#### PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith.

#### PROCLAMATION:

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir Joseph West Ridgeway, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by the 19th section of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," as amended by the 6th section of Ordinance No. 1 of 1892, it is enacted that when the following events have occurred, viz. :--

- (a) The period fixed under section 7 of the said "Forest Ordinance, 1885," for preferring claims has elapsed, and all claims (if any) made within such period have been disposed of by the Forest Settlement Officer; and
- (b) If such claims have been made, the periods fixed for appealing from the orders passed on such claims have elapsed, and all appeals (if any) presented within such period have been disposed of by the Supreme Court; and
- (c) All lands (if any) to be included in the proposed forest which may be acquired under section 13 of the said last-mentioned Ordinance have become vested in the Crown—

the Governor shall, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, specify the limits of the forest which it is intended to reserve, and declare the same to be reserved from a date fixed by such Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient to constitute the Crown lands specified in the schedule hereto a reserved forest:

And whereas the period fixed for preferring claims has elapsed, and no claim has been preferred:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation declare the Crown lots 8,143, 8,144, 8,145, 8,146, 8,147, 8,148, 8,149, 8,151, 8,152, 8,153, 8,154, 8,155, 8,159, 8,160, G 593, M 593, N 593, O 593, P 593, and Q 593 in preliminary plan 9,328, and lot Q 693 in preliminary plan 10,265 (title plan 135,954), containing in extent 847 acres 3 roods 21 perches, called Kananpella forest, and more particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, to be a reserved forest as from and after the 1st day of September, 1896, reserving nevertheless to the public the right of way along the following footpaths within the said forest, and desceibed in the preliminary plan 9,328:

- (1) The footpath starting on the north from lot 8,150 in preliminary plan 9,328 and falling into the Colombo-Ratnapura road at the 24th milepost on the south;
- (2) The footpath starting on the west from land described in title plan 136,255 and falling into land described in title plan 146,581 on the west;

Reserving also to the inhabitants of Kananpella, Tawalgoda, Kosgama-ihala, and Eswatta, the right to use the water of all the streams in the forest shown on preliminary plan 9,328, for irrigation and domestic purposes only.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and ninety-six.

# NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

SEALED Tenders (in duplicate), marked on the envelopes "Tender for Colonial Store," will be received up to 12 o'clock noon on Wednesday, September 16, 1896, from persons willing to contract for the undermentioned services from January 1 to December 31, 1897 :--

Shoeing horses of Mounted Orderlies at Colombo.

Tenders should be submited in duplicate, the original being forwarded to the Colonial Storekeeper and the duplicate to the Hon. the Auditor-General, both being required to be forwarded at the same time.

A deposit, as noted above, will be required before any form of tender is issued; and should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or fail to furnish approved security, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of contract.

The deposit must be made at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and the deposit receipt must be produced to the officer issuing the form of tender as his authority for

making the issue.

No tender will be considered unless it is on such printed forms-to be obtained at the office of the Colonial Storekeeper—and unless accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract.

The amount of security to be given, and all other necessary information, can be ascertained on application

at the Colonial Storekeeper's office.

The person whose tender has been accepted by Government will be required to bear the expense of having security bonds prepared for the due performance of his contract, which bonds will be subject to the approval of the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderers' own lawyers, in which case the name or stamp of the Proctor who drafted the bond should be affixed to the document. But if a contractor submits a security bond which does not bear the name or stamp of the lawyer who drafted it, he will be required to pay a fee of Rs. 10.50 to the Attorney-General for approving each bond.

The security bond should be furnished immediately on

acceptance of tender being notified.

All alterations or erasures in tenders should bear the initials of the tenderers, otherwise the tenders will be treated as informal and rejected.

The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.
