# ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1896.

## WESTERN PROVINCE.

#### COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: a fairly good yala harvest is expected, though crops have not entirely escaped injury by flood water. In some villages ploughing for maha has commenced,

Dry grain: kurakkan sown to a small extent is thriving.

Other products: the supply of fruit and vegetables is good, and prices are reasonable.

Prices of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts, from Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 a thousand. Rainfall: there were heavy showers during the month, and certain low-lying parts of the district were flooded, but little or no damage was done, as the sand bars at the mouths of the Kelani river and of the outlets from Hendala canal were cut in time, and the work was successful, the flood water rapidly subsiding.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: a fairly good yala harvest may be expected.

#### NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: the cultivation for vala promises well, and fields are being prepared for maha.

Dry grain: chenas are being sown.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce.

Prices of staple products: rice, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 32.50 to Rs. 35 per thousand.

Rainfall: there were a few good showers during the month.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: harvest prospects generally are good.

# KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy, yala harvest: the plants are from two to three months old, and are in good condition.

Dry grain: nil.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce in the Pasdun korales, but plentiful in other parts of the district

Prices of staple products: rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 32 50 to Rs. 40 a thousand.

Rainfall: moderate.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: good.

# CENTRAL PROVINCE.

# KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: the fields in all the divisions are being ploughed, except in Pata Dumbara, where the harvesting

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.
Yala: in fields in Udunuwara, Harispattu, Pata Dumbara and Pata Hewaheta paddy is being transplanted; in Yatinuwara and Udapalata crops in ear and blossom; and in Uda Dumbara in blade.

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Dry grain, maha: kurakkan in Udunuwara and Yatinuwara are blossoming and in Uda Bulatgama being

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Rainfall: sufficient.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1·50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1·25 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 4 per 100.

MATALE DISTRICT. [Not received.]

#### NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: Kotmale-ploughing commenced for maha harvest. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane-gathered a full crop, and ploughing commenced for yala harvest.

Dry grain: Kotmale—chenas being sown with kurakkan.

Rain: there was sufficient rain throughout the district.

Fruits and vegetables: vegetables deficient; fair supply of fruits.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 a bushel; kurakkan and Indian corn, Re. 1.25 a bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 8 a hundred.

Health: chickenpox prevails in Uda Hewaheta.

Health of cattle : good.

#### NORTHERN PROVINCE.

# JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there were slight drizzles on the 10th, 13th, 14th, and 18th in portions of the district, the quantity registered by the Public Works Department being 02 in. The south-west monsoon blew strongly during the month. The paddy lands are being manured and ploughed.

Dry grain crops: kurakkan, tinai, and sami are in plants. Prospects on the whole good.

Tobacco: there is a fall in the price of tobacco, as compared with that of last year. A large quantity from

last year's supply is said to be yet in stock in the Malabar Coast and Galle markets.

Prices of grain: paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; varaku, Re. 1.25 per bushel; chami, Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; payaru, Rs. 4 per bushel; uluntu, Rs. 4 per bushel; ellu, Rs. 4.50 per bushel.

#### MANNAR DISTRICT.

Rainfall: smart showers of rain during the month. Rainfall registered at Mannar island 1.17 in. Strong blowing of south-west wind.

State of crops: ploughing for the next kalapokam general. A few paddy stacks threshed in Mantai during the month. Sirupokam in some villages; in Nanaddan east and Musali north in plants and in ear. Condition good. Prices of grain: paddy, Re. 1 to Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; kurakkan, 87½ cents to Re. 1 per bushel; tobacco, Rs. 6 to Rs. 15 per 1,000 leaves.

#### VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

There were a few good showers of rain about the middle of the month in Vavuniya, Chundikulam, and Melpattu divisions. Rainfall registered at Vavuniya 2:36 in.

The kalapokam crop is being threshed. A good idaipokam crop is expected in some villages. Sirupokam

cultivation is in plants.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; kurakkan, 75 cents per bushel. The health of the people is on the whole satisfactory.

Cattle disease: murrain reported from Sinnacheddikulam has now died out, and the district is now healthy.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT. [Report not received.]

#### SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

## GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy and dry grain, yala: the area under crop is smaller than in the corresponding season of last year, owing to want of rain in some divisions and floods in the others. The condition of the crop, which is now fast earing, is satisfactory.

Miscelloneous: jak and breadfruit are scarce. Plantain, vegetables, and cocoanut are plentiful. Price per 1,000

cocoanuts is Rs. 25.

Prices of staple food: rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 3·50 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1·50 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 2 per bushel; amu, Re. I·25 per bushel.

Rainfall: 8·29 in.

Health: satisfactory.

#### MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: good. Dry grain: good.

The crop prospects are reported healthy as the weather is seasonable.

Frices: paddy and fine grain, Re. 1.50 per bushel.

## HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Rainfall: slight and variable. A fair amount in the north of Giruwa pattu and Magain pattu. Great scarcity of water in Tangalla town.

Paddy: harvesting of second maha over in Giruwa pattu east. Some irrigated lands have been sown for yala, and the crop is in ear. In Giruwa pattu west the paddy sown on irrigated land promises well. The crops on unirrigated land are fair at present, but will require rain. In Magam pattu the sowings for yala are finished.

Fine grain: Indian corn and kurakkan are doing well in Giruwa pattu west.

Vegetables are plentiful in Giruwa pattu west.

Food supply somewhat scanty in Giruwa pattu east.

Health of people and cattle: fairly good.

Prices: paddy, from Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan, from Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 per bushel; gingelly, Rs. 3 per bushel; meneri and tana, Re. 1 per bushel; mun-eta, Rs. 3.25 per bushel; Indian corn, from 37½ cents to 50 cents per 100 pods; jak fruit, from Rs. 5 to Rs. 12 per 100; pumpkins, from Rs. 8 to Rs. 12 per 100; coconnuts, from Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per 1,000: plantains, from Rs. 25 to Rs. 35 per 100 bunches; sweet potatoes, 62½ cents per out cents per cwt.

#### EASTERN PROVINCE.

# BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: threshing of munmari harvest is still being carried on. Reaping of pinmari harvest has commenced. damaged by blight, but the extent of damage cannot be accurately fixed, except at the threshing season.

Other grain: nil.

Price of paddy has not gone over Re. 1 25 a bushel. Rainfall: 1 47 in.

Health of people and cattle good.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rainfall: 33 in.

Paddy: pinmari crops at Tamblegam and Kodiyar are promising. Munmari paddy has been threshed, except in parts of Kaddukkulam pattu.

Tobacco is being purchased by Jaffna cigar merchants. The prices are better than those realized last year, though the quality of the leaf is not so good.

Dry grain : fair. Cassava: fair.

Fisheries: satisfactory.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 118 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; dry grain, 75 cents per bushel; cassava, 2 cents per lb.

# NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNEGALA DISTRICT. [Report not received.]

#### PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: in Puttalam pattu nothing has been done for want of rain in time. Paddy plants in Rajawanni pattu and Akkarai pattu south are thriving well; their growth is of different sizes. Prospects in Akkarai pattu south fair; in Pomparippu pattu paddy reaped and stacked and a few stacks threshed. Preparations for cultivation are now being made in Demala hatpattu.

Fine grain: Grown-up plants in Akkarai pattu south and Rajawanni pattu. In Demala hatpattu gingelly and meneri crops gathered. In same pattus crops died for want of rain. Prospects moderate. Harvest, yala. Fine

grain was not cultivated in Pomparippu pattu.

Staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3 50 per bushel; cocoauuts, Rs. 4 to Rs. 4 50 per 100. Rainfall: weather has been dry, but a little rain has fallen. The record for the month was 5.18 in.

## CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern Division.—Ma-wi cultivation has commenced. The fine grain sown is in good condition.

Central Division.—961 bushels of paddy sown, of which about 8½ were damaged; remaining crop is in good condition and is earing and maturing. The fine grain is reported good. The ploughing for maha cultivation has

Southern Division.—475 bushels of paddy and 40 bushels of fine grain have been sown for yala harvest. A few The rest are thriving. fields adjoining jungles and sown with bala-wi were, when blossoming, damaged by insects. Maha operations have commenced.

# NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

Rainfall: 6.46 in.

Paddy: meda crops in Nuwaragampalata are being reaped. Yala crops are at various stages of growth.

Fine grain: Gingelly crops are being reaped.

Tanks: more or less half full.

Cattle murrain: still prevails in Nuwaragampalata and Hurulupa lata.

Health of people good.

Buttala.—Weather, dry. Paddy crops fair. No chena crops in this division. Fruit and vegetables are scarce.
Cattle are healthy. Fever, dysentery, and cold prevalent.
Bintenna.—Weather, dry and rainy. Paddy crops are being reaped, but not threshed owing to the rain. Yala fields are being ploughed. There is no chena cultivation. Fruit and vegetables are scarce. Cattle are in good health. Health of people is fair. Fever, sore-eyes, and dysentery prevalent in some places.

#### PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

## RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: nearly all the second maha crops have been harvested. The yala fields are progressing fairly; prospects favourable. In Nawadun korale cultivation for maha has begun.

Fine grain: yala chenas are maturing, and will soon be fit for reaping; prospects good.

Health: hoof disease among cattle is reported in parts of Kuruwiti, Kadawata, and Meda korales, and necessary measures are being taken to check its progress. The health of the people is good.

#### KEGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy, yala: prospects are good. Ploughing operations for maha cultivation have commenced. Present weather is favourable.

Dry grain: chenas are being prepared for sowing hill paddy and kurakkan. The sowing of kurakkan has already commenced. Mun and tana have been sown in parts of Four Korales. Gingelly sown in Galboda and Ginigoda korales and Beligal korale has been harvested; the crop is good.
