"Given the uncertainty due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the

Largest stock of smuggled turmeric seized

A stock of 20,000 kg of turmeric smuggled

A stock of 20,000 kg of turmeric smuggled from India was seized by Police Special Task Force (STF) during a raid carried out in the Hungama police area, Police Spokesman DIG Ajith Rohana said.

He said the above stock was the largest consignment of turmeric seized following the Gazette banning the imports of turmeric. The raid was conducted at the Gurupokuna fisheries harbour in Kalamatiya around 3am on Sunday. He said four suspects were arrested and a trawler was seized during the raid.They were to be produced before the Court yesterday.
