MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held at the Town Hall on Friday, July 10, 1896.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated July 4, 1896.

MR. CHARLES PERERA'S DISSENT.

Partly from the fact that among the majority in favour of these concessions are gentlemen whose professional knowledge gives great weight to their opinion, and partly from a fear that my imperfect acquaintance with the working of tramways might not warrant my doing more, I was content last year to vote with the minority, merely adding one or two observations against the granting of the concessions proposed. Many things, however, which the development of the scheme and a closer examination of its details have revealed, compel me to emphasize my dissent from the views of the majority. And although I still labour under the disadvantage of not having any experience of the actual working of tramways, I feel that this hardly disqualifies me from forming a correct judgment, seeing how areastly the conditions existing among us differ from those that exist in the Indian and European towns where tramgreatly the conditions existing among us differ from those that exist in the Indian and European towns where tramways have for some time been in use. I find myself unable to agree to the concessions proposed to be granted to Messrs. Boustead Brothers, and that on three broad grounds. In my judgment these concessions are too large, and of a character likely to prove inconvenient to the Council; they involve, and are sure to cause, much pecuniary loss to the Council; and, while they will not materially advance the convenience of the general public, they will in some important respects seriously abridge and endanger it.

As to the first, a glance at the history of the proposal for the construction of a tramway in Colombo will sufficiently prove my position. Mr. Matthews, it will be remembered, was the first to tender. We have the draft of the concessions proposed to be made to him, and I cannot see how it is possible for any one who considered those concessions too liberal to agree to the concessions now proposed to be granted to Messrs. Boustead Brothers. The Committee of July 8, 1891, at Mr. MacBride's suggestion, agreed that the construction of a tramway should be open to public competition, and that draft concessions should be published in the four local papers, in the London Engineer and Engineering and in Indian Engineering—Mr. MacBride adding also the London Times. The

3rd clause of the draft concessions was altered at the instance of Mr. MacBride so as to provide that the line should be laid in such a manner that carriages and carts could pass on either side of the tram-cars; and in November, 1895, it was resolved that the space available for traffic should be 9 ft. on each side of the cars. Further, the Committee suggested, with regard to the line from the Fort to the Bridge-of-Boats, that it should be compulsory on the grantees to construct that line as soon as the roads to be utilized were made wide enough for the purpose as provided in clause 3, and a sum of about Rs. 25,000 was voted for the acquisition of land and for a road through Old Moor street to

Messenger street via Grandpass.

Again, the 9th clause of the draft concessions, in the case of Mr. Matthews, provided for the purchase by the Municipal Council of the tramways and things connected therewith after the expiration of twenty one years; but in the case of the present grantees the term is extended to twenty-six years. Then, again, in the former case an amount was indicated that should be paid to the grantees after allowance for wear and tear, depreciation &c., In the present concessions this provision is altogether omitted, and to that extent at least they are obviously far too liberal to the grantees and proportionately disadvantageous to the Council. And when the Committee at the instance of the Chairman on May 13, 1896, suggested to Messrs. Boustead Brothers that that clause (clause 9 of the concessions) should be modified, they, in their letter of June 3, 1896, declined to accede to a proposal whose reasonableness was so manifest. Nevertheless the Council, when Messrs. Boustead Brothers suggested a change of route from Old Moor street via Grandpass to Victoria Bridge, agreed to the change so suggested, and even granted them permission to construct a double line of rails along routes intended for passenger traffic.

Further, by clause 13 of the old concessions the grantee was required to keep and maintain in good repair the portion of the road between the rails of the tramways and a space of 18 in. on either side of the tramways, and in consideration of his so doing was exempted from Municipal taxation on such of his horses and carriages and other vehicles as belonged to the construction and working of the tramways. In the present concession the grantee, while continuing to enjoy exemption from Municipal taxation as before, is also to receive an annual sum from the Council. The position of the grantee, it will be observed, is greatly improved, but not the position of the Council. In fact, while on this head, I may point out what seems to have hitherto entirely escaped observation that the powers conferred and the duties imposed upon the grantee are strangely inconsistent with the provisions of the Ordinance

No. 5 of 1873.

For instance—

(1) Section 5 of that Ordinance makes it compulsory on the grantee, at his own expense, to keep in good condition and repair the part of the road lying between the rails of the tramways, and so much of it as extends 18 in. beyond the rails on each side; but in clause 13 of the concessions no such provision is mentioned.

The notice which by section 3, sub-section (1), of the Ordinance is to be given fourteen days at least before the commencement of the work is by clause 12, sub-clause (1), of the concessions limited to seven days.

(3) Sub-section (3) of section, 3, of the Ordinance makes it incumbent on the grantee to pay all reasonable expenses of the Council on account of superintendence of the breaking up of streets, but clause 12 of the concessions omits this provision.

(4) The distance mentioned in sub-section (4) of section 5 of the Ordinance does not agree with clause

12, sub-clause 3

(5) In sub-clause 4 of clause 12 of the concessions the time mentioned is six weeks, whereas sub-section (1) of section 4 of the Ordinance requires four weeks.

(6) Sub-section (3) of section 4 of the Ordinance is altogether omitted in the concessions.

Moreover a very important concession has been made to the grantee in the present case, for he may lay a double line of rails along routes intended for passenger traffic, provided that where the roadway (exclusive of the footway) narrows to 21 ft. the cars shall not be allowed to pass each other. Accordingly, along reads like Maradana road (near Mariakade corner) and Main street a double line may now be constructed. The confusion and trouble that the running of a double line along Main street during such times as the Christmas holidays for instance, and along the Maradana road in the neighbourhood of Mariakade on the occasion of funeral processions to the Cemetery that are of almost daily occurrence, will form a species of grievience that is better imagined than told. I may mention that, as I read this clause, it gives the grantee the absolute right of constructing a single line on any road in Colombo, and I need hardly add how dangerous to passengers and especially to children using the roads the exercise of such a right might become, seeing that most of our streets are narrow, and are unprovided with footways. Yet with all this increased liberality on the part of the Council Messrs. Boustead Brothers show no disposition to accede to any of the suggestions made by the Council. They have not yet made any reply to the request of the Committee that they should fix the annual sum payable under clause 13, but are pushing on their plans and specifications for the approval of Council, and are evidently anxious to close, as soon as may be, a contract of almost one-sided character and so highly advantageous to themselves. The Council should, in my opinion, pause before they will be disastrous in that for twenty-six years at least it will deprive the Council of the power of introducing better means of locomotion should any be found—will in fact for that period be fatal to all plans of advancement. What Mr. MacBride said of the concessions to Mr. Matthews applies with double force to the concessions in the present case, a

The above, let it be noted, will not represent the total loss. We shall have to add to it the loss in the Commutation tax paid by the drivers, &c.

But it may be said that the Council are prepared to suffer a loss in case the public interest is hereby advanced. Doubtless that is an object not too dearly bought at any price. But are we sure that with all the sacrifice we are making we shall really secure the object we all have at heart? It is not pretended by those who support the present proposal that the wealthier and well-to-do classes will be benefited by the introduction of tramways. Benefit to the masses is what they reckon upon. Will the construction of tramways prove a benefit in this respect? To my mind it is perfectly clear not only that the masses will derive from such construction no benefit worth speaking of, but that their convenience will be greatly lessened and otherwise interfered with. They will not reap the advantages that are fondly anticipated, while they will be exposed to positive hardships of a trying character such as they are now exempt from. The tires of the wheels of most of the vehicles in use are only \(\frac{3}{4}\) in. in width—in rickshaws they are less—and even if the grooves of the tramway rails do not exceed \(\frac{3}{4}\) in. the difficulty of locomotion will be so great as very considerably to diminish vehicular traffic. Even the better classes will suffer by such diminution, for even at present it is not seldom a matter of complaint that the number of carriages available is not adequate to for even at present it is not seldom a matter of complaint that the number of carriages available is not adequate to the demand. Carriage-builders, cartmakers, and smiths, and those who do horse-shoeing will suffer, too, from this cause. Owners of carriages or horses that ply for hire will have to sell them at a sacrifice. But it is on the poorer classes of the general public that this diminution in the number of available vehicles will chiefly tell. What advantage will the tramway afford them? None in convenience, for they cannot go where they will but only where the tage will the tramway afford them? None in convenience, for they cannot go where they will but only where the tramway route will take them. And none in cost, for the tramway fares, however low, cannot be as cheap as those payable for the present modes of conveyance. At present a first class carriage charges 50 cents for the first half hour, and during that period about 3 miles can be traversed. Now if 4 persons occupy such a carriage the cost is only 12½ cents each for the 3 miles, and be it remembered they can go in any direction they will and stop where they please. For six hours the charge is only Rs. 2, that is 50 cents a piece. Hackeries charge 15 cents the first half hour, that is about 4 cents a piece for at least 2 miles. For a whole day a hackery costs Re. 1.50, that is about 37½ cents each if four persons occupy it. With these facts before him one hardly see the necessity for any cheaper mode of locomotion, if a cheaper were possible. And in a country like this how will any falling off in the number of carriages affect the daily recurring requirements in connection with weddings and funerals, religious festivals and demonstrations, races and cricket matches; how grievously will it tell on sightseers from outstations or from foreign affect the daily recurring requirements in connection with weddings and funerals, religious festivals and demonstrations, races and cricket matches; how grievously will it tell on sightseers from outstations or from foreign countries, on those who have to attend church or temple, and on young children who have to find their way to school? How about those who may attend concerts, theatres, and other places of amusement at night and have to return at hours when the tramcars cannot be expected to run? What about people who now get their stock of provisions taken home by carts? What of the conveyance of firewood, of straw, of glass, and of building timber now done by cart? What even of the carriage of metal, gravel, &c., for Municipal use? Then there is the certainty of the overhead wires and posts forming a disfigurement of the streets, and the only too great probability of their proving a fertile source of danger. There is also the consideration, by no means unimportant, of the impediment the tramcars will offer to scavenging carts, to carts that are used in the flushing of drains, to grasscarts, and rubbish tramcars will offer to scavenging carts, to carts that are used in the flushing of drains, to grasscarts, and rubbish carts, and in cases of those sewers the manholes of which open between the rails of the tramway the obstacle will be almost insuperable.

It is clear, therefore, that much of the provision that now exists in the matter of locomotion will cease to exist when the tramway cannot effectively-in some cases cannot at all-make up for what it will have displaced. It will deprive us—especially the poorer classes among us—of advantages we are now enjoying, and it will bring little or nothing to compensate us for such deprivation. What then is its use? Where is the pressing necessity for its introductions.? It will not benefit the well-to-do; it will not benefit—rather it will bring hardship on—the poor. It will benefit for the most part only the large importers and exporters of goods, to whom, if their places of business lie in the neighbourhood of the trancar routes, it may furnish a cheap and convenient mode of removing their goods from the wharf to their stores or to the railway station.

In these circumstances what I would say is that if we are to grant the concessions we should make the grant subject to the following conditions:

> (1) That the clauses of the agreement be in the points I have indicated, brought into harmony with the provisions of the Ordinance.

(2) That no double line be laid upon any street that is less than 60 ft. in width.

(3) That the grooves of the rails be sufficiently narrow to allow not only carriages and carts, but also hackeries and rickshaws to pass them without damage or difficulty.

It is in this way only as it seems to me that we shall in this matter not be thrusting on the people conveniences they do not want, and have not asked for, while actually taking away from them facilities they now enjoy and prize.

MR. C. M. FERNANDO'S DISSENT.

I am not opposed to the establishment of a tramway system within the Municipal limits of Colombo, provided only that it does not unduly interfere with the existing vehicular traffic. The concession to Messrs. Boustead Brothers, I regret to find, does not safeguard this provision. The Council having adopted the plans and specifications as I regret to find, does not sareguard this provision. The Council having adopted the plans and specifications as submitted by them have approved of a rail with a groove of $1\frac{1}{8}$ in., such a groove, as by wear would soon increase to $1\frac{1}{4}$ in., and would seriously endanger all carriage traffic within the city. It would also drive out the hackeries and rickshaws, that are now so great a boon to the poorer middle classes. Useful as the tramway system might prove to be, I do not think it would adequately supply the place of all the vehicles that it would throw out. The danger from the groove is increased by the fact that the concession authorizes a double line of rails. Thus there would be four grooves running along the length of each road. The Tramway's Committee, in which I had the honour to serve, recommended the adoption of a $\frac{3}{4}$ in. groove. To this recommendation Messrs. Boustead Brothers replied that they were advised by their consulting engineers that such a groove was "impracticable." The Director of Public Works, Mr. MacBride, gave this opinion his support, and the majority of the Council on this material assumed—and I venture to think too quickly—that $1\frac{1}{3}$ in. groove was the only practicable one. I have the greatest respect for the professional opinion of so eminent an authority as the Director of Public Works, but he does not claim to be a specialist on tramways. It is unfortunate that the Council did not see fit to take the opinion of some consulting engineer of their own before they yielded to Messrs. Boustead Brothers on this question of groove. In the discussion of the motion which preceded the present one, I pressed this matter strongly on the attention of my colleagues, but with no avail. Therefore, believing as I do, that the proposed groove is likely to drive away the useful means of locomotion that are now available to the public, I felt constrained to vote against this motion, and as the reasons for my dissent are not identical with those of my colleagues who voted in opposition, I feel it my duty to record my dissent in this formal manner.
