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Sri Lanka second in COVID-19 prevention report

Sri Lanka has been ranked second out of 108 countries in terms of COVID-19 prevention measures, economic recovery and international cooperation according to a survey report issued last week by a Chinese Research Institute.

The Chinese Embassy issuing a press release yesterday said the survey was conducted by 'YICAI' Research Institute, a Chinese finan-

cial think tank founded in 2003. According to the analysis of the report, Sri Lanka has been ranked number three when it comes to 'fighting against the pandemic', number 12 when it comes to 'economic recovery' and number 33 in terms of

'international cooperation'. As per the overall score China has been ranked first, while the US has

been ranked 98th. India has been Vietnam and Cambodia. Ghana placed in the 45th position.

"As the report revealed, nine out of the top 10 countries were in the Asia-Pacific region namely China, Sri Lanka, South Korea, Myanmar, Australia, Thailand, New Zealand,

from Africa ranked in the third place. Denmark and Germany performed best among European countries, ranked 21st and 23rd. Brazil and the US, both countries with leaders who initially downplayed

the problem and with lower levels of co-operation by the public, respectively ranked 89th and 98th. Sweden, which opted for the controversial policy of herd immunity, came in at number 90," the release by the Embassy said. TO PAGE **02**

The evaluation system including 23 detailed indicators had made a quantitative evaluation of the performance of 108 countries in the war against COVID-

"Countries with strict epidemic prevention policies, such as China, Sri Lanka, South Korea and

Italy, all had the pandemic under control in recent months, the models showed, which based their calculations on earlier disease trajectories and with the assumption that asymptomatic cases continued to be present.

"Until an effective vaccine is widely available, the novel coronavirus will coexist with humans, the report concluded. Effective governance that responds quickly using technological means and which can depend on public support is an effective strategy to deal with the pandemic," the release added.



Testifying before the Presidential Commission of Inquiry probing Easter Sunday carnage on Friday (26) he said that if he had known that an attack was imminent, he could have sealed off several parts of the country and carried out a oppressive attack to nab the suicide bombers.

He pointed out that a lot could have been done by informing the traffic sector, deploying vehicle safety and creating emergency check points, and told the Commission that they could have executed an 'offensive offence' in such a special

At that time a test blast had been carried out in Batticaloa. Unfortunately, the information received on April 20 was not shared with the Special Security Forces, he said.

I requested from Law and Order Ministers Ruwan Wijewardene, Ranjith Maddumabandara and former Secretaries Padmasiri Jayamanne and Jagath Wijeweera to allow the STF to participate in the National Security Council.

The IGP was informed. The STF carries out underworld drug and criminal operations throughout the island. We had been called before to the Security Council. However, the President did not take the necessary steps to summon us until the attack.

end of raw information. Accordingly, the April 4 information received from a foreign intelligence source is clearly intelligence. It also had clear information on how to act on it and carry out an operation. The very fact that any information is referred to as 'Top Secret' suggests that it is in the process of being confirmed as intelligence," he said.

The Commission asked if there was a possibility of arresting suspects by the officers of the State Intelligence Service at present?

He said that as an intelligence officer is also a police officer, that officer has the power to arrest a suspect. In many parts of the world,

there is currently a separate law on intelligence,

although an environment has been created in which intelligence officers do not engage in operational duties in an active background, 90% of the police officers present in the State Intelligence Service as an intelligence officer in this country has the power to arrest a suspect, he said.

As examples he pointed out that, during a recent robbery at the Colombo National Hospital, two State Intelligence officers were called in to arrest the suspect and a STF team was also deployed to search for explosives in the Wanathawilluwa area.

When STF officers request the deployment of teams when a senior officer makes a verbal or written request to me. Also, even in an environment where there is a legal framework for a circular not to directly contact the State Intelligence Service instead of contacting through the IGP, at the direct request of the Director of the State Intelligence Service, their officers have been directed to carry out operations," he said.


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ANGAMPORA: REVIVING AN ANCIENT MARTIAL ART

recision hand strikes coupled with swift foot movements and defiant chants are all part of an ancient combat tradition of Sri Lanka. Over the past decade, there has been a steady rise and great interest in the form of fighting known as Angampora. It is a lifestyle that was part of our rich heritage for centuries. Its robust adherents displayed a lifetime of fidelity to this martial art that incorporated combat strikes, meditation, ayurvedha and a respectful bonding with ones teacher (guru).

The term 'Angampora' is derived from two words in Sinhalese- anga meaning body and pora meaning to attack (fight). During the glorious and prosperous rule of Sri Lankan kings, this martial art focused on three segments- angampora (unarmed hand-to-hand combat), elangampora (weapons) and maya angam (use of incantations to repulse an enemy). The ancient chronicle Varga Purnikawa has recorded that the fighting technique was taught by nine hermits. Angampora incorporates a system of locks and grips, strikes and blocks (18 defensive strikes) and nerve point attacks which often leaves the enemy paralyzed.

Centuries ago, angampora had played a vital role in the strategic defence of our nation, which might come as a surprise to some who are accustomed to reading about combat with modern firearms. During the reign of King Bhuvanekabahu VI of Kotte, certain areas of Sri Lanka were under attack from the Portuguese, who had already arrived on the island.

History reveals that King Bhuvanekabahu had a team of expert angampora warriors within his combined army of about 4,000 soldiers. There was an important battle that took place at Mulleriyawa in 1562. The Portuguese under the command of Major Jorge Menezes were hoping to mount an attack on the large stockade at Mapitigama, from the southern side of the Kelani River.

When the king got wind of the impending attack, he divided his troops into three sections, with his son leading the main strike force with cavalry troops. Elephants were also used in this attack. The brave soldiers of Sitawaka stormed directly into the wooded area and the Portuguese opened fire. But they didn't have time to reload their muskets (a long muzzle loading gun). It was then that our angampora fighters jumped into action, beating up the bewildered Portuguese who had probably not seen this form of swift unarmed combat. The foreigners fled with heavy casualties. By 1815, the British gradually wielded their influence over most of Ceylon. Before this, our angampora warriors had managed to inflict pain and death on the invading British, by putting up pockets of resistance

to British platoons. Subsequently, Governor Robert Brownrigg realized the threat to his troops from this martial art, and sent out a decree whereby angampora masters were located and shot in the knee, making them disabled. Moreover it was a deep insult to their honour in society.

During 1817, the Governor banned the use and learning of angampora. A gazette notice was published bringing the ban into full effect. Shortly, angam madu (training halls) were abandoned. The British assumed that this would put an end to the practice of this feared art. However, Sri Lankans being a resilient people practised in secret and sustained this art in remote villages.



Angampora was taught by two main clans Sudaliya and Maruwalliya. In 1948, after the British were compelled to leave our island, the martial art made its resurgence from Beligala Korale, in Kegalle.

One of the present-day masters of this fighting lineage is Piumal Edirisinghe. A practitioner of the art for 25 years, Piumal learnt the basics from his late grandfather. He explained, "I developed an interest in angampora as a child. My maternal grandfather was a famous ayurvedha practitioner named Mudalihamy Warnasuriya. He taught me when I was 12 years old. Since then I studied under many famous masters including Premasiri Malimbadaarachchi, Athula and Charles Warnasuriya, Wickremesinghe and Karunapala."

"Angampora is not just a martial art. It is a lifestyle. In the ancient days, aspiring students offered fruits and betel leaves along with their horoscope to the master. The master would observe their body language and character. They would then check the student's horoscope and only if satisfied, enlist them for training. The apprentice would commence his or her training with the lighting of three oil lamps. The student stayed at the residence of the master and did chores for him. Today, we live in modern times. We don't focus much on horoscopes. But we seriously check each student's character which is tested during the first three months of train-

Honesty, compassion, endurance and a friendly disposition are key qualities we look for. In

points emphasizing that the student must complete training, use the skill for self-defence only, be humble and discreet, not use it to gain wealth, and be willing to serve the country when required."

We can assume that unarmed fighting techniques, later supplemented by bladed weapons originated in South East Asian countries. Our neighbor India has many ancient forms of martial arts. Silambam is a swift fighting style. Varma Kalai is another form combining yoga and martial arts. Kalari is the feared fighting style of Kerala, with its famous Chekavar warriors. The Sikhs of Punjab practised Gatka, a combat art using wooden staffs.

Angampora training has an assortment of exercises focusing on strengthening the tendons and on spiritual purity. After two years of training in unarmed combat, the student is given his first weapon - a

long staff. Practising with the staff improves foot movement and agility. The student is then given a basic blade weapon like a sword. In ancient times, it was said that the angampora fighter learnt to use 64 weapons, which included 32 types of swords. One can imagine the time and commitment to such a lifetime of learning.


A fighter would have to have excellent stamina to rapidly wield such heavy weapons. Our ancient warriors ate a healthy *kurakkan* based diet with many vegetables. They occasionally drank some kitul toddy. Eating certain meats was prohibited to students in ancient times.

At present most masters in Sri Lanka teach within a range of 21 weapons, with focus on seven main weapons. These are the staff, sword, dagger, axe, mace, belt sword and spear. It will take a lifetime of training to master all 21 weapons. During the bygone centuries making a sword was taken seriously by the blacksmith. Once completed it is believed that a king's sword was washed in milk and the combatant's sword washed in the blood of an animal. It was a symbolic gesture. In angampora there are no belt

systems or badges of proficiency. After many years of demanding training (usually 12 years) the faithful student graduates with the title of praveena- a qualified exponent of angampora. This ceremony of achievement known as a helankada mangalaya is the apex moment of the fully fledged fighter. Over the past few years members of the Sri Lankan Armed Forces have taken a keen interest to learn and sustain this art. Foreign tourists have also been beguiled by angampora displays at cultural events. Hopefully, the combat form of angampora

(v) Work towards early realisation of infrastructure and connectivity projects including in the sectors of Ports and Energy through close consultations as per the Bilateral Agreements and MoUs and strong commitment towards a mutually beneficial development cooperation partnership between the two countries.

(vi) Deepen cooperation in renewable energy with particular emphasis on solar projects under the US\$ 100 million Line of Credit from India.

(vii) Strengthen technical cooperation in

Draining the public service swamp

hat lawyers and Arabs live on dates used to be a pithy though rather impolite observation made tongue in cheek about the legal profession. If lawyers live on dates, government servants thrived on ARs and FRs. These are Administrative and Financial Regulations that animated the work of the public service.

Perhaps it's wrong to say that government servants thrived on ARs and FRs. Some who mastered them may have, but others detested these rules that they had to observe despite the fact that most would have had the inclination to do as they please. Public servants were caricatured as lovers of the rule book. They read chapter and verse from Circulars to hapless citizens who often trekked miles to fall at the feet of these petty panjandrums, in order to get various matters such as building approvals etc. attended to as required by laws or by-laws.

The President recently paid a surprise visit to the National Housing Development Authority where he came face to face with some apparently red tape loving public servants who were giving short shrift to the various ordinary folk who presented themselves at the NHDA hoping for some redress over routine grievances.

The issue of public administration Circulars has since then become front and centre in the public discourse, particularly after the president stated that all his verbal instructions should hereinafter be treated as official Circulars.

He added that the war would have never been won if there was reliance on administrative Circulars. The administrative service however is by and large not used to this order of doing business. To them public service has become a pasture upon which they seek to nurture their brood for seven generations to come, and then some.

It's why unemployed undergraduates depend on the government for public sector employment. They see a government servant's tenure as a ticket to a life of almost lotus-eating abandon. There was a time when matrimonial advertisements were thick with hopefuls claiming they hold this or that public service post, because such jobs were the greatest attributes that attracted wealthy and hopeful partners.

The advertisements may themselves be somewhat muted in this day and age, but the matchmakers continue to flaunt the public service credentials of their marriagemarket hopefuls.

So it's an issue of mentality, where the government service is seen by the bureaucrats and the lower level administrative clerks and others on the State payroll as happy hunting grounds for lucrative paychecks, in exchange for the least amount of work.

The president has to change that mentality and his first approach has been to target the reliance on written instructions or the notorious Circulars that are the fall-back for all the State service panjandrums and their minions to drive away pesky individuals who have come to them as supplicants for some sort of public service facility, such as a license or a routine authorization. 'Come tomorrow,' or 'subject officer absent' are the favourite phrases trotted out by petty officialdom to excuse themselves from urgent public demands on their time.

When these don't work, they may rely on Circulars or some other administrative esoterica to shirk their duties. It is a jungle out there for lovers of red tape, a forest in which they like to get lost every day and emerge at 4 pm when they depart for the day, perhaps stopping for a tipple on the way to mull over how many hapless folk they managed to stave off during their eight hours with their expert reliance on 'Circulars' and other administrative edicts.

The common sense here is that the president is not dealing with groups of sporadic shirkers. He is trying to right the wrongs that have been inculcated as a mindset over generations of public service shirking by those who treat State employment as a guarantor of eternal leisure, and good pay.

But mindsets can change, and that at least should be the mindset of change-makers. The fact is that there are dedicated and principled public servants in the midst of the habitual shirkers. There must be ways to reward these and disempower the others who are inclined to harass the public

The spot checks carried out by the president are a good way of keeping public service employees on their toes, because the latter will literally have to be looking over their shoulder to see if the highest in the land is walking in, phone in hand, when they are interacting with taxpayers who have come to them in the expectation of proper responses to their problems.

The president however is unable to be omnipresent and even if he equips all public service institutions with CCTV cameras it's doubtful that there can be constant monitoring of everything, even if he deploys a unit delegated to that task.

To change mindsets, there has to be eternal vigilance among the public as well, and if the people band together and resolve that they will never bribe officials or tolerate bad behaviour from them, that would go a long way towards ensuring that the president's own striving for a public service that delivers, would have a meaningful and permanent outcome. Mindsets are likely to change when all stakeholders are active in holding the public service folks' feet to the fire in getting things done, and this includes the public who are the electors, and the elected who are trying to transform archaic systems that haven't changed one bit over the years.

REVIVING THE AILING PUBLIC SERVICE



ast week the entire country saw on television what happened in one of the public offices located in Narahenpita. It was a very pathetic scene. A woman who had been forced to undergo severe difficulties by this state office staff had the courage to make a formal complaint about her plight. The most pathetic scene was outside the office. A man in a wheelchair who visited the same office for redress described his bitter experience to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa who paid a surprise visit there. The entire country witnessed it. The reality of the Sri Lankan Public Service displayed on television within a few minutes.

This shows the pathetic situation of the most of Sri Lankan state institutions that are obliged to offer their services to the public. If we walk along the roads or visit anywhere in the country, we cannot find anyone who praises our public service. All praise the public service only for one specific fact. That is the priceless benefits you get if you join the public service no matter how or when. This is the only admirable fact we hear about our public service.

Another historical Circular issued by the Government to the Grama Niladhari fraternity last week informed them to remain at their respective offices from 8.30 am to 4.15 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays and also on Saturday till 12.30 pm. This is a historical move taken by the Government for the first time. This is because a People's President and Prime Minister are ruling the country at this moment. This move taken by the President and the Government is adequate to judge the real intention of the President and the Government and the future of mother Lanka. It is ensuring the wellbeing of the often harassed common man from the poorer sections of society. It is making their life easy and happy. This aspect is enshrined in 'Vistas of Splendour', the Government's National Policy document.

How can any Sri Lankan working at a semi-Government or private sector institution meet the Grama Niladhari on a heavy working day like Tuesday and Thursday before evening? Saturday is a half working day for most of the private companies but it is possible to obtain a half day on a day like Saturday. Even a half day is like a coin of gold for some private sector employees because they only have 21 days of leave or 28 days of leave for the entire year. They do not have 42 days of leave plus three months of vacation like Government school teachers. Therefore making sure that the Grama Niladhari is available till 12.30 pm on Saturdays is a highly commendable people friendly move.

Before introducing this new circular, most of the Grama Niladharis were not available at their offices most of the time and there was no one to complain to. There was no point of complaining. Most of the time they ask people to come on another day or visit the divisional secretariat in order to obtain redress or seek the the service requested by the person. Most of the time it is the approval of the Divisional Secretary.

The common man abhors the majority of public offices because they do not get the required service satisfactorily and not because they know the benefits received by Sri Lankan public servants. If these innocent ordinary people know the benefits enjoyed by public servants, they will not only hate public servants but they will go beyond that when they are subjected to various hardships by them without offering the service they request.

It is better to talk about the very recent COVID-19 affected last six months. All public



hardship at the hands of negligent officers on a surprise visit to the establishment last week.

servants received their entire salary along with all the other benefits during this period and they did not feel much hardship. Even they did not need to pay loan installments. Their 42 days of leave entitled for the year remain as it is and not even a single day cut off considering around the five months they stayed at home. COVID-19 became only a fully paid extraordinarily long vacation for them.

When state and private institutions gradually started to function again, the state sector offered another set of benefits for their employees. Some state ministries located in Colombo offered free up and down transport for their employees who reside in Colombo and outstations while many other state institutions did not ask their public servants to sign on and sign off formally as usual. This is how the state sector treated thepublic servants.

It was totally the opposite when it came to some semi-Government and private institutions. The very first thing done by these semi-Government and private institutions is asking their employees to report to work without providing transport. Some institutions provided transport only for a few days. Their second act was not paying any allowance for thousands of rupees spend on data to work from home online. The third and most cruel step is deducting the leave given to their employees for 2020. They cut it off by 50 percent and sometimes more, considering the number of months their employees worked from home. The workload done from home spending thousands of rupees on data was not considered at all as 'work'. Some employees have evidence for the workload they did online while some private sector employees do not have adequate proof to prove their months long hard work from home.

The most funny and unreasonable part is after re-commencing private and some semi-Government offices, they started to count the number of days employees reported to work from mid March to mid May, the hardest period of COVID-19. The offices started to say how good those employees are and how important they are. However these offices functioned due to the workload done online by thousands of private sector employees who always work on line no matter whether the offices are closed or open or whether they are working or on medical leave. Many private sector employees were discontinued by their employers despite all their efforts.

None of the above mentioned issues are in store for public servants. All those issues have an impact on some semi-Government employees and private sector employees. Unfortunately these employees offer the best service to the people while undergoing untold 'harassment' meted at them by their managements. They make themselves available for the people all the time and talk to people politely and

kindly. They do whatever possible to make people happy and satisfied. We all know whenever we visit a private office to obtain a service, they call us and update us if they are unable to do the job within a day.


There is no need to explain the experiences of people who visit public offices to obtain various services. Some websites of some public offices are not updated for years. Hotlines of some public offices are there to make people's blood boil. The calls are being sent around or just some recording played continuously when the hotline is dialled for an urgent matter.

The worst public offices are not located in Colombo or suburbs. They are located in outstations in Sri Lanka. If you visit one of those public offices located in the far corner of the country, you will see that there are few employees there. Every day one or two of them will be on leave. The few available employees come late, get themselves cleaned, get the make-up done, have breakfast and then tea, then have a regular chat with friends face to face and over the phone, then go and collect the child from school, then drop the child at the tuition class, leave office very early and the day goes on without serving the people. In addition to those daily routine, they have monthly alms giving, weddings, funerals and so on. They hardly have time to spend a few minutes and do the service asked of them by an innocent needy man or a woman who visits their office.

At the end of the month, they get their salary and all the other benefits no matter whether they serve the public or not. But if a private sector employee does the same, the next day someone else will be employed in his or her position and no need to wait for a month to see the repercussions. The private sector offers good services and good punishments.

There is a huge responsibility for all of us to make the required changes in the attitude of public servants. We, the people should not ignore whenever we undergo unnecessary hardships in a state office. We should not forget it. We have to take action. We have to inform the relevant top authorities about the incident.We should not be silent and mind our own business. It is a social service and we can collect merit by preventing another innocent poor person undergoing the same hardship on the next day. Take your phone. Dial the number now. Tell what you underwent, where and when. Take the pen and a piece of paper. Write it. Take a small envelope and write the address. Put it into a post box. Take a few minutes from your busy schedule and to write and email your experience to the relevant authorities. Send a fax. It will save valuable time and money of an innocent powerless villager who toils hard the whole day in a cultivation or a factory to eke out a daily wage to survive in these hard times.

LEGALLY SPEAKING, COMPETITION IS NOT CLEAR CUT



or those who see the Food City sign in remote towns and think it's their familiar Food City, only to find it's an imitation corner shop with a copycat sign, remember, you are falling for one of the oldest tricks in the book.

From giant Corporates to SMEs, there are business experts being flummoxed every now and then due to the dangers of 'passing off.'

Those who thought there is only one Pilawoos eatery now see hundreds of Pilawoos by the way-side, and no there's no official franchise. Imitators sprung up and took up the name, and the original establishment was either overwhelmed and didn't take action, or was supremely confident of its own stature that they thought imitation was the sincerest form of flattery.

But cases of 'passing off' in this way as an established business, aside from being a societal phenomenon-has been a legal minefield. No doubt there are litigants who succeed in staving off competitors.

But those who too jealously guard their businesses have found out the hard way that up to a point, similarities in branding can exist and that this is not necessarily a cause for shutting down your opponent in business.

In the liquor manufacturing business

- arrack to be precise - a

landmark case was fought between Randenigala Distilleries with Distilleries Co. Distilleries Co had secured a judgement in their favour that a case of passing off existed against Randenigala Distilleries, but the latter appealed to Supreme Court.

To be sure, by any businessman's yardstick for success, his branding should be his property. But there are obvious imitators who carry off copying other brands because they know how to pass off their brand as someone else's without making things too obvious. A good legal defence helps.

The party that sues has to establish that their brand has earned goodwill among the public.

Distilleries Co, had an established brand and that

Distilleries Co. had an established brand and that was acknowledged by the Supreme Court in Appeal.

Unfair competition is judged rather severely in Sri Lanka, at least in a legal reading of it. But, that does not mean that the law regarding such unfair trading practices is comprehensive. But Courts do take these matters seriously. The point that went against Distilleries Co. was that the Company seemed to litigate on the basis that mere copying or cut throat competition was good enough to win a case of 'passing off.'

But the Supreme Court Bench decided otherwise, overturning the Commercial High Court order. The courts citations were blunt to the point of being snide. In quoting a decided case, the Judges observed:. At the heart of passing off lies deception or its likelihood, deception of the ultimate consumer in particular...Never has the tort shown even a slight tendency to stray beyond cases of deception.

"After they copied our label and our name they have got very big profits", the Counsel for the Respondent Distilleries Co. alleged. The Court seems to scoff at the idea.

It is the goodwill of the Respondent's mark that may be protected under the law, and not acts of copying, the then Chief Justice Mohan Peiries wrote in judgment

The judges made a rather subjective judgement as they are entitled to, on the facts of the case. The Chief Justice in his judgement observed by placing themselves in the shoes of reasonably well informed consumer that, 'It is clear to this Court that looking at the overall characteristics of the two products, they are sufficiently distinct from each other to satisfy ourselves that the likelihood of confusion will be

The Judges went to the extent of determining that the bottles are generally displayed in shelves in wine stores, and that they are given when people ask for specific brands which meant that the labeling or similarity of labeling did not have much of an impact on the decision of the consumer to purchase one brand over another.

The registration of trademarks in Sri Lanka is governed by the Intellectual Property Act but that's a different story. Passing off is not only about trademarks but the similarity at various levels and the "get up' of the product.

It is all about perception one may say, and much like election symbols, the value of a trademark can vary. The Hand election symbol or the Elephant election symbol are not relevant anymore to the Sri Lankan voter who would vote on any symbol as long as that's associated with the two mainstream political trends of the day.

No person can acquire a trade mark which confers an exclusive right to use a name or word that is used in ordinary, everyday language and, simi-

larly, no person can, by alleging 'passing off', prevent another from using a name or word that is used in ordinary, everyday language. The principle is that, ordinary words should be available for use

"English Law does not, however, protect brands as such. It will protect goodwill (via the law of passing off); trade marks (via trade mark infringement) the use of particular words, sounds and images (via the law of copyright); and configuration of articles (via the law of unregistered design rights) and so on. But to the extent that a brand is greater than the sum of the parts that English law will protect, it is defenceless against the chill wind of competition.", the Supreme Court decided in Rani Grinding Mills vs. Swadeshi Industrial works.

Thus it was that the Samagi Jana Balawegaya was able to successfully use the colour green in its campaign material because nobody can have branded rights as such over a colour. The UNP decided to lodge a protest with the Elections Commissioner over the use of the green brand by the SJB, but didn't pursue the matter in Court.

So, in the said case of Distilleries Co.vs Randenigala Distilleries, it appears that the judge of the Commercial High Court did not go over the facts of the case but passed judgement on the basis of the similarity i.e. the spectacular copycat effort they thought the Randenigala Distilleries engaged in.

But it's remarkable the extent to which these devious practices of passing off and unfair competitiveness can impinge on business.



The 2020 edition also comes as governments look to the sector to drive recovery from the effects of the pandemic and with the enhanced recognition of tourism at the highest United Nations level. Rural areas hit hard by COVID-19

For countless rural communities around the world, tourism is a leading provider of employment and opportunities. In many places, it is one of the few viable economic sectors. Moreover, development through tourism can also keep rural communities alive. It is estimated that by 2050, 68 percent of the world population will live in urban areas, while 80 percent of those currently living in 'extreme poverty' live outside of towns and cities.

The situation is particularly hard for youth: young people in rural communities are three times more likely to be unemployed than older adults. Tourism is a life-

line, offering young people a chance to earn a living without having to migrate either within their home countries or abroad.

World Tourism Day 2020 will once again be celebrated by UNWTO's Member States in all global regions as well as by cities and other destinations and by private sector organizations and individual tourists.

It comes as communities in rural areas also struggle with the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

These communities are usually much less-prepared to deal with the short and longer-term impacts of the crisis. This is due to a number

Rural farmers to be protected by transparent procedures

Livestock and Farm Promotion and Dairy and Eggs Related Industries State Minister D.B. Herath took steps to provide immediate solutions to many problems faced by small and medium scale poultry farms at the rural level.

It has been decided to reduce the current maximum price of Rs. 250 per one-day-old chicken to Rs. 175.

It was revealed that middlemen in some cases were selling one-day-old chickens for more than Rs. 350 and so the State Minister instructed the Animal Production and Health Department to take immediate action to stop this.

Also, there were no reports in the Ministry or the Department on the distribution of calves from animal breeding farms to rural farms. The State Minister directed the Animal Production and Health Department to take steps to monitor it in a systematic manner and submit a report of the data to the Secretary to the Ministry. The distribution of calves at the local level from 34 breeding farms to

rural farms will in the future be properly recorded.

At present about 800,000 layers (laying hens) are released to poultry farms every month. About 80,000 hens are imported annually. It was agreed at the meeting to increase this number to 85,000. The Department was entrusted with the responsibility of preparing a quota system with the breeding farms in a transparent man-

The Minister focused on the measures that can be taken to protect the local rural poultry farms from the large-scale entrepreneurs. He said that checks and balances should be created to protect the poultry farm owner and the consumer.

The Secretary to the Ministry S. Senanayake, officials of the Department of Animal Production and Health, National Livestock Development Board, representatives of all poultry breeding farms and representatives of poultry farms were present

Kolitha excellent hooker and captain

A person who never thought of becoming a top Rugby player in his career was none other than Kolitha Gunatilleke, who ultimately turned out to be one of the brilliant players from school level who graduated to International level with some sterling performances

Kolitha well known as 'Koli' in the sporting circles is the son of famous businessman Thomas Gunathilleke, who was in the Pharmaceutical business since 1935. He has one brother Ananda Gunathilleke another sportsman and four sisters. He was a great product of S.Thomas College, Mount Lavinia and continued his studies as a hosteller in the Miller House,

He enrolled as a student at S. Thomas in the year 1971 at junior school and his school's career spanned up to 1981, where he completed his higher studies. He was very fond of engaging in Athletics at college and became a regular member of the 4x100 and 4x200 relay teams from the inception.

Thomians annexed the junior John Tarbet Shield in1976 held in Batticaloa in which he was a member. In 1978, when he was 16 years old, Quentin Israel, his Miller House master

in charge was the Rugger coach at college who spotted him and invited him to join rugby practices with the first XV team. Koli was clueless about the oval shaped ball game,

even not aware of the basics of the game and informed his mentor in rugby Quentin Israel about it. But Quentin has encouraged and asked him to be present at practice where he picked up the

laws of the game within a month. Due to his build and body structure Quentin positioned him as a hooker in the Pack and made his debut under Shane Pinder as his first captain, and played in the centenary year schools league and knockout tournament in the same year. He then became a permanent member of the side and went on to represent

In 1978, the Centenary year they won the William Molegoda trophy with a 13-6 win

Isipathana and went on to tour Thailand to play in Asian Schools Championship under Shane Pinder's captaincy. He also played against Loughborough Grammar schools from England whom they beat 7-4 at Longden place. The year 1980 was an unforgettable year in his life where he was appointed as the captain of the first XV side and instrumental in guiding them to win the inaugural 'Gratiaen Cup' beating the star studded Isipathana College side in a close battle by 6-4.

While being a school boy player, Gamini

Fernando and his coach Quentin Israel motivated him to play for Havelocks where he



made his club debut in 1980. He played in the Inter Club knock tournament which the Park Club won under Frank Huberts captaincy. He finally left school in early 1981 and continued his tenure as a player for Havies. Due to his

National duty in 1980 when he toured for the Rugby Asiad to Taiwan followed by the Hong Kong Rugby sevens in March1981 as a player. He was rewarded for representing the National team, with a Shield by their College Warden in 1980. His team mates at College First XV team were Umesh and Viraj Idippilly brothers, M.W. Hafeel, David Thambapillai Anura Boteju, Christopher Jordash.

He enjoyed playing for his club and was imbibed with a rare skill as a hooker. He was able to clear the ball from the base to fly half which was a unique skill which amused several teams in the fray. He was a member of the Triple Champion team led by Angelo Wickremaratne in 1981 and went on to play in sevens tournaments held in January and November the same year.

He then played under Marco de Silva and Hisham Abdeen in 1982 and 1983 seasons. After a lapse of one year due to injury he rejoined the fray and toured with the Sri Lanka team in 1985 under Rohan Gunaratne's leadership to Taiwan and Hong Kong In 1987, he was appointed as captain of Havelocks team. He led them to win the domestic sevens tournament and surged ahead to remain as runner-up in the R. Premadasa Trophy with Jeyer Rodriguesz as coach and Ana Saranapala as Chairman of Selectors. Same year he toured with the National team for Hong Kong sevens followed by the World Cup sevens tournament in Sydney.

He also toured Wales with the 15 a side

National team to play four test matches in 1987, He was picked for the Rugby Asiad in Hong Kong in 1988 under Hisham Abdeen and also toured with the Colombo Wanderers to Dubai sevens where they lost in the cup final to a Wales side.

The team consisted of him, Hisham Abdeen, Chandrishan Perera, Priyantha Ekanayake Saman Kotalawala, Imthi Marikkar. He finally called it a day in 1989 after playing under Chaminda Rupasinghes captaincy.

During his school career he played with Christopher Jordash, Idippily brothers, Anura Boteju, Chaminda Rupasinghe, Christopher. John, Sidath Nagahawatte, Louis Siriwardena, Gamini Kannangara, G.D.M.YU Peiris, Hussain Didi, Shiran Fernando, Tony Weerasinghe and Roshan Perera,

After his retirement he was invited to serve as chairman selectors of Havelocks with Chaminda Rupesinghe in 1998. He was a representative for Colombo clubs at Sri Lanka Rugby and serves as vice patron of Havelocks at present. Malitha a banker by profession is his wife, Son Munsith a Thomian graduated from NSBM while Chadma his daughter is



Spark Air to take wings early February

Acquires two aircraft, base to be MRIA

Creating aviation history in Sri Lanka a consortium of local and foreign investors would be launching what would be the country's first comprehensive airline owned by the private sector. It will be named Spark Air.

Head of Safety Management System, Capt. Uditha Danwatte said that they have already inked agreements to acquire two A 330 aircrafts for the operation which is expected to take wings in early February 2021 after receiving IATA approval.

Outlining their plans he said that they will be initially launching flights to Asia and Europe mainly targeting cargo since passenger operations are too early to commence due to the COVID pandemic. "Spark Air will have some technical modification of their aircraft to increase cargo facility.

"We have identified 15 international destinations to be included in our radar which include Los Angeles. When the pandemic settles we plan to operate as a full service airline mainly targeting

new destinations that are currently not serviced from Colombo."

He said that the management plans to take the two aircraft on dry lease since over 350 pilots and thousands of experienced airline crew are grounded due to COVID. "Similarly the management thought that this is also the best time to go in for airline leases since the conditions are very

Spark Air will be basing their hub in Mattala Rajapaksa Airport and have already taken space for two hangers and for a cargo storage facility. "We plan to start recruitment by December and will be opening out our sales office in Colombo in January."

A former pilot of the Sri Lanka Air Force with many bravery medals to his credit and then served SriLankan and Mihin Lanka he said that he was disappointed in the manner in which Mihin Lanka was shut down when it showed signs of turning

around. "Similarly it was a very imprudent move to pull out Sri Lankan from profit making routes in Europe since most of these flights were operating with nearly 99% seat factor.'

Its strategies were developed to be steered in implementation through four dynamic initiatives, namely, Quality and Processing, Sustainability, Branding and Marketing, and Research and Development, and with the ultimate goals of increasing production to 350 million kgs, increasing export earnings

to US\$.3 billion and increasing, by twofold, the real earnings of estate employees and small-holders.

He said that there was unanimity that the gradual transformation of the Tea Industry from a fundamental primary agricultural programme to a sophisticated industrial enterprise is indispensable for dynamic progress and it was decided that the next Colombo International Tea Convention should be held

The Chairman thanked the Minister and the Chairman of the Sri Lanka Tea Board for temporarily suspending the collection of the Promotion and Marketing Levy with effect from July 2020. "The trade is encouraged that it has now been decided to reduce the levy to Rs.3 per kg., of which Rs.1.50 will accrue to the Promotional and Marketing Fund, while the balance will be granted to producers to enhance replanting," he said.



A Tea Factory Learning Center was opened at the National Institute of Plantations Management (NIPM) by State Minister of Company Estate Reforms, Tea Estate Related Crops, Tea Factory Modernization and Tea Export Promotion, Kanaka Herath and Minister of Export Agriculture, Ramesh Pathirana recently.

The aim of the learning center is to enhance the practical knowledge of the students undergoing educational courses at NIPM which is under certain conditions is not fulfilled by the industry internships provided to the students at present during the course period. Thus with the opening of the new learning center a change to the course curriculum is expected.

"It is crucial to encourage entrepreneurship within the plantation sector

to boost up the economy," Minister of Plantation, Ramesh Pathirana said. And all the necessary support will be provided by the government to develop the education curriculum at NIPM which plays a vital role in providing good educated man power to the plantation industry.

Speaking at the event, State Minister of Company Estate Reforms, Tea Estate Related Crops, Tea Factory Modernization and Tea Export Promotion, Kanaka Herath said that a proposal should be made to establish one center to coordinate all the different courses provided by different institutions in the Plantation sector. "Equally it is important that such a responsibility should be given to NIPM," he added.

Director / Chief Executive Officer, NIPM, Prasad Dharmasena said that this is only the first stage and

they hope to expand the learning center to accommodate basic machineries needed by the Rubber and Coconut plantations in the near future as stages two and three. Thus a complete learning center will be established for the students to get a complete practical knowledge along with the theoretical parts learned.

The constructed tea factory learning center has a capacity of 300 green leaf kilos where the total investment for the project was handled by the NIPM itself which was approximately 24 million rupees. The learning center would also pave the way for students to carry out research projects related to the tea plantation sector. At present only the basic machinery needed by the tea plantation industry is available where more required machinery will be added later on.

In the local context, the biggest challenge, we have seen is the formulation of the risk appetite statement comprising of qualitative and quantitative elements inclusive of financial and non-financial risk. Banks could consider different approaches when formulating their risk appetite state-

They could use more sophisticated and refined systems to create a joint perspective on capital, funding and risk and return by including Return

management process. To enable this Adjusted Capital (RORAC), Risk-Adjusted Return on Capital (RAROC).

Many of these metrics could play an important role when allowing banks to understand the interdependencies to aid them in formulating risk appetite limits.

Then reconciliation of capital planning and strategic planning is essential to ensure consistency between risk and business strategies. Capital is a scarce resource and banks must consider, as they never have done before, the cost of capital, while still pursuing growth and profits.

The best practice for banks would be to consider a reasonable alignment of their annual planning process, to ensure the growth of business adequately deliberate and compliment the capital planning process to maximize the profitability of the institu-

Emerging trends for banks' strategic planning:

Funding Strategy and Contingency planning: Funding strategy and contingency liquidity plans will be better informed and sharper by stress-testing the relationship between capital, funding cost and liquidity

Feedback response: In the event of a breach of any of the risk limits (i.e- capital adequacy ratio, leverage ratio) banks take action through an asset sale, raising capital, cutting down lending, etc. These balance sheet changes could be captured iteratively in stress testing.



Bigger Stocks Drop Midweek Crashing the CSE Party

The ASPI's ascent continued with consistent, domestically funded volumes this week as the average daily turnover amounted to Rs.2.7Bn for the week ending 25th Sept. However, the price declines of the index heavy larger counters, JKH, SAMP, HNB, TJL and AEL ended the week on mixed grounds. Consequently, the Bourse ended the week on a mixed note as the ASPI increased by ~ 138 points (or +2.4% W-o-W), while the S&P SL20 Index decreased by ~30 points (or -1.2% W-o-W).

A catalyst for this week's optimism was CBSL's decision to insulate the foreign bond investors from forex risk. The CBSL approved one to two-year USD/LKR swap facilities with provision to carry out the initial and subsequent forex transactions at the same exchange rate. The risk cover is for inflows between \$25.0Mn and \$1.0Bn towards the LKR denominated bonds. This investor optimism spilt over to a scenario of possible state protection of equities investments, despite the state minister of capital markets Nivard Cabraal specifically mentioning that no such protection will be provided to equity investors n the same interview given to Bloomberg.

The market also received a reality check with another Covid-19 scare from a foreign national contracting the virus. This may unnerve some investors in the medium term as SL's largest claim to fame in 2020 is the successful containment of the pandemic. Despite the apparent enthusiasm of the domestic investors, we still believe the domestic run will have more fuel in the tank. The August inflation rose to 6.2% from 6.1% in June, further tightening the negative real returns of the Sri Lankan saver, which in our view is the single largest catalyst fueling the current CSE rally. We also believe that the planned upgrade of Kuwait from MSCI's Frontier to Emerging Index in November 2020 could catalyze foreign funds to invest some spillover funds in SL - just like CSE benefitted from Pakistan's upgrade in 2017.



Letters wouldn't in the street in the street



ADITHA DISSANAYAKE uriosity is a strange thing. It supposedly kills cats, and drives scholars like Archime des and Newton to define in the most bizarre way possible, ordinary events like why water splashes out of bathtubs and apples fall from trees. Without it, we wouldn't know how our ancestors lived in the stone ages, how trees bear fruits or why monkeys look so much like us.

And without curiosity, I would never have gotten to know "the most accomplished Coquette" in the days of breeches, buttons and bows of 18th century Engof breeches, buttons and pows of four century and land. I confess I thoroughly enjoyed her company while scholars besotted with the Lizzy Bennetts, Emma Watsons and Fitzgerald Darcys of the Jane Austen canon would rather stand by the roadside and shiver to death on a cold winter night than get into the same carriage as Lady Susan Vernon.

Ironically, curiosity has no place in the life of the scandalous heroine, described by her sister-in-law Catherine Vernon as "delicately fair" possessing "an uncommon union of symmetry, and brilliance," the only compliment that she receives in the whole novel, nor in her plans to find financial security in the only way that was available to women of her time, through marriage, albeit for her daughter, Frederica so that she herself can lead a comfortable

life sponging on her son-in-law.

Scandal, however, is an understatement to describe Lady Susan's arrival at her in-laws estate of Churchill even as the gossip mill claims that while staying as a guest at her previous place of residence, she was evicted by its Mistress Mrs. Manwaring for engaging at the same time, the affections of two men who were "not at liberty to bestow them," namely her husband, and the fiancé of her young sister-in-law. Undeterred, Lady Susan moves on to her next residence, the country estate of her deceased husband's younger brother Charles Vernon and his wife Catherine. When word reaches Mrs. Vernon's younger brother Reginald De Courcy that Lady Susan will be her house-guest, he is eager to meet her, knowing full well her scandalous past and totally ignorant of her powers to lure the innocent into the quagmire.

In my view, Austen portrays cleverly the sixtyfour skills a woman is supposed to possess when it comes to charming the opposite sex through the way Lady Susan uses all her feminine skills to "make black appear white," artfully converting those who are predetermined to dislike her as her faithful followers. Thus, almost before she could flutter her eye-lashes, the skeptical Reginald is trapped in her

web, much to the displeasure of his family. Under the same roof lives the terrified sixteenyear old daughter, Frederica, who does not possess her mother's talents. Her mother describes her as "a stupid girl" with "nothing to recommend her". Although Frederica is a rather charming young girl in her mother's eyes she is a burden because of her "artlessness" when it comes to capturing a man. When Frederica resists Lady Susan's plan to marry her off to the brainless Sir James, Lady Susan congratulates herself on her maternal affection in not insisting on the marriage, remarking that she will merely make Frederica "thoroughly uncomfortable till she does accept him". She insists that, "Frederica shall be Sir James's wife before she quits my house, and she may whimper, and the Vernons may storm, I regard them not. I am tired of submitting my will to the caprices of others; of resigning my own judgment in deference to those to whom I owe no duty, and for whom I feel no respect."

Also in the picture are the elderly De Courcy parents who hear all the news of the infamous Lady Susan through their daughter Mrs. Vernon, and Lady Susan's confidant, the equally unscrupulous Alicia Johnson married to a gouty man who in Lady Susan's view is "too old to be agreeable too young to die." Alicia urges her friend to pursue Reginald de Courcy on the grounds that his father is "very infirm, and not likely to stand in your way long". They are two peas in a pod, and through Lady

Susan's disclosure to her friend, we see her schemes, machinations, and truly captivating wicked nature. Only Mrs Vernon is able to see through Lady Susan's duplicity: "Her address to me was so gentle, frank, and even affectionate, that, if I had not known that the base always distilled me for marrying." how much she has always disliked me for marrying Mr Vernon, and that we had never met before, I

should have imagined her an attached friend."


The novella ends (spoiler alert!) with Lady Susan Vanquished, and society appeased: Manwaring has abandoned her; Reginald De Courcy is soon to be "talked, flattered and finessed into an affection" for Frederica; and it is Lady Susan herself who is now married to the "rattle," Sir James Martin.

Written around 1794, "Lady Susan" was not published until often Lang Austen's death. It could be

lished until after Jane Austen's death. It could be because she never attempted to have it published, that it is often overlooked and therefore, has never received much attention in comparison to her other six major novels. The story is short, and unravels through forty-one letters and a conclusion. Scholars estimate that it was written between 1793-4 when the young author was in her late teens and represents her first attempts to write in the epistolary format popular with many authors of her time. In 1805, it is said that she transcribed a fair copy of the manuscript but did not pursue publication in her lifetime. The manuscript remained unpublished until 54 years after her death with its inclusion in the appendix of her nephew James Edward Austen-Leigh's biography of his aunt, A Memoir of Jane Austen in 1871.

In her portrayal of a widow with beauty and a distinguished name, but no financial means, thus entitled to sympathy and in need of money: a dangerous combination, Austen skillfully paints on this small piece of ivory the plight of women who must struggle to survive either as a widow or spinster or wife; a situation that has not changed even in the 21st century. If there are faults in the book, it is mainly due to the limitations of the epistolary format where the narrative is revealed through one person's perspective and then the other's reaction and reply, not allowing for the energy of direct dialogue, or in-depth descriptions of the scene or sur-

roundings or insights into the other characters. Yet, it is a unique experience to be in the company of an older woman who is by turns scheming, selfish, unscrupulous and who has no compunction about freeloading from relatives, telling falsehoods or manipulating others. The fact that she is not the typical heroine of a romantic novel stands in her favour, making you admire Lady Susan, if not for her morals, for her independent spirit and sheer determination to live life to the full. China Cultural Center turns six

A celebration of cultural exchanges!

the month of September, the China Cultural Center (CCC) in Sri Lanka

celebrated its sixth year anniversary of being formally established as the official organization for cultural exchange in Sri Lanka

The Sri Lanka CCC is the 16th overseas China Cultural Center established globally under the patronage of China's Ministry of Culture and Tourism, which was inaugurated on September 16, 2014 by Chinese President Xi Jinping and then Sri Lankan President Mahinda Rajapakse. The preparations and establishment of the CCC was carried out by the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Sri Lanka, and it is run and operated by a working team from China's Ministry of Culture and Tourism.

A 1000-year-old friendship refreshed and renewed

Although the formal bilateral relationship between Sri Lanka and China was established only 63 years ago, the history of the friendship between the two countries dates back far beyond. The recorded history origins from the times of Jin Dynasty of China, where such information is found in the written stories of famous Chinese buddhist monk venerable Faxian, a who travelled to Sri Lanka between 410 – 415. Sri Lanka has been a very important partner during the ancient times where significant trade was carried out through the maritime silk route, used as a gateway to bridge East Asia and South Asia. The archaeological findings in Sri Lanka are evident to this trade and exchange of cultural val-

ues taking place between Sri Lanka and China. Since of establishing the lost relationship back in 1957, the Embassy of the People's Republic of China has been committed to creating economic wealth, socio-political stability and cultural exchange between the two countries. The efforts of the political, commercial, and cultural divisions in the Embassy have made it possible to an extent where both countries evaluate the expectations consistently for effectiveness and

efficiency, and specially cooperate during some

unexpected disasters, like the 2004 December

Tsunami and the 2020 COVID 19 pandemic. It

is due to the support and help of the Chinese

government, Sri Lanka has benefited through

education, scientific research, scholarships, trade loans, significant FDIs (Foreign Direct Investments) and special donations to build the infrastructure of the country.

The establishment of the China Cultural Center in the year 2014 has significantly brought the bilateral cultural exchange to a totally different level. Across the world, the Chinese Cultural Centers have contributed immensely to establish the meaning and significance of authentic cultural values of China, which is often misinterpreted by many. It is evident that the world has not enough chances to experience the traditional culture and values of China. Hence the 60+ cultural centers established in various countries have attempted to bridge this gap of understanding the real cultural values of China without infiltrating to the local culture but supporting and thriving together with the customs of respective ways and norms.

As the 16th overseas China Cultural Center amongst the 60+ other centers across the world, and as the first center inaugurated by the two presidents of the respective countries, the CCC in Sri Lanka highlights its importance and the value placed on the friendship of the two countries, which was created many centuries ago between China and Sri Lanka.

Cultural exchange – continued effort with variation

The China Cultural Center has now become a fully functional apparatus that enables cultural exchange through many different facets and complementing programs. The CCC is in a con-

stant drive to educate the society at large how cultural exchange helps to bridge the gaps and bring the peoples of the countries much closer to each other.

During the past six years, the Sri Lankan culture-loving society was exposed to some of the unique experiences of traditional Chinese art, music and dancing, calligraphy, cinema, drama, authentic Chinese cuisine, photography and intangible cultural heritage through the commitment of China Cultural Center in Sri Lanka.

An appreciation of the communities across Sri Lanka

The educational knowledge and unique experience achieved from those programs and events organized by the CCC can meet various appetites of a wider spectrum of the society and intellects. Moreover, the officials of the CCC have made every attempt to reach out to most remote communities in Sri Lanka creating value for all age groups who witness and engage with the programs. This is highly commendable since most international cultural programs are being focused only on a limited crowd in a major city in Sri Lanka. The CCC has done the opposite way and concentrated on both urban and rural areas, which benefited more people here.

At present, the CCC has carried out over 100 programs, including more than 300 various types of activities and events (including performances, exhibitions, lectures, workshops, teaching programs, and etc.). More than half of Chinese provinces (Jiangsu, Hubei, Canton, Jiangxi, Shanxi, Yunnan...and etc.), provinciallevel autonomous regions (such as Tibet, Inner Mongolia, Guangxi, Xinjiang, and Ningxia), provincial-level municipalities (Beijing, Shanghai, and Tianjin), and Chinese SAR Hong Kong have been invited by the CCC to conduct different cultural exchange programs in Sri Lanka.

The future of the friendship







Occurs dicumbers

he Emperor Tiberius (42 BC - AD 37), vouched for the amazing benefits of Cucumber according to Pliny the Elder! He had the cucumber on his table daily during summer and winter! Charlemagne King of the Franks had cucumbers grown in his gardens! Surely the Emperor's and King's food preference must be taken seriously! Green Thumbs speaks to Director of the Institute of Indigenous Medicine Dr. Swarna Hapuarachchi on the Cucumber, the Emperor's and King's choice!

In Sri Lanka, cucumber is best eaten sliced as a salad or as an appetizer with other vegetables because of its distinct flavor and texture. This crop can be grown throughout the year in the wet-zone and during Maha season in the dry-zone. The identified districts for cucumber production are Kurunegala, Matale and Hambantota and the potential districts are Puttalam, Colombo, Matara, Badulla, Moneragala, Polonnaruwa and Anuradhapura.

According to the DOA Vegetable Task Force Report, the peak cucumber production months during the Maha season are January, February and the first and second weeks of March and that during the Yala season are April, May, June, July and the first and second weeks of August.

"It grows best under conditions of high temperature, humidity, and with an uninterrupted supply of water and nutrients. Under favorable and stable environmental and nutritional conditions and when pests are under control cucumber thrives. Give Cucumber Plants Sunlight and Good Soil. For the best-tasting fruit and optimum yields, grow plants in a sunny spot and in warm, fertile, and well-drained soil rich in organic matter with a soil PH between 6 and 7," said Hapuarachchi.

Cucumber plants that do not get enough sunlight are more likely to have a meagre fruit set and produce an overall lower yield. Therefore, it is best to plant them in

areas that get at least 8 hours of direct sunlight each day.

"Generally, a healthy pickling cucumber plant produces about 5 pounds of cucumbers per plant. Well-aged compost is the best source of nutrients for cucumbers, the plant does not regenerate after the growing season. Once it has lived out its life span of roughly 70 days, the plant dies and cannot be regrown," stated Hapuarachchi.

Cucumbers are natural climbers and because the tendrils of the vines will grab anything and everything such as fences, string, wire trellis, or tall cages. Many commercial operations, train their plants to grow on poles or trellises. But beware of the pests. Downy mildew (Pseudoperonospora cubinsis), Powdery mildew (Erysiphe cichoracearum), Soft rot (Pithium spp) and Cucumber mosaic virus (CMV).

Cucumbers are easy to grow. If they receive full sunlight and has an evenly moist, fertile soil, victory is almost guaranteed. Like other summer vine crops, cucumbers are heavy feeders and demand a steady supply of water. The Emperor Tiberius who demanded to eat cucumbers must have known Cucumbers as Cucumis Sativus and pickling, slicing and seedless are the varieties of cucumber. In general cultivation, cucumbers are classified into three main cultivar groups: sliced, pickled, and seedless/burpless. It is advisable not to plant it where tree roots will rob them of water and nutrients. Plant Cucumbers alongside Peas, Corn, Beans, Radishes, Beets, Carrots and Onions.

Potatoes compete mightily with cucumbers for nutrients and water, so they should not be planted with cucumbers. Cucumbers grow poorly when planted near potatoes, sage, and melons.

"Use the freshest cucumbers you can for juicing, and organic if you can. Cucumber juice is naturally hydrating and contains minerals like potassium and magnesium that actually help maintain your body's fluid balance. Because it's so hydrating, it may help clear up your skin, reduce your blood pressure, and promote regular bowel movements," said Hapuarachchi.

• IT CONTAINS ANTIOXIDANTS
Antioxidants are molecules that block oxidation, a chemical reaction that forms highly reactive atoms with unpaired electrons known as free radicals. The accumulation of these harmful free radicals can lead to several types of chronic illness. In fact, oxidative stress caused by free radicals has been associated with cancer and heart, lung and autoimmune disease. Fruits and vegetables, including cucumbers, are especially rich in beneficial antioxidants that may reduce the risk of these conditions.

• IT PROMOTES HYDRATION

Water is crucial to your body's function, playing numerous important roles. It is involved in processes like temperature regulation and the transportation of waste products and nutrients. In fact, proper hydration can affect everything from physical performance to metabolism. Because cucumbers are composed of about 96% water, they are especially effective at promoting hydration and can help you meet your daily fluid needs.

 IT MAY AID IN WEIGHT LOSS
 Cucumbers could potentially help you lose weight in a few different ways. First of all, they are low in calories. This means that you can eat plenty of cucumbers without packing on the extra calories that lead to weight gain. Cucumbers can add freshness and flavor to salads, sandwiches and side dishes and may also be used as a replacement for higher calorie alternatives. Furthermore, the high- water content of cucumbers could aid in weight loss as well.


• IT MAY LOWER BLOOD SUGAR
Several animal and test-tube studies have found that cucumbers may help reduce blood sugar levels and prevent some complications of diabetes. One animal study examined the effects of various plants on blood sugar. Cucumbers were shown to effectively reduce and control blood sugar levels. Another animal study induced diabetes in mice and then supplemented them with cucumber peel extract. Cucumber peel reversed most of the diabetes-associated changes and caused a decrease in blood sugar. However, the current evidence is limited to test-tube and animal studies. Further research is needed to determine how cucumbers may affect blood sugar in humans.

• IT COULD PROMOTE REGULARITY

Eating cucumbers may help support regular bowel movements. Dehydration is a major risk factor for constipation, as it can alter your water balance and make the passage of stool difficult. Cucumbers are high in water and promote hydration. Staying hydrated can improve stool consistency, prevent constipation and help maintain regularity. Moreover, cucumbers contain fiber, which helps regulate bowel movements.

- EASY TO ADD TO YOUR DIET

Mild with a distinctly crisp and refreshing flavor, cucumbers are commonly enjoyed fresh or pickled in everything from sallow-calorie snack or can be paired with hummus, olive oil, salt or salad dressing to add a bit more flavor.

Selecting orchids Here's what to look for when shopping for an orchid:

Some roots should be visible at the top of the potting mix, and they should be whitish, firm and not moist. (Because they are epiphytes, orchids can draw moisture out of the air through their roots.) Roots coming out of the bottom of the pot is also not a bad sign; you don't even have to repot it when you get the plant home. Some buds should be unopened - you'll get a

longer display of first blooms.

Caring for orchids at home

The showiest orchids come from the humid equatorial regions of the planet, and once you get your plant home, much of your work will consist of approximating its natural environment. Here's what you need to

Mist frequently, but don't allow water to collect on the center area of the plant.

Place decorative pebbles in a tray and add water to the tray until it's just below the top of the pebbles; don't completely cover the pebbles. Sit the pot on the pebbles.

The evaporating water will increase the humidity around

the plant. Avoid placing orchids near drying elements such as heaters and fireplaces. Provide

good air circulation to avoid heat buildup and bacterial infections. Never leave

plants sitting in water. All leaf surfaces should be dry at night to avoid spotting

and bacterial growth. Water plants with a weak solution of a high-nitrogen fertilizer.

Repotting orchids

Although orchids enjoy being root-bound, they'll need to be repotted when the potting mix has broken down, usually every two years. Choose a time after the orchid has finished blooming; flowers could fall because of the stress of repotting.

ermed as "Disney's most beautiful let-down" this live action remake does not exactly follow in the footsteps of the 1998 animation. For one thing it lacks the presence of one of the most prominent characters in the original - Mushu, a small dragon, who acts as the guardian to the brave young woman. It also does not fall in line with the stereotype Disney princess movies of having an animal side kick as a companion. Instead a red and yellow hued Phoenix guides Mulan during moments she strays away from reality and protects her during moments of need.

Directed by Niki Caro 2020's 'Mulan' breaks onto the wide screen at a moment which it is most needed. When movements like #MeToo and #BlackLivesMatter have created waves across the globe it is fitting to see a tale which sets women empowerment in the picture. It is an emblem against a form of discrimination against women: that their role

in life is to get married to bring honour upon their families. It also comes at a time when movie enthusiasts are hungry for a new production to hit the wide screen, as the coronavirus pandemic has halted the screening of many movies. Therefore despite it's shortcomings 'Mulan' is likely to be welcomed with open arms by those who are permitted to visit film halls.

Though the theme is the same, the modern version of 'Mulan' improves upon the 1998 animated version.

One significant aspect which works in it's favour is that the 2000 production is not glamourised to win over the audience. Thus unlike remakes like 'Dumbo' and 'Aladdin', 'Mulan' does not exactly seem to be made to be a money-grabber.




