The first batch of COVID-19 vaccines under the World Health Organisation's COVAX partnership for Sri Lanka is scheduled to arrive on March 7, State Minister of Primary Health Care, Epidemics and COVID Disease Control Dr. Sudharshani Fernandopulle said.

Accordingly, the country will receive 264,000 doses in the first stage. Sri Lanka will receive 4.5 million doses under the COVAX partnership.




She said doctors at the Lady Ridgeway Children's Hospital, Borella has told her to consult them at the hospital monthly but she cannot

"This situation is a major hindrance towards the progress of the future digital economy of Sri Lanka," it stressed.


The society further said the ISPs are manipulating their customer bases as per

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

Development projects should fulfill people's needs - PM

The primary objective of any development project should be to fulfill the needs of the people, Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa stated yesterday (03).

The Prime Minister also pointed out that development projects that do not meet the needs of the

people should be confined to history. The Prime Minister was speaking while chairing a discussion held at the Ministry of Finance regarding the First Phase of the proposed railway project aimed at reducing traffic con-

gestion in the City of Colombo. Under the First Phase of the project, three railway lines have been identified for construction covering Colombo and suburbs.

"It is proposed to construct one railway line from Ragama to Kirulapone via Colombo Fort, another line to Kelaniya via Moratuwa, Piliyandala, Narahenpita and the third to Kottawa, Pannipitiya and Hunupitiya via Thalawathugoda," Urban Development Authority offivcials informed the Prime Minister during the discussion. Prime Minister Raja-

paksa advised officials that the inclusion of Maharagama, one of the most populous cities, in the project would be more beneficial. The Prime Minister

pointed out that a large number of people from the outlying areas travel to Maharagama and that the project will also alleviate severe traffic congestion in the area.

Following the discussion, Urban Development Authority officials informed the Prime Minister that Maharagama can be included in the project by connecting it to the 21.5 km long Kottawa-Hunupitiya railway

Pointing out that development should be done for the benefit of the people, the Prime Minister emphasised that the country does not need development projects that do not benefit the public. The daily economic loss to Sri Lanka due to traffic congestion in 2019 was estimated at Rs.1000 million. As a solution to this, the City Bus project which was recently launched by the Government is now being implemented successfully. The aim of this railway project is to connect the people who come to Colombo in their private vehicles to the railway transportation facility by using the city bus service.

The project which will be operated as a Public Private Partnership is expected to be completed in four years. The project will receive USD 5,000 million as a Foreign Direct Investment. It is also proposed for the Government to contribute 6% for this project. This railway project alone is expected to save around Rs.550 million daily.

The Prime Minister advised the UDA to consider all the requests forwarded by foreign investors who are willing to invest in the project care-

Investigations revealed that the Policeman and the woman had moved into a

guest house in Hanwella on February 28. On March 1, the suspect had been seen leaving the guest house with a travelling bag in which the headless corpse of the woman was apparently stuffed.

DIG Ajith Rohana said that investigations revealed the murder was committed in the guest house.

President's Counsel Shamil Perera appearing for Archbishop of Colombo Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith moved Court to issue an Interim Order since illegal constructions and filling of lands are continuously taking place within the sanctuary.

However, Additional Solicitor General Priyantha Nawana appearing for the Attorney General told court that the Supreme Court has already issued an order preventing the authorities from dumping garbage in the Muthurajawela Sanctu-

ary. Shamil Perera PC submitted to the court that the order made by the Supreme Court was to prevent dumping of garbage. He said this matter relates to a wide range of issues including illegal constructions, filling of lands and destruction of the environment.

Meanwhile, the Attorney General sought further time to get instructions from the respondent parties and thereby the two petitions were fixed for support on March 30.

The petitioners are seeking an Interim Order directing the respondents to stay any further dumping of waste and the filling of lands within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary.

Filing this petition through Counsel Ravindranath Dabare, the petitioners alleged that a land filling racket has been going on for years mainly due to the fact that the said sanctuary is situated at a prime location, close to the Port City, highway, other development projects and Colombo City. This illegal land reclamation had become a large-scale racket with

the blessings of certain politicians and Government officials. Petitioners further state that it

has been brought to their attention that recently an extent of approximately 50 acres within the Muthurajawela Sanctuary, situated in the Grama Niladhari Division of Wawala and within the Ja-Ela Divisional Secretariat has been demarcated for reclamation by a private development company that had earlier attempted to illegally acquire 406 acres from the Sanctuary for the construction of a housing scheme, with the acquiescence of the Agrarian Services Depart-

The petitioners state that Muthurajawela and the Negombo Lagoon Wetland Complex are located 10km North of Colombo

in the Gampaha District of the Western Province. The Muthurajawela Marshes and Negombo Lagoon are two adjacent and interdependent ecological systems covering about 6,000 Ha and forming one contiguous Wetland. The Wetland represents a large area of brackish marshes, mangrove swamps and freshwater marshes merging into an estuarine lagoon to the North-West. The lagoon opens to the sea at its Northern end and receives fresh river water input from the Ja-Ela and Dadugam Oya.

The petitioners state that Muthurajawela functions as the 'Green Lung' for the metropolitan area, and should be preserved as an important landscape amenity for present and future generations.

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A justifiable stand

he Catholic Church and its followers are poised for a mass protest at the failure of ongoing investigations to unravel the real contours of the Easter Sunday Massacre, which is nearing its second anniversary, and the main actors and the masterminds behind the whole episode.

Speaking to the media at the Archbishop's House in Borella, His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith stated that the "Black Sunday" planned for March 7 where Catholics attending Sunday Services in Churches throughout the country have been told to do so dressed in black, was only the beginning of their agitations and if by April 21 (the second anniversary of the tragedy) positive results are not shown, all homes in the country would be asked to hoist black flags as a mark of protest to register the dismay and opposition at the delay in delivering justice on behalf of the victims.

The Cardinal, flanked by some of the loved ones and survivors of the Easter Sunday church attacks opined that the Catholic Church was in no way impressed by the turn the investigations were taking and that there were indications of investigations being influenced by certain forces to protect individuals linked to the attacks. He noted that the authorities have failed to take into custody those who funded the terrorist outfit responsible for the massacre and those responsible for stifling and sabotaging the investigations into the attacks.

His Eminence also spoke of deals being cut in order to sweep things under the carpet, adding that the Presidential Commission of Inquiry had failed to meet the expectations of the Church in throwing light on the whole operation and identifying the true perpetrators and facilitators of the ghastly crime.

Of course the PCol is not an investigative arm and is only a fact finding body tasked with unearthing the lapses that occurred leading to the tragedy and for identifying the persons who permitted the attacks due to their negligence of duty. It is now left to the various investigative arms of the law enforcement to act on the findings of the Report under the guidance of the Attorney General and also by following on the revelations made in the Commission Report to trace and act against those behind the attacks including the individuals, if any, who attempted a cover-up.

The moving scene at the media briefing where a parent, a Buddhist, who lost both his children in the attack on the Kochchikade shrine, no doubt, catalyzed the feelings and state of mind of the Cardinal in his determination to ensure justice. The scene, no doubt, would also have greatly influenced the authorities to pursue the case in earnest until all actors responsible for the tragedy are rounded up and justice delivered to the anguished families and loved ones of the victims who perished.

For one thing, there was great expectation not only among the families of the victims but also all Catholics that the present Government would ensure that all those responsible for the Eater Sunday carnage would be brought to justice. The massive mandate it received in the Roman Catholic electorates bears testimony to this. In his Independence Day speech, President Gotabaya Rajapaksa was unequivocal in his determination to bring to book all those involved in the tragedy.

Not just those directly responsible for the massacre, but even those who turned a Nelsonian eye to the warnings received especially those in high authority and holding the levers of power too should undoubtedly be held accountable as the Cardinal has been reiterating. A lot is owed to His Eminence for his role in reining in his flock amidst the greatest of provocations and preventing what would certainly have been a bloodbath that would have not only sparked communal tensions all round but also dealt a severe blow on the economy.

This was largely due to His Eminence's undertaking to the Catholic community that he would not rest until all those responsible are unravelled and punished to ensure justice is done. In this mission he was also greatly assisted by the Maha Sangha whose support has not waned with the passage of time and who no doubt would enjoin the Buddhists to come out in solidarity by hoisting black flags in their homes which is the next stage of the Church's protest on the second anniversary of the tragedy, if by then the current status were to remain un-reme-

One recalls how the Maha Sangha rallied behind His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith not only in commiserating with him at his hour of great grief but also in offering their moral and material support to rebuild the devastated Churches by even personally getting involved in the rebuilding tasks. Perhaps it is as a tribute to this generous gesture that His Eminence has taken exception to the recommendation of the PCol to ban a Buddhist movement led by a vociferous monk. According to His Eminence, the Church did not expect the Commission to recommend a ban on any Buddhist Organisations but to ascertain the real perpetrators of the attack on that fateful Easter Sunday.

he findings of the Presidential Commission of Inquiry (PCoI) into the Easter Sunday bomb attacks on April 21, 2019 were handed over to President Gotabaya Rajapaksa recently and have become the subject of intense scrutiny and debate due to the potential political implications of the report.

Sri Lanka had experienced relative peace and quiet since the conclusion of the Eelam War in May 2009. This tranquility came to a terrifying halt on the morning of April 21 two years ago when a series of bombs ripped through several churches and Colombo hotels in a coordinated terror attack.

The first bombs exploded at St. Anthony's Church in Kochchikade, Colombo at half past eight in the morning. Less than half an hour later, a blast occurred at St. Sebastian's church at Katuwapitiva in Negombo. Some 20 minutes later another bomb ripped through the Zion church in Batticaloa.

This was followed by a series of well-timed attacks, within twenty minutes of each other at three leading Colombo hotels, the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, the Kingsbury Hotel and the Shangri-La Hotel, all of them situated in the heart of Colombo. Several hours later there was a blast at a motel in Dehiwela.

The attacks left 269 people dead and shocked the entire world, generating sensational headlines and effectively crippling Sri Lanka's tourist industry which had seen a remarkable resurgence since the conclusion of the war. The attackers belonged to a radicalised Islamic terror group.

Aftermath of the attack

The initial Government reaction following the attacks was to impose a curfew, declare a State of Emergency and implement a ban on social media for a few days. In the immediate aftermath of the attack, there was also considerable anti-Muslim sentiment with fears of a retaliatory backlash.

Then President Maithripala Sirisena was overseas at the time of the attack and was on a personal visit to Singapore. He returned to the country shortly afterwards and this became a controversial issue later, with accusations that he did not return to Sri Lanka on the first available flight to Colombo.

The attacks must also be viewed in the political climate of that time. It was in October 2018, six months earlier, that then President Maithripala Sirisena had sacked Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe and appointed Mahinda Rajapaksa as Premier and sworn in a new Cabinet.

This Government lasted 52 days. Ranil Wickremesinghe was sworn in again as Prime Minister after the Supreme Court declared that President Sirisena's actions in dissolving Parliament were unconstitutional. However, the relationship between the two was irrevocably strained by then.

The President was the Minister of Defence but the other vital Cabinet portfolios were held by ministers of the United National Party (UNP). There was an apparent disconnect between the President and the Cabinet with the President and ministers being publicly critical of each other.

In such a political environment, the actions of President Sirisena as well as Cabinet ministers came under close scrutiny. Minister Harin Fernando publicly stated that he was warned by his father not to attend Easter services, giving rise to speculation that there were warnings of the impending attack.

On the day after the incidents, then President Sirisena appointed a three-member committee to probe the attacks. It comprised of Supreme Court Judge Vijith Malalgoda, former Inspector General of Police N. K. Ilangakoon and former Law and Order Ministry Secretary Padmasiri Jayamanne.

As this committee began work, a month after the attacks, then Speaker of Parliament Karu Jayasuriya appointed a separate Parliamentary Select Committee (PSC) to probe the attacks. This was interpreted as a manifestation of the lack of trust between the President and the ruling UNP at that time.

The eight-member PSC was chaired by Deputy

Speaker Ananda Kumarasinghe and comprised of Parliamentarians Rauff Hakeem, Field Marshal Sarath Fonseka, Ravi Karunanayake, Kavinda Jayawardana, Ashu Marasinghe, Jayampathy Wickramaratne and M. A. Sumanthiran.

The committee appointed by the President handed over its final report a few weeks later, on June 10, 2019. While the report offered insights into the attack and the prevailing security climate at that time, it stopped short of making any specific recommendations regarding any individuals or institutions

Sittings of the PSC were conducted in public and, from what transpired at these hearings, it became evident that there was a significant lack of communication and cooperation between the various Government agencies tasked with ensuring the safety and security of the nation, enabling the attacks.

For instance, Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe described how he was not invited to meetings of the National Security Council (NSC) after the constitutional crisis six months earlier. Then Defence Secretary Hemasiri Fernando recalled the difficulties he had in meeting with President Sirisena.

Security lapses

As a result, there was a public demand both to know the facts regarding the security lapses that led to the attacks and to identify those responsible. Leading the call for this was the Archbishop of Colombo, His Eminence Malcolm Cardinal Ranjith who was quite vocal in his condemnation of the handling of the

Previously, Cardinal Ranjith had been credited with being a voice of reason in the days after the attack. The Cardinal was widely commended for playing a key role in appealing for calm in the Catholic community, thereby possibly preventing a possible backlash against Muslims.

As there was a perception in a section of the Government that the proceedings of the PSC were being conducted with a view to tarnish the image of then President Sirisena, the President appointed a five-member Presidential Commission of Inquiry (PCoI) on September 22, 2019 to probe the attacks.

The five-member Commission was chaired by Justice of the Court of Appeal Janak de Silva. Its other members included Justice Nissanka Bandula Karunarathna, Retired Justice Nihal Sunil Rajapaksa, Retired

Sittings of the of the nation, enabling the attacks. Justice Bandula Kumara Atapattu and retired Ministry Secretary Ms. W.M.M.R. Adikari.

The appointment of the five-member PCoI came a day after the PSC probing the attacks recorded the testimony of then President Sirisena. The PCoI was mandated by the President to identify those responsible for attacks, both in carrying out the attacks and through negligence of duty.

In the gazette notification appointing the PCoI, then President Sirisena noted that "a large number of complaints and allegations have been made against persons, who were public servants or officers, who are alleged to have direct or indirect connections with the April 21 suicide bomb attacks".

PCol report

This PCoI has concluded its hearings and submitted its report. The election of President Gotabaya Rajapaksa in late 2019 meant that the PCoI report was submitted to its appointing authority who is now President Rajapaksa. Former President Sirisena however remains a ruling party Parliamentarian.

In an ironical move, the PCoI appointed by former President Sirisena has now recommended criminal proceedings against him, holding that the then President was guilty of 'criminal liability' for his part in the acts or omissions which resulted in the tragedy. This carries major political implications.

The PCoI recommended that the Attorney General consider instituting criminal proceedings against the former President under "any suitable provision in the Penal Code". Among the issues the PCoI held the then President liable was the non-appointment of an acting Minister of Defence.

"No doubt, in terms of the Constitution, there appears to be discretion for the President in the making of an acting appointment. Nevertheless, given the circumstances, President Sirisena should have made the acting appointment," the PCoI said, noting that Sirisena had information of a possible attack.

The Commission also recommended that the Attorney General consider criminal proceedings against several others including former Police Chief Pujith Jayasundara, former Defence Secretary Hemasiri Fernando and senior Police officers Nandana Munasing-

he and Deshabandu Tennekoon. The PCoI also faulted former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe for keeping neither Cabinet nor Parliament informed that he was being kept out of National Security Council meetings since October 2018. However, the PCoI refrained from recommending any legal action against Wickremesinghe.

The Government has responded to the PCoI report with President Gotabaya Rajapaksa appointing a ministerial committee to study the recommendations. The Committee been entrusted with identifying "the overall process including the measures that need to be taken by various agencies and authorities"

This ministerial committee is headed by Minister Chamal Rajapaksa. Johnston Fernando, Udaya Gammanpila, Ramesh Pathirana, Prasanna Ranatunga and Rohitha Abeygunawardena are the other members. Minister Rajapaksa has assured that justice will be done and there will be no 'cover-up'.

Former President Sirisena has opted not to comment on the findings of the PCoI, taking up the position that he will "not to respond to the allegations in the Report at this stage". It is uncertain as to what course of action Sirisena will pursue, should criminal proceedings be instituted against him. The SLFP has already rejected the PCoI Report.

With the former President being a part of the ruling coalition and the leader of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP), a question mark hangs over whether the Government can continue to rely on the support of SLFP Parliamentarians, should criminal proceedings be instituted against Sirisena.

Former Prime Minister Wickremesinghe meanwhile has stated that the findings of the PCoI raises serious concerns regarding the state of security at the time of the attacks but argued that there are "many unanswered questions" which merit further inquiry and investigation.

The coming weeks should provide some clarity to these issues. The country awaits answers to the vital questions of how the Easter attacks eventuated, whether it was due to the negligence of some and if so, what action would be taken against them- if only to prevent a recurrence of such calamities.

MANOJA ALWEERA lmost all the countries strive to acquire a rapid economic development. Therefore,



what economic development is, and in this regard, the questions asked by Professor Dudley Seers are important. They are: over a period of time what has been happening to poverty; what has been happening to unemployment; and what has been happening to inequality? If all these issues have declined from a high level, then beyond doubt, he says it has been a period of development for the country concerned. Out of these three issues unemployment is more vital because lessening unemployment automatically reduces other two problems as well. Job aspirants are unemployed for many reasons, and policy makers usually worry more about some types of unemployment over the other types. As such we find frictional unemployment,

seasonal unemployment, structural unem-

ployment and demand deficient unemploy-

The labour market is in constant flux or instability. At any point of time, some sectors of the economy are growing, while other sectors are declining. Some workers quit their jobs while other are laid off. Some firms cut employment while other firms expand employment. New persons enter the labour market after completing their education, and some others re-enter after spending some times in the non-market sector. Thus, at any point in time, many workers are in between jobs. This type of unemployment can be identified as frictional unemployment.

Frictional unemployment arises because both workers and firms need time to locate each other to grasp the information about the value of the job. The existence of frictional unemployment does not suggest that there is a fundamental structural problem in the labour market, such as having an imbalance between the number of persons looking for work and the number of jobs available. As such, by its very nature, frictional unemploy-



ment leads to appear short unemployment

is not viewed with alarm by policymakers.

Union-mandated wage increases and government-imposed minimum wages introduce rigid wages into the labour market and prevent the market

from clearing. Sticky wages can explain the large fluctuations in unemployment rates over the business cycle as well. If the real wage is rigid, firms respond to a decline in demand for their products by cutting employment and generating demand-deficient unemployment. Taking this theoretical background of unemployment into consideration we can consider the Sri Lanka's current incidence of unemployment.

Current level of unemployment

According to the latest data, the overall unemployment rate or the open unemployment rate has increased to 4.8% in 2019 from 4.4% experienced in 2018. Educated youths' level of unemployment is as large as twice of the open unemployment rate of the country. Also, female level of unemployment is higher than that of male. When more than 20% of the under or hidden employment is added to the rate of open unemployment, even currently about 25% of the labour force does not have proper and continuous jobs. This rate of unemployment is extremely high compared to that of most of the countries in the Asian region, which have been following open market policies similar to Sri Lanka.

Causes for unemployment

A number of hypotheses have been presented by researchers to explain the Sri Lanka's high level of unemployment. Rama (1994) says that out of these alternative

hypotheses, the 'skills mismatch' or 'structural mismatch' hypothesis, first articulated by the ILO Mission led by Professor Dudley Seers to Sri Lanka in 1971, is most influential in explaining the issue of high level of unemployment.

The mismatch hypothesis highlights that although the economy has employment opportunities jobs expected by a large amount of job seekers are not adequately found or they do not fit the prevailing jobs. This skills mismatch concept has been further extended to cover vertical mismatch and horizontal mismatch by later researchers. If more qualified persons work in jobs which do not require that much of qualifications is identified as having a vertical mismatch. On the other hand, horizontal mismatches apply if a person qualified in a particular discipline works in a job in some other or unrelated area. As such, if a person with engineering degree works in a job that requires no engineering knowledge at all is a good example for understanding a hori-

zontal mismatch. In the Sri Lankan labour market, this types of vertical and horizontal mismatches are also common due to insufficient generation of higher value added jobs. In this setting, particularly, the private sector business leaders attribute this mismatch to the weaknesses of the system of higher education, complaining that the quality and the content of education are weak to inculcate the required skills, aptitude, and job orientation in the labour force. As such, many are of the opinion that the education system of the country is mainly responsible for creating such issues of mismatch. Also, at the same time some other researchers such as Patabendige (2006) and Kiribanda (1994) do not highlight this hypothesis as a major reason for appearing a high level of unemployment in the country, and they say that the private

sector has failed to generate skill jobs and contribute to acquire a higher economic growth although this sector has been considered as the engine of growth after 1977 economic reforms.

Next, it is appropriate to consider other hypotheses to understand the diverse sources for appearing a high level of unemployment throughout the past years. In this sense, we can identify a number of alternative hypotheses such as: 1) Queuing up for government jobs as explained by Glewwe (1987) and Dickens and Lang (1996). Accordingly, until some job aspirants obtain government jobs they prefer to be unemployed, 2) The model presented by Rama (1994) is another Queuing up model which says due to the wedge between good and bad private sector jobs arising from the job security laws, some job aspirants are queuing up or waiting for more secured jobs; 3) Slow Economic growth Hypothesis highlighted by a number of economists say inadequate economic growth so far experienced is responsible for less job generation; 4) Factor market distortions hypothesis particularly highlighted by the Ten-Year plan (1958-1967) and Five year Plan (1972-76) and subsequent writers. They say due to factor market distortions caused by rigid labour laws, union influence and low labour productivity, labour has become more expensive than machinery (capital) for which various incentives are given to promote industrialization. But, this is true only in case of unskilled labourers since such labour and machinery are substitutable. But it is not true for skilled labour since machineries and skill labour are complementary and as a result, capital intensity increases employment generation for skilled labour, and it seems that these advocators of distortions view have not understood the idea of capital skill complementary hypothesis and 5) lack of innovation and

In Sri Lanka, the importance of investment in R & D (Research and Development) and in-house research have not been realized by both public and private sectors. Although the prescribed ratio with regard to R & D for developing country is 1% of country's GDP Sri Lanka's ratio is only around 0.1% and this is also mainly related to the public sector. As a result, business expansions are highly limited resulting in less employment generation.

HUMANS VS. CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT OF WILD ELEPHANTS

BERNARD FERNANDO

was reported in the press, that President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has prioritized a quick and durable solution to protect both humans and elephants vis-a-vis the Human-Elephant Conflict (HEC).

However, we note with much sorrow and distress, the continuous reporting of the raging Human/Elephant Conflict that is currently destroying the lives of poor humans and wild elephants in Sri Lanka. It is equally disturbing to witness the damage being done to property, harvest and laboriously cultivated plots of those helpless, poor people whose sole livelihood is farming. Their tales of woe deserve immediate attention of the authorities. The elephant chasing crackers and electrical fences are fast becoming wasted investments in the face of these hungry, wily and wild elephants.

Last year, the Wild Life Conservation Department published a policy statement in the press on the above subject requesting public views and I promptly sent my views and proposals. As the latter appear to have fallen on the deaf ears, I repeat below, the relevant proposals which seem quite appropriate in the present context.

The road map of the department should inter-alia focus on the following home truths and remedial action.

- As Sri Lanka is a small island nation, the available habitat for human beings, fauna and flora is very limited and therefore highly
- The ever growing populations of humans and elephants who occupy this small land mass; together consume its limited food and



environmental resources, converting the HEC to a perennial

- problem. Since Elephant Conservation (EC) is also of crucial importance, a delicate equilibrium has to be struck between human and
- wild elephant populations. In the absence of effective birth control programmes for humans and elephants, the research priority would be to ascertain the existing area -wise, elephant population (Both tame and wild) and thereafter determine the country's optimum area-wise carrying capacity of elephants considering the main variables such as growing elephant and human population and mortality rates and their food and habitat availability. Factors such as clearing of jungles for increasing human habitat and food cultivation (as is increasingly happening at present) including reforestation too have to be reckoned with in this context.



This research finding should lead to the determination of the optimum number of elephants required for country's EC at least for a period of 10 years. In the event of elephant population exceeding this number, the excess numbers can be exported to other countries which can care for our elephants without culling them.

More importantly, the following benefits will accrue to the people

habitable and cultivable land to the increasing human population in the medium and long term.

- Saving considerable volumes of jungle vegetation and food crops, as well as allowing expansion of food crop production and improvement of the economy of rural poor arising from a calculated preservation of the forest cover combined with reforestation programmes.
- Reduction of wasteful foreign exchange on electrical fences, elephant chasing crackers, anes-

thetics and manpower etc. which are inimical to wild life.

The savings can partly be utilized to Catch, Tame and Export (CTE) the elephant surplus.

I am confident that the above mentioned export strategy can contribute towards solving many of the practical problems of HEC and EC while helping to alleviate the country's main food and habitat requirements as well as debt repayment problems in the medium and the long term.

Despite such a system, 2,500 nonbreed hybrid so-called Jersey animals from Australia were imported as part of a massive import order of 20,000. On farms in the dry zone such as Ridiyagama, they were detained, sprayed with water using electric fans and cooled. Certainly, it was a degradation of cattle farming. It was boasted that the animals would give 20 litres of milk a day but received only 8-10 litres a day. In addition, a large number of these animals have already died due to the presence of a deadly disease which is not found in Sri Lankan animals. But animals are brought to the island despite the objection of the farm officers.

The Government recently stopped the import of cars, spices and foodstuffs to save foreign exchange. Nevertheless, the money spent on importing these animals is more of a crime than the Central Bank robbery. The only thing that happened during the bank robbery was that they broke into the bank and took the money. Calculating the cost of importing these animals, the death of sick animals and damage caused to the local animals by the imported cows is a more serious crime than the notorious bank

robbery. No country in the world imports animals for breeding dairy cows. Sri Lanka can be self-sufficient in dairy cattle in about 4-5 years by importing sexed semen or producing the same locally in order to breed only female animals. Dairy products imported from Europe, New Zealand and Australia are branded as A2. Medical researchers say that the use of A2 milk may increase the risk of diabetes, cancer and high blood pressure. Consumption for A1 products, including milk, is very suitable and healthy and we should use more of those dairy products.

Row over who represents coup-hit Myanmar at UN



UN: Myanmar's military junta and the envoy sent by its toppled civilian government have launched contradictory claims over who represents the country at the United Nations, officials said Tuesday.

Ambassador Kyaw Moe Tun spectacularly broke with the junta before the General Assembly on Friday in an emotional plea for help to restore ousted civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi. The next day, the junta said the envoy had been sacked, but on Monday, Kyaw Moe Tun sent a letter to the president of the UN General Assembly to say that he still holds the

"The perpetrators of the unlawful coup... have no authority to countermand the legitimate authority of the president of my country," said the letter obtained by AFP, referring to Suu Kyi. "I wish therefore to confirm to you that I remain Myanmar's permanent repre-

sentative to the United Nations," he added. On Tuesday, Myanmar's Foreign Ministry sent a note verbale to the UN, also obtained by AFP, claiming Kyaw Moe Tun had been

"The ministry of foreign affairs... has the honour to inform that the state administration council of the republic of the Union of Myanmar terminated the duties and responsibilities of ambassador Kyaw Moe Tun," the note said.

"At present, Tin Maung Naing, deputy permanent representative ambassador, has been assigned as the charge d'affaires ad interim of the permanent mission," the note added.

UN spokesman Stephane Dujarric told a press briefing that the body had received the two "contradictory" letters.

"We are taking a look at those letters, where they came from and what we will do," he said.

Biden's first Cabinet defeat signals Senate hazards ahead

US: US President Joe Biden suffered his first Cabinet defeat Tuesday as he pulled an ill-fated nomination, the clearest signal yet that immensely powerful moderates in the deadlocked Senate can imperil his administration's ambitious agenda.

Biden was forced to abandon his push to make Neera Tanden the White House budget director after centrists on both sides of the political aisle made it clear they would not support her.

The opposition centered around several of Tanden's previous tweets in which she disparaged lawmakers.

"I have accepted Neera Tand-

en's request to withdraw her name from nomination for Director of the Office of Management and Budget," Biden said in a statement.

"I have the utmost respect for her record of accomplishment, her experience and her counsel, and I look forward to having her serve in a role in my administra-

The 50-year-old Tanden, who heads a progressive think tank, wrote the president to say she was withdrawing because she did not want debate over her nomination to be "a distraction from your other priorities."

Several other Biden picks have

made it into their posts with bipartisan support, including Secretary of State Antony Blinken and Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen.

Two more nominees were confirmed Tuesday: Council of Economic Advisors chair Cecilia Rouse, the first Black person to serve in the position, and Commerce Secretary Gina Raimon-

But the Tanden setback comes amid growing recognition that substantial political power now rests in the hands of moderates, and one in particular: Senate Democrat Joe Manchin, who opposed Tanden. - AFP

BRAZIL, US: Brazil on Tuesday registered a record 1,641 COVID-19 deaths in 24 hours, health authorities announced, as the country endures a further worsening of the pandemic.

The country of 212 million inhabitants has recorded a total of 257,361 COVID-19 deaths, according to the health ministry, and has second-highest national death toll after the United States.

Several cities and states last week began imposing a new round of restrictions in a bid to avoid overwhelming their already stretched hospitals. Meanwhile, US President Joe Biden said Tuesday the United

No cause of death was given but the Jamaican culture ministry said Wailer had been hospitalized in Kingston since Decem-



Wailer, who was born Neville Livingstone in the Nine Mile district, where Marley also came from, suffered a stroke in 2018 and another in July of last year. He was the last surviving orig-

inal member of the Wailers. Marley died of cancer in 1981, and Peter Tosh was murdered in

Wailer, who was a childhood friend of Marley, won three Grammys over the course of his career and in 2017 he was awarded Jamaica's Order of Merit, one of the country's

Wailer played in development and popu-

across the world," Culture Minister Olivia Grange said in a statement.

"We remember with great pride how Bunny, Bob Marley and Peter Tosh took Reggae music to the four corners of the earth," Grange added.

Marley and Tosh acted as The Wailers' primary singers and songwriters but Wailer played a key role in providing harmonies and percussion to the trio's songs, according to Rolling Stone magazine.

The Wailers are responsible for the Wailers sound. Bob, Peter, and myself: We are totally responsible for the Wailers sound, and what the Wailers brought to the world, and left as a legacy," Wailer told Afropop in

The band's debut album on a major label, "Catch a Fire," released in 1973, helped propel the group to international fame.

At one point that record was ranked 126th on Rolling Stone's 500 Greatest Albums list.

band's biggest hits include "Simmer Down" and "One Love."

After leaving the band in 1974, Wailer went on to enjoy a prolific solo career as a writer, producer and singer of what is perhaps Jamaica's best known export.

He drew much praise for his album "Blackheart Man," which included the song "Burning Down Sentence," which drew on Wailer's experience doing a oneyear prison sentence for marijuana possession.

"The tracks that 'Blackheart Man' were very symbolic and significant to this whole development of reggae music," Wailer told Reggaeville

"I really consider 'Blackheart Man' to be one of those albums that the universal reggae world should be focused on," Wailer

Wailer, a Rastafarian like Marley, won the Grammy for best Reggae album three times in the 1990s.

Tributes to Wailer poured in Tuesday.

"In my view, Bunny Wailer was a more potent musician than even Bob Marley," said Karyl Walker, a veteran Jamaican entertainment journalist. "He played instruments, more than one, and he wrote very good


Walker noted that the wildly popular line dance song "Electric Boogie" from 1983 was written by Wailer.

"Now all the Wailers are dead and it is incumbent on the younger Jamaican entertainers to raise the bar and carry on this rich legacy," Walker told AFP.

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World won't vanquish COVID virus this year - WHO

unrealistic to think the world will be done with the COVID-19 pandemic by the end of the year, the World Organization warned Monday.

Emergencies WHODirector Michael Ryan said it might however be possible to take the tragedy out of the coronavirus crisis by reducing hospitalisations and deaths.

But the virus remains in control, he added, especially given that global new case numbers increased last week after six consecutive weeks of decline.

"It will be very premature, and I think unrealistic, to think that we're going to finish with this virus by the end of the year," Ryan told journalists.

"But I think what we can finish with, if we're smart, is the hospitalisations, the deaths and the tragedy

SWITZERLAND: It is associated with this pandemic."

Ryan said that vaccinating front-line health care workers and those most vulnerable to severe disease would "take the fear... out of the pandemic".

But he added that recent progress could not be taken for granted and "right now the virus is very much in control".

WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said new case numbers rose last week in Europe, the Americas, southeast Asia and the eastern Mediterranean.

'This is disappointing, but not surprising," he said. "Some of it appears to be due to relaxing of public health measures, continued circulation of variants, and people letting down their

"Vaccines will help to save lives, but if countries

rely solely on vaccines, they're making a mistake. Basic public health measures remain the foundation of the response.'

Maria Van Kerkhove, the WHO's COVID-19 technical lead, added: "If the last week tells us anything, it's that this virus will rebound if we let it -- and we cannot let it.'

However, as doses become more widespread, "clearly there will need to be considerations around how public health measures... can be adapted", he added. - AFP

Over 400 acts of violence against COVID health workers in 2020: Report

US: Insults, beatings, arrests - health workers battling the coronavirus were subjected to more than 400 acts of violence related to COVID-19 worldwide in 2020, according to a report published Tuesday by a health NGO.

Safeguarding Health in Conflict Coalition unveiled an interactive map that shows 1,172 violent acts and attacks occurred against health workers or facilities last year, "a minimum estimate," according to the NGO.

More than a third (412) of the acts are directly related to COVID-19, it said, citing several examples including in Mexico, where a nurse was attacked and injured by a group accusing her of spreading the virus.

One in four people will have hearing problems by 2050 - WHO

SWITZERLAND: One in four of the hearing problems currently, it said. But world's population will suffer from hearing problems by 2050, the World Health Organization warned Tuesday, calling for extra investment in prevention and treat-

The first-ever global report on hearing said that the causes of many of the problems - such as infections, diseases, birth defects, noise exposure and lifestyle choices -- could be prevented.

The report proposed a package of measures, which it calculated would cost \$1.33 per person per year.

Against that, it set the figure of nearly a trillion US dollars lost every year because the issue was not being properly addressed.

"Failure to act will be costly in terms of the health and well-being of those affected, and the financial losses arising from their exclusion from communication, education and employment," said the report. One in five people worldwide have

the report warned: "The number of people with hearing loss may increase more than 1.5-fold during the next three decades" to 2.5 billion people - up from 1.6 billion in 2019. Of the 2.5 billion, 700 million would in

2050 have a serious enough condition to require some kind of treatment, it added - up from 430 million in 2019. Much of the expected rise is due to

demographic and population trends, it A major contributor to hearing prob-

lems is a lack of access to care, which is particularly striking in low-income countries where there are far fewer professionals available to treat them. Since nearly 80 percent of people with

hearing loss live in such countries, most are not getting the help they need.

Even in richer countries with better facilities, access to care is often uneven,

Just 4% of COVID research relevant to Africa - Study

scientific research published on COVID-19 is relevant to Africa despite the continent containing close to a fifth of humanity, according to an analysis published Tuesday.

With nearly four million confirmed cases across the continent, the authors of the study said the relative lack of research on Africa or authored by Africans added to the growing body of "evidence of coloniality in global health research and decisionmaking".

Researchers analysed more than 2,000 peer-reviewed articles published in the 10 leading health and medical journals between January 1 and September 30, 2020.

Just 94 out of 2,196 articles studied -- around four percent -- contained content related to Africa or a specific African country, the analysis found.

In the articles relevant to Africa,



There have been over four million confirmed COVID-19 cases in Africa since the start of the pandemic.

just 210 out of 619 listed authors who were African – 34 percent.

That means that two-thirds of the authors of COVID-19 research related to the continent were non-African, compared with African authors making up three percent of the authors of non-Africa-focused research.

Africa is home to 17 percent of the world's population.

The authors of the analysis, published in the online journal BMJ Global Health, said the results were not surprising given how African authors have historically been underrepresented across scientific

> "Health policy is not only informed by original research; sensible, contextually appropriate guidelines,


essential to improving the functioning of healthcare systems," they

"This is especially true during times of surge, when original research can be challenging to produce in low resource settings, like those in Africa.

"African voices and research are needed to guide the local pandemic response," they concluded.


The authors called for governments to increase research funding, particularly into infectious diseases, and said that scientific journals had a role to play in ensuring their studies are more representative of the global population.

The time has come that authoritative journals need to turn to authors and ask where local representation is on papers describing health systems in regions that are not there own," they wrote. - AFP

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More than 200 underage migrants housed at US border

US: Faced with surging numbers of unaccompanied minors at the southern US border, President Joe Biden's administration reopened a temporary reception facility that on Tuesday housed more than 200 teenagers, the Department of Health and Human Services said.

The facility, located in Carrizo Springs, Texas, was initially intended to house oil workers and was used to accommodate young migrants for a month in July 2019, under Donald Trump's administration.

Dealing with "increasing numbers" of unaccompanied children, as well as restrictions on structures due to the coronavirus pandemic, the

pened the facility on February

As of Tuesday, 214 teenagers between the ages of 13 and 17 were living there, HHS said in a statement.

The number of underage migrants arriving alone at the border with Mexico had fallen to a low of 741 in April 2020 and has been rising steadily since, to 5,871 in January.

The arrivals represent "a challenge at the border that we are managing," interior secretary Alejandro Mayorkas said Monday, denying that there was a border crisis.

The opening of the Carrizo facility, capable of housing 700 people, has raised eyebrows among migrant rights activists and organizations.

US: At least 15 people were killed in southern California on Tuesday when a vehicle packed with passengers collided with a large truck in a "chaotic scene" close to the Mexico border, officials said.

The accident occurred when the SUV carrying more than two dozen people -including minors -- and a semi-truck full of gravel crashed near El Centro, California, Judy Cruz, an official from El Centro Regional Medical Center said.

The area of the state is a thoroughfare for Mexican immigrants and farmworkers headed north towards California's rich agricultural center, but officials said it was still unknown whether the passengers were migrants.

"It's too early in the investigation to say what they were doing and where they were coming from," Omar Watson of the California Highway Patrol said during a Tuesday afternoon press briefing.

A total of 25 occupants, including a driver, were traveling in the SUV at the time of the crash, he told reporters earlier in the day.

"We had 15 fatalities on scene, one person passed over at the hospital, a total of 13 people passed away," he said. Among the dead was the SUV's 22-year-old driver.

Those killed ranged in age from 20 to 55, but at least one of the injured was a minor age

The collision occurred on State Route 115 near the town of Holtville, about 10 miles (16 kilometres) north of Mex-

FBI Director defends actions ahead of US Capitol riot

US: FBI Director Christopher Wray on Tuesday defended his bureau's handling of intelligence ahead of the January 6 US Capitol riot, while telling lawmakers of an alarming recent spike in domestic terrorism cases.

Wray faced a grilling from members of Congress in his first testimony since the deadly insurrection by supporters of then-President Donald Trump, particularly over whether the Federal Bureau of Investigation underestimated the danger.

As he sought to show the bureau was taking the threat seriously, he said it has dramatically increased its probes of domestic extremist groups including those advocating white supremacy, and that his agents were now pursuing 2,000 extremism cases -double the number since he became FBI director in

Wray stood by his agency's handling of raw intelligence gathered on the eve of the Capitol unrest, after law enforcement personnel testified to Congress last month that they were not sufficiently briefed by the intelligence community of the January 6 threat.

"The way in which it was handled at least as I understand it strikes me as consistent with our normal process," Wray told a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing.

Wray was referring to a report of raw, unverified intelligence compiled by the FBI's Norfolk, Virginia field office on January 5 and emailed to US Capitol Police and other security offices.

The intelligence report cited social media chatter warning that Trump supporters were planning to storm the Capitol, with extremists "ready for war."

Wray said police were also verbally briefed about the threat, and it was posted on a portal made available to law enforcement personnel in the national capital region and around the country.

He said the email went to multiple US Capitol Police task force officers.

When asked why the report did not flow up to police leadership ahead of the riot, Wray said "I don't have a good answer for that" and acknowledged that he himself did not see the report until days after January 6.

Israel Army faces 'BATTLE OVER BEARDS'



is facing a challenge on the home front unrelated to traditional threats against the Jewish state: it's over facial hair, and activists say the Army's future is at stake.

Bar Pinto and Gilad Levi, two red-bearded 29-yearolds, have founded "Beard Exemptions for All" ("Ptor Zakan Lekulam" in Hebrew), a campaign challenging Israeli military rules compelling all male troops to be clean-shaven.

Pinto and Levi have taken issue with a system that grants exemptions to that rule on religious grounds, while the faces of secular troops must remain smooth.

They argue this exacerbates tensions within the

ISRAEL: Israel's military ranks. "There is an obvious rules governing facial hair group of 17 soldiers who discrimination between religious and secular," Pinto said. "It's not legal," Levi added. Military duty at age 18 is mandatory in Israel, with young men compelled to serve for nearly three

years and women for two. But increasing numbers are seeking exemptions, citing psychological conditions and other factors as grounds to avoid service. Defence Minister Benny Gantz recently said that more than half of young Israelis were not serving in the military.

Pinto and Levi told AFP that they view military service as a sacred part of Israeli citizenship, but that with the army struggling to attract young people, rigid

are counterproductive. "We want the army to

focus on what really matters: investing time and resources to defend the country," not the facial hair of its soldiers, said Pinto. 'Why complicate the lives

of these young men who are making an effort to serve their country and give the best years of their lives?"

Beard Exemptions for All is bolstered by a nearly 4,000-member Facebook group, an online video campaign and merchandise, including t-shirts and stickers featuring the army's

logo, branded with a beard. Israeli army rules state that "all soldiers are required to shave their faces". A

agree with that assertion filed a supreme court petition in January seeking to force the army to grant exemptions to anyone who makes a request.

Levi said 1,600 troops had contributed money from their own pockets to fund the legal challenge, which had so far raised 120,000 shekels (\$36,000). Facial hair, they argued, is crucial to many young Israeli men, regardless of their level of devoutness.

"Religious and secular are brothers in arms, we live together in this country,' Pinto said. "Beards should not be an issue that divides

UK news group to pay legal costs to Meghan

UK: The UK newspaper group that published a letter written by Meghan Markle should pay interim legal costs following her high-profile privacy claim victory last month, a judge ruled on Tuesday.

Markle, who is formally known as the Duchess of Sussex and is married to Queen Elizabeth II's grandson Prince Harry, won a comprehensive victory in February against Associated Newspapers after extracts of the 2018 letter were published in

The letter to her estranged father Thomas Markle was written a few months after she married Harry, and asked him to stop talking to tabloids and making false claims about her in interviews.

At a remote hearing at the High Court in London on Tuesday, judge Mark Warby ordered Associated Newspapers to make "interim payment"

£450,000 (\$627,000, 520,000 euros) to cover legal costs.

But the figure stopped short of the £750,000 requested by Meghan's lawyer Ian Mill. Following the ruling, lawyers

for the publishers of the Mail On Sunday weekly and MailOnline website indicated they would appeal. Further details are due to be outlined in a later written ruling. - AFP

All 279 kidnapped Nigerian students released

NIGERIA: All 279 girls kidnapped from their boarding school in northern Nigeria have been released and are on Government premises, the local governor told AFP on Tuesday.

Nigerian President Muhammadu Buhari expressed "overwhelming joy" over the release of the girls from days of captivity, vowing tougher action against kidnappers. Nigeria has been rocked by

four mass abductions of students in less than three months, sparking widespread anger against the government and memories of the 2014 kidnapping of hundreds of schoolgirls in Chibok, in the country's east, that shocked the world.

"I am happy to announce that the girls are free," Dr. Bello Matawalle, Governor of Zamfara State, told an AFP journalist early Tuesday. "They

An AFP reporter saw hundreds of girls wearing hijabs, gathered at the government

premises. Authorities initially said 317 girls were abducted in the raid by hundreds of gunmen on the Government Girls Secondary School in remote Jangebe village on Friday.

But Matawalle said the "total number of female students abducted" was 279. In December, more than 300

boys were kidnapped from a school in Kankara, in President Muhammadu Buhari's home state of Katsina, while he was visiting the region. The gangs are largely driven

by financial motives and have no known ideological leanings. But there are concerns they are being infiltrated by armed

The jihadists' decade-old conflict has killed more than 30,000 people and spread into neighbouring Niger, Chad and

Roshan Mahanama wins top title in back-to-back years

The Observer-Mobitel School Cricketer of the Year 2021 will be launched next week with the commencement of the inter-school matches from later next week.

The Observer-Mobitel School Cricketer of the Year 2020 awards ceremony which has been postponed due to Covid-19 pandemic is likely to be held later next month after Sinhala and Tamil New Year.

However, only a few two-day matches will be played as non-tournament encounters as this year the Sri Lanka Schools Cricket Association (SLSCA) will confine its matches to a championship decided by one-day matches

Up to a maximum eight tournament matches including five in the qualifying round league will be played by a team. The final round matches will be from the quarter final knockout stage.

The Observer-Mobitel School Cricketer of the Year had a humble start in 1979. Even in the previous 1978, there had been a similar event in Galle. In both 1978 and 1979, the present Chief ICC Match Referee Ranjan Madugalle emerged as the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year.

After Arjuna Ranatunga of Ananda won the Observer School Cricketer of the Year for the second time in 1982, another champion cricketer from the adjoining Nalanda created history, winning the back to back Observer School Cricketer of the Year titles in 1983 and 1984.

Nalanda captain Roshan Mahanama was well popular even from his schoolboy days. He was a born star who marked his presence from school level to international world as a former Sri Lanka captain and ex-ICC Match Ref-

Having first made his mark at Nalanda, he is a classic example to all as one of the stylish top order batsmen. Looking back at school cricket, Mahanama believes that there should be a balance in the number of matches a school team has to play during a season if the quality of the game is to be maintained.

In a recent interview on school cricket, he agreed that more opportunities should be given to outstation

However, it should not be done at the expense of quality. He said that the country's first premier school cricket award - Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year, has always motivated schoolboy cricketers as they look forward to being rewarded and recognized at the end of each

"Events of this nature motivated us as emerging cricketers. It is always a great feeling when you know that your achievements are being recognized," he said.

He said it was a great encouragement to be adjudged the best schoolboy cricketer and be honored for the hard work during the season.

"Winning the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year in successive years was a memorable occasion. It was a great feeling to win that and step into club cricket and thereafter to the national team. When I was crowned the best Schoolboy Cricketer, it gave me even more determination to work harder at top level," he added.

"Unlike today, we had packed houses to witness the inter-school matches. I had watched some of the former Nalanda cricketers such as Bandula Warnapura in action. It was a passion and the school authorities too encouraged the boys to watch matches."

Mahanama said there are no shortcuts to success and one must go through the hard process. "Young schoolboy cricketers must have a gen-It was one of my dreams and I was uine willingness and desire to work privileged to receive this wonderful towards their targets with dedication.

They must remember that there are no shortcuts for success", said Mahanama who was also an exceptionally clever fielder during his days.

"During our era, we did not get many opportunities to play international matches at school level. I had played for Nalanda for five First X1 seasons, but got only two overseas tours. "In contrast, the present day players had more and more opportunities until 2019. Players must make full use of these tours," he said.

Mahanama urged schoolboys to work hard to achieve their targets in a disciplined manner, maintaining the high traditions of the game - instead of being 'remote-controlled'.

The stylish top order bat, recalling his days as a schoolboy cricketer at Nalanda, said that it was a great feeling to have their names on the team's fixture card.

Mahanama said even their old boys made it a point to skip all other engagements to watch their school team in action, adding it was a great honour to see their names in the fixture card - first as a player, then as a coloursman and later as vice-captain or captain.

Though former Ananda captain Arjuna Ranatunga won the Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year titles in 1980 and 1982, it was Mahanama who became the first schoolboy to win the prestigious title in successive years in 1983 and 1984.

He first won the 'Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year' title in 1983 with a rich harvest of runs with the willow. He continued to let his willow to do the talking in the following year too and his superb form won him the title for the second successive year in

Besides Ranatunga and Mahanama,

the others to win the title twice were Thilan Samaraweera (1994 and 1995), Lahiru Peiris (2004 and 2005), Bhanuka Rajapakse (2010 and 2011) and Charith Asalanka (2015 and

It was his late father Upali Mahanama who had been a tower of strength behind the celebrated cricketer's success story. "My late father was a great source of encouragement. He stressed the importance of adding values and discipline to our lives. Then I was lucky to come under the watchful eyes of Lionel Sir (Lionel Mendis)"

"He set us targets as young players and groomed us well. Most importantly, we were taught to respect the game, its culture and to follow team ethics. Even the coaches and masters in charge during our time conducted themselves in an exemplary manner to earn respect. We also had the highest respect and regard for umpires," said Mahanama, recalling the early part of his distinguished career.

He said the deteriorating standards in school cricket has prevented youngsters from directly marching into the national team like in the past.

"In the past, there were players such as Ranjan Madugalle who earned their places in the national team directly from school level and even made it to the World Cup. Unfortunately, we do not often find consistent players in school cricket, ready to face that challenge," he said.

Mahanama is of the view that his crowning glory as the 'Observer Schoolboy Cricketer of the Year' in 1983 and 1984 was a major milestone in his career.

"To be adjudged the best schoolboy cricketer and be honored for the hard work during the season was a great encouragement. I was privi-

leged to achieve it as one of my dreams," he said.

Mahanama, who turns 55 on May 31, represented Sri Lanka in 52 Tests with an aggregate of 2576 runs with four centuries and 11 fifties. His career-best double century (225) was registered against India

In the same match Sri Lanka posted the highest Test innings total as Mahanama shared a record partnership of 576 runs with Sanath Jayasuriya (340) at the Premadasa Stadium in Colombo.

In a creditable move in his last Test for Sri Lanka - against South Africa at Centurion Park in 1998, he scored a half century.

Mahanama played in 213 One Day Internationals for Sri Lanka to enjoy an aggregate of 5,162 runs with four centuries and 35 half centuries.

Leslie Donovan Perera, first Lankan to win Olympic bout

The first Sri Lankan to enter an Olympic ring and win a bout was Leslie Donovan Perera Handunge, from Kandy and also the second son of Kandy to blaze the Olympic trail. He was known as Perera at school. He was remembered by all sports lovers in Kandy, specially by the Boxing, Cricket and Rugby. He was one of the finest sportsmen Kandy has ever produced.

He became the best Director of Physical Education at the Peradeniya University, yet to be replaced by his class of work. When he was in charge of all the grounds at Peradeniya, they were in perfect condition, even international cricket matches were played before Sri Lanka got Test status. Leslie Handunge represented Ceylon at the 1948 Olympic Games and was the first Ceylonese to enter an Olympic ring and win an Olym-

pic bout by beating Mexcican Tello in the men's - flyweight, ranking 9th at the 1952 Olympic Games. He joined Trinity College as a

schoolboy from Matale, and was guided in the correct path by the coaches. He excelled at Trinity College in four major events cricket, boxing, rugby and athletics. After leaving school, he played inter-club hockey and football for Kandy Rovers and was rated as one of the finest center forwards in hockey. In football he played as left-inside. Leslie played rugger for Kandy Sports Club and Up-Country. He was a master in every sport he

Later Leslie became one of the top class rugby referees and officiated the Trinity-Royal under 17 game as referee for four years. When Kandy Lake Club was playing in the 'B' division, he was the only referee



from Kandy to handle the games played in Kandy. He was famous for his lectures when at refereeing matches, he used to halt the game and deliver brief lectures. He also refereed football games and was a cricket and hockey

When Leslie was handling the University playgrounds at Peradeniya as Director of Physical Education, it was the only facility in Kandy with four sports fields together (Tennis court, Hockey, Athletics, Cricket grounds with turf wicket). After he left the office, a matting was laid by the side of the turf and constructed football and rugby grounds, all in-a-row.



Moreover, an electronic payment facility is available for Cargo Management System (CMS) in Container Freight Station (CFS) 1, CFS IV and BQ Warehouse Complex and partially implemented CMS at CFS Peliyagoda which will be fully functioning in the near future. Meanwhile, documents for rework operations(rework applications and guarantee letters) and acceptance of empty container removal applications are operating electronically. General Manager – Operations of South Asia Gateway Terminals (Pvt) Ltd (SAGT), Upul Jinadasa explained that the paperless system at SAGT is process driven, adaptation of right technology, establishing accuracy, standardization and discipline across all related data and processes. "Although digitalisation

"Although digitalisation has been established at the SAGT since 2003, a digital paperless delivery processing including-payments has been introduced in June 2020." Under the paperless system, vehicle booking system is introduced to minimise truck waiting times, traffic and optimise utilisation and costs where current average truck turnaround time including entry queuing is less than 45 minutes. Lankan firms provided guidelines for export to EU

The Delegation of German Industry and Commerce (AHK) in Sri Lanka has released a guideline in partnership with the United Nations Industrial Development Organization on how to export agricultural products to the European Union.New and existing regulations will require that exporters ensure traceability of their supply chains.

Organic certification will also require additional checks and registration both locally and internationally. The guide also deals with local regulation. Use of the lion trademark along with the Ceylon Tea or Spice logos will require approval from the relevant agency. AHK released the guidelines to its stakeholders and on its website on March 2 via a webi-

Sri Lankan firms are advised to refrain from using cheques for payment as they have been phased out in Europe.Germany is currently the second-largest market for organic produce in the world. To export organic products into Europe Sri Lankan businesses need to be registered and certified through a registered control body. In Sri Lanka, there are currently 7 approved certifications bodies, the Control Union, Sri Lanka, The Netherlands; Ecocert, India, France: NASAA Certified Organic (NCO); Australia, Lacon, Germany; QAI, Quality Assurance International, USA; OneCert, USA; MayaCert, Guatemala. When a Sri Lankan company is certified organic by an EU approved certification body, it is allowed to use the EU organic logo on its products, and it is eligible to export organic products to the EU.

FCCISL, Embassy of Sri Lanka in Beijing gift Ceylon Tea to CICCPS

The Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry of Sri Lanka (FCCISL) in collaboration with the Embassy of Sri Lanka in Beijing gifted a consignment of Ceylon Tea to Party Secretary of the China International Chamber of Commerce for the Private Sector (CICCPS) and Executive President of APTA, CCI headquartered of Beijing, Wang Yanguo.

Yanguo was instrumental in gifting much needed

medical supplies to Sri Lanka during the early days of the Covid-19 pandemic (2020). Wang spoke at length about enhancing the bilateral economic and trade relationship. He also proposed holding the next meeting of the CICCPS in Sri Lanka and leading a large delegation of business people to Sri Lanka. He was particularly interested in the opportunities available in the Hambantota

Tourism, factory workers to get Covid vaccine priority - Minister

President Gotabaya Rajapaksa has agreed to give priority to those engaged in the field of tourism and factory workers, from the next stock of Covid vaccines to arrive in the island, Tourism Minister Prasanna Ranatunga said.

The Minister expressed his belief that it would be possible to vaccinate persons in the field of tourism and employees of all factories in the country at a special discussion held at the Ministry of Tourism on yesterday to determine the progress of procedures of bringing in tourists to the country.

Tourist institutions which had been responsible for bringing in the largest number of tourists prior to the Covid-19 pandemic had been summoned for this discussion. This meeting was held to discuss problem faced by them in this present situation. Minister Ranatunga said that the second phase of the Covid-19 vaccination drive was been implemented now. During this instance, people over 30

years of age are being vaccinated in the Western Province where the disease was most reported from based on Grama Sewa Divisions.

The Minister said that by yesterday, 553,821 persons had been vaccinated. The Minister also said that lists of names of approximately 20,000 persons including tourist guides, drivers and employees of hotels registered under the Tourism Development Authority have already been sent to the Ministry of Health.He said further that in addition, steps are underway to give the vaccine to others engaged in the field of tourism, as well. There are 14 Free Trade Zones throughout the

island belonging to the Board of Investment. In addition, there are industrial parks too. The Minister said that there are more than 250 factories located within the Free Trade Zones

The number of employees working in these exceeds 130,000. Minister Ranatunga said that in the future they intend to provide the vaccination employees working at more than 1,700 factories across the island. The Minister also focused his attention on several problems faced by representatives of institutions organizing tours to Sri Lanka.

Attention was focused on the fact that many countries from

which large numbers of tourists arrived here had not been granted permission to visit Sri Lanka and the difficulties tourists had to face when obtaining visas for arrival was also discussed. Minister Ranatunga said that he will discuss this matter with the Department of Immigration and Emigration and an expedited solution will be provided. In addition, a lengthy discussion was held on restrictions in place when bringing down tourists to this country. It was decided during this instance to draw the attention of the Covid Committee and health authorities to this issue. Secretary to the Ministry of Tourism S. Hettiarachchi was also present at this discussion.

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Laxapana Batteries to invest Rs 1.1bn to enter renewable energy space

Laxapana Batteries PLC is entering the renewable energy business. The company has stated its intentions to invest over one billion rupees in generating renewable energy from rooftop solar projects.

To fund the investment, the company proposes raising Rs 540 million (Mn) by way of a rights issue and also intends to lock-in in long-term debt to benefit from the prevailing lowinterest rate regime. At an Extraordinary General Meeting held on February 10, 2021, the Shareholders of Laxapana Batteries PLC approved the Rights Issue to offer 36,000,000 ordinary shares, which is in the proportion of 12 new ordinary shares for every 13 existing ordinary shares held at Rs 15 per share. With a Rs 1.1billion investment to develop rooftop solar projects, Laxa-



pana is well positioned with a sustainable business model to contribute towards the government's policy of increasing the share of renewable energy production in the nation's total energy needs.

Despite the challenging economic environment that began with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Laxapana has delivered a resilient performance in the FY2020/21 period. During these uncertain times, the Company witnessed growth in Q3 FY2020/21 with a revenue increase by 14%, over Q3 FY2019/20 and profit before tax growing by Rs.

29.4 Mn. The Company recorded revenue of Rs 206.2 Mn and Rs 552.7 Mn in Q3 FY2020/21 and nine months ended 31st

December 2020

respectively. These compare to Rs 180.4 Mn and Rs 506.2 Mn to corresponding periods in FY2019/20. Cumulative profit before tax of Rs. 100.4 Mn for the nine months ended December 31, 2020, is a notable year-on-year increase of 113% over Rs. 47.2 Mn recorded last year nine months despite numerous challenges encountered in the business

environment.

The new investment initiative further diversifies the company's business portfolio and is expected to contribute positively to earnings going forward.

The Vehicle Importers Association of Sri Lanka (VIASL) requested a meeting with President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to discuss a survival plan put forward by its association. It also intends to discuss challenges faced by the industry due to the ban imposed on motor vehicle imports which has been in effect since March 2020, which the association claims has

adversely impacted the economy of vehicle importers and all related industries.

VIASL Secretary Arosha
Rodrigo addressing the media in Colombo last week said vehicle importers as well as related service providers were facing severe difficulties maintaining their business premises and paying off bank loans, rent and the salaries of their

He said now a large number of importers in the country have run out of stocks and some don't have a single vehicle in their showrooms and were struggling to survive and pay

their employees. Rodrigo cautioned that if the ban is to continue further, they will be forced to close down their business and make all their employees redundant. He said around 100,000 direct and indirect employees will have to be made redundant, while 350,000-400,000 dependents of these employees will lose their livelihood.

He said vehicle importers, as well as government permit holders, who had opened letters of credit prior to the import ban, and should be provided these vehicles.
Since all circulars regarding clearing of imported vehicles

with the opportunity to import

clearing of imported vehicles from Sri Lankan ports were published on a retrospective basis, there are several permit holders as well as importers who are struggling to import the vehicles they have ordered and confirmed legally through a valid letter of credit.

Local manufacturing and assembling has been portrayed as a solution to the foreign exchange issue, but Rodrigo alleged that this would not benefit the coffers as the value addition of the process was minimal and it has been merely designed for tax evasion and higher profit margins for a few companies.

He said that the general public would be the ultimate victim as a result consequences of the ban being forced to purchase low-quality products sans adequate safety and emission standards at an inflated price. **MFJ**


"Energy price revision may have a cascading effect on many sectors of the economy. Most importantly, it could trigger a broad-based rise in general price levels.Downstream sector products such as kerosene, heating oil, fuel oils, lubricants, waxes, asphalt, and other petrochemicals would also revise prices affecting multitude of industries, the report said.

Many large-scale construction contractors are less likely to experience margin erosion due to raw material price increases. However, small-tomedium scale contractors who generally enter into fixed price contracts may have to absorb some losses. When the global metal prices collapsed in 1Q 2020, the local importers did not drop the prices but in fact increased due to import restrictions. Hence, they may have developed some loss absorbing capacity to hold the prices in the medium term. The year 2020 marks the lowest global commodity prices in the recent history as a result of extraordi-

nary events that unfolded with

the onset of COVID outbreak towards the end of 1Q.

The oil prices plummeted to historic lows, even turning negative momentarily for the first time in history. Other commodities met with similar fate with base metal prices steeply declining as major industrial powerhouses scaled down operations. Sri Lanka was able to exploit the low oil prices that prevailed during



2020, amidst weaker domestic demand to ease some pressure off the rupee by cutting the

petroleum import costs by around 30% in 2020 compared to 2019.

According to UN Inter-governmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), largest growth in the carbon emissions has come from electricity generation, transport and industry. Therefore, Innovation in sustainable, environmental-friendly infrastructure development, transport and renewable energy are necessary to meet these challenges.

Construction activities due to infrastructure development can generate large amounts of waste materials that need to be disposed of. A large amount of construction waste is disposed in landfill sites. There is a potential to recycle many elements of construction waste.

"Therefore, investing in identifying and developing methods in mitigating construction waste and implementing processes to recycle construction waste will become a necessity if the world has to achieve the sustainable development goals by 2030. Innovation in more environmental friendly ways of designing

address these burning issues. We need to enhance scientific research, upgrade the technological capabilities and encourage Investment in infrastructure

and construction are necessary to

will drive Industrialization and industrialization in turn is essential for development. Industry creates employment, generates income and contributes to poverty alleviation, promotes social inclusion and empowers women.

As industry develops, it enhances the need to increase value addition of raw materials through manufacturing. This in turn, needs and enhances the application of science, technology and innovation. The Governments need to promote greater investment in skills and education in order to develop science and technology. Investment in education will contribute towards achieving the other sustainable development goals.

While promoting large scale industrialization, it is vital to promote small-scale industrial and other enterprises by enabling access to investment, financial services, including affordable credit, and their integration into value chains and markets.

MILCO was established in 1956 as "The National Milk Board" under the purview of the Ministry of Agriculture. It commenced operations with a single factory in Colombo commissioned under the Colombo Plan. Today it boasts of a wide network of milk collection, production and sales centres administrated through out the island and continue to contribute towards the enhancement of the rural economy while providing the much needed nutrition to the entire nation. At present Milco is operating profitably after reforms at the company following new management in

For more than 12 years, Wickramasinghe has served at IFS R&D International, a leading international information technology company, as an expert in the fields of supply chain management and tax reporting principles in various countries. Lanka; Lasantha Wickramasighe shared his views along with the new developments of MILCO. Here are the excerpts of the interview.

Q: What is your mission in making the company more stable with the ongoing system in Sri Lanka?

Milco has become a profit making venture. Our Mission is to be a proactive partner in achieving the targeted growth in fresh milk production whilst strengthening the local dairy farmer. Modern technology supported with continuous improvement initiatives to be applied in the processing of nutritious food and beverages to provide our valued consumers at affordable prices.

We have presently got four factories in Ambewala, Digana, Polonnaruwa and Narahenpita along with 93 island wide chilling centres. We maintain around 2000 self-regulating dairy farm societies and collect milk through these societies around the country. These societies collect dairy milk, chill it and distribute all around the country. We have around 23,981 active Dairy Farmers.

Milco was not in a very healthy environment in the beginning of 2020. It has been facing a severe cash flow and the delay of wages of dairy farmers. So that dairy farmers were getting distracted from Milco to join other companies. Communication among employees was in a poor standard. The Organization culture has been deteriorating. However by the end of 2020, the whole income of dairy farmers got increased in more than 15% of what it was. The standard of Milco became extremely successful in the year end by resolving the issue of cash flow, by regular payments of dairy farmers, and re-joining the dairy farmers who have been away from Milco. The promotions for the staff became hundred percent fair and deserving. Moreover, we have attended in uplifting the welfare of the employees of Milco. Eventually; Milco has become a place with a better enterprise than certain private sector employment.

Q: What are the changes that you have done in Milco by the end of 2020?

We have gained the trust of dairy farmers. In the milk processing aspect, a monthly production plan and Monitoring System has been introduced with continuous improvements to minimize machine downtimes. We have also minimized the stocks of finished goods as well as the management storage cost

whilst maximising the utilization of machineries in the production floors. We, not only restored the on time payments for dairy farmers, but also increased the row milk price by more than 15% for them during 2020. Our ambition is to encourage small dairy farmers all over the island to expand their production capacities.

Q: What is the new foundation for dairy development in MILCO during 2021?

The company is also focusing on creating an ecosystem for increased dairy management. Milco has invested in the backbone infrastructure for cattle feeding, breeding, sharing of best practice and networking. A programme is undergoing to help formers to cultivate pasture. MILCO is purchasing their pasture production and process a bit and then sell it for dairy farmers at a concessionary price. By the end of 2021, we are focusing to create a new market for pasture where many jobs will be created and the dairy production will be increased due to better nutrient for cows. Other than pasture, we are planning to increase our cattle-feed production capacity by five times.

the purpose of providing improved breed heifers for farmers, high breed bull calves with high breed stud bulls. Best practices items were included with financial support for farmers, mobile vet route and providing cooling facilities. Finally for the expansion, we are looking forward to commence our new factory in Badalgama in this year. The corporation is confident of contributing to the government's goal of double the milk and milk by-product production.

Q: How have you faced the problem of retaining farmers in your enterprise?

Trust is the key.Basically we have faced


problems retaining farmers due to the lack of certainty in timely payment during the past. Under the new "Agile Management" system the company has ensured that the industry is more effective for all stakeholders. Trust is resorted. The longstanding bond with the dairy farmer an MILCO is strengthening by now.Under the agile management system, bottom-up discussions have begun with the workforce. Milco Corporation has been able to increase yoghurt production by 10% in the Narahenpita premises with no capital expenditure owing to suggestions and commitment of our employees.

Q: What are the future plans for MILCO in order to make the enterprise more benefited?

Now, MILCO is a profit making venture. We are focusing on creating an ecosystem for increased dairy production. We are planning to invest 10 more chilling centres, and 200 more farmer societies. During 2021, we will conduct an island wide competition to select 100 best dairy farmers with the purpose of cultivating best practices among dairy farmers to increase their own production. We are positively looking forward to double our production within three years.

Lanka Sugar Company Private Limited, Chairman Janaka Nimalachandra

He said that increasing production and saving the drain of valuable foreign exchange on imports of sugar is the priority of the company.

The company had cultivated 10,000 acres of sugarcane last year which included 8,500

acres at Pelwatte and 1,500 acres at Sevanagala. "We plan to crush around 200,000 MT of additional sugarcane and add over 5,000 acres to the cultivation this year," the Chairman

The company had around 40,000 MT of production last year and plans to add 15,000 MT of sugar this year.

"We have embarked on the factory expansion programme to boost the capacity at Sevanagala and cultivation at Pelwatte," said the Chairman.

The government allocated Rs. 475 million through the last budget to increase the factory capacity at Sevanagala.

"Phase II of Sevanagala Sugar factory expansion is to be carried out this the year. Sevanagala Sugar Factory Crushing Capacity to be expanded from 1250 TCD to 1500 TCD." the Chairman said adding that through the project the factory will be able to crush an extra 60,000 MT of sugarcane.

"We have already invested on factory

machinery and vehicles for agriculture," Nimalachandra said adding that Rs. 600 million has been allocated for irrigation of sugar fields at Pelwatte and Sevanagala.

He said the company launched insurance schemes for sugarcane farmers and crop damage which is another first by the company.

The Chairman further stated "We also increased the price by Rs. 250 per MT of sugarcane this year in addition the increase of Rs. 500 per MT last year. Also 10% increment was given for cane transport to support the sugarcane farmers."

Around 2,000 employees from the Sevanagala and Pelwatta factories were awarded permanent appointments upon completion of five years. "This is the first time employees were presented permanent appointments since the launch of the company," the Chairman said adding that certain employees were given permanent placement after 27 years of service.

He said the Cost of Living allowance of 7,800 was added to employees' salary in two stages (last year March and January this year), which was not paid since 2013.

Grade promotions were given to 900 employees after the lapse of over a decade (700-Pelwatte and 200-Sevanagala)

Incentive and bonus for all employees were granted as a festival incentive in April (Rs. 75,000/- + one month's salary per employee at Sevanagala Unit and Rs. 25,000 for Pelwatte

He said simultaneously the sugarcane farmers were also awarded a retention allowance for every metric ton of sugarcane supplied to the two factories. Along with this an incentive was given to farmers based on the quality and yield of sugarcane they

A seed cane subsidiary of 50% and Land Preparation subsidiary of 50% was granted for sugarcane farmers to encourage them to cultivate more.

"We had expanded sugarcane cultivation by 3500 Ha of new land in Pelwatta area and 500 Ha in Sevanagala area," Nimalachandra said

adding that the expansion generated thousands of direct and indirect employment opportunities for people in the Monaragala District.

The company built 30 mini-reservoirs (rain water collection ponds) in Pelwatta and another 20 to be added this year to address

the water scarcity for sugarcane farming. "We introduced animal feed production using the remnants of the sugarcane harvest and sugar production," the Chairman said adding that the additional income generated through this to be transferred to the farmers to uplift their livelihood.

The company introduced high yielding and favorable cane varieties for drought conditions with the assistance of the Sugar Research Institute, commencement of Gal-Amuna irrigation project - phase II (1000ha) with the objective of irrigating 1000 ha of sugar cane cultivation, ensuring uninterrupted supply of sugar to Government institutions which include Co-operatives and Lanka Sathosa outlets specially during the Covid-19 pandemic were steps taken to boost production and support the economy.

"We are working with the Wild Life Department on establishing and repairing electric fence to protect the sugar crop from elephants and other wildlife.

Currently the company maintains and protects a 200Km elephant fence with a cost over Rs. 300 million and 500 staff in the Monaragala district where the two factories are located.

The company provided a permanent solution to the issue of short supply of fertilizer faced by farmers for many years with the assistance of Fertilizer Secretariat.

Lanka Sugar Company also invested in new vehicles for land development, harvesting, collecting and loading, estate protection and fire sections since there are no sufficient machineries and most of the available are over utilized. (70 new vehicles)

The company supported in the production of hand sanitizers and antiseptic liquids locally, required for the health sector and the general public in the Covid -19 pandemic situation


The company produced 40,000MT of sugar and 2.5million liters of additional ethanol

compared to previous year. "We managed to run the distilleries in full capacity. During the past few years the distilleries have operated only half year," the Chairman said.

The company plans to implement an organic fertilizer and biogas producing project in Sevanagala unit which will reduce the cost of oil for boilers and will upgrade the factory to a zerowaste, zero-pollution standard. Plans are afoot to launch an eco-tourism arm under Lanka sugar brand name. "We have commenced work on two resorts at Pelwatte and Sevanagala.'

Establishment of a spray irrigation system in Sevanagala to provide high quality seed cane and to increase the productivity of the plantations (Investment 50Mn.), reducing the loan interest rate of farmers by 4% (from 12% to 8%) which will be a great relief for the farmer families, writing off Rs. 480 million worth farmers loans (3500 farmers) from January 1 to ease the burden of farmers with plans to install a drip irrigation system for Sugar Cane cultivation in Pelwatte Unit - Cost-Rs. 100 Million are some of the expansionary and employee welfare measures taken by the company.
