## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J West Progeway, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 122 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," as amended by subsection 3 of section 20 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, it is enacted that it shall be lawful to the Municipal Council from time to time to make by-laws not inconsistent with the provisions of the said first-mentioned Ordinance, for any of the purposes in the said sections set forth and provided:

And whereas by section 124 of the said first-mentioned Ordinance it is enacted that no by-law, or alteration, amendment, or cancelment of, or substitution for, any by-law shall have effect until the same is confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council; and that notice of such confirmation shall be given by Proclamation to be made in that behalf; and that such by-laws, when so confirmed and published in the Government Gazette, shall be as valid and effectual as if they had been in the said Ordinance enacted:

And whereas the by-laws set forth in the schedule hereto have been made by the Municipal Council of Colombo under the provisions of section 122 aforesaid of the said first-mentioned Ordinance, as amended by sub-section 3 of section 20 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, and the same have under section 124 of the said first-mentioned Ordinance been confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do hereby proclaim that the by-laws set forth in e schedule hereto have been confirmed by Us in Executive Council, and shall have effect as from id after the First day of January, 1897.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourteenth day of November, in the year our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six.

## GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

#### SCHEDULE.

The following by-laws made under section 122 of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, as amended by section 20 (3) of dinance No. 1 of 1896, shall apply only to bakeries where wheat flour is used for making bread :-

1. The walls of every bakery shall be plastered with chunam and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and unage sufficiently provided.

2. No bakery shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit or latrine, nor in a position where bad odours wafted

refrom shall reach it.

3. No place used as a bakery shall be used for any other purpose whatsoever.

All utensils and other furniture shall be kept clean.
 The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome.

All refuse and dirt in and about the premises shall be swept off, and the drains well flushed.

7. No person suffering from a contagious or loathsome disease, or who has recently been in attendance on h person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a bakery

8. Any person who shall commit a breach of any of the foregoing by-laws shall be liable on conviction to a e not exceeding Rs. 20.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by the 26th section of the Ordinance No. 26 of 1885, intituled "An Ordinance relating to the Ceylon Railways," it is enacted amongst other things that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to declare by Proclamation any road or path which the railway may cross to be an "occupation crossing":

And whereas it is expedient to declare that each of the roads and paths crossing the line of railway between the stations of Taláwakelé and Bandárawela, Polgahawela and Kurunégala, and Kalutara South and Mátara, more particularly set forth and described in the schedule hereto, be an "occupation crossing" for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation declare that each of the roads and paths crossing the line of railway between the stations of Taláwakelé and Bandárawela, Polgahawela and Kurunégala, and Kalutara South and Mátara, more particularly set forth and described in the schedule hereto, shall, from and after the fifteenth day of December, 1896, be an "occupation crossing" for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this 3rd day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-six.

And whereas the Legislative Council of the said Island, at a public session thereof held on the 29th day of July, 1896, by a resolution established a toll in respect of the ferry between Kalpitiya on the peninsula and Karativu on the mainland, in the North-Western Province, as from and after the First day of January, 1897, and it is expedient to appoint the rates at which the said toll so established in respect of the said ferry shall be levied:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, under and by virtue of the powers in that behalf on Us conferred as aforesaid, do hereby appoint that the rates at which the toll so established at the Kalpitiya jetty on Kalpitiya side and on Karativu side at St. James's Church during the north-east monsoon and at Mudaliyanturai during the south-west monsoon, in respect of the said ferry between Kalpitiya on the peninsula and Karativu on the mainland, in the North-Western Province, shall be in accordance with those set out in the schedule hereto.

## Code for 1896,

- 16. (a) All amendments affecting the schedules of examination and appearing for the first time in this Code shall come into operation on July 1, [1896.]
- 26. (a) No English school will be eligible for a grantafter January 1, 1897, unless all the teachers engaged in the instruction of the primary standards either hold certificates granted after examination by the Department or possess such other qualification as shall, in the opinion of the Director, satisfy the requirements of Government, and that after January 1, 1898, no grant will be paid to any English school unless the whole teaching staff of such school shall consist of teachers either holding certificates granted after examination by the Department or possessing such other qualification as shall, in the opinion of the Director, satisfy the requirements of Government. Provided, however, that all teachers appointed from the United Kingdom or America to English schools in this Colony, graduates of any of the British or Indian Universities now engaged as teachers in English schools, and persons recognized as certificated teachers by the Education Departments of the United Kingdom or by any of the Departments of Public Instruction in India, shall be exempt from such requirements.

Note.—Persons who have passed the Cambridge Local Examination for senior students, the University of London Matriculation Examination, or the First Arts Examination of any of the Indian Universities, will be required to pass only in English reading, school management, and class teaching at the examinations to be held by this Department, before certificates of competency to teach can be issued to them.

- 26. (c) No English school, or English school on a vernacular basis, shall retain at any one time as free scholars on its register more than fifteen per cent. of the total number of pupils appearing on such register.
- 26. (d) Any English school, or English school on a vernacular basis, in which it has been found that the fees prescribed in the schedule of fees affecting such school (see Schedules R, S, T) have not been paid by the scholars and duly credited to the school fund, will be removed from the list of aided schools.
- 26. [(b)] No scholar shall be admitted into any grantin-aid English school, or English school on a vernacular basis, from any registered grant-in-aid English school or English school on a vernacular basis, or from a Government English school, who does not produce a certificate showing that no fees are due by such scholar to the authorities of the school at which he was last in attendance. Such certificate should be in the form Q of this Code.
- 30. (d) No grant will be allowed for any scholar over twenty years of age on the day of examination, excepting in night schools, and no grant will be paid in night schools on account of any scholar under [sixteen] years of age.
- 33. The managers of an industrial school registered by the Department may claim for each pupil above the age of 6 and below 21, certified to have been in regular attendance for nine months since the previous annual examination of the school, and to have received instruction in the workshop for not less than three hours daily on not less than 100 days, a grant of ten rupees in addition to the general grants; provided the Inspector shall be satisfied with the efficiency of the instruction given in the trade in which each such pupil is presented for examination. No grant can be claimed for the industrial instruction of any pupil who does not at the same time pass the examination in such standard of Schedules A, B, D, and E as such pupil may be eligible for, unless such pupil has passed in standard [V.] of any such schedule.

One of the value of rupees 240 per annum and two each of the value of rupees 120 per annum, tenable for three years, either at the Royal College or at any [registered] English school, will be awarded every year to the three best candidates who shall pass this examination in honours. But no candidate shall be eligible for a second election to a scholarship corresponding exactly to that previously won by him.

75. (a) Two scholarships, each of the value of rupees 120, tenable for three years at any [registered] English school, will be awarded to the two girl candidates who shall pass the best junior examination. Such scholarship will be open to candidates who have not completed their seventeenth year on the last day of the month appointed for the examination. But no candidate shall be eligible for a second election to either of these scholarships.

79. One scholarship of the value of rupees 240, tenable for three years at any [registered] high school, will be awarded to the senior girl candidate who shall pass the best examination. The scholarship will be open to candidates who have not completed their nineteenth year on the last day of the month appointed for the examination. But no candidate shall be eligible for a second election to this scholarship.

79. (b) One scholarship of the value of £150, tenable for four years, will be awarded on the results of a special examination to be conducted for the present by the

Oxford and Cambridge School Examination Board.
