WEST RIDGEWAY.

To all to whom these presents shall come.

GREETING

WHEREAS William Adolph de Lemos, of Ramboda, has, under the provisions of "The Naturalization Ordinance, 1890," applied to Us, the Right Honourable Sir West Ridgeway, K.C.B., K.C.S.I., &c., Governor of Ceylon, in Our Executive Council, that the privileges of naturalization may, in terms of the said Ordinance, be conferred on the said William Adolph de Lemos, and We, in Executive Council, acting in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by section 3 of the said Ordinance, have made an order bearing date the 6th day of November, 1896, granting such application:

And whereas the said William Adolph de Lemos has taken the oath of allegiance prescribed by section 4 of the said Ordinance, and has produced to Us a certificate of his having taken and subscribed such oath, and of the date of his taking and subscribing the same, and We are satisfied that the said William Adolph de Lemos has taken the prescribed oath within the period specified in

the said section of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We do hereby grant to the said William Adolph de Lemos all the rights and privileges of a British subject, and declare that the said William Adolph de Lemos shall, within the limits of this Colony, be entitled to all political and other rights, powers and privileges, and be subject to all obligations to which a natural-born British subject is entitled or subject.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, under the Public Seal thereof, this Eighteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by section 94 of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," it is amongst other things enacted VV that whosoever shall leave, or permit to be left, on any road to which the provision in sub-section 4 of the said section 94 shall be extended, as therein-after mentioned, any cart or other carriage without the oxen, horses, or other animals being yoked or harnessed thereto, unless such cart or carriage shall have accidentally broken down there, and in case of such accident for a longer time than may be necessary for its removal, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds:

And whereas it is further enacted by the said section that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation, to declare that the aforesaid provision shall extend and be applicable to any road in this Colony, or to any section of such road, whenever it shall appear to the said Governor and Council that a sufficient number of halting-places has been constructed along the same:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Us, the said Governor and Council, that a sufficient number of halting-places, as set out in the schedule hereto annexed, has been constructed along the road from Kurunégala to Puttalam:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation declare that the hereinbefore recited provision in sub-section 4 of section 94 of the said Ordinance shall from and after the date hereof extend and be applicable to the said road from Kurunégala to Puttalam.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Thirteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

Dewamedi Hatpattu.—The young paddy crops show fair prospects. Crops on high lands are also good. Dambadeni Hatpattu.—Paddy crop of fields already cultivated is in a flourishing state. Ploughing and sowing still continue. Only a small extent of chena lands has been cultivated.

Chena lands are being sown.

Katugampola Hatpattu.—The young maha paddy crop is thriving. Wanni Hatpattu.—Ploughing has just commenced in some parts. Only about 50 amunams of chena lands have been cultivated.

Weudawili Hatpattu.—The young paddy crops are thriving. No chenas have been sown during the month. Hiriyala Hatpattu.—The yala crop has been reaped and harvested. The maha crops are fair, chena lands are being sown

Health of people in general has been good, except in Dambadeni hatpattu, where a few cases of measles and

Health of cattle has also been good, except in Katugampola, Medapattu, and Meddeketiya korales in Katugampola hatpattu, and in Dambadeni Udukaha korale west, where murrain still prevails but is now decreasing.
