HEREAS by section 10 of "The Toll Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, may, by resolution to be notified in the Government Gazette, abolish any existing tolls which may hereafter be legally established:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by resolution dated the 7th day of April, 1897, do abolish the toll existing at Welimada, in the Province of Uva, as from and after the 1st day of January, 1898.

THE following rules and orders made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages," for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage and festival, where special precautions have been and are necessary, are published for general information in lieu of the rules promulgated annually for several years.

1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be, and it is hereby limited to sixteen days, namely, from 30th June to 15th July, 1897, inclusive. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named, or staying beyond the period here prescribed, shall be guilty of an offence. The route granted by the Police authorities to the leaders of the bands shall distinctly specify the above-named periods.

2. It shall be lawful for the Police authorities or any Police Magistrate at any place on the

line of march to prohibit from proceeding all persons who, by reason of disease, infirmity, weakness, advanced age, youth, want of supplies, or other sufficient cause are considered unfit to undertake the journey, or who appear likely to fall ill and endanger the health of others; and to require such persons to find security to ensure their obedience to the orders so given. In default of such security being found, it shall be lawful for the said Police anthorities or Police Magistrate to detain such persons in custody for a period not exceeding three days.

3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders, to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the

- roads they have to travel.

 4. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama-
 - (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices;

(b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims;

(c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims;
(d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims;
(e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

- 5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer, or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
- 6. Any pilgrim tethering or keeping cattle in any place other than that assigned by the Police shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

7. Any person selling meat in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

8. Any pilgrim who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or failing to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting

or assisting in the concealment of such disease, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

10. All pilgrims shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any pilgrim declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

11. The number of pilgrims for the pilgrimage of the year 1897 is restricted to 300, viz., 50 pilgrims for the Colombo band, 50 for the Kandy band, 50 for the Galle band, 50 for the Kurunegala

band, 50 for the Batticaloa band, and 50 for the Badulla band.

12. No person shall take part in the pilgrimage of the year 1897 without having first obtained a ticket from the Government Agent of the Western Province for the Colombo band, or from the Government Agent of the Central Province for the Kandy band, or from the Government Agent of the Southern Province for the Galle band, or from the Government Agent of the North-Western Province for the Kurunegala band, or from the Government Agent of the Eastern Province for the Batticaloa band, or from the Government Agent of the Province of Uva for the Badulla band.

13. Every pilgrim shall show his ticket when required to do so by any officer of Police, or by

any officer appointed to enforce the observance of orders under the Ordinance aforesaid.

IT is hereby notified for general information that the Governor of Ceylon has, under the provisions of section 9 of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," with the advice of the Executive Council, ordered that the Naulla-Ella section of the Ella-Wellawaya road be stopped up from and after the 1st day of July, 1897.

GENERAL REGULATIONS OF THE CEYLON TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

DEPARTMENTS OF SURVEYING AND LEVELLING.

MECHANICAL ENGINEERING.

1. Age and Conditions of Admission.—Candidates for admission to any of the departments of the College must fill in and present to the Superintendent of the College the "Form of Application," giving in their own handwriting the particulars required therein, and the signatures of two persons who have personal knowledge of them, and who are prepared to answer inquiries as to their character. They must be not less than 16 years of age on the first day of the year they propose to enter. They must present a certificate from the Principal of the School or College they attended last, and such other certificates of educational attainments from publice xamining bodies as they may possess. They must pass a medical examination for physical fitness and an entrance examination for sufficient general knowledge. The applications of those who show that they possess the necessary qualifications will be submitted to His Excellency the Governor, who will nominate a sufficient number to be admitted as students of the College in the department they select.

2. Fees and Deposits, &c.—The fees will be paid in all cases for one year in advance, and a deposit in addition to cover the cost of instruments and books will be made on admission. Fees for the year and the deposit on

admission must be paid before the student joins any of the classes.

3. Instruments and Books, &c.—Certain instruments, tools, books, &c., which the students are required to possess (see the schedule attached to syllabus of each department) will be supplied to them at economical rates and the cost debited to deposit, but they may purchase elsewhere so long as the articles are of approved kind. The balance of the deposit, after providing what is necessary, and after deducting the cost of damage to College property through culpable negligence or malice, will be refunded at the end of the course. Students are not to borrow from or lend to one another in class any of the instruments, tools, books, &c., which are enumerated and prescribed for their own possession.

4. Hours of Study.—The registers will be marked at the commencement of every class, and at other times if necessary, and every student must be in his place then. The hours of study are from 10.30 A.M. to 12.30 P.M. and from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. every week day, except Saturday. There will be surveying classes for engineering students on Saturday mornings during certain terms

of the course.

5. Note Books.—Every student is required to prepare in books of the prescribed kind the laboratory and lecture notes and home exercises with regularity, fulness, neatness, and accuracy. Special attention is to be paid to the note book work. All note books are to be brought to the College daily, and be ready for reference or examination at any time during

working hours.

6. Care of Students' Property.—Instruments, books, and other personal property when not in immediate use may be given in care of the College Sergeant at his office during working hours. But no responsibility will be taken for safe custody of such property after working hours; articles left over night will be at risk of the owner. Students are recommended to provide themselves with locked handbags marked with their names. Every student should also provide himself with towel and soap.

7. Drill.—Every student must attend drill at the prescribed times. Those students who elect to join the College detachment of the Ceylon

Volunteers and make themselves efficient each year will not be required to attend the other drills in order to qualify for the diploma.

Vacation.—The usual vacations will be observed at Easter, in August, and at Christmas. Students whose course includes surveying and levelling

will attend for a fortnight at Camp in one of the August vacations.

9. Examinations.—Examinations will be held three times a year, and the place of the student in order of merit determined accordingly. But due account will be taken besides, in determining the order of merit, of the thoroughness of the home work as shown by the note books, regularity of attendance, and general conduct.

10. Diplomas. - Diplomas will be granted to those students in each department of the College who take the full course and who satisfy the Examiners at the term and final examinations.

11. Irregularities.—Reports of absence or irregularity of any kind will be made to parents or guardians.

A student who misconducts himself may be expelled at the option of

the Director of Public Instruction.

No claim shall lie for any refund of fees paid on behalf of a student who has been sentenced to expulsion.

DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL ENGINEERING.

TWO-YEAR COURSE.

SYLLABUS.

First Year.

Drawing (six hours per week).—Use of instruments, scales, &c.: practical geometry and graphic arithmetic; elevations, section and plan; projection; drawing of parts of machines and structures, rivetted and bolted joints.

Workshop Practice (six hours per week).—Woodwork: names and uses of tools; examples of joints, tenon and mortice, dovetails, framing and panelling. Metalwork: names and uses of tools.; chipping, filing, scraping, fitting; drilling and tapping; serewing: rivetting. screwing; rivetting.

Mathematics (five hours per week).—Use of logarithms; general equations; pro-

portionals; series; trigonometry.

Laboratory Work (four hours per week). — Experimental mechanics: friction; equilibrium of forces; efficiency of machines; elasticity and strength of materials.

Lectures (two hours per week). - Mechanical principles; forces; work; efficiency; transmission by lever, screw, and wheels; velocities and accelerations; momentum; energy; stress and strain and laws of elasticity; strength of materials used in construction; applications to simple structures.

Classes (two hours per week).—Exercises on laboratory work and lectures.

Second Year.

Drawing (six hours per week). - Graphic statics; roofs and girders; retaining walls; arches; machines.

Workshop Practice (four hours per week). — Woodwork: turning: properties of timber. Building: construction in brickwork. Metalwork: turning; planing: screwcutting; fitting and setting out.

Mathematics (five hours per week).—Analytical geometry; differential and integral

Laboratory Work (four hours per week).—Experimental mechanics; strength of materials; flow of liquids; equilibrium of arches; suspension bridges.

Lectures (three hours per week).—Compound stress and strain; bending and shear

in beams and struts and shafts; springs; arches; hydraulics; flow in channels and pipes; waterwheels; turbines.

Classes (three hours per week).—Exercise classes on laboratory work and lectures;

classes in taking out quantities for constructional purposes and framing estimates.

Surveying and Levelling (five hours per week). — Chain surveying: adjustment of instruments; office work; field work. (A fortnight for field work in Camp will be arranged during the August vacation.)

FEES.

The fees will be Rs. 100 per annum paid in advance, and in addition a deposit of Rs. 50 will be made on admission.

Laboratory Work (four hours per week).—Practical mechanics; equilibrium of

forces; efficiency of machines; elasticity and strength of materials.

Lectures (two hours per week). - Mechanical principles; work; efficiency: transmission by lever, screw, and wheel; forces in equilibrium; velocity and acceleration; stress and strain; properties of materials; proportions of simple structures.

Classes (two hours per week).—Exercise classes on laboratory work and lectures.

Second Year.

Drawing (eight hours per week).—Graphic statics; roofs and girders; machine design.

Workshop Practice (eight hours per week).—Woodwork: turning; pattern-making.

Metalwork: turning; planing; screw-cutting; fitting and setting out.

Mathematics (five hours per week).—Equations; elementary trigonometry.

Lectures (two hours per week).—Beams; struts; shafts; springs; belts; spurgear; steam engines; gas engines; oil engines.

Classes (two hours per week).—Exercise classes on lectures.

FEES.

The fees are Rs. 50 per annum, with a deposit of Rs. 25 the first year, paid in advance.

Regulations for the Admission of Ceylonese to the Public Works Department.

1. All appointments will be made in the first instance to the Head

Overseer Grade, without exception.

- 2. Candidates will be selected in the first instance by a competitive examination (viz., the entrance examination of the Ceylon Technical College), and having been pronounced physically fit and having gained the nomination of His Excellency the Governor will become students at the Technical College in a special course of training in Civil Engineering, and will become subject to the regulations of that Institution for not less than two years. They must gain the diploma of the College duly attested by the officer appointed to represent the Public Works Department at the final examination of the course. They will be required to serve a further two years in the Government Factory or Railway Works, or other approved engineering works in Ceylon, and after completing that term of service satisfactorily selection will be made from among them for posts as vacancies may occur in the Head Overseer Grade.
- : 3. Candidates must not be less than 16 years nor more than 18 years of age on the first day of the year in which the entrance examination for admission to the College is held, and must satisfy the Examiners that they are duly qualified in respect of health and character. They must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and be otherwise physically qualified for service, and they will be called on to undergo a medical examination to test these points.
- 4. No candidate will be admitted to the competition who has not previously satisfied the Examiners in a preliminary examination in handwriting, orthography, and arithmetic (including vulgar and decimal fractions), and in colloquial Tamil or Sinhalese. The subjects of the entrance examination are :-

- (a) English composition; English history; geography.
 (b) Mathematics: algebra (up to and including quadratic equations); Geometry (the first two books of Euclid).
- 6. To enter the higher grades of Inspector or Third Grade District Engineer a qualifying examination must be passed, which will be known as the "Junior Examination," in the following subjects:-

Arithmetic:—Up to decimal fractions. Algebra.—To quadratics inclusive. Geometry.—Four books of Euclid and deductions.

Mensuration.—Taking out quantities and estimating.

Surveying and Levelling.—Chain surveying only. Drawing.—Plan drawing and tracing.

The examination in the last three subjects will be held at the Provincial Headquarters of the Province in which the candidate may happen to be stationed.

- 7. To rise from the third grade into the second and qualify for the first grade, a final examination must be passed; which will be known as the "Senior Examination," in the following subjects:—
 - Trigonometry: practical trigonometry (heights and distances).

Civil engineering.

Mensuration: taking out quantities; estimating analyses of work.

Surveying and levelling.

- Drawing.
- Departmental rules and accounts.

The examination in the last four subjects will take place in the Provincial Headquarters of the Province in which the candidate may happen to be

The classification of the Public Works Department in the District. Engineer and lower grades is as follows:—

FIRST GRADE.

Three appointments at Rs. 6,000 per annum. do. at Rs. 5,000 Eight do. Ten do. at Rs. 4,000 do.

SECOND GRADE.

Fourteen appointments at Rs. 3,000 per annum.

THIRD GRADE.

Three appointments at Rs. 2,500 per annum. Three do. at Rs. 2,000 do.

FOURTH GRADE.

Seven Inspectors at Rs. 1,500 per annum.

FIFTH GRADE.

Ten Head Overseers at Rs. 1,000 per annum.

Vacancies which may occur in the Head Overseer Grade before the year 1901 will be filled by selection and nomination of His Excellency the Governor from among certificated engineering students of the Technical College who passed the entrance examination before the year 1897, and who have also served an apprenticeship of not less than two years in approved works, and who are not more than 25 years of age when such a vacancy occurs.

Regulations for Admission of Ceylonese to certain Appointments in the Surveyor-General's Department.

Appointments to the third grade of Surveyors in the Surveyor-General's Department who are paid at the rate of Rs. 1,200 per annum will be made by selection as vacancies occur from holders of the diploma in Civil Engineering of the Technical College, gained in the College course immediately preceding the year such vacancies occur; but of the actual vacancies in that grade, such holders are to be eligible only for every alternate one in rotation with those candidates in the Department at the time who can qualify by examination and seniority of service for promotion to that grade; that is to say, of two vacancies in the third grade, one is to be filled by selection from among outside candidates from the Technical College, and the other from among candidates in the ranks of the Department who can qualify for such promotion, and so on alternately with every vacancy which may occur in that grade.

Appointments directly to the third grade from among the eligible candidates from the Technical College will be made without further examination, and they will be eligible for promotion from grade to grade according to merit along with the other officers of the Department of the same grades; but to qualify for promotion out of the first grade Surveyors who are paid at the rate of Rs. 3,200 per annum into the senior grades, they as well as all other officers of the same standing must pass the departmental qualifying examination instituted for that purpose.

Candidates from the Technical College for appointment to such vacancies are eligible for selection if they gain the diploma in Civil Engineering in the College course immediately before such vacancies occur, and if their diploma bears the signature of the officer appointed to represent the Surveyor-General at the examinations affecting the award of them.

Candidates for these appointments must be not more than 18 years of age on the first day of the year they enter the College. They must pass a medical examination for physical fitness and an entrance examination in the following subjects:—Handwriting, Orthography, Composition, Arithmetic, Geometry (first book of Euclid), Plane Trigonometry (heights and distances), Geography.

Their course of training at the Technical College will extend over two years, and they will be subject to the regulations of that Institution for that period.

All Officers of the Department who have passed the Departmental qualifying examination are eligible for appointments in the senior grades up to the rank of Superintendent of Surveys on Rs. 6,500 per annum, but vacancies in the senior grades will be filled up alternately from the Department and from Cooper's Hill College.

Regulations for Admission of Ceylonese to the Telegraph and Telephone Departments of the Postmaster-General.

All Ceylonese candidates for admission to the Telegraph and Telephone Departments of the Postmaster-General are required to present the diploma of the Ceylon Technical College gained in the department of Telegraphy of that College and bearing the signature of the officer appointed to represent the Postmaster-General at the final examination of that course, or other diploma or certificate showing at least equal proficiency in the holder.

Appointments will be made as vacancies may occur by selection from among candidates possessing such diplomas or certificates, and who have

gained the nomination of His Excellency the Governor.

Appointments will be made in the first instance to the fifth grade. Premotion to the higher grades and to Postmasterships will be subject to merit and seniority of service in the Department.

Regulations for granting the License of the Surveyor-General to Students of the course in Surveying and Levelling at the Ceylon Technical College.

Students in the Department of Surveying and Levelling of the Technical College, who pass the prescribed course and gain the diploma at the final examination of the course held at the Technical College, and satisfy as well the officer appointed to represent the Surveyor-General at that examination, shall be eligible for the license and for registration as Surveyors or as Surveyors and Levellers without further examination and payment of the fees prescribed in section of the Ordinance No. 15 of 1889. Such candidates for the license must be more than 21 years of age when they apply, and they must pay the registration fee and the stamp duty on the license as provided for in sections 2 and 7 of the Ordinance.
