The Cabinet of Ministers yesterday decided to table the Final Report of the Presidential Commission that investigated Alleged Acts of Corruption in State Institutions at the next Parliament

According to Environment Minister Mahinda Amaraweera, the report was presented to the Cabinet yesterday and a decision was to be taken to submit it to Parliament at the next Parliamen-

The Commission Report was handed over to the President by retired Supreme Court Judge Upali Abeyratne, who headed the five-member Commission of Inquiry (CoI) which was appointed by the President to probe large scale corruption allegations during the period between January 15, 2015 and December 31, 2018.

The other four Commissioners are retired High Court Judge Sarojini Kusala Weerawardane, retired Auditor General Pasdunkorale Arachchige Pemathilaka, retired Ministry Secretary Lalith R. de Silva and, retired Deputy Inspector General of Police M. K. D. Wijaya Amarasinghe.

TIGER WAR CRIMINALS LIVING **ABROAD WITH IMPUNITY**

BASELESS ALLEGATIONS LEVELLED AGAINST SRI LANKAN FORCES

Those who have committed War Crimes by forcibly conscripting children to a terrorist outfit are presently living in countries which are clamouring about Human Rights violations in Sri Lanka, said Education Minister G L Peiris yesterday.

Speaking at a news conference, Prof. Peiris said these countries are trying to meddle in the internal affairs of Sri Lanka by levelling baseless allegations against the country and its Security Forces

who saved the country from the clutches of terrorism.

The Minister asked as to why such countries have failed to take action against these war criminals. He said these countries are berating Sri Lanka while giving safe havens for war criminals on their soil.

"They have written books and posted pictures of their involvement in Sri Lanka. These countries can make use of them as evidence to try them for crimes against humanity", he said.

OIC welcomes Govt's decision to permit **COVID-19** burials

The Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) on Saturday welcomed the decision of the Sri Lankan Government to end compulsory cremation of Muslims victims of COVID-19 and allow their

"The hope is that the Sri Lankan Government's decision to lift the ban on burial of Coronavirus victims will help preserve the rights of Muslims in the island," OIC Secretary General, Dr. Yousef Al-Othaimeen said.

The OIC has a membership of 50 members from all parts of the globe and also it has several Non-Muslim countries as observers.

Earlier on three separate occasions, Secretary General Al-Othaimeen, had called upon Sri Lankan authorities to stop compulsorily cremating Muslims dying of COVID-19 and allow their burial as per rituals in the Muslim faith.

The Secretary General also addressed concerns over the issue of the cremation of bodies of COVID-19 Muslim victims in Sri Lanka to the 46th session of the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) on February 23. TO PAGE 02

Prasanna urges UGC to resolve external undergrads' problems

Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga has urged the University Grant Commission (UGC) to resolve the problems faced by external undergraduates.

Although all external undergraduates should be enrolled for courses during the period from 2016 to 2020, this has not been done up to now.

Therefore, the Minister urged the Commission to intervene and provide a solution to this problem. Meanwhile, Yakkala Wickramarachchi Ayurveda College, Gampaha has been upgraded to that of University status and was declared open by Minister Ranatunga vesterday.

Although it has earlier been decided to enroll a similar number of students for the external courses like the internal students, the enrollment of students for the external courses has been suspended from

Minister Ranatunga said the issue has been brought to the notice of the President and the Higher Education Minister.

Since the Government has taken measures to upgrade the Ayurveda College to university status, the Minister expects a solution would soon be provided to this problem by the relevant authorities.

The victim had apprised the President at the meeting about a dilapidated road in the area and appealed to the President to make early arrangements to repair it.

The victim was identified as retired Army Sergeant Major D. Jayaratne, a resident of Wijayapura, Karuwalagaswewa. Karuwalagaswewa Pradeshiya Sabha Chairman

The Court of Appeal Bench comprised Justice Nissanka Bandula Karunaratne and Justice R. Gurusinghe. The lawyers stated that the concerned Commission has recommended to acquit former Parliamentarian Duminda

Silva from all charges filed against him. The lawyers maintained that if an accused is dissatisfied with an order made by Court, he could personally request that the judgment be reconsidered by a larger panel of judges in the Supreme Court. They said a third party cannot consider the decision of the Supreme Court in such a criminal case. The lawyers added that the Supreme Court's reputation, sovereignty and public confidence have been severely undermined in this matter.

The Committee pointed out the need to develop schools to change the attitude of parents towards schools in enrolling their children in schools.

The COPA also told the education authorities that the Code of Conduct on School Structure should be revised from time to time under the supervision of education administration experts. The Committee stated that the commencement, closure and regulation of schools should be done in accordance with these Guidelines on School Structure.

The Committee also drew the attention to the importance of overseeing the implementation of the transfer orders when transferring teachers and principals to unpopular schools. The Committee also pointed out the need to implement special programs to improve the examination results of these schools as the examination results of a school are a major factor in attracting students.

The Chairman of the Committee, Prof. Tissa Vitarana stated that all schools should have an education administration report and that it is appropriate to base that report when allocating funds under various projects.

It was revealed at the Committee that 93 schools were closed from 2013 to 2017 due to lack of students, the prevailing situation in the country and other reasons. In 2018 alone, 101 schools were closed.

It was revealed at the committee meeting that the shortage of teachers for the primary section as well as for certain subjects is another problem faced by these schools.

It was discussed at the committee that an amount of Rs.64,930 million had been allocated for the "Nearest School, Best School" project implemented during the previous Government period (for the period 2016-2020) and as at 31 December 2018, Rs. 31,234.77 million had been spent and resources had been given to schools without conducting a proper study. Although at least two acres of land is required to set up a new school, there are about 25 schools in the Nikaweratiya Education Zone alone which have less than 200 students who do not have that space, it was disclosed at the committee meeting. Members of Parliament B.Y.G Ratnasekera, Dr. Upul Galappaththi, Tissa Attanayake, Dr. Harini Amarasuriya and a number of Government officials were present at the meeting.

tion regarding the permission for the burial of Covid infected dead bodies, the board of trustees of the Maradana Mosque has urged the Ministry of Health to utilize the Kuppiyawatta Burial Grounds for such burials. In a letter addressed to Dr. Asela Gunawardena, Director General of Health Service, the Trustees of the Maradana Mosque (Inc.), delivered on Monday March 1, have requested the Kuppiyawatta Muslim Burial Grounds which is managed by the Mosque to utilize for COVID-19 deceased burials in terms of the Extraordinary Gazette No: 2216/38 — Thursday 25th February 2021 issued by the Minister of Health. The letter signed by the Secretary to the Board of Trustees of the mosque, A.W.S. Marikar had pointed out that a Ground Water Table Test Report was also recently undertaken at the Kuppiyawatta burial grounds by the Department of Geology, University of Peradeniya where it was determined that the water table was detected at a depth of 2.5-3.0 Meters which is suitable for COVID-19 deceased burials according to Health Ministry expectations.

The Trustees also said that they will conform to whatever additional guidelines issued by the Health Ministry in such

On May 22, 1972 when Ceylon became a Republic, the Royal Ceylon Air Force transformed into the Sri Lanka Air

The Royal Ceylon Air Force was established on March 22, 1951 with six officers and 21 Other Rankers, and today it comprises 20 branches and 73 trades with 34,000 officers and other rankers.

The Air Force has come a long way from its humble beginnings and today possesses Kfir and F7 jets, transport crafts such as AN 32, C130, MA 60 and Y12 and helicopters comprising Bell 212, Bell 412, MI17 and MI24 and is geared to face the future as a fully-fledged Air Force.

As the Air Force celebrates its glorious journey today, in line with its 70th Anniversary, 467 officers and 7,290 Other Rankers will also be promoted.

The events planned in line with the 70th Anniversary will commence today (March 2) at the SLAF base in Katunayake and many events have been organised. 



The project has been organised by the Ministry of Environment, together with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). It is funded by the Global Environment Facility (GEF) and implemented by the International Union for Conservation of

Nature (IUCN), the statement added.

The project, which will be implemented in the Malwathu Oya basin of North-West Sri Lanka, will address the requirements of wild species and humans through biodiversity mainstreaming and conservation landscape design, accompanied by a community-centered land-use plan with livelihoodfocused interventions at a village level. It is expected to reduce direct threats to biodiversity through integrated, ecologically sensitive planning and decisionmaking in natural resource management, and tourism that protects biodiversity, reduces resource conflicts, and maintains ecosystem

Addressing the participants at the meeting, Dr. Anil Jasinghe, Secretary to the Ministry of Environ-

With participants joining both online and offline, the inception workshop provided a platform for all project stakeholders to understand and take ownership of the 'Managing Together' project, and formally launch it. The workshop explored areas such as landscape level biodiversity

evaluation guidelines, and project work plans, among others.

Speaking of their role as an implementing partner of the project, Dr. Ananda Mallawatantri, Country Representative of IUCN in Sri Lanka, stated, "The IUCN will bring in proven global tools and knowledge to enrich the process. This novel 'managing together' approach would provide solutions to multiple development issues, including water-related health problems, the humanelephant conflict, poverty-led deforestation, loss of coastal coral and seagrass due to overexploitation, among others. Improved understanding of ecosystems and social issues, and inclusive landscape planning is timely and in line with the 'Vistas of Prosperity and Splendour' policy of the President."



They have earnestly awaited the magnificent Air Show organized by the Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) which celebrates 70 years of service to the nation. This year the SLAF has invited the famous Surya Kiran Aerobatics Team (SKAT) of the Indian Air Force (IAF) to take part in the air show, in addition to the Tejas Fighter Jets known within the IAF as 'Flying Bullets'. Colombo is not a new venue for the Surya Kiran Team as they were here to fly at the 50th anniversary celebrations of the

Ranking fourth among the world's air forces, the IAF was established on October 8, 1932. The Number 1 Squadron consisted of four Westland biplanes and five pilots. Once operating as the Royal Indian Air Force the prefix Royal was removed in 1950 when India became a republic. During World War II, the IAF played a vital role in halting the Japanese advance. During this time, the IAF was involved in strike, aerial reconnaissance and close escort duties to aircraft of the RAF Bomber Command. The IAF fleet was enhanced with Spitfire, Douglas Dakota, Hawker Hurricane and Westland Lysander aircraft. The IAF has been actively taking part in United Nations peacekeeping missions. In the command structure, the Chief of Air Staff (Air Force Commander) is an officer holding the rank of Air Chief Marshal. The IAF bears the responsibility of safeguarding the Indian air space. Additionally, the IAF gives close air support to the

Indian
Army and also engages in tactical airlift operations.
The Indian Air Force has deployed its air assets to assist during natural disasters.
Today the IAF is a technology-intensive force.

I was privileged to talk to Wing Commander Ajay Dasarathi, representing the Surya Kiran (meaning Rays of the Sun) Aerobatics Team. He said, "The engine is the heart of an airplane and the pilot is its soul. We are happy to fly in Sri Lanka. Our team consists of Group Captain Anoop Singh VM, Commanding Officer and Team Leader. The other pilots are Wing Commander U. Mehta, Squadron Leader A. Yadav, Wing Commander M. Nautiyal, Squadron Leader A. Salaria, Wing Commander N. Bhatt, Squadron Leader A. Singh, Wing Commander A. Dasarathi and Squadron Leader N. Singh. The additional pilots are Squadron Leaders T. Singh, M. Bhalla and Bordoloi. The team's commentator is Squadron Leader Anjali Rai and the technical team is headed by Wing Commander Nagendra."

The IAF officer further added, "Our motto is 'Always the Best'. The Surya Kiran Team is the youngest fighter squadron of the Indian Air Force. This team is currently the only nine military aircraft aerobatic team in Asia. We presently have 13 pilots. Our team has done over 600 displays in India and represented India in South East Asia and China. Our first display overseas was in Colombo, Sri Lanka 20 years ago."

This aerial display team was formed in 1996 and part of the 52 Squadron. Initially, the pilots flew the Kiran MK11 aircraft until 2011 and were operating from the IAF Bidar Station in Karnataka. The team was subsequently re-established in 2017 and bestowed with the modern Hawk MK 132 aircraft. Flying in close formations to dazzle spectators has been a tradition of the Indian Air Force since 1944. During the Golden Jubilee of the IAF (1982), a team called Thunderbolts was created consisting of fighter pilots. The Hunter fighter aircraft was the plane used by these daring pilots. It was four of these pilots who later formed an Aerobatics Flying Team which was the genesis of the Surya Kiran Team.

In 1996, India was getting ready to hold the Avia-96 Air Show and there was a requirement for a formation flying team. Wing Commander Kuldeep Malik was assigned the task to form the team with selected pilots. Garnering their skills,

with increased confidence mastered the six aircraft pattern called the Shockwave Formation. Audiences applauded the pilots as they performed the Goblet Roll and the challenging Tango Roll. By 1998, flying nine aircraft in formation, the IAF team increased its capability.

The Surya Kiran Team had the opportunity to briefly fly with the Red Arrows team of the Royal Air Force and the French Air Force formation flying team. By June 2000, the Indian pilots perfected the Synchro Formation move gaining greater appreciation from a delighted public. The highest airfield they have operated from was at Srinagar, which is located at a dizzying height of 5,400 feet. These versatile pilots have to fly over all sorts of terrain at high speed. It is unanimously opined that flying over the sea is a challenge as the domain presents the problem of depth perception. In recognition of their consistent formation flying for 10 years, the Surya Kiran Team was honoured with its own squadron status. In 2015, the team was empowered with the Hawk Jet aircraft. The HAL Hawk 132 is a tandem seat aircraft capable of ground attack and flying training. It has an aerial ceiling of 13,500 metres. In a combat role, the Hawk 132 can fire a precision strike weapon.

How does a fighter pilot join Surva Kiran? All aspiring fighter pilots must have QFI status -Qualified Flying Instructor and a minimum of 1,000 hours flying time as fighter pilots. In addition to the Commanding Officer, this aerial display team has a Flight Commander (for operational planning) and a team of technical officers and airmen headed by a prudent Senior Engineering Officer. Once airborne the pilots do wingovers, turns, loops, barrel rolls and inverted runs. On average, this dynamic team engages in 30 air shows each year. The danger is always present in the sky. In the past, four pilots were fatally wounded in air crashes. This shows the element of risk which is present in high-speed formation patterns and yet living on the edge is what distinguishes these bold pilots.

The SLAF Air Show will also be augmented with the Indian Air Force Sarang (meaning peacock) Helicopter wing. The wing flies the HAL Dhruv utility helicopter. This display team was formed in October 2003 and subsequently named 151 Helicopter Unit. These pilots are based at Sulur Air Force Station, Coimbatore. Squadron

The IAF flying component is enriched by the participation of India's indigenous Tejas- MK 2 multi-role fighter aircraft. These jets of the No.18 Squadron have a delta wing design enhancing its high-value performance. The Tejas (meaning Radiant) is the second high agility supersonic jet developed by HAL with an aerial ceiling of 17,300 metres and a combat range of 1,500 Km. It uses a fly-by-wire (FBW) control system (electronic interface).

The first Tejas unit was the No 45 Squadron set up in 2016 initially based in Bangalore. This fighter can be armed with air-to-air, air-to-ground and air-to-sea missiles augmented with precision-guided munitions. The Tejas fighter jet team visiting Colombo is headed by Group Captain Manish Tolani and fellow pilot Group Captain Syamantak Roy.

The other aircraft flying over Colombo will be the IAF Dornier 228 a utility aircraft, which has a service ceiling of 7,620 metres. The IAF team's presence in Colombo will enrich the SLAF Air Show and is a glowing testament of the strong bonds between Sri Lanka and India. Many aircraft of the Sri Lanka Air Force will take part in this spectacular air show, flown by our dynamic pilots. The Air Show opens on March 3 (for invitees) and will be telecast live on Channel Eye, Sri Lanka Rupahavini from 5 pm.

ere are the views expressed by Ven. Prof. Induragare Dhammarathana Thera during the book launching ceremony held at the Abhayaramaya Temple, Narahenpita last Thursday under the patronage of Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa. Two books authored by Ven. Muruththettuwe Ananda Thera were launched at the ceremony.

"Certain individuals co-sponsored the proposals against Sri Lanka at the United Nations Human Rights Commission. But this Government bravely withdrew the co-sponsorship of the Resolution. Then how can we accuse this Government?, Sanskrit and Eastern Studies Department Head of the Humanities Faculty of the Kelaniya University Senior Prof. Ven. Induragare Dhammarathana Thera questioned.

Addressing the ceremony, Prof. Ven. Thera said certain fabricated set of words such as 'Sir fail' have come into the limelight these days just because there is no proper mechanism in the Government to reply to such fabrications. The Government needs a proper mechanism to reply to such lies created against the incumbent Government by different parties. It has been just one year and three months since this Government undertook power. We brought in this Government after rejecting the previous Government. Which Government in Sri Lanka provided 100,000 employment opportunities as well as jobs for those who failed the G.C.E. Ordinary Level Examination? During the past few months, the Government has provided over 37,000 jobs to those from needy families who had failed the Ordinary Level Examination. This Government has provided employment opportunities to over 60,000 graduates during the past few months. I ask whether the Government has failed? Then who has passed?

According to Ven. Prof. Dhammarathana Thera, no one can blame the Government which did not sign the MCC Agreement. Who can find fault with the Government which said the Eastern Container Terminal of the Colombo Port will not be given to anyone. How come the previous Yahapalana regime which tried its best to sign the MCC Agreement is better than this Government which did not sign it? How come the previous Yahapalana regime which sold out the entire Hambantota Harbour for nothing is better than this Government which did not give away the Eastern Container Terminal of the Colombo Port? he questioned.

Ven. Prof. Dhammarathana Thera pointed out that with the outbreak of COVID-19, even when many rich countries in the world could not pay salaries and pensions to their citizens. the Sri Lankan Government was able to pay all salaries and pensions on time while having to repay loans amounting to Rs. 18 trillion. Then who has passed and who has failed? If this success is a failure then what is a success? he questioned.

Ven. Prof. Dhammarathana Thera stressed that no one can speak against a Government that does not sell national assets. Can we speak against a Government that does not imprison Buddhist Bhikkus? Can we go against a Government that freed War Heroes? Now arrangements have been made to

Reforming the Police

he brutal assault of a law student by personnel at the Peliyagoda police station last Friday deserves the severest condemnation of all law abiding citizens who look up to members of the law enforcement for their protection. It is reported that the law student, the younger son of a former Provincial Governor, had gone to the police station on behalf of his elder brother who is an Attorney-at Law, to look into the welfare of a client of the latter who was in the custody of the Peliyagoda Police. It was alleged that police personnel had set upon the victim in the mistaken belief that he in fact was the lawyer brother who bore much the same resemblance.

It is only in the realm of speculation as to what actually transpired at the police station. Whatever the reason, the fact that an assault was carried out on the young law student (a picture of his heavily battered face was in the front page of all newspapers) certainly cannot be condoned and is not warranted under whatever circumstances.

The influence wielded on the victim's side obviously brought the matter into the spotlight with the assault receiving wide media publicity. The Bar Association of Sri Lanka (BASL) too has condemned the assault and has called for the maximum punishment to the perpetrators. But what would have been the plight of an ordinary person with no clout?

A Chief Inspector of Police and three constables have been interdicted by the IGP on the orders of the Law and Order Minister Rear Admiral (Retd) Sarath Weerasekera pending a full investigation. Whatever the outcome, the harshest of punishment should be meted out to the perpetrators of this brutal act so that it would serve as a deterrent to others of the same ilk in police uniform. Such acts have given the Police a bad name in recent times what with top members of the Khaki brigade even found to be involved in the narcotics trade.

Deaths of persons while in police custody has also tarnished the reputation of the Police Service. True, the police are working under tremendous pressure, with crime taking on dangerous dimensions that require all their skills to counter.

On most occasions police personnel have to encounter armed gangs who handle modern weapons. It is perhaps the cumulative building up of tensions as a result of these challenges that sometimes find release in acts of the type witnessed last Friday at the Peliyagoda Police. A combination of many factors may have resulted in the police taking on an inhuman face in some instances.

Meanwhile, the police have also been accused of lethargy in the detection of crime and drug trafficking and no less a personage than Defence Secretary General Kamal Gunaratne who recently came down hard on Senior Police officers in charge of the Provinces for turning a blind eye to drug trafficking, extortion, underworld activities, illegal logging, brothels, illegal sand mining and other unlawful activities taking place on a massive scale in their divisions. He advised the police officers not to consider the police profession as yet another job as the lives of the country's people are in their hands. Their job is to ensure that all incidents and criminal activities are probed and the culprits brought to justice. After all, they are the guardians of law and order.

Now we have the police literally taking the law into their own hands in meting out summary justice to individuals - a clear case of the public who look up to the law enforcement for their protection, having to run away from their protectors, some of whom could be as dangerous as the criminal elements from whom they seek protection. Is this the sorry pass to which our police service has fallen to? This state of affairs needs immediate remedial measures if the public is to have any faith in the law enforcement agency that is being sustained and maintained by the public. Policing the Police has become an urgent need.

Of course there are brave and dedicated officers in the Police Service who have gone after the criminals even risking their own lives. But as long as the rotten apples remain, their efforts will be in vain. The entire police service cries out for a complete overhaul and the dismantling of the prevailing structures which are obsolete and moribund given the scale and dimensions of underworld

There is also the crying need for eliminating corruption in the Police Service. All high ranking police officers should be made to declare their assets and their bank accounts opened for scrutiny, when requested. True, corruption that has taken root could not be weeded out overnight. But a start should be made in earnest at least now for reforming the police.

have often gazed at the East River from my office window in the United taking a ■Nation's moment's break from my busy schedule. The gentle waves sparkling like a king's robe often brought back memories of my hometown in Ambalangoda or a passage from a Mark Twain or James Michener novel. Currently the East river and I are as far apart as planet Mars from earth. Yet should I see the East river again I will look at it with new eyes; with the new knowledge that at the bottom of the seemingly peaceful body of water there lie missiles fired by the anti-Castro forces in the U.S. Apparently, the attack of missiles from bazookas were carried out to prevent the second in command to Castro the Argentinian Guerrilla leader Che Guevara addressing the General Assembly.

This is but one among many interesting incidents that I discovered within the pages of 'No Comment' - Thalif Deen's outstanding memoire; outstanding not only because of the glimpse he gives of the affairs of the UN but because of his style in presenting these memorable events. Satire has been around since the days of Greek comedies and although satire is difficult to understand, not so Deen's "No Comment."

Apart from "being a satirical memoire," the book is an impressive study of the functioning of the United Nations and the political developments of the last half a century that the author has personally observed and reported on. Humour, irony, and exaggeration are all mixed into one, resulting in this thought provoking publication that narrates the political and socioeconomic developments of his time at the United Nations. Deen presents the reader with an up close view of the drama enacted at the United Nations debates and in the interactions of diplomats, staff, and members of the press covering the United Nations. Set in the world of international politics, delightful cameos are made by world leaders from Nikita Khrushchev to Barak Obama, the good as well as the notorious; from Arafat, Castro, Qadhafi, Che Guerra, to Saddam Hussain and many more, some of whom outwitted each other in their heated arguments.

Well-known incidents

Among them are wellknown incidents spiced with satire so that the reader is constantly amused. We are told of how the Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev banged his hole-riddled shoe on his desk, as captured on a camera by a journalist, when seeking the

floor to raise a point of order in the General Assembly and of the occasion when fearing assassination, the PLO leader Yasser Arafat slept in the U.N. Secretary-General's office. Deen recalls how Mobutu Sese Seko, President of then Zaire, singled out as one of "the world's most corrupt leaders responded at a press conference when he was asked whether he was the second wealthiest political leader. Apparently, seemingly outraged Mobutu shouted back: "It's a lie. It's a lie," and then added with a straight face, "I am only the fourth richest".

Perhaps, even more useful to record, lest they will be buried under the sand, were the lesser-known incidents. He narrates how an African minister was once heckled from the gallery by a group of New York students and was taken out by the security, photographed, and banned from the U.N. premises. But five years later, one of the hecklers returned to the U.N. – this time as Foreign Minister of his country to address the world body; or how Andrew Young as a young political activist was part of an antiapartheid demonstration outside the U.N. and returned as the U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. ten vears later.

Writing on the happenings outside of the world body's formal settings, he recounts a conversation between the Head of the U.N. Bureau of an Indian newspaper and a visiting journalist, a rigid vegetar-


ian, and a Brahmin Hindu having lunch at the U.N. cafeteria. When the host saw the visiting journalist serving himself beef stroganoff, he surprised was and asked him: "I thought you were a strict vegetarian and did not eat beef." "Oh," said the visiting journalist: "I don't eat Indian cows, but I can eat American

By way of an explanation of the title of his book, he relates the dilemma he faced along with the rest of his fellow journalists at the U.N. He writes: "Mean-

while journalists, rarely ever, were able to get any on-the-record comments or reactions from Ambassadors, diplomats, and senior U.N. officials because most of them followed the advice given to Brits during wartime censorship in the U.K.: "Be like Dad, Keep Mum." He goes on, "As Winston Churchill once remarked: 'Diplomacy is the art of telling people 'to go to hell' in such a way they ask for directions.' But as a general rule he says, "most Ambassadors and diplomats did not tell us either to go to hell or heaven – but avoided all comments on politically sensitive issues with the standard non-excuse: 'Sorry we have to get clearance from our capital.' but 'Clearance': from their respective foreign ministries never came. But still, it is hard to beat a response from a tight-lipped Asian diplomat who told me: 'No comment' - and as an after-thought, added: And Don't Quote Me on That".

Sri Lankan at heart

Being very much a Sri Lankan at heart, he has extensively covered Sri Lanka's role at the United Nations. 

n the last article, we discussed the difference between acquisition and learning of a language by a speaker of the language. That gave us insights as to what kinds of processes are involved when we gain competence of our first language or a second language. In today's article, we will discuss different approaches to the acquisition/learning of a language, namely behaviouristic approach (behaviourism) and innatist approach (innatism). This will help us better understand the nature of the processes involved in the acquisition/learning of a language.

Language as developing from behavioural conditioning

B. F. Skinner considered language acquisition as a behavioural process. According to Skinner, language development in children happens as a result of responses to language input (i.e. external experience) as stimuli. For instance, when a child hears the word rice, the child will learn it and associate it with its meaning. Then, the child will gradually use the word *rice* when she wants some. And when the child gets rice, that will function as a reinforcement for child language development. That is, the child will be motivated to learn and use more and more words, phrases or sentences. Thus, the behaviouristic approach relies on language as a process of learning.

One of the challenges for the behaviourist approach is how we could learn to speak sentences by way of behaviour. It then turns out that we need to memorise sentences and reproduce them. However, as we discussed last time, we know that the number of sentences that we can produce in a language is infinite. We also saw that we can produce infinitely long sentences. Thus, the obvious challenge for the behaviourist approach is how we can memorize infinitely long and an infinite number of sentences. At the same time, we know that we can produce sentences that we have never heard before. For instance, I am sure that none of us has ever heard the following sentence.

A handsome astronaut took me to the planet Neptune yesterday.

We never heard this sentence before. That means I never memorized that sentence. But I was able to speak it and write it. You were also able to comprehend it. This means that language is a productive system with a capacity to produce novel and an infinite number and infinitely long sentences. This provides

some evidence against the idea that we memorize sentences and speak them.


This shows that behavioural conditioning or environmental influence cannot account for every aspect of language. They may account for certain processes involved in the acquisition of language at word level as discussed above. However, as far as the productivity capacity of language is concerned, behaviourist approach is not explanatorily adequate to account for the whole range of facts.

Innatism: language as an instinct

Noam Chomsky and his colleagues and followers call language an instinct like the ability to walk. According to them, the ability to talk like the ability to walk is an instinct in the sense that it is part of our biological endowment. For instance, it is part of our biological capacity that we are able to walk. We as human beings on our own start walking without help of others and continue to walk. Any human being (unless he/she has a physical/mental disability) can walk. In the same manner, any human being (unless he/she has a physi-

cal/mental disability) can talk. The idea is that our ability to acquire language is something that we are born with. We are said to be born with some language principles which serve in the process of acquiring a particular language such as Sinhala or English. These principles that we are born with are said to be available to us universally and are called universal principles. This facility that we are born with is called Universal Grammar (UG). Accordingly, UG is said to include some principles that are manipulated by a child in the process of acquisition of a language by the

This is not to say that particular languages such as Sinhala or English are innate. For instance, if a child who is born into a family speaking Sinhala grows up with a family speaking Tamil, the child will pick up the language she is exposed to (i.e. the language in her environment), namely Tamil. Part of what actually helps the child in the acquisition of Tamil is her innate facility called the UG. As the child is born with some language principles 'hard wired' into her brain, the time she is exposed to language input, the process of acquisition will start. Thus, UG only serves as a foun-

dation for a language to be acquired when she is exposed to it.

One of the arguments in favour of UG is that productive and infinite systems like language are not learnable. We will fail badly if we try to memorise or learn all the sentences in a language. Learning infinitely long sentences is out of the question. We also know that the speech context plays an important role in the production and comprehension of words/phrases/sentences. However, it is also impossible to learn all the contexts in which a particular word/phrase/sentence will be

However, it is a fact that every aspect of language is not innate. As we discussed above, there are many aspects that the innatist approach cannot cover, a point in case is the acquisition or learning of words/idioms. As we discussed above, words/idioms appear to be learned/acquired by way of behavioural conditioning.

What we can conclude from the above discussion is that either approach (i.e. behaviourism or innatism) is not able to fully account for every aspect of language acquisition or development in children. While one is stronger in one aspect (i.e. behaviourism with respect to words/phrases/idioms), the other is stronger in another aspect (i.e. innatism with respect to productivity of sentences). Thus, the processes involved in language acquisition is still a problem that is unresolved. It still remains a mystery. There is much to be investigated and much to be proven.

In today's article we discussed what is referred to as the 'problem of language acquisition'. We discussed two of the dominant approaches to language acquisition/learning, namely behaviourism and innatism. We reached the conclusion that neither approach on its own is able to account for the full range of facts pertaining to language acquisition/learning. I hope this discussion served to understand the nature of the processes involved in language acquisition/learning in a better manner. Another notion related to language acquisition is language competence. What actually happens in acquisition/learning of a particular language is we gain competence of that language. Chomsky marked a difference between competence and performance of a language. We are going to discuss this in detail in the next article.

he climate crisis doesn't stop for anyone or anything, not even the pandemic that has forced billions of us to radically overhaul our lives. And like the pandemic, climate change has no nationality, agenda or political affiliation.

Both exist to spread where, when and how they can. Another stark similarity is that the impacts of COVID-19, just like the climate emergency, do not treat us equally, as those who self-identify as female are hit the hard-

The pandemic has taken a disproportionate toll on all who regard themselves as girls, women and womxn, as well as minorities. those with disabilities, older members of our communities, refugees, migrants and Indigenous Peoples.

So much so, the UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres last month said progress on gender equality has been set back years, and within his 2021 priorities described achieving gender equality as "the greatest human rights challenge.'

Deep rooted social injustices, from worker rights to gender inequality, go hand in hand with the climate emergency. Climate denial, like prejudice, is certainly not a victimless

Even though the climate crisis is global, it is impacting low and middle income countries the worst, with self-identifying females the most affected. When climate-fueled extreme weather events strike, it's those who deny science and block climate action who must answer to the victims on the frontlines.

Social justice

Though we are in the throes of these interconnected health, environmental, economic and equality crises, creating a better world for all is still within reach. Together, we can move forward on an inclusive green path to recovery, where social justice is our guiding

This means profound systems change with new rules and investments, and not the failed racist patriarchal polluting status quo being merely tweaked. A fairer, healthier, wealthier

and safer world for all people is exactly what a transformation in line with 1.5°C - the Paris Agreement's long-term temperature goal - means.

And it's what publics across the planet want. In Japan, 60 percent of people want transformational economic change. While in India, Mexico, China, Brazil, South Africa and beyond, support for a green economic recovery is at 80% or higher.

A green and just recovery to COVID-19 is the opportunity for governments to kick start a new economy that helps solve the climate and biodiversity crisis, while ensuring fair wages, employment protections and social safety nets for everyone, specifically for women and girls.

Millions of people who identify as female have managed to pull together time and again in the name of justice and for saving our beautiful planet. Since the beginning of Greenpeace 50 years ago this year, women have been central, with the organisation cofounded by the extraordinary Dorothy Stowe.

While they have not always been recognised or nurtured as much as they deserved, self-identifying females are very much a leading force within the organisation now and

will be going forward. They are the captains and crew of our ships, executive directors, scientists, cleaners, photographers. They are our campaigners and activists who put their bodies on the line to demand a green, just and peaceful world. Inclusivity is one of our values because there can be no green peace without gender equality.



Amplifying the voices of the most marginalised and vulnerable, while boosting their access to opportunities and platforms, is central to the mission of Greenpeace.

Like in West Africa, where female fish processors have been standing strong for years against fishmeal and fish oil factories taking away the fish on which their local communities depend.

While they are struggling to make ends meet with few employment rights, the fishmeal and fish oil (FMFO) industry, owned by investors outside Africa, booms. This, as well as overfishing by destructive foreign fishing vessels, is threatening food security, jobs and social stability in the region with women most impacted.

These female fish processors want their West African governments to legally and formally recognise them in the same way as other people doing in any job.

Globally, our oceans are suffering from the plunder of overfishing and illegal industrial guard food security and jobs for millions of people, like the West African female fish processors and their communities, and to save our marine environment.

One billion people rely on fish as their main source of animal protein, according to the World Health Organisation, while it is estimated that 43 million people are facing food insecurity in West Africa – 20 million of them due to the socio-economic impact of COVID-19.

What we are seeing today with the pandemic and the climate emergency, like with previous crises, is the worsening of the already disadvantaged position of women in the labour market, alongside the burden of unpaid domestic and care work and genderbased violence.

Despite the many and intersectional challenges females – as well as non-binary people face, there are also many remarkable change-makers. As much as it must be in everyone's interest to provide the COVID-19 vaccine to all people, it must be in everyone's interest to find real solutions to the climate and gender inequality crises.

Global challenges

No person is safe until all people are safe, just as no country is safe from the virus and the climate emergency until all countries are safe from COVID-19 and the climate crisis. Tackling the pandemic, climate change and gender inequality are urgent priorities, not

Global cooperation at unprecedented levels is required to overcome these challenges, as is the brave active citizenship we have seen - and continue to see - by all who selfidentify as female; they must be central to solving the climate emergency and overcoming the pandemic.

This year, we have an opening to not just move beyond the ravaging storm of the pandemic, but to do it in a way where we steadily set sail to a fairer, greener and healthier future with the wind at our backs, making some waves on our voyage of victory.

US, FRANCIS: Willingness to get a COVID-19 vaccine is on the rise compared to last year, a survey of six industrialised countries published on Monday showed.

More people in the United Kingdom, the United States and even vaccine-sceptical France now accept the idea of getting a coronavirus jab, KekstCNC, an international consultancy, said in the survey conducted in February.

The survey also covered Germany, Japan and Sweden where a similar trend was clear, it said.

"As vaccine rollouts commence, higher numbers of people in all countries say they would take the vaccine," the study said.

The highest percentage was found in the UK with 89 percent of those questioned in favour of taking a vaccine, up from 70 percent in Decem-

In Sweden, the rate was 76 percent against 53 in December, in the US 64 percent against 58, in Germany 73 against 63 and in Japan 64 against

France was the country in the study with the least enthusiasm at 59 percent, but favourable opinions about vaccines were still sharply up from the 40 percent level seen in

December. Some people were, meanwhile,

highly critical of the vaccine rollout in their country.

While 76 percent of Britons surveyed felt their government had gotten the rollout speed "about right", that percentage fell to 32 percent in the US, 28 percent in Germany and Japan, 22 in France and only 20 percent in Sweden.

People in the six countries judged that Israel and Britain had done the world's best jobs with their vaccine rollout.

Meanwhile, four million doses of

the latest COVID-19 vaccine to get US approval will be delivered across the country as early as today, a senior

Britain announced Sunday that it has given more than 20 million peo-

ple at least one dose of a coronavirus vaccine, with the rapid rollout providing hope in a country with Europe's highest death toll.

Prime Minister Boris Johnson called it "a huge national achievement" while praising National Health Service staff and others involved for "tireless work".

Health Secretary Matt Hancock made the announcement in a video message on Twitter, saying: "I'm absolutely delighted that over 20 million people have now been vaccinat-

A total of 20,089,551 people have received a first dose, according to government figures released Sunday. Only Israel and the United Arab Emirates have vaccinated more people per head of population.

The United States could start vaccinating older children against COVID-19 by the fall and younger ones by year-end or early 2022, the White House's top pandemic advisor Anthony Fauci said Sunday. "We now have three really efficacious vaccines," Fauci said on ABC's "This

Children in high school - roughly ages 14-18 in the United States -should be able to get the vaccine sometime this fall," Fauci told NBC's "Meet the Press."

Iran says time not 'suitable' for nuclear deal meeting

IRAN: Iran said Sunday it does not consider the time to be "suitable" for an informal meeting - proposed by Europe and involving the US - on the embattled 2015 nuclear deal.

The European Union's political director earlier this month proposed the informal meeting involving Iran and the United States. US President Joe Biden's administration has accepted in princi-

Following Biden's election, Washington, the European parties to

the deal - France, Germany and Britain – and Tehran have been trying to salvage the 2015 nuclear accord, which granted Iran international sanctions relief in return for restrictions on its nuclear programme.

The accord has been nearing collapse since former president Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew in 2018 and reimposed crippling sanctions as part of a "maximum pressure" campaign against Tehran.

"Considering the recent positions and actions of the United States and the three European countries, (Iran) does not consid-

er the time suitable to hold the informal meeting proposed by the European coordinator", Foreign Ministry Spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh said in a statement.

"There has still been no change in the US positions and behaviour yet," he added, saying the Biden administration has continued Trump's failed policy of maximum pressure".

Biden has signalled readiness to revive the deal, but insists Iran first return to all its nuclear commitments, most of which it suspended in response to the sanctions, while Tehran demands Washington take the first step by scrapping the sanctions. - AFP

SUU KYI HIT WITH TWO NEW CRIMINAL CHARGES

18 killed in Myanmar's bloodiest Sunday

MYANMAR: Ousted Myanmar civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi was hit with two new criminal charges when she appeared in court via video link on Monday, a month after a military coup triggered relentless and massive pro-

Suu Kyi has not been seen since being detained on February 1, and her appearance came as demonstrators took to the streets again across the country in defiance of an escalation of deadly force from the junta.

At least 18 people died on Sunday as troops and police fired live bullets at demonstrators in cities across Myanmar, according to the United Nations, which cited its own credible information.

Suu Kyi, 75, was already facing obscure criminal charges for possessing unlicensed walkie-talkies, as well as violating coronavirus restrictions by staging a campaign event during last year's election. She is now also accused of a violation of communications laws as well as intent to incite public unrest, her lawyer Khin Maung Zaw said.

"We can not say for sure how many more cases Daw Aung San Suu Kyi will face in this period," he told reporters in Naypyidaw.

"Anything can happen in this

country at this time. Myanmar's ousted president Win Myint is also facing the same intent to incite public unrest

charge in addition to coronavirus restriction breaches.

Suu Kyi has reportedly been kept under house arrest in Naypyidaw, an isolated city that the military built during a previous dictatorship. The military has justified its takeover, ending a decade-long democratic experiment, by making unfounded allegations of widespread fraud in last November's national elections. Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy won the election in a landslide.

The generals have hit Suu Kyi with two charges the international community widely regards as frivolous - relating to importing walkie talkies and staging a campaign rally during the pandemic.

Hundreds of thousands of people have taken to streets regularly over the past month to oppose the

While the military has coup. steadily increased the type of force used to try to contain the uprising, beginning with tear gas and water cannons, this weekend's violence saw the biggest escalation. One person was shot while crouching behind rubbish bins and other makeshift shields, and had to be dragged away by others, with the incident filmed by media. - AFP

Churchill paintings go under the hammer

MOROCCO: Hollywood's Angelina Jolie and Britain's iconic wartime Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, a keen artist who took inspiration from the Moroccan city of Marrakesh, combined for a March 1 date at Christie's auction house in London.


"The Tower of the Koutoubia Mosque", an oil painting Churchill produced during a World War II visit, is tipped to fetch between £1.5 million and £2.5 million (\$2 million and \$3.5 million), according to a Christie's estimate.

Put up for auction by Angelina Jolie, it is vaunted in Christie's catalogue as "Churchill's most important work. Aside from its distinguished provenance, it is the only landscape he made" during the war.

A second Churchill landscape, "Scene in Marrakesh", painted on his first visit to Morocco in 1935, also went under the hammer.

A career army officer before entering politics, Churchill started to paint relatively late, at the age of 40. His passion for the translucent light

of Marrakesh, far from the political storms and drab skies of London, dates back to the 1930s when most of Morocco was a French protectorate, and he went on to make six visits to the North African country over the course of 23 vears.

Ardern blasts COVID-19 rule-breakers

NEW ZEALAND: Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern urged New Zealanders to "call out" COVID-19 rule-breakers Monday, as public anger built over a series of infringements that forced the country's largest city back into lockdown.

A frustrated Ardern -- who has won widespread praise for her pandemic response -- said the breaches that led to Auckland being shut down for the second time in a month were intolerable.

She said some people involved in the latest outbreak had ignored clear instructions to remain in isolation and failed to fully disclose their movements to contact tracers.

"Those individuals are facing the judgement of the entire nation, there are consequences, undoubtedly," Ardern told report-

New Zealand has recorded only 26 COVID-19 deaths in a population of five million, but Ardern said everyone needed to cooperate in order to keep the virus in check. "If that means calling a family member or colleague out for not following the rules then we should do that. Do it with kindness, but do it," she

said. The stay-at-home order was imposed in Auckland on Sunday, after it became clear a snap threeday lockdown last month had not halted a cluster of infections in the city of 1.7 million. Concerns centred on a family where the chain of transmission was unclear, although it has since

emerged they had contact with infected members of another family in defiance of isolation orders.

One of those involved visited a doctor, a college and the gym while awaiting the results of a test that eventually showed he had the virus. - AFP

But while he teased his future plans, he left the crowd guessing about whether he will challenge Biden in a rematch.

"With your help we will take back the House, we will win the Senate, and then a Republican president will make a triumphant return to the White House -- and I wonder who that will be?" Trump

said to a raucous cheer. "Who knows?" he boomed about his potential plans. "I may even decide to beat them for a third time,

At CPAC, he walked on stage to revel in a lengthy standing ovation by cheering loyalists, the vast majority maskless despite the coronavirus pandemic.

Like he did so often during his two campaigns, he painted a pitched battle against as Democrats' "socialist" agenda to remake the nation.

"We're in a struggle for the survival of America as we know it," Trump said.

"This is a terrible, terri-criticized Biden policies ble, painful struggle."
But he said the "incred-

ible" populist movement that propelled him to victory four plus years ago is just beginning, "and in the end, we will win."

Trump also put to rest the rumors that he might take his base of support to create a new political

"I am not starting a new party," Trump said. "We have the Republican Party. It's going to unite and be stronger than ever before."

In his 90-minute speech he attacked immigrants, slammed "cancel culture,"

on climate change and energy, and repeated his false claims that "illegal" actions by Democrats had cost him the election.On future direction for the party, support for Trumpism was rock solid, with 95 percent of respondents wanting to continue Trump's policies and

agenda. But when asked who they prefer as the party's 2024 nominee, a moderate 55 percent chose Trump, with Florida Governor Ron DeSantis a distant second on 21 percent.





On this day 25 years ago

When Sanath Jayasuriya decimated the Indian bowlers at New Delhi

The 1996 Cricket World Cup in the sub-continent was undoubtedly Sri Lanka's finest moment in their history where the islanders went on to beat Australia in the final at the Gaddafi Stadium in Lahore.

But it was on a day like this exactly 25 years ago that one of the key players of that champion team, Sanath Jayasuriya produced probably the most brutal innings of that tournament.

The dashing left-hander simply tore the Indian bowling attack by smashing a 6-ball 79 in a Group 'A' fixture at the Feroz Shah Kotla Stadium in New Delhi on March 2, 1996.

The manner in which the Master Blaster hammered the Indian attack to all corners of the ground was simply amazing as Sri Lanka chased down India's score of 271 for three with eight deliveries and six wickets to spare.

India's formidable total was built around a run-a-ball 137 by the legendary Indian opening batsman Sachin Tendulkar after they were invited to bat first.

But Tendulkar's masterclass innings was effortlessly overshadowed in the wink of an eye by Jayasuriya who pummelled the hapless Indian bowlers to submission on a fast outfield.

Jayasuriya's batting style was soon compared with some of the all time greats in the game and the greatest compliment came from Tendulkar who said: "I haven't seen Bradman bat but I have seen Sanath Jayasuriya."

In the modern era of limited over cricket this score could be considered nothing but an average total but 25 years ago it was considered a daunting task for any batting line-up.

Man-of-the-Match

But Jayasuriya simply made it look easy like a walk in the park by launching a severe assault on the bowlers while hoisting two sixes and stroking nine boundaries on his way to a Man-of-the-Match winning performance.

It was high drama from the very first delivery as India's most senior bowler Manoj Prabhakar was taken to the cleaners with the fast bowler conceding 33 runs from his first two overs.

Prabhakar bowled over the wicket, he came round the wicket, he varied his line, length, pace and he did whatever he could to contain the batsman as Jayasuriya was on a rampage collecting 42 runs from the first three overs of the innings.

Javasuriya then slowed down after completing a sparkling half century but his assault on Prabhakar was so powerful that the bowler was forced to bowl offbreaks in his second spell and thereafter he never played an international match.

GSP Plus unaffected by trade restrictions, helped by fall in GNI

The Generalised Scheme of Preferences Plus (GSP Plus) that Sri Lankan exporters currently enjoy will not be impacted by the trade restrictions imposed by the government. The agreement's eligibility period is also likely to be extended given the fall in Gross National Income following the COVID-19 pandemic.

Head of Cooperation European Delegation to Sri Lanka and the Maldives Frank Hess said, "Let me be very clear. There is no link whatso-

ever between GSP Plus and import restrictions. Why do we give GSP Plus? We give GSP Plus as a unilateral trade concession because Sri Lanka has committed to itself to implement a number of UN conventions on environmental issues, social issues, and governance. As long as Sri Lanka does that, Sri Lanka does qualify for that

Hess noted, "Whatever Sri Lanka does on import restrictions will not impact that."

GSP+ is limited to countries that are catego-

rised as being lower income. For a country to qualify they must have a GNI below US\$ 4000. Sri Lanka in the recent past crossed this thresh-

old and no longer qualified.

Hess said, "As you know Sri Lanka at some stage crossed that threshold and became a middle-income country. In this case, there is a transition period of 3-4 years. In the (transition) period Sri Lanka has fallen and is again below this threshold. That means Sri Lanka is able to qualify for GSP Plus.'

Hess was speaking at the Taj Samudra on February 24 at a EU-Sri Lanka trade-related assistance meeting.

The European Union is to reform the way GSP Plus is regulated and changes are due between 2022 and 2023.

The European Union sends delegations to monitor the progress Sri Lanka has made on its commitments. Due to COVID-19, the European Union has not been able to send a delega-


'Rates to hold; CBSL assures liquidity as economy rebounds'

can choose to hold policy rates steady or cut by a 25bps or 50bps while, hike is off the table due to the lackluster economic growth according to First Capital ResearchPre -policy Analysis.

"We believe that there is a 70% probability to hold rates due to the considerable improvement in high frequency indicators and with fiscal and monetary measures implemented so far. However, there is a 15% probability each for 25bps and 50bps rate cut to support economic growth."

First Capital Research estimates the Sri Lanka's GDP would recover to 3.2% in 2021, from its expected steepest contraction in the history of -5.8% in 2020. Lack of demand for credit, slowness in consumer demand recovery and import restrictions can be considered as a major factor favouring to ease the policy rates at the upcom-

> The Board, having noted the reduction in overall market lending rates during 2020, stressed the need for a continued downward adjustment in lending rates to boost economic growth in the absence of demand driven inflationary pressures, particularly considering the significant levels of excess liquidity prevailing in the domestic money

> Manufacturing and Service Purchasing Managers' Index (PMI) remained in expansion territory in January 2021. New business activity in PMI increased in January 2021, particularly with the improvements observed in financial services, transportation, and wholesale and retail trade sub-sectors.

Private sector credit increased by LKR 25.7Bn in January 2021 recording a growth for the 6 th consecutive month indicating a revival in gross loan disbursements. Growth reflects that both businesses and individuals are speeding-up economic activities.

CBSL continues infusing ample liquidity into the banking system via increased CBSL Holdings (Money Printing) which also support fiscal shortage. The CBSL Holdings rose to LKR 809.9Bn on 26th February 2021 from LKR 738.4Bn as at 31st December 2020.

Yields in the secondary market witnessed an increase with moderate market activity from participants followed by a wait and see approach amidst the looming uncertainty. The last 2 Bond auctions and 5 Bill auctions were undersubscribed by a considerable amount reflecting the lack of clarity among market participants with the current economic condition. We consider a rate cut would be required to sustain the secondary market rate at lower level.

Market turnover drops to Rs. 2 bn, after 9-weeks"

Bourse started the week reverting the direction back to negative recording a turnover below Rs. 2 billion after 9-weeks. Index spiked within the first few minutes of trading as it reached its intraday high of 7,549. Thereafter market witnessed a bumpy downtrend for the rest of the session and closed at 7,438 losing 38 points.

Capital Goods sector dominated the turnover for the session with a contribution of 44%. Market experienced a net foreign outflow while recording low participation.

The secondary bond market yield curve remained broadly unchanged while overall market witnessed thin volumes. With market witnessing slight selling interest, short tenor maturities 15.12.22 traded at 5.82%, 15.01.23 at 5.85%, 15.11.23 in the range of 6.32%-6.38% and 15.12.23 at 6.35%.

Department of Motor Traffic (DMT) is launching a major digitalization drive to provide a speedier service to the public mainly in the Driving License issuing section. They also plan to 'go paperless' soon.

The Department has also planning to build a payment gateway to move from using cash to

"We will soon bring the Transport Medical institute to link with our Driving License system for which the discussion have started. Later National Identity Card office, and several other government offices too will be linked to us. This will also minimize documentation forwarding from the public and reduce proving fraudulent information," said Commissioner

Driving License, Department of Motor Traffic, B. A. D. D. W. Siriwardane.

She said that in addition they also want to bring all the 25 regional offices of Department of Motor Traffic 'online' enabling them to share information.

Siriwardane said that a lot of people who seek their services are ignorant as to what procedures should be followed and documentation is needed. "For this we will soon have an updated trilingual website offering all step by information to the public.'

This step will eradicate unauthorized people contacting applicants as they would be guided by our prior information on the web.

In Werahera the one day driving license issuing process has been temporary halted due to

the COVID-19 situation. However, we are now issuing a temporary.

"However we give a 'temporary Driving License to 'drive' until the original (now printed by Sri Lanka Army) is delivered by the Postal Department.'

However, the services provided by the head office including motor vehicle transfers and the Vehicle Registration will be provided through the Jaffna, Anuradhapura, Kurunegala, Gampaha and Hambantota district offices, with the aim of minimizing the inconveniences faced by

Local assembly of vehicles and component manufacturing SOP launched

The Ministry of Industries spearheaded by Wimal Weerawansa is soon to launch the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for Local Assembly of Vehicles and Automotive Component Manufacturing to encourage world renowned brands to locally assemble vehicles.

President of the Sri Lanka Automotive Component Manufacturers' Association Dimantha Jayawardena, said that the new SOP has been prepared in keeping with the highest standards around the world. "This SOP has been prepared by the Policy Development Division of the Ministry of Industries in close collaboration with Ministry of Finance, Sri Lanka Customs, Registrar of Motor Vehicles, Sri Lanka Automobile assemblers and Automobile Component Manufacturers. With the launch of the SOP it will become mandatory that vehicle assembly comply to the SOP and increase value addition for locally manufactured vehicles.

The SOP includes guidelines and standards for registration at the Department of Motor Traffic, BOI, Sri Lanka Customs and the Ministry of Industries and for the local assembly of vehicles.

It has also specified the necessary regulations for standardization of the assembling and manufacturing process, the automobiles and components, and the establishment of the assessment facilities.

"The SOP clearly states that it is vital that the sector should be provided with the opportunity to expand itself in the domestic market at the

first stage and in order to achieve this objective, there should be a substantial level of investment in the domestically value-added automobile manufacturing/assembly industry, which could create the demand for locally manufactured components increasing their quality and to achieve internationally renowned standards.

"This SOP includes all regulations, procedures and requirements related to different aspects of the industry, from the registration of an industry to the safety and quality standards applicable to the same and is subject to review and revision every five years. Prospective local assemblers should be given the flexibility during the first two years to invest and start operations and adhere to the SOP guidelines within a 2-year time-

"We expect more than 20,000 direct jobs and 25,000 indirect jobs to be created within the next 2 - 3 years. Currently SLACMA is working with the Ministry of Skills and Development together with NAITA and German Tech to absorb these students to the local assemblies.

The advantage of local manufacturing of automobiles allow technology transformation and technical training under some of the world's best manufacturing standards such as Just In Time, 5S, KAISEN, LEAN Manufacturing, IATF 16949 and Six SIGMA standards. This will help our students to apply these manufacturing methods in other manufacturing industries.

Market leader Maruti NSE 2.17 % Suzuki sold 144,700 passenger vehicles during the month, a year-on-year growth of 8%. Its market share improved by 116 basis points over January to 46.9% but was considerably

lower than 53.3% achieved in February 2020.

Hyundai Motor and Tata Motors sold 51,600 and 27,224 units during the month, growing by 29% and 119% over last year.

mpowering farmers is a commitment that embodies the heart and soul of Cargills (Ceylon), which runs Sri Lanka's

With this in mind, Cargills has embarked on an ambitious agriculture modernisation project, 'Sarubima', to create a positive impact on the local farming community and environment which they operate in.

Apart from all this, the project is an ideal platform to find solutions for key challenges to Agriculture sector growth in Sri Lanka which include regional disparity, dwindling interest of youth in agriculture, overuse of agro-chemicals, limited export potential of local produce, volatile weather conditions and field harvest losses.

Speaking on the concept behind Sarubima Project, Cargills Agri Business-Deputy General Manager Haridas Fernando said,

"Moreover, we have taken our farmers on overseas visits and introduced them to modern farming techniques which enabled them to build their own model farms.Fernando said

"In addition, Cargills Bank has come forward to extend its support to farmers in order to boost Agri-





cultural production by disbursing loans at a concessionary interest rate." Fernando said.

Moreover, Cargills sources fruits, vegetables and fresh milk directly from a network of over 10,000 farmers, through its collection centres and sends it to its chain of supermarkets.

"We buy over 120,000 tonnes of fresh vegetables and fruits and close to 150,000-160,000 litres of milk on a daily basis. Currently, this project has been extended to 10 selected areas. And we hope to extend this to several

other areas in the near future,"Fernando said.

"Water scarcity in this area has had a huge impact on our vegetable cultivation. Because of that we used to depend on rain water when it comes to growing vegetables. Due to lack of water resources in this area, we grew vegetables once a year. Now with the Cargills Sarubima project, we have benefited from modern agricultural practices such as drip irrigation and fertigation and now make a better living in a productive and cost effective way. Now we grow vegetables two to three times a year."

Also, since we have adopted drip irrigation and dedication the application of weedicides, fertilizer and cost of production has dropped drastically. Earlier, we used approximately 200-250 Kg of fertilizer for growing vegetables and now with this modernization project it has reduced to 15-20 Kg, "farmer W.G. Swarnathilake said.

team, we have been able to obtain better yields and higher income.



Unique oval community gardens of Copenhagen

he Naerum suburban district of Copenhagen, in Denmark, is home to one of the most visually appealing allotment gardens in the world – the "round gardens",

which are actually oval. Søren Carl Theodor Marius Sørensen is considered one of the greatest landscape architects to have ever lived, and the oval gardens of Naerum are one of his most famous projects. In 1948, 40 oval allotment gardens, each measuring approximately 25 × 15 m, were laid out on a rolling lawn, between public housing on one side and more traditional allotments on the other. Owners were free to position their cottages, select the surrounding hedges, and lay out the interior of their plots, but Sørensen provided some directions, stressing that they were meant as a guide, not rules. Seven decades later, the oval gardens of Naerum are still one of the most beautiful attractions in the Danish capital.

Initially, Sørensen envisioned the landscaping project as a regular grid of ovals spread across the lawn, but this eventually gave way to a looser arrangement of the plots and a more dynamic look.

Despite the freedom of design that each garden plot owner enjoyed over the years, the oval gardens have always retained a certain consistency in some



regards, like the preference of clipped over unclipped hedges, which helped maintain its charm.

One of the most impressive things about Søren Carl Theodor Marius Sørensen's design is that the oval gardens look amazing from above, and even more so from the ground, as you walk amongst them. That was actually the landscape architect's plan all along.

The lack of road access to each plot may seem like a flaw at first glance, but it's by design. The Danish landscape architect wanted to encourage owners to walk more, get some fresh air before getting into their cars, as well as greet and maybe socialize with their neighbors more. Walking among the oval gardens helped them do

just that. **Oddity Central**

he Royal Ceylon Air Force was established on 2nd March 1951. The founding of the Royal SRI LANKA AIR FORCE Ceylon Air Force began with the presentation of 41 of 49; Bill No. 41 of 1949, which was presented to Ceylon's House of

Representatives, by Mr R.G.Senanayake, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Defence and External Affairs on 9th August 1949.

The Bill was read in the House for the second time on 30th August 1949. The Bill provided for a Regular Air Force, a Regular Air Force Reserve, a Volunteer Air Force and a Volunteer Air Force Reserve. The Royal Ceylon Air Force thus became the youngest of the Defence Services of Ceylon.

The Governor-General, Lord Soulbury, ratified the Bill on 3rd October 1949 and the legislative work was at last, complete. The Air Force Act was born. The British Government seconded Group Captain Graham Clarke Bladon to set up the Royal Ceylon Air Force, and command it





through its formative vears .Group Captain Bladon was Senior Air Staff Officer of the Royal Air Force's 62 Group, the Reserve Command covering the whole of the South West of England. He was honoured with the Order of the British Empire in 1951, whilst serving in Ceylon. He was a veteran of the Second World War and later

promoted to Air Commodore. Yet another Ceylonese officer during World War II was Air Vice Marshal ER Amarasekara who would enter the annals of Sri Lanka Air Force history as its first Sri Lankan Commander.

On the 22nd May 1972 when Ceylon became a Republic, the Royal Ceylon Air Force was duly redesignated as the Sri Lanka Air Force.

In the 7 decades that ensued, the Sri Lanka Air Force has come under the leadership of 17 prudent Commanders. The journey that commenced with the humble Chipmunk the Havilland DC 1, has steadily taken the SLAF to spread its wings and enhance its fleet with MIG 27s, Kfir c7s and F7s. Many other fixed wing and rotary aircraft have seen the largely ceremonial Air Force of the 70s emerge a a combat capable and victorious Air Force of the 21st Century. The history of the Air Force is a truly a classic saga that resonates with sacrifice, dedication and fierce gallantry.

he Sri Lanka Air Force emblem, a symbol of pride and accomplishment for every member of the Air Force, is based on the Royal Air Force emblem which reminds us of our RAF roots. The emblem consists of a blue circle bearing the words ' ශී ලංකා ගුවන් තමුදාව ' surrounded by sheaves of paddy on which is a superimposed eagle with its wings outspread, head turned to the 'Sinister' (left) according to ancient heraldic custom. The blue hand is crowned by the republic emblem and rests upon a blue banner bearing the Air Force motto 'සුරකිමු ළකඹර'



AIR FORCE ENSIGN

When the Royal Ceylon Air Force was established on 2nd March 1951 with Gp Capt. G.C

Bladon as the Commander, a proper ensign had not been designed for the Royal Ceylon Air Force. On 23rd February 1951 a commission was appointed to decide on the National Arms and Badges of Ceylon, ceremonial and other uniforms. On 27th November 1951 the commission recommended the use of the Air Force ensign. The Air Force subsequently replaced the union jack flag of the RAF ensign with the lion flag of the country. The ensign depicts sky blue colour with the lion flag in the top left hand corner whilst the modified roundel of the RAF is visible in the right

A roundel remains a symbol of extreme pride for any Air Force in the world. It is the primary symbol of identity of the Air Force and carries a powerful projection of belongingness. From the wing of an aircraft to the

bottom right corner of the Air Force ensign the iconic representation of the roundel will remain a primary source of identity, intimate pride and inspiration to those under it and as a tribute to all those who


SURVEILLANCE RECONNAISSANCE

CORE COMPETENCIES

Strategic and tactical aerospace surveillance and reconnaissance operations systematically conducted over Sri Lankan territory (inclusive of the EEZ).

Strategic and tactical aerospace surveillance augmented with alert reconnaissance operations over Sri Lankan territory is another one of our core competencies. Sri Lanka has a land area of over 65,000 square Kilometres as well as a territorial sea of 12 Nautical Miles, a Contiguous Zone of 24 Nautical Miles and Exclusive Economic Zone of 200 Nautical Miles.

It is in the national interest to ensure that these areas are not exploited by external powers and that the bountiful treasures that are held within are preserved for the benefit of the nation and all Sri Lankans. This requires regular vigilance, periodic routine surveillance as well as reconnaissance as called for by specific requirements. This is a task that the SLAF is geared to meet and that it fulfils with pride and commitment.



SEARCH AND RESCUE

While little can be done to avert natural disasters and perhaps even some manmade ones, the way we can mitigate the situation is by being able to respond professionally and rapidly by deploying the considerable resources vested with the SLAF.

This action smoothly facilitates the rescue and relief measures. In this role, the Air Force has proven capabilities in conducting SAR, CASEVAC and Air Maintenance operations by day/night and in fair weather, within the Colombo FIR for an airliner / ship in distress with up to 300 survivors. In the event of a natural disaster within Sri Lanka and anywhere within the SAARC region and in support of offshore operations, the SLAF can swing into action rapidly and immediately and assist local authorities to contain the disaster and activate relief measures.

FORCE PROTECTION Comprehensive force protection for vital Air Force assets and installations.














PEACE KEEPING MISSION

The Sri Lanka Air Force has deployed an Aviation Unit under the United Nations Multidimensional Stabilization Mission in the Central African Republic(MINUSCA) which was established under chapter vi to viii of United Nations (UN) Security Council resolution 2149 (2014).

This is the first ever aircraft deployment by Sri Lanka and the SLAF under a UN mandate in our history. Three (03) Mi-17 helicopters from the SLAF fleet along with 122 personnel consisting pilots, engineers and other supporting staff were deployed to the Mission as the No. 62 Helicopter Flight, which will be an extension of the No. 6 Helicopter Squadron. In addition to the main contingent, two Officers have also been deployed as Staff Officers, who will be based at the MINUSCA Headquarters to assist and coordinate the Aviation Units during their deployment.

This achievement of the SLAF speaks volumes of the trust and confidence commanded by the entire military forces of Sri Lanka and would go a long way in enhancing the nation's image further in the international arena. Besides, this endeavour would bring substantial economic gains to the country.

The SLAF deployed its second aircraft deployment overseas, when three MI 17 Helicopters proceeded to South Sudan to take on the role of an Aviation Unit. The three (03) Mi-17 helicopters from the SLAF fleet along with 104 personnel consisting of pilots, engineers and other supporting staff deployed to South Sudan.

These helicopter deployments are tasked to carry out VIP transportation, transportation of food and equipment, domestic flying, para dropping and medical evacuation in the Central African Republic and South Sudan, in support of the overall UN mandate for this weary nation.

TOWARDS NATION-BUILDING

As a result of the "Gama Samaga Pilisandara" program conducted by His Excellency the President Gotabaya Rajapaksa at Kanugahawewa Village in Kebithigollewa, Anuradhapura, the Commander of the Air Force, Air Marshal Sudarshana Pathirana undertook the renovation project of the village in line with the 70th Anniversary of

The Chief Incumbent of the Kanuqahawewa Abinawarama Viharaya, the Kanuqahawewa Grama Niladari Officer and residents of Kanuqahawewa discussed their needs with the Divisional Secretary and made a proposal on what was needed

Based on the proposal made by Wijesinghe, the Senior Staff the Divisional Secretary the Urban Development Authority has planned to develop the village of Kanugahawewa as a Model Village together with the

Sri Lanka Air Force. The entire project is conducted under the quidance of the Commander of the Air Force who appointed a Steering Committee led by the Director Ground Operations of the SLAF, Air Vice Marshal Camillus Labrooy. Other Air Commodore Udula Officer of the Directorate of Civil Engineering and the Base Commander of SLAF Base Vavuniya, Air Commodore Deshapriya Silva.

The Kanuqahawewa Village is home to 314 families and approximately 942 civilians. Based on the needs of those in Kanugahawewa, renovation of the Kanugahawewa Abinawarama Viharaya, Kanugahawewa Vidyalaya, houses for those who by the people of Kanugahawewa. members of this committee are cannot afford to build a house on their own and many other development projects have been undertaken by the Sri Lanka Air Force.

> Signifying the commencement of the development project of this Model Village, the Commander of the Air Force, Air Marshal Sudarshana Pathirana placed the cornerstones on 28 January 2021 for the Teachers Quarters of the Kanugahawewa Primary School, a Bell Tower at the Kanugahawewa Abinawarama Viharaya and thirteen (13) houses which will be constructed during stage 1 of this project. The Commander also symbolically commenced the construction of 13 Km long Electric Fence which will in time protect the villagers from the wild elephant threat they face at present.

China gains momentum in race to overtake US economy

BEIJING -- China's economy surged closer to its American rival last year, achieving nominal gross domestic product of \$14.73 trillion - more than 70% that of the U.S., data released Sunday by the National Bureau of Statistics in Beijing shows.

The Asian country's economy grew at 3% in dollar terms during 2020, based on an average exchange rate of 6.8974 yuan to the greenback. China reached 101.59 trillion yuan in terms of local currency, topping 100 trillion yuan for the first time.

China's action to suppress its coronavirus outbreak in the early part of last year helped industrial production stage a quick recovery in spring, fueling real estate development and other economic activity. Overseas demand also gave a boost.

By contrast, the U.S. struggled with its initial response to the pandemic, hampering the economy. Nominal GDP shrank 2.3% last year to \$20.93 trillion, the Commerce Department said.

Consequently, China's nominal GDP equaled 70.4% that of the U.S., climbing by 3.6 percentage points from 2019 for the first rise in two years. China now accounts for 17% of global GDP, the statistics bureau says, up from 10% in 2010.

The contrast in pandemic responses suggests China will overtake the U.S. as the top global economic power sooner than expected. The Japan Center for Economic Research projected in December that China would surpass the U.S. in nominal GDP as soon as 2028. (www.asia.nikkei.com)

CA Sri Lanka's initiatives in strengthening Public Financial Management

Through its Public Sector Wing (APFASL)

Introduction

Public financial management is a system by which the financial resources are managed economically, efficiently and effectively ensuring transparency and accountability. The Parliament delegates the authority to the Government and the public sector manages the affairs through the public servants. It is the public servants who are ultimately responsible for managing public finance and discharge accountability. Financial management involves managing finance in an orderly and efficient manner through proper planning, budgeting, accounting and reporting under effective internal control environment to secure adequate return on investment (benefits to the people).

Public sector in Sri Lanka is very large diverse and complex. It plays a dominant role in the national economy, contributing 50 to 60 percent of the national income. Provision of essential services such as education, health, water, electricity and other welfare services to the general public are directly handled by the public sector. Public Sector entities include ministries, departments, provincial councils, local authorities, statutory boards, state owned enterprisesand so on. While the demand for public expenditure has been on the increase, the available resources are limited becoming more difficult to make both ends to meet. In the circumstances the role of the public sector plays a crucial role in managing public resources and to deliver public services.

Need for strengthening Public Financial Management

Public financial management is a key ingredient for economic development. However the financial management in the public sector has been very weak. Particularly the emerging economies and developing economies suffer due to lack of professionalism. Very few finance professionals work in the public sector. Many countries are till adopting cash based accounting although the studies reveal how the accrual system of accounting leads to better management of financial performance and position. Some countries are in transition from cash based accounting to accrual based accounting. Consolidated accrual based balance sheet in the public sector are very rare. Progressive countries are moving away fromtraditional input control conformity and compliance, to performance management focusing on results, outputs and outcome. IT development, emerging requirements in internal controls and audit and risk management practices are some of the major challenges faced by the accountants and auditors in the public sector. Reform minded countries like New Zealandhas shown to the entire world how financial management reforms can boost economic development.

Further the COVID-19, the global pandemic has made dramatic impact on our economy. The challenges faced by the economy is unbearable. Increasing demand has been put on the Government finance functions due to drastic measures taken by the Government by way of various relief measures. In addition, the revenues are dropping, loans are maturing for repayment, tourism and export industry are very badly affected, rupee is depreciating gradually and managing public finance has become a major challenge for the government. The public sector needs high professionalism to handle this situation.

Need for the hour is to maximize the utilization of national resources so that its benefits will have trickle down effects at grassroots level to meet the expectations of the people. As a premier national accountancy body we have a prime responsibility to work closely with the government to overcome the current situation. There is an urgent need to revamp the Government financial management system by simplifying the cumbersome procedures, bringing in the international best practices to meet the current need for accelerated development of the economy. Introduction of Public Finance Act and the revision of Financial Regulations have been a long felt need to streamline the financial management practices.

CA Sri Lanka's Initiatives to cater public sector needs

World over the Professional Accountancy Organizations (PAOs) had been catering the needs of the private sector until recently. Although International Federation of Accountants (IFAC), Confederation of Asian and Pacific Accountants (CAPA) are committed to protect public interest encouraging the PAOs to extend their activities into the public sector focusing on high quality financial management only very few PAOs have been able get involved with the public sector. The Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (CIPFA), London, the only international professional accountancy body globally dedicated to public financial management has joined hands with several accountancy bodies in promoting professionalism in public financial management. We are proud to say that CA Sri Lanka, the premier national accountancy body has taken the lead in joining hands with CIPFA London to professionalize the public sector financial management personnel in Sri Lanka under an MOU signed with them. In addition, it has set an example by creating a model for the other PAOs to follow by establishing a Public Sector Wing (APFASL).

Establishment of the Public Sector Wing (APFASL)

APFASL, the Association of Public Finance Accountants was established as a Public Sector Wing of CA Sri Lanka in 2012 with a vision to lead excellence in Public Financial Management. All of its members are public servants serving in Government Ministries, Departments, Provincial Councils, Local authorities, Statutory Boards and State Owned Enterprises.

APFASL is managed by a board of management consisting of 15 members appointed by the Council of CA Sri Lanka including seven ex-officio members namely the President and Vice President of CA Sri Lanka, Auditor General, Director General of State Accounts, Director General of Public Finance, Director General of Public Enterprises, Commissioner General of Inland Revenue and eight independent members.

i. Associate Public Finance Accountants (APFA) - Accountants, Auditors and Inland Revenue Officers from public service who meet the eligibility requirements in terms of the Articles of Constitution are admitted as associate members.

ii. Fellow Public Finance Accountant (FPFA) – Associate members having 10 years of unblemished records are elevated as fellow members

iii. Chartered Public Finance Accountants (CPFA) – This qualification is offered to our members on merit basis as well as on examination basis. Initially this qualification was offered on merit basis to senior public servants possessing master's degree infinance related subjects with 10 years' executive experience andothers follow the examination route.

APFASL's initiatives in strengthening Public Financial Management

CA Sri Lanka has taken several initiatives through the APFASL to strengthen public financial management practices in the country. Some of them are as fol-

• Launched a new professional qualification, Chartered Public Finance Accountancy (CPFA) for the

This qualification was introduced by CA Sri Lanka as a core qualification to the public sector to enhance the knowledge, skills and status of the Public officers. CPFA members are recognized for membership from CIPFA, London as a dual qualification under the MOU signed with them.

- Introduced Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) based on International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), and conducting awareness programs to facilitate implementation of these standards to improve financial reporting. So far 20 standards have been formulated, adopted and published in three volumes jointly with the Ministry of Finance.

- Conducting series of capacity development programs by way of seminars, workshops and conferences.
- Publishing a Bi-annual Newsletter containing articles and news relating to public financial management

APFASL has also introduced a new system of accounting and reporting supported by a simplified uniform accounting standard based on SLPSAS for the Local Authorities at the request of the Ministry of Provincial councils and Local Authorities.

Currently the Association is in the process of Launching a Master's Degree in Public Financial Management for which a comprehensive proposal has been submitted to the Ministry of Higher Education for approval.

In historic first, Pope Francis to visit Iraq

IRAQ: Pope Francis is to arrive Friday for the first-ever Papal visit to conflict-torn Iraq, aiming to encourage the dwindling Christian community to remain in their ancient homeland, and broaden his outreach to Islam.

Among the most extraordinary moments of the trip will be his one-on-one meeting with Grand Ayatollah Ali Sistani, the highly reclusive cleric, who is a top religious authority for many of the world's Shiite Muslims.

Despite a second deadly wave of coronavirus infections, renewed violence and notoriously poor public services, Francis is fulfilling the dream of a predecessor, late pope John Paul II, by visiting Iraq.

Amid war and persecution, the country's Christian community - one of the world's oldest -- has fallen from 1.5 million in 2003 to just 400,000 today.

The 84-year-old pontiff, who will be on his first foreign trip since the start of the pandemic, plans to voice solidarity with them and the rest of Iraq's 40 million people during a packed three-day visit.

From central Baghdad to the Shiite shrine city of Najaf, welcome banners featuring his image and Arabic title "Baba al-Vatican" already dot the streets.

From Ur, the birthplace of the Prophet Abraham in the southern desert, to ravaged Christian towns in the north, roads are being paved and churches rehabilitated in remote areas that have never seen such a high-profile

"The pope's message is that the Church stands beside those who suffer," said Najeeb

But even as sectarian violence pushed members of the minority to flee, the national population surged, further diluting Christians to just one percent, according to William Warda, co-founder of the Hammurabi Human Rights Organisation. Most were concentrated in the northern province of Nin-eveh, where many still speak a dialect of Aramaic, the language of Jesus Christ.

In 2014, jihadists from the so-called Islamic State group seized control of Nineveh, rampaging through Christian towns and telling residents: convert or die. At the time, Pope Francis endorsed military action against IS and considered visiting northern Iraq in solidarity with Christians there.

That trip never materialised, but Francis has kept a close eye on Iraq, condemning the killing of unarmed protesters during mass anti-government rallies from 2019.

Pope John Paul II had planned to visit Iraq in 2000 but Saddam Hussein abruptly cancelled the trip. His successor Benedict XVI never made moves towards Baghdad.

In 2019, President Barham Saleh extended an official invitation, hoping to help Iraq "heal" after years of violence. Francis hopes this week's trip could open a similar door to Shiite Muslims, who number roughly 200 million worldwide but are the majority in Iraq. As part of that effort, he will meet the top cleric for many Shiites, Grand Ayatollah Ali Sistani, at his

Khashoggi fiancee demands punishment for Saudi Prince

TURKEY: The Turkish fiancee of slain Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi said on Monday that Saudi crown prince Mohammed bin Salman should be "punished without delay" over the murder. The United States on Friday declassified a report that publicly accused the crown prince of approving Khashoggi murder in the kingdom's Istanbul consulate in 2018.

But the United States stopped short of applying sanctions against the 35-year-old de facto leader, known by his initials MBS.

"It is essential that the Crown Prince, who ordered the brutal murder of a blameless and innocent person, should be punished without delay," Khashoggi's fiancee Hatice Cengiz said in a statement posted on her official Twitter account in English

"This will not only bring the justice we have been seeking for Jamal, but it could also prevent similar acts recurring in the

future," she said. Khashoggi, a US resident and critic of

Prince Mohammed who wrote for The Washington Post, was killed and dismembered at the kingdom's Istanbul consulate after going inside to receive paperwork for his wedding to Cengiz.

Waiver war at WTO over COVID jab IP rights

SWITZERLAND: The World Trade Organization faces calls led by India and South Africa to waive intellectual property rights for COVID-19 vaccines -- a notion fiercely rejected by pharmaceutical giants and their host coun-

The WTO will thrash out the divisive issue at its general council meeting on Monday and Tuesday as its new head Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala takes up her post.

Some countries see the waiver as a shortcut to ending the novel coronavirus that has hobbled the global economy.

The IP plan was filed by India and South Africa on October 2 and garnered support from a host of developing countries which -- correctly -- anticipated being left behind in the vaccination race.

The text proposes a temporary exemption from certain obligations under the Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS), so that any country can produce vaccines without worrying about patents.

OMAN: Perched on Oman mountain top, the village

of Misfat al-Abriyeen has changed its fortunes by transforming mud-brick homes into boutique hotels, drawing tourists to a region famed for hiking trails and tales of genies. The village of 800 resi-

dents, situated on the dramatic escarpments of Oman's "Grand Canyon", opened its narrow streets six years ago to foreigners and locals seeking adventure in the deserts and green corners of the Gulf sultanate. Villager Yacoub al-Abri said it all started in 2010 when his uncle suggested they take another look at the mud houses that had lain neglected for

years in the ancient settlement about three hours' drive from the capital Muscat.

The owners had abandoned the centuries-old homes, fearing they could collapse, and moved to the opposite side of the village where they built new accommodation.

His idea was "to combine the simple and natural surroundings of an old Omani life with a modern touch that provides comfort and safety", Abri told

The beige-walled homes, made of mud brick with palm-frond roofs, were turned into simple but elegant inns furnished with traditional wood and textiles.

Five years after the idea was dreamt up, the family's first boutique hotel was up and running, inspiring neighbours and villagers elsewhere in Oman to follow their lead.

"We started with only five rooms, then we increased the number and bought other old houses. Today we have 15 rooms and there are plans to continue expanding until we reach 50," Abri said.

Misfat al-Abriyeen had the right elements for success.

At an altitude of more than 1,000 metres (3,300 feet), the tiny village which is home to the Abri tribe is a charming collection of traditional houses situated along dozens of small alleys overlooking lands bursting with banana plants and citrus and palm trees.

It is part of a region known as the Grand Canyon of Oman where tourists can hike the rocky mountains and valleys, and explore the old ways of local

But the region is also famed for its

centuries-old stories of genies - or spirits in human form -- that are still widely told in similar villages across the country, despite half a century of modernisa-

Boutique mud houses change

"Staying here is like a journey into a world of tranquillity and peace of mind," said Abri, in his white dishdasha and colourful traditional turban.

"Even the food that is provided here is cooked in Omani homes by the people of the village." According to the hotel owner, 5,500 tourists from Germany, France, the Gulf and beyond stayed at his boutique establishments in 2019, with an annual occupancy rate of 90 percent, compared to just 800 during the first year of business in 2015.

The rates at the centuries-old former homes vary between \$90 and \$180 per night, depending on the room and the

The country of five million people has been trying to diversify its oil-reliant economy since crude prices sank seven vears ago.

Tourism has long been a second source of revenue that capitalises on the nation's rich heritage, scenic coastline and stunning terrain.

Energising the industry is seen as a potential saviour after coronavirus restrictions forced Oman to close its doors for months, badly hitting the econ-

Some 3.5 million tourists visited Oman in 2019, but the sultanate plans to attract 11 million by 2040.

In Misfat al-Abriyeen, turning six mud houses into boutique hotels has led to more projects to attract visitors, such as new hiking trails and climbs, according to Abdullah al-Abri, who owns one of the hotels. - AFP




