- Rules

 1. These rules may be cited as the Hospitals
 Letteries Board (No. 2) Rules, 1955.
 - 2. Subject as hereinafter provided in these rules. the Board may appoint any of the officers and servants specified in column 1 of the Schedule hereto on the scale of salary specified in the corresponding entry in column II of that Schedule.
 - 3. It shall be lawful for the Board, in view of any special qualifications or experience which an officer or servant may possess, to appoint such officer or servant with the prior sanction of the Minister, given with the concurrence of the Minister of Finance, at any point in the scale of salary applicable to such officer or servant.
 - 4. Officers and servants of the Board shall be entitled to leave of absence from duty in accordance with the Financial Regulations applicable in the case of public servants.
 - 5. Officers and servants of the Board shall be subject to the disciplinary control of the Board.
 - 6. It shall be a condition of service of every officer or servant of the Board that, in the event of the Board establishing a provident fund for its officers and servants, every such officer and servant shall be bound, and shall abide, by the rules applicable in the
 - case of such fund.

 7. The services of any officer or servant of the Board may be terminated by the Board at any time. All officers, other than those whose services are terminated on the ground of inefficiency or misconduct, shall be entitled to one month's notice in writing of the proposed termination of their services.
 - 8. Notwithstanding anything in the preceding provisions of these rules, any officer or servant of the Board who is a public servant who has been seconded for service with the Board shall be entitled to such salary, and shall be subject to such terms and conditions of service, as may be agreed upon by the Board and the Deputy Secretary to the Treasury.
 - 9. Every member of the Board, other than the Chairman, shall be entitled to an allowance of twentyfive rupees in respect of his attendance at an ordinary meeting of the Board, and an allowance of fifty rupees in respect of his attendance at the draw of any hospitals lottery. The Chairman shall be entitled to an allowance of two hundred and fifty rupees per month.

Chairman " means the Chairman of the Board.

THE AWARD

This is an award under section 24 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by Acts Nos. 25 of 1956, 14 of 1957 and 62 of 1957). It relates to an industrial dispute between The Tea, Rubber, Coconut and General Produce Workers' Union (hereinafter referred to as "the Union") and Messrs. Henderson and Company, Limited (hereinafter referred to as "the Company").

- 2. The Honourable the Minister of Labour, Housing and Social Services by his Order under section 4 (2) of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950, dated 9th October, 1958, referred the above dispute to this Court for settlement.
- 3. According to the statement of the Commissioner of Labour, dated 7th October, 1958, the matter in dispute between the Union and the Company was the non-employment of-
 - 1. W. A. B. Perera,
 - 2. A. G. Jinadasa,
 - 3. I. P. Deen,
 - 4. W. D. Piyadasa,
 - 5. H. A. Sammy Perera,
 - 6. Tuan Faleel,
 - 7. Karunawathie,
 - 8. W. A. Fernando,
 - 9. H. M. Albert,
 - 10. W. Upananda,
 - 11. M. L. Upasena, and
 - 12. L. A. Prematilake.
- 4. On the first date of hearing an attempt was made to effect a settlement of this dispute but it was not possible to arrive at a settlement. The 12 workers in question had been discontinued early in July, 1958. Representations were made by the Union to the Commissioner of Labour and a conference was held when the Company agreed to consider the possibility of giving employment to three workers who had been in service for over 3 years and to intimate its decision to the Commissioner of Labour within 3 days. The Company also agreed to review the position with regard to the other employees in a month's time. The Company informed the Commissioner of Labour a few days later that it would not be possible to give employment to the three persons referred to, and the Union then requested the Commissioner of Labour to take necessary action to refer the question of non-employment to an Industrial Court. The evidence led shows that there was a previous dispute in September, 1956, and at a conference held at the office of the Commissioner of Labour the Company agreed to re-employ some of the discontinued workers; one of whom was W. A. Fernando. The Company also agreed that if it became necessary to reduce the number of workers owing to decrease of work, the Company would give full employment to the perma-

nent workers and 3 days' work a week to casual labourers. The Company also agreed that it would take over the discontinued employees before new workers were taken on. On March 21, 1957, the Company wrote to the Commissioner of Labour repudiating the agreement that had been reached in October, 1956, but the Company does not appear to have informed the Union with regard to this repudiation. Mr. S. Ratnam, Labour Officer, Colombo, mentioned in his evidence that a new rubber section had been opened by the Company at Vauxhall Street and that 15 new workers had been recruited for work there. He added that he had been informed that all work in the rubber store had been done by a contractor who supplied his own labour.

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 m Weerasekera}$ who appeared for Company mentioned that a circular had been sent by the Employers' Federation to all its members to the effect that casual labourers who have been given employment for a period of 2 years should be placed on the permanent list of employees. He added that this was only a recommendation of the Federation which could not compel any of its members to carry out the recommendation, but he argued that it was the duty of a labourer, if he had worked for 2 years, to mention this fact to the management so that his name might be entered on the permanent check roll. He added that if an employee who had over 2 years' service had mentioned this fact to the Company, his name might have been included in the permanent check roll. The Employers' Federation had also informed the Union in 1957 that all casual workers who had been in continuous employment for 2 years would be placed on the permanent check roll.
- 6. On the first date of inquiry, Mr. Weerasekera mentioned that the number of employees at Messrs. Henderson & Co. was 190 and that before the discontinuance of these workers, the number had been 206. According to the evidence of Mr. Rahim, the Managing Director of the Company, the number of workmen at present is about 110 of whom 78 or 79 are permanent. He mentioned that the number of casual labourers was 30 or 40. Mr. Rahim also stated that there was a strike in or about June, 1958, after which there was no work and accordingly the number of workers had to be reduced. When Mr. Rahim was questioned why 30 or 40 casual labourers were retained in employment if there was no work, he replied that they were required to clean up the premises as the premises had been believed. premises as the premises had been badly neglected during the strike. He could not explain why the permanent labour force could not clean up the place if, as he stated, there was no work. Later he stated that the work had decreased but there was a certain amount of work. The fact that the new store had been opened by the Company in Vauxhall Street soon after the strike would indicate that the work had not decreased. If there was work for at least 15 workers at Vauxhall Street, there would have been sufficient work for these 12 employees who were discontinued, if other arrangements had not been made by the Company to get the work attended to by contract labour. Mr. Rahim also stated that an attempt had been made to give the casual labourers 3 days' work in the week as originally agreed to at the conference in 1956. Later he stated that this was not done as it was not possible to give even 3 days' work per week to all the casual labourers owing to decrease of work. This statement is incorrect as there are still 30 to 40 casual labourers and therefore it was possible to give each labourer work for more than 3 days in a week, instead of giving the full week's work to each of the 30 or 40 labourers who have been retained in service.
- 7. After the conference in October, 1956, one of the persons whom the Company agreed to take back was W. A. Fernando who is one of the 12 workers now discontinued. W. A. Fernando gave evidence that he had been working at the Company since 1943 and that occasionally he was not given work for a week or two, but otherwise he had work continuously.

The Company must have undertaken to take him back in October, 1956, because he had been in service for a fairly long period. It would appear to me to be extremely unfair that an employee whom the Company had agreed to take back at the Conference should later be discontinued on the ground that there was no work while a number of workers who were later recruited were retained by the Company.

- 8. It was argued on behalf of the Company that the ordinary principle in retrenchment, namely, last to come first to go, need not be observed in the case of temporary or casual labourers. It was contended that in the case of temporary and casual labourers, the Company could discontinue any labourer by giving him one day's notice. In his opening address, Mr. Weerasekera defined a casual worker as a man engaged to do a particular job and who is paid off at the end of the day. None of the workers who were discontinued are of this description. They are in fact temporary labourers for whom a separate check roll is maintained by the Company, apparently for the purpose of depriving them of the holiday leave and other privileges to which they would be entitled. They are called casual labourers when in fact they are temporary labourers.
- 9. In the course of his evidence Mr. Rahim mentioned that he knew the workers personally and was aware which one was efficient and which one was not, but he admitted that with regard to these 12 persons, only two were selected by him while the others had been selected by Mr. Simpson who is a Director of the Company. Mr. Rahim also admitted that none of these persons who have been discontinued had, prior to the date of discontinuance, been fined or dealt with in any way on account of inefficiency. It is possible that when workers have to be discontinued on account of reorganisation or retrenchment, some preference might be given in the case of skilled workers, to persons who are more efficient in their work, but in the case of unskilled workers no such discrimination need be made. The main question which I have to decide is whether the Company's action in discontinuing these 12 workers was bona fide. Ordinarily no records are maintained with regard to the work of temporary labourers and the Managing Director will have to rely on reports made by other persons. It would not be difficult for an inefficient employee to get a good report from one of his superiors, while a good worker might get a less favourable report than that to which he is entitled. It is, therefore, possible that a good worker might be discontinued, and an unsatisfactory worker would be retained. It will, therefore, be very unsatisfactory if at the time of retrenchment action is taken on reports. furnished for the purpose, and not on reliable evidence with regard to a worker's conduct and efficiency. In the present case no evidence whatever has been led to prove that the men who had been discontinued were less efficient than the men who have been retained.
- 10. The Company has not produced any books, nor placed reliable evidence that the volume of work at present is less than before the strike. In fact the opening of a new store at Vauxhall Street is a clear indication that there has been no reduction of work. No action therefore should have been taken to discontinue the twelve employees in question. Even if there had been a slight reduction of work, action should have been taken by the Company to give casual labourers 3 days' work in the week or to discontinue those who had been last employed by the Company. The action taken by the Company to discontinue these labourers is, I consider, unfair and inequitable. My award, therefore, is that these 12 persons should be given re-employment within 2 weeks of the publication of this award and that they should be paid 2 months' salary as compensation within 2 weeks of the publication of this award.

This is an Award under section 24 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by Acts Nos. 25 of 1956 and 14 and 62 of 1957). It relates to an industrial dispute between the Ceylon Bank Employees' Union of No. 94 2/4, York Building, Colombo I (hereinafter referred to as "the Union") and the Commercial Banks' Association (Ceylon), c/o National Overseas and Grindlays Bank, Limited, Colombo 1 (hereinafter referred to as "the Association") and consisting of the Banks enumerated in the First Schedule hereto.

- 2. The Honourable the Minister of Labour, Housing and Social Services, by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 4 (2) of the aforesaid Act, referred the matters in dispute between the Union and the Association to this Court for settlement, by his Order dated 22nd December, 1958. The Acting Deputy Commissioner of Labour has, by his statement of the same date, set out the matters in dispute between the parties as follows:-
 - ..(1) Revision in salary scales of minor employees;
 - (2) Rent allowance of 30 per cent. of the basic salary;

 - (4) Inclusion of allowances in the calculation of all overtime payments; and
 - (5) Equal pay for work of equal value.
- 3. The inquiry into the matters in dispute was fixed for 15th January, 1959, on which date the Association was represented by counsel and proctor but no member or official of the Union was present, nor was there any representation of the Union by a lawyer. In the circumstances after being satisfied that notice of the date of inquiry had been served on the Union the Court adjourned the inquiry for today and directed that a notice under section 36 (1) (aa) of the Act be issued on the Union to be present today so that the Court may, in the exercise of its duties, interrogate members of the Union or an official of the

Union in order that the position of the Union and its claims may be more fully ascertained. In response to the notice Mr. K. A. D. A. Gunaratne, the General Secretary of the Union, is present today.

- 4. Mr. Advocate Kadirgamar, counsel for the Association, produces marked "A" the original of an agreement entered into between the Union and the Association dated 23rd January, 1959, which shows that all the matters in dispute as set out in the statement of the Acting Deputy Commissioner of Labour and other incidental matters have been settled. Mr. Gunaratne admits the genuineness of this document and he has nothing to state with regard to the matters in dispute or with regard to the terms of settlement. In view of this settlement it is not necessary to interrogate members of the Union or any other person as originally considered necessary.
- 5. The Court feels that, in view of the fact that the two parties to this dispute have by mutual agreement taken decisions which each considers just and reasonable, it is not necessary for the Court to probe these matters any further. The Court has carefully examined and studied the contents of the document and is of the view that the terms of settlement are just and equitable. The Court, therefore, makes its award in terms of the agreement as follows:-
 - 1. Re the dispute in regard to revision in salary scales of minor employees.—It is directed that with effect from the first day of November, 1958, the scale of salaries payable - to peons, liftmen, watchers and labourers shall be varied from the existing scale by increasing the minimum basic wage at the foot of the scale by Rs. 5 (rupees five) and increasing the other stages of the scale on a graduated incremental basis, so that the maximum of the scale be increased by Rs. 10 (rupees ten). Proportionate increases in the basic wage shall be paid by the members of the Association to head peons and counters.

 The said employees shall be placed in the

new scale in the same stage of the existing scale as they were on 31st of October, 1958. The new scale of basic wages so to be paid to the said employees is set forth in the Second Schedule hereto.

2. Re the dispute over the claim for a rent allowance of 30 per cent. of the basic salary.—It is directed that the members of the Association shall pay with effect from the first day of November, 1958, an "interim allowance" monthly until such time as under any written law, award or agreement applicable to banks' employees the house rent factor or allowance in the total remuneration now or hereafter payable to them is computed and/or specified whether separately or as an integral part of the wage structure to such employees and in such event the present "interim allowance" shall thereby be regarded as superseded or absorbed provided that it shall not be less than the amount granted herein.

Such "interim allowance" shall be-

- (a) Rs. 10 (rupees ten) each in the case of all minor employees, and
- (b) Rs. 25 (rupees twenty-five) each in the case of all other employees,

who are members of the Union...

3. Re the dispute relating to leave in compensation for the reduction in Bank Holidays .- It is directed that the existing annual privilege leave of fourteen working days shall be increased by three additional working days making a total of seventeen working days.

4. Re the dispute over the inclusion of allowances in the calculation of all overtime payments.— It is directed that the members of the Association will on and after the first day of November, 1958, for the first hour of overtime on other week days and for the first half hour of overtime on Saturdays, pay overtime rates calculated on the same basis as is used for calculating overtime in excess of those periods.

> It is noted that the Union's demand for leave in lieu in addition to overtime for work on Bank holidays is withdrawn.

- 5. Re the dispute relating to the demand for equal pay for work of equal value.—It is noted that the Association does not accept the principle that women employees should receive the same pay as male employees, but in the interests of a settlement agreement has been reached on the scale for female telephone operators generally and female machine operators in the Eastern Bank Limited and it is directed that the members of the Association will place female telephone operators on the same scale as male telephone operators and that the Eastern Bank Limited will place female machine operators on the same scale as clerical staff.
- 6. It would appear that after the Honourable the Minister referred the matters in dispute between the parties to this Court on 22nd December, 1958, the Union went on strike and that the strike continued till the fifth day of January, 1959. In coming to an agreement with regard to the matters in dispute the parties have also come to an agreement with regard to the question of "strike pay". The Court adopts the settlement arrived at in regard to this matter and directs that the five and half days $(5\frac{1}{2})$ on which the

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employees' union was on strike in the month of December, 1958, shall be set off against any privilege leave available to an employee for the year ending 31st December, 1959, and any balance against privilege leave in the ensuing year. The total monthly remuneration of employees for the month of January, 1959, shall be reduced by an amount equivalent to the remuneration for 2½ days on which they were on strike in January, 1959. The members of the Association will if any amplance and decimal advances of the respective ciation will, if any employee so desires, advance to him the amount so deductible from his remuneration for January, 1959. The amount of such advance shall be repayable by him out of any remuneration to which he may become entitled in respect of overtime as and when earned during the years 1959 and 1960.

7. We make Award accordingly.

This is an Award under section 17 of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by the Industrial Disputes (Amendment) Acts, No. 25 of 1956, No. 14 of 1957 and No. 62 of 1957).

- 2. The Acting Deputy Commissioner of Labour, acting under section 3 (1) (d) of the aforesaid Act, referred to me for settlement by arbitration the matter in dispute between the Ceylon Plantation Kanakkapillais' Union and the Manager of Leangawella Estate, Bandarawela which, according to the statement of the Acting Deputy Commissioner of Labour dated 31st December, 1958, is whether the dismissal of K. S. Arumugam, K. P. of Leangawella Estate, Bandarawela is justified, and if not, what relief he should be granted.
- 3. At the inquiry before me Mr. K. S. Muthusamy represented the Union and Mr. D. H. Greve of the Ceylon Estates Employers' Federation represented the Manager of Leangawella Estate. Mr. Greve stated that after discussion held between the Union and the Federation the matter in dispute had been adjusted and settled. In view of this adjustment which Mr. Muthusamy admitted, the demand for re-instatement of K. S. Arumugam K. P. is withdrawn by the Union. There is no doubt in my mind that the settlement as a result of which the demand for re-instatement was withdrawn is in the best interests of both parties.
- 4. The application for the re-instatement of K. S. Arumugam K. P. is accordingly rejected.

THE AWARD

This is an Award under section 24 (1) of the Industrial Disputes Act, No. 43 of 1950 (as amended by Acts, Nos. 25 of 1956 and 14 and 62 of 1957). It relates to an industrial dispute between the Ceylon Bank Employees' Union of No. 94 2/4, York Building, Colombo 1 (hereinafter referred to as "the Union") and the Bank of Ceylon, Central Office, York Street, Colombo (hereinafter referred to as "the Bank").

- 2. The Honourable the Minister of Labour, Housing and Social Services, by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 4 (2) of the aforesaid Act, referred to this Court for settlement the matters in dispute between the Union and the Bank, by his Order dated 22nd December, 1958. The Acting Deputy Commissioner of Labour has, by his statement of the same date, set out the matters in dispute between the parties as follows:—
 - (1) Revision of salary scales of Counters, Peons, Liftsmen, Watchers and Labourers;
 - (2) Rent allowance of 30% of the basic salary to all Bank Employees;
 - (3) Lieu leave, in addition to overtime, be given for working on all Bank holidays; and
 - (4) The privilege leave of Bank Employees be increased by 7 additional days.
- 3. The inquiry into the matters in dispute was fixed for the 16th of January, 1959, on which date the General Manager of the Bank was present and the also represented by counsel Union was not represented, Bankwas and proctor. The was any member or official of the Union present. In the circumstances, after being satisfied that notice of the date of inquiry had been served on the Union, the Court adjourned inquiry for today and directed that a notice under section 36 (1) (aa) of the Act be issued on the Union to be present today so that the Court may, in the exercise of its duties, interrogate the members of the Union or an official of the Union in order that the position of the Union and its claims may be more fully ascertained. Mr. K. A. D. A. Gunaratne, the General Secretary of the Union who is in Court says that the notice had not been received.
- 4. It has been brought to the knowledge of the court that the parties have come to an agreement with regard to all the matters in dispute between them and also in respect of certain incidental matters and that the terms of settlement have been embodied in an agreement signed by the General Manager of the

Bank on behalf of the Bank and by the President and Secretary of the Union on behalf of the employees of the Bank who are members of the said Union and witnessed by two officials of the Labour Department. Mr. Advocate Gratiaen, counsel for the Bank, produces the original of the agreement marked "X". Mr. Gunaratne admits the genuineness of the agreement.

- 5. The court feels that, in view of the fact that the two parties to this dispute have by mutual agreement taken decisions which each considers just and reasonable, it is not necessary for the court to probe these matters any further. The court has carefully examined and studied the contents of the document and is of the view that the terms of settlement are just and equitable. The court, therefore, makes its award in terms of the agreement as follows:—
 - 1. With regard to the revision of salary scales of Counters, Peons, Liftmen, Watchers and Labourers.—It is directed that with effect from 1st November, 1958, the salary scales payable to peons, liftmen, watchers and labourers shall be varied by increasing the minimum basic wage at the foot of the scale by Rs. 5 (rupees five) and increasing the other stages of the scale on a graduated incremental basis, so that the maximum of the scale be increased by Rs. 10 (rupees ten).

It is noted that in coming to an agreement with regard to the new scale of salaries which was demanded the Bank felt that it would be fair and reasonable to vary the scale of salaries of other categories of minor employees also. In terms of the agreement the Bank will pay proportionate increases in the basic wage to head peons, counters, drivers, plumbers, electricians, painters, carpenters, masons and latrine coolies. Minor employees shall be placed in the new scale in the same stage of the existing scale as they were on 31st October, 1958.

It is directed that the Bank shall pay with effect from 1st November, 1958, an "interim

allowance "monthly until such time as, under any written law, award or agreement applicable to the Bank's employees the house rent factor or allowance in the total remuneration now or hereafter payable to them is computed and/or specified whether separately or as an integral part of the structure of the wage paid or payable to such employees and in such event the present "interim allowance" shall thereby be regarded as superseded or absorbed Provided that it shall not be less than the amount granted herein. Such "interim allowance" shall be—

- (a) Rs. 10 (rupees ten) each in the case of all minor employees;
- (b) Rs. 25 (rupees twenty-five) each in the case of all other employees of the Bank
- 3. With regard to the claim for lieu leave, in addition to overtime, for working on all Bank holidays.—This demand has been withdrawn by the Union and the Court, therefore, makes no award.
- 4. With regard to the claim for 7 additional days of privilege leave.—It is directed that the existing privilege leave of fourteen working days be increased to seventeen working days.

6. Incidental matters.—It would appear that after the Honourable the Minister referred the matters in dispute to this Court for settlement on 22nd December, 1958, the members of the Union went on strike on 23rd December, 1958, and continued to be on strike till 5th January, 1959. In arriving at a settlement in respect of the matters in dispute the parties have also come to an agreement with regard to the question of "strike pay" and it is desirable that that agreement also be given effect to in this Award.

It is directed that the 4½ days the employees of the Bank were on strike in December, 1958, shall be set off first against any privilege leave available to the respective employees for the year ending September 30, 1959, and any balance against privilege leave in the ensuing year. The total monthly remuneration of employees for the month of January, 1959, shall be reduced by an amount equivalent to the remuneration for 2½ days on which they were on strike in January, 1959. The Bank will, if any employee so desires, advance to him the amount so deductible from his remuneration for January, 1959. The amount of such advance shall be repayable by him out of any remuneration to which he may become entitled in respect of overtime as and when earned during 1959 and 1960.

In computing 4½ days as working days on which the employees of the Bank were on strike in December, 1958, the Bank concedes 31st December, 1958, as a non-working day under the present conditions. But, if the financial year or the half year of the Bank in any year ends on 31st December, such 31st December will be considered as a working day for the employees.
