair Masud said further experiments would be need-



ed to show the exact effect on immune response.

But he said the findings could have implications for conservation efforts as well as for fish farms, where the species being reared are highly susceptible to parasites.

"Freshwater fish in particular are facing unprecedented levels of species loss," he told AFP.

"Ultimately, our study highlights the need to keep sound pollution to a minimum to prevent increased disease susceptibility and mortality levels." There is an increasing understanding of the health burden associated with the cacophony created by human industry and transportation.

In a meta-analysis of individual studies published in November, scientists at Queen's University Belfast found that noise affects amphibians, arthropods, birds, fish, mammals, molluscs and reptilians.

So widespread is the problem, they called for man-made noise to be treated as a "major global pollut-

Mexico holds raffle for Presidential jet

MEXICO: Mexico held a symbolic raffle Tuesday for a luxury presidential jet that President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador calls an "insult" to the people and which has yet to find a buyer.

Instead of taking home the Boeing 787 Dreamliner, holders of the 100 winning tickets were rewarded with a share of prize money totalling two billion pesos (\$95 million).

Lopez Obrador, a leftist austerity crusader, has been vowing to sell the aircraft since his 2018 election campaign, saying "not even Donald Trump has a plane like that."

The jet was purchased for about \$218 million during former President Felipe Calderon's 2006-2012 term in office, and is now worth an estimated \$130 million.

It has proven hard to find a buyer for a massive jet customized with an executive bedroom, private bath and seating for 80 people.

In February Lopez Obrador proposed a raffle and awarding the plane to one lucky winner.

But the plan failed to get off the ground due to a law that prohibits raffling or donating the nation's assets. Instead the plane became an emblem adorning the six million tickets in a lottery aimed at raising funds roughly equivalent to the plane's value.

Under the government's plan, two-thirds of the proceeds will pay for the prizes and the rest will go to public hospitals serving "poor people."- AFP

There have been so many tropical storms in the Atlantic this year that the UN's World Meteorological Organization, which names them, is about to run out of names for only the second time in history. The last time was in 2005, the year Hurricane Katrina dev-

astated New Orleans. The latest Atlantic storm, Hurricane Paulette, pounded the island of Bermuda on Monday with Category 2 winds and heavy rains, according to the NHC. - AFP

Rain, 'only hope' for Brazil's wetlands

BRAZIL: Lieutenant Sil- the ground around the truck va's face is grim as he watches his firefighters try - and fail -- to control one of the thousands of wildfires ravaging reaching the other side, where Brazil's Pantanal, the world's biggest tropical wetlands.

"It needs to rain. We've got low moisture, intense heat. With that combination, rain is our only hope," says Silva, even as new flames break out at the spot his team of six firefighters is trying to douse on the grounds of an ecotourism hotel in the northern Pan-

Even when the fire looks to be out, embers continue burning underground, feeding on layers of dry leaves that have accumulated amid the region's worst drought in nearly five decades.

The firefighters advance about 60 meters (yards) into a dense patch of charred scrubland, but the hoses connected to their truck can reach no farther.

One starts using a leaf blower to clear away the dead vegetation, which momentarily extinguishes the flames on the surface.

But the slightest gust of wind is enough to reignite them. Silva decides to retreat and change tactics: better to thing like this," he says. create a fire break by soaking

The Pantanal sits at the southern edge of the Amazon rainforest, stretching from Brazil into Bolivia and Para-

The region is known for its lush landscapes and biodiversity. But this year, some 23,500 square kilometers (9,000 square miles) of the wetlands have gone up in smoke -- nearly 12 percent of the Pantanal.

Helped by local volunteers, firefighters are racing to control the flames before they destroy the area's hotels and numerous wooden bridges, essential infrastructure for getting in and out of a region normally covered in water this time of year.

Hotel worker Antonio da Silva is one of the volunteers helping safeguard the bridges, wearing a cowboy hat and face mask.

"I'm from this region, I've lived in the Pantanal for 60 years, and I've never seen any-



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

sportsmen and promoters it is a Royalist and a Sylvestrian who are still fresh in the minds of the local community in Kandy three and two decades after their passing away. Dr. C.D.L. Fernando was who was also a fine cricketer, footballer, athlete, boxer, cadet and later was a sports promoter passed away on 22nd September 1987 which marks his 33rd death anniversary and the other is the fist sylvestrian to play club cricket, was also a top footballer, hockey player, athlete, boxer and cadet M.E. Marikar a well known sportsmen, promoter and sportswriter died on 19th September 1996, 24 years ago.

Dr. C.D.L. Fernando was a versatile sportsman. sports benefactor, philanthropist and above all a gentleman par excellence who left this world in 1987. CDL, as he was known by everyone, started his schooling at S. Thomas' College, Mt. Lavinia and later crossed over to Royal College where he excelled in cricket, rugger, and athletics and also was in the ring as a fine boxer.

This sportsman from S. Thomas' College and Royal College was an allround sportsman, his help for sports in Kandy can be valued in gold. Today people of his calibre are no more and people have forgotten the good work done by them. But there are few genuine sports lovers who remember the part played by these promoters.

It is 33 years since his death and during his time he was a versatile sportsman, sports benefactor, philanthropist and above all a gentleman. To think or write of CDL is difficult as one does not know where to start and where to end for he had such a doing

a sportsman.

CDL, as he was known, was one of the finest Bradby's era. At Royal he excelled as a top class allround sportsman. He played rugby from 1943 to 1945 and had the privilege of leading the first Bradby team. Though he schooled in Colombo, he made a name in Kandy in the the first Bradby captain, medical and sporting field. As a sports administrator his fairness and integrity was never in question.

In the 'first leg' of the Bradby played in Colombo, he led the side to win by 3 points to nil and in the 'second leg' in Kandy, Royal ended on the losing side, where Trinity won 6-0. At the first school assembly after the match, the principal of Royal College EL Bradby had asked him what happened to the Kandy game after winning the Colombo game and CDL's reply was "Trinity played better than us".

At cricket, he was a fine all-rounder, an aggressive batsman, a medium pace bowler and a fine close-in fielder. He played for Royal in 1944 and ended in 1946. In his last game in 1946, against his former school S. Thomas' College, CDL had a match bag of 9 wickets for 54 runs in 23.2 overs, out of which seven were maid-

He pocketed five wickets in the first innings and four in the second innings which helped the Royalists to gain an 83-run win. In 1944, he played under George Rajapakse, in the following year under Vivan de Krester and in the last year under Mahesh Rodrigo. Some of his team mates at cricket were Chris de Saram, Nihal Wickremasuriya, M. Kasipillai, Hugh Aldons, Tissa Kapukotuwa, Willie de Saram, KC de Fonseka, Raja Cooke, RMS de Silva, T. Pararathalingam, PKD Gunawardena and Jommy Rajaratnam.



oneworld member airlines committed to net zero carbon emissions by 2050

oneworld member airlines have committed to net zero carbon emissions by 2050, becoming the first global airline alliance to unite behind a common target to achieve carbon neutrality.

The alliance's 13 member airlines plan to achieve this target within the existing environmental framework previously agreed to by governments, including through the International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO).

The airlines will develop their individual approaches to reach the target of net zero carbon emissions by 2050, through various initiatives such as efficiency measures, investments in sustainable aviation fuels and more fuel-efficient aircraft, reduction of waste and single-use plastics and carbon offsets among other measures.

MAS Pilots Innovative Trash Trap Project

Addressing marine plastic issue at source

n a country that is rich in biodiversity and marine ecosystems, today the stunning natural reserves of Sri Lanka face considerable threat due to the issue of plastic pollution. While beautiful stretches of golden sand fringe the nation, many of them are covered in the remnants of our own consumerism, with plastic waste lining the beaches. Data from Environment Ministry suggests approximately 400 MT of plastic waste is generated daily within Sri Lanka. MAS Holdings is

piloting an innovative solution to Perera, MAS Holdings Environcap the problem at the source itself, by capturing plastic waste in the rivers and canals which play a critical role in transporting mismanaged plastic waste from land to ocean. By installing trash traps in the canals that push plastic waste into our oceans, MAS plans to address the issue head on by trapping, collecting and removing plastic waste before reaching the ocean. The pilot of the proposed solution, a prototype 'ocean strainer' trash trap, was placed in the Dehiwala canal recently, to prevent plastic waste from reaching the ocean through the canal mouth. The pilot, which is an expansion of MAS's ocean plastics initiative, was launched on recently with the participation of Local Government and Environmental Affairs Ministry (Western Province) Secretary Chandrani Samarakoon, Ministry of Local Government of the Western Provincial Council, Director Planning Sumith Nishantha



mental Sustainability Director Sharika Senanayake and other members of the respective teams.

"The issue of marine plastics is a complex one. Not only must the oceans be cleaned of existing plastics that pollute the waters and beaches, but new plastic waste must be stopped from entering the oceans. Different forms of trash traps are used around the world to collect floating waste from rivers, preventing mismanaged trash from inland waterways from reaching the oceans. At MAS, we started working on the ocean plastic issue in 2015, not only to help clear up our beaches of plastic waste, but also to upcycle that waste by recycling the plastic to create yarn that can be used in our products. Developing the 'ocean strainer' is the next step in this effort, to create a more sustainable approach to addressing the marine plastic issue by capturing it at the source", said

MAS Holdings Sustainable Business Head Sid Amalean.

This initiative is the result of successful private-public collaboration between MAS, the West-ern Provincial Council, the Marine Environment Protection Authority, the Sri Lanka Land Reclamation and Development Corporation (SLLRDC), with the support of the Western Province Tourism Development Authority, the Environmental Police and the people of the Dehiwala area.

Commenting on the collaboration, Chandrani Samarakoon stated. "Under the guidance of the Hon. Governor of the

Western Province, the Ministry of Local Government, Environmental Affairs and Tourism has been actively engaged in implementing several initiatives to conserve the overall natural environment of the Western Province. In order to protect the coastal environment of the area, the Ministry in partnership with our private sector partner for this project, MAS Holdings, planned the installation of a floating controlled trash trap at the Dehiwala canal with the aim of preventing plastic and polythene waste floating to the ocean via the canal mouth. This will be implemented and monitored as a pilot project, and depending on its success, the Ministry plans to expand this model in other canals that are situated in the Western Province that directly connect to the ocean. We sincerely appreciate the contribution of all stakeholders and partners in carrying out this pilot project."








"Hello, this is Navalny," he wrote in a post on Instagram that has racked up more than 1 million "likes" in a few hours. Supporters saluted what they said was the 44-year-old's return from

Taking to social media for the first time after he fell seriously ill in Siberia on August 20, Navalny posted a picture, appearing with his wife and two children in the Berlin hospital where he was flown for treatment.

Wearing a hospital gown and sitting up in bed, he looked gaunt and barely smiled, while his wife Yulia beamed next to him.

The outspoken critic of President Vladimir Putin collapsed on a flight from the Siberian city of Tomsk to Moscow after a trip to support opposition

Only about 50 skeletons of one of the largest carnivores to roam Earth have been discovered since the first in



Scorsese tells Toronto film festival: Cinema is not 'comfort food'

US: Martin Scorsese warned that cinema is becoming "marginalized and devalued" as a "form of comfort food" during the coronavirus pandemic, as he addressed the Toronto film festival Tuesday.

Scorsese, no stranger to controversy after last year slamming popular superhero blockbusters as "not cinema", spoke as movie theaters remain closed in major US cities including Los Angeles and New

Toronto, North America's largest film festival, is taking place mainly online this year, along with a handful of drive-in and limited capacity indoor screenings.

In a short video introducing the event's annual career achievement gala, Scorsese praised the festival for going ahead at all.

"The fact that film festivals are

continuing to happen -- improvising, adapting, making it all work somehow - is very moving to me," said the Oscar-winning "Goodfellas" director.

"Because in the press and the popular culture, what's happening... it's becoming sadly common to see cinema marginalized and devalued, and in this situation categorized sort of as a form of comfort food."

Millions around the world have spent the past few months locked at home due to the pandemic, with many binge-watching television and films from their living rooms.

In a blistering New York Times op-ed last November, Scorsese said movie theaters are the place "where the filmmaker intended her or his picture to be seen," and warned superhero movies were crowding auteurs off the big screen.


