#### MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

IIIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has been pleased to direct that native Unofficial Police Magistrates when proceeding beyond five miles from their residence to hold inquiries into deaths shall be entitled to travelling expenses according to the following scale:—

Mileage at 50 cents per mile either way, with a daily allowance at the rate of Rs. 3.75 for detention from home.

The Minute dated May 15, 1896, is hereby cancelled.

NDER instructions from the Secretary of State, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct that the following clause be substituted for clause 26 of the Minute of December 11, 1892:—

26. Mounted Orderlies and members of the Police Force shall be entitled to pension on the scale laid down in section 2, whether their salary at the time of retirement amounts to, or is less than, Rs. 250 per annum. Men who served in the late Ceylon Rifle Regiment, and who enlisted in any Department of the Public Service during the months of July and August, 1873, will be allowed to count towards pension one-third of their military service, provided they are not in the receipt of a military pension.

#### PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by section 5 of "The Cemeteries Ordinance, 1862," it is enacted that the Governor VV may, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, when to him it shall seem advisable, by Proclamation, establish a General Cemetery for the burial of the dead, within such limits as shall be specified and defined in such Proclamation:

And whereas it seems to Us advisable to establish in the town of Trincomalee, Eastern Province. a General Cemetery to be used by the residents of the said town as hereinafter enumerated, for the

burial of their dead within the limits hereinafter specified and defined:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. hereby proclaim that the land set forth in Schedule A hereto, within the limits therein specified and defined, shall be and the same is hereby established a General Cemetery to be used by the residents of the places enumerated in Schedule B hereto, for the burial of their dead, as from and after the 1st day of May, 1897.

#### SCHEDULE A.

The land known as Sinnakkantalai Savakkalai, and described as lots J 44, K 44, and L 44 in preliminary plan 1,713, dated July 19, 1892, and duly authenticated by P. D. Warren for the Surveyor-General of Ceylon; bounded on the north-east by sea, southeast by lot L 36 in town plan, south-west by Coast road, and north-west by lot H 44 in preliminary plan 1,713.

#### SCHEDULE B.

The town and Local Board of Trincomalee within the following limits: -East and north-east, Dutch Bay, Fort Frederick, and Back Bay up to a line taken from the junction of Love lane with the Coast road to the sea. North and north-west: line taken from the junction of Love lane with the Coast road, along Love lane as far as Tattakkaikulam, and thence to the northern edge of the tank, and along it in a straight line nearly due west to the distance of 64 chains, and then turning south-west and continuing in a straight line to the Anuradhapura road, and thence along the Anuradhapura road to Kandy road and along the Kandy road to the junction with Orr's Hill road. West and south-west: Yard Cove and Inner Harbour. South: the canal on Admiralty Flats as far as Dhobies' tank, and thence the surveyed line forming War Department boundary

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Thirty-first day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.

#### GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

WHEREAS by the 57th section of the Ordinance No. 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for the general regulation of Customs in the Island of Ceylon," it is enacted that the Governor may, by Proclamation, from time to time appoint the ports of the Island which shall be warehousing ports for the purpose of this Ordinance, and the Collectors of such Ports may from time to time, by notice in writing under their hands, approve and appoint warehouses or places of security in such ports, and direct in what different parts or divisions of such warehouse or places and in what manner and under what regulations and what sort of goods may be warehoused, kept, and secured without payment of duty upon the first entry thereof; and may also direct in what cases and with what sureties and to what amount security by bond shall be required in respect of any warehouse so approved or appointed as aforesaid, or in respect of any goods deposited therein or for the security of the duties due thereon; and such Collectors may, by a like notice, revoke or alter any such appointments or declarations, but every such notice of the appointment of warehouses, or of the revoking thereof, shall be subject to the Governor's approval, and shall be published in such manner as he may direct:

And whereas Colombo has been proclaimed a warehousing port; and whereas the Collector of Customs of the Port of Colombo has, by notice in writing under his hand, approved and appointed a portion of the Wharf and Warehouse Company's Warehouses, Colombo, as a special warehouse in which goods may be warehoused, kept, and secured without payment of duty upon the first entry

thereof
