GREETING.

And whereas the said Panayattis Theocharides Cosmos, known as Peter Cosmos, has taken the oath of allegiance prescribed by section 4 of the said Ordinance, and has produced to Us a certificate of his having taken and subscribed such oath, and of the date of his taking and subscribing the same, and We are satisfied that the said Panayattis Theocharides Cosmos, known as Peter Cosmos, has taken the prescribed oath within the period specified in the said section of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We do hereby grant to the said Panayattis Theocharides Cosmos, known as Peter Cosmos, all the rights and privileges of a British subject, and declare that the said Panayattis Theocharides Cosmos, known as Peter Cosmos, shall, within the limits of this Colony, be entitled to all political and other rights, powers, and privileges, and be subject to all obligations to which a natural-born British subject is entitled or subject.

Commercial Relations of Great Britain and the Dominican Republic.

Foreign Office, August 19, 1896.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Dominican Republic, a Note, dated the 14th ultimo, denouncing the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation, signed between Great Britain and Dominica on the 6th of March, 1850. This notice of denunciation, which is in conformity with the provisions of Article X. of that Treaty, as supplemented by the terms of the subsequent Declaration of the 7th of September, 1860, has been accepted by Her Majesty's Government, and the stipulations of the Treaty—except those relating to peace and friendship between the two countries and their subjects and citizens—will cease and determine accordingly on the 14th of July, 1897.

#### SEASON REPORTS FOR SEPTEMBER, 1896.

#### WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala crops are being harvested and the prospects of a fairly good maha continue to be favourable.

Dry grain: no cultivation worth reporting.

Other products: the supply of vegetables was good and prices were moderate, but fruit was scarce and dear. Prices of staple products: rice from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts from Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 a thousand.

Rainfall: the rainfall during the month has been above the average.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: a fairly good yala harvest can be expected, though it has been damaged to some extent by the recent rains.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the harvesting of the yala crop is finished except in the totamunes, where it is still going on. Fields are being prepared for the ensuing maha cultivation.

Dry grain: the kurakkan crop in the Panadurabadda has been gathered.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce throughout the district, except in the Rayigam korale.

Prices of staple products: rice. Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 45 a thousand.

Rainfall: there was very little rain in the early part of the month; towards the latter part there were some

heavy showers.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: the yala harvest was a fair one.

#### NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala crops are being reaped and threshed; cultivation for maha has been so far successful.

Dry grain: in the Hapitigam korale, the crops on private chenas cultivated for this harvest are being reaped.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce.

Prices of staple products: rice from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 32 to Rs. 35 per thousand: green gram and gingelly, Rs. 4 per bushel; paddy Re. 1.75.
Rainfall: plentiful

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: good.

#### CENTRAL PROVINCE.

#### KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: in Udunuwara, Yatinuwara, Pata Dumbara, Udapalata, and Uda Bulatgama paddy plants are being transplanted; in Harispattu paddy plants are in blade; in Uda Dumbara fields are being ploughed; and in Pata Harispattu paddy plants are in blade; in Uda Dumbara fields are being ploughed; and

in Pata Hewaheta being sown. Crop or prospect of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Yala: the fields in Udunuwara, Harispattu, Pata Dumbara, Uda Dumbara, and Pata Hewaheta are being harvested. Crop or prospect of crop: fair in Harispattu and Pata Dumbara; good in Uda Dumbara and Pata

Hewaheta.

Dry grain, maha: hill paddy chenas in Yatinuwara and Harispattu are being weeded; in Udunuwara amu is being sown. Chenas in Pata Dumbara, Uda Dumbara, and Pata Hewaheta are being cleared; Udapalata being reaped; and in Uda Bulatgama hill paddy and kurakkan are in ear. Crop or prospect of crop: good in Udapalata; in other divisions too early to form an opinion.

Yala: in Harispattu and Pata Dumbara kurakkan is being harvested. Crop or prospect of crop: good. Rainfall: sufficient in Yatinuwara, Uda Dumbara, Pata Hewaheta, Udapalata, and Uda Bulatgama, and in

other divisions insufficient.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.25 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 4 per 100.

#### NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: Kotmale-maha plants, one to three months old, being weeded and transplanted. Uda Hewaheta and Walapane—paddy in young plants (yala).

Dry grain: clearing and burning of chenas for kurakkan in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane; Kotmale—kurakkan

in ear; prospects good.
Rain: sufficient throughout the district.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; kurakkan and Indian corn, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.37 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 6 to Rs. 7 per 100.

Health: good.

Health of cattle: hoof-and-mouth disease prevails in Kotmale and in some villages of Uda Hewaheta and Walapane.

Vegetables and fruits: there was a good supply of vegetables and fruits.

#### MATALE DISTRICT.

Matale South: the yala fields are being harvested, with very satisfactory results. The maha cultivation has begun in several villages, for which the present weather is very favourable.

Matale North: nearly all the yala fields have been reaped, with good results. The godakumburu cultivated under the kekulan system gave a heavy return. The chena sowing has begun.

Matale East: the fields under rivers have been reaped, and the return was good as usual. The chenas cleared for maha are being sown with fine grain.

#### NORTHERN PROVINCE.

#### JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there was some very heavy rain almost throughout the district accompanied by thunder and lightning between the 26th and 29th, and some partial showers on the 19th and 30th. The rainfall registered at the Public Works Department Office, Jaffna, was 6.04 inches. The wind was in general from south-west.

Paddy, kalapokam: sowing of paddy, which was delayed for want of rain, was general throughout the district with the restrict of the re

with the setting in of the rains.

Dry grain crops: varaku and karuttasamy are being sown, and payaru in ear.

Palmirah fruit: the crop of palmirah fruit was gathered in and the outturn was reported to be fair.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, between Re. 1.50 and Re. 1.75 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; varaku, Re. 1.25 per bushel; tinaichamy, Re. 1.50 per bushel; panichamy, Re. 1.50 per bushel.

#### MANNAR DISTRICT.

Drizzling rains in Mannar island, and partial showers in mainland between the 19th and 30th of the month. Rainfall registered, 3·02 inches. Private chenas in Mannar island being cleared for dry grain cultivation. Sowing of paddy began in Mantai south. Ploughing and fencing general.

Paddy, Re. 1·25 to Re. 1·50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1 to Re. 1·25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3·50 to Rs. 3·75 per

#### MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Crops: sowing of paddy for kalapokam is going on.

Weather: good rain throughout the district except in Mullaittivu itself. The days were cloudy for the most part.

General health: fair. In some villages people were subject to fever, pneumonia, sore-eyes, and dysentery. Murrain is dying out at Tunukkai. A few cases of hoof-and-mouth diseases were reported from Mulliavalai.

Prices of articles: paddy, Re. 1·25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1 per bushel; varaku, 75 cents per bushel; ellu, Rs. 4 per bushel; kollu, Rs. 2 per bushel; palmirah jelly, per koodai Rs. 2.

#### VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

There has been rain throughout the district during the month. Rainfall registered at Vavuniya is 7.71 inches. Preparations are being made for the ensuing kalapokam cultivation. Tank works are in progress. Prices: paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.25 per bushel. With the exception of a few cases of fever, the health of the people is satisfactory.

There are a few cases of cattle murrain reported from Kilakumulai north.

#### SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

#### GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: cultivation going on in all the pattus, and a few lands in both Talpe and gravets sown with paddy.

Dry grain: no cultivation yet begun.

Miscellaneous: jak, breadfruit, and plantains are scarce. The other vegetables are in fair supply; cocoanut crop middling; price per thousand Rs. 30.

Dries of stable products: rice from Rs. 2 to Rs. 2:50 per bushel: naddy Rs. 1:25 per bushel: kurakkan, Rs. 2

Price of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 2 per bushel; and amu, Re. 1.25 per bushel.

Rainfall: 12.93 inches.

Health: satisfactory. Cattle disease prevailed to some extent in both gravets and Talpe pattu.

#### MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: fair. Dry grain: fair.

Prices: paddy and fine grain, Re. 1.50 per bushel.

#### HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Paddy and fine grain: cultivation for maha is being carried on in Giruwa pattu west. In Magam pattu the fields at Medagama and Walawe are in blossom, and a good harvest has been reaped at Tissa. A good many chenas have been cleared for maha, and some of them have been sown.

Rainfall: there was heavy rain on the 9th, 10th, and 11th. The north-east monsoon burst at Hambantota on

Prices: rice, Rs. 3:50 to Rs. 4 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1:25 to Re. 1:50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1:25 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 25 to Rs. 50 per 1,000; Indian cobs, 37 cents to 62 cents per 100; breadfruit, Rs. 3 per 100; pumpkins, Rs. 12 to Rs. 30 per 100.

#### EASTERN PROVIVCE.

#### BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: ettala paddy crop and second crop raised on other bunds are being harvested; yield good. Ploughing for munmari harvest of next year is delayed for want of rain.

Other grains: preparations are in progress on Crown chena lands and on private new lands for sowing Indian

corn and fine grain.

Price of paddy, Re. 1 a bushel. Rainfall: 2·19 inches.

Health: generally better than during last month. Hoof-and-mouth disease still prevail among cattle, and is likely to affect the ploughing of the paddy lands during this month, although every effort is made to check its spread.

#### TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rainfall: 6.84 inches. Paddy: munmari cultivation has already commenced in the Koddiar and the Tamblegam pattus. Fields are being ploughed and sown in Kaddukkulam east. The cultivation in Kaddukkulam west has fairly progressed, the plants being about one month old.

Tobacco: lands are being manured for raising the crops of 1897.

Dry grain, none; manioc, none; fisheries, fair.

Price of articles: paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; dry grain, Re. 1.25 per bushel; cassava 3 cents per lb.

#### NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

#### KURUNEGALA DISTRICT. [Not received.]

#### CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division: the sowing of ma wi cultivation is over, and the sowing of elankali for kekulan has begun. Central division: the yala crop of dewareddiri and bala-wi gathered up to date is reported to be 8,754 bushels. Mawi cultivation is still going on, and an extent of about 512 bushels is reported to have been sown up to date, of which about 10 bushels in Medapalata were damaged by rain; the rest of the crop is young, and looking very well.

Southern division: the ma-wi cultivation has ceased and bala-wi sowings have begun, and will be continued till the end of next month. The ma-wi crops are thriving with a good supply of rain, which is somewhat hindering the gathering of the yala harvest which is going on now.

#### PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: in Demala hatpattu and Pomparippu pattu paddy crops are being reaped and gathered; in Puttalam, Akkarai, and Rajakumarawanni pattus preparations are going on for maha cultivation of 1897. Prospect, good.

— Fine grain: chenas are being cleared for maha cultivation in Demala hatpattu and Puttalam, Akkarai, and

Rajakumarawanni pattus.

Staple products: rice, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 3.75 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 per 100.

Rainfall: the weather has been dry during the greater part of the month, and the only appreciable quantities of rain fell on the 7th and 27th, the records being .78 inch and .60 inch. The total quantity registered for the month is 1.85 inch.

#### NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

#### ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT.

Rainfall at Anuradhapura: 2.85 inches.

Paddy: yala harvest still not over; reaping and threshing going on. Crops on fields sown late in the season are earing.

Tanks: more or less quarter full. Some small tanks have quite dried up.

Health of cattle bad; hoof-and-mouth disease in all the palatas; murrain in all the palatas except Taman-kaduwa. Every effort made to stamp out the disease.

Health of people: good; fever and colds prevail to some extent.

#### PROVINCE OF UVA.

#### BADULLA DISTRICT.

Health: a few cases of measles, chickenpox, and dysentery have been reported, in addition to the usual com-

plaints of fever, cold, and sore-eyes usual at this season.

Cattle: hoof-and-mouth disease amongst cattle is disappearing.

In the Bintenna of Kolonna, Meda, and Atakalan korales kurakkan chenas are beeing cleared and burnt.
