THE REGISTERED STOCK AND SECURITIES ORDINANCE

BY virtue of the powers vested in me by section 4 of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance (Chapter 289), as modified by the Proclamation published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 9,773 of September 24, 1947, I, Stanley de Zoysa, Minister of Finance, do by this Order direct that, of the sum of six hundred million rupees for the raising of which by way of loan authority has been given by the Ceylon Development Loans Act, No. 6 of 1954, the sum specified in the Schedule hereto shall be raised in Ceylon in the mode and upon the terms and conditions specified in that Schedule.

1. The sum of money to be raised shall be twenty five million rupees, and it shall be raised by way of a 16/20 year loan issued at par.
2. The loan shall be raised by the creation and issue of registered stock only.
3. The rate of interest payable on the loan shall be $3\frac{1}{4}$ per centum per annum.
4. The dates in each year, on which the half-yearly interest on the loan shall be payable, shall be the 16th day of January and the 16th day of July.
5. A half-yearly appropriation out of the Consolidated Fund of Ceylon as a contribution to the sinking fund to be established for the purpose of redeeming the loan shall be made at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, and such contribution shall commence on the 16th day of January, 1960.
6. The date of redemption of the registered stock issued for the purpose of raising the loan shall be the 16th day of January, 1979 :

Provided, however, that the Government shall have the option of redeeming any such registered stock at par on such date subsequent to the 15th day of January, 1975, as may be appointed by the Minister of Finance by notification published, not less than six months prior to that date, in the *Gazette* and in at least two newspapers circulating in Ceylon.

CEYLON GOVERNMENT 3½ PER CENT. LOAN, 1975/79

Issued at par—Repayable at par

The Central Bank of Ceylon, on behalf of the Government of Ceylon, invites applications for a 3½ per cent. Loan of Rs. 25 millions. The loan is repayable at par on January 16, 1979, but the Government will have the option of repayment at par on such date subsequent to January 15, 1975 on giving 6 months' notice.

Authority.—The loan is raised on the authority of the Ceylon Development Loans Act, No. 6 of 1954, and under the provisions of the Registered Stock and Securities Ordinance, 1937 (Chapter 289).

Purpose.—The loan is raised by the Government of Ceylon for expenditure on any work connected with or incidental to the development of Ceylon.

Form of Issue.—The loan will be issued in the form of Registered Stock. (Leaflets containing the general conditions applicable to Registered Stock are available on application to the Department of Public Debt, Central Bank of Ceylon—see page 2 for a summary of these conditions).

Issue Price.—The issue price is Rs. 100 per cent. payable in full at the time of application. The minimum holding is Rs. 100.

Applications.—Applications will be received by the Registrar from January 16, 1959, and until the list is closed. Applications must be on the proper form and must be accompanied by a remittance in full. Depositors of the Ceylon Savings Bank and Post Office Savings Bank may, by arrangement with these Institutions, forward their applications through these Institutions.

A commission of 1/16 per cent. on the nominal amount of subscription will be allowed to bankers (including the Ceylon Savings Bank and the Post Office Savings Bank), recognised stockbrokers and brokers in respect of applications bearing their stamp. A negotiating fee of the same percentage will be allowed to Proctors in respect of applications bearing their stamp.

Payment for Stock.—Payment should be made by cheque drawn in favour of the Central Bank of Ceylon and crossed "on account of Ceylon Government Loan".

Scrip.—Stock Certificates will be issued after receipt and acceptance of the applications.

Interest.—Interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. per annum will be payable half-yearly on the 16th day of January and the 16th day of July in each year. The first payment of interest will be on the 16th day of July, 1959, and will be for the period commencing on the date on which the application is accepted up to and including the 15th day of July, 1959.

Taxation.—All documents used in the issue, transfer or redemption of the loan will be free from stamp duty. Interest to resident holders will be paid without deduction of income tax, but resident holders liable to income tax should include such interest in their income tax returns. Deduction of tax at source will be made from holdings of non-residents. (Current rate of income tax is 39 per cent. in the case of non-resident individuals and 45 per cent. in the case of non-resident companies). Persons who are exempt from Ceylon income tax will be entitled to claim repayment of the tax deducted.

Security.—The loan is secured on the Consolidated Fund of Ceylon. A separate sinking fund will be established towards the redemption of the loan under the management of the Monetary Board of the Central Bank of Ceylon, who are the Trustees of the sinking funds. Half-yearly contributions at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum to the sinking fund will be commenced on January 16, 1960.

Public Debt.—The present gross funded public debt of Ceylon is Rs. 1,261,179,421 (exclusive of Rs. 9,608,400 war loans issued on behalf of the United Kingdom Government). The approximate market value of the accumulated sinking funds amounts to Rs. 289,210,307. The net funded public debt is thus Rs. 971,969,114.

**THE SCHOOL TEACHERS' PENSION ACT,

“ 18 (1) Every contributor (other than a bachelor) who retires on pension after the first day of October, 1951, shall contribute either at the rate of two per centum of his unreduced pension or at the rate of two per centum of the salary drawn by him at the date of his retirement, whichever rate he may elect.

(2) Every contributor who is a pensioner shall, whenever his pension is revised, have the right to make an election under paragraph (1), irrespective of the fact whether or not he has previously made an election under that paragraph.

(3) All contributions due from any contributor under the preceding provisions of this regulation shall be deducted from his pension by the officer for the time being making payment of such pension.”;

- (2) By the insertion, immediately after regulation 18, of the following new regulation:—

“ 18A. Where a contributor to the Fund who has retired on pension—

- (1) dies before the notification to him of his pension, or
- (2) dies within the period specified in paragraph (2) of regulation 26 for making an election under regulation 18 (1), without having made such election, or
- (3) dies after the revision of his pension and within the period specified in paragraph (3) of regulation 26 for making an election under regulation 18 (2) without having made such election, or
- (4) dies after the revision of his pension, but before notification to him of his revised pension,

the contributions payable by him under these regulations on or after the date of his retirement shall be computed upon his salary on the date immediately prior to the date of his retirement.”;

- (3) in regulation 19—

- (a) by the renumbering of that regulation as paragraph (1) of regulation 19;
- (b) in the renumbered paragraph (1) by the substitution, for the words “is reduced”, of the words “is reduced by abatement of his ordinary emoluments”; and

- (c) by the insertion, immediately after the renumbered paragraph (1) of the following new paragraph:—

“ (2) Where a contributor to the Fund whose salary is reduced by abatement of his ordinary emoluments—

- (1) dies within the period specified in regulation 26 (1) for making an election under regulation 19 (1) without having made such election, or—
- (2) dies before the notification to him of such reduction,

the contributions payable by him under these regulations on and after the date of such reduction shall be computed upon his salary on the date immediately prior to the date of such reduction.”;

- (4) by the substitution, for regulation 26, of the following regulation:—

“ 26. Every contributor who is entitled to make an election under these regulations, shall make his election,—

- (1) if the election is in consequence of the reduction of his salary by abatement of the ordinary emoluments, within six months after the date of the notification to him of such reduction,
- (2) if the election is in consequence of his retirement on pension, within six months after the date of such retirement or the date of the notification to him of his pension, whichever date is later,
- (3) if the election is in consequence of the revision of his pension, within six months after the date of notification to him of his revised pension,
- (4) if the election is in consequence of his resignation, dismissal or retirement, within six months after the date of such resignation, dismissal or retirement,
- (5) if the election is in consequence of the acceptance by him of an appointment in the Public Service, or under the Local Government Service Commission, or on the staff of the Ceylon University or in the Central Bank, the Co-operative Wholesale Establishment or the Gal Oya Development Board, within six months after the date of the acceptance of such appointment, or
- (6) if the election is in consequence of his re-employment as a teacher, within six months after the date of his re-employment.”; and

- (5) in regulation 27—

- (1) by the renumbering of paragraph (3) of that regulation, as paragraph (4) thereof; and
- (2) by the insertion, immediately after paragraph (2) of that regulation, of the following new paragraph:—

“ (3) Where a bachelor dies after he has ceased to be employed as a teacher but before he has received any refund to which he has become entitled under paragraph (1) of this regulation, the amount of that refund shall be paid to his legal representative or heir or heirs.”.

THE AWARD

This is an award under the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950. It relates to a dispute between The Nidahas Karmika Saha Velanda Sevaka Vurthiya Samithiya (hereinafter referred to as the "Samithiya") and Messrs. Bousteads (E. & C.) Ceylon, Limited, (hereinafter referred to as the "Company").

2. The matters in dispute according to the statement of the Commissioner of Labour published in *Ceylon Government Gazette* No. 11,579 of 7th November, 1958, are:—(1) Payment of Special Living Allowance of Rs. 17.50 with retrospective effect from 1.1.58, (2) Payment of regular annual increments.

Demand No. 1.—Payment of Special Living Allowance of Rs. 17.50 with retrospective effect from 1.1.58.

3. At the very outset Mr. Mallawaarachchi who represented the Samithiya stated that the special living allowance of Rs. 2.16 per day now paid to the workers does not cover the Rs. 17.50 which is being claimed. His demand is that a further 67 cents per day be paid to make up the Rs. 17.50. He stated that at a conference held on 11.8.58 the Company did not take up the position that "they have paid the 30 or 40 cents as they now state". At the time of the conference in August, 1958, the Wages Board had laid down only that 30 cents extra be paid. The balance 37 cents to make up 67 cents per day or Rs. 17.50 per month was directed to be paid only from 1.9.58.

4. I have no doubt that the Samithiya and Mr. Mallawaarachchi were at the time of the hearing of this matter aware of the fact that the Rs. 17.50 was covered by the aforesaid increases. They cannot plead ignorance as this was clear from the award in I. D. Nos. 45 and 61 cited by them in which this same Samithiya was a party.

5. I cannot help expressing my strong disapproval of the conduct of the Samithiya and Mr. Mallawaarachchi in attempting to take undue advantage of an omission or lapse on the part of the said Company and also in making an attempt, futile though it was, to mislead this Court. They perhaps were not aware of the fact that Mr. Mahendra, the Managing Director of the Company had since been apprised of the position if, in fact, he was not aware of it earlier.

6. Having failed in his attempts aforesaid, Mr. Mallawaarachchi then pressed his claim to have the allowance of Rs. 17.50 with retrospective effect from 1.1.58.

7. Mr. Mahendra stated that the Company could not afford to pay the allowance from 1.1.58 owing to financial difficulties. No evidence was called by him.

8. It is in evidence that at a conference held on 11.8.58 the workers expressed their willingness to accept at Rs. 12.50 per month, but the Company would not pay this amount. If this was paid the amount of Rs. 12.50 together with the 30 cents that was being paid from March, 1958, would have amounted to more than Rs. 17.50. The Directors of the Company, perhaps, were not at the time aware of the correct position, but this cannot be said of the Samithiya that was a party in I. D. Nos. 45 and 61. In agreeing to accept Rs. 12.50 per month, the Samithiya

seems to have created in the minds of the Directors a false impression, that the workers were gracious enough to accept, Rs. 5 less than what they were entitled to demand according to the recommendations of the Government.

9. That this employer has been paying the wages and all the allowances that had been laid down by the Engineering Wages Board is not disputed. The Wages Board laid down that an additional 30 cents be paid to all workmen in the engineering trade as a special living allowance from 1.3.58. This has been paid. Again an additional 37 cents was ordered to be paid per day from 1.9.58; this too has been paid. This increase of 37 cents was to bring up the special allowance to 67 cents, making a total of Rs. 17.50 per month recommended by Government.

10. In support of the claim for Rs. 17.50 with retrospective effect from 1.1.58 Mr. Mallawaarachchi cited I. D. Nos. 45 & 61—dispute between this same Samithiya and Messrs. Brown & Co., Ltd. In that matter the award was made on 21st May, 1958, allowing the demand for the payment of the allowance of Rs. 17.50 from 1.1.58. This was before the additional 37 cents was granted by the Wages Board as from 1.9.58.

11. What evidence regarding the capacity of Messrs. Brown & Co., to pay this additional allowance was placed before the Court is not known. Neither does one know the amount of work that Brown & Co. handled each month. On a perusal of that award one cannot resist the conclusion that Brown & Co. was financially well off and handled a very large volume of work. That award also shows that Brown & Co. were willing to act on the award in I. D. 7 of 1956—a dispute between three unions and Messrs. Walker Sons & Co., Ltd.—though that award bound only Walkers Ltd., described in that award (I. D. Nos. 45 and 61) as “an engineering firm carrying on extensive engineering business in Colombo and occupying a more or less unique position as regards its trading”. On the other hand, the evidence led by the Samithiya shows that the volume of work handled by this Company is not at all considerable. One or two of the witnesses speak to the Managing Director Mr. Mahendra having told them that Bousteads had taken a contract for several lakhs of rupees. Apart from this there is no substantial evidence to indicate the volume of work they handle. However, according to the witness Wilson Fernando, an electrician and an office bearer of the Samithiya the workmen in this firm do no work from 8 to 10 days in a month, as there is no work, but are nevertheless paid full wages. The next witness M. A. Fernando who was called just after Wilson Fernando, but after an adjournment of half-an-hour, stated that there is work available every month excepting on two or three days. This variation regarding the period during which there is no work was probably meant to minimise the effect of the evidence of Wilson Fernando.

12. Mr. Mallawaarachchi, realising the effect of the evidence of Wilson Fernando, in his address desired me to treat him as an adverse witness and also stated—to use his own words—in the opinion of the union the evidence he has given is unreliable. My own view is that Wilson Fernando spoke to the actual conditions existing in this Company and I accept his evidence.

13. Witnesses Baron and Banda, a workman and a peon respectively called by the Samithiya, stated that several members of the executive staff left within the last 18 months and their places have not been taken by others. This evidence together with the evidence of witness Wilson Fernando go to show that the Company is not doing well in business.

14. This being the state of affairs it is surprising that this Company has not thought it fit to effect any retrenchment which it would have perhaps been justified in doing. The workers should be thankful to

the Company for keeping surplus staff on instead of making demands which, if granted, may cripple the Company and throw out of employment a large number of workers.

15. Taking everything into consideration, I do not consider it fair and equitable that this Company should be called upon to pay the Rs. 17.50 with retrospective effect from 1.1.58, and the demand is accordingly rejected.

Demand No. 2.—Payment of regular annual increments.

16. The Samithiya in its statement submitted in terms of Regulation 12 of the Industrial Disputes Regulations, 1951, stated that “presently annual increments are not granted to all the employees, and increments are granted at the whim and fancy of the employer. Some employees are receiving no increments at all while certain favourites of the employer have received increments. This discrimination has caused heart burning”.

17. The demand as embodied in that statement is a most extravagant one, increments being claimed as follows:—

- Unskilled—an increment of 20 cents per day annually;
- Semi-skilled, Grade II—an increment of 30 cents per day annually;
- Semi-skilled, Grade I—an increment of 40 cents per day annually;
- Skilled—an increment of 50 cents per day annually;
- Peons, watchers and clerical hands to be granted annual increments of Rs. 4, Rs. 4 and Rs. 10 to Rs. 25 respectively unlimited, as stated in respect of this demand.

18. It does not appear to me that in formulating the demands for increments the officers of this Samithiya had addressed their minds to the feasibility of making these demands but have just made unwarranted statements regarding grant of increments and have also made demands irrespective of whether they are reasonable or not, acting perhaps on the theory that one must ask for much more than one may expect to get.

19. On being questioned by the Court whether the increments should be perpetual, Mr. Mallawaarachchi stated that he would be restricting his demand to a period of 10 years.

20. Every witness called by the Samithiya stated that he has received increments. The first witness Baron stated that he joined the former firm of Bousteads in 1942 on a wage of 22 cents per hour and when that firm closed down in 1946 he was getting 28 cents per hour. The present Company took over in 1946, and pay regular increments and merit increments where the workers are concerned. He is now getting Rs. 5 and odd cents a day inclusive of allowances. He also says that the engineer recommends for increments only those who work and do not idle. This I think is as it should be.

21. The evidence of Wilson Fernando the electrician is that he joined as an unskilled worker in 1935 at 11 cents per hour and when the former firm closed down, he was being paid 30 cents per hour. He is now receiving 43 cents per hour. Mr. Mallawaarachchi sought to get out of the witness some evidence of discrimination, but the witness would not respond favourably, probably because there is no discrimination in fact. From 1946 up to now he has had an increase of 13 cents per hour.

22. Another witness, M. A. Fernando, a fitter, states that he joined in 1946 at 16½ cents per hour, had an increase of 4 cents per hour in 1948, an increase of 1 cent per hour in 1951 and an increase of 7 cents per hour in 1952. He now gets 33 cents per hour.

23. Not one worker has been called who would say he was not given an increment for any period of time while others were given increments.

23. Very little material has been placed before me by either party on the question of increment. No evidence at all has been placed before me regarding the wage scales prevailing at Bousteads, whether the workers are started on the minimum wage as laid down or at a higher point. It is presumed that the wages are based on the rates fixed by the Wages Board. In view of the unsatisfactory nature of the evidence that was placed before me I suggested that the Samithiya might negotiate with the Company and arrive at a reasonable incremental scale. Mr. Mahendra was agreeable but Mr. Mallawaraatchchi stated that he was not prepared to negotiate with the Company at this stage and wanted this Court to make an award.

24. I have had the advantage of going through the award in I. D. 7 of 1956, and am basing this award on the scale of increments therein with the modifications I do consider reasonable. The employer concerned in that award as mentioned earlier is Messrs. Walker Sons & Co., Ltd. I am of the view that the incremental scale laid down for that firm should not be made applicable to a firm like Bousteads, in view of its position and standing referred to by me earlier. One has to bear in mind that an incremental scale that is made binding on the Company would be a recurrent liability which would increase every year irrespective of whether the Company is making profits or not.

25. According to the award in I. D. 7 an unskilled worker starts with 17½ cents per hour and gets no increment till the 4th year when he gets an increment of 1½ cents per hour till the 10th year of service. It would in my opinion create a certain amount of heart burning when an unskilled worker finds he gets no increment at the end of a year and even up to the 4th year while the others get their increments every year. I am therefore of the view and I direct that an unskilled worker should also be given an increment of 1½ cents per hour or 10 cents per day of 8 hours each till he gets his 7th increment in the 8th year. This will give him a wage of Rs. 2.10 per day in his 8th year of service.

26. As regards the other categories of workmen I consider an increment of 2 cents per hour or 16 cents per day of 8 hours a fair and reasonable increment for skilled workers and 1½ cents per hour for semi-skilled workers of both grades up to the 8th year of service, that is 7 increments in all. I therefore direct that increments be paid accordingly. The scale of increment will be as shown in Schedule A hereto.

27. The increments referred to in paragraphs 25 and 26 above should as a general rule be granted; but the Company will be entitled for sufficient cause to withhold payment of the increments. The worker concerned should be informed of the reason for withholding an increment and should be given an opportunity to show cause, if any, against it.

28. The Company is at liberty to give increments higher than those fixed in this award.

29. No worker shall as of right be entitled to any increment after he has been granted his 7th increment. The present wages, where necessary, should be increased for the wages to be in conformity with this award, but should not in any event be reduced.

30. The grant of further increments will be entirely at the discretion of the Company.

31. As regards the peons, watchers and clerical staff, there is no evidence placed before me regarding their salary scales. Witness Banda who is a peon stated that he gets a salary of Rs. 38.50 per month and he received an increment of Rs. 2.50 per month last year. No member of the clerical staff or a watcher has been called and it is not at all possible to consider the question of increments without knowing the salaries paid to them. Besides, I believe that the award in I. D. 1 of 1956—a dispute between The Ceylon Mercantile Union and the Employers' Federation of Ceylon—is binding on this Company and these categories of employees.

32. In these circumstances, I do not propose to make any award regarding increments to watchers, peons and clerical staff. I would not reject the demand as such, but I leave it open to the Samithiya or the employees under these categories to make a fresh demand, if so advised, on proper and fuller material.

NOTIFICATION UNDER SECTION 18A (3) OF THE FISHERIES (AMENDMENT) ACT, No. 25 OF 1952, AS AMENDED BY THE FISHERIES (AMENDMENT) ACT, No. 30 OF 1956

IN terms of section 18A (1) of the Fisheries Ordinance, No. 24 of 1940, as amended by the Fisheries (Amendment) Acts, Nos. 25 of 1952, and 30 of 1956, the Honourable P. H. William de Silva, Minister for Industries and Fisheries, has referred a dispute that has arisen between the local fishermen of Ambalangoda and the local fishermen of Hikkaduwa-Dodanduwa Town Council area on the one hand and the migrant fishermen from Gandara, Dondra, Kudawella, Mirissa, Kottegoda, and other adjoining villages on the other with regard to their respective fishing rights in the waters adjoining the Ambalangoda Urban Council limits, Madampe Village Committee limits and the Hikkaduwa-Dodanduwa Town Council limits to me for public inquiry and report.

2. The subject matter of the dispute is as follows:—

The local fishermen of Hikkaduwa-Dodanduwa claim the exclusive right of fishing in the waters adjoining the Hikkaduwa-Dodanduwa Town Council limits. The local fishermen of Ambalangoda claim the exclusive right of fishing in the waters adjoining the Ambalangoda Urban Council limits and the Madampe Village Committee limits. Both these groups of local fishermen request that migrant and non-resident fishermen be prevented by regulation from migrating to their beaches and from exploiting these waters by any mode of fishing.

3. Since all matters in dispute may not have been specified in the representations already made, I have been requested to inquire into any matters incidental or related to the dispute as outlined above and to make my report on all such matters.

4. I invite all persons concerned or interested in the dispute, who desire so to do, to make written representations relating to this dispute to the Director of Fisheries, to reach his office at Galle Face, Colombo, on or before February 9, 1959.

5. I shall commence a public inquiry into the subject matter of the dispute at the Hikkaduwa Rest House, on March 19, 1959, at 9.30 a.m. At the public inquiry, I will hear evidence whether oral or documentary, upon oath. All persons entitled to

be present and to tender evidence in support of their representations may appear either in person or by Counsel or other friend or pleader.
