PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. West Ridgeway, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by the "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things provided that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided for the purposes of the administration of justice, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence, or alleged crime or offence—

For the Midland Circuit three times at least at Kandy, and such other places in such Circuit, as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Kandy on the 10th March, 1st August, and 1st December in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court for the Midland Circuit should be holden at Kurunegala, a place within the said Midland Circuit in the said Ordinance mentioned:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, and for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, do hereby direct and appoint as follows; that is to say :-

A Criminal Session of the Supreme Court shall be held at Kurunegala on Monday, the 10th day of January, 1898.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.
