Head of the National Operations Centre for the Prevention of COVID-19 Outbreak (NOCPCO) Army Commander Lt. General Shavendra Silva yesterday stated that random PCR tests are scheduled to be carried out in all factories with a large workforce.

"Random PCR tests have been carried out since the initial COVID-19 outbreak in March this year. But following the detection of a new COVID-19 cluster in Minuwangoda, random PCR tests will be intensified and will be carried out on a large scale," the Army Comemployees of the Minuwangoda mander said.

FCID NOT LEGAL UNDER POLICE ORDINANCE -

The Financial Crimes Investigation (FCID) established by the previous 'Yahapalana' Government, to investigate allegations of fraud and corruption was illegal and was in contravention of the Police Ordinance, MP Wijayadasa Rajapakshe said testifying before commission to probe political victimization yesterday.

He said former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe and former Minister Sagala Ratnayake spearheaded moves to set up the FCID.

Rajapakshe said FCID was initiated by

for political purposes by a Cabinet memorandum of former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe and it was not an independent body and acted in accordance with a political agenda.

He said the FCID applied the law differently from person to person, and said when it came to investigations against the incumbent President Gotabaya Rajapaksa and Yoshitha Rajapaksa the FCID seemed to act in a politically biased and partial manner.

He pointed out that although the com-

the Anti-Corruption Commission set up mittee set up by Wickremesinghe's cabinet memorandum was named the 'Anti-Corruption Committee', not a single anti-corruption ordinance was drafted or introduced.

Rajapakshe who was the Justice Minister in the Yahapalana regime for a brief period said the politically charged FCID had eroded public confidence in the country's law and order and that he had proposed setting up a separate unit under CID to look into corruption. Rajapakshe pointed out that FCID was not legal under the Police Ordinance. TO PAGE 02



Navy foils bid to smuggle 2000 kgs of dried turmeric

The Sri Lanka Navy during special operations conducted on Tuesday and Wednesday has arrested six suspects with over 2000 kilogrammes of dried turmeric smuggled into the country.

Special operations conducted by the Navy in Punapitiya, Udappuwa and Sinnapadu, Kalpitiya on October 6 and 7, 2020 made way to apprehend three suspects with over 1700kg of smuggled dried turmeric, the Navy media unit said.

The Navy arrested three more suspects with over 344kg of dried turmeric and a lorry in Wankaleipadu, Mannar, during another oper-

Police. The Northwestern Naval Command during a special operation conducted in the beach area of Punapitiya, Udappuwa apprehended three suspects with 27 sacks containing over 1297kg of smuggled dried turmeric, while

The lorry and a dinghy used to transfer the stock of turmeric were also held by the Navy. In the meantime, the same naval command managed to recover 19 sacks with 403kg of dried turmeric hidden in a shrub, during another operation carried out

in Sinnapadu area, Kalpitiya. A coordinated search conducted by the North Central Naval Command with the Mannar Police STF in Wankaleipadu, Mannar led to the recovery of over 344kg of dried turmeric in nine delivery sacks on a suspicious lorry

Plan mooted to extend retirement age to 63

MAHINDA ALUTHGEDERA

The Government is planning to extend the retirement age for public and private sector

employees to 63 years. A proposal has been submitted to the Government and a special committee will be appointed to obtain recommendations, Public Services, Provincial Councils and Local Government Minister Janaka Bandara Tennakoon stated.

He said that about 653,000 Sri Lankans are receiving their pensions now, and that 85 per cent of them are paid by the Government.

He was speaking at a media briefing at the Government Information Department yesterday.

The National Retirement Day falls on October 8. The Sri Lanka Department of Pensions has organised a celebration to mark its 50th anniversary this year, but the Department has taken steps not to hold it in the prevailing situation.

Pensions Department Direc-

tor General Jagath Dias said that the Government spends about Rs. 300 billion annually on pension payments.

Pensions Department Additional Director General K.R. Padmapriya said that under the 'Retirement for All' Scheme, the Government considers to raise the retirement age of public and private sector employees to 63 years.

The introduction of a pension scheme for the private sector, securing the public service pension scheme and ensuring that all those who are not covered by a pension receive a pension benefit, are some of the other main features of the programme.

He said that the proposal of the Department of Pensions will be submitted to the Government along with the views of all parties.

Chinese delegation to meet President, Prime **Minister**

A high-powered Chinese delegation led by former Chinese Foreign Minister and the current Communist Party Political Bureau Member Yang Jiechi, is expected to meet with President Gotabaya Raja-paksa, and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa today.

The delegation was slated to arrive in the country late yesterday evening.

Being the first ever Chinese visit in the South Asian region since the global Corona epidemic, the visit is expected to strengthen cooperation between Sri Lanka and China in combating the global pandemic and reviving economic relations.

The travel bubble set up for the purpose of this important visit will confine the delegation to Colombo and restrict to just two meetings with the Head of State and the Prime Minister, under the strict health protocol prescribed by the Health Ministry, a communiqué issued by the Foreign Ministry said.

According to these sections of the Act, if a person found guilty for an offence, the suspect will be liable on conviction to fine not less than four million rupees and not exceeding fifteen million rupees.

The 20 year old MT New Diamond crude oil tanker was transporting 270,000 metric tonnes of crude oil from the port of Mina Al-Ahmadi in Kuwait to the Indian port of Paradip when a fire broke out aboard in the eastern seas of Sri Lankan on September 3.

The vessel was sailing 38 nautical miles off Sangamankanda Point when it caught fire with an explosion in a boiler in the ship's main engine room.

A joint effort by the Sri Lankan Navy, Air Force and Indian Navy succeeded in extinguishing the fire.

Following that, the Marine environment Protection Authority (MEPA) had sought the Attorney General's advice on taking legal action under the Marine Pollution Prevention Act in connection with the marine pollution caused by the oil spill from the vessel.

The Marine Environment Protection Authority was informed by the Attorney General to go to the location of the vessel and investigate whether the oil spill from the vessel had caused marine pollution in the area.

According to the evidence and observations submitted by the MEPA, the Attorney General maintains that it was clear that the oil spill was from the vessel. Previously, the owners of the 'MT New Diamond' vessel had paid in total payment of Rs. 442 million in compensation to Sri Lanka Authorities as the cost incurred by government stakeholders in extinguishing the fire that broke out on the vessel.

However, negotiations with the owners of the vessel pertaining to claims regarding marine pollution caused by the vessel are pending.

Trade Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardena told Parliament yesterday that Sri Lanka as well as the entire world has been affected by the COVID-19 pandemic yet the Sri Lankan government will

grant more relief to people through the November Budget proposals to encourage the people to rejuvenate the economy.

He said that the Government could not allow middlemen to control prices of commodities at their will earning exorbitant profits like during the Good Governance government tenure.He pointed out that it was where the UNP went wrong and it was the same reason for the UNP not being able to elect a single MP.

He made these observations in response to a query made by Opposition Leader Sajith Premadasa under standing order 27 (2).

Dr.Gunawardena said he agreed with Sajith Premadasa that the economy of the country was rendering the people helpless.

He added that the economy of the country was below US\$ 20 billion each year since Independence until Mahinda Rajapaksa accepted the government in 2005.

However after terrorism was defeated, the economy rose and it was US\$ 79.3 billion when the government was handed over to the UNP in 2015. The economic growth rate was 7 percent, Minister Gunawardena said that the economic growth rate dropped to 2.3 percent gradually during the last 5 years under good Governance tenure and it only could increase the economy upto 83.9 percent during the corresponding period. He said that as imports was allowed without any restriction during that period, the USD currency rate dropped from Rs 131.00 to Rs 180.00. He also said hence this government had to restrict the imports to protect local producers.

He added however the government has not controlled coconut and vegetable prices as the Price Control Act was cancelled by late Minister Lalith Athulathmudali during their reign.

He said further the government could not protect producers, consumers and the middlemen alike. He said that the government could ensure to protect the producers and let the consumers have access to products at a reasonable rate. "If the cost of a coconut is Rs. 30, the government cannot sell it at Rs. 150 like during the UNP regime," Minister Bandula Gunawardena said."

The Government cannot allow middlemen to control the price of commodities at their whims and fancies earning exorbitant profits like during Good Governance government's tenure". He said that a standard facemask was Rs. 50 or 60 at the market.

Although the DMI had informed the relevant officials about the need of arresting Zaharan after the Digana incident, none considered about the information at that time," Senanayake stated.

He further stated DMI had informed that Zaharan was bearing Islamic State (IS) Ideology and zaharan was motivating muslim youth to follow the IS ideolog, at the NSC meetings. Senanayake highlighted that former President Maithripala Sirisena was aware of Zaharan's IS ideology since 2018.

The Commissioners inquired as to why the security heads had failed to take necessary measures to arrest Zaharan Hasheem and his followers. Replying to that, Senanayake stated that there was a competition between the investigations services in the country and they were not collaborate with DMI when conducting investigations regarding these matters.

Responding to a question raised by the Commissioners, Senanayake stated that investigations units attached to the Police, the Criminal Investigation Department and Terrorist Investigation Division had failed to work together with the DMI when conducting investigations. As an example, when a stock of explosives was found in Wanathawilluwa in 2019, the CID could have obtained the assistance from the DMI to conduct inquiries since the DMI had a large network regarding this incident.

'No turmeric shortage here by 2022'

"Farmers cultivate the total requirement of turmeric now. The annual requirement is around 7,000 metric tonnes," Department of Agricultural Exports Director General A.P.Heenkenda yesterday said to the Daily News in Kurunegala.

"Of that, 5,000 metric tonnes are imported. About 1,500 hectares have been cultivated with turmeric. The harvest will be reaped in January, 2021. About 22,500 metric tonnes of raw turmeric can be reaped then and 3,800 metric tonnes of dried turmeric can be produced from the harvest," he said.

"About 4,000 metric tonnes of raw turmeric will be used as seed turmeric. The country, therefore, will have enough turmeric by 2022," he said.

Prof. Kapila Gunawardena said that Sri Lanka would be happy to partner with India in this initiative to conserve cultural heritage.

Twentieth death anniversary

A vision etched in the hearts of the people

Sirimavo Bandaranaike's mission to uplift the common man lives on

G reat leaders may die, but their vision will, after their death, incarnate itself in a thousand lives. The forgoing maxim aptly applies to the exceptional vision of Sirimavo Bandaranaike who created history nationally and internationally by becoming the first woman Prime Minister in the world and holding the same portfolio for three terms, namely, 1960 to 1965, 1970 to 1977 and 1994 to 2000.

The outstanding domestic and global mission of Sirima Ratwatte Dias Bandaranaike or Sirimavo Bandaranaike, as she was respectfully called by the people of Sri Lanka, still exists.

Although many of her beneficial and farsighted national development programmes and overseas strategies were condemned merely due to gender discrimination inherent in politics then, in the complex contemporary political composition her farsighted policies still resonate with relevance.

Born on April 17, 1916 to an aristocratic Kandyan family, she bade adieu to the nation after accomplishing the national obligation she was destined to accomplish. Even two decades after her death, the economic, political and social strategies she launched are still discussed and observed in present-day political fields which is a reiteration of the productiveness of Sirimavo's indigenous vision and mission.

The retrogressive perpetrators of the time hoped that they could put an end to the progressive national movement which had been launched by Prime Minister S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike and halt the revolutionary political forward march of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) by assassinating him. But their expectations were shattered as Sirimavo Bandaranaike took the reins of both her late husband's revolutionary mission and the party, at the request of the then party leaders The resolute determination of Sirimavo to fill the tough political vacuum created due to the assassination of S.W.R.D was a historical undertaking. She volunteered to shoulder that challenging responsibility with no hope of any personal gain, but out of compassion for the people

and the party. Since then she dedicated herself wholeheartedly to move forward the mission of ushering the 'common man's era' initiated in 1956.

She rightly and completely followed her husband's socialist policies, neutrality in global relations, and the revival of Buddhism and the Sinhala language and culture. Going ahead bravely with S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike's socialist policies, she nationalised a number of key economic institutions including insur-

ance firms and banks. The distinguished characteristic in During her second term in office, she introduced a new constitution under which the dominion Lanka was transformed into the Republic of Sri Lanka, a free state out of the Commonwealth circle of countries. The new republican constitution introduced by her government replaced the Soulbury Constitution crafted by imperial rulers, a move for which she was acclaimed worldwide.

Making maximum use of the resounding victory by the United Front Coalition consisting of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party, Lanka Sama Samaja Party and Communist Party of Sri Lanka, she steered a number of revolutionary reforms in the Sri Lankan polity. Her political coalition consisted of a collection of prominent party leaders of diverse visions such as socialist, capitalist and liberal. Sirimavo had the vision to deftly manage all such diverse ideologies.

Shortly after the establishment of the United Coalition government in 1970, she had to face the youth unright of the Jonatha

uprising of the Janatha Vimukthi Peramunu (JVP). The political competence she displayed in controlling the armed youth struggle was highly commended by local and global military analysts. At the time of the youth uprising, our armies were mere ceremonial reservists. In that unexpected difficult situation, her international friends came forward to help her in overcoming the armed conflict. Many political analysts described the international solidarity she could muster in controlling the conflict as a personal trait of Sirimavo

Bandaranaike. Following the lessons learnt from the youth unrest she formulated and promulgated a new industrial policy aimed at ensuring sustainable industrial progress in the country. She established a number of new industries such as cement, paper, steel and chemical Sirimavo rightly and completely followed her husband's socialist policies, neutrality in global relations, and the revival of Buddhism and the Sinhala language and culture.

under the patronage of rich socialist countries. Even contemporary economic forecasters are in favour of her economic strategies targeted at a self-reliance economy in place of a dependent consumption system.

She constantly worked to eliminate the inequality in distribution of wealth and resources among the rural population, understanding the





economic inequalities that the rural youth had to face. Foreseeing the consequences of the Global Food Shortage in 1973 she introduced and launched the 'Battle of Production' to overcome the then food deficiency. Although her accelerated food production move was condemned with contempt by her opponents, the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) highly commended her food production strategy and awarded her the Ceres medal of honour.

The most celebrated achievement

of the political career of Sirimavo Bandaranaike as I perceive is her exceptional foreign policy. Her government suffered certain embargos from Western powers as she nationalised the tea estates and petroleum firms of American and British entrepreneurs. However, Sirimavo firmly followed her brave political policies despite Western dissuasions, and bent towards China and Russia, the two giant socialist powers. She mediated wisely into the Indo-China conflict and guided the two parties to solve the issue peacefully. She also earned global admiration following her introduction of the resolution for the Indian Ocean as a Zone of Pe in the international arena. Her foreign policy was well accepted equally by affluent and as well as small states. She was constantly esteemed by the leaders of the Non-aligned MoveThe most celebrated achievement of the political career of Sirimavo Bandaranaike is her exceptional foreign policy.

ment (NAM) countries. Specifically she was an enthusiastic friend of both India and China. She could provide a promising leadership to the NAM and held the Nam Summit Conference 1976 in Sri Lanka with success by which she could demonstrate the glory and prosperity of Sri Lanka to the global community.

The prominent proclamation made by her in her address to the NAM Summit in 1976 still bears justification to the modern world also. "NAM countries should oppose the injustice, inequality, outdated colonial dominance and influential interferences," she asserted at the summit.

She always loved and defended the thousands of party members of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party. During the time in power and at times of no power, even without civic rights, her priority was the party and its members. She at all times defended democracy and fostered those noble democratic values in giving leadership to the party. Although she bade adieu to the nation two decades ago, the community and the party did not say goodbye to her. The significance of her exceptional vision and mission will remain in the hearts and souls of the common masses for ages.

n July 21, 1960, Sirimavo Bandaranaike became the first democratically elected woman Prime Minister in the world. During her lifetime, she went on to serve three terms as the Prime Minister of Sri Lanka. Her daughter, Chandrika Bandaranaike Kumaratunga went on to become the first woman President of Sri Lanka.

However, these women largely remain anomalies in the nation's history.

"I wouldn't necessarily say we broke the glass ceiling with Sirimavo and Chandrika. They don't represent the average women who aspire to enter politics," said Sathya Karunarathne, research executive at Advocata Institute. "They had strong pedigree politics. Their families, their husbands, fathers, the men in their lives, were deeprooted in politics."

Sixty years since Sirimavo's election, women's political representation in the Sri Lankan Parliament remains abysmally low. In 2020, only 5.3 percent — 12 out of 225 legislators — in the Sri Lankan Parliament are women.

Despite being the majority of the electorate at 52 percent of the total population and 56 percent of the registered voters, female voices remain absent from formal politics. Sri Lanka ranks 182nd out of 193 countries on the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU), a global database that ranks countries by the percentage share of women in their national Parliament. Among its South Asian neighbours, only the Maldives has fewer women politicians in its parliament. To address the large inequity, the previous Sri Lankan government introduced a 25 percent mandatory quota for women to enter the local government in 2016. Prior to the 2016 amendment, women's representation was at meagre two percent in the local government. In the 2018 elections, 17,000 women ran for elections out of the more than 56,000 candidates for over 8,000 posts. Female representation in leadership roles skyrocketed from 89 to 2,300 in 2018.

However, according to Karunarathne, the gender quota, without addressing the

deep-rooted structural barriers to women's political participation, is setting up women politicians to fail. There are three major structural limitations encountered by Sri Lankan women when entering politics, she adds.

First, the education structure, influenced by stereotypes and social norms where girls are not encouraged to study and pursue politics. Second, Sri Lankan political parties have large barriers of entry for women interested in politics. Without men's extensive networks and patronage, the small number of women who are in the Sri Lankan Parliament have entered mainly through pedigree politics and their relation to male politicians.

Third, women politicians lack finance to effectively run campaigns. A 2013 UN women's study found that over 80 percent respondents identified the lack of access to

funding as one of the biggest challenges to women's entry into politics worldwide. Lihini Fernando, the United National Party (UNP) municipal councillor from Moratuwa, stated that it costs about Rs. 25 million to campaign throughout a district.

Sri Lanka has no campaign finance act but there is a draft Election Campaign Finance Bill that would require candidates to reveal sources of funds. Illicit campaign financing and the high costs of Sri Lankan elections can be combatted by introducing a cap on campaign spending and amending current election laws to include disclosure of campaign contributions, said Karunarathne.

"This could help level the playing field for women. Politics is largely male-dominated, and campaign financing is another big boys' club that does not necessarily take into consideration the economic realities of women." Additionally, a 2016 IPU study found that psychological violence including sexist remarks has affected 81.8 percent of female Parliamentarians globally. Sexism remains pervasive in Sri Lanka for the few women who are able to climb the tall fences of political gatekeeping.

Not long ago, when Rosy Senanayake, then Member of Parliament for Colombo and now its first woman Mayor, questioned transport minister Kumara Welgama, his public response was "you are such a charming woman. I cannot explain my feelings here but if you meet me outside Parliament, I will describe them."

Despite little formal representation, women have been making their presence felt through voter turnouts and political movements like the Mother's Front. The mothers of those that disappeared in Sri Lanka's protracted civil war have been pro-

testing for years for answers on the whereabouts of their loved ones.

Laws in Sri Lanka are highly gender-discriminatory: marital rape is legal; limitations to inheritance and property rights remain prevalent in the Muslim Marriage and Divorce Act (MMDA), Kandyan law, and Tesawalamai law; discriminatory female employment laws like the 1954 Employment Act restrict women's work at night and more.

Sri Lanka's fiscal policy also has disproportionate effects. For instance, there is a 62.6 percent tax levied on menstrual products. Under this existing tax structure, menstruating for just five days would cost Sri Lankan women in the poorest households approximately 3.5 percent of their total expenditures for the month.

As the coronavirus ravages lives worldwide, we are seeing a resurgence of the importance of public health spending. Research by Patricia Funk and Christina Gathmann shows that Swiss female politicians are more likely to favour spending on health, unemployment, and social security than their male counterparts. Research by the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab also shows that women political leaders in villages were more likely to invest in priorities for women like drinking water and road improvement because they understand and share them.

There is a noticeable role model effect, observed by Lori Beaman, Esther Duflo, Rohini Pande, and Petia Topalova, where the gender gap in aspirations of girls and boys between 11 and 15 closed by 32 percent for girls and by 25 percent for their parents in Indian villages with reserved quotas for women leaders.

It also helped eradicate gender disparity in educational attainment of young girls, and girls spent less time doing household work.

Past research has shown that women have to constitute at least 30 percent of the decision-making body to exert influence and promote pro-women policies. Sri Lanka remains far from meeting that goal. (*The Diplomat*)



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

Government will eradicate drug trafficking – Minister Chamal Rajapaksa

Eradicating drug trafficking is a main objective of the Government, and the Police will do its utmost to achieve this goal, Minister Chamal Rajapaksa said in Parliament yesterday.

Minister Rajapaksa was responding to a question by Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) MP Hesha Withana during the question round on the drug rackets in the Ratnapura District and action to curtail the rackets.

Minister Chamal Rajapaksa said that in the Ratnapura District, drugs worth Rs. 110 million



have been nabbed by the Police in the last two years with 6,962 raids and 6,957 arrests.

"Sufficient steps have been taken to curtail the drug racket in Ratnapura District. Several drugs were seized and suspects were arrested.

"We have taken legal measures against the suspects. We have organised special awareness programmes to educate teachers and students on drug dealings targeting schools.

"We have taken steps to establish information centres to get information on dealing drugs to schoolchildren. A 24/7 special operation unit has been set up to take complaints and alerts on drug dealings of the area at the Senior DIG Office," Minister Rajapaksa said.

Minister Rajapaksa said that a number of drug kingpins were already in jail. If you happen to know more of them, submit the information you have to the Police, Minister Rajapaksa said.

Minister Rajapaksa said that the Government will deploy Criminal Investigation Department (CID) officers to probe into drug rackets among estate work-

ers.

Any international agreement detrimental to country will not be signed - Minister Aluthgamage

The Government led by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa will not sign any international agreement detrimental to the country, Agriculture Minister Mahindananda Aluthgamage said yesterday.

Aluthgamage made this observation joining the debate on the adjournment motion moved by Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) MP Dr. Harsha De Silva on the country's economy. Moving the adjournment motion Dr. De Silva suggested that the country's economy is dwindling as a result of the Government's economic policies. De Silva suggested that large scale businesses and small and medium enterprises have been severely affected by the Government's economic policies. De Silva suggested that the Government has failed to manage the economic crisis that occurred due to the COVID-19 pandemic. De Silva criticised the tax policies implemented by the Government.

Diesel power generation will be reduced to 5% by 2025 – Minister Alahapperuma

The Government will reduce diesel power generation to 5 per cent by 2025, Power and Energy Minister Dullas Alahapperuma Said in Parliament yesterday.

The Minister was responding to a question by Parliamentarian Chaminda Wijesiri during the oral questions round.

Minister Alahapperuma said that the CEB has

incurred losses Rs. 14. 4 BN in 2016, Rs. 47.5 BN in 2016, Rs. 31.9 BN in 2018 and Rs. 85.4 BN in 2019.

Minister Alahapperuma said that natural liquid gas power plants will be introduced under energy diversification. "This has been discussed since 2007. But nothing happened. Steps are taken to add 600 LNG to the power grid, and we have

already obtained Cabinet approval for the project," the Minister said.

"Delay of completing power generation projects is a major fallback. No major power plant has been added to the national grid for 7 years after 2013. The last addition was the Lak Vijaya by then President Mahinda Rajapaksa. The next period had moved away from the national plan on power genera-

tion. They used costly generation methods and did not update charging rates accordingly," Minister Alahapperuma said.

The Minister said that the wastage of electricity is between 8 per cent and 10 per cent and hopes to reduce it. He said that he believes that the CEB will make a profit following these measures.





Provincial Councils and Local Government State Minister Sarath Weerasekara said that India has no moral right to force Sri Lanka to implement the 13th Amendment as it is detrimental to the country.

Talking about international agreements in Parliament yesterday, he said it is very important to talk about indo Lanka accord as it affects our national security.

"When foreign governments adversely commented on the abrogation of article 370 pertaining to Jammu and Kashmir, our Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa was asked to comment on the matter and he said it was an internal matter of India. Knowing that this is an internal matter of Sri Lanka, PM Modi insisting on the 13th Amendment, maybe because India's participation and commitment are acknowledged through the facilitation of the Indo Lanka Accord.

But in the Indo-Lanka Agreement there is no agreement about the 13th Amendment. It was forced on us by India subsequently. Also I have my reservations about the Indo-Lanka Accord signed on July 2, 2020. Did India honour her part in that agreement?"

He noted that it says all the displaced persons in ethnic violence or other reasons will have the right to vote and to create necessary conditions to engage them to return.

"But thousands of Sinhalese and Muslims who lived in the north have never returned to date. Also it says within 48 hours, cessation of hostilities came into effect and all arms held by terrorist groups will be surrendered to the authorities. We know it was only done as a token ceremoniously and India couldn't stop the revival of hostilities of the LTTE. Even the IPKF, one of the largest armies of the world, couldn't crash the LTTE and had to return to India with heavy casualties. However, the Sri Lankan forces with proper political leadership defeat-

ed the LTTE but that too at very heavy cost. Around 20,000 were killed, 14,000 wounded in action and so India could not fulfill that requirement, too." He said the question

arises whether this agreement was signed under duress or whether the contents of the agreement compromised Sri Lanka's sovereignty.

"Because one thing we know is that when we were about to crush the LTTE at Wadamarachchi, India violated our air space and dropped food and medicine in Jaffna famously known as Dhal dropping operation of India. Within two months the agreement was signed making that incident a coincidental prelude to the agreement. Also it mentions about the Trincomalee harbour and oil tanks and Sri Lanka courts have nullified the merger of the North and East Provinces, which was one of the clauses in the accord."

Therefore, he said there is serious concern about the validity of the agreement and if it is not valid, India has no moral right to interfere into our internal affairs. "I also must remind India soon after its independence, there was a separatist movement by the Dravidians. That's why Jawaharlal Nero broke India into 28 linguistic states. In ancient China and many other civilizations like Roman, Greek, when regional powers became strong, the then empires got broken up and diminished. Ambedkar expresses that "linguistic states and political entities will become a stepping stone to create separate states". He further states that the road between an independent nationality and independent state is very narrow. If this happens modern India will cease to exist."

Therefore, he noted that India should be cognizant of the fact that granting self determination to the North or the merged of North and East could be utilised as a stepping-

stone for a dravidistan or if not they could link up with Tamil Nadu. "So, Balkanization of Sri Lanka into nine provincial governments through the 13th Amendment will invariably affect the unity of India. The promoter will then become the victim. In the north 99 per cent of the population are Tamils, the LTTE resorted to ethnic cleansing and all Sinhalese and

Muslims who lived in the north massacred or chased out. Now the separatist politicians seek self determination. That is why experts say power should never be divided based on ethnicity. The 13th Amendment provides for ethnic enclaves. We know devolution of power as a post to decentralisation up to the lowest level. The centre must retain the power. Our culture of governance was centered with the ruling king. It has not fundamentally changed. A virtuous ruler is the term that we recognise respect and expect. India and Sri Lanka have very long history of friendship, and we recognise the importance of nurturing that friendship.⁴

Weerasekara admitted that he loves Indian very much for the Indian Navy, and India contributed a lot for him to become a professional Navy officer. "So having said that, let me mention one of the statements mentioned by Prime Minister Modi. He insists on the 13th Amendment to fulfill the aspirations of the Tamils in the north. It is respectfully reminded that more than 50 per cent of the Tamils in Sri Lanka are living in the south amongst the Sinhalese and Muslims. So, if power is devolved to fulfill the northern Tamils what about the aspirations of Tamils living in the South? Does that mean that India is not concerned about their aspirations or is India convinced that their aspirations are already met? India also must study why the Tamils from the North in the past years keep on coming to the

South. Because they know they are not discriminated against. Also the Indian Prime Minister is talking to the Tamil political parties who work on a separatist agenda. The TNA is the political arm of the LTTE, the most ruthless terror organization in the world and even India has banned it. The leaders took an oath in front of Prabhakaran before coming to Parliament. The LTTE killed Rajiv Gandhi, one of the most popular Prime Minister's in India. The TNA has never condemned the assassination of Rajiv Gandhi or for that matter any of the atrocities of the Tamil Tigers. So, Mr. Modi, talking to politicians or political parties and addressing their so-called grievances is like someone appearing for the interest the associates of his mother's killer. If it is required, he should talk with the Tamils in societies comprising respectable and educated Tamils and not the representa-

tives of terrorists." He thanked India, however, because she stood by Sri Lanka at the UNHRC, soon after we defeated the LTTE. "When there were war crimes allegations against us, in 2009 on May 27 India voted in favour of us and congratulated us for crashing the LTTE and condemned the Tigers for their murderous acts. Also in 2014 when the UNHRC adopted a resolution calling for an investigation in Sri Lanka, India opposed saying it is an intrusion of a country's sovereignty. We won the war against terrorists by rescuing 295,000 Innocent Tamils from the clutches of the LTTE. It was the largest rescue operation in the world. We cleared 495,000 anti-personnel mines for the Tamils to be resettled. We resettled 300,000 Tamils within a very short period. The so-called saviors of Tamils who are now appearing for the aspirations of the Tamils, never came and offered even a cup of yoghurt to an innocent Tamil child during that operation.

So, I hope Indian Prime Minister Modi would take all these facts into consideration before asking us to implement the 13th Amendment again."

A wise move

he decision taken by the authorities not to impose an islandwide curfew in the wake of the detection of the largest Coronavirus cluster in the country is a sound one indeed, given its wider implications. Presently, a curfew is in force in 18 Police divisions of the Gampaha district following the unearthing of a Coronavirus cluster in the confines of a single garment factory in Minuwangoda. Army Commander Lt. General Shavendra Silva who is also the Head of the National Operations Centre for the Prevention of Covid-19 ruled out an islandwide curfew, at least for the moment, even though the expanding Brandix cluster was baffling to them. Health Minister Pavithra Wanniarachchi too opined that an islandwide curfew was not an immediate option though the situation was being closely monitored. She told Parliament on Wednesday that as a responsible Government it was not their intention to push the country to the brink by such a measure.

- No doubt the experience of the first Coronavirus outbreak may have prompted the Government to hold back from plunging headlong into a countrywide lockdown.The implications from such a drastic course are all too well known both to the economy and also to the community. Besides, many who lost their livelihoods as a result of the earlier lockdown are only just beginning to pick up the pieces. This also applies to businesses and commercial establishments. It is also a positive sign that the Government has not gone into panic mode and taken drastic measures. It has allowed normal life to proceed as far as possible at its own pace with a proviso that the public should strictly follow the health guidelines in operation. The GCE (A/L) and Year Five scholarships exams will be held on schedule. Businesses, offices and workplaces are operating as usual, subjected to the guidelines in force.
- However all this does not mean the country is out of the woods vis-a-vis the Coronavirus. The Army Commander and health authorities together with Cabinet spokesman Keheliya Rambukwella noted that the next 48 hours could be crucial. This no doubt is on account of the hitherto unsuccessful bid to trace the original carrier who infected the female supervisor of the Minuwangoda factory and precipitated a cluster of 1034 patients and perhaps, a long chain stemming from this.
- There are reports of detection of Coronavirus cases outside the Brandix cluster, with several other persons having tested positive. They may or may not have had contact with the Brandix cluster or their associates. However, top Epidemiologist Dr. Sudath Samaraweera has ruled out the chance of the

Rishad Bathiudeen" - President Opposition politicians are ready to grab any weapon to attack the Government as they have run out of issues. In the rush to make allegations against the ruling party, they put their feet in their mouths again and again. The latest weapon they picked up in their witch hunt is the release of the detained Rivaj Bathiudeen, brother of All Ceylon Makkal Congress (ACMC), Rishad Bathiudeen. They have conveniently forgotten that the power to discharge a suspect lies solely with the system of judiciary and crime investigations by police and any attempt to question that right is an attempt to interfere in free and fair justice. As Irrigation and State Minister of Internal Security, Home Affairs and Disaster Management Chamal Rajapaksa clarified in Parliament on Tuesday (Oct 6), the release of former minister Rishad Bathiudeen's brother Riyaj arrested in connection with the Easter Sunday carnage did not mean that he had been cleared of all charges. It was a decision taken by the courts and it can also decide to order the arrest of the suspect if new evidence linked to him surfaces. The issue was raised in Parliament by Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) MP Chaminda Wijesiri. In reply, the Minister replied that Riyaj had been taken into custody on April 14, 2020 on suspicion of connections with Insaf Ahmed, the terrorist who blew himself up at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel in Colombo during the terror attacks that took place on April 21, 2019. The CID found out that there were 17 calls made by the suspect to the terrorist. Initially, the suspect had been detained under the provisions of the Prevention of Terrorism Act (PTA) for three days for questioning and thereafter obtained the permission of courts twice for three months each. The investigators have found that the suspect and the terrorists had no terror links. The calls had been made for business purposes. "There is no evidence to prove that the suspect aided and abetted the terrorist(s) to carry out the attacks, and, therefore he was released on Sept 29, 2020. The last call was three months prior to the attacks. However, if there is new evidence, he will be arrested again," Minister Rajapaksa said. He said that 130 employees in public institutions and statutory institutions had been interrogated with regard to the Easter Sunday terror attack. After interrogations it had been found that some of them were innocent or that there was no evidence to prove those suspects had links to the terrorists. They had been released. Ten employees in public institutions and statutory institutions had been arrested on terror charges. Cases are

past. "I will also take actions to rectify any omissions or mistakes made by the relevant authorities or officials," said the President.

"I emphasize that our Government has not entered into any political deal with MP Rishad Bathiudeen," he said and assured the citizens he will not forsake the trust that they have placed in him and he will most certainly continue to work towards strengthening this trust.

Cabinet spokesman Minister Keheliya Rambukwella said that since there are some concerns over Bathiudeen he should not be taken into the Government. The ruling party, Sri Lanka Podujana Permauna (SLPP) too announced that neither the Government nor the SLPP had entered into any agreement with MP Rishad Bathiudeen. "There is no discussion or any idea to absorb MP Bathiudeen into the government," SLPP General Secretary Sagara Kariyawasam said. However, responding to a question asked at the SLPP weekly news briefing over the concerns raised by Archbishop of Colombo Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith over the release of Rivaj Bathiudeen, MP Kariyawasam called for an immediate investigation into the release of Riyaj Bathiudeen, who was arrested over alleged involvement in the Easter Sunday Attacks. "We request the Defence Secretary to launch an immediate investigation into the incident and to find out if there has been any irregularity in the release of Riyaj Bathiudeen," he said. Minister Wimal Weerawansa, known for his outspoken statements, said that the Government is not stupid to have any deals with Bathiudeen. He said that if any attempt is made to allow Bathiudeen to join the Government he will be chased out.Sports Minister Namal Rajapaksa too said the Government maintains its stand that it will not have any dealings with extremists. Furthermore, Rishad Bathiudeen clarified that his party, the All Ceylon Makkal Congress did not have any agreement with the Government nor has it had any talks with the Government. The people have the highest expectations from law enforcement institutions. The police have the fullest responsibility of probing crimes, arrest suspects and also discharge a person if there is no sufficient evidence to prove guilt at a trail seeking conviction. Hence, politicians should not jump to give their own interpretations of 'political deals' when a suspect is arrested or discharged. It is not a healthy sign of a mature democracy. Constantly questioning the capacity to interpret the law is akin to constantly questioning the legitimacy of politicians to even make any law in the first place. In the past, we have seen ugly scenes such as stone throwing at the houses of judges who had given verdicts that were not seen as being favourable to the party in power at that time. The members of the Opposition should think, not twice but several times, before challenging a Court decision merely to score brownie points over the ruling party.

Samaraweera has ruled out the chance of the Coronavirus having reached the stage of community spread. But an unknown number of associates of the Brandix cluster, and their first contacts and in return their associates down the line are still at large going about their business nonchalantly possibly infecting hundreds of others in the process. This is the time for the authorities to be a little more forthcoming and take the people into their confidence by drawing a true picture of the situation. That way, the people in turn would understand the gravity of what is at stake and respond positively to all advice.

The arrival of 48 Lankans from the Brandix branches in India too had given rise to all kinds of questions and speculation, which, thankfully, had been put to rest by the Army Commander ruling out any link with the Brandix cluster in Minuwangoda. This was reminiscent of the arrival of a staff member of the US diplomatic Corps in Colombo into the country during the first outbreak of Corona here bypassing the quarantine procedures, which stirred a hornet's nest.

Meanwhile, a call has gone out from an Opposition MP that all Parliamentarians be subjected to PCR tests. This suggestion could have some merit given that MPs by virtue of their calling have to mix with the public which, in the context of present developments, is fraught with danger. The suggestion could well have been made in jest or as part and parcel of the political power play in this country. But one should not forget the distinguished line of politicians the world over who fell prey to the pandemic starting with US President Donald Trump, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro, Heir to the British Throne Prince Charles and many other leaders around the world all of whom went into quarantine.

Hence, it goes without saying that this is hardly a time to dwell on such niceties such as Parliamentary Privileges or diplomatic immunity, in the teeth of the worst health emergency the world has witnessed in recent times (almost no one alive now has a recollection of the 1918-20 Spanish Flu which killed millions). Hence, the need for all concerned to act with responsibility and circumspection in finding ways to overcome the present health crisis and make the world a better place to live in health-wise.

The long road ahead for New Caledonia

oters in the South Islands Pacific French colony of New Caledonia have narrowly voted to remain with French rule, but indigenous Kanaks have been celebrating the outcome of October 5 vote as taking a step closer to independence. A third referendum needs to be held in two years' time under the Noumea Accord, and they feel that majority of voters would then vote for independence.

Kanaks are an indigenous Melanesian race that has settled in the islands 3,000 years ago. Ethnographic research has shown that Polynesian seafarers have intermarried with the Kanaks over the centuries. New Caledonia was

annexed to France in 1853 and became a French overseas territory in 1956. The cluster of islands known as New Caledonia consists of one of the largest landmasses in the Pacific Ocean, and it boasts about 25 percent of the world's nickel resources

With the island's nickel industry taking off in the 1960s the French authorities brought migrants from France and Asian countries such as Vietnam, Indonesia and Japan in a bid to outnumber the indigenous Kanaks. In the 1970s the Kanak and Socialist Nation-Liberation Front (FLNKS) was formed seeking independence. The main concerns of FLNKS were immigration and the redistribution of nickel revenues.

The leaders of the newly independent South Pacific Islands who have formed the South Pacific Forum supported FLNKS's quest for independence. With New Caledonia virtually in

Australia and Japan have been the major players in the industry until recently. In 2015, Kanak truck drivers went on strike blocking strategic points in the transport of nickel from the mines to the port. Drivers called for new exports of nickel to China to save their jobs. This divided the political establishment in the islands and a vote in the 54-member Congress opened the door to exports to China.

Last year, the loss-making Brazilian owned nickel mine Vale was put up for sale and in December New Caledonia's Southern Province President Sonia Beckes said that they will have no other choice than selling it to a Chinese buyer. French authorities are keeping an eye on attempts by China to expand its commercial activities in New Caledonia, the same way they have done in neighbouring Vanuatu and Fiji.

ounds like a contradiction doesn't it? It is and it is not. The one (keeping distance) is literal and the other (staying close) is metaphorical. Distance anyway is in the news thanks to Covid-19 and the recent 'breakout' that has rudely shocked people out of complacency.

Wash hands. Wear a face mask. Maintain social distance. The mantra has made a strident resurgence. This is good.

We still know very little about Covid-19. The entire world is still largely in the dark. There's talk of multiple strains of the virus, which obviously doesn't help identification and treatment. It also calls for greater vigilance.

As in most cases like this, the initial response has been little more than a blame-game. Pointing ed or go through motions so we fingers is the easy thing. Of course,

we need answers. We need to know how it all started. We need to know whether relevant authorities at Brandix were negligent when the warning signs first surfaced. We need answers because that helps us prepare better.

And yet, we need to go beyond all that. We have to recognize that it is our fellow citizens who have unfortunately contracted the virus. We need to recognize that they are not to blame. They didn't invite the virus and if they were, as the case may be, negligent in terms of precaution protocols, well they are no better and no worse than any of

Almost everyone has a mask, but does everyone wear it when in public or when talking with or in the presence of another person? Do we wash hands as recommendcan get our work done faster? And



distance: did we maintain it or did we ignore it altogether?

This is a situation which calls on everyone to do his or her bit. A state, a government, a hospital or an army of medical personnel just cannot handle it without the full cooperation of the public. No country on earth has a citizenry endowed with 100 percent civic consciousness.

There will be that one person who out of arrogance, ignorance or pure ill-will acts like an adjutant of the virus. On the other hand, if such acts and such persons form a significant percentage, then we are

well and truly on the way to being sunk.

So we need to keep distance. We need distance for safety and we need distance for perspective. When we are safe and have some perspective, we tend to be less emotional and more rational. That cannot be a bad thing. And yet, we need to be close. Metaphorically, as mentioned above.

Close as in showing solidarity with the infected, if not for any other reason than the high possibility that each and every one of us could become infected too. Those who ridicule the infected, blame

them and badmouth them must understand that they could very well be infected themselves. They would stop being finger-pointers and become 'the finger-pointed to' so to speak.

That possibility is not why we should stand, metaphorically, with the infected. The simple truth is that if we look away, if we run away or in any other manner, in word and deed, shun the infected, we feed 'stigma.' That is dangerous. Very dangerous.

Stigma, clearly, makes people hesitant to seek medical treatment or get tested. They try to suppress the symptoms but they just can't

stop the virus from spreading to each and every person they come into contact with. They might even be reluctant to self-isolate for fear of someone wondering why they are isolated and putting two and two together. Essentially it leads to under-reporting and to more people being exposed. Sooner or later it comes out. No one can hide. However, by then, things could have progressed to a point where tracking and tracing is virtually impossible.

No Covid-19 patient should ever feel that his or her fellow citizens do not empathize. They should feel that the entire nation is wishing them full and swift recovery. If we can get that kind of message across to the infected, it will mean that we are strong as a nation, resilient as a people and singleminded in our solidarity.

That might be what it takes to beat Covid-19 or rather that might be the best we can do as individuals and collectives in supporting relevant authorities to fight the virus. We must stand with each other, even as we maintain recommended social-distancing protocols

Sri Lankan economy to contract by 6.7% in 2020

WASHINGTON: South Asia is set to plunge into its worst-ever recession as the devastating impacts of COVID-19 on the region's economies linger on, taking a disproportionate toll on informal workers and pushing millions of South Asians into extreme poverty, says the World Bank in its twice-a-year-regional update.

Released yesterday, the latest South Asia Economic Focus Beaten or Broken? forecasts a sharper than expected economic slump across the region, with regional growth expected to contract by 7.7 percent in 2020, after topping 6 percent annually in the past five years.


India's economy, the region's largest, is expected to contract by 9.6 percent in the fiscal year that started in March 2020. Regional growth is projected to rebound to 4.5 percent in 2021. Factoring in population growth, however, incomeper-capita in the region will remain 6 percent below 2019 estimates, indicating that the expected rebound will not offset the lasting economic damage caused by the pandemic.

"The current account deficit is expected to remain low (at 2.2 percent of GDP in 2020) thanks to low oil prices and strict import restrictions, which should largely offset the reduction in receipts from garment exports, tourism and remittances," the report further notes regarding Sri Lanka.

"However, refinancing requirements will be high, with annual foreign exchange debt service requirements estimated at 7-8 percent of GDP over 2020-2022.3

The fiscal deficit is projected to expand further to over 11 percent of GDP in 2020, driving an increase in debt levels.

Reflecting these challenges in Sri Lanka the \$3.20 poverty headcount is projected to increase from 8.9 percent in 2019 to 13 percent in 2020. It adds that the Sri Lankan economy is expected to contract by 6.7% in 2020. In previous reces-



sions, falling investment and exports led the downturn. This time is different, as private consumption, traditionally the backbone of demand in South Asia and a core indicator of economic welfare, will decline by more than 10 percent, further spiking poverty rates. A decline in remittances is also expected to accelerate loss of livelihoods for the poorest in some countries.

The collapse of South Asian economies during COVID-19 has been more brutal than anticipated, worst of all for small businesses and informal workers who suffer sudden job losses and vanishing wages," said Hartwig Schafer, World Bank Vice President for the South Asia Region. "Immediate relief has dulled the impacts of the pandemic, but governments need to address the deep-seated vulnerabilities of their informal sec-

Three-quarters of all workers in South Asia depend on informal employment, especially in hospitality, retail trade, and transport-sectors most affected by containment measures. The report warns that informal workers and firms have little room to cope with unexpected shocks of the magnitude of COVID-19. While the poor have faced rising food prices and suffered severely, the COVID-19 crisis has dealt a further blow to many informal workers in the middle of the income distribution who experienced sharp drops in earnings.

Few informal workers are covered by social insurance, have savings or access to finance. The report urges governments to design universal social protection as well as policies that support greater productivity, skills development, and human capital. In that effort, securing international and domestic financing will help governments fund crucial programs to speed up recov-

In the long-term, digital technologies can play an essential role in creating new opportunities for informal workers, making South Asia more competitive and better integrated into markets-if countries improve digital access and support workers to take advantage of online platforms.

"COVID-19 will profoundly transform South Asia for years to come and leave lasting scars in its economies. But there is a silver lining toward resilient recovery: the pandemic could spur innovations that improve South Asia's future participation in global value chains, as its comparative advantage in tech services and niche tourism will likely be in higher demand as the global economy becomes more digital," said Hans Timmer, World Bank Chief Economist for the South Asia Region.

Virus cases top 4,000 a day in Germany, a first since April

BERLIN: New cases of coronavirus infections in Germany have soared past 4,000, official data showed Thursday, reaching a daily level not seen since April 11 when the country was still in lockdown.

Europe's biggest economy recorded 4,058 new Covid-19 cases in 24 hours, including 16 deaths, according to latest data compiled by the disease control agency RKI.

The alarming jump in numbers came with autumn school holidays about to begin, prompting calls from Chancellor Angela Merkel's government for citizens to avoid travel abroad during the usually busy period for tourism.

Germany's 16 states were also tightening rules for domestic travel,

agreeing Wednesday evening on a ban on overnight stays in hotels or holiday apartments for visitors from so-called risk zones within the coun-

Places where new infections top 50 per 100,000 inhabitants over the last seven days are classed as risk zones, and local authorities are required to take specific measures to halt contagion.

Parts of central Berlin have slipped into the category, prompting the German capital authorities to order restaurants and bars closed from 11pm. Likewise, numbers in financial capital Frankfurt were also rising, and are now just a whisker away from risk-zone category. (AFP)

Brazil coronavirus cases pass five million

BRASLIA: Brazil surpassed five million coronavirus infections on Wednesday and is approaching 150,000 deaths from the disease, amid optimism the virus is slowing in the hard-hit South American coun-

try. The Health Ministry reported 31,553 new infections in the previous 24 hours, registering a total of 5,000,694 cases overall, behind only the United States and India.

Home to 212 million people, Brazil also counted 734 new deaths Wednesday, meaning the virus has claimed 148,228 lives since the country recorded its first death in March.


Brazil has the world's second-highest death toll from the disease after confirmed," he said. the US.

The country's curve appears to be descending, however. The average number of deaths per day for the past week was 610. The daily average rarely dipped below 1,000 per day from June through August.

The country averaged around 27,000 new infections per day over the past week. The average was over 40,000 in early September.

But experts agree that despite the downward trend, the situation in Brazil remains "worrying." The fall in the number of cases "isn't yet sustained," University of Brasilia epidemiologist Mauro Sanchez told AFP. "Therefore, there is an initial

Explosions and sirens sounded in Nagorno-Karabakh's regional capital Stepanakert as the city continued to face regular shelling, AFP journalists said.

Heavy bombardments have levelled many homes since fighting erupted late last month and Stepanakert is pockmarked with unexploded ordinance and wide craters from shelling.

nia said fighting continued into Thursday, with both sides claiming to have inflicted heavy losses and accusing the other of shelling civilian areas.

Alongside the new bombardments in Stepanakert, Azerbaijan said Armenian shelling on several villages near the frontline had left people dead and wounded.

Armenia's rights ombudsman Artak Beglaryan told AFP on Wednesday that the renewed fighting has displaced around half of Karabakh's 140,000 residents and forced some 90 percent of its women and children Defence officials in Azerbaijan and Arme- from their homes. The fighting in one of

the most combustible frozen conflicts resulting from the fall of the Soviet Union erupted on September 27, with Azerbaijan insisting the region must return to its control.

Nagorno-Karabakh broke away from Azerbaijan in a 1990s war that claimed the ives of some 30,000 people.

The Armenian separatists declared independence, but no countries recognise its autonomy and it is still acknowledged by world leaders as part of Azerbaijan.

Six organic cassava processing and fruit dehydration plants to be set up

USD 5 mn joint venture project

Starch Industries Pvt. Ltd, (a Sri Lankan agri pharma company) and Via Agri Pvt. Ltd (into agriculture and fruit processing) which entered into a joint venture will initially invest over USD 5 million to set up plants to process organic cassava and for fruit dehydration.

"We will initially set up one factory in the North Western province and subsequently add five more factories within the next two years, said Group - Managing Director, Via Tropic Foods (Pvt) Ltd, LTD T. H. Cambal. He said that construction of the first factory will commence in November and would be ready by

February. He said that several foreign parties are involved in this project and they also hope to channel foreing Debt funding as well.

In a bid to create a local raw material base we will also establish plantations and a farmer network of up to 30,000 acres to grow organic cassava to supply the starch processing facto-

"We will also work with formers and sign up several forward buying agreements with farmers to cultivate organic fruits to be dehydrated and packed for export in these factories which would be jointly owned by the Starch Industries group and Via Agri group.

Tapioca starch is the second most used starch source in the world after corn (maize). It is also extensively used in the food industry as an additive, as well as a staple food. The dried fruits market has been estimated to be valued over US\$ 43.54 billion in 2018, which



rom a sacred sites tour of the first Kingdom we realize that inspiration from Nature like the beautiful Bo leaf, when folded in half, one can see the architectural inspiration behind the Buddhist Stupas

Sri Lanka's first city Anuradhapura is where the sacred tree Jaya Sri Maha Bodhi is found, stoic and beautiful for pilgrims to absorb in this holiest city. Over 2200 years ago, Sangamitta Thera brought a branch of the sacred Bodhi tree under which the Buddha attained Enlightenment. to Anuradhapura from Bodhgaya in India. The tree was planted by the then reigning monarch, King Devanampiyatissa and is the oldest recorded Bo tree in the world.

diced on the sharpest and largest cleaver I have ever used, I learn as I cook the different curries that the food is not only medicinal adding more ginger to combat colds, but also meditative as it slows everything down so you enjoy all the layers of ingredients that go into each pot. Descaling the fish is even harder than scraping the skin off the vegetables with a Sinbad the sailor type knife, but nevertheless fun as it makes you appreciate the work that goes into the meal even more. We talk as flakes of scales flick in all directions about how important the coconut is to the Sri Lankan kitchen and in fact instead of just using wood I am also cooking off coconut coals, which are also used to drive mosquitoes away as they do not like the smell of the smoke. Lunch is served in the shade of the garden on wanna leaves and is made up of an average of six curries, the number depending on how much time you have and what you would like to learn. My village feast was accompanied by curry leaf juice created with a "mirisgala", a grinding stone that is used to crush the leaves and make the juice by hand. The meal included delicious fried sardines Sri Lankan style and curried sliced mullet fish in a rich spicy sauce with home-made curry powder. These were accompanied by a range of vegetables cooked with coconut milk and a bitter gourd sambol sautéed and fried infused with red onion, tomatoes, lime juice, salt and pepper, which took away the bitter taste. There was a delicious dhal curry with turmeric powder that makes it look as yellow as the sun, along with cinnamon, green chilli and a sprinkling of curry leaves, which are good for your digestion. After your village feast you can rest and enjoy the sounds of the insects and bird life before heading off on your bike and finding a great spot to watch the sun setting over this historically spiritual spot, where traditions and religion are beacons of hope to the world.

Fold a Bo leaf and you will see how nature inspired the architectural design of the area's magnificent temple Stupas and be at one in this very special place, where you can contemplate life and de-stress from daily life.


At the temple entrance buy flowers and leave your shoes behind, and try to leave enough time to talk to the erudite monks, based at the most sacred site on the island, who say: "all Sri Lankan Buddhists believe in the Sri Maha Bodhi. The tree has many special qualities like the way that only one leaf falls at a time from the South Branch, but from the other branches three leaves fall simultaneously."

In 337 BC the city was made the capital of the country by King Paundukabhaya, who started the irrigation works and tanks that have made the area so inhabitable, and are still great places to cool off and watch the local farmers grow rice, still fed by these ancient watering systems. At one time, the city was ranked alongside Nineveh and Babylon for its colossal proportions, with avenues that artists occupied and areas where foreign merchants had their houses and traded in fine materials and artisan products. Most impressive is the enormous Lovamahapaya, situated on the processional way that leads to the tree, an extraordinary ruin with countless rows of tightly packed granite columns, originally seven storeys high and housing more than 3,000 monks.

At dusk, looking at stars twinkling overhead, including the constellation Anuradha which the city is named after, you really appreciate why the monks who are lucky enough to be sent here feel deeply privileged to live in the grounds of this most sacred ancient city. "I try and solve people's problems by advising them to meditate, conduct a normal life and most significantly worship the Sri Maha Bodhi," says Ven. Rawaela Piyatissa Thera.

Hiring a bike or doing a bike tour with a knowledgeable national guide is the best way to explore the first Kingdom at a social distance and if you are into cycling you can go on and enjoy more of the nature in the surrounding countryside and organise a traditional Anuradhapura cooking class. After picking the ingredients from the home garden or going to the market you can learn how to cook using firewood instead of a cooker and see step by step how to prepare all the ingredients for cooking the old fashioned way in terracotta pots with coconut spoons, as the villagers believe this is much better for your health than using metal pots. You will certainly notice the difference in taste as it is closer to nature and fun making spices on a grinding stone, which is the best thing for your health as it is as fresh as it gets.

My teachers explain as we chop up vegetables holding the knife steady with my feet squatted on the floor - it was not as easy as it looks - and the cutting speed is an art form that leaves nothing to waste. So as I sliced and

EDUCATING THE EDUCATORS

n September 29 Ministry of Education officials, Council for Business with Britain (CBB) committee members, Regional English Support Centre (RESC) mentors and British Council staff gathered in the auditorium of the Ministry of Education to celebrate the long running CBB English Language Teacher Train-ing Project. This project has been running since 2005 and it draws to a close this year. It grew out of 6 weekend workshops round the country and developed into the annual delivery of English language teacher training to approximately 200 English language teachers nationwide.

Over 2000 teachers have been trained through this project impacting on over 310,000 pupils. The course is a distance teacher training course with study sessions run by the trainers at the 31 RESCs across the country leading up to the University of Cambridge Teaching Knowledge Test.

Speakers at the event included Professor K Kapila C K Perera, Secretary to the Minister of Education, Roshanie Moraes, CBB President, British High Commissioner, Sarah Hulton, and Louise Cowcher,



Director Education and English. British Council. Because of Covid 19 the

project was unable to have its annual awards ceremony. Instead the Cambridge Teaching Knowledge Test and British Council teacher training certificates were given to the teachers at their RESCs. A collage of photographs taken during these smaller ceremonies was displayed at the event. The RESC mentors attended the event and were given certificates for their work on the project. The publication, A Celebra-

tion of the CBB Teacher Training Project: 2005-2020 - Case Studies from across the country by the Council for Business with Britain and the British Council was launched at the event. The projects legacy is the cadre of trainers and teachers it created who then impact-

ed on hundreds of thousands of pupils. This publication collects their often very personal stories.

They talk about how the project impacted their lives, their schools and their pupils. Within their narratives are the techniques they learnt like the use of the correction code to make error correction more motivating, resources they added to their teaching baskets like authentic materials and puppets, and teaching skills they adopted like more communicative lesson planning and using concept checking questions to check understanding of meaning. Their stories show children becoming more confident in their use of English and becoming more motivated to use English. Teachers also cite the increase in their pupil marks in end of term tests and in O and A levels. The case

studies clearly illustrate the move from teacher to student centred classrooms and a corresponding increase in teacher and student confidence.

The event also showcases this year's addition to the project in the form of an employability poster competition. Teachers on the project worked with their classes to produce a poster on a topic connected to employability. These posters were shortlisted by the RESCs, then by the British Council, and the finalists were selected by members of the CBB committee. The winning teachers whose classes submitted the successful posters received their awards. The posters were on display at the event and also included in

the case study publication. Roshanie J Moraes, President, CBB, speaking at the event said "this was CBB's contribution to upskilling the future work force of Sri Lanka in the English Language and we are extremely proud to have positively impacted a large number of teachers and students through this in the last 15 years. We hope the teachers and the mentors take this programme forward and engage in continuous development and continue to serve

our society".

The CEO of HSBC Sri Lanka and Maldives, the principal sponsor, emphasized the importance of the project. Mark Prothero elaborated, "The importance of developing English literacy skills is a highlytopical and necessary national debate. It is important for the learning community, in particular the teachers, to foster a generation of students who can use the language as a base in their future careers. HSBC has been the principal sponsor of this project since 2006 and we are very proud of what we have achieved with the programme."

Louise Cowcher, Director Education and English of the British Council, further elaborated on its importance" This has been a key project in supporting young people develop their language skills, which is vital for enhancing their employability. Over the lifespan of the project 2,352 teachers have developed their professional skills to internationally benchmarked standards with the benefits passed on to approximately 310,400 secondary students. This is indeed an achievement to celebrate with CBB and the Ministry of Education!"



A player who had no grass root level involvement in rugby later turned out to be a one of Sri Lanka's finest rugby players produced by Ananda College, Colombo was Asoka Jayasena who is the first Anandian to play for Sri Lanka

Asoka hails from a sports loving family and lived in a neighbourhood in Minu-wangoda. His father was Jayasena Pathirana while Vijitha Tennakoon was his mother. He is the eldest of a family of three including two sisters. His father served in the Sri Lanka Police representing Athletteam in 1960. His father's elder brother G.P.Wimaladasa from Mirigama and uncle Charles from Gampaha were two popular figures in the sporting circles as both repre-

Asoka enrolled at Joseph Vaz College, Wennappuwa to follow his primary education in GCE Ordinary Level class and crossed over to Ananda College, Colombo for further studies. He likes to extend his sincere gratitude to late Reggie Ranatunga, father of former Sri Lankan captain Arjuna Ranatunga, who was instrumental in enrolling him at Ananda College in 1984. Late Ranatunga was a close family friend and monitored the potential of Asoka during small days, who by then was a very indefatigable sportsman involved in Athletics and Cricket at Joseph Vaz, where he competed in the Public school meets and All Island Junior championship meets from 1978 to $19\bar{8}4$



Djokovic 'feeling okay' after battling into French Open semis

PARIS, WEDNESDAY: Novak Djokovic said he was "feeling okay" after overcoming neck and shoulder troubles to defeat Pablo Carreno Busta on Wednesday and set up a French Open semifinal showdown with Stefanos Tsitsipas.

Djokovic beat Spanish 17th seed Carreno Busta 4-6, 6-2, 6-3, 6-4 to reach the last four of a major for the 38th time as he chases a second French Open and 18th Grand Slam title.

However, the world number one required treatment on his upper left arm after dropping his first set of the tournament on a chilly autumn evening in Paris.

"I definitely didn't feel great coming onto the court today, a few things happened in the warm-up,' said Djokovic.

"I had some neck issues and some shoulder issues. I don't really want to get too much into it.

"I'm feeling okay, I'm still in the tournament so I don't want to reveal too much. As the match went on, I felt better, didn't feel as much pain."


The Serb now sits two wins away from becoming the first man in half a century -- and only the third in history -- to win all four Slams twice.

His only defeat in 37 matches this year came to Carreno Busta following his disqualification at the US Open for an angry swipe of a ball which hit a female line judge squarely in the throat.

Djokovic again looked vulnerable against Carreno Busta, who twice had chances to break in the second set but could not capitalise, instead losing his own serve on two occasions.

Cheptegei, Gidey star in Valencia's night of broken records

VALENCIA, WEDNESDAY: Joshua Cheptegei smashed the 10,000m track world record and Ethiopia's Letesenbet Gidey set a new mark for the women's 5,000m on a heady night of athletics in Valencia on Wednesday.

All the talk in the run-up to the meet was of Cheptegei's assault on Kenenisa Bekele's time of 26min 17.53sec established in 2005 in Brussels.

The 24-year-old 10,000m world champion surpassed expectations, running the distance in 26mins 11.00 seconds to cement his standing as the new middle distance maestro.

This was his third world record this year.

In February he claimed the world 5km road record in Monaco.

Then, after a period of coronavirus lockdown in his native Uganda, he returned to Monaco and, in his first

race back, wiped almost two seconds off Bekele's 16-year-old track world record time over the 5,000m as he clocked 12min 35.36sec.

He becomes only the 10th athlete to concurrently hold the 5000m and 10000m world records.

The 22-year-old was lowering the previous mark of 14min 11.15 held by her compatriot Tirunesh Dibaba since 2008 by over four seconds. Gidey put up the run of her short career a year after taking 10,000m silver at the world athletics champion-

ships in Doha. With two pacemakers helping her record bid until the 3,000m marker Gidey maintained a ferocious pace to etch her name in athletics' record books.

"I'm happy," said Gidey. "I dreamed about this record for six years. I want to thank Valencia for giving me this chance." AFP

Bravo reaches 150 IPL wickets but Chennai lose

DUBAI, WEDNESDAY: Birthday boy Dwayne Bravo reached 150 wickets in the Indian Premier League on Wednesday but his side Chennai Super Kings went down to Kolkata Knight Riders by 10 runs.

The West Indies all-rounder, who turned 37, got to the landmark with his third wicket of Shivam Mavi for nought as Chennai bowled out Kolkata for 167 in Abu Dhabi.

"I stuck to bowling the hard lengths and it worked," Bravo said after he returned figures of 3-37 from his four overs for the Mahendra Singh Dhoni-led side.

It was Bravo's third game for the three-time champions this season but the paceman said, "At my age it doesn't make sense to play all games. When I get the opportunity, I back myself to do well".

The paceman recently became the



first player to take 500 T20 wickets while playing for Trinbago Knights Riders in the Caribbean Premier League.

Mumbai Indians paceman Lasith Malinga leads the IPL wicket-takers chart with 170 scalps from 122 games but the veteran Sri Lankan pulled out of this season due to family commitments.

Tripathi in place of Sunil Narine proved key as the batsman smashed 81 off 51 deliveries including eight fours and three sixes.

Chennai faltered in their chase to manage just 157 for five in their 20 overs despite a valiant 50 by Australia's Shane Watson and lost their fourth match out of six this season in the United Arab Emirates.

"We thought we will ease Sunny's (Narine) pressure a little bit and send Rahul up," said Kolkata skipper Dinesh Karthik.
