## Remove acquiring surcharges from borrowers closing their loans before time

Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa directed the Central Bank yesterday to remove the practice that financial institutions acquire a surcharge on loans that their customers close before the repayment period.

Prime Minister Rajapaksa asked the officials to ensure that all financial institutions function according in this respect and refrain from

their borrowers, who would settle their bank and vehicle loan installments in full with their respective banks and finance companies before the scheduled loan repayment peri-

The Prime Minister directed Central Bank officials to take necessary steps toward this at a Progress Review Meeting held at the Minisof Finance. The discussion

tions charge a 3 percent surcharge on the unpaid balance of their burrower's loan. They sometimes refrain from charging that amount from him only upon a request made on his part.

The Prime Minister said that a general policy should prevail over acquiring such charges from the public.

Tamil National Alliance (TNA) legislator, M.A Sumanthiran told Parliament yesterday that the Government had withdrawn the special security assigned to him and that his life was in danger as a result.

He said that he was given special security by the Government on the basis that there was a threat to his life

and he had not made a request. He said that Law and Order Minister Rear Admiral Sarath Weerasekara had notified him one month ago that there was still a threat to his life. Therefore, he warned Minister Weerasekara that if

anything happens to his life now, Minister Sarath Weerasekara would have to take responsibility for it. He said that Weerasekara had ordered the withdrawal of his security for attending a protest in the North

The Law and Order Minister defended the decision saying he is not prepared to allow the Security Forces to be used to give special security to an MP who violates a Court order and attends a protest despite there

being a threat to his life. Weerasekara noted that despite being warned, Sumanthiran had attended the protest which goes to show that there was no threat to him. He said, "I am the one who withdrew Sumanthiran's security in my capacity as the Public Security Minister. Sumanthiran had participated in the protest defying Police and Court orders. Therefore, Police protection cannot be given to such a person. If he has threats to his life, then he should not go to such crowded places and the fact that he went for the protest where thousands of protestors were present, proves that there is no threat to his life. That is why his special security detail was

"Immediately after the LTTE was defeated in 2009 there were around 12,843 LTTE suspects who surrendered to the Government. The Government rehabilitated them and integrated them with the society. As a policy, all of them were reintegrated into society, given skills training and they are now living with the rest of the society, including 600 child sol-

Accordingly, the Minister stated that health regulations should always be followed and steps should be taken to vaccinate the people as a practical measure against this concern.

The Minister emphasised the above taking into consideration the time-consuming factor faced by tourists having to undergo PCR tests and a long quarantine period upon arrival. Member of Parliament Waru-

na Liyanage brought to light the issue related to the Dahaiyagala Elephant Pass in Udawalawe located between the Udawalawe National Park and the Bogahapitiya proposed Forest Reserve, identified as a place of importance as it is a decisive route for elephants. The MP pointed out that as a result, elephants in the forest reserve are under threat due to the illicit clearing of these areas.

In consideration of the above, Minister Ranatunga emphasized that elephants are a resource for the country's tourism industry and that forests and the wildlife should be protected which are major tourist attractions.

Parliamentarian Udayana Kirindigoda, said that tourists often obtain information about the country through various websites regarding hotels and lodgings in particular, associated with various tourist destinations. However, the MP stated that information provided on these sites are not updated and below the level of satisfaction. The MP was of the view that although quality information and photographs of hotels and lodges have been published on websites, in practice this is not the case and as a result the reputation of the country is being tarnished. Agreeing with the aforesaid,

## Wayamba Ela project construction work accelerated

Construction work of the Wayamba Ela project providing a solution to the water shortage problems that occur during the Yala and Maha Seasons in the Wayamba Province has been accelerated," Highways Minister Johnston Fernando said.

Under this project, there will be 90 kms of new and upgraded canals including two underground tunnels and two new earth gravity dams together with the construction of the Maha Kithula and Mahakirula reservoirs.

"The water will transfer to seven large tanks and 326 rural small tanks located in the Galewela, Polpithigama, Mahawa, and

Ahatuwewa areas to facilitate the irrigation of 12,500 farmlands. This project will provide direct and indirect benefits to nearly 40,000 farmer familiary.

lies," the Minister added.

The estimated cost for the project is Rs.51,729 million. The Wayamba Ela project was commenced

under the Mahaweli Water Security Investment Programme diverting Mahaweli water to the Northern part of the North Western Province of Sri Lanka. The project is to feed the upper Mee-Oya catchment and Hakwatuna-Oya by conveying 130 million cubic

metres (MCM) of water

annually. The main aim of the project is to provide sufficient water for the target irrigable area in the province. The project will also provide the people in the Province with safe drinking water that can help minimise the occurrence of Chronic Kidney Disease (CKD).

Minster Fernando said it has been planned to plant 60,000 saplings in the Wayamba Province in parallel with this programme.

Minister Fernando was speaking during the inspection tour of the Maha Kithula, Mahakirula, and Mahadambe construction sites which are also ancient archeological sites. Members of the Maha Sangha were also present.

## REINVENTING SRI LANKA:

## Tourism industry ponders its future

year ago, Dinesh Perera and his friends owned and operated the only two LGBTQ-friendly accommodations in Colombo: Mahasen by Foozoo and Mahasen Terrace by Foozoo. Both hotels sat opposite each other on Mahasen Mawatha, a quiet road in a residential neighbourhood in Colombo.

Foreign and domestic visitors flocked to them, drawn to their cooking sessions and rooftop drinks, places where the clinking of the morning coffee cups, chit-chat and laughter filled the air, providing an escape from the busy metropolis.

But those days are long gone. "Our chapter in Mahasen Mawatha has come to an end," Perera tells CNN Travel, referring to their decision to shutter both their Colombo properties in December.

They are not alone. Since the beginning of the pandemic, many tourist service providers around the island have had to close. However, for some Sri Lanka establishments, their troubles began well before Covid-19 forced the world's borders to close.

#### FROM ONE CRISIS TO ANOTHER

As the global crisis began to unfold, Sri Lanka was only just starting to recover from a completely different tragedy. Tourism in the country was hard-hit by the Easter bombings of April 2019, reducing tourist arrivals to just over 37,000 in May 2019 - a 70 percent drop from the previous year.

"We were only beginning to get our usual bookings in November and December (of 2019) after the Easter attacks," Perera says, referring to their months-long recovery.

Unlike other hotels that did not fare so well, both Foozoo properties continued to have guests during the first wave of Covid-

"We had bookings during the first lockdown. Most foreigners stranded in the country decided to make Foozoo their long-staying home," Perera says.

On March 19, 2020, Sri Lanka closed its borders to international tourists while imposing a police-mandated curfew to control the spread of Covid-19, which lasted for more than two months.

As the restrictions eased after the first wave, Perera continued to receive domestic

"It was just enough to keep our business afloat," he says.

Then came the second wave in October. Since then, Covid-19 numbers continued to rise. As of February 8, the country has recorded more than 68,000 cases and 351 deaths, according to the latest figures from Johns Hopkins University.

"I remember we had bookings for October, but with the news of the second wave, all of them got cancelled. We did not receive any guests after that. It was not sustainable to keep running on losses. So we had to take the hard decision to close," Perera says.

As part of the reopening, the Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority (SLTDA) implemented a plan to allow international travellers to return following a pilot project that invited 1,500 Ukrainian tourists to arrive in clusters and travel in a "biosafety

The plan comes with several restrictions. Tourists must stay in 'Level-1' accommodations for 14 days. Guests are allowed to use facilities such as pools, gyms, salons and restaurants and also leave the hotel during quarantine to go sightseeing, provided they travel with registered tour guides and driv-

They must pay for up to three PCR tests and have proof of a negative PCR test 96-hours before their arrival in Sri Lanka.

Those who accompany the tourists, including guides and drivers, must quarantine for 14 days.

Though it is a step in the right direction, many feel it does not go far enough to assist the small businesses that are hardest hit.

"I do not think it can work," says Sean Mohammad, owner of now-shuttered White Peacock Hostel in Dickwella in the south of the country.

"It is hardly going to benefit those who actually need tourism. For most mid-range and small-scale accommodations, it is a rigorous process to get registered by the

SLTDA and get the Level-1 standards.' For Level 1 recognition, hotels that are registered under the SLTDA have to acquire a "safe and secure" certification, a process that involves a lengthy audit. Several operators CNN spoke with complained of delays and misplaced applications.

Once a hotel is certified, they can opt to be added to the list of Level-1 accommoda-

tions. These hotels are only permitted to accept foreign guests and cannot host functions.

For those unable to get certified, the future remains bleak. Though some

tourism businesses have A close encounter made temporary with an elephant arrangements to pay their employees, others are not so lucky. Many Sri Lankans involved in tourism are now working as daily wage labourers after losing their jobs. Others have stepped

into new ventures. Perera and his team, for instance, are pinning their hopes on Foozoo Kitchen, their

vegan food delivery business. Others feel the pandemic and Easter bombings have shown that Sri Lanka has been too dependent on foreign tourists.

"The SLTDA always only focuses on a small niche market of seasonal, high-end travellers without any regard to what travellers look for," says Mohammad.

Instead, he says, more needs to be done to promote tourism to domestic travellers.

"There is huge potential. Most Sri Lankans do not know what their country has to offer them. They often go abroad looking for places, sights and experiences that are widely abundant in Sri Lanka," says the former hotel owner, who has travelled extensively in

In line with global travel trends, a large number of foreign and domestic travellers in Sri Lanka now look for experiences that go beyond hotel and resort stays and include a mix of traditional cuisine, wellness, outdoor and cultural activities.

"We are working on it," says SLTDA Director General Dhammika Wijesinghe, referring to the organization's sustainable tourism model and efforts to promote the country's attractions to domestic tourists.

As part of this, they plan to create longterm opportunities for local communities.

"We have conducted workshops to educate people about sustainable practices," says Wijesinghe, referring to two sessions in Kandy and Sigiriya in recent months. "We followed a market-oriented approach. We focused on creating tourist markets in different countries, be it India, China, Germany or the UK."

The Director General says Covid-19 has prompted a new direction.

"We are finally thinking of creating a service or product-driven approach," she says. "I think most travellers now look for wellness and adventure experiences.

#### POSITIVE MODELS

Professor Athula Gnanapala, an academic at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, who holds a PhD in tourism management, says any plans to develop the country as a destination need to take into account the country's grassroots communities.

"Most of our tourist sites and establishments are located in rural regions, so people living in these areas should have the maximum benefit. Sustainability should focus on integrating local communities, but it does not happen in Sri Lanka," he says.

About 90 percent of the tourism establishments, Gnanapala says, are run by smallscale and medium-scale entrepreneurs.

He says the SLTDA needs to pay greater attention to the issues faced by these operators instead of focusing on promoting only popular landmarks and wildlife safaris to tourists.

"We have a lot of attractions. We can create different experiences focusing on wellness, birdwatching, waterfalls and, of course, our cuisine," he says, "Why do not we develop rural tourism? It helps us incorporate grassroots communities so they benefit from it."

Several independent establishments across the island have indeed been successful in creating such concepts. These include Back of Beyond, which offers stays and experiences for travellers in remote locations.

"Our first property began in 2007, targeting domestic travellers," says Mandi Daluwatte, Back of Beyond's Communica-

tions and Social Media Manager. "We wanted to offer them a travel experience closer to nature while keeping our prices affordable. Over the years, the concept became so successful that not only locals, but foreigners visited us in

large numbers.' She says the company offers travellers beautiful locations close to nature, fresh local food prepared by village chefs and outdoor activities.

Its most-visited property sits close to the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Sigiriya, bordering a serene stream running through the jungle, and hosts tree houses and ecofriendly cottages perched on boulders.

Meanwhile, in the south of Sri Lanka near Yala National Park, Back of Beyond offers a glamping experience overlooking sprawling sand dunes and natural pools.

"Our concept is definitely sustainable. That is why we are operating for this long," Daluwatte says, referring to the bookings Back of Beyond continued to receive during the pandemic.

"Because of that, we could also pay our staff. They come from the community.'

Like Back of Beyond, Viraj Dias has created a campsite in the mountains in Haputale, 205 kilometres from Colombo. His business, Eco Lodge Haputale, hosts low-budget travellers looking for outdoor activities such as guided hikes, privacy and seclusion in a scenic location.

Dias also operated a homestay before the pandemic. Foreigners loved staying with his family, he says, but it offers little charm to domestic visitors.

"Our homestay did not receive many domestic travellers, so it is temporarily closed now," says Dias. "But we receive many groups in our campsite. People from Colombo come here for the weekend."

Dhanula Jayasinghe, who works as a ranger at Leopard Trails, a bespoke wildlife experience provider, says that his company too is thankful for domestic travellers.

"It was not profitable, but it kept us afloat," he says.

"We offered a discounted rate during the pandemic, and our programme became suc-

Unlike traditional jeep safaris, Leopard Trails provides a luxury glamping experience with local cuisine, bonfires and a guided safari with information on wildlife behaviour, habitats and identification of individual leopards in the national parks.

'We also organised junior ranger programmes for children. Families with young kids loved it," says Jayasinghe.

For those outside of Sri Lanka, Jayasinghe created a virtual safari on Airbnb with the support of his industry colleagues in April 2020 as a response to the pandemic.

His leopard safari is the only virtual experience on Airbnb from Sri Lanka and has exceeded 250 bookings. While 10 people can join the tour, priced at \$14 per person, users can opt for private bookings with up to 100 people. The virtual tour is a combination of pic-

tures, videos and stories from the wild; one that soon gained popularity with over 250 five-star reviews.

"We get a mix of requests," Jayasinghe

"Sometimes it was families from across the world. They cannot travel to meet each other. Sometimes we had work-from-home office buddies who needed something fun and interactive. We also had university groups. Our tour was their classroom lesson

Jayasinghe is happy that the virtual tour also promotes Sri Lanka as a tourist destination while creating a new market for Leopard Trails.

"I am bringing a wildlife experience to people who have never visited Sri Lanka, who live thousands of miles away from the country. They are inspired to visit us when

the restrictions are relaxed. "I think I'm a tourism ambassador," he adds with a chuckle. (CNN)

## Women and girls in science

Sri Lanka is one of the few countries in this region where girls are not discriminated against in terms of education. Equal opportunities are available here for both males and females to pursue secondary and higher education. But even then, we need more girls to learn STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects at both school and university level.

This is one issue that we have to ponder on as we celebrate the International Day of Women and Girls in Science which falls today (11). STEM specialists are increasingly in demand in the worldwide job market and if we do not encourage more females to take up these subjects, we will lose out. In fact, the Government aims to realign school curricula and university courses with a prime focus on STEM to tap into this market, in order to make "unemployed graduates" a thing of the past.

This year's Women and Girls in Science Day will be celebrated under the theme "Women Scientists at the forefront of the fight against COVID-19". The outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic has clearly demonstrated the critical role of women researchers in different stages of the fight against COVID-19, from advancing the knowledge on the virus, to developing techniques for testing, and finally to creating vaccines against the virus. The ongoing pandemic is proof that our future will be marked by scientific and technological progress that can only be achieved when women and girls are creators, owners and leaders of science, technology and innovation.

In our journey towards response and recovery, Sri Lankan female researchers working here and abroad have been among those pioneering the COVID-19 treatments and vaccines. Women played an important role in science even before the pandemic, accounting for nearly half of undergraduate enrolments in science, technology, economics and mathematics (STEM).

At the same time, the COVID-19 pandemic also had a significant negative impact on women scientists, particularly affecting those at the early stages of their career, and thus contributing to widening the existing gender gap in science, and revealing the gender disparities in the scientific system, which need to be addressed by new policies, initiatives and mechanisms to support women and girls in science in all countries.

Today, the 6th International Day of Women and Girls in Science Assembly will be held at the United Nations Head-quarters virtually. With great momentum and interest to accelerate progress in achieving the 2030 Development Agenda and its 17 Global Goals, the 6th International Day of Women and Girls in Science Assembly theme will be 'Beyond the Borders: Equality in Science for Society', with a special focus on the value of the social aspects and cultural dimensions in Science, Technology and Innovation to enhance sustainable development programmes.

Science and gender equality are both vital for the achievement of the internationally agreed development goals, including the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Over the past 15 years, the global community and countries such as Sri Lanka have made a lot of effort in inspiring and engaging women and girls in science. Yet women and girls continue to be excluded from participating fully in science globally.

According to UNESCO's, Girls' and Women's Education in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) report (2017), female students represent only 35% of all students enrolled in STEM-related fields of study at higher education level globally. The report notes that gender differences in STEM education participation at the expense of girls begin as early as in Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) in Science- and Mathrelated play and are more visible at higher levels of education

At present, less than 30 per cent of researchers worldwide are women. According to UNESCO data (2014 - 2016), only around 30 per cent of all female students select STEM-related fields in higher education. Globally, female students' enrolment is particularly low in ICT (3 per cent), natural science, mathematics and statistics (5 per cent) and in engineering, manufacturing and construction (8 per cent).

Long-standing biases and gender stereotypes are steering girls and women away from science related fields. As in the real world, the world on-screen reflects similar biases—the 2015 Gender Bias Without Borders study by the Geena Davis Institute showed that of the onscreen characters with an identifiable STEM job, only 12 per cent were women.


Women who have made significant progress in STEM fields in their respective countries should be duly recognized and rewarded. This will be an example and inspiration to young girls who would like to choose a career in a STEM discipline. Schools and universities must popularise STEM subjects among girls. The Government should help by providing STEM subject teachers especially to schools in rural areas, where the focus on STEM is minimal. The Government's recent move to provide laptops to all undergraduate students on concessionary terms will also help female university students following STEM courses to achieve better results.

COVID has given us an ideal opportunity to recognize the role played by women in the advancement of science. They should be given all opportunities to rise and shine in this vital field.

# Govt. ready to take on Geneva challenge

he Government was last week preparing to counter a resolution against Sri Lanka at the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) while the country celebrated its seventy third anniversary of independence on a sombre note with President Gotabaya Rajapaksa pledging to take action against those responsible for the Easter Sunday terror attacks in 2019 and the Central Bank bond scam.

The Government has been kept busy on the diplomatic front recently with differences of opinion with neighbouring India over the leasing of the East Container Terminal (ECT) of the Colombo Port. Colombo has however been firm in its decision although New Delhi has voiced its displeasure.

Leaders in Colombo were optimistic that relations with New Delhi can be restored despite the recent dispute. Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa said that such issues are dealt through discussion. "India is our closest friend. We can resolve any dispute with them after talking with each other," he said.

#### **Human rights issues**

The greater diplomatic challenge now facing the government was countering the resolution against Sri Lanka at the UNHRC. The government planned to brief envoys of the United States, the United Kingdom, Germany and Canada based in Colombo ahead of the UNHRC sessions in Geneva.

Sri Lanka has taken up the position that the allegations noted by the UNHRC are unsubstantiated. It has also noted that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa recently appointed a commission to review reports of preceding commissions investigating human rights issues and make appropriate recommendations.

The Commission is headed by Supreme Court Judge A.H.M.D. Nawaz. Its other members are Chandra Fernando, a retired Inspector-General of Police and Nimal Abeysiri, a retired District Secretary. They have been asked to submit their final report to President Rajapaksa within six months.

The main mandate of this Commission is to determine whether past Commissions of Inquiry have revealed any human rights violations, to review recommendations of past commissions of inquiry and ascertain the manner in which those recommendations have been implemented so far.

The appointment of this Commission in Colombo was followed by the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) at the United Nations releasing an 'Experts Report' expressing concern at what it claimed were developments in Sri Lanka that hindered human rights.

"The UNHRC and member states should strengthen independent monitoring, analysis and reporting of the human rights situation in Sri Lanka and establish an impartial and independent international accountability mechanism by investigating, compiling, and analysing information," the report said.

#### **Easter Sunday attacks**

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa meanwhile, in his Address to the Nation on Independence Day, made it clear that his Government would proceed with action against those found responsible for the Easter Sunday attacks and the Central Bank bond scam, both of which are still being investigated.

The President's remarks came days after the Presidential Commission of Inquiry appointed by former President Maithripala Sirisena in September 2019 handed over their report to President Rajapaksa. The Commission had previously handed over two interim reports to President Rajapaksa last

"I have received the final report of the Presidential Commission appointed to inquire into the Easter Sunday attacks. I have already given instructions to implement its recommendations. We will not allow those responsible for designing and enabling this tragedy to escape justice," the President said.

President Rajapaksa also said that he had advised the Attorney General's Department to swiftly act upon matters relating to the Central Bank bond scam. "The public expects fair, unbiased and efficient service from the officials who enforce the law," President Rajapaksa said in his address to the nation

Following these remarks, the Archbishop of Colombo, His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith called for the report of the Commission of Inquiry into the Easter attacks to be made public. "We request the President to reveal the conclusions and recommendations of this report to the nation," Cardinal Ranjith said.

#### **Criminal charges**

Cardinal Ranjith, who has been in the forefront of the campaign to bring the perpetrators of the Easter attacks to justice, called on the government to take prompt action. "None of us will be able to live in this nation if the report is swept under the carpet," Cardinal Ranjith said on Independence Day.

As yet unconfirmed reports say the Commission has recommended criminal charges against former President Maithripala Sirisena, then Premier Ranil Wickremesinghe, then Defence Secretary Hemasiri Fernando, then Police Chief Pujith Jayasundara and then Head of National Intelligence Sisira Mendis.

These reports say that the Commission has recommended that criminal charges be filed against those who failed to prevent the attacks, despite early warnings. The commission also reportedly recommends action against those who failed to carry out proper investigations in advance.

There were other developments on the political front last week within the ranks of both the government and the opposition. Making headlines within the ruling coalition was Minister Wimal Weerawansa, who is also the leader of the Jathika Nidahas Peramuna (JNP), a coalition partner.

Minister Weerawansa was quoted in a newspaper interview as saying that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa should head the Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna (SLPP). This drew a sharp response from the general secretary of the SLPP, Sagara Kariyawasam who is a SLPP National List Parliamentarian.

Kariyawasam told a news briefing on Monday that Minister Weerawansa had no right to make such statements regarding SLPP and that he should immediately withdraw his remarks and apologise. Minister Weerawansa however declined to do so, instead elaborating on his remarks.

"I didn't intend to say that Premier Mahinda Rajapaksa should be removed from the SLPP leadership and be replaced by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa," Weerawansa said. "What I meant was that a position should be created for President Rajapaksa, while Premier Rajapaksa is the leader," he said.

Although Minister Weerawansa is reputed for his controversial statements, this storm in a tea cup is likely to fizzle out as it is well known that Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa and President Gotabaya Rajapaksa work very well together on a common agenda, with hardly any differences of opinion.

In the opposition ranks, there have been moves to form a 'broad alliance' between the United National Party (UNP) and its breakaway group, the Samagi Jana Balavegaya (SJB). It was reported that these discussions were being held with the blessings of UNP leader Ranil Wickremesinghe.

It was reported that Wickremesinghe had delegated UNP deputy leader Ruwan Wijewardene for the task of having a dialogue with the SJB. What is

however being mooted by the UNP leader is not a merger of the two parties but working together on a common agenda, possibly on a common platform.

Amidst such issues of political significance, the government last week also intensified its efforts to contain the Coronavirus pandemic which has now seen over 70,000 infections in the country and 365 deaths. Vaccination of health care workers is complete and over 160,000 vaccines have been given.

Health officials also denied speculation that the President and the Prime Minister have been given priority in vaccination. They have been allocated to the over-60 age group and will be vaccinated when that age group is immunised, officials said, denying there was a request for priority.

Sri Lanka plans to vaccinate its entire population within three months, Secretary to State Ministry of Primary Health Care, Epidemics and COVID-19 Disease Control Dr. Amal Harsha de Silva said. Vaccines are being provided mostly by India, China and Russia for this purpose, Dr. de Silva said.

#### Dr. Neville Fernando

An unfortunate victim of the Coronavirus pandemic was Dr. Neville Fernando, ex-parliamentarian for Panadura who later achieved great success as a businessman and founded the South Asian Institute of Technology and Medicine (SAITM) and the Neville Fernando Teaching Hospital in Malabe.

Dr. Fernando, who was a popular general practitioner in Panadura was elected to Parliament in the electoral landslide of the J. R. Jayewardene-led UNP in 1977, defeating the Lanka Samasamaja Party stalwart and ex-Minister of Transport Leslie Gunewardena by a comfortable margin of 11,000 votes.

Dr. Fernando was a much-loved MP who thrived on being the peoples' representative. Being in Parliament for only twelve years and not holding any ministerial office, he pioneered many schools, hospitals and industrial estates in Panadura which render yeomen service to the electorate to this day.

As a parliamentarian, Dr. Fernando also carved a niche for himself, being fearlessly critical of President Jayewardene, most notably opposing his plans to deprive Sirimavo Bandaranaike of her civic rights. Apart from ministers Gamini Dissanayake and S. Thondaman, he was the only MP to do so.

Dr. Fernando resigned as a Parliamentarian before President Jayewardene could take disciplinary action against him. He went on to achieve great success as a businessman developing several hospitals, a printing press and a porcelain exporting enterprise before setting up his medical school.

The SAITM project was not concluded to his satisfaction but Dr. Fernando had the gratification of seeing all its students graduate as doctors, either from SAITM itself or being absorbed to the Kotelawela Defence University. The teaching hospital bearing his name is his legacy to the nation.

These varied events dotted the political landscape

# Fair Distribution of Economic Welfare: Science against Myth

he impact of Corona Pandemic so far during the past year has provoked a new round of concerns over the extent of fair distribution of economic wealth and means across the people of each country because of the brutally disproportionate effects of the pandemic on living standards of the people across various segments/social strata. The disruption of global supply chains due to lockdowns and social distancing policies adopted by the governments as the immediate response to curb the spread of the pandemic has been the major cause.

While millions of people in the world have been pushed to a new circle of poverty without much helping hand of the rich, the erosion of living standards has been disproportionate across races, age, sex, area, industry, sector, etc. Meanwhile, further accumulation of wealth to few owners/investors of information technology-based businesses due to zoom-economic structures created by markets to protect supply chains in response to pandemic is highlighted as the first-round beneficiary of the pandemic while new beneficiaries of wealth are to come in years to come in the process of the response to new waves of the pandemic and recovery. The US Fed Chairman recently stated that ultraease policies being flowed would make unequal recovery.

### Distributional Response from Market Economies

The Presidential Election in the US in last November and subsequent events including the assault on the Parliament complex were largely driven by thoughts of the need for distribution of fair share of income and wealth and state welfare that were never heard in large market economies like the US in the recent past. US\$ 1.9 trillion relief package (including \$ 15 hourly federal minimum wage law, additional \$ 1 trillion direct payments to families, \$ 440 bn for small business, etc.) on the top of the already implemented \$ 3.6 trillion stimulus in last 10 months was the first initiative for fair distribution declared by the US President-Elect Biden. At the inauguration speech of the new US President on January 21, 2021, he stressed the growing inequality among several national challenges that should be addressed together and issued 15 new Executive Orders mostly to

improve distribution to the US economy through global transactions.

While political leaders favour exorbitant taxes on billionaires to provide welfare for the general public, some raise concerns over the present market mechanism in line with thoughts of socialism. Pandemic hit worst the market economies of the West and government response through health, fiscal and monetary stimulus policies taken to address distributional disparities are similar in all economies.

#### Global Policy Trend on Economic Recovery from Corona


Therefore, in almost all countries, the state or the bureaucracy has received a new lease of life in the name of fair distribution of economic welfare among the public under the cover of the pandemic risks where the bureaucracy believes that it can control pandemic-related all risks and improve the distribution of welfare. Policy tools available are numerous although their effects intended on fair distributions are not on record. Control of imports and foreign currency outflow, price controls inclusive of tariff revisions in favour of domestic production/ import substitution, types of divestiture/distribution of state property/ businesses to investors in favour of foreign exchange and international business knowhow, intervention in internal trade flows to reduce tradermargins, relaxation of bureaucratic barriers and conflicts to allow more private production/business activities, offer of state employment to low income segments, historically

low interest rates and fiscal stimulus through debt are some examples for such tools.

### Communists/Socialists against Capitalism

Rising adversity of wealth distribution seems to help recover proponents of socialist governance systems which have been pushed to corners of the world since 1980s with the larger market reforms taken place in Russia, China and East European countries in place of pro-communist-socialist policies. These proponents generally follow the views of Karl Marx (writings during 1840s to 1870s major Das Kapital published in 1867) on the large wealth disparity between the capital owners and labour class due to exploitation of labour (Skills and Time) in the production by the capital-owned entrepreneurs by paying the labour with unfair or low share of production value (Labour Theory of Value) as the wage and the surplus or profit accumulating to capital or capitalist in the environment of the UK/Europe under industrial revolution and colonization. However, profit is the margin between the cost of production and price which is determined by market factors, mostly outside the control of the entrepreneur (even causing losses and capital bankruptcies), which is not factored in Marx's philosophy.

In contrast, market or capitalist economic systems are driven by private property, competition and profit motive. The father of Economics or free market hypothesis or capitalism, Adam Smith, believed (writings during the period 1750s to 1770s – major The Wealth of Nations published in 1776) that the market mechanism works on the foundation of the self-interest which accrues benefits to all stakeholders through

competition, because all in markets (labourers, land owners and capital owners) are traders where markets have own regulations leading to natural prices based on competition.

Therefore, he pro-

posed that the government allow markets to operate freely (Laissez Faire), other than maintaining general law and order funded through taxes to provide for orderly environment for functioning of markets. Therefore, Adam Smith seems to recognize the state as the element that disturbs the market mechanism and fair distribution. He was a philosophical writer and lecturer in political economy in his carrier and Commissioner of Customs in Scotland in 1778. Most developed countries have resorted to the capitalist model/market economies and advocate for improvement of living standards through competition, productivity and opportunities.

However, leaders of the countries have been governing them at preferred points on the path between the socialism and capitalism whereas no one can measure the degree of the blend rather than slogans on fair distribution or fare share. The hypothesis of social or socialist market economies is the new variant of market economies that believes policy intervention in market economies to ensure fair distribution of economic benefits. This is a political slogan attempting to survival of socialism after it failed in 1980s. Therefore, pro-socialists by looking at distributional outcome of pandemic-hit market economies have renewed the voice on the need for greater state intervention in markets to ensure fair distribution.

## Facets of Distributional Disparities – Wealth, Income and Public Services

The conventionally discussed disparity is the wealth and income disparity blamed for capitalist economic activities. Although there are certain economic indicators to measure the overall increase in living standards, measurements of distribution disparities are rare. Mostly available distributional data are on disparities of household/personal income, employment, household living conditions, consumption of consumer durables and technology, education, etc., by various social groups (age, sex, race, area, etc.) gathered from sample surveys conducted in long lags. Although the disparity of distribution of wealth/ property/capital is the core topic, no one has suitable data to quantify it. However, in countries with the transparency in financial markets, the distribution of financial wealth/ capital is ranked by way of a list of wealthy individuals based on market prices of securities.

The economic growth and prosperity that are not distributed fairly among the people are not considered healthy and democratic. Therefore, governments take numerous policies on political grounds at various points between the communism and capitalism to improve the distribution through various public services. Fiscal and monetary policy measures, market regulations and law enforcement are broad facets of public policies. All are intended to promote living standards of the people through both increase in production, income, employment, skills and opportunities and improvement in their distribution across the peo-

## Vaccine Nationalism exacerbates global faultlines

he competitive nature of international politics and the rise of 'me first' nationalism have again been starkly highlighted by developed nations as they scramble to corner COVID vaccines for their citizens in order to beat the global rampage of the pandemic. Wealthy nations have turned towards subsiding their own pharmaceutical companies and locking in vaccine supplies for their population

Developed countries, otherwise accustomed to using foreign aid to arm-twist governments in developing countries, are now busy managing their domestic pandemic situation. Tightening border controls and restricting travel has become the new normal. Developing countries have been forgotten.

#### Global response

The global response to the pandemic and its economic impact has been incoherent, unlike the G20 response in the aftermath of the 2008 financial crisis.

There appears to be a breakdown in the global effort to tackle the pandemic, hitherto never witnessed before when viruses like SARS-2 and Ebola hit. Major powers then had collaborated effectively to meet the challenge and prevented a global pandemic. In fact, in 2014, the US and China had collaborated closely to establish treatment centres and supply medication

WHO. The latter cannot be

absolved of culpability as he

mishandled the initial response to the pandemic. By monopolising vaccine supplies, developed countries are laying the foundation of a global humanitarian crisis. If such countries are relegated to the last in line for vaccine supply, economic recovery will be hit badly. Given the nature of global trade and interdependence of supply chains, nations will have to swim together or suffer sustained economic downturn. According to the OECD, around \$11 trillion of the \$18

trillion traded in 2019 was in intermediate goods that were part of global supply chains. Non-availability of vaccines to developing countries will add another layer of inequity to an economically stratified global community.

#### Access to vaccine

Former US President Trump did nothing to address these issues and the world is now waiting for President Biden to ensure American policy is reversed. It is estimated that developing countries, if denied funds and vaccines, will take three-four vears to vaccinate their population. Another unfortunate trend is the unseemly fight between pharmaceutical companies and the EU and UK over access to vaccine supplies. AstraZeneca has indicated that it will not be able to supply vaccines promised ear-

with a COVID-19 Coranavirus vaccine.

To five vaccines to impose restrictions on vaccine exports, obliquely alleging that the pharma companies want to divert vaccines to more lucrative markets like the UK from manufacturing units in the EU. The UK has put in controls on export of various pharma products to lock in supplies for its own

population. South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, at the World Economic Forum, accused wealthy countries of hoarding vaccines far more than their requirement. The EU has locked in supplies for more than twice its population. It is smarting at criticism that it is trailing other wealthy countries, like the US, UK, Israel and others in its vaccination coverage of its population. Any selective application of export controls will run afoul of WTO rules

on universality of restrictions, though the regulations recognise exemption grounds of national security and health emergencies.

Has the world changed so fundamentally as a result of four years of Trumpism? The EU's Comprehensive Agreement on Investment (CAI) with China, announced on the eve of President Biden's assumption of office, was another clear signal of transatlantic discord and a blowback for Trumpism.

#### **COVAX** initiative

The COVAX initiative launched by the WHO to help developing countries is hugely underfunded and may not vaccinate more than 20% of the population of the developing nations unless funds are provided urgently and orders placed for vaccines. The EU's export controls will also hit vaccine supplies to many developing countries. While EU nations are prone to grandstanding on human rights issues, their recourse to vaccine nationalism exposes their double standards. India has carefully charted a course that avoids vaccine nationalism. The depth in the pharma sector has been the

foundation on which she has crafted her vaccine diplomacy. Operation Vaccine Maitri has now reached out to countries across Asia, Africa and Latin America, with vaccine supplies reaching diverse

India's neighbours, barring Pakistan, and other countries in the extended neighbourhood, have received their first consignments as grants. This is despite the huge domestic demand for the vaccination campaign that India kicked off in January. Having supplied medication and medical kits earlier to combat the pandemic, the external affairs minister put it aptly by saying: "We are more nationalistic, but at the same time we don't see a tension between being nationalistic and being international." He was articulating a policy that has inspired India's vision of internationalism that began a few years after Independence,

independent countries in Asia and Africa emerging from years of exploitative colonial rule.



## Government does not oppose debates on incidents of political revenge: Dinesh

The government has no objections for a Parliamentary debate on the report of the Presidential Commission investigating incidents of political revenge, even though the Opposition attempts to project it as such, Leader of the House Dinesh Gunawardena said yesterday. Minister Gunawardena stated so following the request of the Opposition Leader Sajith Premadasa for a debate on the Commission report in the House.

Minister Gunawardena said, "We, as the ruling party, have already promised to give a debate on the Commission report during the Party Leaders' meeting held the day before yesterday. The ruling party will not interfere with the Speaker in the submission of this Commission report or any other report to the House. This is an attempt to recanvas the same thing that happened the day before in the meeting, and the minutes of the meeting can verify it. Therefore, I would like to emphasise that the government does not oppose this debate in any way."

"I remember when I asked for a debate on the Commission report of the Central Bank Bond Scam, the then ruling party raised a Point of Order saying that there was no Tamil translation of the report. As a result, the Chair gave



an order stating that it should be submitted; and that until then, we should not take it up for debate. That is what happened a few years ago; that is how your government operated. You should keep that in mind," he added.

Speaking on the matter concerning allowing MP Ranjan Ramanayake to attend Parliament sessions,

the Leader of the House said the matter was already before the Speaker, and that the House should wait until he gives a ruling.
"The Speaker could

have immediately given a ruling. However, he requested 21 days to listen to the opinions of those involved in the matter. Therefore, there is no point in arguing about it. We should wait until he gives a ruling," Gunawardena said.

Speaking on the issues related to the removal of MP M.A. Sumanthiran's security detail, he stated that the government would not jeopardise the safety of any MP, unlike

the previous government. He drew the attention of the House as to how during the previous government's rule, a decision was taken to remove the security detail of then MP

Mahinda Rajapaksa.

Gunawardena said, "Prime Minister Rajapaksa was the leader who led the country to victory in the war. Now you talk about the assessment of security. We will not violate the privileges of any Parliamentarian. The Speaker is able to discuss this matter; he can summon the responsible officers to inquire about their decision to remove MP Sumanthiran's security detail."

### Animal feed expenses rose by Rs.29 billion in 2015/19: Bandula

Animal feed expenses rose by Rs.29 billion between 2015 and 2019 during the previous government's rule, Trade Minister Dr. Bandula Gunawardena said in Parliament yesterday. This was in reply to a question raised by MP Mohammed Muzzammil during the oral questions round.

Dr. Gunawardena said, "The total amount of animal feed imported from 2011 to 2014 was 58 kilotonnes, which cost around Rs.11.6 billion. The previous government imported 203 kilotonnes



of animal food between 2015 and 2019, which cost around Rs.35.2 billion. The expenditure increased by Rs.29 billion. However, the industry did not see an increase in production. Due to such poor

decision-making, the importation of animal food products affected local production." The Trade Minister added

that local production of animal feed would be encouraged in the future. "The Ministry of Agriculture has increased the local production of corn as it is a staple for animal feed. In the future, agricultural productions will be increased due to our policy on limiting imports. We will have sufficient products to increase our local animal feed production," he said.



He was responding to a question raised by National People's Power Leader MP Anura Kumara Dissanayake under Standing Order 27/2.

Accordingly, 110 more students have been admitted to medical faculties, 30 students to the Faculty of Dentistry (University of Sri Jayewardenepura), 100 students to engineering faculties, 150 students to science faculties, and 150 to management faculties, he added.

Prof. Peiris stated that last year, only 30,000 students were admitted to universities. However, this year, the number has risen to 41,000.

He said the university system has obtained approval from the Treasury to implement these measures, and that financial allocations have been obtained to create 500 new posts for academic staff.



## Trump's second Impeachment trial deemed Constitutional

### 6 Republicans break ranks and vote with Democrats

**US:** The second impeachment of former US President Donald Trump is Constitutional, according to the United States Senate. Though a conviction over Trump's role in the violent attempted coup of January 6 is looking pretty unlikely at this point, the jurors voted 56–44 to move forward.

Fifty-six Senators voted that the trial was constitutional, while 44 voted that it was not. Six Republicans broke ranks to vote with Democrats in declaring the trial constitutional.

"The Senate shall proceed with the trial as provide under the condition of that resolution," declared Senate President pro tempore and Batman movies regular Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-VT). Today mirrored an earlier vote on the impeachment that was 55-45. The

addition in the impeachment column was Sen. Bill Cassidy, Republican of Louisiana. Despite his harsh words against Trump in past weeks, Minority Leader Sen.

Mitch McConnell (R-KY) voted with the Trump defense.

Expected to last until Presidents' Day on January 15, 67 votes are need to convict the now ex-Presi-

dent - which means the Impeachment managers have their work cut out for them against a GOP refusing to stand up to the MAGA moron and his hardcore base.

The six Republicans broke ranks to vote with Democrats in declaring the trial constitutional were: Sen. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, Sen. Mitt Romney of Utah, Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, Sen. Pat Toomey of Pennsylvania, Sen. Ben Sasse of Nebraska and Sen. Bill Cassidy of Louisiana.

Polls show that a small majority of the country overall believes Trump deserves conviction. An Ipsos/ABC News poll found 56 percent back this, while a Gallup poll found 52 percent support.

Among Republicans, however, an overwhelming majority opposes convicting Trump. -YAHOO, AFP

## **Don't let Long Covid 'fall through** the cracks', warns WHO



New research suggests that due to Long COVID also known as Chronic COVID Syndrome (CCS) the lungs of people who smoke may have more receptors for the new coronavirus.

**SWITZERLAND:** The World Health Organization (WHO) called Tuesday for greater research, recognition and rehabilitation for Long Covid sufferers as it brought experts together to share insights into the little-understood condi-

The WHO held the first in a planned series of seminars aimed at expanding understanding of post-Covid conditions, which heard not only from scientists and doctors but also from sufferers them-

Little is known about why some people, after coming through the acute phase of COVID-19, struggle to recover and suffer ongoing symptoms including tiredness and brain fog as well as cardiac and neurological disorders.

Studies suggest that potentially one in 10 cases may have prolonged symptoms one month after infection -- meaning millions may be suffering from ongoing ill-

WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said that with attention turning in the coronavirus pandemic towards vaccination campaigns, "Long Covid should not fall through the

He said the impact of Long Covid on society and the economy was starting to become clear, and for those reasons, "people start to listen" beyond the medical community. Though the level of research is growing, it is "still not enough", he said.

#### **Bangladesh bans cattle** painkiller to save vultures

**BANGLADESH:** Bangladesh has banned a painkiller used widely by farmers to treat cattle in an effort to save the country's vultures from extinction, the government said Tuesday.

Like elsewhere in South Asia, vulture numbers have plummeted in Bangladesh, with the population now estimated at just 260 compared to 50,000 in the 1970s.

The meat of dead cows that have been given Ketoprofen is highly toxic when consumed by the scavenging birds, leading to rapid kidney failure.

In 2017 Bangladesh outlawed the nonsteroid anti-inflammatory painkiller in two Vulture Safe Zones (VSZs), areas designated as protected areas for the birds.

But the new ban on the sale and production of the medicine approved on Monday applies nationwide, Environment Minister Shahab Uddin told AFP. - AFP

The latest assault on Myanmar's civilian leadership came as anger at last week's coup and the detention of Suu Kyi by the generals has driven hundreds of thousands of people into the streets, defying a junta ban on rallies.

"The military dictator raided and destroyed NLD headquarters at around 9:30pm," the National League for Democracy announced on its Facebook page.



National Athletics Coach Y. K. Kularatne said that Sri Lanka Athletics had earlier decided to conduct the National Championship from April 7 to 10. However, with the Asian Athletics Meet cancelled, SLA has now decided to conduct the new selection trails for the Nationals from April 7 to 10 at the Sugathadasa Sta-

SLA successfully conducted the 98th National Championships last December according to the health regulations and that was a good opportunity for the local athletes to make a comeback with their performances.

Due to COVID-19 pandemic several International events were postponed including the Asian Youth Athletic Championship, Asian Martial Art and Beach Games and the Asian Athletic Championship.

Meanwhile, SLA is currently on the lookout for more competitions for Sri Lanka's top athletes, especially in the European Circuit, which will be beneficial to boost their World Ranking Points.

With the new World Ranking System coming into play for Olympic slots, many top athletes are also on the lookout for competition in the European Circuit.

The selection trial for the Nationals will be the first event for the local athletics in 2021.

With the new points system athletes can collect a total of 100 points from the Nationals which are vital for Olympic qualifica-

## Djokovic passes Tiafoe test, Serena sublime at Australian Open

MELBOURNE, AFP - Eighttime champion Novak Djokovic was made to sweat at the Australian Open yesterday as Serena Williams made serene progress in her bid for a record-equalling 24th Grand Slam title.

Women's favourite Naomi Osaka also charged through but fellow major-winners Stan Wawrinka, Bianca Andreescu and Petra Kvitova were all second-round casu-

Djokovic was given a stern examination by America's Frances Tiafoe and dropped his first set of the tournament before recovering to win 6-3, 6-7 (3/7), 7-6 (7/2),

The top seed looked in control after taking the first set, but lightning-quick Tiafoe, who reached the quarter-

finals two years ago, refused to go quietly. The American bounced

back to take a close second set but imploded as tensions rose in the fourth, receiving a code violation for an audible obscenity as Djokovic took charge.

The Serb is targeting a record-extending ninth title and his 18th Grand Slam trophy overall as he snaps at the heels of Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer, who top the all-time list with 20 each.

He avoided the fate of 2014 winner Wawrinka, who blew three match points in the fifth-set tie-breaker in his four-hour epic with Marton Fucsovics, who won 7-5, 6-1, 4-6, 2-6, 7-6 (11/9).

Osaka, whose three Grand Slam titles include the 2019

match against France's Caroline Garcia, winning 6-2, 6-3 in 61 minutes.

Earlier Williams, 39, continued her quest to equal Margaret Court's all-time mark of 24 Grand Slams with a 6-3, 6-0 romp past 99thranked Serbian Nina Stoianovic.

Williams hit 27 winners in her 101st Australian Open match while again sporting her unique, one-legged cat-suit inspired by track legend 'Flo-Jo'.

Williams' elder sister Venus, 40, was a major casualty on day three when she painfully rolled her ankle in the first set against Sara Errani before hobbling

through a 6-1, 6-0 defeat.
And Andreescu, the 2019 Australian crown, had no US Open champion who

## **Involve more Lankan architects** for State projects - SL/A

The Sri Lanka Institute of Architects(SLIA) requested the government to offer opportunities for talented Sri Lankan Architects to handle large projects in the country and utilize their service more for State ventures.

"I am inviting government decision makers of the construction industry in Sri Lanka; specifically from the President and Prime Minister to give opportunities for talented Sri Lankan Architects to handle the large projects which are going ahead to make greater impact for our future built environment. Give the opportunity, SLIA is ready to conduct design competitions with-

in 3 months. That is the way forward if we really think smart that we are to make Sri Lanka "the wonder of Asia". At least if we award4 such buildings to talented Architects in a year through SLIA design competitions, over the span of 4 years we would have 20 iconic landmark buildings in Sri Lanka. This is the potential impact SLIA could make through collaboration with the Sri Lankan government and SLIA. If the government really wants to boost our industry during this seemingly difficult period this would be much appreciated by those of the prospective practices as well, Archt Russel Dandeniya, Senior Vice President SLIA told

ence in Colombo on Tuesday. Dandeniya said the total public investment on construc-

tion was approximately Rs 1 trillion out of which 40% was on buildings and out of the 40%, the component of private sector both consultancy and construction was 12%. The balance 28% was the component of the Public sector. He said the State sector (public and semipublic) employment related to construction related professions (architects, engineers, quantity surveyors etc.) were 1,020 (those who are workingat CECB, UDA, NPPD, SEC, Buildings Department, NHDA, University of Moratuwa, Department of Archeology, etc.). However Dandeniya said while the private sector employed 7,600 professionals related to con-

struction, the State sector employed only 120 architects with the private sector employing more than 1,200 architects. He said it was therefore evident there is an imbalance of distribution of work between private sector and State sector where 28% of public investment is carried out by 120 architects and 12% is carried out by 1,200 architects. The majority of these architects in the private sector, who have been trained under public funds, are working below par and their potential is not being harnessed for the betterment of the public.

"We are not asking anything but serving opportunities to make our built environment

remarkable and boosting architecture practices during this difficult period by creating opportunities.

## World food prices rise for seventh month in a row

World food prices rose for the seventh consecutive month in December, led by dairy products and vegetable oils, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations reported today.

The FAO Food Price Index averaged 107.5 points in December, 2.2 percent higher than in November. Over the whole of 2020, the benchmark index, which tracks monthly changes in the international prices of commonly-traded food commodities, averaged 97.9 points, a three-year high and a 3.1 percent increase from 2019 although still more than 25 percent below its historical 2011

The FAO Cereal Price Index rose 1.1 percent from November and for all of 2020 averaged 6.6 percent above the level of

2019. Export prices for wheat, maize, sorghum and rice all rose in December, moving higher in part due to concerns over growing conditions and crop prospects in North and South America as well as the Russian Federation.

The FAO Vegetable Oil Price Index gained 4.7 percent in December to reach its highest level since September 2012. In addition to ongoing supply tightness in major palm oil producing countries, international trade was affected by a sharp hike in export duties in Indone-

The FAO Dairy Price Index increased 3.2 percent in December, its seventh consecutive monthly rise, with all categories higher due to strong global import demand induced by concerns over drier and warmer



conditions on Oceania's milk production as well as high internal demand in Western Europe

The FAO Meat Price Index increased 1.7 percent in the month of December, while its full-year average was 4.5 percent below that of 2019.

The FAO Sugar Price Index declined by 0.6 percent in December after a marked increase during thec previous month.



# Introduction of the South Asian Journal of Tourism and Hospitality:

#### A timely requirement

The Faculty of Management Studies of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka recently launched its maiden journal on tourism and hospitality namely 'South Asian Journal of Tourism and Hospitality' (SAJTH).

It is a peer-reviewed bi-annual journal with open-access, issued in January and July, was introduced in collaboration with leading academics in Tourism and Hospitality across the world.

This inaugural issue of SAJTH propagates new tourism and hospitality knowledge through eight research papers and a book review that critically explore contemporary issues in both in and out of the South Asian context. In the first article, the development of the wildlife tourism resources at the

Beijing Wildlife Park (BWP) is investigated with the aim of determining the way forward for sustainable development of the BWP by using the case study approach through collecting data from the online comments on two Chinese travel apps

The second paper explores the ways in which mass tourism has utilized cultural heritage as a salient asset for development. It argues that there are numerous ways in which ordinary heritage could be better researched in South Asia, how it might be used as a tourism resource, and as a tool for community empowerment.

The third paper reports on a study of visitor demand for Human-Elephant Conflict mitigation strategies such as visitor willingness to pay a conservation tax at park level that could be used for implementing HEC mitigation measures to conserve elephants in the wild.

A discrete choice experiment

(DCE) was conducted at three national parks in Sri Lanka presenting different options for mitigating HEC. The influence of experiential marketing on destination loyalty through the mediating effect of tourists' satisfaction and destination image in the tourists' cultural destinations in Sri Lanka is the fourth paper. It discloses that experiential marketing has a significant positive effect on destination loyalty only with the mediating

effect of destination image and sat-

The fifth paper titled "Can the Western Tourist Gaze be deconstructed through Buddhist Ontology" with the philosophical insights advanced by the Kyoto School of Thoughts, articulates that the western gaze in the discovery of the outer world can become meaningless. Hence, the western tourist gaze that sought pleasure or leisure or even newness would be futile as it leads to avidya, the manifestation of the ego. The paper concludes

that 'the union of the seer and the seen' gets deconstructed when the individual deeply realizes the fundamental nothingness that creates the above subjective-objective illusion (avidy?) - the foundation of the western tourist gaze.

The sixth paper focuses on the moderating role of personal initiative in projecting employee creativity through transformational leadership in five-star hotels in Sri Lanka. It discusses the fact that a significant moderating role of the personal initiative was found in the association between transformational leadership and employee creativity from surveying 312 employees and their immediate supervisors


Whether and to what extent, branding and trademark regimes can be used in a business context to extract value from tourism-related products and services in Sri Lanka is discussed in the seventh paper, following a systematic literature review. The focus of the eighth paper is to understand how people used their cooking mishaps during the movement control order

period due to the Covid-19 pandemic to seek emotional support and a sense of belonging to an online food community. Three major sharing motivations, namely, social and relational, emotional articulation and information sharing, are derived through content analysis of reports.

Finally, the book "Tourism, Hospitality and Digital Transformation," edited by K. Tajeddini, V. Ratten, and T. Merkle (Routledge; 1st Edition, 2019) is reviewed comprehensively and critically.

**URUGUAY:** As a second, deadly wave of COVID-19 batters Latin America, images have emerged from country after country of desperate people lining up for days to buy oxygen to ease the suffering of infected loved ones fighting for breath.

As demand soars, prices have skyrocketed and families have had to scrape together their last cents to pay for supplies of the essential gas.

On January 14 alone, a researcher estimates more than 100 people died of asphyxiation at hospitals in Brazil's northern Amazonas state.

One of them, according to his widow, was Henrique Marques, 52, who ran out of breath in a hospital in Manaus.

According to the World Health Organization, about one in five people with COVID-19 requires oxygen therapy to relieve respiratory distress.

With more 19 million recorded infections to date - likely an undercount, almost four million people in Latin America have required oxygen therapy

since the outbreak began.
Public health NGO PATH, which compiles a "COVID-19 Oxygen Needs Tracker", says more than half of hospitals in low- and middle-income countries - a category that includes most of Latin America - have an inconsistent supply of medical oxygen, or lack it

On a world map produced by PATH to show daily oxygen need, Brazil is marked with a large, bright orange dot indicating demand for some 327,000 cylinders, followed by Mexico with 89,700 cylinders, Colombia with 76,700, Argentina 56,200 and Peru 36,700. Latin America's death toll of more than 610,000 is second only to that of Europe, with about 762,000.

Brazil and Mexico account for more than half of the region's deaths, with

according to experts - this means 228,000 and 162,000 respectively, and rank second and third in terms of mortality worldwide.

Peru is proportionally the hardest hit with 125 deaths per 100,000 of its population of 33 million.

Amazonas state and its capital, Manaus, were particularly assailed by the second wave this year, quickly running out of hospital beds, oxygen and burial space.

By mid-January, daily demand for oxygen in Amazonas was about 76,000 cubic meters (around 20 million US fluid gallons) and supply at a mere 28,200 cubic meters.

In Lima, July Blanco and her brother Juan Carlos were among hundreds to have lined up for days at a time, sleeping outdoors, to obtain an oxygen refill for their ailing father.

They waited patiently with others outside the Criogas factory, famed for keeping its prices stable while other

producers hiked theirs by as much as 300 percent. The price for a 10 cubicmeter tank varies widely in Peru -between \$330 and \$690 - while a cubic meter of oxygen sells for anything between \$5 and \$13.

In Mexico, the authorities say they have not detected any shortage or hoarding of oxygen. However, there has been a 700-percent increase in demand between December 20 and January 20, and a shortage of cylin-

On the Mexican black market, consumers say they are paying 45,000 pesos (\$2,230) for a 9,500-liter tank and 32,000 pesos for a 6,000-liter tank -- triple the normal price.

In impoverished Nicaragua, the price for a tank of oxygen could be as high as \$1,000 or \$1,500, according to Roger Pasquier, president of the Nicaraguan Anesthesiology Association.

# Vaccine production must catch up to science - EU chief

**BELGIUM:** Europe's race to manufacture COVID-19 vaccines must accelerate to catch up to scientific breakthroughs and outpace emerging variants, European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said on

"We underestimated the difficulty related to mass production. Normally, it takes five to 10 years to produce a new vaccine. We did it in 10 months. This is a huge scientific success, and we should be rightly proud -but in a way, science has outstripped industry," she told the European Parliament.

In her first public admission to Europeans - outside of some select media interviews - von der Leyen said her Commission had made missteps in procuring vaccines on behalf all EU countries.

But she defended the overall strategy. "We were late to authorise. We were too optimistic when it came to massive production. And perhaps we were too confident that what we ordered would actually be

But to have allowed Europe's wealthiest countries to grab vaccines for themselves

delivered on time," she said.

and leave others in the cold "would have been, I think, the end of our community,"

she said.

There were lessons to be learnt, von der Leven said, and her Commission would do so. They included getting more data shared between clinics in EU countries, improving regulations to allow the European Medicines Agency to move faster in authorising vaccines, and especially to clear industrial bottlenecks to vaccine production.

"Industry must adapt to the pace of science," she said, noting that vaccines can contain as many as 400 ingredients and manufacturing involve as many as 100 com-

A vaccine production task force under internal market commissioner Thierry Breton was charged with that mission, she said.

"We're dealing with completely new mRNA vaccines never manufactured at scale before. One of the current bottlenecks is, for example, linked to synthetic molecules... we need more coordination on the supply of key ingredients." Von der Leyen warned that European scientists do not yet

know if the vaccines will be effective against new mutant strains of the virus that are emerging.

"But we do know these variants will continue to emerge. And we do know that we need to anticipate and prepare immediate-

ly," she warned. She also said deeply regretted an aborted bid by the Commission last month to try to restrict vaccines being transported into Britain's territory of Northern Ireland as part of a bitter row with Anglo-Swedish pharmaceutical company AstraZeneca, which has failed to deliver vaccine doses it promised to the EU. But she stressed that "in the end, we got it right" and a hastily set-up EU vaccine export control scheme would not "restrict companies that are honouring their contracts with the European Union" and vaccines to most of the bloc's

neighbours would be unhindered. The Commission, she emphasised, "will do its utmost to protect the peace of Northern Ireland, just as it has done throughout the entire Brexit process".

## Pet pooches play more when humans are watching

**US:** Pet dogs are far more likely to play with one another when their owner is present and being attentive, according to a new study, raising the intriguing possibility that they are putting on a show for our benefit.

That our canine companions are keenly attuned to the level of interest humans are showing them is well established, Lindsay Mehrkam, an animal behaviorist and lead author of the paper that appeared in Animal Cognition, told AFP Tuesday.

"But we weren't aware of any research that has really shown the effect of a human audience impacting species typical behavior, in this case dog-dog play." Mehrkam oversaw an experiment involving 10 pairs of pet dogs that had lived together for at least six months.

The duos ordinarily engaged in play at least once a day, according to their

The researchers videotaped the dog pairs under three conditions: where the owner was absent, where the owner was present but ignoring them, and where the owner was present and showering them with attention in the form of verbal praise and petting.

To ensure the experiment was robust, they ran each of the conditions three

times over the course of several days. "We found overall that the availabiliof owner attention did in fact facilitate play," said Mehrkam, with human attention increasing both the frequency and intensity of behaviors like bowing,

hip nudges, wrestling, chasing, gentle

"It's really quite striking that dogs who have the chance to play with each other whenever they want to, nonetheless are much more likely to get up off their butts and start playing when a person is just paying attention to them," said co-author Clive Wynne of Arizona State University.

The researchers offered several ideas for what might be driving the effect. One possibility is that an owner's attention might be a reward the dogs are seeking, like young children plead-

ing with their parents to watch them as

they show off what they can do. The dogs might have also learned that playing among themselves leads to bigger prizes, such as the owner joining in the fun, or taking them outside.

Or, their owner might provide the dogs a sense of safety, because although animals use play to strengthen bonds, it can sometimes turn tense and lead to aggression. Having a person around is

insurance against a fight. Their human's presence could also be a trigger that enriches the general environment, perhaps causing a rush of the love hormone oxytocin, which leads to a more positive emotional state that in turn manifests as play.

"It's one of those types of studies that leads to a lot more questions than answers," said Mehrkam, adding she was working on untangling the various threads in ongoing experiments.- AFP

**THAILAND:** Lovers across Bangkok will be heartbroken come Valentine's Day, with city officials declaring Wednesday that all of the Thai capital's 50 districts will be banned from issuing marriage licenses.

The holiday, immensely popular across the kingdom, is also typically considered an auspicious day for couples to tie the knot resulting in large queues at marriage registration offices across the city.

The most popular district is Bang Rak which translates as "district of love" in Thai.

But the hopes of eagerto-wed couples have been dashed.

"Bangkok's 50 district offices will refrain from providing marriage license registration service on this Valentine's Day," Thailand's Public Relations Department said on Twit-

"The cancellation aims to prevent the spread of #Covid19." The announcement also said Chinese New Year festival, which usually involves a raucous parade in Bangkok's Chinatown, will not go on.

Last year, Bang Rak district had scores of couples dressed in matching outfits or formal wear lining up before dawn to register for licenses, helped by pink-shirted civil servants wearing "love" headbands.

Little fanfare has been made among the city's malls and businesses compared to previous years, though that hasn't stopped some restaurants for punting out Valentine's Daythemed meal offerings.

Burger King Thailand hasdebuted "Black and Pink burgers" for Valentine's Day, featuring a pink salmon patty with rose-col-

our buns. - AFP

## **Maori MP refuses to wear tie** rejecting 'colonial noose'

**NEW ZEALAND:** New Zealand's Parliament backed down Wednesday after ejecting a Maori lawmaker because he refused to wear a tie, allowing him to speak without an accessory he labelled a "colonial noose".

The issue flared on Tuesday when Maori Party co-leader Rawiri Waititi was ejected from the parliamentary debating chamber for not wearing the required attire during question time.

Waititi, who has a full-face "te moko" tattoo and dons a black cowboy hat, argued that he was wearing legitimate Maori business attire - a traditional pendant.

'This is not about ties, it's about cultural identity," he said as he left. Indigenous Maori make up about 15 percent of New Zealand's five million population but are over-represented in statistics such as pover-

ty and imprisonment, with many blaming injustices dating back to the days of British colonial rule.

Waititi said the tie row showed race relations still needed to improve in the South Pacific nation.

This is a breach of the rights of indigenous peoples, we (must) have the freedom to express our cultural identity in a space like this," he

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said she had no objection to lawmakers not wearing ties but added "there are much more important issues for all of us". After strictly enforcing the dress

code on Tuesday, parliamentary speaker Trevor Mallard took a more relaxed approach when a tie-less Waititi spoke on Wednesday.

Rather than have the Maori leader ejected, Mallard simply let him ask a question unhindered, later saying a permanent rule change was being considered.





# Designing your dream home

**ISHARA JAYAWARDANE** 

rchWorld speaks to Principal Architect -KWCA, Council Member- Sri Lanka Institute of Architects, Chartered Architect, Architect Kosala

Weerasekara, on the very basic design processes that culminate in a unique creation.

"When we start a design, if it is a personal house we follow a certain design process. When it comes to residences the primary design generator would be the Client/User. The secondary design generator would be the site. As architects we always analyze the client and take into account their preferences, their tastes, and their way of life. We become so close to them that we can understand what their actual needs are. After that we start designing for them. So when it comes to the site, we have to consider the weather patterns such as wind movement and sun path. So each house is being designed after analyzing the client and the site first. So that's why each house has its unique character," explained Weerasekara.

There are those who like large crowds and there are those who prefer surroundings that are more mellow. Night clubs are not everyone's cup of tea. Some people are pack rats and there are those who are not hoarders. When doing

#### **Unique solution**

"For me extrovert and introverts are two types of personalities. In architecture everyone we meet is full of different characteristics. So if we analyze the client carefully, it will lead to a unique solution for that person. So for example, a house designed for one introvert will be different from a house designed for another

We know that in society there are many with a nervous disposition. It is highly common to the point that we all know someone who has a nervous disposition. One has only to go on YouTube and there are plenty of talk shows like Dr. Phil where you encounter many people with a nervous disposition. So when building a personal house, it depends on the client's situation. Weerasekara points out that as an architect he always tries to design a house that is livable for his client who during the course of their association becomes more of a friend.

introvert," said Weerasekara.

There is an interesting story in a book called Northern Lights from the Soviet Union. Since olden times many different tribes lived in that region. There is a fairy tale called - 'The Burbot and Princess Marya, his wife'. The Burbot wished to marry the Tsar's daughter

and on the pain of death the Tsar ordered the Burbot to build a house as magnificent as the Tsar's own in the space of one night! The Burbot accomplished this task! Once more these fairy tales form a plan and plant an idea in the child's mind! They too want a house as majestic as the house the Burbot made!

#### **Homely feeling**

"So the architects responsibility is to identify the qualities of the user and design an ideal home for the particular client. I don't believe there is an ideal house for a Sri Lankan. Of course there can be similarities using materials and techniques. But what an Architect needs to do is deliver a unique and ideal house for each client which makes them feel that it is their very own home," pointed out Weerasekara.

The tale of The Burbot and Princess Marya, his wife does not end there. The Tsar orders the Burbot to build a new church in one night, the likes of which have never before been seen in that country! The Burbot accomplishes this and eventually the Burbot marries the Tsar's daughter. All of this forms a unique idea in the mind of the child that reads the fairy tale!

"In my experience before you build a house you need to know about yourself. Your capabilities and especially your financial capabilities. You need to be honest with yourself and recognize your likes and dislikes. You need to plan for the future. For example what you will be doing in the coming years. If you have kids, you need to think to yourself - 'what will my kids be doing in the coming years?'. So you need to discuss this with your architect. And I always tell my clients to think in the long term - for example, in the coming 10 years. This is because your capabilities, your thinking, your attitudes can change after 10 years. So always keep provision for

change. I would like to quote Architect Madura Prematilleke who said - 'Build hope, not ambition - architecture should offer hope to grow, not be heavy with ambi-

#### **Simplicity and minimalism**

Weerasekara added that for him everyone is a unique client. As far as we know there has never quite been a person like you in history. There is no one like you in the present and there will be no one quite like you in the future. That is the challenge he is confronted with. That is why every house an architect designs is unique. Weerasekara respects every client. But what he really tries to do is give them what they need which may be different from what they want. He added that basically he loves all his clients and loves to work with them.

"I do believe in simplicity and minimalism. I think simplicity and minimalism is a must for any building. People do complicated houses when they want to show off. But I think that actually what people need is something simple," said Weerasekara.

#### Long process

He went onto explain that building a house is a long process. What you see as a house is the final product. But for Weerasekara it's a process from day one, from the moment a client walks in through the door up to the time he/she moves into the house.

"From the inception after a careful analysis of the client, site and functions we make sure the original concept is there throughout the building process. So for me it's a team work. The Architect will lead the team with the other stakeholders of the project such as the client, the structural engineer, quantity surveyor, contractors and various other personalities. So if the process is right there will be no mistakes. That is my experience. The architect makes sure that he fulfills the client's requirements budget, time and quality. For me the process is so important," said Weerasekara.

esign trends throughout a house will only take you so far. Some of the most foundational parts of sustainable homes come long before we can begin designing the home. Two of the main things that should be considered before we even think about designing a home is the size and the location of the

## School cricket to resume as season commences in March

Royal, Trinity, D.S. Senenayake, De Mazenod, Wesley and Gurukula MV have been drawn in division 1 Group 'A' section 'X' in the Inter-school Under-19 limited over tournament to be played from later next month.

The Division 1 Group 'A' section 'Y' will comprise St. Benedict's, St. Joseph's, Mahanama, St. Thomas', Matara, St. Sebastian's and St. Anne's, Kurunegala while section 'Z' of the same group will have Nalanda, S. Thomas', St. Anthony's Katugastota, Prince of Wales, Richmond and Maliyadeva.

The long awaited 2020-2021 Under-19 inter-school cricket season will begin on March 20, after the completion of the postponed GCE Ordinary Level 2020 examination.

However, there will be no two-day tournament this year due to limited time left after the Covid-19 pandemic. Hence, the official 2020-2021 Under-19 tournament will only be confined to a limited-over affair.

Division 1 Group 'B' section 'X' will have St. Peter's, Thurstan, Mahinda, Dharmaraja, St. Aloysius' and Moratu MV while section 'Y' will comprise Ananda, Isipatana, Zahira, Joseph Vaz, Dharmapala and Maris Stella. The section 'Z' of division 1 Group will comprise St. Sylvester's, Dharmasoka, St. Servetius', Devapathiraja, Lumbini and St. Anthony's, Wattala.

Similarly, another 36 school teams will battle in the Division 1 tournament drawn under three groups A, B and C. All in all, there will be 72 teams competing in the Under-19 division 1 and division 11 tournaments.

President of the Sri Lanka Schools Cricket Association (SLSCA) Thilak Waththuhewa said they plan to commence the new inter-school Under-19 season after the conclusion of the GCE O/L examination.

"We have already drafted the SLSCA plan to conduct the Under-19 tournament from March 20. We have sent the

Ministry to get the clearance from the health authorities," said Waththuhewa, the former Nalanda Principal who is now the Principal of Richmond College, Galle.

"Unfortunately, there will not be any two-day tournament matches. Instead, we plan to conduct the one day limited over tournament this time from March 20 to April 30. We plan to conduct the finals and finish the tournaments by April 30," said the SLSCA President.

The one-day limited over tournament will be conducted under two play five qualifying round league

"There will be 32 teams competing in division one - 16 in tier 'A' and another 16 in tier 'B'. Similarly, there will be another 32 teams in the division two. There again in division two, 16 teams will be in tier 'A' and another tournament schedule to the Education 16 in tier 'B'," Waththuhewa said.

He said the teams will get 40 days to complete their matches including the finals by April 30.

"All these 32 teams each in divisions one and two will get five qualifying round matches each. After the qualifying league round, eight teams each will be selected to play in the final rounds from quarter final onwards.

The maximum number of tournament matches a team has to honour is eight, including the five qualifying round games," the Sri Lanka Schools Cricket chief explained.

The SLSCA President said apart from these tournament matches, schools may play their traditional two-day matches such as big matches, subject to clearance from the health authorities due to the prevailing Covid-19 pandemic

The world's only uninterrupted big match – the Battle of the Blues between Royal and S. Thomas' is likely to be played in Hambantota at the Mahinda Rajapaksa International Cricket Stadium in April. Negotiations are already underway to play the Royal-Thomain without spectators.

But there will be live television coverage of the three-day affair, similar to the recently conducted Sri Lanka Premier divisions with each team drawn to League T20. The idea is mooted to maintain the 142-year-old traditions

## Kandy soccer yearning to regain past glory



Kandy's successful sportsmen and sportswomen can be proud of their achievements. This was possible due to their keenness, the backing they got from parents, schools, clubs and coaches. Records reveal that Kandy has produced some of the best sportsmen and women in Football, Cricket, Hockey Rugger, Athletics, Table Tennis, Iron Sports, Netball, Volleyball, Lawn Tennis, Boxing, Badminton, Cue Sports (Billiards and Snooker), Cycling, Swimming, carom etc.

At one time Kandy was a powerhouse of Sri Lanka club football. But today it is in a forgotten state. When will the game of football that one time held its domain and produced footballers of international class regain its former glory in the historic city of Kandy?. Sports have been widely used to connecting people, build cohesive communities, enhance tolerance and change the way people think and act.

Today no one seems to care for football in the hill capital which has a history of nearly 100 years. The game is sadly neglected. For many years, tournaments and AGM's were not being held on time in an organised manner. This has been a great setback for the sport. It is reliably understood last year's finals was played only this year. The FFSL is not showing any interest in Kandy football. It is time for them to wake up from their deep slumber and start move the game of football in Kandy towards the right direction. Kandy Football League is a founder member of the National controlling body. At one time this league conducted over 150 matches a year.

Football was introduced to Kandy in the mid 1920's. During the Second World War, British units were stationed in Kandy, with the onetime Commander in Chief of the Allied Forces in the South East Asia, Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten having his headquarters in the hill capital.

Later on Kandy Amateur Football League was formed. It subsequently changed its name to Kandy District Football Association. It served football in Matale, Gampola, Nawalapitiya, Kurunegala and Kegalle, as the years passed by these towns formed their own associations. Today they can survive on their own . When Football in Colombo and else where experienced a setback as far as Ceylonese exponents of the game were concerned, the game was more or less confined to the permanent population and to the Servicemen. Early in 1942, however, there appeared to be a lack of interest in the game, and the efforts made by S.C.Traill the then secretary to call a meeting

of the League was failed and he was compelled to return the trophies to the donors. At that time the game seemed to be seriously affected.

But fortunately G.H. Robins, T.P.C. Roberts who were then stationed in Kandy along with M.S. Jainudeen were mainly responsible in resuscitating the game. A tournament for the main shield was inaugurated with the participation of the Services Footballers in Kandy and football began to thrive again. At that time Bogambara was the location of high activi-

At one time Kandy had one of the biggest leagues with over 40 teams. The present day generation should be aware of

Today football is not much heard of in Kandy. Football has apparently hit rock bottom. Kandy won the All-Island senior and junior League championship for the first time under the presidency of B.M Bodi Liyanage and H. Marikar in 1990's. With these wins Kandy was offered a tour to Nepal for a tournament, for which teams from Pakistan, Bangladesh, India, Nepal took part and Kandy was placed second. It was the first ever Kandy team to tour overseas. Today in FFSL competitions no team from Kandy participate. Holding position in office for prestige sake is not what is required
