The first locally made drug under the programme to locally produce 50 percent of Sri Lanka's total drugs requirement was launched recently at the State Pharmaceuticals manufacturing Corporation (SPMC).

The Pharmaceutical Production, Supply and Regulation State Ministry said it had produced the Gabapentin 300 mg drug as a first in the programme.

The state health sector spends Rs. 14.17 Billion according to the ministry spokesman, while the private health sector spends Rs. 1.6 Billion to import this drug. This money can be saved through this. TO PAGE **02**

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Three needy students in Ginigathhena given assistance

There is no need for anyone to teach us Sri Lankans about protecting human rights since we are inherited with protecting human rights for centuries, Education Minister Prof.G.L.Peiris said.

He made these remarks at a ceremony organised to help three students of a visually impaired mother in Ginigathhena at the Education Ministry Auditorium yesterday. The mother had informed the principal of the Ginigathhena Central College, at where one of her three children is studying, that she cannot send the children to school as she cannot feed them due to poverty. Having heard this incident several sectors including the Education Ministry took immediate measures to facilitate the family. Accordingly, with the assistance of both local and foreign well-wishers, the Education Ministry has created a mechanism to assist the education of the

three students. Besides several other facilities including hygienic facilities will be provided. Of the three children, the elder girl is studying in Grade Six of the Ginigathhena Central College while the other two are studying in Grade three and two at the Ginigathhena Primary School.

Minister Peiris addressing the gathering said that foreign countries need not to teach Sri Lanka about protecting human rights and having sympathy since we are inherited those qualities by birth.

"No foreigners should teach us about protecting human rights as we have those qualities for centuries with the introduction of Buddhism to the country. Not only protecting others' human rights we assist and help each other as a duty and responsibility," the Minister stressed.

Speaking on the education sector, the Minister

said that the prime responsibility of the government is to provide every child with equal opportunities of education. Then the Ministry opens new doors for children to gain quality education and knowledge. "The Right to education and the right to work are protected. The Ministry is duty bound to bring those responsibilities to a practical aspect" he added.

Minister C.B. Ratnayake said moves are under way to facilitate such students affected by financial constraints. Speaking on the environment sector he said that certain persons are trying to exaggerate and highlight minor incidents relating to environment including deforestation.

The Principal of Ginigathena Central College Upul Indrajith said that a mechanism has already been formed to facilitate the three students for their studies and other requirements.

Many countries are testing only symptomatic or the most serious

On Wednesday, 5,954 new deaths and 282,592 new cases were recorded worldwide. Based on latest reports, the countries with the most new deaths were India with 1,132 new deaths, followed by Brazil with 987 and United States with 968. The United States is the worst-hit country with 196,831 deaths from 6,631,561 cases. At least 2,525,573 people have been declared recovered.

After the US, the hardest-hit countries are Brazil with 134,106 deaths from 4,419,083 cases, India with 83,198 deaths from 5,118,253 cases, Mexico with 71,978 deaths from 680,931 cases, and United Kingdom with 41,684 deaths from 378,219

The country with the highest number of deaths compared to its population is Peru with 94 fatalities per 100,000 inhabitants, followed by Belgium with 86, Spain 65, Bolivia 64, and Brazil at 63. China - excluding Hong Kong and Macau - has to date declared 85,223 cases (9 new since Wednesday), including 4,634 deaths (0 new) and 80,448 recoveries. Latin America and the Caribbean overall has 316,572 deaths from 8,480,585 cases, Europe 223,326 deaths from 4,660,226 infections, the United States and Canada 206,064 deaths from 6,770,982 cases, Asia 120,247 deaths from 6,857,575 cases, Middle East 41,115 deaths from 1,738,023 cases, Africa 33,253 deaths from 1,376,017 cases, and Oceania 896 deaths from 30,889

'SriLankan employees in frauds suspended'

Discounts for Sri Lankans migrating from Mattala

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga yesterday said that Sri Lankan migrant workers will be offered discount rates, when they leave the Mattala Rajapaksa International Airport (MRIA) for overseas employments.

He said that necessary discussion in this regard is held with the Sri Lanka Foreign Employment Bureau (SLBFE).

According to the statistics of

SLBFE, over 200,000 migrant workers leave Sri Lanka for employments every year. Many leaving for jobs are residents of surrounding areas of the MRIA such as Galle, Matara, Hambantota, Moneragala, Ampara, Badula, Kalmune and Batticaloa. Therefore, this will be a great opportunity for them," he added.

The proposal has already been approved by the Cabinet, and It will be implemented when the operations

of the airport resumes in the near future.

The Minster further said that the Tourism Ministry has formulated separate plan to convert the MattalaAirport as a most active airport in the South Asian region after it reopened.

So far, 8,200 passengers arrived at the Mattala Airport on 198 flights under the state repatriation," the Minister added.

Four extraordinary gazettes to Parliament

The proposal submitted by Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa in his capacity as the Finance minister to present Parliament the four extra ordinary gazette notifications issued, subject to the Import and Export Control Act No 1 of 1969 Sri Lanka, Cabinet Spokesman Mass Media Minister Keheliya Rambukwella said.

He was speaking at the weekly Cabinet media briefing yesterday at the Government Information Department.

Minister Rambukwella said that a proposal on the regulation of imports and restoration of economic activities presented by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa was approved by the Cabinet in April.

"The aim of the proposal was to reduce the pressure on the foreign exchange rate caused by the Covid-I9 epidemic. The President appointed the Customs Tariff Determination Committee to propose the measures to strengthen and revitalise the national economy in line with the policy statement," the Minister said.

In accordance with the recommendations of the committee, imported goods were classified into three categories and the following three steps were taken as an interim measure to regulate imports.

1.Temporary suspension of imports of non-essential items that can be grown or produced locally, commercial goods and motor vehicles.

2.Granting permission to import selected goods on loan facility provided by suppliers or on foreign exchange free basis.

 Granting permission to import selected goods required for local industries, agriculture, export processing and local consumption.

"We will organise a series of seminars island-wide to make the public aware of the draft Constitutional Amendment . First seminar will be held at Colombo Public Library on September 24," he said

He was speaking at a press conference in Colombo yesterday.

Herath added that Constitutional Amedments will not help solve burning issues of the people.

The Commissions to be established under the draft 20th Amendment to the Constitution will no longer be independent, he said.

He said that election related violence, misappropriation of public funds and misuse of public assets including government vehicles minimised after the Election Commission was set up under the 19th Amendment to the Constitution.

Herath added that the Parliamentary Council proposed under the draft Amendment can forward their

observations with regard to the nominees sent by the President for the appointment of persons to High Posts in the Government .

"The Executive President can ignore their observations too," he

He added that the Government should divulge its position over the Provincial Council system which was established under the 13th amendment to the Constitution.

"The Provincial Council System is not a solution to the national issue. Our position is very clear. We opposed this system at the very beginning," he said.

Bio-fences to end human-elephant conflict

Highways Minister Johnston Fernando yesterday directed the officials of the Kurunegala District Development Committee to install bio-fences and extend the present electric fence to prevent wild elephants from entering villages and crop fields.

Three persons died and many others were injured in the last two months after they were attacked by

elephants in Nikaweratiya and Polipithigama. The people of the area said that a herd of elephants enter the village and destroy houses and crops regularly. Therefore, the people have urged the government to provide them with a speedy solution for the problem," the Minister said.

Lime bio fencing will be installed as an indigenous technology to minimise the wild elephant attacks in rural areas in addition to extending electric fences. The officials informed the Minister that the illegal cultivation surrounding the Inginimitiya and Siyabalangamuwa Reservoirs has resulted in wild elephants being deprived of water and food. These illegal occupants harass and shoot the wild elephants. The Minister advised the officials to look into this matter and take steps to evacuate them.

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WORLD SEPSIS DAY

e as human beings frequently fall ill due to varigerms. However, thanks to our immune system and modern medicine, we can clear off many of those tiny organisms from our bodies.

The medical field has also advanced in a way to deal with the rising trend of infections caused by microbes. Therefore, mankind can live a better life now more than ever. But this may not be the case all the time.

What if we are immune suppressed? What if we have a chronic illness? What about those who are very young or old? Will we then be able to tackle an infection in the same way? The answer is "No" as there is a risk of developing a life-threatening condition called sepsis, when infections are encountered.

Sepsis may not be a familiar term to most of us, but we need to know what it is as it is very common and takes a lot of victims. It could be your loved ones or yourself who is having sepsis. So, what is sepsis and why is it important to know about it?

What is sepsis?

Sepsis is a life-threatening condition caused by the body's response to an infection that is unusually severe. During sepsis, your body releases various chemicals into your blood and the response is out of balance and triggers changes that would result in massive damage to many of your organs.

If treatment is not given on time this can progress to a condition called septic shock, where blood pressure drops drastically, and together with multiple organ failure, can lead to death. This can happen to anyone, but some are more prone to this condition than others. This can be difficult to identify at times and hence sepsis is referred to as the hidden or silent killer.

How common is sepsis? It is difficult to measure the global burden of sepsis, but according to WHO statistics, sepsis affects more than 30 million people in a year with around six million deaths. In 2017, there were 48.9 million cases and 11 million sepsis-related deaths worldwide which accounts for almost 20 percent of all global deaths. One in 10 maternal deaths are due to sepsis.

Furthermore, approximately 85 percent of sepsis cases and sepsis-related deaths worldwide occurred in low- and middle-income countries. This gives us a glimpse of the magnitude of the problem and we can expect the actual counts to rise during the coming years if we do not take necessary actions against it. To make people aware about this and fight against this preventable condition, The Global Sepsis Alliance has taken the initiative of marking September 13 as World Sepsis Day. With that in mind let us now look at some important aspects of sepsis.

What causes sepsis?

Sepsis is caused by any infection including bacteria, virus, fungi or parasites. But bacterial infections are the most common cause of sepsis. These organisms can enter the body through ingestion, inhalation or even through a minor abrasion. Although anyone can develop sepsis, some are more prone to it than others.

Do you have any of the following condi-

tions? If the answer is yes, then you are at an increased risk of developing sepsis.

- Do you have low immunity?
- Do you have any chronic conditions like diabetes, liver cirrhosis, kidney or lung dis-
- Are you already receiving treatment at a hospital or intensive care unit?
- Do you have any wounds or burns?
- Do you have any external devices such as
- urinary catheters or breathing tubes? • Are you on steroid treatments? Have you received frequent long-term
- antibiotics?
- How old are you? (< 1 year or > 65 years are at increased risk)

The number of cases of sepsis is rising worldwide every year. This may be attributed to an aging population, an increase in the number of people with illnesses that weaken their immune system, greater prevalence of antibiotic resistance making them ineffective at killing bacteria and increase in invasive procedures providing an easy access to microbes.

Why are newborns at greater risk?

Newborns are one of the most affected. Neonatal sepsis is defined as a baby getting a blood-borne infection within the first month. It can be classified according to the timing of the onset of symptoms.

* Early onset: contracted before or during the period of delivery usually within 72 hours from birth.

* Late onset: contracted after 72 hours of birth.

A baby may become infected before birth if the mother's amniotic fluid is infected. During delivery, the newborn may be exposed to an infection in the birth canal. Once born, a baby may be exposed to infections in the hospital or

The following will increase the risk of your baby developing sepsis

- Was your baby born too early, before 37

- Did your amniotic sac break more than 18 hours before birth?

- Did you have a prolonged or difficult labour?

- Did you have an infection during the time of birth?

- Did your baby need any medical interventions soon after birth?

Why are mothers at more risk?

Sepsis can develop during pregnancy or after delivery and it is a leading cause of maternal death in the world. Sepsis during pregnancy is called maternal sepsis whereas sepsis within six weeks of delivery is called postpartum or puerperal sepsis. Sepsis can occur because of an infection related to the pregnancy following unsafe terminations or unrelated to pregnancy such as pneumonia or urinary tract infections. Puerperal sepsis may arise due to poor hand hygiene and other unhygienic practices during delivery.

Why are the elderly more at risk?

The elderly population is at a higher risk of developing sepsis. As we go through the aging process, our immune system becomes less effective at fighting infections. This results in contracting more infections and greater risk of developing sepsis. There is higher prevalence of chronic illnesses such as diabetes, liver cirrhosis and kidney disease in the elderly which are independent factors increasing the risk of sepsis. Having multiple comorbidities, which is common in the elderly population, compounds this risk further. Other factors contributing to greater sepsis risk among the elderly are repeated and prolonged hospital stays, functional limitations, malnutrition and endocrine deficiencies. Most common infections that progress to sepsis among the elderly are lower respiratory tract infections and urinary tract infections.

How does sepsis present?

Sepsis can develop after any simple infection. There are many signs that are indicative and used to diagnose sepsis which are listed

- Fever with chills and/or shivers (>38.30C /

- Hypothermia (<360C / 96.8F)
- Difficulty in breathing or rapid breathing (> 20 breaths/minute)
- Increased heart rate (>90 beats per minute)

- Weak pulse
- Low blood pressure - Cold extremities
- Altered mental state - Fatigue or weakness
- Cyanotic or mottled skin

- Reduced urine output

All the above may not be present in everyone with sepsis and some symptoms may be more severe. Without timely intervention, it can progress into septic shock rapidly where blood pressure drops dramatically. As sepsis worsens, the blood flow to our vital organs such as the brain, heart and kidney diminishes leading to their irreversible damage. Blood clots may form inside the vessels of organs and limbs causing organ failure and tissue death that may appear as gangrene. All these together can ultimately lead to death if not treated promptly. Most people may recover from sepsis with timely management; however, the average mortality rate due to septic shock is nearly 40 percent.

There are some differences in the presentation of sepsis in neonates and pregnant mothers which is described below.

How does sepsis present in newborns?

In neonates the presenting symptoms can be subtle and nonspecific. It may also include pale colour skin, poor feeding, lethargy, temporary stopping of breathing, seizures, diarrhea and vomiting. Late signs may include jaundice (yellow discolouration), enlarged liver and spleen, and petechiae (bleeding under the skin).

Neonatal sepsis is a leading cause of infant deaths, but with early diagnosis and treatment a complete recovery can be expected. Unfortunately, in some lifelong disability such as deafness, hydrocephalus is possible despite treatment.

How does sepsis present in pregnant

They commonly present with fever and chills, lower abdominal pain, foul smelling vaginal discharge and increase in heart rate. It may take several days for these symptoms to become apparent thus leading to a delay in seeking medical help. The risk of developing an infection after delivery depends on the method of delivering the baby. Emergency cesarean section having the highest risk of infection with normal vaginal delivery having the lowest.

How is sepsis treated?

Sepsis is a medical emergency and should be managed accordingly for treatments to be effective. The treatment interventions include intravenous fluids, prompt administration of empirical antibiotics, diagnostic tests to identify the source of infection and the offending organism, inotrope support (drugs to support blood pressure) with regular monitoring in a high dependency or intensive care unit. Those with diabetes need special mention as their blood sugar and other organ functions need to be carefully monitored and supported to increase treatment effectiveness. Reasons for ineffective treatment are delay in presentation to hospital and delay in diagnosis and initiating treatment.

What are the challenges in managing

Mainstay of treatment for sepsis is antimi-

crobial drugs. However, with rapid emergence of antimicrobial resistance this can be a problem. Antibiotic resistance is when an antibiotic that had been effective against bacteria suddenly stops working against them due to various reasons including genetic changes in bacteria. This is a significant challenge in the treatment of sepsis where existing drugs become ineffective. The delay in presentation of patients with sepsis to health care facilities is another key challenge in management. One of the reasons for such delay is the non-specific nature of symptoms of sepsis. With late presentations, the interventions carried out by health professionals are less likely to be effective as the disease is in a critical stage.

A significant challenge faced by low middle-income countries is limited resources such as intensive care unit beds and access to high quality antibiotics. This is another problem faced during management of sepsis that may result in a poor outcome for patients.

How can sepsis be prevented? To prevent sepsis, it is important to prevent contracting an infection in the first place. There are many actions you can take as an individual to stop an infection which

- If you develop any cuts or small wounds, keep them clean and covered as necessary to avoid any infection from taking root.

- If you are suffering from a chronic illness such as kidney disease or diabetes, then visit your health care provider regularly to keep your illness under control. Those with diabetes with poor glycaemic control have high risk of a simple infection progressing to sepsis. For this reason, it is vital to maintain good blood sugar control to prevent sepsis.

- Ensure you get available vaccines for preventable illnesses. These include annual flu shots and vaccines of the national immunisation programme. This is critical for those with underlying chronic diseases.

- Lifestyle changes to avoid alcohol conmption and smoking to maintain good health and prevent development of an infec-

- Hand hygiene is one of the most effective methods to prevent spread of infection.

 Maintain good health with a balanced nutritious diet and safe drinking water giving your immune system the best chance to evade an infection.

- If you recognise symptoms of sepsis as described above, then seek medical attention immediately.

- To prevent the progression of an infection to sepsis it is important so take prescribed antibiotics as directed.

Sepsis claims many lives and targets the most vulnerable among us, but the united effort of the public and health care professionals can go a long way to combat its harm as we discovered in the recent fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

Eppawala phosphate

'Gold' still to be mined

Farmer organizations in the Anuradhapura district are perturbed over the fact that no government has taken fruitful action to exploit the potential of the natural phosphate deposit in Eppawala which is of international standard.

The federation of farmer organizations has taken up the matter with Anuradhapura district politicians including Minister S.M. Chandrasena and State Ministers Shehan Semasinghe, Duminda Dissanayake and Channa Jayasumana, as well as Chairman of the District Development Council Parliamentarian K.H. Nandasena.

The farmer organizations have also appealed to Anuradhapura Government Agent R.M. Wanninayake and the District Agriculture Committee to take immediate attention to intervene in the issue.

The Eppawala phosphate deposit is an indigenous type of phosphate found in the

Anuradhapura district in the North Central Province, about 240 km from Colombo and just 140 km from Trincomalee harbour. The particular deposit was discovered on April 4, 1971, by the then geological survey department. The deposit consists of 60 million metric tons of phosphate (nothern area - 40 million metric tons and southern area – 20 million metric tons).

The Eppawala phosphate deposit is classified as a high-grade deposit because

it contains about 30 to 40 percent of phosphate and is also one of the richest apatite deposits in the world.

The deposit is found in the form of six hills rising from maximum elevation of about 200 metres from the mean sea level and covering a huge surface area. It is learnt that at present Lanka Phosphate, a government-owned company, has mining rights for 19 hectares taking the present demand into consideration. Before the discovery of the deposit, a large amount of rock phosphate fertilizer was being imported for which precious foreign exchange was wasted.

According to Lanka Phosphate's sources, the production of rock phosphate fertilizer had begun in 1974 and since then, for nearly the last 50 years, only about three percent of the total reserve has been consumed. It is still continuing to provide rock phosphate fertilizer used for plantation crops like tea, rubber and coconut.

metric tons.

The sources reveal that in 2007, plans were approved to produce single super phosphate which is suitable for all crops including paddy and the environment licence too was granted. The experts point out if this project was realized as planned, nearly Rs. 32 billion being spent for importing chemical fertilizer, mainly triple super phosphate, would have been saved.

This matter has been already brought to the notice of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa by a team of experts including university academics. It is learnt that the experts have said that the country's full requirement of triple super phosphate and single super phosphate could be fulfilled from the Eppawala phosphate deposit and surplus production could be exported.

Action Plan for Health Security 2019, National Influenza Pandemic Preparedness Plan, National Immunisation Policy, and National Vaccine Deployment Plan were cited by the Minister as part of the national health policy.

The Minister said that a culture has been created to manage the health crisis under the National Disaster Response World Health Organization Centre.Regional Director Poonam Khetrapal Singh said that the countries that have made progress to universal healthcare have supply chains that are more secure, efficient, and

Sri Lanka has the highest density of health workers in South Asia. Singh commended Sri Lanka and called on other countries to prioritise health in state budgets, improve value for money in health, and mobilise domestic revenues through pro-health taxes like levies on sugar, tobacco, and alcohol. Former CID director Shani Abeysekara further remanded

The Gampaha Magistrate's Court yesterday further remanded former Director of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) SSP Shani Abeysekara and two others who were arrested for allegedly fabricating evidence in a case, until October 2.

However, two police officers, the house owner and his wife, who gave evidence on the recovered weapons recently, said the weapons were hidden at the location by the former CID director himself. On these new statements,

the CCD launched an investigation into the incident under the directives of the IGP and arrested Abeysekara on July 31.

Vande Bharat re-commences, 154 Indians stranded in Sri Lanka repatriated

One hundred fifty four Indian nationals including an infant were repatriated from Sri Lanka on the special Air India flight AI 1284 from Colombo to Bangalore and

Delhi on September 17. The flight was a part of Vande Bharat Mission, a Government of India initiative, to undertake the largest ever repatriation from all over the world for return of Indian nationals stranded abroad in the COVID19 pandemic.

Over 1.3 million Indians have been repatriated so far through different modes of the Vande Bharat Mission including Air India, private and foreign carriers, chartered flights, naval ships and land border crossings. The Phase 6 of Vande Bharat Mission became operational on September 1.

The Indian nationals who were stranded in Sri Lanka due to restrictions on international travel because of the COVID19 pandemic have

expressed their happiness at the opportunity to return home. Nearly 2,000 Indian nationals have been repatriated from Sri Lanka so far including this flight through eight special Air India Flights, an Indian Naval ship Jalashwa, which made a voyage from Colombo to Tuticorin on June 1 and through various charter flights.

the High Commission of India received, a passenger manifest is prepared for the special repatriation flights. Priority is given to compelling cases in distress, including migrant workers/labourers who have been laid off, short term visa holders faced with expiry of visa, people with medical emergency/pregnant women/ elderly, those required to return to India due to death of family member, and students as stated in the Standard Operating Procedure issued by Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India.

Denzil Kobbekaduwa Ranaviru Village in ruin

Most parts of the Denzil Kobbekaduwa Ranaviru Village in Ambanpola in the Kurunegala District are covered with jungle and have become a haven for wild elephants.

This Ranaviru village was inaugurated by the former President Chandrika Kumaratunge in 2002. Under this project, 190 plots of lands were granted to war heroes for them to construct houses. But houses had been constructed only in 10 lands, while the other 180 plots are neglected and covered with jungle.

Secretary of the Ranaviru Village Welfare Society, disabled war hero W.H. Sisira Kumara said that this situation has arisen as these plots of lands had been granted to war heroes who live in various parts of the island .They do not come to settle here. If

A.D. Karunarathne, father of a dead war hero, said that the authorities have failed to provide the residents with the basic infrastructure facilities such as water and roads. The residents have to trek two or three miles in search of drink-

ing water. "Why didn't the authorities construct two or three public wells for us? We never were granted any financial assis-

tance to construct the houses. The authorities have named this village as 'Denzil Kobbekaduwa Ranaviru Village'. This is an insult made to that great War Hero," Karunarathne said.

The narrow roads in this village are in a dilapidated condition. The people here do not look for a vehicle to go on their errands unless it is something urgent like taking a sick person to ahospital,' he

The villagers are hopeful about President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa that they will develop this village and provide more facilities to them. They said that the politicians from the previous government only visited them when there is an election, but no action was taken even to provide them with basic facili-

He said that he cannot remember whether anybody has apprised this to the Security Council

The Former Defence Secretary was giving evidence before the Presidential Commission investigating into the Easter Sunday yesterday.

Hettiarachchi added that he was not aware that ISIS is a banned organisation in Sri Lanka

He added that legal experts outlined that country did not have provisions to deal with these terrorists leaving country for training.

The Former Defence Secretary said that he received information that 37 -38 youths from Sri Lanka have received training from terrorists through Turkey and the Middle East countries.

He said that Sri Lanka did not have provisions to deal with them, but strategic decisions were made to prevent extremist elements taking roots in the country.

Hettiarachchi added that former Law and Order Minister Sagala Rathnayake presented a new Act to Parliament and former Intelligence Chief Nilantha Jayawardena designed a military plan after information received that educated youth have joined this outfit.

Farmers urge to use **Eppawala Phospate Deposit for nation welfare**

The farmer organizations in the Anuradhapura District said that no government has taken action to use the Eppawala Phosphate Deposit for the benefit of

The Integrated Farmer Organisations Federation has submitted the matter to Minister S.M. Chandrasena and State Ministers Shehan Semasinghe, Duminda Dissanayake, Channa Jayasumana including the District Development Council Chairman Parliamentarian K.H. Nandasena.

They have appealed Anuradhapura Government Agent R.M. Wanninayake and the District Agriculture Committee to intervene in the issue.

The Eppawala phosphate deposit is in the Anuradhapura District is about 240 km from Colombo and 140 km from the Trincomalee Harbor. The deposit was discovered on April 4, 1971 by the then Geological Survey Department. The deposit has 60 million metric tonnes of phosphate. The Eppawala phosphate deposit is classified as a high grade deposit because it contains about 30 - 40 per cent of phosphate and one of the richest and unique apatite deposits in the

The deposit is in six hills rising from maximum elevation of about 200 meters from the sea level and covering a huge area. The Eppawala Phosphate Company, a Government owned company, has mining rights of 19 hectares. Before the discovery of the deposit, a large amount of rock phosphate fertiliser was imported.

According to the phosphate company's sources, the production of rock phosphate fertiliser had began in 1974 and since then nearly last 50 years, only about 3 per cent of the total reserve has been consumed. It is still continuing to supply Eppawala Rock phosphate fertiliser (ERP) used only for plantation crops like tea, rubber and coconut and annual use is confined to about 60,000 mt.

The sources reveal that in 2007 all plans were approved to produce single super phosphate suitable for all crops including paddy and the environment licence too was granted. The experts point out if this project was realised as planned and Rs. 32 billion was spent on importing chemical fertiliser mainly Triple Super Phosphate. This matter has been already brought to the notice of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and the Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa by a team of experts including university experts.

Pansiyagama Vidyalaya students seek water

Six hundred and thirty students and 46 staff members of the Pansiyagama Maha Vidyalaya in Polpithigama lack drinking water. The school is under the Maho Zonal Education Division.

He said that the school receives a little water from a well of a farmer with a motor. Therefore, many students go to nearby houses and boutiques for







Harin's Cardinal error

Il Catholics of Sri Lanka will no doubt unreservedly condemn the remark made by former Minister Harin Fernando that the church authorities themselves may have been privy to intelligence reports of an impeding attack on churches on Easter Sunday.

Fernando has based his theory on the alleged nonparticipation of His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith at any of the main Easter Sunday services on that day.

Testifying before the Presidential Commission of Inquiry probing the Easter Sunday bombings Fernando said:"Traditionally the Archbishop conducts a main Easter mass.But on April 21, 2019 there was no mass conducted by him. Later I got to know there was an Easter vigil mass on April 20". He does not say if the Cardinal presided over this particular vigil mass, but the implication is that His Eminence avoided the main Easter Sunday service due to knowledge of a suicide attack on churches the next day, which to say the least is a very serious allegation to which the church no doubt would give an appropriate reply.

It is not clear why Harin Fernando, a Catholic himself, chose to remain silent on the probability of the church having prior knowledge on the bombings all this time - 17 months to be exact. He certainly had plenty of antipathy towards the Cardinal during that time when he even accused His Eminence for openly queering the pitch for Sajith Premadasa at the Presidential Election. This was in apparent response to a remark made by His Eminence in the immediate aftermath of the Easter Sunday attack that he (Fernando) chose to remain silent about information pointing to an an imminent attack on Churches in the former Minister's possession. Interestingly this statement that Harin's father was in possession of information about the Church bombings originate from the Ex-minister himself well before the Cardinal allegedly made mention of this and it defies logic how it was His Eminence's remark could have made a difference to the UNP candidate's vote since Fernando himself had already exposed his Government's incompetence.

Be that as it may, it is frivolous, nay, contemptible for Harin Fernando to imply that the Church may have possessed foreknowledge of the impending bombings and did nothing. He should have been asked by the Commission to immediately place any material in his possession to certify this. Worse, by stating that the Cardinal failed to conduct the main Easter Sunday service due to prior knowledge of the attacks he by innuendo is attributing criminal neglignce to the Cardinal bringing His Eminence on par with the Government of the day. It is also a moral attack on the Cardinal to suggest that the Head of the Catholic Church in Sri Lanka had contrary to perishing with his flock as a true matyr in the Christian tradition had taken the easy route out by non participation in the Easter Service. This could also well be a strategy to stage a diversion away from the genera accusations being laid at the door step of the Yahapalanaya Government on its negligence to forestall the attacks. It could also be a deliberate attempt to have the Cardinal and the Church authorities summoned before the Commission and questioned on their alleged omission.

It has been the Cardinal's perennial complain that the concerned authorities failed to act on Intelligence reports pointing to attack on Churches and had this intelligence, at least, passed on to the Church, they(Church) would certainly have called off all the Easter Sunday Services in the country. Now Harin Fernando implies that the Church itself could have had knowledge of the attack yet allowed the Easter Services to go ahead. How, pray, can one reconcile this position? Would His Eminence permit members of his flock to be slaughtered by keeping this information to himself? What reason did the Cardinal have for keeping mum and letting the carnage take

Would the role played by His Eminence in the immediate aftermath of the Church bombings fit in with the suggestion made by Harin? On the contrary it was His Eminence who took the lead in calming tempers and emotions and preventing a retaliatory bloodbath for which he earned the esteem and admiration of all members of other faiths particularly the Buddhist clergy who rallied en masse behind him showering their assistance and commiserating with the Cardinal at the tragedy that befell his flock, at a time the country's leadership was woefully found wanting and groping in the dark.

Hence, instead of appreciating the leadership provide by the Cardinal to the Catholics and the role played by His Eminence in averting a calamity at a time there was glaring paucity of leadership in the country it is unbecoming of individuals like Harin Fernando to look for a scapegoat in the Cardinal and the Catholic church for the criminal lapses on the part of the Government, of which he was a member, in permitting a bloodbath of the magnitude of that which occurred on that Easter Sunday.

FASTTRACKING TOBE MAJOR MARITME HUB

he oceans, particularly maritime trade, have been the lifeblood of the modern global economy and Sri Lanka, with its close proximity to the main East West trade lane has immensely benefited due to the geographic location.

The Port of Colombo recorded a throughput of 7.2 million TEUs in 2019. However, the bitter truth is that Sri Lanka will have to be highly competitive and grow further if the country wants to maintain its supreme position as the most important trading hub in South Asia and it simply cannot only rely on the advantage of its geographic location. In other words we need to build capacity.

This was emphasized by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa when he discussed the future activities of the State Ministry of Warehouse Facilities, Container Yards, Port Supply Facilities and Boat and Ship Building Industry Development on Tuesday (September 15). He said that Sri Lanka can use its unique location advantage to become one of the world's leading maritime hubs. Pointing out that goal could be achieved speedily by developing our ports facilities by emulating the world's most advanced ports, he emphasized the need to develop our ports to a higher level that would make them capable of attracting world's largest cargo ships each with a capacity of 24,000 containers.

To enhance our port capacity, the development of the Eastern and Western Terminals of Colombo Port should be accelerated. The President further said that the port system should be developed to cater to the needs of international vessels plying close to the country and in parallel to these initiatives Ports in Colombo, Galle, Trincomalee, Kankesanthurai and Oluvil should be developed.

During the discussion, a special attention was paid to upgrade the reshipment handling capacity, offering warehouse facilities and container terminals as well as supply facilities of international standards. It was also discussed to construct new warehouse facilities in areas such as Ratmalana, Peliyagoda and Veyangoda to promote Colombo Port as a premier transshipment hub.

The government should intervene to construct fuel storage tanks and supply fuel to the vessels. The President authorized the construction of a docking bay in Beruwala to facilitate the launch of large boats into the sea. "It is necessary to expand manufacturing, repairs and maintenance of ships and boats aiming the global market. The expansion of facilities to exchange naval staff centering main ports is also important', President emphasized.

Sri Lanka is strategically located in the centre of the Indian Ocean, roughly 10 nautical miles off the traditional East-West maritime trade route. The region sees some 60,000 ships passing through annually. A recent survey revealed that in 2018, Sri Lanka accounted for 24% of container traffic in the South Asian region and typically grew faster than the regional average. Much of this success is attributed to the performance of Colombo Port. Ranking 24th on the Lloyds List in 2019, Colombo Port is a significant player in the region, acting as a major transhipment hub connecting to India and other countries.

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The Port of Colombo recorded a throughput of 7.2 million TEUs in 2019. However, the bitter truth is that Sri Lanka will have to be highly competitive and grow further if the country wants to maintain its supreme position as the most important trading hub in South Asia and it simply cannot only rely on the advantage of its geographic location. In other words we need to build capacity.

All the experts were of the view that in order to mitigate port capacity constraints at Colombo Port, planned port developments including the delayed East Terminal project should be speeded up. A recent research publication stated that private sector-oriented solution like forming a public-private-partnership, through a competitive tendering basis with a multilateral development bank playing an honest broker role could be one way to approach this issue. Whatever solution is ultimately adopted, the best possible financial terms for Sri Lanka should be ensured as Colombo Port is a strategic national asset while considering the sensitivities of the neighbourhood.

The research paper said that seen in purely commercial terms, Sri Lan-

ka's transhipment trade is heavily dependent on the Indian market and such trade seems at risk. Geopolitical concerns in Indian policy circles have prompted investment to upgrade major Indian ports through the Sagarmala Initiative and a planned transhipment port in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

and Nicobar Islands.

The Eastern Terminal of the Colombo Port was inactive for five years since 2015 due to the mismanagement and poor decision making, Ports and Shipping Minister Rohitha Abeygunawardena said. "When we handed over the Eastern Terminal, all its work was completed. As soon as the Government changed, it decided to cancel the order for importing cranes for this terminal. Due to this poor decision, the Eastern Terminal ended up being inactive due to the

lack of cranes during the last four and a half years. This is a humongous terminal that could facilitate any large international vessel," he noted.

Last week, Ceylon Association of Shipping Agents (CASA) has warned Colombo's status as a maritime hub is under threat by the failure to expedite capacity expansion, ease of business as well as major port development moves to by neighbouring India. "The Port of Colombo, with its close proximity to the main East West trade lane has benefited due to our geographic location. The Port of Colombo recorded a throughput of 7.2 million TEUS in 2019. If we are to remain competitive and grow further we just cannot only rely on our geographic location. We need to build capacity," CASA Chairman Igram Cuttilan said.

Rubber Research Institute, Agalawatte ince the introduction of the rubber tree (Heveabrasillensis Muell. Arg) to Sri Lanka in 1876 planting material for the propagation of the tree was rubber seeds.

The first rubber trees planted at the Henerathgoda Botanical Gardens had started to flower in 1883 after 7 years and since then the production of seeds had been on the increase.

It appears that the expansion of rubber cultivation had been massive from 120 ha in 1890, 16,000 hectares in 1910, and 190,000 hectares by 1920. Every seed that was produced had been planted as per the legend.

In 1917 the bud grafting technique was introduced to rubber, and it was a real breakthough in the developments of the rubber industry, especially in producing planting materials with predictable yields at planting.

Seedling plantations, as many as many seedling species naturally do, had shown a wide variation in growth as well for the yield harvested by tapping when the trees are mature. It is reported that only 25% of the trees in seedling plantations contributed to 75% of the crop from that field.

Being seedlings, to identify the high yielding trees one had to wait till the trees were tapped. In a seedling population, the co-relation between the tree girth and the yield is not strong or positive as seen in clonal populations. Within a clone a correlation exists between the tree size and the yield which canals the planter to select better plants in the nursery as well as during the first 2-3 years in the field. However during the 1920 sigh yielding individuals had been identified from commercial seeding plantains and used as a source of bud wood to produce budded plants in planting programmes. A few such selections were Mil 3/2 (Identified from Milakanda Estate). HC 28 (Indemnified from Hilcroft Estate) and Wag 6278 (identified from Waga Estate). The yield potential of these clones had been in the range of 330-440 kg/ha/y.

In 1938, a new series of lones were recommended, Nab 12. Nab 15. Nab 17 and Nab 20 (selected from Nebuntenna Estate). Hand pollination or artificial breeding to produce clones had begun at Rubber Research Institute of Sri Lanka, Ceylon then, in 1932 and many clones had been produced under the tag RRIC, to denote the Rubber Research Institute of Ceylon, and after under RRISL. The productivity of these clones has been on a gradual increase up to about 3000 kg/ha/year, at present.

RRIC 100 SERIES CLONES

The most significant milestone in Hevea breeding in Sri Lanka which received huge recognition from all rubber growing countries was the release of RRIC 100 series clones, especially the clone RRIC 100 which exhibited resistance to many foliar diseases that prevailed at that time. An international trial that was jointly conducted in Thailand, Malaysia, India and Ivory Coast had revealed that the clone RRIC 100 was the best among all the clones presented by all countries at that time, as far as growth rate, vigour, resistance to diseases and yield were concerned.

RRIC 102, THE NEGLECTED RUBBER CLONE



Due to superior performance and world recognition, the clone RRIC 100 was extensively used in Sri Lankan planting programmes until it was temporarily taken out from the list in 1996. But it is recommended for non-traditional rubber growing areas up to date.

CLONE BALANCE

A balanced clone composition is required for a country, especially to lower the risk of getting the rubber industry affected by sudden and devastating foliar diseases. Accordingly, the Rubber Research Institute of Sri Lanka is maintaining a list of clones recommended under three different groups, group I clones being well studied and widely used for both Regional Plantation Companies and the Smallholder sector. Clones in group II and group III are recommended only for the estates under Regional Plantation Companies.

According to the statistics of the Agriculture and Environmental Statistic Division of Department of Census and Statistics in 2002, the clone composition in Sri Lanka was dominated by the foreign clone PB 86 (43%) followed by RRIC 100 (24%) and RRIC 121 (6%) followed by other clones in small proportions. With the introduction of RRIC 100 series clones, especially the clone RRIC 100, PB 86 was taken out from the list. In fact, PB 86 is highly susceptible to Phytophthora leaf disease and bark rot and low yielding compared to RRIC 100 series clones.

The clone composition in 2009

when surveyed by RRISL too had the same three clones but at that in almost equal shares, RRIC 100 (33%), RRIC 121 (33%) and PB 86 (29%). Each clone in the group is generally recommended to be used only up to 10% of the total extent of the estates under RPC's. But for the smallholder sector, only a limited number of clones are recommended, and therefore, growing up to 20% is acceptable. The clone RRIC 100 was removed from the list in 1986 in order to control the clone balance but continued to recommend for non-traditional areas as it was the most promising clone at that time.

In the list of recommended clones under group I, there were RRIC 102 and RRIC 103. Unfortunately, in 1985 the clone RRIC 103 got succumbed to the leaf disease Corynespora and wiped out. Parent clones of both RRIC 100 and RRIC 103 are the same and this demonstrates the variation among the clones for their genetic makeup. The clone RRIC 102 was a group I clone right from the beginning and has RRIC 52 one of the parents of RRIC 100 and RRIC 103. The colour of the latex of this clone is not pure white as it is in PB 86. Also, the growth during the first two years or so is not as impressive as that of RRIC 100. It also demands a bit more Magnesium fertilizer and the RRI has recommended extra Mg for RRIC 102. Due to these petty reasons, this clone RRIC 102 has received step-motherly treatment from both growers and planters.

As the share of the clone RRIC 121

was 33% (in the country) in 2009, the usage of it was restricted to estates under RPC's from 2012. Further, when the data were analyzed for the RPC's, the share of clone RRIC 121 was 43% and it was over and above the recommended limits. But, the usage of it could not be stopped for the smallholder sector due to the limited number of clones recommended for them. However, a plan was suggested to the Rubber Development Department (RDD) to reduce gradually the usage of clone RRIC 121 starting from 2011. The ratio was to use only 60% in the year 2011 and then to reduce 10% every year to reach 0% by 2017. The balance was to be supplied with other clones. Also, the clones RRISL 203 and RRISL 2001 were recommended for smallholder farmers since 2006, but with restrictions. That is to allow 10% of the total land area with each of these clones, and also only for the farmers having more than 10 ha. It was highly recommended to use the clone RRIC 102 as it was underuti-

However, when the usage of the clones was surveyed in 2020, it was alarming. The clone RRIC 102 covered only 2% while RRIC 121 has converted about 75% area.

This is a very unhealthy situation for a country and under no circumstances this high percentage of a single clone be afforded by country. If a clone specific disease attacks the clone RRIC 121, as it happened for the clone RRIC 103 in 1985 and for the clone RRIC 110 in 1995, the

entire rubber industry will be wiped out.

POTENTIAL YIELD OF THE CLONE RRIC 102

The objective of this article is to discuss the true performance of clones that we are using at present. Though the breeders generally declare a potential yield or productivity for each clone along with the tapping system, a huge variation is observed from one clearing to the other of the same clone.

The productivity of a clone is generally given as the yield in kilos per hectare per years. Rubber clearings, irrespective of the clone show 3-4 times yield variation, mainly owing to the stand per hectare and the growth condition.

The average yield potential of the clones RRIC 100 102 and RRIC 121 is about 2000 kg/ha/year. But, the potential yield of these clones is high if cultivated properly as per the RRISL recommendations and harvested judiciously.

The actual yeild obtained from one such field of clone RRIC 102 are discussed here to highlight the true peforamance of clones and the importance of adoping RRISL recommendations in cultivating rubber.

This observation was done is a block of clones RRIC 102 in the Kegalle district. Plants have been received from the government rubber nursery at Welikadamulla, Attanagalla. Planting had taken palce in 2003

and tapping commenced in 2008 after 5 years.

When tapping practices were considered for up to five yeas of tapping the panel position indicated that even the recommended d2 frequency has not been practiced but a lower frequency. Under S/2 d2 tapping, about 160 tappings are allowed per year, but on average only 90 days had been tapped per year, as evident by the bark consumption.

As far as the growth of the trees is concerned the average girth at the age of 10 years of planting is 72 cm measured at 120 cm. Twenty percent of the trees show girth above 80 cm

All RRISL recommendations have been fully adopted from planting up to date including correct use of fertilizer. The growth condition, the harvesting frequency and quality of the tapping speak for the yield of this clearing which is above 300 kg/ha/ year and individual tree yield per tapping is above 80 grams. No extra effort had been taken to increase the number of tapping days through recovery tappings or the yield per tapping by applying any yield stimulant. This is a good insight and food for thought for the growers who continuously complain about the low price per kilo of rubber leaving behind all other important agro-management practices. There is no secret behind the attractive yield, but the growth condition of the trees.

The tapping system adopted is S/2 d2 but the actual number of tappings per year is similar to d3, but without stimulation or rain-guard as said before.

Similarly, yield below 800 kg/ha/year is achieved in many rubber clearings belongs to the RRIC 100, RRIC 121 and rest of the clones in the recommended clone list. For each of these clearings, the yield obtained can be well explained in the contest of the number of trees in the land area, growth condition, tapping frequency, number of dry trees, and also the adoption of agro-management practices.

THE WAY FORWARD

All the prospective rubber farmers and planters need to adopt recommendations right from the beginning, ie, from land preparation. If the old clearing has White Root Disease affected trees or a patch, all recommended steps should be followed to eradicate the deadly disease from the next replanting.

Soil conservation is as important as managing the trees. Harvesting should not make any tree dry, as the closest possible reason for brown beast affected trees or dry trees in a clearing is over-exploitation. The trees give only what the tree can give.

The use of high-quality plants in replanting programmes is now guaranteed through issuing plants from government rubber nurseries which are monitored for quality by the Rubber Research Institute, as in the case of the RRIC 102 clearing reported here.

However, these under-utilised clones should be planted up to about 20%, giving the priority to small-holder farmer who are anyway in short supply of clones. Estates under RPC's are encouraged to plant group 11 and III clones until a proper clone balance is achieved for the country.

Reflection on literary sociology and sociological literature

Peradeniya is for poets and poetry, many among those who've passed through that university would claim. The sheer beauty of the place constitutes a muse, of this there cannot be any argument. Dawn descends in silver from Hantane and from certain high points evening can be seen to set fire to Alagalla. There are colors to cut the heart. Carpets made of flowers. Greens rolling from hue to hue. Roads bending to disappear into trees. Moonlight and the softest rain. And a river running through it all.

But places are also people and communities are differently peopled through faculties, halls of residence, activities, eras and generations. The wider world arrives as whisper or shout, but either way will leave a trace, surreptitiously or boldly dissolving or doing away with frames and replacing these with other structures. And things are no longer the same.

It is loved. It is hated. And love and hate exchange places in the same heart that loved and hated. Time offers distance and change makes for assessment of things that are and how and why they became what they are. True for Peradeniya. True for any other university anywhere in the world. True of many places. Many things. Many people and processes.

And whether or not you are a poet or a sociologist (or a student of any other discipline for that matter), you can, if you so wish, reflect. Casually or deeply. You can keep it to yourself, you can share.

Karunatissa Athukorala is given to sharing, one way or another. This retired professor, from whom generations of sociologists have learned, loves to relate anecdotes. He doesn't say 'alright, this is a sociological insight,' but pickings there are.

Stories. That's the word. Stories related in a particular way. We could ask, 'is it "a way" made particular by training?' We could flip it too. Does he write or speak his sociology, so to say, in the way he does because he is essentially a good narrator, we could ask. Chicken or egg, in other words.

Professor Ariyaratne Athugala spoke to this issue. It was at the launch of a book of short stories written by Athukorala titled 'Mojuwa,' aptly too, considering the eclectic nature of the material it contained.

The stories, if not the names of the characters, are absolutely believable, to the point that the effort almost seems like a matter of Athukorala selecting pieces from a journal maintained over many decades unknown to anyone else.

If that's the case, then we have to consider the proposition that all lives are but stories, some bleeding from one to the other, and some distinct. We have neat plots, a mix of pathos and humor, a laying bare of some salient element of the human condition and an unwrapping of inter-personal relationships that shed light on larger social processes including the play of structure and agency.

Athugala pointed out that it is typical for 'prabandha' (fiction) to be seen as something distinctly different from 'nibandhanaya' (treatise) and suggested that perhaps the veracity of this 'thesis' should be reexamined.



Trivial and personal perhaps but nevertheless containing the DNA of a complex social process which, if extracted, could be extrapolated to tell, yes, a story of what's what and what's not of Peradeniya that is as accurate or as full or error as any sociological treatise.

ment of Sociology could be administering a questionnaire or trying to make sense of qualitative data gathered through interviews and observations or writing it all down in 'sociological format.' I hope it is 'good,' for that would inform and make for more sensible engagement.

he Gonagala Massacre was committed by the LTTE on September 18, 1999, in the small village of Gonagala, in the Ampara District. According to reports, over 50 men, women and children were hacked to death in the middle of the night by LTTE terrorists.

The LTTE is a terrorist organization banned by a number of countries including the United States, the United Kingdom, India and the European

The Gonagala massacre is one of several such attacks that have been carried out by the LTTE. However, these murders gained notoriety because, unlike previous attacks, most of the LTTE cadres who took part in it were women. According to survivors, there was a significant presence of female cadres among the 75 LTTE cadres who took part in the

The incident occurred in the early morning of September 18, 1999, at 31 Colony in Ampara. The LTTE cadres first entered Gonagala village and hacked to death 50 Sinhalese civilians, most of them in their sleep. A middle-aged man who had tried to protect himself had his hand severed and his skull pulverised. After the attack, the bodies of children lay in pools of blood in their beds in which they had been sleeping.

The LTTE cadres then moved from the Gonagala settlement to two neighbouring ones, where they killed four more civilians, before making their exit. Of the 54 victims of the massacre, 27 were men, 17 were women and 10 were children. Out of the 17 women who died in the killings, two were pregnant. According to forensic experts, only one victim was shot dead with a revolver, while the rest were killed with knives or machetes.

It was also reported that four other civilians were also seriously wound-

One survivor, Herath Mudiyansalege Premasiri, a 29-year-old farmer, gave the description of the events that happened around him. "We finished late and went to bed. There were about 15 of us, relatives and friends who had come to help us with the alms-giving. I was sleeping alone in my room. Around 2.00 am, I heard a group of people banging on the door. They later broke into the house."

He survived by hiding under his bed, but 14 other people who were in his home on that day were killed.

Another resident of the village, who was a home guard, had been on duty at a checkpoint further away. When he returned home in the morning, he found his pregnant wife, two children (ages six and eight) and his father, mother, sister and brother-inlaw dead. The LTTE hacked to death

a large number of civilians belonging to all ethnicities and religions who lived in the North and East for 30 long years. The villages were located adjoining the areas held by the LTTE. Those villages were called 'border vil-

The people who lived in these bor-

der villages left their homes at night and spent the night in thick jungles and treetops to protect their lives from the LTTE. But some such as the elderly, the sick, the disabled, infants and pregnant women could not do it. The LTTE cardres came at night and hacked them to death.

They died in a painful way after suffering for hours without being able to get help from outside. May be they died in the most painful way possible for a human being. But after 2015, arrangements were made to pay compensation for the LTTE terrorists while ignoring innocent civilians who escaped from those massacres.

Buddhist Bhikkus who lived in those border villages did not leave their temples because of the innocent people. They stayed back and faced the brutality of the LTTE while protecting people and priceless historical archeological sites which provided concrete proof of the real Sri Lankan history. The LTTE tried its best to fabricate a new Sri Lankan history to help their claim over certain lands, but the historical archeological sites stood against this claim providing evidence for the true Sri Lankan his-

Suicide bombing was a popular tactic of the LTTE. Between 1980 and 2000, the LTTE carried out 168 suicide attacks causing heavy damage to civilian, economic and military targets. The Sri Lankan economy and the Sri Lanka Army have been targeted on numerous occasions, including during a high-profile attack on Bandaranaike International Airport (BIA) in 2001 that caused damage to several commercial airliners and mili-

tary jets. The LTTE was also responsible for a 1998 attack on the Buddhist shrine and UNESCO World Heritage Site - the Sri Dalada Maligawa – that killed eight devotees. The attack was symbolic in

Of the 54 victims of the massacre, 27 were men, 17 were women and 10 were children. Out of the 17 women who died in the killings, two were pregnant.

that the Sri Dalada Maligawa is the holiest Buddhist shrine in Sri Lanka.

Other Buddhist shrines have been attacked, notably the Jaya Sri Maha Bodhiya and Sambuddhaloka Temple

The LTTE hijacked a bus on May 14, 1985 and entered Anuradhapura. As the LTTE cadres entered the main bus station, they opened fire indiscriminately with automatic weapons, killing and wounding many civilians who were waiting for buses. The LTTE cadres then drove to the Jaya Sri Maha Bodhi and gunned down Buddhist Bhikkunis and Bhikkus and civilians as they were worshiping. Before they withdrew, the LTTE entered Wilpattu national park and killed 18 Sinhalese in the forest reserve. The LTTE cadres massacred 146 Sinhalese men, women and children in total, in Anuradhapura.

The brutal terrorism of the LTTE ended on May 18, 2009, by the heroic armed forces of Mother Lanka after sacrificing over 26,000 precious young lives.

Several war heroes became permanently disabled. The blood shed by them in order to protect innocent Sri Lankans and the motherland was underestimated from 2015 to 2019. Some of them were imprisoned for saving the motherland and people's lives. But on November 16, 2019, the people of Sri Lanka did justice for those precious lives lost and shat-

y mother grew up in a house of eight people in Kurunegala. During the island's severe droughts in the 1970s, most of her family's humble, home-cooked meals consisted of boiled jackfruit served in a clay pot with a handful of freshly grated coconut. This simple, carbrich meal fused with natural fats fuelled enough energy for the farmer-family to toil day and night in the dry plains.

Today, Starbucks serves jackfruit in wraps, while Pizza Hut offers it as a topping. The London Evening Standard called jackfruit "the new kimchi, kale and cauliflower all rolled into one." Pinterest named it "the hottest food trend of 2017," and more recently, The Guardian declared it "a vegan sensation" thanks to its shredded meat texture.

But for my mother, her memories of growing up are studded with her eldest sister's myriad jackfruit dishes. She's particularly fond of kiri kos, a creamy jackfruit curry cooked in coconut milk. For kiri kos, my aunt plucked unripe jackfruits. Decades later in the early 2000s, it was the same tree that pleased my jackfruit cravings as a child. My mother recalls the days where I sat side by side with her as she removed and discarded the sticky white sap koholla - from ripe jackfruit, gobbling up each yellow,

I loved the strong smell of the ripe fruit. People in the West often describe it as "stinky," but for me, other Sri Lankans and those living between many parts of India and the rainforests of Malaysia where the fruit naturally grows, this seasonal smell of ripe jackfruit brings immense

Jackfruit is the world's largest tree-borne fruit and it has a spiky skin that changes colour from green to yellow as it ripens. We use unripe jackfruit in our cooking and eat the ripe fruit raw, just as we eat a ripe mango or an apple. While the West is now touting it as an ethical meat alternative, for centuries, this humble fruit has been revered by Sri Lankans, as it has repeatedly saved the island from

Across Sri Lanka, the jackfruit tree is known as bath gasa ("rice tree"). Sri Lankans are rice eaters and precolonial Sri Lanka took pride in the country's vast reservoirs and irrigation canals that harnessed monsoon rains, supplying water for paddy cultivation. But when British forces occupied the island in 1815 and subsequently stripped farmers of their land, they made it difficult for islanders to grow rice and instead expanded plantation crops such as tea, rubber and cinnamon for their export

In 1915, a member of Sri Lanka's independence movement named Arthur V. Dias, who had been sentenced to death by the British for his perceived role in an uprising, was freed from prison. Upon his release, Dias dedicated himself to helping Sri Lankans fight British rule and he realised that islanders would soon face food shortages as rice cultivation continued to decline. During his independence movement marches in Sri Lanka's central highlands, he also saw the destruction of the island's native jackfruit trees. When he learnt about the harrowing food shortages caused by World War One across Europe, Dias sought to establish food security and self-sufficiency throughout Sri Lanka.

"One person can't build a tank for paddy cultivation, but Arthur V. Dias realised he could plant jackfruit trees, which would be the same as rice and eradicate starvation in Sri Lanka," said Damith Amarasinghe, a history teacher at St. Mary's Maha Viduhala in Uswetakeiyawa.


Dias came up with the ambitious goal of planting one million jackfruit trees across Sri Lanka. A planter by trade, Dias imported jackfruit seeds from Malaysia and gathered healthy seeds for germination. He visited villages to distribute seedlings and mailed seeds to far-flung corners in the country. Over time, Dias' campaign paved the way to many successful jackfruit plantations across the country and earned him the heroic nickname of Kos Mama, or Uncle Jack.

Today, Dias is considered a national hero, and like most Sri Lankan children, I first learned about Dias in a school textbook. His jackfruit campaign also helped establish food security in Sri Lanka during World War Two while nearby places such as Bengal and Vietnam experienced horrific famines in the 1940s. Amarasinghe explained that jackfruit was also known as the "starvation fruit" in Sri Lanka during the 1970s, fleetingly transferring me to my mother's memories of her childhood.

In the 1970s, a combination of inflation, droughts and a food shortage pushed Sri Lanka to the verge of collapse. A 1974 New York Times article quotes Sri Lanka's thenprime minister Sirimavo Bandaranaike as saying the dire economic situation has "almost squeezed the breath out of us – we are literally fighting to survive."

But thanks to Dias' campaign in the early 1900s, people had jackfruit growing in their backyards. Amarasinghe explained that those saplings - which had become tall,

fruit-bearing trees long before the 1970s - are what got people through the crisis.

"My grandmother hailed from a well-to-do family, but the government only allowed them to purchase 2kg of rice for a week. During these years, it's jackfruit that kept them fed," Amarasinghe told me.

Most recently, Amarasinghe says that jackfruit also became a staple during Sri Lanka's months-long curfew to control Covid-19. During the initial weeks of the pandemic, many people in rural villages lost their incomes and it took weeks or even months for government welfare programmes to reach these remote hamlets. Without access to money or food, many villagers resorted to boiling jackfruit – just as my mother's family did in the 1970s.

But jackfruit isn't just a starvation fruit. The island's deep love and gratitude for jackfruit has birthed a host of flavourful delicacies, and we welcome every bit of it into our diverse cuisine. Tender baby jackfruit without seeds go into a flavourful curry known as polos ambula. The curry's labour-intensive process involves slow cooking the young fruit in a clay pot over an earthen fire for at least six hours. As the hours pass, the baby jackfruit

slices simmer in a spice-infused coconut broth, soaking up the flavours of cloves, cardamom, dried tamarind and other aromats.

Ripe jackfruit pods are slimy and taste better with a sprinkle of salt. Seeds don't go to waste in our homes; we eat them boiled. When combined with a ground mix of pan-fried rice and shredded coconut, boiled seeds make for a dark curry called kos ata kalu pol maluwa. My mother loves seeds as a snack, smoking them over a charcoal fire.

My favourite is my father's kos ata aggala, pan-roasted and ground jackfruit seeds blended with scraped cocoevening tea when I'm home as a token of his love.

who cooks with locally sourced ingredients in her spare time. Welitharage cites jackfruit trees' popularity as timber and the many uses of its leaves and flowers in Ayurvedic medicine to treat diabetes. Rich in carbs, jackfruit is also a good source of dietary fibre and vita-

Welitharage uses jackfruit flour in muffins and cakes, and fries sliced jackfruit pods into chips laden with sugar. Similarly, many Hela Bojun restaurants - an initiative by the Agriculture Ministry allowing women to cook traditional Sri Lankan cuisine and earn a living prepare kos kottu. Kottu, a popular street food and hangover cure, is a greasy mix of leftover flatbread, sliced vegetables, eggs and meat.

The female-run Hela Bojun stalls dish up a healthier vegan kottu using boiled jackfruit pods.

Though jackfruit is traditionally cooked at home, this humble fruit is increasingly found in many upscale restaurants across the country.

"One day we had additional baby jackfruit, so I thought of preparing cutlets with it for guests who are vegetarian or vegan," said chef Wasantha Ranasinghe at Upali's by Nawaloka, a popular restaurant in Colombo that serves authentic local dishes. His tender jackfruit cutlets, served with a homemade spicy chilli sauce, soon became a hit among the epicureans frequenting the res-

Curious to see how jackfruit fares at hipster cafes, I visited the chic Colombo restaurant Cafe Kumbuk, which plates tacos with fried baby jackfruit alongside mango salsa and guacamole.

"Living in Sri Lanka, I realised jackfruit is such a widely available, versatile fruit that can be cooked and enjoyed in so many ways," said cafe founder Shana Dandeniya, who returned to Sri Lanka a few years ago after growing up in the UK. "To me, it's one of the greatest local superfoods we have access to, and we should cham-

She is particularly fond of the pulled pork-like texture in cooked jackfruit and has plans to reintroduce a pulled jackfruit burger on the cafe's menu following customer requests. "It's great when slow-cooked and pulled; I think it's even better than pulled pork.'

When I spoke to my mother again, she tempted me to visit my aunt in the village for a bowl of creamy white kiri kos cooked over a woodfire and enjoyed with a plate of hot rice and lemongrass-scented freshwater fish curry. I can't recreate my aunt's authentic flavours in my Colombo kitchen with a gas stove, but I can visit her and then see my father for a token of love that comes with his teatime kos ata aggala. (BBC)



LAUGFS terminals at HIP celebrates 100th ship call

LAUGFS Terminals Ltd celebrated, the 100th ship call, for loading of LP Gas at its port based, all weather LP Gas Storage and Transhipment Terminal Complex located at Hambantota International Port. (HIP) This facility was built and now operated by LAUGFS Terminals Ltd which is a fully owned subsidiary of LAUGFS Gas PLC.

The commercial operations of this facility commenced in July 2019, and it is considered as an impressive performance to record the 100th ship call within a space of only 14 months, which is exceptional for infrastructure projects of this nature having long gestation periods.

LAUGFS Terminals Ltd has spent USD 65 million to build this state of the art terminal complex and was able to complete the construction work within two and half years and employed for this purpose, the state-owned venture HQC of China as its EPC contractor. CEO of Hambantota International Port Group (Pvt) Ltd. Ray Ren, said: "We congratulate LAUGFS Terminals on their robust business plans and operation which will contribute greatly to the energy hub status of Hambantota International Port. HIP which now positions itself on quality services and standards in all aspects of port operations will continue to support LAUGFS Terminals in achieving their targets with high quality operational and health & safety standards for the discharge and loading of LPG," he

The installed cargo capacity of this Terminal Complex is 30,000 m/t, which can be turnaround 3 times monthly to achieve 1,000,000 m/t of LP Gas per annum as transhipments, by way of import, storage, mixing of elements of Propane & Butane and exports to identified markets. This Transshipment Terminal Complex has been granted the Board of Investment approval with special Hub-status as per the relevant Gazette notifications and enjoys a range of statutory concessions.

"We were also, for years had been making much noise about a "Maritime-Hub" around our country and the ports but hardly any tangible move had been made towards achieving this status either by the authorities concerned or by the private sector establishments.

However, LAUGFS, having been an active player in the energy sector of the country for over 25 years and also having its wings in certain overseas LPG markets, stepped into building this LPG Transhipment Terminal complex at Hambantota Port not only with a view to contribute to make this port a "Maritime Hub" but also and more importantly making it an

The call of the 100th ship at the terminal complex through Hambantota International Port is a landmark event in the country since it denotes the beginning of creating an "Energy-Hub" around the port in addition to it being a "Maritime-Hub" in the short to medium term with increased ship calls for trading and transhipment purposes. LAUGFS Terminals Ltd has taken only a period of 14 months to achieve this important feat which is significant.

The achievement of the call of 100 ships all the more important in the light of the adverse effect from oil-price volatility, USA China trade disputes, drone attacks on Saudi Aramco installations and Covid-19 impacts with almost complete lockdowns globally leading to economic recessions creating a substantial decline in energy demand and trading.

LAUGFS Terminals Ltd with its 100 ships calling at the terminal complex had handled in total 413,000 m/t of LPG of inward and outward cargo. The value of the transactions of inward and outward cargo of these 100 ships is around USD 175,000,000. Its exports to foreign markets include Bangladesh, Maldives and India and it is now reaching 60% of exports of the total volumes handled monthly which is once again considered as a noteworthy feature to highlight. "Our major export mix consists of apparels, tourism, plantation produce and few more sectors but it is quite interesting to

observe a gradual emergence of a completely new sector the "Energy Exports" adding value through LAUGFS Transshipment Terminals. This will hopefully be a major export sector in the country in the time to come," a LAUGFS official said.






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

"Access to a life-saving vaccine shouldn't depend on where you live or how much money you have," said Robert Silverman of Oxfam America.

President Cyril Ramaphosa said in an address to the nation that international travel would "gradually and cautiously" resume from October 1.

"We have withstood the corcent contraction in the first onavirus storm," he said. (AFP)

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
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More than 200 virus cases at Lebanon's biggest prison: doctor

BEIRUT THRUSDAY: Lebanon's largest prison has more than 200 coronavirus cases, the head of the country's doctors' union warned Thursday, calling for speedy trials to ease overcrowding.

"There are more than 200 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Roumieh prison," Sharaf Abu Sharaf told journalists in Beirut, after authoriweekend.

Abu Sharaf did not specify whether the new cases were all inmates or if they also included prison guards. But he blamed prisoners for the spike in infections, saying they were

not abiding by health measures. He also called on authorities to speed up trials to ease overcrowding, in a country where suspects can languish in jail for months without a

hearing. Roumieh prison houses more than 4,000 prisoners, around three times its intended capacity, and has long been infamous for its poor

conditions. A video leaked from the prison and shared widely across social media on Wednesday showed nearly 100 inmates demanding immediate measures to ease overcrowding in

light of the virus outbreak. A prisoner speaking on the

group's behalf threatened a "river of blood" unless steps are taken.

Security authorities had first announced 22 coronavirus cases there on Saturday.

They include nine guards and 13 detainees who had been transferred to an isolation unit inside the jail.

Dozens of families of Roumieh detainees staged a protest in front ties first announced 22 cases at the of a Beirut courthouse Monday, demanding a general amnesty for their relatives over fears the pandemic was spreading in the jail.

Speaking to AFP on Monday, Beirut Bar Association head Melhem Khalaf called the outbreak there a "humanitarian time bomb." Caretaker health minister Hamad Hassan has said his ministry was working with the ministries of interior and defence to prepare two hospitals in the eastern Bekaa region and one in the capital to treat

detainees. Covid-19 infections have surged in Lebanon in recent weeks, especially after a massive explosion at Beirut port on August 4 that killed more than 190 people, wounded thousands and ravaged large parts of the capital.

Since February, Lebanon has recorded a total of 26,083 Covid-19 cases, including 259 deaths.(AFP)



UK's PM urges Britons to flatten pandemic's 'second hump'

LONDON THRUSDAY: British Prime Minister Boris Johnson said Thursday he could close pubs earlier to "stop the second hump" of coronavirus cases, comparing the country's trajectory of resurgent transmission to a camel's profile.

His government is set to unveil new restrictions in England, which could also include greater social curbs, later on Thursday, initially targeting the northeast region where Covid-19 cases are

It already imposed rules across England on Monday limiting socialising to groups of six people or fewer, as daily cases reach levels not seen since early May.

In an interview with The Sun newspaper, Johnson said new measures may be needed as "the only way to make sure the country is able to enjoy Christmas" and an alternative to another full lock-

"What I don't want to be doing is locking down sections of the economy," he

said. "We can grip it now, stop the surge, arrest the spike, stop the second hump of the dromedary, flatten the second hump," Johnson told the tabloid, before musing on his metaphor.

"Dromedary or camel? I can't remember if it is a dromedary or a camel that has two humps? Umm. Please check." Dromedaries are Arabian camels which have only one hump.

Johnson had compared Britain's first wave of virus cases to a sombrero hat, imploring people to "squash it" by obeying the nationwide lockdown in place from late March until June.

But the prime minister has faced stinging criticism this week over the failure to achieve the "world-beating" testing and tracing system he promised by the sum-

The government admits that increasing demand for virus tests is posing problems, after hospital bosses warned delays in the system were jeopardising health-

care services. It has blamed people who do not need tests overburdening the system, with ministers vowing to unveil new prioritisation rules in the coming days.

"I really sympathise for those that can't get the test that they want," Johnson added, conceding "the system is really struggling with the real weight of

"Often, and I don't in any way reproach people for doing this, but it's a fact, a significant proportion of those people are asymptomatic." Johnson vowed to "continue to ramp it up" and has promised to have the capacity to test 500,000 people a day in place by October.

Britain has been the worst-hit country in Europe from the pandemic, with the government registering nearly 42,000 deaths. The Office of National Statistics, which uses broader criteria for counting Covid-19 fatalities, has said closer to 58,000 Britons have died from the virus.

Tourists travel secret tunnels of Albania's communist-era paranoia

GJIROKASTRA ALBANIA THRUSDAY:

Snaking beneath a fortress in southern Albania, a covert tunnel network built during the communist era captures the secrecy and paranoia that defined the long rule of tyrant Enver Hoxha.

Today communism is gone and the

military bunker is a tourist attraction, still drawing rare visitors during the pandemic, when themes of fear, isolation and confinement are particularly resonant. The sprawling underground complex, now dubbed the Cold War tunnel, is part

of a vast and costly "bunkerisation" project spearheaded by Hoxha, who feared foreign invasion during his 40-year isolationist rule. In order to fortify the hermit state, he oversaw the construction of more than

Most are small dome-shaped structures, built as sentry posts for soldiers, that still dot the landscape today. The underground matrix burrowed beneath the citadel of Hoxha's hometown of Gjirokastra, in the country's south, is

170,000 military bunkers across Albania.

UNESCO World Heritage Site. Construction crews worked shifts in secrecy to ensure no one had a view of the full plan for the 1,500-metre tunnel

among the most impressive. Today it's a



network built to house the military command in case of a foreign assault.

It was rediscovered after the fall of communism in the 1990s and has since become a tourist draw.

While Covid-19 has dealt a heavy blow to Albania's tourist season, some 300 mask-clad visitors still explored the underground lair this summer, including Alexandre Benlalam, a 39-year-old Paris-

ian computer engineer. "Today we are visiting this bunker to reflect and think about the sad time we are living with the pandemic, we are deprived of certain liberties, freedom to touch each other, to speak to each other, to meet," he told AFP. Today's "limitations are in the right direction" however, he added, contrary to the deprivations under Hoxha's ironfisted dictatorship.

Reporting' an imaginary war

While the tunnel walls are now crumbling and old furniture left behind is covered in dust, the complex was initially highly sophisticated.

The corridors connect nuclear bomb shelters and scores of offices for the military command, secret police, public prosecutors and a court, explained Astrit Imeri, a 67-year-old former military officer, as he revisited the underground hide-

Additional spaces were carved out for wiretapping operations, dormitories for sleeping, a bakery, water tanks, and a stash of Kalashnikovs and TT pistols to be used against potential enemy intru-

"The tunnel had all the resources to stay there not just for a few hours but for days and weeks," Imeri said.

He was among those who took part in elaborate military exercises held inside the tunnels to prepare for a war.

Locals were also called to participate, including Engjell Serjani, 60, a radio journalist who remembers having to "cover" a fabricated conflict in the mid-1980s as part of the drills.

Baratha Hegoda the Rugby Legend

Rugby Football has become one of the top sports in the country with more and more academies and schools enrolling young kids to take up the game to transform them into highly skilled players. A man who contributed three decades of his life to the game, which apparently is an unbroken record in the Lankan Rugby historv was none other than Baratha Hegoda, well known in the rugby circles as 'Bari', is a legend who will be remembered for a long time both as a player and as a gentleman,

Bharatha Hegoda a rock solid third row player later matured as a utility player, who could fit into any position in the Pack. Bari's three-decade career as a forward for Sri Lanka and CH & FC was due to his sheer determination, dedication and perseverance.

He started his school rugby career at Greenlands College in the year 1960 as a junior student. He then shifted to Isipathana College at the young age of 16 years, where he played in the second XV team as a prop forward. Continuing further as a player in 1970,1971 and 1972 he was

selected to represent the first XV senior team.

Due to an unfortunate incident Isipathana College was barred from participating in the school's rugby season in 1972. As a result, he was deprived of representing the College first XV team. Subsequently S.K.Gunawardena, brother of LSSP MP for Kalutara Cholmondeley

Gunawardena invited most of the Isipathana players, to join his school. They ultimately accepted the invitation by Gunawardena and joined Dehiwela Central school rugby team, which is now renamed as S.de S Jayasinghe Maha Vidyalaya. Bari along with Sarath Perera, Preethi Mahawela, Kamal Jayawardena, Ananda Perera, Ranjith Perera crossed over in 1973, which enabled them to build up a strong rugby team.

Bari Represented Dehiwela Central in the school's rugby season from 1973 to 1974. He then embarked on his club rugby career with CH & FC in 1975, to play in the Inter Club under-22 tournaments as a third row player. One year later, monitoring his skills, he was selected to represent the CH & FC senior team under Rodney



Patternot's captaincy and under the watchful eyes of great Archibald Perera as coach.

According to him it was Archibald Perera who moulded him to play in the key number-8 position, where he continued playing for CH in the 1977

Sri Lanka Navy extended him an invitation in 1978 to don their jersey to represent them in the inter club rugby competition, where they defeated his former club CH in 1979. He rejoined CH rugby on the Invitation of his close friends and former champion captains late N.H.Karunasena and Saman Jayasinghe in 1980 and 1981 seasons. Under N.H Karunasena CH won the league title after 20 years having performed a similar feat way back in 1962.

He went on to lead CH under Y.C. Chang as coach in1982. Due to an injury occurred in a match against CR & FC in 1983, he was out of action but returned after one year in 1984 to continue playing for CH as a member of their 'A' division rugby side until

By reaching 50 years of age in 1996, he quit playing competitive 'A' division rugby and joined the 'B' division team to enjoy playing until 2005, where he entered the record books becoming one and only player to play over three decades of rugby.

While being a club player Bari went to represent the national team in both 7's and 15's formats. He holds the record of playing in six Rugby Asiads representing the country. His debut in Rugby Asiad was in 1978 as a number-8 player held in Malaysia, led by Irwin Howie. Due to his

extraordinary playing skills he established a permanent place in both formats of the game, from where he started from 1980, 1982, 1984, 1986 and played his last Asiad in 1988.

In the sevens arena he was a regular member at Hong Kong sevens teams from 1979 under Lanil Tennekoon and again in 1980, 1981,1982, 1984 and in 1985.

In 1980 he represented the Colombo Wanderers teams on the tour of Taiwan.

He was instrumental in guiding CH to win several championships including the sevens championship in 1980, the league in 1982, the Clifford Cup in 1983, Singapore Sevens as runner up in 1984, and emerging as runner-up in the R. Premadasa Knockout tournament in 1984 followed by winning the same tournament in 1985, 1986 and 1988 respectively, under the watchful eyes of Y. C Chang as Coach and Kishin Butani and Ranjan Kanagasabai, who were pillars of strength by providing financial support to the

players from 1980 to 1986. He would like to extend his sincere gratitude to Kishin Butani under whom he says they celebrated the "Golden era of CH rugby" from 1988 to 1994, where Hassan Sinhawansa was Chairman of Rugby.

He is thankful to the coaches Archibald Perera, Y.C. Chang and Tony Amith and his team mates N.H, Karunasena, Saman Jayasinghe, Chandrishan Perera, Ranjan Kanagasabai, Rohan Abeykoon, Iqbal Hassan, Raheel Hashim, Roshan Perera, Sujantha Kumar, Rahim.Junaideen, Imran Salih, Anil Dassanayake, Ravi Wijenathan, Patrick Ranasinghe, Tiny Miskin, Brumoon Akbar, Apisai Nagata, S.Sritharan, Simon Hunter, Brian MaCauly, Jalasi Radrardo, and Basil

Maxwell and Carey hit hundreds as Australia clinch ODI series win

MANCHESTER, WEDNESDAY: Glenn Maxwell and Alex Carey both hit brilliant hundreds as Australia sealed a dramatic series win over world champions England in the third one-day international at Old Trafford on Wednesday.

Australia, chasing a target of 303, were all but out of the game at 73-5 when Maxwell came to the crease.

But an Australia record sixth-wicket stand of 212 between Carey (106) and Maxwell (108) helped give the tourists a 2-1 success as England suffered their first home ODI series defeat in five

Earlier, Jonny Bairstow had revived England from the depths of 0-2 with a superb hundred that saw them to 302-7 after the opener watched from the other end as left-arm quick Mitchell Starc removed Jason Roy and Test captain Joe Root with the first two balls of the

Sam Billings (57) and Chris Woakes (53 not out) also hit valuable fifties.

Maxwell's hundred was just his second century in 113 matches at this level, with Carey's innings the wicketkeeper's maiden century in his 39th

But when Maxwell holed out off leg-spinner Adil Rashid, Australia still needed 18 off 15 balls. That became 10 off six when Carey, whose century came off 106 balls, was superbly caught by a diving Mark Wood at third man off Jofra Archer.

New batsman Starc, however, hit his first ball, from Rashid, for six and sealed victory with two balls to spare

"It probably wasn't the ideal situation when I came in but being the last batter. I suppose I had a bit of license to go for it right from the start," Maxwell told Sky Sports. "We thought if we could take it as deep as we could, myself and Alex, we might be a chance at the back end." England captain Eoin Morgan said Australia were "too good for us", adding. "To lose two wickets for no runs and then post over 300 is a huge positive for us. I think Jonny

Bairstow was outstanding today. "Carey and Maxwell played outstandingly well." England were left to rue the Carey being caught on nine off an Archer no-ball as they ended a coronavirus-hit season by suffering their first series defeat in 18 matches across all formats. AFP

The Sri Lankan cricketers are tentatively undergoing training at R. Premadasa Stadium under the guidance of national coach Mickey Arthur in preparation for the upcoming three-test series against Bangladesh, which is scheduled to commence from October 24 at Pallekelle Stadium, Kandy.

The 23-member squad which was formed recently will continue their training sessions, including fitness, at the Premadasa stadium. Four players, namely Santush Gunathilake, Kavindu Mendis, Asitha Fernando and Wanindu Hasaranga, have been released to represent their clubs engaged in the under-23 tournament which commenced last Wednesday. Once confirmation of the tour is finalised the squad will be pruned down to 15 players two weeks before the first match.

Meanwhile, as per reliable sources, the management is likely to experiment with seamer friendly wickets for this tour, to encourage the pace bowlers who are included in the squad. They are to play with one specialized spinner along with three fast bowlers, unlike the past

where they used two specialized spinners. The inclusion of Dhananjaya de Silva in the team will be an added advantage, as he will play a pivotal role as an all-rounder.

Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) is awaiting the final feedback from the COVID Task Force, whether they could make some slight adjustments to their earlier stipulated health conditions to accommodate the Bangladesh team as per schedule. After the intervention of the Sports Minister Namal Rajapaksa's, a SLC delegation comprising President Shammi Silva, Secretary Mohan de Silva, CEO Ashley de Silva and other officials met Shavendra Silva, Army Commander and Chairman of the Presidential Task Force last Wednesday to discuss the viability of commencing the scheduled tour. He is likely to come out with a favorable reply within the next few days.

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) rejected the terms and conditions communicated by SLC pertaining to COVID-19 pandemic precautions, including the 14-day quarantine, which they wanted to be pruned down to a week last Monday.

If you look at the average of countries in South East Asia, the tax-to-GDP ratio is even lower than 15%—a level that is now wide-

ly regarded as the minimum required for sustainable development. It should also be noted that countries in developing Asia continue to face rather volatile tax yields with large variability across time."

Asakawa said due to decreasing tax revenues and increasing expenditures as a result of the pandemic, many of the developing members have little room to increase their external debt further.

'Ban on footwear imports must to sustain local shoe industry'

K Thomas expands with Rs 1.8 mn showroom in Nawam Mawatha



K Thomas new showroom in Nawam Mawatha

K Thomas a resounding Sri Lankan shoe brand which produces high quality footwear second to none in the world is making inroads in the Lankan market with the opening of its latest state of the art showroom in Nawan Mawatha recently, with an investment of Rs 1.8 million.

The quality of K Thomas shoes had been also acknowledged at the Footwear & Leather Fair 2020 held just before the corona outburst on February 9, 2020, adjudged the Most Attractive Product for its shoes made of Ostrich

The late K Thomas, founder of the business, said to be the best cobbler Lanka has ever produced served as an orthopedic shoe technician at Colombo General Hospital Orthopedic Clinic. He first produced orthopedic shoes for disable soldiers of the armed forces. This legacy is now carried forward by his wife and three sons in partnership, producing trade shoes to cater to the local market. The specialty of the fully Lankan owned shoe company Asiri Lanka Pvt Ltd situated in Ranmuthugala Kadawatha is that 90 percent of the raw material used for production is sourced from Sri Lankan and only genuine leather is being used for shoe production. In addition natural rubber and an environment friendly rubber called Polyurethane (PU) is used for the manufacture of shoe sole, said Director W K Ajith Perera. For the middle range market shoe category they use virgin PVC soles to cater to the requirements of the low price segment. Therefore, K Thomas branded shoes are produced in four categories with the high end shoe manufactured with pure leather including the sole. The middle category shoe range is made with a natural rubber shoe sole and the third category with Polyurethane sole and fourth category is manufactured with virgin PVC sole.

Perera said that the shoe category

with the Polyurethane (PU) sole is light in weight and ideally suits Sri Lankan conditions because it matches the country's climate and is ideal for office use. The shoe production is done in a

very systematic manner at its factory in Kadawatha. The factory produces about 24,000 pairs annually.

Perera said his company Asiri Lanka Pvt Ltd supply shoes to several areas in the country including Colombo, Kurunegala, Kandy, Galle, Gampaha and Kiribathgoda and also to group companies and his prime objective is to uplift the production quality to international standards and a technical upgrade is being carried out in the factory to achieve that target soon. The director said they have upgraded some items to international standards already and these items are on par with Italian shoes now and the Goodyear Welt tradition followed by their father K

Thomas is carried forward by him. Perera said the leather tanning is not getting the necessary encouragement and support from the government recalling that in the 90's there were plans to move the business to the Hambantota district but it did not happen with the cancellation of the project

despite UNIDO willing to assist with a water purification plant. It was then proposed to shift the project to Batticaloa. There too due to the objection of the Chief Minister the project had come to a halt. Then plans were mooted to take it to Puttalam, there too due to objections, the project never materialized. He said although citing environmental pollution there were objections to tanneries in Sri Lanka, there are about 300 tanneries in populated areas in India but they have taken measures to minimize pollution in India. Perera questioned as to why these measures could not be taken in Sri Lanka?

He said there are about 9 tanneries in the country mainly around Colombo and environment pollution can occur mainly during the soaking to wet glue process of hide and if a common water purification plant and foam recovery plant is established for all 9 tanneries and a common soaking unit is constructed, the pollution level could be brought down even lesser than 0.6 percent which is a acceptable pollution

occurrence according to UNIDO. Perera said the existing tanneries too were functioning under severe stress conditions engulfed by draconian laws and regulations and bureaucracy and red tape. For example he said the tannery maintained by Ceylon Leather Company in Mattakkuliya had to be shut down due to bureaucratic pressures despite the company investing a big amount in setting up a treatment

Perera said in the future they intend

to further improve certain standards to be on par with European requirements and introduce a conveyor system to their production line with an investment of Rs 2 million. With the fulfillment of this, he said they would be able to tap the overseas market very soon.

He said in the Corona period they had to lockdown the factory from March 17 till May 14. By this time he said they had lost all their orders and restarted production with a great deal of uncertainty. There was also a large stock of footwear piled up which were produced for the April festive season. At that point they were facing a huge crisis as they had not even received money for the previous sales done on credit basis. However he said that due to a decision taken by the government at that point which was to suspend the imports of all goods in to the country, there was a sudden big demand for their products. By the end of June, all orders which had come to a standstill during the lockdown began to flow in

and even the unpaid dues gradually started to flow in. By the end of July they began to receive all orders similar to the pre covid period. Furthermore he said shoe industry stakeholders also during this time made big investments to the magnitude of Rs 50 to 60 million to go into new products taking into account the ban on footwear products

into the country particular deck shoes. He said on July 15 a delegation of about 30 footwear producers had met the additional secretary of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce for a discussion and 27 of them requested for the extension of the suspension of shoe imports into the country.

However despite this understanding by July 17, authorities had decided to reopen five HS Codes (6401/6402/6403/6404 and 6405) that covers all categories of footwear enabling traders to recommence imports into the country. This decision will adversely affect the local footwear industry, he said.

ADB to establish Regional Hub to help Economies improve domestic resource

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) is establishing a regional hub to promote knowledge sharing and strengthen cooperation on tax policy and tax administration across economies in Asia and the Pacific and their development

"I firmly believe that one of the keys to success in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in a world reshaped by COVID-19 (coronavirus disease) will lie in strengthening domestic resource mobilization (DRM) and international tax cooperation (ITC)," said ADB President

Masatsugu Asakawa in a seminar held yesterday at ADB's 53rd Annual Meeting.

The Regional Hub on DRM and ITC will focus on promoting DRM and ITC through close collaboration among finance and tax authorities of developing economies; international organizations such as the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), and the World Bank; and regional tax associations.

Despite many developing economies having maintained strong

and steady gross domestic product (GDP) growth in recent years, tax yields have not increased proportionately. Even prior to the pandemic, many economies did not achieve a minimum tax yield of 15% of GDP—a level now widely regarded as the minimum required for sustainable development. The COVID-19 pandemic has worsened the situation due to increased pressure on economies' expenditures and a decrease in tax revenue, leaving little room to further increase external borrow-

Participants in the seminar dis-

cussed how governments must balance efforts to raise tax revenues and promote investments that can contribute to a robust recovery from the pandemic, and the need to earn the trust of taxpayers while seeking to increase the tax base. To improve tax yields in a fair and equitable manner, governments must also cooperate more closely, including to manage aggressive tax planning and combat tax evasion. This requires a higher level of participation in international initiatives such as the Inclusive Framework on BEPS (base erosion and profit

shifting) and the Global Forum on Transparency and Exchange of Information for Tax Purposes.

The regional hub will serve multiple functions such as institutional and capacity development, including the exchange of information; knowledge sharing across partners, international financial institutions, bilateral revenue organizations, and developing economies; and collaboration and development coordination across development partners. It will be an open and inclusive platform, with a focus on South-South policy dialogue.

We know the coronavirus pandemic has led to an increase in air quality all around the world. Lockdowns have resulted in factories and roads shutting, thus reducing emissions. But why wait for a pandemic to clear our skies? Why don't we make it a lifestyle? Policy makers really need to give this problem serious thought.

"The City of Colombo should be developed and transformed into a city which is healthy to live, work or play. The quality of the air we breathe needs to be improved. There is a very large commuting population in Colombo, as such so many vehicles and people come into the city every day. To ensure a better-quality environment, with less carbon emissions and good air to breathe, it is of utmost importance to improve the public transport network. It will be useful to encourage electric vehicles into the city with better infrastructure for them," said Gunawardena.

When it comes to Post Covid19, almost every country is still finding its feet. The new state of affairs requires social distancing. Packed buses are strongly discouraged. This might encourage private transportation which could work against reducing pollution. Even radio stations have reported that once more our streets are becoming congested. People have been strongly advised to stay away from large gatherings. For the time being urban parks and open public spaces will see fewer numbers.

"With the correct vision, it is not difficult to make Colombo more of a Green City. Improving public transportation, encouraging clean energy will reduce the pollution and the urban heat island effect. The control and balance of density, urban parks and open public spaces, pedestrian walkways are also of utmost important. Less hard concrete pavements, and more soft landscaping and trees would be ideal to combat the harsh climate and the heating up of the urban environment. According to the United Nations Environment Program, buildings and their construction together account for 36 percent of global energy use and 39 percent of energy-related carbon dioxide emissions annually. It is therefore, the responsibility of the Architect and allied professionals to be conscious of Global Warming, and the Energy Crisis and to align themselves with the Sustainable Development Goals adopted by the United

Gunawardena.

Covid19 has certainly opened our eyes to working from home. This too can contribute to less traffic on the road and less pollution since we don't really need to go to the office and do our work. We can use email and internet. Gunawardena of course sunports decentralization in Sri Lanka. However, for Decentralization to work she points out that job opportunities, education and health services all need to be of equal or better standards in the suburbs. That will definitely reduce congestion on the roads in the City. It will also develop the suburbs. People there will have easy access to schools.

"More pedestrianized places would be good. Places for pedestrians to actually walk without getting knocked down, preferably tree-lined streets and pedestrian boulevards. Once public transport is improved, which includes bus, rail, light rail & ferry, the parking problem will be less. However, this will require an attitude shift in users as well as providers, where people of any walk of life would use public transport respectfully. When this is done, park and rides in the periphery of the city will be effective. In addition, some multi-story carparks could be made available," she pointed out.

Gunawardena also added that Colombo is definitely a bustling city by day, and dead by night. One is afraid to walk down the streets of Colombo after dark for fear of being mugged, harassed or picked-up. Once public transport is improved, night markets and street cafes will be

accessible to the common public. Currently, Galle Face Green is one of the very few inclusive public spaces.

She feels that ten years from now, very little will be different. Colombo will have many more isolated highrise buildings, aspiring to have a skyline similar to that of the developed world, and one which lacks

identity and sense of place. When asked what in her opinion is on the main impediments to the evolution of Architecture in Sri Lanka, she pointed out that globalization and the unlimited access to materials and technology, without verification for its suitability to our climate is a huge impediment. We are creating glass boxes from without and cooling heavily from within thus, depleting the energy resource of our nation unnecessarily. Often, the architectural trend is to be 'global' at the expense of being tropical. It is also important to look at more sustainable materials, and harness our resources responsibly, rather than opting for all imported resources which increases the carbon foot print. It is the responsibility of the Architect and Urban Designers to address all aspects of Sustainability - Environment, Economic & Social Sustainability when implementing development projects.

"Installation of solar power after a building is designed and in operation is not the ideal. Passive design strategies need to be used, to first cut down on the energy demand, and then look at alternate technologies. Purely depending on solar for energy may not be feasible for large building complexes, however, effective use of

solar technologies can contribute to a considerable cost saving in the long run. Optimizing solar gain in a country which has sunlight throughout the year, and incorporating new solar technologies will definitely be beneficial," said Gunawardena.

After lockdown, places like Marino Mall and Colombo City Center are now opening their doors once more. CCC was opened up around December 2018. Gunawardena pointed out that this trend in Mall Architecture is referred to by some architectural historians as Architectures of Consumption. It is an international building typology which has gained much controversy. It is a trend which was invented in United States less than sixty years ago which spread quickly around the world. It is a trend which harbors consumerism, and a specific lifestyle, which does not necessarily promote and foster cross cultural and community interaction. In comparison, in the yesteryears, a marketplace in a city fosters much human interac-

She pointed out that Port City will have its challenges. With the status of the Global Economy, it definitely has its challenges she says. She added that what the country needs is a stable National Vision. Without political stability and a National Vision, attracting investors will be a grueling task. Therefore, to live up to the expectation of being the Wonder of Asia, is not impossible, but a tall order. With convening of the new Parliament it will be interesting to see the course Sri Lanka takes into the near future.

SCIENTISTS CREATE 3D-PRINTED BUILDINGS FROM SOIL

cientists have developed a method to 3D-print greener buildings using local soil that they say has the potential to revolutionise the construction industry.

The technology is designed to be a sustainable alternative to concrete, which accounts for approximately 7% of carbon dioxide emissions, according to the Inter-

national Energy Agency. Sarbajit Banerjee, a professor of chemistry and materials science and engineering at Texas A&M University, said 3D printing enabled a versatility that allowed them to print entire architectural facades, although getting such structures to meet existing building regulations remained a significant challenge. Concrete remains the primary material used in many construction projects but it cannot be recycled and

requires a lot of energy to mix and transport. The research team's aim is to print structures using the type of soil that can be found in any garden. "While the widespread use of concrete has democratised access to housing and enabled the growth of cities, this has come at a considerable

environmental cost," said Banerjee. "The move to 3D-print concrete threatens to exacerbate this problem. However, we envision a new paradigm of construction that uses naturally sourced materials. Using such materials will further pave the way for building designs that are specifically adapted to the needs of local climates,

instead of cookie-cutter houses. 'We see this as a means of providing dignified habitats to some of the neediest populations across the world."

What's more, the use of local materials would reduce the need to transport concrete long distances, further reducing the environmental impact of the buildings.

The research team's plan to replace concrete with the earth beneath our feet depends on their ability to improve soil's load-bearing capabilities, to which Banerjee said they "are making excellent pro-

Once they have a clearer idea of the limits of the technology, Banerjee and his team plan to investigate how it might allow for building on other planets.

'We see this research not just as a means of replacing concrete but allowing for construction in difficult environments. For instance, we have worked on addressing the problem of building all-weather roads in the subarctic. [The technology] could one day be used beyond Earth, to create settlements on the moon or even Mars."

uman curiosity cannot abide by a vacuum and so speculation and legend made good the lack of fact even to the point of speculating that he did not write the play she wrote. This is because not much was know about William Shakespeare. This was partly because the material which might have filled the void has not survived or existed. Or it could have been an elaborate conspiracy to overlook his early works. This was a time that writing was unexciting and its creators not important. That was the attitude and perhaps Shakespeare would have been frustrated over his efforts. Shakespeare of course did enter the public world six times a week in the season as an actor. But despite the best efforts of Victorian scholarship to discover or invent a unity between his life and work, the images give each of us of Shakespeare differ. Setting aside apocryphal tales such as that relating to Shakespeare's alleged poaching from Sir Thomas Lucy's property as a young man or the possibility of having been a Roman Catholic (which I refute from the beginning) because he was baptized, married and buried at Holy Trinity Church, Westminster, little also is known of Shakespeare other that his connection with his work. 

The plays of the next stage of Shakespeare's career reflect the influence of his excursion into non-dramatic poetry. His language was now capable of lyrical, courtly refinement. In this respect, RICHARD 11 forms a striking contrast with the earlier history plays. It is self consciously fascinated by language; by what it makes it possible and by what conceals.

Romeo and Juliet also belong to this period. The language here is more varied, with surging lyricism often giving way in an instant to more earthy language. As Shakespeare fused different idioms, so he juggled different genres. Romeo and Juliet may be a tragedy but it flirts with the opposite. It was normally expected that tragic characters be princes or rulers; the Montagues and Capulets are just well-

to-do. The whole set-up of two young lovers from opposite families is the natural stuff of comedy. Yet, this play has been accepted as the greatest romance of all.

To Shakespeare, tragedy is nothing like as important as comedy. During this period, he wrote six plays nonstop. The division period between the first half of the century and the second is hard to place precisely (to be contin-

Shakespeare's comedy is in a loose sense romantic both in its subject matter, but also in that he uses little satire. He was also disinclined to writer directly of the contemporary world. Unlike in many of plays, where everyday law applies and freedom of selfdiscovery do not, for an instant; the two forests and Portia's Belmont. Shakespeare tends to press beyond the normal limits of the genre he uses. Yet,

there is the possibility of the final limit of death. It is one of the features of Shakespeare's comedy that is often needed to invoke the possibility of death and loss.

Shakespeare used a chorus before every act, almost as if trying to shape the material and critic response to it. A sense of an ending had to be found out of the material of history by its nature. There was no reason for it to stop at all as the conclusion of a history play can only be contingent. The division between the first half of Shakespeare's career and the second is hard to place precisely. The turn of the century was the useful maker. The Privy Council of the moment banned the publication of verse satire, so the theatre reaped the benefit as the satirists become more popular with the public and turned to drama. This changed the theatrical scene and so did the resurgence of the

It was a late start, however,

English history no longer figured in his tragedy other than a bit in King Lear. Shakespeare, by now had used up the best material, dwelling into ancient Britain. Determined as he was to expose especially British history, he continued to do so in a broader sense. Although the first folio divided Shakespeare's plays into tragedy, history and comedy the dividing lines very clear in King Lear and Macbeth. Here, he owes something to Holinshed's Chronicles from which Shakespeare culled material for the English histories while the three Roman histories Julies Caesar, Antony and Cleopatra and Coriolanus. In watching the Roman plays, the contemporary audience would have to make allowances for the cultural differences especially between the English monarchy and the Roman Empire as found in the plays. They are at the opposite end of the scales of value.

In his other plays, we encounter fullblown conflict between utterly different systems of values, the bonds of traditional loyalties and the rigid treatment given to some characters are utterly irregular.

HAMLET, however, stands apart as the greatest tragedy he ever penned, moves forward in a sequence of astonishments, unfailing, however familiar. The play endures, not simply for its wisdom or acted excitements; but because though he is by no means Everyman, there is at least a trace of Hamlet in all us.

Shakespeare was also famous for his Soliloquies; "The time is out of joint. Whatever I was born to set it right' (1.5) This (1,530 lines in the uncut text) is the longest part in Shakespeare, Soliloquies: O' that this too solid flesh would melt' (1.2); 'O, what a rouge and peasant slave as I; (11.2). 'To be or not to be' (111.1) 'How all occasions do inform against me' (IV.4)

Many writers such as Ben Johnson wrote for different companies. The diaries of Philip Henslow, the theatrical impresario suggested the kind of frenzied conditions under which a lot of work must have been produced. There was a huge turnover of scripts many of which were written at high speed and collaboratively.

Shakespeare by comparison enjoyed an unusually stable relationship with one company.

In the early stages of his career, he worked with different companies though he was one of the leading members of the Lord Chamberlain's Men. When the Company moved its Base to London from the Theatre north of the City down to the Globe and south of the river, Shakespeare became a shareholder in the Company. This may reflect his talent or it may simply be that he was able to raise the cash to buy his share. He remained with the Company until it was named King's Men in 1603.





A gimpse into Tamil literature

hort novels in Tamil were immensely popular, some half a century ago in our country. The late S Yoganathan was one writer who brought out five novella inn one book. It was titled "Oli Namakku Vendum' (We Need Light). That's the underlining theme, but not a single story by the title is included in the book.

The tiles of the stories are 'Twenty Years and Three Desires', 'A word called Comradeship', 'Janaki', 'That Day Should Come', and 'Thiruchittambalam'. They were all written between 1963 and 1972.

The '60s brought into the fore a host of Tamil medium graduates who excelled in the field of writing. Yoganathan was one of them. As a student at Peradeniya, he brought out a collection of short stories in 1964. I remember my speaking at the launch of the book. Some of these graduates got into the SLAS.

Among them, the following became noticeable writers: S. Yoganthan, S. Kathirgamanathan, A. Kailsanathan, K. Gunarasa (Sengai Aaliyaan), A Rajagopal (Sembian Selvan), K Navasothy, and Muthu Sivagnanam. Prof A Shanmugadas is the only living person now.

But not all writers were alive to the contemporary situation or were they capable of compre-

hending their immediate environment and society. This was understandable as they were little more than their teenagers.

Most singled-out University life as a separate experience and indulged in cynical or pessimistic harbouring.

Undergraduates like Yoganathan and Kathrgamanathan, however, saw 'varsity life as something like the larger life outside. The conflicts within the campus were conflicts in the city itself. Yoganathan understood this and brought in typical characters in his wring to prove his point. Both had a Marxist approach to litera-

Discouraging self-centeredness, a part of the individualistic trend and emphasizing the need for collective struggle to bring in social justice, need for educational reforms to suit the changing society, the urgency to frame conservative behaviour - it is these that are seen in Yognathan's novellas.

In his novella 'Janaki', a Brain girl throws away conservatism aside to adapt herself to earn a living, not only for herself but also for her widowed mother. The vociferous brother of her had already thrown away his rituals, to become a cleaner in a lorry. Janaki had to learn what life was by joining a nurse's training school, where her mentor was a girl from the depressed class.

If conservatism and hypocrisy are attacked in this story, the writer in 'Twenty Years and three Desires 'is bringing in through a dialogue between different temperamental people in the campus, a consciousness for social reality. The characters are all typical University students. Dhammica (daughter of a middle-class peasant), Sumanadaa (son of an old woman who earns a living by working in a building site), Dharmapala (a son of a farmer) and Sivakumar (son of a petty shopkeeper) represent different social strata, race, temperament, and ideas. Selfishness and insular thinking meet a tragic ending, particularly when the broader and united effort is required to bring good to the underprivileged. This is obvious in the novella. Here I the writer's analytical realism as Raymond Williams would have meant it, ad not photographic realism.

The solidarity theme is recurring in the other story called 'A Word Called Comradeship'. As said earlier the need for more realistic educational policy I called for in the fourth novella called 'That Day Should Come'.

The last novelette, 'Thiruchittambalam' is again calling for a positive attitude towards life a discourages Self-pity.

This was the tone in the early part of the '70s, but in 2020, the trend in Lankan Tamil writing has progressed amazingly fast.

kiko Obata has been fascinated by plastic food ever since she was a child, and 10 years ago she started collecting all sorts of plastic food items, amassing a collection of over 8,000 individual pieces.

"Sampuru", the fake food displays used by most restaurants to showcase their dishes to potential diners, is an important part of Japanese food culture. They are considered superior to menus, as they give customers a much better idea of what they'll be getting on their plates, and also help restaurant owners better showcase their dishes. Sampuru makers often go above and beyond to make their products as realistic as possible, and some do really look good enough to eat. Plastic foods are so popular in Japan that some people have actually started collecting them.

Akiko Obata, arguably the world's most committed plastic food collector, fell in love with Sampuru over 30 years

ago, when her sister brought home a number of discarded fake food displays from the restaurant she was working in. They all looked so deliciously real, and she found them mesmerizing. However, she only started collecting plastic food items 15 years ago, and in 2015 she had already bagged the Guinness World Record for the largest collection of prepared food related items.

Obata, who lives near Narita Airport, in Chiba Prefecture has a soft spot for plastic desserts, but her impressive collection features all kinds of dishes, from several styles of burgers and pizzas, to spaghetti complete with suspended forks, and traditional Japanese foods like sushi.

"Replicas are not real food, but I truly respect how each of them are made to look so real," the collector told Design Made in Japan.

Obata has a whole room in her home dedicated to her record-setting plastic food collection, and claims that it took Guinness representatives an entire day to go through all her 8083 items. While some are life-size representations of various dishes, others, like foodshaped key-chains, are tiny.

Nullabor Links is an 8-hole par-72 golf course that stretches along the Eyre Highway, from Kalgoorlie in Western Australia to Ceduna in South Australia. Nullabor Links consists of 7 holes from existing courses and 11 holes created at roadhouses and road stops along Eyre High-

The average distance between holes is 66 kilometers, and the longest distance between two consecutive holes is about 200 kilometers.

Playing a hole, then getting in a car and driving 150 kilometres



and then playing another hole, in a golfing event that spans over five days on average is a concept that many don't understand, but those who have completed the Nullabor Links course will tell you that it is an experience like no other.

Driving 1,365 kilometers along the Australian coast gives players the opportunity to experience Australian culture and attractions, and for many the competition alone is worth the time an effort. Those who want bragging rights, can buy a a score card purchased in Kalgoorlie or Ceduna, and after presenting the completed card they can claim a Nullarbor Links

Certificate for playing "the World's Longest Golf course".

Unfortunately, because of the Covid19 pandemic, the border between Western and Southern Australia is closed, so the Nullabor Links course cannot be complained. However, management hopes to reopen the world's longest golf course "as soon as possible".

TO THE SHAREHOLDERS OF ARPICO FINANCE COMPANY PLC

REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the financial statements of Arpico Finance Company PLC ("the Company"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2020, and the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 March 2020, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAušs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by CA Sri Lanka (Code of Ethics), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters

Allowance for impairment of leases, loans and receivables

As at 31 March 2020, 72% of its total assets of the company consisted of Net investment in leases and hire purchase and Loans and receivables from customers amounting to LKR 9,633,656,584 (Note 25 and 26), net of impairment allowance of LKR 1,292,934,588 (Note 25 and 26).

Recognition of expected credit loss (ECL) under SLFRS 9, is a complex accounting policy which requires considerable judgement in its implementation. ECL is dependent on management judgements in assessing the level of credit risk and classification of credit facilities in to various stages, determine when a default has occurred, determining probability of default (PD) of customers, estimating cash flows from recovery procedures or realisation of collateral and the impact of outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic on the economically impacted customers and key assumptions used in ECL model.

Due to the significance of Financing facilities and the related estimation uncertainty and judgement in the impairment calculation, this was considered as a key audit matter

How the matter was addressed in our audit

Our audit procedures to assess impairment of leases and hire purchase and Loans and receivables from customers included the following:
