The Attorney General alleged that the accused could be charged for conspiracy to commit criminal misappropriation in respect of Treasury Bonds to the face value of Rs.36.98 billion and 15 billion respectively in March 2016.

She said adverse effects have not been reported after vaccination and all the reported cases are general discomforts which are common to any other vaccine. She said COVID prevention can be achieved only when the prescribed individuals are vaccinated.

She reiterated not to be deceived by misinformation shared through social media regarding the vaccination drive. She said Health officials will conduct the vaccination in Colombo District followed by the Gampaha District second. She said that the health sector has given priority to these districts considering their high risk.

The State Minister stated, since the politicians interact with the people on a regular basis, priority of inoculation was given to Members of Parliament to prevent them from spreading the virus to society.

The total number of COVID positive cases in the country reached 77,906 yesterday.

As per Epidemiology Unit statistics, the total number of coronavirus recoveries reported in the country increased to 71,823 and around 5,661 patients are still under medical care. Meanwhile the country confirmed 13 deaths on Wednesday (17) due to COVID-19 raising the death toll from the viral disease to 422.

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga said that 3,820 tourists have arrived the country so far since the reopening of airports from January 21.

Most of them are Ukrainian nationals and the total number of them are 1.374.

In addition, 626 tourists from Kazakhstan and 443 tourists from India have arrived in Sri Lanka.

The Minister further said Jazeera Airways and Gulf Air have decided to commence direct flights to Sri Lanka shortly while flights belonging to Air Arabia, flydubai and Salam Air are already operational to Sri Lanka.

Brian Thomas released on bail

Cricket commentator Brian Thomas, who was in remand over defrauding Rs.134 million, was released on bail by Colombo Chief Magistrate Buddhika Sri Ragala yesterday.

He was released on a cash bail of Rs.25,000 and two sureties of Rs.500,000 each. The Magistrate also imposed a travel ban on him.

The CID had earlier informed the Magistrate that they had commenced an investigation into a complaint lodged by Dinesh Schaffter on March 20, 2019. The Criminal Investigation Department further informed the court that the suspect, while acting as an intermediary, had requested a sum of Rs.1.4 billion from a businessman with the aim of investing it in a well-known company in Sri Lanka.

Attorney Ashoka Weerasuriya appearing on behalf of the prosecution told court that the suspect had cheated the plaintiff in a sum exceeding Rs.100 million. Counsel further stated that the suspect had fraud charges against him levelled by a group of players in 1996 and that the suspect had defrauded another 15 suspects on various occasions.

Since time immemorial, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka have shared intertwined civilisational ties influenced by such major belief systems as Buddhism, Islam, and Hinduism. These dominated much of the Gandhara region-including modern Afghanistan-from where Buddhism spread to South Asia, Central Asia, and East Asia. And history tells us that some of the early settlers of this paradise-island hailed from the northwest of India and the Indus River region, which Afghans then and today have inhabited.

Haidari further said:"The majestic Buddhas of Bamiyan are a testament to our shared heritage and to Afghanistan's cultural pluralism and diversity, which underpin the very Afghan identity today." That is why he said that Afghanistan's former imperial powers, who later embraced and championed Islam in our flourishing region, revered and protected the Buddhas of Bamiyan, as have the many modern governments of Afghanistan, with the exception of extremist Taliban, who on orders from their foreign patron, tragically dynamited the sixthcentury statues of Buddha.

The first phase of the programme has been launched at 75 CWE (Sathosa) premises in the Western Province. Of them, 26 new vegetable stalls have been installed in the Colombo District, 41 stalls in the Gampaha District and eight stalls in the Kalutara District.

Those stalls will provide consumers with vegetables such as carrot, leaks, beet-root, tomato, pumpkin, brinjal, green chili and cabbage at concessionary prices below the normal market prices.

In addition, the government has also facilitated the public to buy potatoes at a lower price while paying attention to giving the local potato farmers a reasonable price for their production.

The concessionary vegetable stalls will also be set up in other areas in the future, the Finance Ministry said.



Justice Minister Ali Sabry, PC said that a problematic situation could arise if Article 16 of the Constitution is repealed without having a proper conversation.

The Justice Minister was responding to a statement by Ven. Athuraliye Rathana Thera in Parliament recently. The Minister said that Ven. Rathana Thera has proposed to remove Article 16 of the Constitution alleging that laws are not equally enforced for all Sri Lankans in terms of Article 12.1 of the Constitution.

"As suggested by Ven. Rathana Thera, if Article 16 of the Constitution

is removed, all laws including the Buddhist Temporalities Act will be abolished. If this removal happens, we will have to face a number of issues, which have never been experienced in this society. This matter has to be thoroughly discussed," the Justice Minister said.

The Justice Minister said that his statement that the Article 16 cannot be repealed has been misrepresented by various individuals.

There are certain laws that affect certain individuals, certain religions and certain social groups. For an example, the Buddhist Temporalities Act applies only to the properties

belonging to temples and devalas. No one is asking to change this law. I believe we have to protect these laws,' he said.

There are laws governing the property of certain places of worship. The Muslims also have such a law called the Wakf Act. There is no necessity to remove this law as well. However, there are some laws that affect the women, children and marital age. These factors have affected other sections of society as well. I am of the view that these areas should be changed.

The Article 16 of the Constitution cannot be repealed in such a manner. If that happened, many of the things associated with it may be lost. It is useless slinging mud at me without understanding the reality, the Justice Minister added.

The Justice Minister also said that a social group with a private agenda has created false information against him to be circulated on the social media.

"We go all over the country to resolve the people's problems. This false propaganda culture emerges when we discuss the issues faced by the people. We could understand the motives behind this campaign. This propaganda is aimed at the Government after using racism as a weapon

They are of the view that they can easily disseminate their opinions to the public if these campaigns are carried out against me. An individual of a political party had said that I am going to establish 100 Kathi Courts. There are some individuals who spread such malicious and false information," the Minister said.

"We have initiated a long term programme to upgrade the judicial system. There are a number of issues in the judiciary. Recently, I visited Thissamaharama, Hambantota and Tangalle. In those courts, both criminal and civil cases are being heard in a single court. A single judge has to hear more than 6,000 cases. In a devel-

rather than personally targeting me. oped country, the judge-population ratio is about 150 to 200 per one million. In our country, the judge-population ratio is 15 per one million. We have to provide a solution to this issue," the Minister said.

The Justice Minister said that legal reforms will be replaced the outdated laws after appointing three committees to look into the issues. He said the Government will establish 100 new courtrooms islandwide in next three years.

The Justice Minister said that the President has instructed to draft a new Constitution. "An expert panel headed by President's Counsel Romesh de Silva will finalise the preliminary draft in March," he said.

Easter Sunday attacks

Hejaaz Hisbullah, Mohommed Shakil remanded

Attorney-at-Law Hejaaz Hisbullah and Principal of the Madrasa School in Puttalam Mohommed Shakil, who were arrested by the Criminal Investigations Department (CID), were remanded till March 3 by Colombo Fort Magistrate Priyantha Liyanage yesterday.

Deputy Solicitor General (DSG) Dileepa Piries appearing for the Attorney General said that Attorney General Dappula de Livera had instructed the Inspector General of Police (IGP) to produce detained Attorney-at-Law Hejaaz Hizbullah to a relevant Magistrate's Court.

The DSG Dileepa Piries further stated that the suspects have been charged under the Section 2(1)(h) of the Prevention of Terrorism Act (PTA) and the Section 3 (1) of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR).

He added that Mohammed

Shakil was arrested and produced before Court on charges of aiding and abetting suspect Attorney-at-Law Hejaaz Hisbullah for violating the Section 2 (1) (h) of the PTA and the Section 3 (1) of the ICCPR. Deputy Solicitor General Dileep Piries told Court that the suspect, Hejaaz Hizbullah, was involved in extremist teachings at the Al Suharia Madrasa Vidyalaya in Karativu, Puttalam.

He said that the Save the Pearl, of which Hejaaz Hisbullah was the Chairman, had given full support to the Madrasa School and had taught 56 children.

It was also revealed that 26 of these children have been kept in a separate classroom and given special residential training from 2018 on the Easter attack. Investigations have revealed that the 26 students who were belonged to the affected families in Colombo and suburbs, DSG Dileepa Piries added.

The Deputy Solicitor General stated that Naufar Moulavi, known as the theoretician of the terrorist group that carried out the attack had visited the school and conducted lectures in December 2018 .He said that the mastermind of the Easter Sunday Terror Attack, Saharan Hashim, had conducted lectures in January, 2019.

According to a statement by a child at a Madrasa School, Saharan Hashim's brother, Rilwan Hashim, had visited the Madrasa on several occasions and had given training to remove the parts of a bomb and a gun.

The Deputy Solicitor General said that Mohamed Assam Mohamed Mubarak, who detonated a bomb at the Kingsbury Hotel in Colombo on Easter Sunday, had conducted military training at the school in February, 2019.

The Deputy Solicitor General questioned how the chairman of 'Save the Pearl', which sponsored the school, was unaware that such activities were taking place inside the Madrasa.

He said that investigations have revealed that the suicide bomber Ibrahim Ilham had acted as the treasurer of the Save the Pearl Organisation and that another attacker Ibrahim Insaf had bought a 108 perch land in Madurankuliya from the money belonged to the Save the Pearl Organisation.

The Deputy Solicitor General said that there were sufficient facts to file indictments before the High Court against the suspects.

Solicitor General Deputy Sudarshana De Silva, Senior State Counsel Lakmini Girihagama along with Deputy Solicitor General Dileepa Piries appeared for the prosecution.

A group of lawyers led by Attorney-at-Law Tiran Anketell appeared for the suspects.

Minister condemns discrimination against first woman DIG

Public Security Minister Rear Admiral Dr. Sarath Weerasekara condemned the discrimination faced by the first woman Deputy Inspector General (DIG) of Police in Śri Lanka, Bimshani Jasin Arachchi.

DIG Arachchi is facing objections over her promotion as the DIG Police Welfare, after 32 Senior Superintendents of Police (SSP) filed a Fundament Rights Petition against her promotion.

"As a country respecting women, we should be proud that a woman has made it to the top ranks of the Police Force. I am saddened to note that a woman has had to

face such discrimination in a society that respects women and holds them in high esteem.

The Police should be proud and honoured that a female has reached this position. I think this officer received an international award a few weeks ago. I don't think those who filed the case against her appointment would win the case.

"We suspect that some form of insult has been committed in filing such a case. A woman rising to the rank of DIG in the Police should be seen as a credit to the police force and a feather in their cap,' Minister Weerasekara said.

Case against Minister Ranatunga fixed for further trial

The case filed against Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga and his wife was yesterday fixed for further trial on June 2 by the Colombo High Court.

The case was taken up before Colombo High Court Judge Manjula Thilakarathne. The Attorney General (AG) had filed indictments against Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga, his wife

Maureen Ranatunga, and another person, on threatening a businessman demanding the balance out of Rs. 64 million.

The AG filed indictments on charges of committing the offences between April 6, 2015, and June 2, 2015.

The AG has named 65 witnesses and included 35 articles as court productions against the three accused in this case.

Colombo Airport expansion project



he year 2021 marks the 70th Anniversary of the San Francisco Peace Conference in which the late former President (then Finance Minister) J.R. Jayewardene made a historic speech supporting Japan's cause after the World War II, quoting from the words of the Lord Buddha, saying, "Hatred ceases not by hatred, but by love." The journey of great friendship between Japan and Sri Lanka thus began, and in this commemorative year, the author aims to highlight how Japan's support for "Quality Development" has played key role in achieving "Quality Growth" of Sri Lanka, while consolidating the bond of friendship between the two countries.

JAPANESE ODA AND ITS APPROACH

Japan vigorously assisted Sri Lanka's self-help efforts for development following her union with the Colombo Plan in 1954. Starting with technical assistance in 1955, Japan expended her assistance, in terms of grants, loans, and technical assistance, to almost all key sectors in the economy of Sri Lanka and supported the development initiatives in all the provinces in the country. In implementing assistance, Japan is further strengthening partnerships with a wide range of institutions of the government of Sri Lanka, NGOs (Japanese NGOs, local NGOs and international NGOs) and academic research organizations to maximize synergetic and complementary effects. Japan continues to contribute to enhancing collaboration between the government and development partners, under the SDG framework. More importantly, Japan closely coordinates in particular with major donor countries and lending agencies, namely, the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to maximize development efforts. Japan has always given full consideration to crosscutting issues such as gender and environment, and made an effort to comprehensively introduce a gender perspective into each programme and project and tried to ensure that it contributes to environmental conservation. In particular, Japan has given due consideration to make sure that its assistance does not give rise to further economic, social and regional disparities in Sri Lanka, and rather provided assistance with a view to eliminating disparities, in the medium to longer term.

that Japan has provided ODA to Sri Lanka on better terms than any other bi-lateral or multi-lateral organizations did. Lower interest rates associated with longer grace and maturity periods in Japanese ODA have resulted in a higher grant element. According to the estimation, based on World Bank and IMF grant element calculation formulas, on average, Japanese development loans obtained by Sri Lanka during the last two decades consisted of around 60 percent grant element (see Table 2).

These findings were further confirmed by a recent research conducted by the Verite Research in 2020 (https:// www.veriteresearch.org/publication/financing-infrastructure-the-non-concessionality-of-concessional-loans/). According to Verite Research (2020), the grant element associated with Japanese loans ranges from 50 percent to 75 percent in 38 major Japanese development loans. According to Verite Research (2020), average weighted interest rate of 38 Japanese loans, obtained during 2005-2020, was 0.73 per annum, the lowest among all Sri Lanka's donors. Most of the Japanese development loans contained around 10 to 15 years' grace period and 30-40 years maturity period. As a result of lower interest rate and longer grace and maturity periods, Japanese development loans have never become financially burden for Sri Lanka. In recent years, many quarters in the society has been concerned over Sri Lanka's growing public debt burden. Nevertheless, such concerns were hardly manifestations during the period in which Japan was the top bilateral donor. Possible reasons for the absence may be due to the fact that Japanese development loans were highly generous thereby not generating undue financial

standing the procurement practices adopted by donors. Verite Research (2020) examined the procurement methods adopted in 50 major donor funded projects.

These projects were funded by both bilateral and multilateral donors. Interestingly, multilateral donors, the World Bank and Asian Development Bank, have adopted international bidding approach while Japan has adopted either the international bidding or bidding restricted to donor's supplier practices. Accordingly, out of 13 considered, 7 development projects opted for international competitive bidding. Interestingly, none of the Japanese funded project has adopted highly uncompetitive unsolicited procurement method. The evidence shows that Japanese funded projects have adopted competitive bidding practices thereby making sure project costs are internationally comparable. Uncompetitive procurement practices cause countries to borrow more than the amount that actually costs a project and that, in turn, is an additional burden to the economy. Such practices could exacerbate debt burden if unsolicited projects account for a significant share of ODA received by a recipient country.

Highly productive to the economy

Developing countries seek ODA for addressing key bottlenecks to growth and development. One of such bottleneck is the two gaps experienced by the developing countries. First, there is a gap between domestic savings and desired amount of investment in the economy. Second, there is a gap between foreign exchange earnings and expenses. Developing countries need to import most of the investment and intermediary goods which play a key role in the process of economic development. Another bottleneck is the limited supply of skilled human workforce in developing countries. It is expected that the ODA could effectively resolve these bottlenecks and unlock the growth and development potential in developing countries. Evidence on the effectiveness of Japanese ODA in enhancing growth and development in Sri Lanka could be presented at two levels, namely at micro-level and macrolevel. Micro-level evidence could be extracted from expost evaluation exercises undertaken by the Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and independent Country Assistance Evaluation reports commissioned to third parties. Table 3 reports data related to findings of some of the Japanese ODA (loan) projects completed in recent years. Accordingly, nearly 77 percent of total development projects, funded via loans, were evaluated as 'satisfactory' and of which 38 percent of projects were evaluated as 'highly satisfactory'. Interestingly, most of the projects which were carried out to improve or develop economic infrastructure reported 'satisfactory' status. The Country Assistance Evaluation reports also re-affirms that development project carried out under Japanese ODA delivered expected outcomes. Country Assistance Evaluation (2008) concluded: 'The contribution of Japan's ODA to the development of economic infrastructure such as roads, electricity, water and sanitation was found to be highly satisfactory. Therefore, positive impacts are expected for the socio-economic development of targeted project areas."

Kawasaki (2004) found, for a set of six Asian countries, that Japanese ODA contributed to enhance GDP growth rate in recipient countries by around 0.6 to 1.6 per cent per annum. Similarly, Cooray (2003) found Japanese ODA is positively correlated with gross fixed capital formation in Sri Lanka during 1960-2000.

As previously mentioned, a greater share of Japanese ODA channeled into economic and social infrastructures developments; these included roads, bridges, power and energy, ports and airports, telecommunication, education and training, health, and water and sanitation. Our findings clearly indicated that such projects were carried out in the highly efficient manner and at lower costs. More importantly, development projects have become highly productive resulting in greater contribution to the economy and people. Quality is one of the cornerstones of any Japanese projects or services.



Japan has assisted Sri Lanka over the years to achieve her socio-economic development enjoyed by the current generation. Covering key economic sectors, Japan has provided ODA at a lower costs, with a higher grant element, within a competitive and transparent context. Japan has successfully funded a number of key development projects covering roads, power, transport, and education. Reflecting the unique feature of Japanese ODA, a greater majority of assistance has channeled into economic infrastructure development or improvements in the country. Our regression analysis clearly indicates that there is a strong positive relationship between Japanese ODA and economic growth and development in the country. Our findings are consistent with the findings of previous research studies. The findings imply that social and economic infrastructures developed with assistance of Japanese ODA have contributed to economic growth and development in the country. This impact was further supported through the micro-level evidence found in ex-post impact evaluations and third party impact evaluations. These evidences clearly indicate that Japanese ODA, with particular emphasis on "Quality Development" has contributed to promoting "Quality Growth" of Sri Lanka and "Quality Life" of Sri Lankan people over the last seven decades continuously.

RELATIVE SIZE AND SECTORAL COVERAG

Japan stresses that sustained economic growth is a prerequisite for poverty reduction, and Japan provides assistance for poverty reduction through economic growth as one of its goals. More specifically, Japan assists Sri Lanka's efforts to accelerate economic growth. With respect to specific assistance, priority is placed on transport, electric power, agriculture, rural development and private sector development (including ICT and tourism). More importantly, Japan assisted Sri Lanka heavily in areas such as education, health and environment on the ground that such sectors play a key role in socio-economic and environmental wellbeing in the long run.

Japan also assisted in addressing water scarcity among the urban and rural poor communities. One of the other area of assistances is the improvement of good governance. In particular, Japan stressed on improvement of human rights, democracy, law and order and the judicial system since those are pivotal in the private sector led growth process in a country.

Interestingly, Sri Lanka has remained one of the priority countries for Japanese ODA during the last seven decades (see Figure 1). In relative terms, during 1970-2019, Japanese ODA accounted for nearly 5 percent of Gross Domestic Savings (GDS), 3 percent of Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF), and 1 percent of Gross Domestic Products (GDP). Japan became Sri Lanka's top bi-lateral donor during 1986-2005, and, during this period, Japanese ODA accounted for nearly 6 percent of GFCF and 2 percent of GDP. Out of the total Japanese ODA disbursed, over two-thirds channeled into economic infrastructure development; 26 percent in ground transport, 21 percent in power and energy, 9 percent in ports and shipping, 5 percent in telecommunications, and 4 percent on irrigation and related activities (see Table 1). In addition, Japanese ODA supported improving human resources development and the health sector in Sri Lanka. Moreover, development of the private sector, in particular small and medium enterprises, and poverty reduction have also been key areas for Japanese ODA. These clearly demonstrate that Japanese ODA to Sri Lanka has remained significant during the last seven decades.

KEY CHARACTERISTICS

Higher grant element

According to Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), a bi-lateral finance assistance must contain a grant element of at least 25 percent to consider it as an ODA. One could employ formulas developed by the World Bank and International Monetary Fund (IMF) to calculate the grant element of an ODA. The higher the grant element in an ODA, the lower the financial burden it carries to the recipient country when repayments are made. In particular, containing a higher grant element is invaluable for most developing countries to avoid repayment difficulties since their financial capacities remain somewhat weaker while longer time is required to reap the economic benefit of ODA funded projects. In fact, economic and social infrastructure projects have relatively longer time horizons in delivering benefits.

An empirical study, carried out by the author, found



Lower life-cycle costs

One of the criticisms against foreign funded development projects is the higher costs associated with project preparation, designing, and construction. It is often alleged that uncompetitive practices and corruption and bribes lead to high project unit costs. In recent years, a few studies have found that project costs, in a comparable set-up, were lower in Japanese ODA funded project compared to that of the other bilateral and multilateral donors. In particular, Japanese ODA projects aim at minimizing life-cycle costs (construction, operation, maintenance, etc.) rather than just construction. The life-cycle costs approach allows policymakers to select "quality project" at lower costs rather than engaging in projects which are less costly at the stage of construction, but add heavy financial burden towards the operation and maintenance. The lifecycle cost approach has become highly useful for policymakers to get a sense of average cost in the long run.

Competitive procurement procedures

One of the key determinants of costs of donor funded projects is the type of procurement methods adopted by the donor. Broadly speaking, procurement methods, adopted by different donors, could be classified as follows: (a) internationally competitive bidding; (b) bidding restricted to suppliers from donor's origin (partially competitive); (c) unsolicited proposals (uncompetitive); and (d) contractor pre-selected (uncompetitive). Internationally competitive bidding is the best practice while bidding restricted to suppliers from donor's origin could be consider as the second best choice. Unsolicited project and contractor pre-selected approaches often cause project costs to balloon due to absence of a bidding process. What is an unsolicited project? Unsolicited projects are the ones that are proposed, developed, and implemented by the donors. Unsolicited projects are harmful due to (a) lack of transparency in selection and implementation of projects; (b) avoidance of competition; (c) avoidance of due diligence processes; and (d) opportunities for corruption and political patronage. Regardless of the pivotal role played by procurement methods in determining the overall project costs and, in turn, the financial burden for the recipient country, limited attempts have been made in under-

Similarly, Country Assistance Evaluation (2014) briefly summarized the findings of the evaluation as follows: "Overall, Japan's assistance to Sri Lanka was characterized as very effective."

An ex-post evaluation is done in assessing the project's relevance, coherence, effectiveness, efficiency, impact, and sustainability. There is a well-established tradition in Japanese ODA agencies in carrying out ex-post evaluation exercises to determine to what extent the project achieved its initial objectives and to learn lessons for future aid operations. The findings imply Japanese ODA funded projects are not only relevant in the context of Sri Lanka's national development objectives, but also have made a significant impact to the society. More importantly, the development projects have become sustainable.

At macro-level, researchers have investigated the impact of Japanese ODA on key economic variables such as GDP, GDS, industrial output, exports, and FDI. Interestingly, a number of empirical studies, both cross-country and country specific studies, have confirmed that Japanese ODA effectively enhances economic growth and development in developing countries.

The author examines the effect of Japanese ODA on growth of GDP, GDP per capita and industrial output for the period of 1975-2019. Findings are reported in Table 4. The estimated results indicate that there is a statistically meaningful positive relationship between the growth of Japanese ODA and Sri Lanka's GDP growth during the study period. Moreover, growth of Japanese ODA positively relates with both per capita GDP growth and industrial output growth. Our results are in consistent with previous research (Momita, *et. al.*, 2019, Kawasaki, 2004, Cooray, 2003). Momita, *et. al.*, (2019) found, for a panel dataset of 117 countries, Japanese ODA is positively related with the growth of industrial output whereas Source: https://www.jica.go.jp/srilanka/english/index.html

Halt this trend

he nation's preoccupation with the Coronavirus has blinded us to an equally death dealing agent in the form of the phenomenal rise in road accidents that keep on exacting a heavy toll of fatalities with each passing day. According to Police Spokesman DIG Ajith Rohana, the number of road accidents has risen to 120 per day from which an average of 10 to 11 deaths and 40 injuries are reported.

- In fact, 11 road deaths were reported during the 24 hours from February 15-16, nine of which was from accidents and two cases from previous hospitalization. Five motorcyclists and four pedestrians were among the dead during those 24 hours. It is said that the cumulative death toll from road accidents in this country has now exceeded the number of deaths during the war period. The authorities need to do something about this.
- Drastic steps should now be taken to arrest this dangerous trend. There is no knowing how many among those killed in road accidents were breadwinners and how many families were rendered forlorn and destitute due to such loss. Among the reasons attributed to road accidents are speeding, drunk driving and ignoring traffic signs, according to DIG Rohana.
- One has also to a large extent lay the blame on the Traffic Police for failing be firm on errant drivers. Speeding over the prescribed limits continues while traffic cops remain mere bystanders. There is also reluctance on the part of the traffic police to book drivers of luxury and super-luxury vehicles violating speed limits obviously for fear of getting on the wrong side of some politico. Only vehicles with shabby appearance and three-wheelers come under their scrutiny.
- Television is full of chilling scenes of road accidents captured via CCTV cameras where callous driving and also carelessness on the part of pedestrians are evident. There is also the recent harrowing incident where a youth barely out of his teens knocked down and killed a mother and her threemonth-old infant while participating in a drag race. There was also the case of the involvement of a national cricketer in a fatal road accident. In these instances the individuals concerned were found to be under the influence of liquor. What became of their cases is anybody's guess as also with the incident where the daughter of a SSP driving without a licence rammed through a car showroom in the city.
- Not much publicity is given to the aftermath of fatal road accidents and the fate of the suspects involved as with the same intensity the original

Sri Lanka, currently struggling to cope with severe socioeconomic challenges, has taken many short-term and long-term steps to solve them. It has been identified that education is the long-term solution to the problems that confront Sri Lankan society in building a dynamic, vibrant and a cohesive nation.

In considering the future of higher education in Sri Lanka holistically, however, it must be said that there are several issues which need to be addressed, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa pointed out earlier this week at the Convocation of the General Sir John Kotelawala Defence University. The world is currently in the midst of what has been called the Fourth Industrial Revolution. Building on the digital revolution that took place in the second half of the twentieth century, rapid technological innovations in a number of fields are converging to create transformative changes around the world. The changes are taking place at exponential speed and are impacting almost every industry in every country. The ongoing global pandemic has only accelerated the pace of these changes. Every country, every government, and every institution involved in education should therefore take note of these important evolving changes. Currently, required educational reforms are being examined on the basis of representations made by experts for the improvement of education reflecting the country's political options, its traditional values, priorities and its vision of the future. A study by National Institute of Education (NIE) stated that education stands at the crossroads today and the present structure of education, pace and nature of improvement cannot meet the needs of the present situation. Social life is passing through a phase which predicts a multifaceted crisis and the danger of erosion of long accepted values and the goal of democracy and professional ethics are being subjected to increasing strain. The future is likely to bring new tensions together with unprecedented opportunities with a demand for commitment to human values and social justice. In the face of the present multi-faceted crisis, the faith in education as the best investment for development and as the one field that affects the whole generation, the future of an entire nation for both individual and social progress or for both private and public good, still has many adherents. The Constitution of Sri Lanka, in the Chapter on Directive Principles of State Policy and Fundamental Duties states that the government is pledged to achieve the objective of "complete eradication of illiteracy and the assurance to all persons of the right to universal and equal access to education at all levels." The principle of universal and compulsory education is therefore built into the Constitution. The farsighted policy of free education pioneered by Dr. C.W.W. Kannangara had given an equal opportunity to youths from remote parts of the country to get higher education and produced a capable national knowledge bank which understood the aspirations of the people and social ethics and values of the country. However, with the rapid advances in the world, the need for educational reforms was recognized in the last few decades, but in spite of several national dialogues, a practical solution failed to be formulated so far.

Every child has the right to education and other fundamental human rights are dependent upon the realization of the right to education. Though we have achieved a high level of enrolment and participation, yet a policy adjustment will be needed to consider the removal of disparities and provide equality of educational opportunities by meeting the needs of those who have been denied an opportunity so far.

Addressing the new KDU graduates on Tuesday, President Rajapaksa emphasized the need to reform the country's education system in order to create a citizen who can optimally contribute to the future world, the economy and development.


The universities should not simply be degree-awarding institutions. The President points out that the country, the economy as well as the graduates themselves should benefit from this. He urged the education authorities to introduce a new curriculum as soon as possible, giving priority to practical needs.

Our higher education system must adapt swiftly. It has to offer our students an education that will remain relevant despite fast changing circumstances and help them find gainful employment in future. Unfortunately, this is an area in which our universities and other higher education institutions need considerable improvement," the President said. "At the minimum, all graduates from our university system need to have some knowledge about new technologies and at least a functional familiarity with computers if they are to have a chance to build successful futures for themselves," the President said. He urged the Vice Chancellors of all universities to introduce Information Technology and computer science to all students, regardless of the field of study. "Irrespective of their chosen field of study, all students selected for university education are intelligent. Any lack of exposure they have to these subjects when they enter university is due to a failure in the education system rather than due to their own weaknesses," the President said. "Enhancing focus on research and development will also have a beneficial impact on the rankings of Sri Lankan universities internationally. Improving these rankings is important if we are to attract more foreign students as well as attract and retain talented faculty members at our universities," the President added.

New reforms should create a background to facilitate access to education for the children who were left behind to reach their expected academic destination without age restrictions. Former National Institute of Education (NIE) Director General Dr. Upali Sedere pointed out in a research paper that disparities were evident across the provinces, districts, and communities. Regional income inequality has been increasing in Sri Lanka during the past few decades. The Western Province represented 5.7 percent of the total land area and 28 percent of the total population, but the Western Province contribution to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) increased from 43 percent to almost 50 percent in a decade. Meanwhile, contribution made by three other provinces together, namely Sabaragamuwa, Central, and Uva to the total GDP decreased from 24 percent to 19 percent. The Western Province alone contributed to two-thirds of the services sector in Sri Lanka.

accident is reported. This too may have contributed to the road fiends getting emboldened. Hence, the spotlight should be focused on the legal action that follows a fatal road accident so that any punishment would act as an effective deterrent to would be offenders. Besides the penalties imposed by the law, the perpetrators should also legally be made to adequately compensate the family of the victim(s). More teeth should be added to the prevailing laws to make the offenders suffer harsher punishment than is presently prescribed.

Most accidents occur due to the lack of knowledge of highway rules and being in the dark on signals often resulting in collisions. The driving schools that have sprung up like mushrooms in every street corner should also come under the scrutiny of authorities. Some of these so-called driving schools are hastily put together affairs to rake in the shekels handing out competence certificates before their charges reach the required standards which obviously contributes to the rising level of road accidents. Drastic measures are now called for to come to grips with the problem. Ironically the vast development of the road network has lent itself to speeding that ends in tragedy.

Hence what is needed is stepped up policing and rounding up of all errant motorists without fear or favour before more deaths are caused. Besides a majority of road accidents involve heavy vehicles on the long haul such as monster trucks and tippers carrying heavy loads. In most instances the drivers of such vehicles tend to fall asleep during the long journeys which start in the wee hours. A rule should be imposed for long distance drivers to have breaks at intervals so that they could rest and restart the journey afresh. Ideally an age limit should also be imposed for driving particularly heavy vehicles since unlike in the past with a vast number of vehicles on the road today one will need sharp reflexes and an alert mind to avoid mishaps. A driver of advanced age, needless to say, could be hardly expected to fit the bill. The drivers of private buses are the worst offenders where speeding and breach of road rules are concerned but they carry on regardless under the very nose of the traffic police. The sooner we take stock of these issues, the better it will be for the overall health of all road users.

By improving local education system, it will be possible to educate many Sri Lankan youths who go abroad for higher education. They migrate seeking foreign education because higher education in Sri Lanka has insufficient capacity to address student demand, especially at the undergraduate level. According to a University World News report, Sri Lanka's 15 state universities admitted only 23,000 students in 2018, out of the 240,000 who sat the university entrance (Aevel) examination. In the same year, some 12,000 Sri Lankan students reportedly sought university education abroad.

Two major decisions the government took last year were to give jobs to all unemployed graduates and to increase the university intake. The university enrolment has been increased from 31,000 to 41,000. The Open University will enroll an additional 10,000 students to their branches. The plans have been devised to register 10,000 individuals to follow degrees in Information Technology.

President Rajapaksa advised the officials to expedite the review process of the already drafted National Education Policy and implement it accordingly. He said that the current labour market discrepancies have occurred due to the fact that educational reforms that suit the country have not taken place for many years. There exist a large number of job vacancies in various fields in the country as well as internationally. But the education system has not created the manpower needed for the modern world.



WHEN PROCEDURAL ISSUES BECOME AMINEFIELD



hat may appear to be regular, routine issues such as making payments to Court where required, can have dire consequences nevertheless.

Section 416 of the Cvil Procedure Code provides that at any stage of the action, "if it appears to court that the Plaintiffs are residing out of Sri Lanka, the Court may in its discretion either of its own motion or on the application of any defendant order the Plaintiff to give security for the payment of all costs incurred and likely to be incurred."

That is obviously to make sure that if costs are ordered against any plaintiff who is not in the country, such costs can be recovered by the defendant irrespective of whether the plaintiff is abroad, and conveniently 'goes missing' as a result.

However, the Court in the exercise of its discretion should be satisfied that the said Sections 416 and 417 are not being oppressively used by the party moving for security.

It means of course that the defendant may not use the need for the plaintiff to furnish security as some sort of tool in order to adversely impact the plaintiff's chances in court.

A case came up in appeal that asked the Court of Appeal for relief on precisely such an issue that had transpired in the District Court. (Barr *Kumarakulasinghe and Others v. Ollegasegaram Amaratungaj* – SLR - 323, Vol 3 of 2005.)

In this matter, the plaintiff had been ordered by the District Judge to furnish security to the value of Rs. 1,010,000. He challenged that order in a Leave to Appeal application.

The Court of Appeal decided in judge-

not be made as a matter of course. The Court in the exercise of its discretion should be satisfied that the aid of either section is not being oppressively used by the party moving for security."

"In this case the defendant has failed to explain to Court why the defendant wanted the plaintiffs to deposit such an enormous sum when the plaintiffs' action was valued at Rs.700,000 and the defendants counterclaim at Rs.400,000."

Citing oppressive use of the provision, the judges of the Court of Appeal decided that the order for security was not justifiable, and set it aside.

In a separate case, *Martin vs. Suduhamy*, (Sri Lanka Law Reports 1991 – Volume 2), a petition of appeal was filed in the Supreme Court in terms of Section 755(4) of the Civil Procedure Code. The matter in issue was that security deposited upon appeal was not hypothecated by bond as security for the costs of appeal as provided for by Section 757(1) of the Code. When objection to the hearing was taken on this ground, the appellant took a postponement but took no meaningful steps to rectify the omission.

Justice Bandaranayake in her judgement stated that the failure of the appellant to offer an explanation suggest that his failure to hypothecate – to pledge collateral for the money deposited – was not by a mere mistake or oversight but probably intentional. It was observed in judgement that "Such conduct in my view should be regarded as materially prejudicial to the respondent



However, such appeals are not dismissed on the mere technical grounds of not depositing the security required on appeal or hypothecating it.

Court has discretion either to grant relief, or to reject the appeal for failure to furnish said monies to court. The respondent has not been materially prejudiced in this case, held Justice Mark Fernando in his differing judgement in the same case.

Justice Mark Fernando held that "prejudice to the respondent is the same, whether there is no bond, or whether there is a bond which lacks a vital clause, namely, it gives rise to the possibility that the sum deposited as costs might not be available to the successful respondent. But is this prejudice "material"? Court ultimately decided that a matter of Rs, 750 which was the amount of the security involved, is not "material" or "substantial" in a case where the respondent had obtained much larger sums in damages.

The problem according to Justice Fernando however was that the appellant though he did not materially prejudice the case by not ensuring the hypothecation the money, did nothing to rectify the error. Justice Fernando stated in judgement:

"I am in respectful agreement with Lord Chancellor in *Sameen v. Abeyewickrema* that relief can be granted even in respect of total or substantial non-compliance, and even if no excuse is forthcoming. But while the Appellant's non-compliance was by no means substantial, the material before us suggests that the Appellant deliberately did not comply with Section 757(1); obtained a postponement of the hearing when the objection was taken, but refrained from taking any steps to cure his default; and made no application for relief to the Court of Appeal."

In other words, Justice Fernando held that there was nothing prejudicial to the defendant by the appellant's lapse in not subjecting the security deposited to be hypothecated. But yet, if he was to continue the case despite the lapse, he should have explicitly pleaded in Court to grant that relief, which he failed to do. The appeal was dismissed.

ccine developers' refusal to share publicly funded vaccine research findings is stalling broader, affordable vaccinations which would more rapidly contain the COVID-19 contagion. The pandemic had infected at least 109 million people worldwide, causing over 2.4 million deaths as of mid-February. Avoidable delays in preventive vaccination are imposing terrible burdens on the world economy and human welfare, with economic disruption demanding more relief and recovery measures. They have cost US\$28 trillion in lost output globally, with developed countries contracting by 7 percent in 2020.

National capacities to cope with the pandemic have been largely determined by means and power. Thus, access to COVID-19 tests, treatments, personal protective equipment and other pandemic supplies has been severely lacking in most African and other poor countries.

At current vaccination rates, it would take "not one or two years, but six years" to reach 75 percent global coverage, currently considered the minimum to achieve 'herd immunity' against COVID-19.

Patent protections, vaccine production constraints and the rich country scramble will deprive more than 85 poor countries of public access to vaccines before 2023. As of February 5, not a single dose had been administered in 130 countries with 2.5 billion people. Of the more than 131 million doses available by February 8, the US, China, the EU and the UK had 78 percent, while Africa had 0.2 percent. The African Union has only ordered less than half of what it needs to reach herd immunity, i.e., just 670 million doses. Besides Brazil, other Latin American countries only have 150 million doses for less than a quarter of their population.

SUPPLY SHORTFALLS

By the end of 2021, total global capacity of the 13 leading COVID-19 vaccine manufacturers would still be well short of the needs of the world's almost 7.7 billion people. Even if they all produce at maximum capacity, a fifth of the world's population would not have access until 2022.

Rich countries continue to oppose the South African–Indian proposal to temporarily suspend relevant provisions of the 1994 World Trade Organization (WTO) Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) to effectively block rapid scaling up of generic vaccine production.

The resulting "catastrophic moral failure" is thus mainly due to vaccine suppliers' profit maximisation, also limiting supplies and access. Meanwhile, rich countries' grossly excessive vaccine purchases can vaccinate their residents several times over.

The US will soon have enough to vaccinate its population twice over, while Canada and Australia have booked enough to protect residents several times over. Exceptionally, New Zealand – which has also ordered several times its population's needs – Vaccine imperialism causes death and suffering, delays recovery



plans to freely share vaccines with its Pacific island neighbours.

MANUFACTURED SCARCITY

Global needs now greatly exceed available supply. Middle-income countries have joined the scramble, making onerous direct deals with vaccine suppliers, typically on worse terms than if they had bargained collectively. Unsurprisingly, vaccine prices vary considerably, by more than 12-fold, from US\$6 to US\$74 per dose.

As countries have not published contract details, acceding to vaccine suppliers' terms, lack of transparency has enabled abuses.

And when forced to comply with Freedom of Information Act requests,

documents are heavily redacted before release.

Such limited transparency enables 'vaccine imperialism' as big power 'vaccine nationalism' impairs others' access. Thus, following its spat with AstraZeneca, the European Commission (EC) banned vaccine exports to most countries outside the EU.

In fact, cross-border enforcement of intellectual property rights (IPRs) is relatively recent. Big Pharma successfully lobbied their governments for TRIPS inclusion in the 1994 WTO founding documents. This greatly strengthened and extended IPRs transnationally.

Now, as these non-transparent deals are disputed, European politi-



cians are threatening 'patent grabs'. EU President Charles Michel has warned of "urgent measures" demanding compulsory licensing, provided for by the European Treaty.

This would require vaccine developers to facilitate generic production, which the developing country-backed TRIPS temporary waiver proposal seeks for all countries. Nevertheless, the EU, other rich countries and their allies still oppose the request to enable rapid scaling-up of affordable vaccine supplies.

PUBLICLY FINANCED Vaccine Development

To accelerate vaccine development, expenses and risks have been mainly borne by governments, rather than by developers or private finance. The six top candidate vaccine developers have already received over US\$12 billion of public money, sometimes with little to show for it.

Of the more successful, Moderna received US\$955 million for research and development plus a premarket purchase commitment of US\$1.53 billion. In Europe, Pfizer/BioNTech got €375 million from the German government and another €100 million for debt refinancing from the European Investment Bank.

Yet, despite massive public financing, vaccine developers retain the IP monopoly right to profit. Thus, the prospect of huge gains from 2021 vaccine sales revenue of almost US\$40 billion is delaying progress against COVID-19.

AstraZeneca promised Oxford Uni-

versity not to profit off any COVID-19 vaccines "for the duration of the pandemic." However, its contracts allow it to declare the pandemic over as early as mid-2021. It could then charge higher prices for vaccines developed with public money for the university.

The AstraZeneca vaccine was 'trialed' on the South African population. Yet, it is paying 2.4 times more than the EU – US\$5.25 compared to US\$2.16. This makes a mockery of "benefit-sharing" and priority "posttrial access" promises. Meanwhile, turning 'ability to pay' on its head, Uganda is paying 20 percent more than South Africa.

Having the greatest vaccine manufacturing capacity in the world by far, the Serum Institute of India has several contracts to produce the Astra-Zeneca vaccine for different countries. In India, it will sell 90 percent to the government and 10 percent to the private sector at a higher price.

Vaccines produced generically at greater scale will be far more affordable, enabling more rapid containment of the contagion, infections, deaths and disruptions. Until herd immunity is achieved nationally and globally, priority in allocation should be on the basis of urgent need, rather than ability to pay or political muscle.

The best way forward now is the TRIPS waiver proposal, still blocked by rich country governments at the WTO. It would enable all countries to affordably make or buy 'generic' vaccines. This would most effectively expedite containing the pandemic with the least loss of lives and livelihoods. (*IPS*)

Any representations or statements of whatsoever which relates to factual matters should be supported by affidavit where possible. Such representations can be made in Sinhala, Tamil or English language, in respect of all or any of the above matters referred to in the above paragraphs.

All such representations should reach the Secretary to the Presidential Commission at the address given below, on or before **12th March 2021** preferably under registered cover.

All such representations should clearly state the name, address, contact telephone number and the e-mail address of such representer or informant.

The Commission, after examining the written representations received, may invite any person, persons or organization to give oral evidence where oral representation is warranted. Dates to give oral evidence will be duly notified.

Body parts of infant who died of COVID sent for investigation

Body parts of a four-month-old infant who died of COVID-19 have been sent to the Government Medical Research Institute for further investigation after a post-mortem.

The post-mortem was conducted by the forensic specialist Professor Sarathchandra Kodikara of the Medical Faculty of the University of Peradeniya. The infant who was admitted to the Sirimavo Bandaranaike Children's Hospital in Peradeniya on February 13 with fever and breathing difficulties had died on the same day afternoon. Since the mother of the child has told that the infant had breathing difficulties after receiving the 'Triple' vaccine, the body was referred to the Faculty of Forensic Medicine on February 17. A circular has been issued to cremate the bodies of persons died of COVID-19 without conducting a post-mortem. The Director General of Health, however, has given approval for a post-mortem as the child died of fever and shortness of breath after the injection.

'Bakalaya' arrested for Boossa double murder

Galle Central Special Corr. Kandage Sarath alias Bakalaya or Bakala Sarath (49), was arrested by Rathgama Police for a double murder in Rupeewala, Boossa, Galle.

Galle Additional Magistrate Pavithra Sanjeewani Pathirana granted permission to the Rathgama Police to detain the suspect. A retired teacher and a mason were killed allegedly by the suspect along with another recently.

The body of 34-year-old Mihindukulasuriya Nuwan Chintaka, a resident of Maliduwa, Boossa was found near an abandoned

house. He was a mason. The other victim, a retired teacher, was found dead at her house.

The suspect along with another had gone to the retired teacher's land to pluck coconut on the day of the murder. He, however, had entered the teacher's house to rob money along with his helper.

Since the old teacher had identified the suspect, he had killed her, investigation revealed.

While the two suspects were coming back, the other victim, Nuwan Chintaka, had been sitting by the road. The two suspects had stabbed him over a rivalry in the past, police said.

The other suspect, a resident of Thelwatta, has not been arrested yet, police said. Rathgama police are investigating.

This year, with participation being enabled on both and hybrid and virtual platforms, the Conference saw impressive numbers in participation from local and foreign participants. A limited number of panellists were physically present at the venue while others and two foreign legal professionals joined the Conference online as speakers.

The theme for the NLC of 2021 was 'Futurism' inspired by the Italian art students' movement in the 1920s, which highlighted the dynamism, speed, change and restlessness of modern life after being plagued by disease and war to arise out of destruction. It was an attempt by various artists to envision the future and depict them through their creative work. Recalling the times the Conference was organized in, the Chairman of NLC 2021 Hiran M.C. de Alwis stated, 'It is only apt that a theme of this nature is selected for this Conference taking into account the unprecedented challenges the last year has posed on us and the world". He further stressed how he does not subscribe to the terminology 'new normal' which is the continuation of chaos but instead the legal profession must look at fashioning a 'new dynamic' to meet the challenges of the time, and hence 'Futurism'.

The Inauguration Ceremony of the Conference was held with the participation of Jayantha Jayasuriya P.C., Chief Justice of Sri Lanka as Chief Guest. Other honorary guests included Minister of Justice, M.U.M. Ali Sabry P.C., Attorney General Dappula Livera P.C., Judges of the Supreme Court of Sri Lanka, President of the Court of Appeal of Sri Lanka Arjuna Obeysekere, President of the Law Commission of Sri Lanka Romesh De Silve P.C., the President of the BASL Kalinga Indatissa P.C. and Secretary of BASL Rajeev Amarasuriya.

President of Sri Lanka, Gotabaya Rajapaksa, sharing his message at the initiation of the Conference expressed how the present government of Sri Lanka is committed to protect the fundamental rights and equal rights of all its citizens and firmly stands by the principle 'One Country, One Law. Shedding light on Sri Lanka's ground reality when it comes awareness on law, the President stated through the 'Gama Samaga' Pilisandarak' programme it was identified how the rural and poverty stricken population are caught in a cycle of never ending misery due to their

ignorance of law governing their day to day issues. He encouraged the Conference to focus on this and see means in which the existing laws can be simplified and the rural population of Sri Lanka can be educated on its specifics. Additionally, the President stated how he hopes the NLC is able to make recommendations to the government regarding the laws and regulations of the country after its intellectual discourse in a manner it assists in making the day-today activities of citizens simpler and facilitates economic development.

Delivering the keynote address of the Inauguration, Romesh De Silva P.C. commended the timely selection of the organizers' theme for the Conference. He stated how the term consists of arriving at practical solutions to the problems the profession is facing at present. Accordingly, he proposed Short Term, Medium Term and Long Term plans to overcome the current challenges of the Bar, with Short Term being the February 2022, Medium Term being February 2024 and Long Term to refer until February 2026.

He further stressed the importance of not being deluded by what the future is, it is not the mere conduct of transborder transactions which he referred to be the past, but tackling issues such as the substitution of AI for actions like filing pleadings and conducting written submissions and certain functions of lawyers becoming defunct.

Secretary of the BASL, Rajeev Amarasuriya, stated how despite the challenging nature of the pandemic it also shone the spotlight on several issues that were crucial and should have been

corrected long ago, and how it demanded the profession to meet the requirements of the time and adapt accordingly. The conference that was organized virtually for the first time will undoubtedly open the door to enable virtual participation for all NLCs in future.

Both the keynote speaker and the President of the BASL Kalinga Indatissa P.C. applauded the present Minister of Justice for being proactive in identifying areas within the present laws of Sri Lanka that require immediate reform and taking the initiative to amend them. PC Indatissa also commended the Minister's efforts taken in developing the infrastructure for the legal profession (expanding current court complexes, reconstructing and refurbishing them etc.). The President of BASL stated that during the two day Conference, the panellists would discuss and identify further areas within the current laws in Sri Lanka that require reforms and modernisation, and the contents of such will be summarised and subjected to relevant authorities to be taken for consideration at the completion of the Conference.

Spanning over a period of two days the Conference focused on a series of timely and dynamic topics that proved to be thought provoking and mind stimulating to the participants. In concluding remarks, Chairman Hiran M.C. de Alwis summarized key points of the discussions that were conducted by the panellists and stated that a written report of them will be submitted to relevant stakeholders.

On the first day a session was conducted on the effective enforcement

of business transactions due to concerns pertaining to the ease of business ranking of Sri Lanka. All panellists were in agreement of the need of an immediate attitude change to effectuate efficiency when enforcing business contracts and in improving the ease of business ranking. Further, in relation to capital

Williams exits in tears as **Osaka, Djokovic reach finals**

MELBOURNE, THURSDAY: Japan's Naomi Osaka brutally halted Serena Williams's latest bid for a record-equalling 24th Grand Slam title on Thursday, as Novak Djokovic wrote the final chapter of qualifier Aslan Karatsev's fairy-tale run.

Fans returned after a five-day coronavirus lockdown in time to see an emotional exit from Williams, Jennifer Brady's win over Karolina Muchova and top-ranked Djokovic preserving his perfect semifinal record at Karatsev's expense.

Triple major-winner Osaka, 23, again proved Williams's nemesis with a one-sided 6-3, 6-4 win which heightened questions about whether the American, 39, will ever match Margaret Court's alltime record for Slam singles titles.

Williams put her hand on her heart as she acknowledged a standing ovation on Rod Laver Arena, and later walked out of her post-match press conference in tears, saying: "I'm

done. The American has lost four Grand Slam finals since winning her 23rd in Melbourne in 2017, and victory over Osaka would have given her a golden

who is into her first major decider.

But after going 0-2 down in the first set, Osaka reeled off five straight games to take charge against a despairing Williams and canter into the

Grand Slam match after reaching the quarter-finals, and Brady can expect the match of her life on Satur-

day. "For me, I have this mentality that people don't

remember the runners-up. You might, but the winner's name is the one that's engraved," Osaka said. "I think I fight the hard-

est in the finals. I think that's where you sort of set yourself apart."

Williams lamented a "big error day" and refused to discuss whether she had made her last appearance at a tournament she has won seven times, an Openera record.

"I don't know," she said, when asked if her salute to the crowd was a farewell. "If I ever say farewell, I wouldn't tell anyone." Williams's departure was

watched by thousands of fans returning after a snap, state-wide lockdown, a welcome sight in Rod Laver Arena after five days of matches in front of empty seats.

The Australian Open is the first Covid-era Grand Slam to welcome large numbers of fans after last year's Wimbledon was cancelled, the US Open took place behind closed doors and the French Open was limited to 1,000 a day.

The returning spectators also witnessed the end of 114th-ranked Karatsev's astonishing campaign, when he became the first man in the Open era to reach a Grand Slam

6-3, 6-4. - AFP semi-final on debut. Karatsev knocked out three seeds to reach the last four but he was no match for Djokovic, the record eighttime Melbourne champion who has never lost a semi or final on his favourite court.

Govt moots paradigm shift to organic fertilizer

The government over 10 years expects to bring to a negligible level the usage of chemical fertilizer emulating the success of Vietnam and Norway.

"The task is no small feat as countries like India and Nepal have had issues trying to achieve the same policy," Chairman Ceylon Fertilizer Corporation (CFC) Methsiri Wijegoonawardana told the Daily News Business at their Head Office in Hunupitiya, Wattala. In the medium term, the company plans to switch from chemical fertilizers to organic fertilizer to reduce external damage to both the environment and affected populations.


On the long term plan to switch to organic fertilizer Wijegoonawardana noted that there would be problems with government intervention. If the government is to incentivize the usage of organic fertilizer then

GREATEST GUIDE!

ri Lanka is slowly opening up o tourism giving visitors a unique chance to visit the many different game parks across the island with only a handful of safari jeeps sharing these stunning places. So you can plan and get the most out of a wildlife experience, I suggest picking up wildlife writer Gehan de Silva Wijeyeratne's latest book, A Naturalist's Guide to the Mammals of Sri Lanka or any one of his fascinating guides to Sri Lankas incredibly diverse wildlife published By John Beaufoy Publishing and other British publishers. Gehan is both a writer and photographer (who qualified as a chartered accountant in London) world renowned for demonstrating not once, but on many occasions over the last three decades, that Sri Lanka is the best place in the world to see blue whales, the biggest annually recurring concentration of wild elephants (The Elephant Gathering) and one of the top locations for leopard safaris, bird watching and seeing diversity in flora and fauna.

His passion for wildlife started

Meet wildlife expert Gehan de Silva and talk to him about where to go. His most recent book, A Naturalist's Guide to the Mammals of Sri Lanka,' will come in handy as the island reopens for tourism

to be a permanent addition to the 'field bag' for keen naturalists. The book uses multiple images with identification-focussed text to provide a compact field guide, which will be useful for resident naturalists and visitors. Only a handful of countries in the world have a portable photographic field guide to mammals with such wide coverage as this book, and although he is the principal photographer, his book is a collective effort, drawing upon the contributions of forty-one photographers from nine countries, resulting in over 250 images being used. The section on marine mammals is probably the best so far from a book for Asia. This is not surprising given the author's role in the development of commercial whale watching in Sri Lanka. Starting in May 2008, he began a publicity blitz stating that Sri Lanka was Best for Blue Whales. He also publicised Kalpitiya as a whale watching hotspot and a key location for pelagic seabirds. The whale watching publicity campaign that he led with the tourism industry drew the attention of film crews and photographers worldwide. This, in turn, led to local marine biologists being featured in international documentaries. In addition to his own photographs, the author has used images from both local and overseas marine biologists. An especially strong contribution is from US marine biologist Paula Olson. The introduction came through British marine biologist Susannah Calderan who has worked in Sri Lanka with colleagues in the University of Ruhuna. The introduction proved to be very useful as Olson had photographed many of the species seen, but had never been photographed in Sri Lankan waters. As a result, all but one of the cetaceans (whales and dolphins) recorded from Sri Lanka are covered in the book, often with multiple images of the animal at the surface, with identification oriented text and image crops to help observers on whale watching boats. Throughout the book, Gehan mentions the names of several researchers who have undertaken work and draws attention to academics including Professor Wipula Yapa, who has studied bats and supervised a number of PhD studies on bats. Two of his students have contributed images, with an especially strong contribution from Tharaka Kusuminda. Other Sri Lankan researchers who have contributed images include Suyama Meegaskumbura and Ranil Nanayakka-'Given that Sri Lanka is one of the best allround wildlife destinations in the world, the island needed a comprehensive, portable and affordable field guide to mammals,' according to Charmarie Maelge, a former Managing Director of the Sri Lanka Tourism Promotion Bureau. She says, 'Gehan's line of thought is to create livelihoods through wildlife tourism to provide an economic and sustainable agenda for conservation. He has a long track record of enlisting the support of researchers, corporations and conservationists in his work'. According to

Gavin Thomas, author of the Rough Guide to Sri Lanka, 'Interestingly, leaving aside foreign visitors, a lot of Sri Lankans will be surprised at the range of mammals to be found in Sri Lanka. In this book readers will find 33 species of bats; golden palm civets; chevrotains, also known as mouse-deer but not real deer, that swim under water to escape predators; shrews, which look like mice but are not related to mice; rats; and a host of other mammals that even professional tourism guides know little about. The real power of the new mammal guide is that because it is not expensive, it will be gifted by both local and foreign tourists to local guides, building capacity and increasing appreciation of the country's biodiversity'.

I asked him how quickly Sri Lanka's travel market will recover. He is quietly optimistic. 'There is a lot of pent up demand' he says. 'People are itching to travel again. There will come a time mid to late 2021 when many people in the G20 countries have been vaccinated. They will look for destinations to which they can travel to with the confidence that they will not find themselves being subject to quarantine on arrival. They also need to be confident that they will not find themselves locked down in a foreign country or locked out of returning to their home country. If Sri Lanka is ready, the visitors will come again'. But he adds with a note of caution, 'A lot depends on the vaccines being effective on new variants for normality to return'. He also cautions against complacency. 'Every destination will be fighting to rebuild their tourism industry. Sri Lanka will need to market itself against stiff competition'. Until travel resumes, I ask him if his books help those who are isolating. 'Yes', he says, 'Even in a big city like Colombo there are many species of birds, butterflies, dragonflies and even mammals which come to your garden or local park. You can start to enjoy nature by learning to put a name to the things that are around you and develop your natural history skills with these portable and affordable field guides'. He also draws attention to the plant life and in particular the trees. 'Cities like Colombo are a gigantic arboretum with a vast range of trees from all over the world planted in gardens, lining the streets and in our parks'. He points out that there are a few book on the trees found in Sri Lanka which people can use to learn the trees around them. In fact, 'A Naturalists Guide to the Trees of Sri Lanka' authored and photographed by him is a thoroughly modern photographic field guide to 125 species of trees.

age and has gained momentum, as he makes time outside his day job to promote Sri Lanka as the best all-round wildlife destination in the world. I asked Gehan which national parks and reserves he would recommend in addition to those which are already well known. For those in an urban environment like Colombo he recommends Talangama Wetland. It is large enough that a person with members of their own household can easily engage in a socially distanced nature walk armed with binoculars and guide books. He also recommends Baddegana Wetland Park and Diyasaru Park, both of which are within a kilometre of the Parliament. With good roads to the East and a broad range of accommodation he also recommends the parks on the East Coast which are less visited. Lahugala National Park in his view has some of the most beautiful examples of intermediate forest trees. He has even had a glimpse of a Red-faced Malkoha in a bird wave (mixed feeding flocks). Gal Oya National Park is another where visitors numbers are low and elephants can be seen. Kuamana or Yala East National Park has leopards and everything else which the adjoining Yala or Ruhuna National Park has but with much fewer visitors. In the North Central Province he recommends Wasgomuwa National Park with elephants that are shyer that those at Uda Walawe. But this is compensated by fewer vehicles in the park. For those who like the cool highlands he recommends the Knuckles which have many species found nowhere else. But he points out that a good naturalist guide is essential as the endemic specialities are small animals. The most biodiverse site in Sri Lanka is the lowland rainforest of Sinharaja. But surprisingly visitor facilities are modest and the road conditions highly variable depending on when the last round of road maintenance was performed. As a result it is not on the itinerary for the mainstream travel groups and serious nature enthusiasts will find they can spend many hours watching endemic birds and mammals away from the crowds.

His latest book covers this and so much more in, 'A Naturalist's Guide to the Mammals of Sri Lanka' is a landmark publication, as it is the first portable and affordable, photographic field guide with near comprehensive coverage of 122 of the 127, 96 per cent of all the land and marine mammals recorded in Sri Lanka. The book is the seventh Sri Lankan title by British publisher, John Beaufoy Publishing, who has a long association with Sri Lanka and other countries in Asia. The 176 page book follows the standard format for the Naturalist's Guide series and is pocket-sized at 130 mm wide and 180 mm high and light in weight. This helps the book

Over the years Gehan has authored more than 20 books. I ask him if he has anymore in the pipeline.

He explains he is working on a pictorial guide that will have different groups such as birds, butterflies, dragonflies, birds and mammals.

The book will draw on his past books but he will also widen the participation to have guest contributor sections. Inviting guest contributors allows him to draw attention to the work of scientists who are working on other groups which may not have the popularity of birds and mammals but are just as important in appreciating biodiversity. John Beaufoy Publishing has several international titles in the Naturalist's Guide series. The other titles relating to Sri Lanka in the series, include: Birds; Butterflies and Dragonflies; Flowers; Trees and Reptiles. John Beaufoy Publishing also published 'A Photographic Field Guide to the Birds of Sri Lanka' (the first complete photographic guide) and 'Wild Sri Lanka'.

So if you feel you can't travel right now, get yourself a wildlife book and start planning your next great adventure or just enjoying learning more about Sri Lanka's incredible biodiversity.

he attachment a person can have with his/her home is something that cannot be explained in words. In fact, separation from a house can be as traumatic as being separated from a loved one. The bond with the house and its master or the bond it has with its inhabitants is very strong. Archworld speaks to **Principal** Architect, Russell Dandeniya Chartered Architects, Director, RDC Architects (Pvt) Ltd, Archt. Russell Dandeniya, on personal housing that cantake on a life of its own.

"Personalities are different and the needs and aspirations of our clients are also very different. If we are designing a perfect house for a client there are the ideologies, the requirements and the psychological aspects of that particular Client that need to be embedded in that particular house. That is essential," said Dandeniya.

'The Fall of the House of Usher" is a short story by American writer Edgar Allan Poe, first published in 1839 that best exemplifies this. The master of the mansion Roderick Usher is convinced that the mansion he lives in is alive and that it has power and control over him and is the cause of his deteriorating health and terrible fears. Though the story may not be true, Poe's story best illustrates the fascinating connection a man can have with his house/ the built environment - a connection between spaces and man.

The narrator of the story says – 'As I came in sight of the place, my spirits sank. They grew as dark and dull as the sky above me, and as sad as the cold, grey walls of the building before my eyes.

I did not know the reason for this feeling of extreme misery, unless it resulted from the general appearance of decay in the house. A strange idea grew in my mind. I believed that the air which surrounded the house was different from the rest of God's air,'

What is apparent is that there is definitely a connection between house/ built environment and the human. And though Poe's tale may be fictitious, its context today is very relevant.

SIMPLICITY

Dandeniya's creations of course promote minimalism, simplicity and sober characters. But our society is chaotic he points out. Sri Home is where your heart is

Lanka, he says is much better than what it was previously and everything has become orderly with a nice road network. Whatever the outside environment is, we have to live with that. So the home should be a relaxing place. I think the rooms and the interior should be more simple, elegant and more rustic," said Dandeniva.

He points out that the climate is a very important factor when doing a house. People are moving with air conditioning and various other in-house luxuries as a trend – they do not really need it and ignore the contextual strengths that should be in the design. "If you build a house in a very nice surrounding, then probably air conditioning might not be important throughout the year. February to April could be the hottest time of the year and we feel the rise in temperature. But other than that we have a comfortable climate. When we are planning and designing we have to consider this factor and also the monsoonal rain and wind. So we need to opt for a passive cooling system. So we can create wind corridors in that particular house. But it all depends on the micro climate, because there may be high rise buildings, earth undulation, rocks, large trees, mountains around, so we get different wind patterns. So we have to analyze the wind patterns and the placement of the house accordingly," explained Dandeniya.

OPTIMUM SUNLIGHT

He went onto explain that most importantly we have to analyze the sun path to get opti-

mum sunlight in to the house to create a healthy environment. The idea is that the bedroom should get morning sunlight to disinfect possible bacterial effects.

"We have to work with four major aspects - the sun path, green & vegetation foliage, cross ventilation with monsoonal rain, monsoonal wind or micro climatic wind condition and a passive cooling system inside the house where we could minimize room temperature at least by three degrees," added Dandeniya. A personal house is an extension of the person's personality. People like to show their personality through a personalized house they may request for a more majestic and grandeur design while others may be humble and request for a design that reflects their humility. Perhaps from the outer appearance people won't be able to identify who exactly is living inside. So it all depends on the client. "Actually if we are putting up a very nice house in front of a very busy dusty road then we need to be mindful of the noise coming from the road and also guard against polluted air getting in. So we have to create a calm and cool environment inside that will give the inhabitant peace of mind,"

HEALING ASPECT

A house is for life. The healing aspect should be there irrespective of who the inhabitant is. A nervous disposition may be a temporary state, therefore, he points out that when the client may exhibit a nervous temperament he (the architect) has to come up with a design that has a soothing effect on the mind of the client, a house perhaps that creates a sense of calm using the micro climate perhaps with a view of lush greenery or a lake nearby or a picturesque surrounding. "Spaces, colors, various attitudes towards



building have to be analyzed carefully as per the requirements of the client. By understanding the client's needs in wider and broader detail, we then design the house through our findings. Some clients come with long and vast requirements. So as architects we have to be more focused and deliver the most appropriate solutions. The ideal house for anyone would depend on their budget and requirements. For me an ideal house would be a flexible and simple one which would grow over time with its requirements. It should be simple and address the immediate needs," said Dandeniya.

Coping with the weather is the most important aspect for Sri Lankan houses. This is when we speak of water proofing, heat proofing when you are using flat slabs on the roof, using doors and windows without any shading devices and minimizing the heat gain. These are the most important aspects. For me tips I would give would be - not to use cement block walls for master bedrooms, the master bedroom should not be placed to the west side where after office hours' a lot of heat gain could be accumulated and also it should not be under a flat concrete slab. Another tip is the multiple usage of spaces. The dining space can be used for tuition for kids, watching TV & for family gatherings also. We have to carefully design those spaces for many purposes.

BE PRACTICAL

He points out that some clients are daydreamers in his words and not at all practical. They have so many requirements but no financial capacity. Others are practical and pragmatic and understand that the architect knows what he or she is talking about. There is also another category who place their faith in myths and astrological beliefs. This is something that Dandeniya does not agree with and quips that they should be sent back to the Astrologer! "I send them all back home because I only work with people who respect architects. I am not interested with these myths that have no practical value. I like dealing with clients who have a proper under-



with clients who have a good understanding of what they really need and that he loves to work with clients who do not know anything about Architecture since he/she is going to get the service of a member of a field unknown to him/her.

"People with half- baked ideas who know very little about Architecture go on google/ yahoo and come up with notions of the best houses in the world and want to incorporate those ideas into their designs which makes the situation very difficult. The situation is made worse when they also believe in these myths and astrological beliefs.

HIS STRATEGY

My strategy is if a client hires me and allows me to do my job, I charge my standard fee. If he tries to teach me architecture, I am charging twice as much.

If a client is teaching me architecture and how to design the house, I charge three times as much. Then there are clients that respect the architect, that respect us, so working with them is easy and it is a pleasure. They are sensible, they have common sense and they do not have these silly notions," pointed out Dandeniva.

Nowadays technology is very advanced. Architects can create 3-D designs. Once you design and build a house there is no going back. If you want to start over again you will have to demolish the house. But Dandeniya assures us that with the advanced technology available if both the architect and client are on the same page then there won't be a mistake.

Building your eco-friendly house

ometimes the most effective new home is an older house. Consider the quantity of building materials and fuel saved by buying an existing home instead of building a replacement one. An honest quality older home is renovated and retrofitted to form it more environmentally friendly, at a lower cost than if you were ranging from scratch.

Higher housing density means more efficient utilities and shorter commutes, so consider that living in a populated area could also be the greener choice. Significantly, by choosing an existing home, you're not transforming wild habitat or agricultural land and contributing to further landscape fragmentation.

Small is big

A smaller home needs fewer building materials and requires less energy to cool down and warmth. When planning a replacement home, ensure to honestly assess your needs, both in terms of the amount of rooms needed,

and therefore the size of these rooms. Tiny homes, currently very fashionable on television shows, are attractive and have clear environmental and energetic advantages.

While most people would have a tough time living permanently in these small spaces, they're a form of laboratory which might provide important lessons about energy efficiency, space use, and general frugality. Your indulgence for these TV shows can provide you with great ideas applicable on a more livable scale.

Build with sustainable materials Today many options exist when selecting environmentally responsible building materials. the alternatives are vast, including sustainability-certified wood products, reclaimed or salvaged wood, and insulation made up of recycled materials.

Another advantage to carefully selecting building materials is best indoor air quality. Many sorts of carpeting, wall coverings, stains, and paints release volatile organic compounds and other air pollutants.



Healthier alternatives exist, like low-VOC paints and hard-wax oil for floors. Given the amount of hours you spend in your house daily, minimizing your exposure to those toxic components is extremely important.

Make it a passive house

The passive house concept consists during a series of standards aimed toward maximizing energy efficiency. The concept relies on design elements that target reducing the wants for heating and cooling. the planning elements include:

• Extremely effective wall insulation. The surface shell of the structure must include enough insulation materials to supply a really high R-value.

• Windows have to be made from glass that limits heat transfer, with well insulated frames. In northern climates, this may mean triple-pane windows

• Heat recovery through a device inbuilt the ventilating system further limits heating needs

• The house envelope (walls, windows, and roof) has to provide a high degree of airtightness. It doesn't mean the house will feel stuffy, as air change needs are handled by the ventilation and warmth exchanger systems.

• The orientation of the house and

its windows allows for passive solar heating, and for the entry of natural light, limiting further electricity needs.

Passive house designs bring a home with low energy requirements, high indoor air quality, even and steady indoor temperature, and therefore the ability to stay comfortable during power outages. Typically, the upper construction costs of the materials involved within the building of a passive house are offset by simpler architectural elements and smaller heating, cooling, and electric systems. Furthermore, occupants incur substantially lower energy costs.

Conserve water

Residents of the USA and Canada have the unfortunate distinction of using the best amount of water per person, per day.

Giving our increasing population, pervasive pollution, ongoing droughts, and changes caused by warming, our water use habits have to change. Building a replacement house offers many opportunities to save lots of on water. Low volume bathroom and kitchen fixtures are essential, including low flow, dual flush toilets.

Makes energy savings easy

Right from the beginning, experts recommend integrating renewable energy systems into the planning of a replacement home, whether it's solar panels, residential wind turbines, or micro-hydroelectric generation. If the initial investment is just too steep to contemplate at the time of construction, planning during the planning phase for an eventual change by reversal to renewable energy will save the owner considerable trouble (and money) later.

However, even as important because the source of the energy you employ is what proportion of it you employ. A well-designed home should allow you to attenuate your energy needs. this may be accomplished by, as an example, choosing efficient appliances, installing LED lights, and using programmable thermostats which can provide you with the cooling and heating you wish only someone's home. And don't forget the lowtech solutions: an easy clothesline for drying laundry will further impede on energy needs.

Thoughtfully landscaped

The work of building an environmentally friendly home continues outside. Landscaping should be done to

landscape Manage rainwater. Collect water runoff from the roof into rain

barrels, to be used for watering landscaping plants.

attenuate the house's impact on the

Minimize impervious surfaces. Make it easier for rainwater to penetrate the soil rather than running off, which allows it to hold nutrients, sediment, and other styles of pollution into nearby waterways. For your driveway and parking areas, choose a permeable material like open-cell pavers or pervious pavers, which can allow water to percolate into the bottom underneath.

• Carefully choose landscaping plant species which require little energy-intensive maintenance like mowing. Favor the choice of native plants with low watering needs. To block water runoff, plant water-loving plants near gutter downspouts, if you're not already collecting roof runoff.

• Small is best: a tiny low yard is simpler to keep up and diminishes your home's impact on the encircling habitat. ensure you discuss with your local code officer for minimum vegetation clearances if you reside in a region vulnerable to wildfires.

• Make your backyard wildlife friendly by providing food, water, and canopy for your wilder neighbors. ecobnb.com




